



It's been a remarkable year for Pa Finn. Not only did he maintain his wonderful record of never losing a final in which he has been involved as manager, but in doing so he also helped Cork to a fabulous 20th All-Ireland senior camogie title.

Although immersed since boy-hood in the traditions of the GAA, the Cork camogic boss rates the experience of winning, this year's Foras na Gaesige spon-sored senior final with the red and white as the best be's ever had in sport. Words like 'magical and marvellous' are how the for-mer 5t Finbarr's hurler and coach described his emotions soon after helping the Leesiders to success, As a result, the county now lie second in the pecking order, six with short of Dublin in the roll of horour. This was different though - it was a county side and it was my first time with a camogie team. It was marvellous especially when you were playing in a stadium like Croke Park. It was the best ever as far as I am concerned," said considering this was only Pa's

second season with the team. He came on board at the start of 2001, a decision be arrived at only after lengthy deliberation.
Although he could draw on many years experience of managing hurling teams, carnogle was a sport with which he had no pre-

sport with which he had no previous involvement.

Thad no knowledge at all of camogie, it was always hurling for me. I said I would think about it. Before I knew it I was nominated, so I left my name go forward and made the decision afterwards.

The transition from burling to camogie was easily made, but success had to wait. He reflects dolefully on his first year at the helm, and in particular the fall-ure of his side to overcome. Tipperary at the penultimate stage of the All-Ireland series.

On a personal note last year was very disappointing for me because I thought we were a better team than Tipperary. The couple of times we met in the league we had played well. That day in Mullingar (All-Ireland semi-final against Tipperary) I felt that the referee was disappointing. In Limerick (for the replay) I don't think we were good enough. We just did not perform on the day. We did for

three-quarters of an hour and then things just went haywire." But Pa left Limerick that day with a clear idea of what had to be done, what changes needed to be made. "After that {the defeat to Tipperary] I felt we needed to get more people in - especially play ers. We also needed a physical

trainer." This season both of these This season both of these requirements were met. Firstly, Iim McCarthy was brought on board around April or May to put the girls through their paces. He had all the attributes", Pa says, and he made a major contribution to the team's improved physical preparation. Secondly, the league was used to experiment with new players and different positions. "We did not go for the league. I adopted the approach if we get there, well and good. We used it to blood players and to try them out in other positions and if benefited us. Genma O'Connor, for example, was playing centre-field, half-forward, corner-forward and we suddenly decaded we would put her half-back and she was absolutely superb all year through.

"Caoimhe Harrington slotted in, oanne O'Callaghan and Emer Dillon too. You could see the Dillon too. You could see the build-up of a very good team coming through. But the league was never our major competition. We were working towards an All-Ireland. I also felt with the four additions to the panel that we had no fear. Tipperary could not have improved that much from last year as they had more from last year as they had more or less the same panel of players. The four players we got strength

ened our team enormously," It was evident from Cork's very first championship outing against Limerick that they had the making of a side to challenge if not end Tipperary's dominance of recent years. Pa sensed it too. "I was very confident going up to the All Ireland, I really and truly felt we had the team to win it. reit we had the team to win it.

People said to me afterwards that
we were lucky in the first half.
We weren't - we held Tipp at bay,
it was 1-6 to 1-5 in their favour.
We had missed an awful lot of
scores, but I felt we were well
over them. Fiona (O'Driscoll)
was in magnificent form. Since
she came back to us after the
league you could see the determination was there. They were all nation was there. They were all

up for it."


Pa Finn may have been vital to the instilling of that drive, determination and belief, yet he remains modest in his assessment of his achievement, forever wary of inflating the importance of his role. No adherent to the cult of the manager, he believes that a disproportionate emphasis is often put on the contribution of the manager, mostly at the expense of the players. It is, he stresses, the players who do all the work after all.

Success comes from the teams and not because of the coach. You cannot tell a great hurler how to hurl. You can talk to him. You can motivate him a small bit. It is all about the people themselves. If you are a good player you are always going out to win. They all say to me you have a great record but I know it is the players that make you. The girls were hallloor that ware. There is

players that make you. The girls were brilliant that way. There is







no bitchiness. They always gave me great respect and whatever I asked then to do, they did it no cribbing.

The building of such a strong panel spirit made the drafting of teams and panels a difficult one for Finn. All the girls had made sacrifices, yet only 15 of the extended panel could start. Breaking the bad news was the part Pa liked least.

If there has to be a downside to it all, then the worse part for me is naming teams and panels. You can only name a certain amount of players and you are leaving five people out. You know they worked as hard as everybody else. Some might have played in the league and Munster championship. That to me is very hard. This year we had to name 25 we had 30 on our panel.

"You have to look after these players and make them as important as your number one. This is where you build up your team spirit. If you involve everybody they are all happy and they will always be fighting for their place. You must have the same respect for them all. That is how it works."

Pa is better equipped than most to understand the vagaries of sport. Not only is his family steeped in Cork's proud hurling tradition, but his own involvement with St. Finbarr's began as early as the age of ten. I came up through the ranks,

won a couple of county medals. Given that deep-rooted history played junior and then senior of family involvement. Pa was

county in 1965 and packed up that same year. I did not play Munster club, I retired after the county final. I played most of the time at half-back, centrefield or half-forward. My best position was half-back. I played with Cork in 1958, but I got injured and had my appendix out and did not play again with the county until 1964. I never really made the grade as such, I was a sub in the Cork team that were beaten by Clare in the Munster championship. I played league and tournaments. "All my family are heavily involved in hurling. My brother Mossie played with the Barr's from 1948 to 1964. He was on the Cork team, he captained them in 1956, and he was on the 1952 team that won the All-Ireland. He was a magnificent hurler, way better than me. "My other brother Mick (RIP) was involved in the Barr's all his life. My nephews Ger and Brian Cunningham, and Tim Finn won a few counties with the Barr's and of course Ger was the Cork keeper and was an U21 hurling selector last year. My sons, Cormac won minor, intermediate and senior with the Barr's and Kevin was sub-goalkeeper to Ger. My father captained the Barr's in 1919 and

unlikely ever to have walked away from the game when his playing days came to an end. Although he took a short break, by the mid-1970s he was back involved, this time as a coach. "In 1976 I got involved with the Barr's hurlers. I coached them in 1977 when we won the

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


with players like Jimmy Barry Murphy, Charlie McCarthy, Gerald McCarthy, Denis Burns and Donal O'Grady). I was involved with them up to 1980. Then Gerald McCarthy took over from me and they went on to win county finals in 1980, '81, '82 and 1984."

Although a staunch Barr's man, when he returned from a second short break, it was as trainer to another Cork team, Kilbrittain, a junior side who he assisted to intermediate ranks. He was also involved with St Catherine's when they won an Intermediate championship, More recently, in 1999 and 2002, he coached Castlelyons to Junior and Intermediate titles. As for next year, what does it

hold for Pa Finn? "I have not yet decided my own future with Cork camogie. I will take my time about making the decision. My wife Nora wants me to keep going. She is enjoying it more than I am and got a great kick out of winning the All-Ireland. She has been involved in hurling all her life with Glen Rovers. Her father, Mick O'Keeffe was with them for years and years. We are going away for a few weeks holidays. I will make my mind up in my own time."

No matter what Pa decides, one thing for sure is 2002 will long remain etched in his memories of a marvellous sporting career.

arcella Heffernan and Fiona O'Driscoll are not only champion V competitors in their respective sports of Ladies football and camogic but also contributed rich chapters to the past year's successful come-back stories in Gaelic Games.

Marcella played an outstanding role in Mayo's return to the top in the All-Ireland senfor championship after the heart-break of a dramatic late, late defeat by Laois in the 2001 final. Fiona bounced back superbly with Cork after taking a rest from camogic to prove a glittering star when belping to bring the O'Duffy Cup back to the Leeside after four years.

And both also saw out the year on a high note as winners of the Vodafone All Stars Players of the Month Awards for ladies football and camogic at a hinch at Croke Park in

Marcella completed a great family double as her sister, Christina, who also helped Mayo to regain the All-Ireland title in 2002, was winner of the Ladies football Player of the Month award in 1999.

That late Laois win in 2001 deprived Mayo of a treble of All-Ireland senior titles and not unexpectedly proved a bitter disappointment for the players.

"I was really depressed after that defeat. It took a lot out of me. I just did not feel like going out much for months", Marcella told me.

"People say football is just a game. But it is

much more to those who train so hard and put in so much work and effort over the year. The defeat was certainly a great disappointment."

But what a change last October! Mayo made it four title wins in five years and talented full forward Marcella Heffernan played such a regal role in forging out the one point win over Monaghan in a keenly contested final that she was named Player of the

There could hardly be a better way to celebrate a birthday than that-Marcella was 24 on the day of the final.

She was particularly pleased that goalkeeper Denise Horan was to the fore in forging out the latest Brendan Martin Cup success.

A last minute error on a kick-out led to the late Laois winning point in the 2001 final.

"Denise took a lot of criticism after that final. But really it was not her fault. All of us. made mistakes during the match. Otherwise we would not have found ourselves in the position that arose coming up to the end." EXCELLENT SAVE

Marcella went on to signal out Denise for special praise for a splendid save right at the end. She showed courage and alertness in rushing out to expertly collect a dropping ball, clear her lines and save the day for the Connacht county virtually on the final whistle.

Like the gifted Mayo forward, Fiona O'Driscoll, who has been one of the outstanding personalities in the sport for some years, has plenty of cause to recall with pride her All-Ireland senior final against defending champions and giants of recent seasons Tipperary.

"I took a rest from camogie early in the year and did not play in the National League. It gets harder to keep up training and maintain match play as one gets older.

However, coming up to the championship I began to realise that I would not have this time back again and that one should make the most of the opportunities while one can," the Cork ace explained.

"I was lucky to regain my place in the county side, but I certainly did not anticipate in my wildest dreams that I would be playing in an All-Ireland final in September and would win another medal and an award such as this Vodafone trophy"

The Fr. O'Neills club player certainly could hardly have expected that the final would prove such a personal triumph. She finished top scorer with 3-4 to boost her tally for the season to a whopping 9-12.

And, as if that was not enough, Fiona, like her Vodafone Player of the Month companion was not unexpectedly, named the Player of the Match after her starring role in the win over the Premier County, which earned her a sixth All-Ireland senior medal.

each started out in their respective sports at an LOCAL SCHOOL

"I started playing football at the local National School and with my home club, Hollymount, I then went on to Ballinrobe Community School where I continued to play the game. I was lucky enough to win four All-Ireland medals during my school days," reflects Marcella.

Such was the potential she displayed during her schooldays that she was called up to the Mayo senior team at only 15 and made her championship debut against London at McHale Park, Castlebor.

In her early days in the senior grade Marcella played in defence, first at full back and later at centre half back, but in more recent times she has been turning on the style as a forward.

"I enjoyed playing in defence especially at centre half. But I have settled down in attack and enjoy playing there. If I score that's a bonus, but the important thing is that we win at the end of the day."

Marcella Heffernan has reaped a rich harvest at the sport. She now has three All-Ireland senior medals and her collection also

includes interprovincial and National League souvenirs. In addition, she has three All Stars awards.

Fiona has also enjoyed much success in her sport. In addition to her six All-Ireland senior medals she has won a splendid total of seven National League souvenirs.

The brilliant Cork star's father is a keen enthusiast of Gaelic games and her three brothers all played hurling and football. So there was a strong emphasis on the sports as Fiona grew up.

She received a good foundation in the skills of camogie from teachers during her schooldays and won her place in the Cork minor team while at school in Midleton. HISTORY-MAKER

Then in 1995 Fiona carned a place in the history books when she led University of Limerick to their only Ashbourne Cup success

She still vividly recalls the day she saw her first inter-county camogie game.

"My father brought me to a Cork-Limerick game at St. Finbarr's Ground here in Cork and was greatly impressed that day by Sandy Fitzgibbon, of Cork.

"My first All-Ireland final was one between

Kilkenny and Cork and Angela Downey (Kilkenny) made a big impression on me that

In hurling, the camogic giant speaks highly of John Fenton, who led Cork to the Centenary Year All-Ireland senior title in 1984. and won a second national championship medal in 1986.

"John worked for some time near our home and he used to call to our house. I got to known him well and I greatly admired his skills on the hurling field.

Jack O'Shea, who won so many honours with Kerry and also wore the Ireland jersey with distinction in the International Test series. is top of O'Driscoll's list in football.

Marcella Hellernan also has ber favourites.

"I always looked up a lot to my sister. Christina, who is two years older than me. Cora Staunton is another player I have always admired

"As for players from other counties, 1 greatly admire Eilish Gormley, of Tyrone.

The polished Mayo full forward also had a word of sympathy for Monaghan and Judy Grennan and Niamh Kindlon in particular.

"I appreciate how the Monaghan players felt after their one point defeat in the All-Ireland final last October.

"As for Judy and Niamh, they are great players and great leaders on the field of play." SPECIAL TRIBUTE

When I asked Marcella to name the players she admired most in the men's gamed, she had little hesitation in siding with Seamus Moynihan and D. J. Carey. She spoke highly of both players and paid a special tribute to Carey for the way he made such a splendid comeback in the past year after a lengthy absence from inter-county hurling.

Camogie introduced radical new changes a few years back that saw teams increased from 12-a-side to 15-a-side and the enlargement of the pirch to the full hurling and football size.

Fiona O'Drioscoll is enthusiastic about the changes.

"The striking of players has greatly improved. A half back can now get plenty of distance into a puck. That was not possible in the 12-a-side game.

"I think the game has benefited over-all from the moves. The development was also probably necessary if camogie is to be accepted into the G.A.A. fraternity."

The Camogie Association, incidentally, is not a member of the G.A.A. as such.

Fiona is very interested in coaching. She is coach at Colaiste Choilm, Ballincollig, where she is a P.E. teacher.

What are the ambitions of the latest Vodafone All Star Player of the Month award winners?

Marcella has her eyes on further All-Ireland glory.

"I would like to go on from the latest title success to make it three All-Ireland titles in succession in 2004. I can't really say why this is an ambition, but it is still something I would like to achieve."

Fiona's big hope is that her club, Fr. O'Neills, in East Cork will soon win the county

"The club has not so far won the championship.

n impressive haul that includes six All Ireland senior championships, a Gael-Linn Inter-Provincial, an Ashbourne Cup and a host of inter county honours - Fr O'Neills finest Fiona O'Driscoll continues to take it all in her stride.

Coming from an area steeped in gaelic games it was inevitable that Fiona O'Driscoll would at some stage take up hurling.

The eldest and only girl in the family of Sean and Joan with three brothers Eric, Vincent and Brian said in her own words "I had very little choice but to pick up the hurley, join in and get involved."

Fiona recalled when we met for a chat how she and her brothers spent the summer months visiting cousins just three miles away and here they would join in with Dick and Ray O'Neill as they spent many hours re-enacting hurling games.

At the time there was little camogie in the national school but when the Fr O'Neills camogie club were short for an under 16 game, young O'Driscoll who's brothers were good hurlers with the club was called upon to stand between the posts to make up the numbers.

"At the time I was only nine or ten and I remember the ball flying past me continuously," laughed Fiona.

The experience did not turn her off and having got a foot inside the door Fiona was there to stay. "The following week we played Killeagh and that day I remember Dolores Joyce and Breda Kelly all lining out against us, I think we lost that one as well."

Fiona was retained between the posts and spent a few years in goal but the yearning to play out field was rewarded and she finally persuaded coaches Aileen Barry and Pat O'Donoghue to give her a chance in the forward line.

"I loved the freedom out field and once I got out of goal I made my mind up to give it my best shot"

Years later in 1990 Fiona was to bring her goal-keeping skills to the rescue of the Cork junior side when regular goalkeeper Rose Desmond was injured during their Munster semifinal into the breach stepped Fiona as the side advanced comfortably to a Munster final.

"It was a relief to hear the full time whistle and when the final came round, I was back out field with Marie O'Brien taking over between the posts."

If there was little camogie action at national school level, secondary education at St Marys High School Midleton was the perfect choice as here camogie was big on the agenda.

Killeagh's Ann Leahy and Betty Joyce were very much to the fore in coaching the school team and it was here that a Munster Senior Championship medal was won. St Mary's lost out at the All Ireland semi final stage to a Thomastown team, that included Jillian Dillon and Una Murphy who would later go on to become stars with Kilkenny.

1986 was the year when a little youngster from Ballymacoda made her debut on the national stage when she was runner up in the Cork Feile

na Gael skills competition to Bishopstown Edel Murphy. As Edel's club Bishopstown were representing Cork in the Feile, the rules did not allow her participate in the skills so Fiona represented the county in the national skills competition in Clare.

The year was to be a memorable one on the club scene when Fr O'Neill defeated neighbours Cloyne to take the Intermediate title just one year after being crowned Junior A champions with Fiona again very much to the fore.

By the following year Fiona O'Driscoll had progressed onto the Cork minor team but was unlucky to lose out to Galway in an exciting contest where just two points divides the sides at the finish. The following year a late Brigid Mullally goal saw Kilkenny snatch the title from Cork's grasp with three minutes remaining and so ended Fiona's minor days minus the illusive All- Ireland medal, years late Fiona would again cross paths with many of her opponent's from those days. Mary Moran was somebody who in her minor days made a lasting impression.

"Mary's love for the game is very obvious and I remember attending a coaching school of excellence under Mary's guidance when I was a minor player, she would have been somebody whom I looked up to."

Junior side in 1989 and again it was heartbreak as the Munster champions led Galway by two points thanks to a cracking Fiona O'Driscoll goal, but with two minutes remaining Galway's Emer Hardiman palmed to the net to end Cork's dream.

In the interim Fiona was making a name for herself as a forward who in the twinkle of an eye would punish a defender, Fr O Neills were working hard to establish themselves in the senior grade and Fiona O'Driscoll was one to keep a close eye on.

1992 saw the arrival of several new faces on the Cork Senior panel, amongst them the physical education student at University of Limerick who made her debut against Kilkenny in the National league.

Fiona recall's that Irene O'Keeffe and Denise Cronin were also new to the panel and slotted in well with the more established players. The county had been without a senior All Ireland since 1983 and having won the national league in 1991 there was a great determination in the panel.

Coach Joe Mc Grath and his back room team of former player's Marion Sweeney, Miriam Higgins, and Marie Mackey set about ending Kilkenny's reign. In an exciting semi final played in Ballinlough Cork edged out the champions to set up a final meeting with Wexford.

On a day when Sandy Fitzgibbon led Cork back to the victory rostrum Fiona O'Driscoll introduced herself to Croke Park contributing 1-3 to Cork's tally as she at last collected the coveted All-Ireland medal. "No words can describe my feelings that day at the final whistle, many of us were making our debut on the senior team but for many, years of heartbreak was finally ended."

The following year Cork retained the Nation league title and went on to retain the All-Ireland defeating Galway in the final with Fiona contributing 0-3 on All-Ireland day.

1994 saw Kilkenny crush Cork's hopes of making it three in a row as Fiona O'Driscoll was forced to sit out the start of their semi-final clash in Ballinlough with an ankle injury but made a half-time appearance as Kilkenny turned the tables on a 4-9 to 2-12 scoreline.

Cork hosted Ashbourne cup 1995 and it came as a shock to many to see the hosts U.C.C. defeated in the opening round by University of Limerick.

No surprise though to see captain Fiona O'Driscoll lead by example as her side took their first Ashbourne title with Fiona being named as player of the tournament.

Team mates on that University of Limerick team included Sinead Millea and Miriam Holland from Kilkenny, Carmel Hannon of Galway, and Tipperary's Paula Bulfin who marked Fiona in this year's All-Ireland final.

Fiona had the distinction of being President of the C.C.I.A. from 1995 to 1998 something which she claims came about because of her lobbying for University of Limerick to be allowed compete in the Ashbourne competition.

"Thomond and N.I.H.E. amalgamated and we worked hard to be allowed compete in Ashbourne and I was a delegate to C.C.I.A. 1994 was the first year we competed in the competition and it was a great honour to be elected president, it gave me a great insight into administration"

tucked away thoughts turned firmly to Fr O'Neills as the club continued their quest for a senior B county title. All through their campaign Mary Kenefick and Fiona O'Driscoll combined as the opposition continued to fall. In the final against St Finbarrs the duo again worked the oracle notching up vital goals as the Ballymacoda side took their first senior title.

"That was very special to us and it was a great day for Ballymacoda of course we also gained promotion to senior status and we eagerly looked forward to challenging those teams already there"

Amongst the sides that O'Neill's would come face to face with was Bishopstown a side that without doubt broke the hearts of the Ballymacoda girls on no fewer than four occasions.

Without doubt losing four county finals is something that still hurts.

In 1997, '98 and '99 Fr O'Neill's lost to Bishopstown while in 2001 having knocked Bishopstown out at the semi final stage it was Cloughduv who ended their dream in the final.

"It's a regret to have lost so many county finals, in 1999 I was coach to the team and it broke my heart but the warm homecoming we got from the locals made us realise just how much the club means to everybody and that homecoming is a memory I treasure and sure who knows

maybe it's not too late to win one yet"

espite a busy camogie schedule ladies football is another big interest and it is here that the county senior championship medals have been won, the holder of two Laois senior, four Cork junior and one Leinster club championship medals one suspects Fiona would trade them all for the illusive Cork camogie championship medal, if any player deserves one she surely does.

With such a busy playing agenda one suspects that leisure time is precious and indeed it is given that the Colaiste Choilm based P.E. teacher has got camogie off on a firm footing since she joined the teaching staff in Ballincollig three years ago. The season gone by has seen under her guiding influences the first camogie title come to the school with the Cork colleges 2nd year B championship, the Junior C championship and the Intermediate B title all achieved.

Also very involved at club level Fiona is coaching the Under 12 side this year. She also coached her clubs under 18 team to a county final in 2000 where she came head to head with her county team mate Denise Cronin who was coaching Glen Rovers. "It was funny because that day we played together in the National league against Galway the same day and then later that evening were in direct opposition below in Carrigtwohill, unlucky for me Denise had the last laugh but it was a great game"

At the beginning of 2002 the Cork county board set up a juvenile camogie committee who's brief is to organise under age camogie from under 12 to 16 level. Fiona O'Driscoll is the child welfare and liaison officer while also holding the position of registrar. With such a busy schedule the inevitable question arises why?

"I genuinely thought that I would have a lot of time on my hands given that I would almost certainly not to be playing inter county therefore I got involved with the new juvenile board. I have enjoyed the experience enormously and have come in contact with so many people from the many clubs."

Indeed Fiona has proven to be a wonderful officer and having dealt with her on many occasions myself at my own club level she has alway's been very honest and helpful.

Cork losing the national league semi final to Limerick was in many respects a blessing for it told Fiona O'Driscoll that just maybe she could do something to help put the county back on their winning ways.

"That day the old longing to be involved in the action was still there and I decided to give it a go and give it my best shot"

Certainly showing little ill effects from her national league lay off Fiona announced her return with a stunning performance against Limerick in the opening game of the championship contributing nine points to Corks tally.

Against Antrim it was a similar story with 3-4 on the score sheet at the final whistle, in the semi final against Galway it was a similar story but without doubt the crowning glory was saved for Croke Park on All Ireland day when Cork stopped Tipperary's quest for four in a row helped in no small way by a hat trick of Fiona O'Driscoll goals and two points. The scores helped settle Cork at vital stages and set the scene for victory.

arlier in the season somebody paid tribute to Fiona in an article and announced her retirement from inter county camogie. When contacted to organise an interview Fiona's words to me were: "Ah sure wait a while Mary, the hunger may just come back, don't write me off just yet."


How I have recalled those words since, as the honours continue to be made to one of Cork's finest camogie stars.

WHAT A COME-BACK

SIXTH All-Ireland senior medal, scorer of a hat-trick in Croke Park on All-Ireland day, leading championship scorer and Vodafone player of the Year, plus numerous other awards well that is how Cork's Fiona O'Driscoll celebrated camogic in the past year.

How often have we heard the saving 'good goods come in small! parcels' well that saving I feel very much pertains to Cork's star forward Fiona O'Driscoll, who while small in stature, makes the Cork scoreboard look very big at times and especially in the past year.

Complete clation and pure jov' is how this great forward described winning this year's All-Ireland Foras na Gaeilge Final when Cork beat Tipperary who were chasing for a fourth title on the trot. However, as with the Armagh footballers the main ingrediant for Cork was probably the hunger, not having won a senior title since '98 – a long time for a Cork side.

Earlier in the year, Fióna took a break during the National League, but as she witnessed her native county been beaten by Limerick in the semi-final, she chatted afterwards to fellow players Linda Mellerick, and Eithne Duggan. Figua felt the longer she stayed out, the harder it would be to get back and so she delighted Cork people and manager Pa Finn when she made her welcome return to the red and white of Cork for the championship in July.

Some people may have fancied Limerick this year, having reached the League Final where they were beaten by Galway, but when Cork met Limerick in the opening round of the championship, it soon became evident who was thinking of a trip to headquarters in September.

The eve of the All-Ireland saw Cork sample the great new Croke Park sod and then it began to hit Fiona how massive and great this new establishment really was, 'the years of work that people had put in really hit home and with the match the following day the excitement really began to hit our players and there may even have been a hint in the air yes we can do it.

For most players of Gaelic Games, their dream must be to play in Croke Park, to score a goal or a point is great but to score a hattrick of goals and then to walk those famous steps of the Hogan Stand, can there be anything better? Well for Fióna, to win another All-Ireland for Cork would be great.

Modest Fiona does not look on her victory as a personal sixth All-Ireland but as a victory for Cork Camogie and indeed the many awards that came her way while very proud to accept such she feels it is more important that camogie is being recognised by the wider audience now.

However, at the same time Fióna very much treasures each medal and award she has got over the years.

While Fiona was achieving a sixth senior medal, Jacqui Frisby, of the Carrickshock club in Kilkenny, was playing in Croke Park for her first time and making major history.

Camogic and hurling are synonymous with Kilkenny, and therefore it was difficult for many people to believe that the Black and Amber had never won or even reached a junior All-Ireland. Final until this year. KILKENNY'S TURN

September 15th 2002 proved a historic day for the Carrickshock club as Jacqui became the second captain in less than a fortnight as Kilkenny's Minor captain Michael Rice brought home the All-Ireland Minor trophy.

It is often said winning your first All-Ireland medal is the sweetest and it certainly was a very special Autumn for the Frisby clan. While Jacqui was aiding Kilkenny on to their first victory, her Dad, Dick, was on the sideline plotting Cork's downfall with his co selectors.

Add to that her cousin Tom was on the victorious minor Kilkenny burling panel the week previous to the camogic final! Very much a year to revall for the seventeen year old school girl from St.Brigids, Callan.

Ahane and Limerick always bring to mind one name and that surely must be Mackey. How proud Mick Mackey would have been as be watched his grand-daughter Chaire lift the All-Ireland Minor 'B' trophy when Limerick defeated first time All-Ireland finalists Offaly down in Leahy Park, Cashel.

It was very much a family occassion with Dad Ger a selector and Mum Vera there to lend a big hand too. Vera, was on the first Limerick team to win a junior All-Ireland back in '77 and last year some twenty four years later ber daughter Claire won her first Minor All-Ireland and she made Limerick history tin 2002 when she took the Corn Aoife back to Ahane for the second time.

Claire is very much a player of the future and following Limerick seniors very impressive year reaching the League final and accounting very well for themselves in the championship it may not be too long before Claire is seen wearing the Limerick senior team.

CORK MINORS

While Cork were looking for the senior title, they were also very intent on holding onto their All-Ireland Minor title and this they did against a fancied Galway side. Both these sides knew each other very well from their colleges matches and while there was good camugic in the game, the marking was a very tight nature which at times meant that we did not see some of the great skills that some of these young players have.

However, one player did stand out from the others on the day and that was Briege Corkery who was also introduced at half time in the junior All-Irekand final and almost won the match for the Leeside girls on the day.

Her speed and work rate in the Minor final were brillant and it was easy to see why she was the receipient of the Player of the match award.

To play for your county has to be a very proud achievement for a camogic player, but it is even greater pride to be selected to play for your province. Since 1956 the Gael-Linn Inter Provincial Championship has been played with very little exceptions. Originally for senior players it was opened to both senior and junior in 1975 with Munster winning the first junior title in that year.

This year the senior title went to Munster while a strong Ulster side took the junior trophy. Played on one day, it gives players a great opportunity to meet up for the day, however, it is probably fair to say that it needs to be given much more respect by some counties and players.

Some players would give anything to be asked to wear their provincial colours, but at times when selected players do not turn up on the day it is not fair to have denied other players a place on the team. Neither is it fair to selectors or the press core who often are left making many changes at the last moment.

However, I feel it is a very worthwide competition and all it needs is maybe to be steered in a different direction.

OFF THE FIELD ACTIVITY

While the activity on the fields was of a high skills level, there was plenty of worthwhile activity off the field too. The first ever National Camogic P.R.O. Seminar was held in Pairr an Chrocaigh drawing a large number of players as well as administrators, the draws were made for the Foras na Gaeilge All-Ireland semi-finals on R.T.E. Television for the first time ever on The Sunday Game.

It was also the first time that camogic was recognised by Cachtarán na hÉireann Mary Mc Aleese in the Annual Youth Sports Awards in Áras an Cachtaráin.

CENTENARY

With the media paying more attention to camogie nowadays, it is up to all of us to market the game as we should remember each time we go out to play we are marketing camogie.

With the centenary of 2004 now only around the corner, we must all endevour to do our utmost to bring the game to as wide an audience as possible. We have a great product, the oldest Gaelic game for females in this country and an extremely skillful game.

MINORS



Treble All Ireland glory sets up new record for county's camogie stars

N a county that has set many records, and has been almost continuously been to the fore in camogic circles, the capturing of Se-nior, Intermediate and Minor All Ireland titles in 2002 is another first for Cork's finest.

"Elaine is equally at home in defence and


"Elaine is equally at home in defence and attack, but she is also a very keen competitor, and the tougher the going gets in a game, the more likely it is that you will see the best of her.

THREE All-Ireland titles, a clean sweep of provincial titles, plus numerous colleges and third-level successes, marks 2002 as a successful season for Cork.

The final lived up to all pre-match expectations as Cork turned in a sparkling performance to take the title.

Trailing at half-time by two points, Cork's second half display was one to remember. Fiona O'Driscoll's contribution of 3 -2 rightly earned her the Player of the Match Award, but it was a superb team effort that carried the day.

For the younger players such as Jennifer O'Leary, Emer Dillon, Jemma O'Connor, Joanne O'Callaghan and Ger Casey, it was a first senior All-Ireland medal.

And stalwarts Linda Mellerick and Eithne Duggan signalled the end of their days in the Cork jersey.

There have been no better servants to the game in Cork.


Many of the intermediate side put the disappointment of losing the junior final behind them and had victories over Down and Dublin.

them at all levels could not be ignored and we had no hesitation in picking Jennifer as a star of the season. She follows in the footsteps of another great Barryroe girl, Cora Keohane, in bringing back an All-Ireland senior medal to her native purish

in bringing back an All-Ireland senior medal to her native parish.

That final against arch-rivals, Tipperary, was one of the great hurling games of the past season and Jennifer had an outstanding game at wing forward, scoring three points. It was her second season on the Cork team, losing last year in the semi-final to Tipp.

A product of the Barryree club and the local primary school, she won her first All-Ireland medal with Clonakilty Convent of Mercy, went on to star with the Cork minor, u.16 team for two years, winning All-Irelands in 1998 and 1999, intermediate All-Ireland in 2000, a Munster u.18 medal in 2001 and the big one this year in senior.

This year also she won several sporting awards for her achievements and she a worthy Top Ten nominee.

All-Ireland Camogie Final

Between July 10th 1999 and September 15th 2002, Tipperary were unbeaten in senior championship camogie. A total of fifteen successive matches saw victories achieved over Kilkenny (four times), Cork (three), Clare, Wexford and Down (two each), Galway and Dublin (one each). But the 16th hurdle proved to be one too many and on September 15th, the curtain finally fell on a glorious reign, when Cork exacted revenge for those three defeats, in the All Ireland final.

Maybe in hindsight, too much was made of the four-in-a-row goal, with an extra burden placed on the girls, whose chief ambition for that September afternoon was to defeat Cork and win the O'Duffy Cup.

At the same time, it was a motivating factor for a team that had won three-ina-row and a team requires some extra incentive in order to keep up the momentum. But it didn't come off and there can be no excuses offered. Indeed none were, Cork's entitlement to the trophy after three years of Tipp dominance, being freely acknowledged. A sad ending nonetheless, but nothing to be ashamed of or indeed to be too cut up over, because in the past three years these magnificent hurlers have provided us with such exquisite performances. such great memories, through which they succeeded in raising the whole image of camogie to a height never previously experienced.

Two early rounds in Semple Stadium against both Dublin and Wexford, saw very easy victories, that against Wexford especially so, when Tipp were geared up for quite a tussle having had to play very well a year earlier in order to beat them. Tipp were in the All-Ireland semi final before they realised it and after

Cork had brushed aside Galway's challenge in Limerick's Gaelic Grounds, Tipp went into action against a Kilkenny side that relied on the physical in their bid to atone for that huge All Ireland final loss of the previous year.

Tipp were ready for them and held them scoreless in the second half, having defended so well when playing into a strong first half wind. The final pairing was the one everyone wanted, Tipp and Cork, and as soon as that final whistle sounded at the end of the Tipp-Kilkenny game, the preparations were under way in both camps. This was a game not to

be missed, one not to be taken lightly, and nothing was left to chance by way of preparation.

Una O'Dwyer was honoured with the captaincy this year, the fourth successive Cashel player in that role, and like her predecessors Maedhbh Stokes, Jovita Delaney and Emily Hayden, she took to it splendidly, a model in terms of leadership qualities. Michael Cleary at the helm in the off-field deliberations, spared neither himself nor the girls in ensuring that everyone was in peak condition, both mentally and physically. There was a confidence in the camp that the Cork challenge would be successfully met.

Their opponents were analysed in as far as it was possible to do so, with a huge respect for the quality of the opposition voiced both by Michael (and his comentors Biddy Phillips and Jim Madden) and the players themselves.

In several instances there was an intimate knowledge of the quality of opponents, through friendships built up in third level academies and when it all came together in the throes of an All-Ireland final, the occasion was expected to explode into one of sheer camogie splendour.

The first half saw Tipp go on top early, Eimear McDonnell's goal providing the inspiration in what was an exciting and well-contested match. Cork began to come more into it in the second quarter and the first of Fiona O'Driscoll's three goals shortly before halftime, placed some question marks over the Tipp defence, a sector that didn't look as comfortable as in previous matches.

Half time saw Tipp with a one point lead, 1-6 to 1-5 and two early second half points seemed to suggest that the champions were on their way again. Not so.

The Cork surge emerged, and between the second and the twenty second minutes of the half, Tipp's fate was sealed beyond redemption. Three Cork goals in a seven minute period broke the hearts of the gallant Tipp lassies and while the Tipp challenge remained sustained and invigorating, we were never going to experience the come-back we saw a year earlier in that amazing semi final replay against the same opposition in Limerick. Now, it would be Cork's turn to claim the spoils and no one could deny their entitlement to them.

We thought that this hunger about

which we hear so much nowadays in every sport, was still present in the Tipp system in abundance. It was there but, unfortunately for Tipp, it was in even greater abundance in the Cork girls and no blame to them for that. Over the past two years, Cork had suffered badly at the hands of Tipp and it goes without saying that there comes a time when the Cork system kicks back and with a vengeance. That September afternoon was the time chosen and the O'Duffy Cup was theirs for the twentieth time.

Tipp tears were profuse, understandably so. The loser takes a back seat on Alltreland final day and players can only slink away while the victors gain the plaudits. Such it is with sport.

Tipp had their days in the sun in 1999, 2000 and 2001 and will have them again. They have given us so many memorable outings in that time, and probably the highest tribute that can be paid to them is that, they have been chiefly instrumental in giving the game a higher and more widespread profile because of the way in which the skill elements have been addressed and presented.

Last year in the Year Book we claimed that hurling was a beautiful game when played by women. Nothing has happened to change that view and we look forward eagerly to Tipp's return to the top of the ladder.

It was Christy Ring who said hurling was only half dressed without Tipperary. In truth it can now be said that such has been the impression made by Tipperary on the camogie scene over the past four years, the game needs Tipperary for its future well-being.

For the record Tipperary were beaten by 4-9 to 1-9, having led by 1-6 to 1-5 at the interval.





Camogie players need support

I OFTEN ask myself the question, 'Is camogic moving forward?' In reality, yes the organisation celebrates its centenary in 2004, but when it comes to competing with our male counterparts, we are left far behind.

Why? It is very hard to know where to lay the blame. But I believe at national level, camogie is at a real crossroads. Bringing the game to 15-a-side was a major step forward, but we need more than eight counties partaking in the All-Ireland senior championship. Especially, when only four of these (Tipperary, Cork, Kilkenny and Galway) have a realistic chance of winning the competition.

In contrast to the hurling championship where many counties can produce the goods, camogie has a very tired look about it, and despite this year the championship being run on a league basis, it probably still will produce the same top four teams when it comes to semi-final stage.

That is not good enough, and does not give the game the profile it deserves. For camogie to flourish, it needs imagination. For instance, staging important inter-county matches while in the next field the hurlers/footballers are playing to a packed arena just is not on. This is hardly promoting the game.

What needs to be done, starting at club level, is hurling and camogie to be staged side by side (might be pushing it — but why not the boys as the curtain-raiser and the girls to follow). Let the significance dictate.

This way, there is a greater chance of more media attention — one reporter can adequately cover the two matches.

We have always said that marketing and sponsorship go hand in hand in this modern day of sport, and a descent sponsor is urgently required nationally.

However, before the game can sparkle at the top level, we need to look at our own membership at club level. Where are all these people when it comes to supporting our county teams? Last summer, Cork played Limerick in the first round of the senior championship in Páirc Uí Rinn. There was a mere sprinkling of families and friends in the stand. Where are all these people — players/administrators — that belong to one of the 50 odd clubs in Cork?

If we do not support ourselves, how can we expect others to come on board?

Presently, there are on-going talks between the GAA and Camogie with view to a merger. In my view, this alliance is critical to the growth and development of the sister sport.

There are huge demands on players, especially at inter-county level. We have come to expect only the best from them and they rarely baulk. Camogie is as skilful and entertaining as any sport, but is not being properly sold.

Everyone acknowledges that the game of hurling is enjoying a glorious era. Camogie should be booming too. First, though, we must help ourselves.



UCD, though, despite coming out on the wrong end of a seven-point difference, provided much sterner opposition to the UCC side than they might have expected.


On the Saturday, they excelled to beat off a fancied UL team, and once more in the final lived up to their own UCD cry - Unity, Confidence and Desire.





NEW LOOK CHAMPIONSHIP

The race for the All-freland senior camogie championship will take on a new format this year. The straight knock-out system that has been a permanent feature of the championship will be replaced by a League plan.

Eight counties, representing all four provinces, will compete in two groups. Each county in each group will have three games and the top two teams from each group will go forward to the Alf-Ireland semi-finals proper.

Should three teams in either or both group finish on equal points on top of the group a play-off will take place to decide the issues.

The first team drawn will have a bye to the last four, while the other counties will meet for a place in the semi-finals.

Cork, who are holders of the All-Ireland crown, Galway, Antrim and Kilkenny will compete in one group, and Tipperary, who have been such an exciting force in the championship in recent times, Dublin, Wexford and Limerick will take part in the other group.

The draw for the semi-finals will take place at the end of the group matches.

The championship is due to start at the end of June and each county will have a game every second week under the group plan. The All-Ireland semi-finals have been arranged for Saturday August 23, with the final on September 21.

The draw for the group matches is:

Group 1

Cork v Galway. Antrim v Kilkenny. Second Round: Galway v Kilkenny. Antrim v Cork.

Third Round: Kilkenny v Cork. Galway v Antrim.

Group II

Dublin v Limerick, Tipperary v Wexford. Second Round: Limerick v Tipperary. Wexford v Dublin.

Third Round: Dublin v Tipperary. Limerick v Wexford.

The first named team will have home advantage.

The draw has resulted in some very appealing and crowd-pulling matches and all the indications are that the system will boost interest in the sport in general.

The fact that all the counties will be guaranteed extra games under this new arrangement is a step in the right direction. The more competitive matches the better the prospects of any team or county building up strength.

So this is an imaginative move by the Camogie Association and developments will be watched with interest.

If it proves as successful as some of the earlier changes made by the Association it will prove very beneficial for the sport in general.

Although the All-Ireland senior inter-county championship was only launched in the 'Thirties the Camogie Association has a history stretching back right to 1904. That's the year the organisation was launched and so next year the Association will celebrate its Centenary and so will prove a memorable occa-

sion for the Association.

The first All-Ireland senior final was for the 1932 title and was decided at the Galway Sportsfield on July 30, 1933. Dublin beat the home county by 3-2 to 0-2.

The campaign for the All-Ireland title followed the same pattern as in hurling and football--provincial championships and the All-Ireland series proper.

That arrangement persisted down through the years until the 1973 Congress. That was the first Congress held outside of Dublin and delegates agreed to a proposal to run the senior All-Ireland championship on the open-draw principle.

The opening games in the open-draw championship were played in 1973 and then in 1976 the arrangement made possible the first-ever senior decider featuring teams from the one province. Kilkenny won that history-mak-

ing game with Dublin.

The Association has increased teams from twelve players to fifteen some years aback and also decided to increase the playing area to the same size as for football and hurling.

Those changes have also benefited the game in general.

Dublin dominated the senior football championship for many years and won an amazing ten titles in succession between 1957 and 1966 inclusive

They head the Roll of Honour with 26 titles, but their last was as far back as 1984. That was surprisingly enough, also the county's first title win in eighteen years.

Only seven counties in all—Cork, Kilkenny, Antrim, Wexford, Galway and Tipperary are the others—have inscribed their names on the All-Ireland senior championship Roll of Honour.

Camogie and ladies football groups in GAA unity plan

YESTERDAY was a historic day in Croke Park as four presidents attended the launch of a scheme which aims to integrate the Ladies Football and Camogie Associations with the GAA.

President Mary McAlesse, GAA chief Sean McCague, Ladies football Association head Pat Rafferty and Camogie Association leader Walter Thompson lent their support to the ambitious project.

The scheme, which will run from March until October in eight counties — Limerick, Tipperary, Galway, Roscommon, Tyrone, Down, Laois and Wexford — will highlight the various challenges the merger poses.

The counties involved will then aim to provide solutions ahead of closer liaisons between the three associations in a national context. A report will be presented to the three congresses in 2004.

Speaking at the launch, President McAleese said: "It is such a lovely joy to be part of this memorable day. Gaelic Games have entered an era of sophistication, composure and confidence, which is truly remarkable. An unashamedly proud amateur sport, it is driven by the highest professional values and its aspiration is to keep getting better and better.

"Naturally, it now looks to areas where fresh synergies can be released and this obvious alliance is one of those. It will not be an easy road and will take a lot of faith and trust in each other."

Mr McCague welcomed the initiative, saying all three associations had shown their desire to go forward as a united force in the promotion of their shared ideas. He added: "This can best be achieved through a concerted effort on all our parts.

"We share common goals and ideals and there is already significant crossover in our activities on the ground in terms of shared facilities along with coaching and games promotion strategies."

He said such integration had already effectively taken place in many clubs around the country.

Incoming president Sean Kelly said this was an ideal opportunity for the GAA to broaden their outlook towards curtain-raisers for their games.

He said it would test the will of those advocating this project but was confident of its success through the co-operation of all involved.

The process will be monitored by a steering committee in each county. These will consist of two representatives from each association.

The Camogie Association celebrates its centenary next year. The Ladies Gaelic Football Association was established in 1974 and has experienced phenomenal growth since its inception.


he 2003 Camogic Championship may be a long way off, but already players and supporters have one eye on how the spoils will be shared in late summer. Recent seasons have thrown up a number of teams that appear possessed of the skill, determination and appetite required for success, but which have yet to prove their mettle by taking home any silverware. And then there is Cork, the recently crowned champions who will be looking to consolidate their position and defend a title it had taken them so long to regain. For a while there it appeared that Tipperary had claimed the O'Duffy Cup as their own. Winning three All-Irelands in a row just a year after turning senior, the women from the Premier established themselves with ease among the game's aristocracy. But last year they were ousted by a hungry and talented Cork side that finally made the breakthrough to beat the reigning champions in the final. So this year, it is they who have everything to lose and the rest who will act as willing challengers. The question facing this Cork side is whether they will be able to copper-fasten their hold on Camogie's biggest prize and dominate in a manner the women from Tipperary have done in recent times. Only time will tell of course, but Cork are hopeful.

Caoimhe Harrington was one of Cork's most influential players last year. Drafted into the forward line along with Jenny O'Leary and Emer Dillon, the young trio were an attacking force to be reckoned with. Caoimhe, a final year physiotherapy student in University College Dublin, is optimistic that the Cork team can capitalise on its success and look forward to another good season. When the team regroups in early March, it will face many challenges - none more so than the retirement of the highly skilled, hard working forward, Linda Mellerick. She was highly instrumental in Cork's victory and will be sorely missed. Her boots will be difficult to fill but Caoimhe takes solace from the success the county has enjoyed at under age level: "There's great depth in Cork camogie. We have had some good wins at minor and Under 16 recently so there's definitely some good stuff coming through. The team will be hoping to build on the very good under age set up we have in the county.5 Recent under age wins for Cork includes last year's All-Ireland minor championship and this will surely provide a fertile recruiting ground for the selectors when they start to rebuild the team for the coming year's champi-


Cork will also be hoping that some of the more effective tactics employed last year can be put to similar effect again. The management had a good understanding of what the girls needed. With large numbers of the panel involved in colleges' camogie at a competitive level, fitness was never a major problem. Training was consequently tailored to concentrate on skills. "In training, ball work became more of a focus, we did a lot of speed work and concentrated on quick movement of the ball. Basically it was match orientated", Harrington points out. The approach worked well for the team and while at this stage there is still a degree of uncertainty about exactly what shape the management team will take, the girls are secure in the knowledge that Pa Finn will still be involved as will former Cork stalwart, Sandra Fitzgibbon.

As defending champions Cork will surely feel

As defending champions Cork will surely feel that they have more to lose than any other but will also feel that after three years in the proverbial wilderness they do not want to experience that kind of frustration again. So from where will their biggest challenge come? Obviously Tipperary will be a threat. Not only do they have a wealth of talented players but they may also have that extra hunger this year. No team that has enjoyed the sort of success that Tipperary has will take kindly to playing second fiddle, particularly to their Munster neighbours and fiercest of rivals. Kilkenny and Galway will also have to be watched. While the former have always been classed among the giants of Camogie, Galway are a team that many believe have yet to reach their full potential. Although Cork beat them comprehensively early last year, the score-line belied their potential. Galway were missing quite a few of their central players that day and still displayed some obvious seeds of promise. Limerick too could be in a position to cause some upsets this season. Although maybe unlikely champions, with few senior clubs in the county, they have some highly effective and talented players to chose from. With Granagh-Ballingarry were All-Ireland club champions back-to-back in 1998 and 1999 and also All-Ireland seven-aside winners in 2002, that particular club provide highly experienced players to the young county side. For the moment, however, there is only talk of summer. The stage now is occupied by students, many of whom are sure to feature prominently when the inter-county season picks up. Perhaps, then, the Ashbourne Cup for Colleges is the best place to start mapping the season ahead. A trip to Cork, where this year's competition is being held, will provide as good a guide as there is to the talent on offer for the coming year. And for those that fancy a flutter, maybe this is the place to look first before placing that bet.


O'Leary wins sports title

It will be interesting to see how this system will work, but the Dublin manager P.J.Donoghue is very much in favour of such a change. It is his opinion that it may very well help the weeker counties and thus give the stronger counties probably more challenging matches, thus being of benifit to all sides. "It is the best camogie news I have heard for sometime, it is very welcomed in Dublin," was P.J.'s

Dublin will face Limerick in Dublin in their first outing and last year's All-Ireland finalists Tipperary will host Wexford. The opening encounters in the other group are Antrim hosting Kilkenny, while Foras na Gaeilge All-Ireland champions Cork will host National League champions Galway.
