

Clare face crunch Munster junior championship match against Cork

CLARE'S inter-county camogie season for 2004 will conclude this Sunday if they fail to beat Cork the opening round the Munster Junior Championship.

The Clare girls will go into Sunday's game in Newmarket at 3 pm as underdogs, as Cork are unbeaten to date in the league and are through to the semi-final of that competition.

Clare concluded their league programme on Sunday last when they suffered a one point defeat against Dublin at the latter's grounds in Crumlin.

Clare have a much changed side this year from that which reached the All-Ireland final last season, when they eventually lost out to Galway after a replay. Incidentally, they were in the league semifinal when they lost to Galway

Since the All-Ireland final, they have lost experienced players like Noelle Comyns, Moira McMahon and Patricia O'Grady to mention but some and, while they have played some good camogie in the league, the lack of experience is certainly a blow to them.

There are a number of injury problems for the management team of Michael Maher, Francie Mahon and Helen Murphy ahead of Sunday's game, which will take place at Fr. Murphy Memorial Park in Newmarket-on-Fergus at

Clare McMahon and Aoife Ryan missed last Sunday's game in Dublin due to injury (exams) and Ann Keane ('flu) were also unavailable for last week's game. The selectors are hopeful that all will be available for this week's

Deirdre Corcoran, Deirdre Murphy, Catherine O'Loughlin and Jane Scanlan were part of last year's team, and they are expected to fill important positions on Sunday.

"It's a strange situation that for the senior championship there is a round robin system, while the Munster and championships All-Ireland are separate competitions. However, the same does not apply for the junior grade so we must win on Sunday to keep our season alive," according to Maher.

Players and officials are hoping for a big turnout of supporters for Sunday's game, when they will be looking to take the first step on the road back to Croke Park.

CORK made their intent known from the throw-in as they blasted Clare aside in the first 20 minutes of this Munster Junior Camogie Championship game Newmarket On Fergus.

In perfect camogie conditions Cork played the game at a speed Clare could not match and found themselves leading by 2-6 to 0-1 after 19 minutes, the goals coming from Marian Jagoe and Miriam Deasy.

With their half-back line of Catriona Foley, Rena Buckley and Michelle Hegarty sweeping up everything that came their way, Cork launched assault and assault on the Clare defence and the excellent duo of Miriam Deasy and

Sheila Burns up front were only too willingly to capitalise on the plentiful supply.

Despite the fact that Cork took their foot off the pedal entering the final 10 minutes of the first half, allowing Clare to look more promising, they still entered the dressing room at half time leading 3-8 to 0-3.

Both teams swapped points on two occasions within 10 minutes of the resumption before a great solo effort by Miriam Deasy finished up in the back of the net and Cork had stretched their lead to 17 points.

Suddenly Clare responded.

The home crowd roared on their

team, who, entering the final thr minutes of normal time were only four points adrift.

It was a very close contest throughout with the home side just edging through.



Senior camogie women retain Leinster crown

THE WEXFORD senior camogie women proved they are the true champions of Leinster in Monageer on Saturday afternoon last when overcoming Dublin to retain the provincial championship.

Wexford, under the management of Aidan Breen and Aidan Moran, were looking for revenge over Dublin, who had beaten them in a National League encounter just three weeks earlier.

With the Slaneysiders having disposed of Kilkenny in last year's final, which was only played in February of this year, before beating them again in this year's semifinal, morale was high in Wexford camp heading into their latest final engagement.

With sun shining brightly, and a light breeze blowing, conditions were excellent for camogie, and both teams got stuck in from the throw-in.

Wexford piled on the pressure in the first five minutes, but unfortunately three attempts to open the scoring all went wide, and in the sixth minute Dublin's Ciara Lucey opened the scoring with a pointed free.

Caroline Murphy of Ferns was in the thick of the action again with a fine catch from a puck-out by Emer Butler, and after running at the Dublin defence, Caroline was fouled just 30 metres from goal. This gave Kate Kelly a great chance to get on scoreboard, and she duly

obliged (0-1 each). In the 11th minute

referee Matt Curran had to caution Dublin cornerback Sylvia Hanks as she was constantly digging at Josie Dwyer. From the resultant free Kate Kelly put Wexford's second point on the board.

Josie Dwyer had a fantastic shot saved by Dublin 'keeper, Emer Butler two minutes later, while Ciara Lucey scored her second point to again level matters (0-2 each).

Louise Codd replied by slotting over an excellent point from play, and Wexford continued to battle hard - but that was to be their last score of the half.

Dublin, meanwhile, upped the pressure for the last five minutes, and they could have had a goal but for a super save by Wexford 'keeper Margaret Darcy, who conceded a 45 which Ciara Lucey duly put over, to leave the sides tied on 0-3 each at half-time.

Within seconds of the restart, Dublin captain Emer Brannigan fouled her opposite number Kate Kelly, who slotted over the resultant free.

Some great play in the next few minutes by Catherine O'Loughlin and Caroline Murphy kept Wexford on top, and

Wexford meant business. Dublin attacked the Wexford defence in the next two minutes, with 'keeper Darcy making two more good saves from Emer McFadden and Karen Blood.

In the 39th minute, Kate Kelly added a fourth personal point, and after Margaret Darcy gathered a Dublin shot to clear the sliotar upfield to Caroline Murphy, who found Lennie Holohan, the Rathnure woman rattled the net with a tremendous shot after probably the best move of the game (1-4 to 0-3).

After a foul on Louise O'Hara the Dubs got their first score of the half, with Ciara Lucey converting the free.

Aine Codd then set up Lennie Holohan, who added her second score, a

The Wexford girls were looking the better team by far, and Kate Kelly added another point two minutes later, bringing Wexford closer to retaining the Leinster title.

It was the 49th minute before Dublin scored again, this time Julie Draper stepping up to send over a '45 metre free.

Blood, with Catriona Power, in an effort to pressurise the Wexford defence with fresh legs in an effort to try to grab those all important scores to get back into the match.

Dublin full-back Eve Talbot sent a free into the Wexford danger zone, where Caroline Murphy, who was in excellent form, caught the sliotar and burst through the Dublin defence in search of more scores for Wexford.

However, it was to be five minutes before Wexford scored again, with Aine Codd. deservedly getting her name on the scoresheet with a fine point from a

This was to be the last score of the game, and with the final score being 1-8 to 0-5, Wexford had done it, they'd retained the Leinster title.

This may not have been one of Wexford's best performances, but at the end of the day, winning a Leinster final is all that matters.

So far, 2004 has been a great year for Wexford camogie, the seniors back-to-back winning finals, and Leinster gaining a place in the National League semifinals, along with the junior team, who are unbeaten this year so far.

And with Colaiste Bride of Enniscorthy winning both the senior and junior championship All-Irelands, there is no reason why Wexford shouldn't be strong contenders for the All-Ireland series.

Clare U-16s show grit to claim first Munster title

Clare 4-7 Limerick 3-7 Seamus Hayes reports MUNSTER UNDER 16 CHAMPIONSHIP

CLARE travelled Charleville on Saturday last to take on Limerick in the U16A Munster final. Clare were seeking to put their name on the Moran Cup for the first time while Limerick were determined to bridge a 27 year gap to their last success.

Limerick started strong and had the upper hand for the first 15 minutes but failed to capitalise with scores. Clare forwards took advantage of their chances and a point in the twelfth minute from Marie Raftery and a second in the 15th from Fiona Lafferty got them going. The decisive attitude of the Clare players was exemplified in the 17th minute by a beautifully taken goal from Danielle Sheedy.

Limerick got on the scoreboard in the 19th minute with a point from play. Clare hit back with two points in quick succession, but these were quickly cancelled out by like scores from the Shannonsiders. Clare finished the first half in flying form when Fiona Lafferty found the Limerick net from a free and this left the Banner girls seven points clear, 2-4 to 0-3.

Clare took up where the left off when the second half resumed and, within four minutes, had added two goals from Eireann Hennessey and

Marie Raftery and a point from Fiona Lafferty to their tally.

After this Clare seemed to relax a little and this allowed Limerick to come storming back into the game. The Shannonsiders came back in style with some great play in the middle of the field from Niamh Mulcahy and captain Marion O'Connell and they notched up a goal and four points. This gave great heart to the Limerick girls and they stepped up a gear and they rattled the back of Susan Vaughan's net twice in four minutes. The Clare girls realising a Munster championship title and a place in an All-Ireland semi-final was slipping through their fingers defended like tigers.

With the game well into injury time, Clare were up by two points but Limerick were looking strong. Memories of last year's one point defeat to Waterford must have surfaced. However, Limerick conceded a free 45 metres out and Fiona Lafferty stepped up and drove over the last point of the game to ensure victory for Clare and put their name on the Moran Cup for the first time ever.

While all girls played well, a strong defensive display from Amy McInemey (captain), Ellen Solan and Ciara O'Leary kept Clare in the game when they were under severe pressure. A great

centre-field performance by Marian O'Brien and Louise Hayes gave great supply to the forwards where Fiona Lafferty, Danielle Sheedy and Marie Raftery were prominent throughout.

Limerick showed great grit and determination to come back and almost snatch victory from Clare. They had great performances from midfielders Niamh Mulcahy and Cliodhna Lane. Marion O'Connell (captain) and Edwina Mullane were also very impressive.

Maire Ní Chearnaigh, chairperson of Comhairle na Mumhan, said in presenting the Moran Cup to Clare captain Amy McInerney, that it was great to see Clare and Limerick make the breakthrough in this the centenary year of the association. It is hoped that this breakthrough will be a springboard for senior success in the future.

Catriona Kelly kept Carrigdhoun in touch with two points but Muskerry maintained their advantage thanks in the main to superb goalkeeping from Aoife Murray and good defensive play from Catriona Foley and Rena Buckley.

With Marion Jaego exchanging points with Mary Buckley Jennifer Vaughan and Margaret McCarthy, Muskerry held a three goal interval advantage 3-4 to 0-4.

Catriona Kelly and Mary Buckley swapped points inside three minutes of the restart but from here on it was all Carrigdhoun as they set about cutting the deficit. Catriona Kelly pointed a free after nine minutes and it signaled a revival as Emer Dillon and Maireaid Holland began to get a grip at mid field.

Inside eight minutes the Muskerry lead was down to two points thanks to goals from a Catriona Kelly penalty and a superb Emer Dillon effort. With the title up for grabs both defences were under severe pressure and without doubt it was Muskerry's Aoife Murray who was the busier as she continued to thwart the Carrigdhoun attack. Catriona Kelly pointed a free to put just one between the side and it looked as if

we were going to a replay, but Muskerry had other ideas, Sile Burns steadied the nerves with a point with three minutes on the watch and now with the finishing line in sight Muskerry held their nerve. Carrigdhoun did have a chance to grab a winner but again Aoife Murray was more than able for the challenge and cleared efficiently as the final whistle was sounded by match referee Cathal Egan.



als for the Irish team this year.



CORK LEFT TO WONDER

THE big surprise of the week-end came on Saturday when the senior side failed to qualify for the national league final losing out to Wexford in a tough encounter in Wexford Park. Through the campaign the management team have continued to experiment in their search for a championship winning side but certainly Saturday's defeat will do little to help the confidence of all concerned.

Cork having played against the wind led at the break eleven points to three and dominating at mid field looked set to book their place in the final. On the turn over Wexford began to get a grip at mid field and when Michelle Hearne goaled it boosted their confidence. Cork's Jenny O Leary replied quickly but it failed to lift her side as Wexford continued their domi-nance. Cork led by two points going into the final minutes but five points without reply saw the home side qualify for the final after a storming finish.

For a number of years Wexford have threatened and sooner or later the great promise shown at under age level was bound to come to the fore. Oulart the Ballagh have taken five Feile Na Gael title in a row and while remarkably they have failed to follow on and make the breakthrough at minor level Colaiste Brid have been a force to be reckoned with at colleges level again recently taking the All Ireland title. Wexford back in the big time to contest final

AFTER years of heartache, Wexford have emerged from the wilderness to contest their first camogie league final in 12 years and are seeking their first win in 27 years.

They have gone 29 years without a championship title, but life is changing for the better. Today, this young squad join the big timers, confidently squaring up to the reigning All-Ireland champions Tipperary in the National League Division 1 final at Nowlan Park (3.45pm).

Another major plus for the Wexford girls is the form of centre back Aine Codd who has seen the darker days, but as one of the main architects in their comeback, she says the euphoria in the county is infectious.

"We got things together early on this year and it has paid off so far. Beating a highly-rated Cork team in the semi-final has given us extra self-belief. But, we know that element of surprise is now gone and Tipperary will be as eager as us to win."

The Blue and Gold's forward line of Eimear McDonnell, Deirdre Hughes and captain Joanne Ryan are particularly devastating. Codd says as a defensive unit they will have to be at their best: "In fact all six will need watching but we did well against the Cork attack which is one of the best in the country. We have been through too much to be complacent, but this final will also give us much-needed confidence for the championship."

OVER the past number of years, camogie, ladies football and indeed women's sport in general has become more popular, respected and admired. The All-Ireland Senior Carnogie final has been televised live now since 1998 and if we had thought this 15 years ago people would have laughed at us. We as an association are better managed (although at times I wonder), the recognition and equality status of the sport has improved and the players, quite rightly so, are better treated — if not at times spoilt.

Many players become household names and are instantly recognisable. Despite what most players say it is a nice feeling when a stranger stops to shake your hand and compliment you on your achievements.

The modern day player is the lucky one. I was lucky in that five television and the 15-a-side game came in a few years before my retirement. I would have hated missing out on playing a 15-a-side All-Ireland Final.

It is the past players who really lost out. The greats of the game who would have revelled in the 15-a-side and their talents deserved to be seen on TV screens. Angela Downey always comes to mind. How many of you ever saw her play? She was read about and spoke about and is a household name but how many actually saw her exploits on the field? The highlights of the All-Ireland finals were shown in Angela's day but we were lucky if they showed 12-15 minutes of the game and what can you judge from that. And she was only one of many. The camogie talent that emerged from Cork over the years was some of the best in the country.

Mary Moran, past President of the Association and past chairperson of the Cork Camogie Board, wrote many Camogie books.

Her collection of records, history and photographs are amazing and one could get lost for days in her horde of memorabilia. Her last book titled Cork's Camogle Story is a must read for any enthusiast.

Sporting bonds that keep us together Mellerick

THERE'S something about the friends splashed over every paper. you make in sport.

I don't know if you'd actually call them friends in the true meaning of the word.

More like acquaintances that you have a lot in common with

You might never pick up the phone or meet these people for a drink but when you do meet up at some gathering or other there is an immediate bond and good craic gets underway without any of the usual awkwardness you might experience in other situations.

Last week, Toomevara Camogie Club in Tipperary held a surprise 'This is your life' function for their star player Deirdre Hughes, who was named on the team of the century.

Micheal Ó Muirheartaigh was MC for the night and what a night it was! About six of us headed up from Cork and from the moment we arrived to the early hours we chatted, danced and laughed with people we normally only smile and give a nod of the head to.

I suppose it's the mutual respect you have for each other that immediately springs to the surface.

These kinds of functions are great for getting to know rivals and their friends and families.

Most of us are altogether different people off the pitch than we are on it.

I certainly know I am.

Your competitive streak and will to win at times is such that you'd almost look on your opponents as your worst enemy and would quiet willingly knock them aside on the field.

Off of the pitch, you'd make way.

You create your own impression of an individual on the field and at times are shocked when you meet them off of it.

Completely different people! Over the years I have witnessed camogie players sacrifice and give so much that I didn't think anything would surprise me.

That was until I met Joan Tobin that

Joan would have been well known in camogie circles as being one of Tipp's best players at junior level

Indeed, when I was growing up and came up against Tipp her name was always mentioned.

Only retired a few years, she missed out the real successful Tipperary years, and for people like Joan that's an awful shame.

She teaches in Belfast and drove down for Deirdre's night.

During the course of the evening we began to talk about camogie as it is now, our love for the game and what it gave to US.

only after talking to her for a while that I found out how dedicated she treated and receive the very best and was.

She told me that when she was train- expenses are covered. ing with Tipperary two or three times a week she used to get the train from Belfast to Dublin and drive the rest of the way to Tipp for training.

She'd head back to Dublin afterwards, sleep on a friend's floor, rise at the dawn the following morning and get the train back to Belfast again.

er made this journey it would be Abbeycourt Hotel in Co. Tipperary.

This girl did this for a few years and no one ever heard a word about it.

I never asked Joan if this trip was funded for her. I presume it was. I hope it was! Camogie players don't get a single cent expenses for travelling to training.

Not in Cork anyway. Many players over the years travelled regularly from as far away as Barryroe, Newtownshandrum, etc.

Mary O'Connor lived in Limerick for a few years and never missed a training session

Likewise players working and studying in Dublin, Waterford, etc made huge sacrifices to attend training and it was just assumed that they would do it.

I'm not having at 'go' at the Cork board for not paying these expenses because the money just isn't there.

What I'm referring to is the utter dedication that many camogie players have for their sport and the quiet way they go

The same goes for injuries received. You get a knock, you break a leg, you pull a muscle-you get it sorted!

The last few years things have improved with many clubs now having in-

Up to then though you paid your own physiotherapy and hospital bills and any loss of earnings was your loss alone. Again this was just the done thing.

I have seen players play through the most unbelievable of pain barriers. Therese O'Callaghan always comes to mind as one of the most dedicated and determined individuals when it came to overcoming injuries and taking to the

I witnessed Therese receive physiotherapy on top of physiotherapy with tears in her eyes.

Strapping before a match seemed to take an hour. And never a word! If anything she tried to hide what she was do-

Matters have improved! The approach is more professional and certainly the players receive more in the way of gear,

Insurance has helped when it comes to needing treatment but the expense issue will always be there unless additional funding is sourced for this alone.

The fear and the question is 'where will it stop?" You pay the expenses of a Senior player, you quiet rightly pay it for Junior and Minor players.

You're talking a lot of money. Tipperary have the right idea in that they formed a 'Supporters Club' a couple of years ago.

The funding raised by this club alone are not a single cent out of pocket. All

Chaired by Michael Cleary these guys could show us a thing or two about fund-raising.

But at the end of the day its not about the money, its not about the pain, its not about the long journey to training.


Antrim will now face Tipperary in the next round while Kilkenny will

play Galway.





The Cork County Senior Camogie Championship begins next weekend, with the clash of Bishopstown and Carrigdoun on the 28.

My favourites for this year's Championship would have to be UCC. A star-studded team featuring inter-county players almost in its entirety begs me to ask the question Why did we allow them to enter our championship?"

We in camogie tend to follow the road our GAA counterparts take. But sometimes it doesn't suit us, and in this case I think we should have left well enough alone.





But spend an hour with the people involved and you'll find out just why Douglas are the kingpins of underage camogie in Cork.

I attended their training session last Thursday evening and witnessed commitment, dedication, good humour, fun, and pride from both mentors and play-

The travelling party leave Cork today at 11am.

The players will have to quickly put the long journey behind them as they take on O'Loughlin Gaels this evening at 6.30pm.

The following morning they play a further two matches and should they qualify from the series of games will contest the semi-finals on Friday afternoon.

The final is down for decision at 2.30pm on Saturday.

A tough assignment indeed but when the going gets tough the tough get going.

Douglas emerged victorious from an epic Cork

A spirited Ballinhassig team made them fight all the way for victory but the South side girls responded to the challenge.

They showed their true mettle when the chips were down and dug out a memorable triumph, according to coach Jimmy O'Mahony. We were extremely relieved after the final. We ex-

pected Ballinhassig to be very good. They had beaten us in the County final two years ago at U12 level.

We had beaten them twice this year in the league but we knew they would provide a stern challenge.

"But our team don't give up; they've great heart and keep going until the final whistle.

Jimmy took over training the Douglas U11 team in March 2001 when his daughter was a member of the

Since then he has given total commitment to the club which has seen them reach the National finals for the past three years. Jimmy doesn't find the effort any burden at all.

'Normally coaches inspire teams', he said. "But in this case it's the girls who inspire me.

"They're here all the time; no matter when we say we're training, they're here full of enthusiasm."

What's the secret of Douglas' success? Most other clubs train, most other clubs have committed person-

The club runs an A and a B team in every grade.

The reason — "We don't want 15 subs. You can't play 15 subs, at least this way everyone is getting a game. Those that don't get a run in A games get a run with the B's. It keeps them interested, used to playing in matches, and more importantly it keeps them playing."

Douglas has a huge catchment area but that doesn't automatically guarantee you success. It takes a lot more than that.

The local school, coached by Eddie Murphy, recently won the Sciath na Scol. The interaction between club and school is a must for success. With each complimenting the other both reap the rewards.

Again that doesn't make you unbeatable in the county. What keeps the girls' enthusiasm going?

What is the secret behind their dominance? "We've never stopped," says Jimmy. "We train twice a week, every week of the year, and we don't give them a chance to go missing. All the girls are very committed to camogie, it's their first love and the reason we have them is because we don't let them off for two or three months of the winter and then go looking for them again.

"We don't give them a chance to lose interest. We're constantly looking for challenge matches for every team. We actually look for games for the B team probably more than we do for the A's because they love matches. So our secret is — the matches and don't stop!

While Jimmy's name automatically springs to mind when one mentions Douglas, this operation is by no means a one man show. Finbarr O'Donovan, whose daughter Niamh stars on the team, has been Jimmy's' right-hand man for the past three and a half years.

Both shy away when I mention their own contribution and are quick to compliment the other and indeed the entire outfit.

Selector Breda Heffernan is another whose commitment has spanned numerous years. With the team since under 11's she has brought them all the way up and you can hear the pride in her voice as she speaks about them and the task that lies ahead at the weekend.

"We're very confident; we have a great bunch of girls. They are extremely disciplined and a pleasure to be with."

Denise McCarthy and Charlotte Boyle, are also there to assist the girl's needs. Douglas have every angle covered.

Tina Sheehan was chairperson of the camogie club for the past two years. This year she stepped down from that role but couldn't leave the excitement behind her and so became Féile co-ordinator for 2004. A tough assignment!

Tina estimates the cost of the weekend to be in the region of €8,000. She is quick to point out that local businesses, the GAA club and others have been extremely generous in helping out and that the parents of the girls have been exceptional in assisting with sponsorship.

Indeed Jimmy and Finbarr cannot praise the parents enough: "The parents are absolutely fantastic. We never have to get a bus to any match. It doesn't matter where we go the parents always lend a helping hand.

"We train here at 5pm as the pitch is available to us then. The parents have to have them here for 4.45pm amidst Douglas peak time traffic and its never a problem. We instil in the players that if they can't be here they let us know and if they are coming they're to be on the pitch for 5pm, not 5.05 or 5.10 past. We start at 5pm, we finish at 6pm and their parents know that."

Of course having a councillor as one of your top supporters is a bonus. Recently re-elected Deirdre Forde was also at the Douglas training session wishing the team all the best.

Deirdre's' ambition is to provide long term financing for the local area to improve facilities. "We try to influence policy in council to cater for the minority sport, particularly young girls.

"We actually did a study of the current and future needs/requirements for the greater Douglas area and it's pointing to an amount of facilities for young girls. "Groups like Douglas Camogie club are currently filling the gap and we need to support them.

"It's a pity there isn't ready money available for events like this. Please God this week will be fantastic for the club and you can be sure we'll be lighting the bonfires when they come home."

Captain Jessica Jackson admits to being really disappointed after last year's final defeat to St. Vincents of Dublin but admits they were beaten by a better team on the day. She is confident, however, of going one step further this weekend.

Unfortunately for Douglas their star forward Aileen O'Donovan is out with a leg injury. Aileen got the winning point in last year's semi-final against Wexford, who were going for their fifth Féile title in-a-row, and is a huge loss.

Always capable of getting scores, she will be missed but Aileen has been out for a few weeks now and so Douglas have had time to readjust and plan without her.

It will be up to the likes of Niamh O'Donovan, Jessica Jackson, Leanne O'Shea and Moira O'Donovan to lift their game and drive their team forward on the day

The opposition as such is unknown but any team that emerges as champions of their county has to be good.

Just how good is the question? All Douglas can do is look after themselves and ensure that they leave no stone unturned.

So all the hard work is done! It's up to the players on the pitch now to give it their all and bring home the honours.

But according to coach Jimmy: "It's all about enjoyment. We're going up to win obviously but the thing is that no matter what happens we're going to have a great weekend and one that I hope the girls will remember for ever. The main thing is that we go up and do our best and enjoy the weekend, the supporters, the parents and everyone who's travelling-it's a great occasion."

Wicklow County Board met on Tuesday night to discuss the referee's match report and will consider the matter again. "We are holding a special meeting on July 19 to deal with the referee's report," said Ms Pearson.

"All clubs will be present at the meeting. I cannot take it any further than that at the moment."

Nancy sadly missed

Camogie Association Nancy Murray passed away peacefully in her sleep last Sunday morning. Her sudden death has shocked

everyone involved in the game as she attended a function just a fortnight ago in Portglenone where the local Geraldine's club paid tribute to club member Mairead McAtamney-Mag-ill, who was selected on the Camogle Team of the Century announced at the end of February.

Nancy was manager of the Antrim team in 1967 when Mairead won the first of her two All Ireland Senior medals with the Saffrons.

Current Camogie President Miri-am O'Callaghan said that Nancy had played a very important role in the

camogie history of Antrim.

"She had a distinguished playing the 60s. Deirdre also won the first six career at club and county level, went on to be a successful coach and referee and was also an administrator of the highest calibre.

"She had a distinguished playing the 60s. Deirdre also won the first six under the first two All Ireland club finals.

Nancy had the distinction of reference from the distinction of reference from the control of the highest calibre. camogie history of Antrim. "She had a distinguished playing

She touched the Association at so ciders during the period 1958-70.

Nancy — born Nancy Milligan — served the game in many capac-

As a player she was on the first Antrim side to win the O'Duffy Cup back in 1945, defeating Waterford in Cappaquin. Antrim retained the title for the next two seasons, with Nancy playing a leading role in mideld (1946) and defence (1947).

With marriage shortening her in-ter-county career, she turned with a lot of success to coaching in the 50s. taking Antrim to the 1956 title, and several other finals during the 60s before the 1967 success.

However she continued to play club camogie and was full-back on the great Deirdre side that captured

And then there was Nancy the administrator, rising through the Divisional Board to take the county chair. She later moved on to Ulster

Council and then in 1973 was elected President of the Association.

Often her playing and adminis-tration roles collided — like in 1971 when she presented Matread McAt-maney, the Portglenone captain, with the Cup for their first ever Antrim title — after spending an hour trying to deny her as Deirdre


She was also a distinguished golfer and had an excellent singing

wice.

She is survived by her husband Sean and sons Donal and Sean, and they will most miss her — but she spent a lifetime involved in every facet of camogie in Antrim and her passing has left a huge void. As a mark of respect, the Antrim Camogie Board postponed all club games in the county from Sunday until after the funeral on Wednesday.

Camogie stays ahead of posse

INNOVATION and hard work are the key reasons camogie continues to grow.

A five-year strategic plan was unveiled in Cork last Tuesday by facilitators Sheila O'Donohoe, Waterford IT and Marie Jackman, an ex-GAA employee who worked closely with the camogie association on the integration with the GAA.

The strategic plan hopes to provide the pathway for the future development, strengthening and growth of our national game.

I must admit to being hugely impressed by the manual I took home.

It's obvious that an enormous amount of research, thought, experience and time went into producing this booklet.

It's quite apparent that those at the head of our organisation have become more professional in their approach and realised the incredible 'product' that we have and its growth potential if developed and marketed correctly.

Fifteen clubs were represented last Tuesday evening in what was a disappointing turnout considering the fact that we have 57 registered camogie clubs in Cork.

All clubs were notified and asked to send a delegate. Maybe they didn't realise the importance of the event.

To be honest I didn't myself but went along anyway and was impressed by the vision and effort shown in coming up with this plan.

We in Cork are privileged. We come from possibly the strongest camogie county in the country at present. I don't think any other county can boast 57 clubs.

But this didn't happen by chance. It came from years of dedicated work by unsung heroes. We owe it to them to keep ourselves up there.

For years, as a player, I cribbed and

moaned along with everyone else and never fully appreciated the work that our administrators do.

Whenever things didn't go our way (the team) I gave out about the craziness of fixtures, travel, accommodation, finance etc.

In hindsight, the work that these people did and continue to do behind the scenes is unbelievable and I would have to say that over time I have become a great admirer of these people for the work they do.

Since becoming ambassador for camogie this year and since I began writing for the Echo I have been in regular contact with Marion McCarthy, our chairperson and all other County Board officers.

I am utterly amazed at the personal time they give up for 'our' cause and embarrassed that I never gave them a second thought.

When I retired from inter-county camogie I swore that would be it. I'd walk away completely.

Funnily enough I haven't done

I feel that camogie has given me so much that it would be wrong and selfish of me to do so. I have to give something back.

I always think that if everyone had that attitude when I was growing up, then things might have turned out very differently for me.

But I won't give it five or seven nights a week like current members are doing.

I'll give it one or two and help out when I can and that should be suffi-

cient for anyone.

We all have other lives to lead. But

that's the problem. I could count on possibly two hands the amount of past players that are currently involved at any level and it's wrong

Those who are volunteering are completely overloaded. Their whole lives are taken up with it and so after a period of time they have no option but to walk away.

If more people got involved the individual workload would decrease. It then becomes an enjoyable interest more so than a second job. We have to pull more people in, form more sub committees and delegate.

I believe it can be done. But we can't scare people off by piling on the

The key points of Cumann Camogaiochta Na nGael and it's strategic plan are - Participation, Quality, Management and Marketing.

The Irish Sports Council was involved in the development of the plan. The development committee embarked on a nationwide campaign to elicit the views of its members

They identified the main themes and key issues which emerged and it resulted in the four key strategic oblectives mentioned above.

We formed 'workshops' at our meeting in St Finbarr's last Tuesday and discussed various topics such as 'the positive aspects of camogie in our county, areas which can be improved and our aspirations for our county.

People came up with some very interesting ideas. We got a little homework too and meet up again on August 23 to review. This is only the start.

Cumann Camogaiochta Na nGael have finally identified what is required to ensure this important sporting organisation remains a vibrant and essential part of Irish sport.





Player burn-out is nothing new

I WATCHED the sports section of the news last Tuesday with interest as the topic arose regarding senior inter-county players and the demands on their lives and bodies.

It's amazing how they fit it all in. Work, training, travel, play, rest and then repeat it all again day after day.

There is no doubt the sport is professional in its preparations and we wouldn't have it any other way. It is this approach which has made GAA the top sport it is today.

However, the demands both mentally and physically are energy sapping. These same people get up every morning and do a full day's work

They are also expected to prepare as a pro in every aspect of their life, from eating, to sleeping, to training, etc.

Life is one long rush particularly in peak season as you juggle your working and personal life (if you have one) around your sport.

It's the same for camogie players. The topic being discussed was player

burn-out and how, in order to maintain the development of the GAA, it has to be addressed.

A survey of nine counties is being carried out to assess the situation. But the result won't change a thing.

A player may get fed up every now and then with the demands placed upon them but they still wouldn't have it any other way.

The talented underage player suffers the most. A good minor hurler could well find himself playing minor, U21 and senior with both club and county.

Throw in the fact that many of these guys also play football with their club and they end up playing minor. U21 and senior football too.



A chance of a night off, a chance to recover, forget it.

It's the same for women.

The talented Cloughduv player Breige Corkery is one such example. Two weeks ago she captained the Cork minor football team to victory in Galway.

That same evening she togged out with her club in the Cork County Senior Camogie Championship.

The following day training with the senior camogie team in preparation for their Championship game against Limerick last Saturday.

She is only one of many. Never a complaint, because this is their life.

It is easier while you're younger. Apart from the obvious like the physical ability to cope with this, the demands on your life shouldn't be as

For years camogie players have been doing this. We all did it. We might not have been playing two codes but if you have a successful club and successful County then you are training at least five nights a week for 10 months of the

Player burn-out? Yes we had it because in some crazy way inter-county camogie players rarely get excused from club training.

It is better now in that players speak up when they are exhausted but it's not done too often.

In camogie the clubs need their inter-county players.

During the 90s, when the Glen were successful, six of us were also on the

Many nights we left Cork training in our gear and rushed to make training with the club. Absolute madness but it was expected.

The game at the time was 12-a-side so I suppose if six of us were missing then how could the rest of the team train properly?

True, but crazy all the same.

I hear many people today speak about how the game has changed, the speed, the skill level, the fitness required, etc.

It does seem to look that way but at times I wonder is it just that memories fade with time and you forget how great such a game was and how fast it was and how hard you trained.

Because if I was to look back I can honestly say that some of the toughest and greatest games I ever played in were as far back as 10 years ago and some of the best players I ever played with and against were from that era

I can also remember being dizzy and feeling sick after pushing ourselves so hard at training

Players are retiring a lot younger that's for sure, but it has a lot to do with the lifestyle we lead today more so than just the sport itself.

Players burn out quicker and don't maintain the energy levels needed as they reach their late 20s and early 30s but again a lot of that may be down to an individual's occupation and how sapping that is.

Wouldn't it be great to train for two or three hours every day and then go home and put your head down?

Professionals do it and that's why the longevity of their playing careers far out lives ours. But professionalism is another issue!



NEW SELECTORS APPOINTED

After the resignation of the Tipperary Intermediate Camogie selection committee, both Stephen Fitzgerald and Biddy Philips will take on the role of selecting the Tipperary Intermediate camogie team on a temporary basis for the rest of 2004.

The new selectors met with the panel on Tuesday evening.

"Twenty seven players turned up for the meeting," Stephen Fitzgerald told the Tippeary Star. "Three players were unavoidably absent. They are one hundred per cent dedicated and want to return to the training field as soon as possible," he said.

At the meeting where the outgoing selectors Bernie O'Dowd, Martin Browne and Brendan Murphy handed in their resignations the clubs decided that the officers of the County Board should be entrusted with the task of appointing new selectors.

Biddy Philips is no stranger to selecting Tipperary teams. She was a selector with the Junior team in the early nineties culminating the All-Ireland victory in 1992 when Tipp defeated Galway. Biddy was manager of the team and after Tipp were promoted to Intermediate grade, she managed of the side that won the All-Ireland in 1997 when Tipp defeated Clare.

Biddy continued in the managers role following promotion to senior grade in 98. Tipp reached the All-Ireland semi final that year but lost. Then the dream of winning the All-Ireland senior final soon became a reality the folowing year.

In 2000, Biddy stepped down as manager but retained the selector portfolio under the stewardship of Michael Cleary. She retained that position as Tipp won part two and part three of their three in a row.

Alas Tipp lost in the final to Cork in 2002 before Biddy stepped down after a long and fruitful innings.

After a two year rest period she hopes to repeat the 1997 intermediate success once
