It's double delight as Downeys take Camogie Award

THE Downey twins, Ann and Angelea, yesterday became the first jointwinners of the National Irish Bank/GAA Camogie Player of the Year Award.

The National Irish Bank Handballer of the Year award went to Eddie Corbett of Ballyporeen, Co. Tipper-ary. The three awards were present by Company Secre-tary, Patricia O'Sullivan-

Kilkenny's win over Wexford, in last year's All-Ireland Final, gave Angela and Ann Downey their twelfth All-Ireland medal each, a remarkable family achievement in sport.

The pair have figured on every Kilkenny winning side in All-Ireland Finals since the county took its first title in 1974. They have also won All-Ireland medals

first title in 1974. They have also won All-Ireland medals in three decades.

Daughters of the famous Shem Downey, who won an All-Ireland Hurling medal with Kilkenny in 1974, both Angela and Ann have accumulated an extraordinary collection of medals and trophies since 1974,

which, in addition to their All-Ireland medals, also includes National League, Interprovincial champion-ship and All-Ireland Club Championship medals, with both St. Paul's and their present club, Lisdowney.

In the all-time list of All Ireland medal-winners, they now share joint-third place behind Kathleen Mills (Dublin) who won fifteen between 1942-1961, and Una O'Connor (Dublin) who won thirteen between 1953-1966. thirteen, between 1953-1966. Twenty-eight-year-old

Eddie Corbett is a talented handball player, administra-tor, referee and coach. He holds eleven All-Ireland medals, with his most achievements significant coming in 1993 and 1994, when he won the All-Ireland 40 x 20 Senior Singles titles.

On the international front, he won the 1993 USA Open Singles Championship, and, last year, he partnered Dan Armijo (USA) to win the Waterford Crystal World Championship in Dublin.

St. Mary's make their third successive appearance at All-Ireland Colleges Finals day. For the second time, they are represented in both senior and junior finals. St. Mary's have a very impressive record since camogie was introduced to the school in 1984. In addition to numerous Cork Colleges titles, St. Mary's have 18 Munster Colleges titles - 4 senior, 5 junior, 5 seven aside and 4 first year.

St. Mary's have seven All-Ireland Colleges titles to their credit. In 1986 they collected their first All-Ireland Colleges junior championship title and retained their crown in 1987. The Charleville girls regained Corn Naomh Gobnait last season. They have enjoyed considerable success in the All-Ireland Sevens winning in 1987, 1988, 1993 and 1994, Their coach, Vincent Harrington is Cathaoirleach of Munster Colleges Council.

ST. MARY'S, MAGHERAFELT

Today St. Mary's, Magherafelt contest the All-Ireland Colleges Junior Championship final for the third time in four years.

St. Mary's affiliated to Ulster Colleges in 1968. They contested a number of junior and senior Ulster finals from 1970 onwards. The first Ulster title came to the School in 1989 when the first year side won out. They added the U14 title in 1991. In 1992, St. Mary's won the Ulster junior championship and have extended their winning run in the competition to four titles. In that year they qualified for the All-Ireland Final and brought St. Mary's, Nenagh to a replay.

In 1993 St. Mary's recorded an Ulster Colleges senior and junior championship double and reached the final of the All-Ireland Sevens. Last season, Magherafelt contested the All-Ireland Colleges junior and seven aside finals meeting today's opponents in both

Camogie was introduced to Presentation, Kilkenny in 1965. The school won the first two All-Ireland Senior Colleges Finals of 1969 and 1970. These two teams had players such as Helena O'Neill, Liz Neary and Bridie Martin who went on to play leading roles in many of Kilkenny's All-Ireland successes of the 70's and 80's.

While Camogie continued to be played in the school they faded from the limelight until they won a Leinster Minor (1st and 2nd years) title in 1988, a Leinster Senior title in 1990 and a Leinster 7 aside, also in 1990. Many of the current senior team won a Leinster 'B' champlonship in 1993 and were also involved in the Leinster Junior Final of





O'Connor, Catriona Hennessy, and sub Helen Campion.


