But how this game will now go is anyone's guess. So much has happen in the past five months. Inniscarra, All-Ireland club finalists last March, and Milford, the side so near and yet so far, will still produce a close affair and for no other reason but that both sides, Inniscarra in particular, are seriously depleted.

Inniscarra are without a significant number of the side which took their first senior county title last July. Cruciate injuries to star forward Niamh McCarthy, Orla Healy and Aoife Kavanagh rules them definite non-starters. Last season's captain Margaret Noelle O'Sullivan is unavailable due to the fact that she is to marry shortly. Karen Jones and Katie O'Mahony are in the States while Laura

Burke seems to be taking a break from the game. Add in the fact that Sinead Ni Riain is struggling with a back injury, Margaret Cosgrave cannot last a full game due to a hip injury, Emma Kingston hasn't trained in seven weeks, Fiona O'Connell lands back in Ireland from Asia Saturday night and Mary Buckley is working up the country, you can hear the frustration and disappointment in manager Fergal

O'Leary's voice.

"We're ferociously depleted,"
explained Fergal. "It's going to
be very difficult against Milford
on Sunday. At this moment
we're struggling to pick the team
as we wait on one or two injuries
to hopefully clear a bit.

"We've a strong panel but it is hard to replace so many. But we won't give up our title easily. We'll be dogged and we'll give Milford a game."

Milford, on the other hand, are

serious title contenders. The return of Regina Curtin after a period abroad and the transfer of Marie O'Neill to the club are major inclusions. However the three Watson sisters, Aine, Maria and Emer are currently in Australia. It is hoped all three will be back in time for the second round/back-door scheduled for the weekend of August 20th but for now they are a huge loss to the north Cork side.

It evens matters up a bit though and Cork right half-back Anna Geary, a starring player with Milford, is under no illusions as to the task facing her

"It is both daunting and motivating to be playing the All-Ireland finalists. The fact that no Cork club has reached an All-Ireland final since the Glen in 1994 speaks volumes about the strength of Inniscarra. I think we have a similar style but Inniscarra have hurlers all over the pitch. Inniscarra have never beaten us and it is a motivating factor for us to maintain that re-


Kilkenny were first out of the hat. They were swiftly followed by Galway, setting up a repeat of the 2009

# Can minors Tipp the balance and regain title?

KILKENNY will be in hot pursuit of an All-Ireland crown lost last year when they take on Tipperary in the minor camogie decider this week-

Since the minor championship was upgraded to under-18 in 2006 Kilkenny have dominated the scene, achieving the four-in-a-row back in

It wasn't just at inter-county level that the Cats excelled. During that intervening period, St Brigid's Callan achieved consecutive All-Ireland colleges titles in 2008 and 2009, while Loreto Kilkenny have dominated over the last years, winning four junior All-Irelands since 2007. In March the city school retained their All-Ireland colleges senior A title with victory over St Patrick's Maghera.

The Loreto school formed the backbone of Kilkenny's starting 15 in their comprehensive semi-final victory over Galway in Nenagh on Wednesday. Included were senior panellists Grace Walsh, Noelle Maher and Claire Phelan, as well as Loreto All-Ireland winning captain Aisling Curtis and star forward Aoife Murphy, who were other key members of the Loreto contingent.

Fellow minors Kelly Hamilton and Megan Farrell were central to Grennan College's success when winning the All-Ireland colleges senior B title,

while Jennifer Cunningham and Niamh Phelan were squad members of the St Brigid's Callan outfit that retained their All-Ireland in 2009.

#### Wealth of winners

A look through the subs shows there is a wealth of colleges winners 27 members of the 33-strong squad have won All-Ireland medals with their schools.

Despite that strength the campaign began on a low note for Kilkenny. who produced a poor display when losing to Clare (1-9 to 0-8) in their opening game.

Kilkenny were short five of their senior inter-county panel that night, but made amends by destroying Derry (6-12 to 0-0) a week later.

That landslide win set up a semifinal showdown with Galway, a repeat of last year's semi-final in which the Westerners prevailed by a single point (1-14 to 2-10).

Warm favourites in Nenagh last Wednesday, Galway boasted a number of players from their last two under-16 All-Ireland winning teams along with last year's victorious mi-

However, Kilkenny tore up the form book as, with the benefit of their senior contingent, they easily accounted for the Westerners, winning by 3-16 to 3-9 in a superb team display.

Claire Phelan was magnificent at centre-forward, scoring 0-7 while Aisling Curtis, Aoife Murphy and substitute Sarah-Anne Quinlan were goalscorers in an excellent perform-

Miriam Walsh, who excelled for the Kilkenny under-16s in their onepoint defeat to Tipp, played a key role last Wednesday, scoring three excellent points from play.

Overall it's a strong Kilkenny team. Seven of the team who started against Galway will be under-age again next year, with nine more panellists eligible for minor in 2012.

Barring injury, the starting 15 next Sunday (venue to be confirmed) is expected to be much the same as the line-up from the Galway match.

Goalkeeper Aine Kinsella won a senior county medal with Mullinavat last year. The half-back line is very strong and features Megan Farrell and the Tullaroan duo Grace Walsh and Noelle Maher.

Midfielder Kelly Hamilton is a proven performer at senior level, while Lydia Fitzpatrick at wing-forward was part of the under-16 outfit that reached the All-Ireland final.

Their final opponents Tipperary beat Dublin and Cork in their opening championship games before overcoming Clare by a point (3-9 to 1-14) in the second semi-final.

Tipp have a number of skilful players in attack, and their under-age talent gives them hope for the future as the county's senior team is being rebuilt following a golden era of five

All-Irelands between 1999 and 2004.

Brid Quinn and under-16 player Caoimhe Maher are a solid midfield partnership for the Premier County. The Fryday sisters, Eimear and Sarah, are sharp while Michaela Graham and Ciara McGrath are also potent attacking players.



#### Wexford ready for a battle

When a team is just one step away from the final in any sport it is human nature to begin to dream and take your eye off the ball.

This Saturday in Nowlan Park there is no time for day dreaming as Galway take on Kilkenny and reigning All Ireland champions Wexford lock horns with Cork. The 'Big Four' have finished top of the O'Duffy Cup table and both games are very much in the mix.

"I wouldn't be able to make a call in either of the matches. In the previous seven weeks of championship it was safe to say that no-one was at their best. The level of intensity in Nowlan Park on Saturday from the four teams will be a world away from what has been seen earlier in the season," insists Model County All Star Claire O'Connor.

"Every team in the semi-finals has the ability to win the All Ireland. Whoever puts in a good performance on Saturday and gets a bit of luck can win and then the same can be said in the Final for whichever two make it."

Before the champs take to the field they will be interested spectators in the first semi between Kilkenny and Galway.

"We played Galway earlier in the year and they looked sharp and we also played Kilkenny who have been suffering from a number of injuries throughout the campaign. If Kilkenny can strike form they always seem to be able to get one over on Galway but having been beaten by Galway I know how good they are," says the Rathnure star.

O'Connor has been representing her county with distinction for 20 years having started out playing camogie as a "miniature hero" in full size goals in primary school. She eventually made her senior debut in 1999. Then, after 28 years of waiting, Wexford finally reached the Promised Land four years ago.

"We had been building for a few years and year on year we added something with people like Aidan Breen and Willie Carley coming in before we finally did it, In 2007 Stellah Sinnott brought everything together and it was the culmination of all the previous work. 2010 was like that as everything and everyone was so fresh and it all just came together. We had so many regrets from the previous two years it nearly made it better than 2007."

With Cork involved the Duffy Cup holders are fully aware that the Rebelettes are never beaten until the final whistle as encounters in recent years have seen Cork come back from the death to snatch victory. In the 2007 League Final they hit three late goals to record an amazing comeback. That bitter loss gave the losers that day the drive to reverse the result come September.

Last year was the first time since 2002 that the Munster marvels did not contest an All Ireland final so now they are the ones chomping at the bit to knock Wexford off their perch.

"When it comes to the big day Cork always perform. Nobody in Wexford is thinking we are going to have it our own way and we certainly know what we are coming up

against. As a back I'm looking at the danger of the Cork forwards who are brilliant and they also have a serious midfield. They are a very attacking team so we will have to have all our avenues covered to keep them at bay. I'm just thinking about the first 30 minutes on Saturday," insists the All Star.

After a midweek briefing at training the Wexford camp were told to watch what they say to the media. Thus there is no hint of over-confidence from their corner back when it comes to their own chances.

"As for ourselves all I know is that we have been training hard all year and getting good commitment so if we work hard enough on the day we can do it. I have no doubt they are thinking the exact same as us and you have two teams capable of beating each other. There is only ever a score or good defending at the other end that has brought the game our way or their way in turn. We'll just have to wait and see," finished O'Connor.



ORK are at their best when their backs Care to the wall and without doubt Wexford enter this contest as favourites.

Since Cork relinquished their title to Galway twelve months ago after a semifinal replay, Joanne O'Callaghan, Catriona Foley, Mary O'Connor and Rachel Moloney have retired. They also have a new management team with Lillian Zinkant the only link to the team of 2010. Joe O'Brien manages the side with Con Hayes as the third selector.

Matters remain pretty much in situ with Wexford as they bid for two in a row.

Despite finishing third in the table, Cork topped it on scoring average by 25 points, 30 ahead of Wexford, They slipped to third place on the last day, after an insignificant final group game defeat to Kilkenny where both sides had already qualified for the

Cork goaled in six of their seven outings, but taking just the top three opposing defences into consideration Cork struggle to be creative and create opportunities.

Cork must be itching for another go at Wexford having been somewhat annoyed with themselves over their three point defeat to the All Ireland champions in round two. Michelle Quilty remains their most potent attacker. scoring 5-26 in the championship to date, with 5-16 of that total coming from play.







RTE HAVE been told to show some 'gender equity' by broadcasting an 'Up for the Match' programmes to coincide with the camogie and ladies Gaelic Football All Ireland's.

I was struck by the level of commitment of all players and management to training, diet, social discipline and lifestyle,' he

ELEVEN of the Galway team that started in last year's semi-final victory over Cork lined out at Nowlan Park on Saturday, but there was something different about this particular effort from the Westerners, for it contained a freshness, drive and vigour incomparable with previous campaigns.

Unquestionably, the management will be extremely happy with the character Galway showed in the second period after enduring a torrid opening to the second half where they were hit for 1-3. Consequently, the remaining 20 minutes was to be a test of Galway's temperament and resolve. It would determine how far they have come this year. Their response was emphatic and for what they brought to this contest, they were more than deserving of

In any event, Aislinn Connolly – a terrific effort over the right shoulder – Brenda Hanney and Niamh Kilkenny (two, one free) were all on target in the opening exchanges, with Aoife Neary posting the home side's sole response.

Neary (free) cut the deficit with her second, but Niamh Kilkenny (free) restored Galway's three point cushion and when Ann Marie Starr was taken down in full flight, Kilkenny registered her fourth of the semi-final.

On 24 minutes, Galway pounced for their opening goal, one which gave the scoreboard a truer reflection of proceedings. Catriona Ryan made a mess of Veronica Curtin's probing delivery and though Hanney's first attempt failed to cross the white paint, the captain retrieved the sliotar and rattled the net with a blistering strike. A brilliant Niamh Kilkenny score from out near the left touchline followed and all of a sudden, Galway were eight clear.

Kilkenny, to their credit, didn't lose heart responding with
a major of their own in the
27th minute. Corner forward
Maria Dargan was pivotal in
setting up the goal and though
Galway kept out the first two
efforts, they were powerless to
do anything about Aisling
Dunphy's ground stroke which
rose high into the roof of the
net.

Significantly though, it was

Galway who had the final say of the half with a score that was a parable of the game itself. Therese Maher robbed Dargan of possession before finding Ann Marie Starr with a succinct pass. The Killimor midfielder moved the sliotar first time into the full forward line where Curtin burst onto the breaking ball before dissecting the posts.

Kilkenny, trailing by six, couldn't have asked for a better start to the second half with Edel Maher finding the net after Earner batted an Aoife Neary free back into the danger area. Noreen Coen pointed for the Westerners, but when Aisling Dunphy and Neary (free) split the posts in the ensuing passages of play, it was obvious this one was going to right down to the wire

Following a superb fetch and offload by Hanney, Niamh Kilkenny edged Galway two in front, but Neary was again on target after Therese Maher coughed up possession before committing the foul on Edel

Maher.

Yet again Galway responded, producing a carbon copy of their previous score. Hanney broke possession to Kilkenny who, at the end of a terrific solo run, fired over. An illegal challenge on Curtin subsequently, allowed Niamh Kilkenny nudge Galway two clear in what was her eighth point of the tie. Rutledge's goal arrived minutes later and with it the realisation that Galway were back in an All-Ireland final.

Not surprisingly, there were plenty of positives to be taken from this semi-final win, Galway's third in four years. Their hunger and commitment to the cause never wavered throughout, especially in the second period when Kilkenny reduced arrears to the minimum on two occasions.

Their distribution of the sliotar, exemplified by centre-half back Therese Maher, was superb. Consequently, the inside line, thriving on the plentiful supply of ball filtering through, ripped the Kilkenny full back line to shreds.

Furthermore, the intensity which Galway brought to the encounter was phenomenal as they hassled, harried and outclassed their opponents all over the field.

That said, Wexford will be a completely different proposition on September 13th. They might have been less than impressive in overcoming Cork, but have a strong tradition of delivering the goods when the occasions demands.

Lest we not forget they lifted the O'Duffy Cup in 2007 and again in 2010. As for Galway, their Croke Park experiences are a familiar tale of All Ireland heartache.

It's time to turn a new leaf in the fortunes of Galway camogie and where better than All-Ireland final day to do so.

A YEAR ago, having let two All-Ireland semifinals slip away with a whimper, after looking dejected trudging off the Nowlan Park pitch after defeats to Galway and Cork in 2008 and '09 respectively, the Wexford mantra was 'believe'.

Well, where in 2010 they 'believed' and foilowed through with victory, now they don't just believe, they 'expect'. Indeed, the county expects.

Expect to stay in the game, expect to tick-tock their way through a competitive first-half, expect to pick off scores - and crucial goals - at vital times, and most importantly, they expect to win.

And Saturday in Nowlan Park against old foes Cork, they did just that, yet again.

The only blemish on a yearly record that reads: played 15, won 14, lost one, now looks flourescent in the rear-view mirrors - a thumping loss against Galway in the opening round of the championship. Now a mouth-watering rematch in Croke Park awaits where both sides seek their own form of revenge.

Galway booked their place in the showpiece before their 2010 All-Ireland conquerors, seeing off a disappointing Kilkenny side by six points (2-13 to 2-7), leaving Wexford to complete the re-

They set about that task with a surprise inclusion in the starting 15 as Lenny Holohan got the nod over Evelyn Quigley who looked favourite to take the corner-forward spot after grabbing an impressive five goals in four championship

It was the added pace of the experienced Rathnure woman that got her the nod over her clubmate. That aspect of her game was in immediate focus as she won Wexford a second-minute free that Ursula Jacob converted.


The first quarter won't live long in the memories of the largest crowd ever to witness All-Ireland Senior camogie championship semi-finals as it disjointedly lumbered from end to end with only frees offering scoring chances.

Adjudged indiscretions from Catherine O'Loughlin and Claire O'Connor gave Jennifer O'Leary the opportunity to pick off a placed ball double, giving Cork their first lead in the seventh

Jacob levelled after she herself was fouled in the 14th minute, while Holohan quickly won her second free, with Pamela Mackey penalised for hurl pulling, as the captain gave her side a 0-3 to 0-2 lead with her third free.

Four points in the next ten minutes would prove to be the Leesiders' best spell of the contest as they controlled proceedings and Wexford struggled.

O'Leary levelled with her third pointed free before she turned provider with a clever flick to Katriona Mackey for her first minor.

The corner-forward doubled her tally two minutes later before the National League champions grabbed a reprieve when the anonymous Briege Corkery, shackled into submission by Acife O'Connor, over-did a handpass when O'Leary had a clear route to goal (0-5 to 0-3).

Veteran Gernma O'Connor made it double scores in the 28th minute as her side

continued to dominate, but a jolt from nowhere in the final minute of the half changed the course of this semi-final in Wexford's favour.

Una Leacy looked almost lifeless, struggling badly with a quad injury picked up in midweek, however the Oulart-The Ballagh club lady can catch a ball as proved countless times in the past. She plucked a long Kate Kelly ball from the air and became engulfed in Cork defenders before releasing for Ursula Jacob - all alone in the large rectangle - to smash past Aoife Mur-

In the three minutes of first-half injury time, Jacob converted her fourth free, sile claimed all her side's first-half salvo of 1-4, and with it led her warriors in one point ahead at the interval.

With the goal the only Wexford score from play of the opening half, they set about righting that wrong. Holohan picked off a superb point when darting around her marker seconds after the re-start and Kate Kelly fed Deirdre Codd two minutes later for a second in quick succession (1-6 to 0-6).

Sile Burns' free was quickly can-

celled out when Noeleen Lambert, playing just three weeks after breaking a finger, picked out Kelly on the right side of the attack, yet it was a second goal three minutes later that put a serious dent in Cork's hopes.

A long ball over the top by Kelly was misjudged by two Rebelette defenders and Katrina Parrock was on hand to collect and smash past a hopelessly exposed Aoife Murray (2-7 to 0-7).

Parrock then grabbed the point of the game from the left to give her team a game-high sevenpoint lead, only for the Cork midfield duo of O'Connor and Orla Cotter to pick of their first scores in 17 minutes.

Jacob claimed her first score of the half with seven minutes remaining but back came the opposition as Catherine O'Loughlin crumbled under a badly sprained ankle - which shouldn't keep her out of September's final - and Katriona Mackey raced through to goal (2-9 to 1-9).

A fifth Jacob free, after a foul on Kelly, settled the nerves and when the St. Ibar's/Shelmalier clubwoman grabbed her second point Wexford had a lead they wouldn't come close to losing.


And now, it's Galway again, September 11 in Croke Park. What's more is Wexford won't just believe they can win, they will expect it.

# Team manager Finn knew Galway were ready for major test

WHATEVER doubt remained over the quality of Galway's stickwomen has surely been put to bed following their hugely impressive All Ireland semi-final victory over Kilkenny.

Another All Ireland final now awaits and no doubt, it's another exciting time for all those involved with the side, including team manager Noel

The Cappataggle man was quick to praise his charges for their sterling efforts in Nowlan Park, the defence in particular, earning special recognition.

"The defence were excellent, but if you can get the central spine of the team working you can build around it. Therese (Maher) was fantastic on Saturday. She is a natural leader. Putting (Sinead) Cahalan full back has settled the defence.

"In saying that, there are girls on the line chomping at the bit. The girls that are playing are not guaranteed they will be playing the next day. They are under serious pressure because we have a very strong panel.

"Importantly, we haven't leaked goals this year and the first one on Saturday was just unfortunate they way it came back across the goal. But as Sharon Glynn said to me after the game, if we could bottle that performance and bring it to Croke Park we'll get a result."

In all, six Galway players found the target over the hour, with the work rate of the likes of Ann Marie Starr and Therese Maher as good as another six scores. Player of the match Niamh Kilkenny finished as the game's top scorer, tallying 0-8 (four from frees), while the towering Brenda Hanney again delivered, hitting 1-2 from play.

Tara Rutledge, who struggled to break into the team earlier in the year, showed prominently in the corner taking her goal well, with Aislinn Connolly, Veronica Curtin and substitute Noreen Coen all chipping in with a point apiece.

"I knew myself prior to the game that we were going very well. The fitness levels were good, everything was excellent. I was a bit concerned with the club matches and what injuries might arise, but thank God at the moment we have no injuries and we will have a clean bill of health going into the All Ireland", continued Finn.

But he acknowledged there were aspects of Galway's game that they need to work on in the four weeks leading up to the linal. "Looking at the stats

from the game, our work rate was up 10% with every other match. We did give away a few silly frees, but I'd rather give away frees than a goal."

After enduring a rough opening to the second half where Kilkenny quickly wiped out Galway's interval advantage, the collective character of the squad was pinpointed by the manager as vital in reaching the decider for a second successive

"I never had any problem with their mentality. Their mentality has always been very strong. When Kilkenny hit their purple patch at the beginning of the second half, we didn't panic and stayed hurling. One thing I have been very happy with this year is that when we need scores we are getting them. We have been driving home to the girls that when we have a lead, we don't defend it we drive on and try to win by six or seven points.

"We always knew we would get our purple patch on Saturday and it was important when we did that we were clinical, which we were. When we ran at them we caused them a lot of problems. When they hit 1-2 we grabbed the bull by the horns and Niamh took a great point. When we were under pressure that is when our work rate kicked in. Noreen Coen chipped in with a point as well and that killed their momentum.

Looking ahead to September 13th, Finn dismissed the suggestion of Sunday Game analyst Therese O'Callaghan that this was now "Galway's All Ireland to lose."

"Favourites mean nothing to me. Ever since last year we wanted to get back to the All-Ireland. We didn't perform and it's still biting them that they didn't deliver. They wanted to get back and give a performance. We are delighted to be back, but it's a 50/50 ball game.

"We have a job to finish that we didn't finish last year. If we had played like we did in the second half of last year's All Ireland in the first, we could be looking for two-in-a-row.

"If we can bring what we did to them in Wexford back in June, we have a serious chance. They (Wexford) had to work twice as hard to get scores on the board, whereas we were getting scores much easier and our movement that day was fantastic.

"The girls really want to atone for last year. I know it will be a bigger crowd, bigger arena, but the goal was to get back and we are." President's Blog August 2011 President's Blog: August 2011

# Book charts the highs and lows of a century of Cavan Camogie

### National president performs official launch

By Eamonn Gaffney

THE establishment of camogie in Cavan from struggling in its formative years through to its many decades of uncertainty, its subsequent reorganisation in 1967 and its recent achievements have been charted in a new book, 'The History of Cavan Camogie 1909-2009'.

The tome which weighs in at 540 pages was launched in the Imperial Hotel, Cavan on Sunday last by national camogie president Joan O'Flynn. Its size is testament to its thoroughness as it boasts almost 1,000 Cavan related pictures spanning the last century in addition to countless fascinating accounts of notable events. The growth and development of the game at club, school, community games and county and provincial levels are covered, from the early days of covert practice to the skilful, challenging, popular and entertaining game that it is today.

There was a capacity attendance at the launch drawn from clubs throughout the county, as well as TDs and public representatives. Also present was a former Chairman of Cavan Camogie Board Fr Oliver O'Reilly and other former office holders.

In the course of her address national camogie president, Joan O'Flynn said that reading the history of camogie in Cavan was a process of both discovering and remembering the past. Few people would have known that there had been 40 camogie clubs in Cavan down through the years. Not many were aware of the formative influence of a Virginia-born woman, Agnes O'Farrelly, on Irish sport and Irish independence.

"It is indeed fitting that a publication of Cavan camogie should claim and proclaim one of its own as a true pioneer of the 20th century," noted Ms O'Flynn.

### O'Farrelly's drive

Agnes O'Farrelly was a native of Raffoney, Virginia and was a member of the executive of The Gaelic League who ensured that the fledgling game received the full support of the League throughout the

She was born on June 24,

1874. Her parents, Peter and Anne, were large landowners and Agnes was privileged to receive a good education, an advantage that was denied to most people at that time.

Throughout her life her activities spanned the academic, political, literary, cultural and sporting fields with considerable influence. She wrote three books of prose and two of poetry in the Irish language and in her early writings used the pen name 'Uan Uladh' (Lamb of Ulster). She was appointed an examiner of Irish for the Intermediate Board examina-

Agnes became friends with Dr Martin Comey, a priest based in Cavan town and who was a language and hurling enthusiast. She persuaded him to organise camogie in his parish and as a result a number of clubs emerged around the town.

The Anglo-Celt of 19 May 1928 reported "Cavan Lady Honoured". At Jury's Hotel of the Dublin Camoguidheacht League made a suitable presentation to Miss Agnes O'Farrelly, M.A. (a native of Raffoney, Virginia), for her special interest in the game and to mark the league's appreciation of her kindness in presenting a beautiful solid silver cup of Irish manufacture and design for competition in the senior league".

The cup was called The O'Farrelly Cup. She continued to dedicate her time to promoting the game and attended the annual congress each year until her death on November, 1951. She is buried in Deansgrange cemetery, Dublin. The attendance at her funeral included the then President Sean T. O'Ceallaigh and Taoiseach Eamon de

### Birth of game in Cavan

The first reference to the sport in Cavan was on November 7, 1908 in The Anglo-Celt which carried the heading "Ladies Hurling team in Cavan". The first officers of the new club were Mrs A Kirwan, captain; K. Kirwan, secretary and M. McGennis, treasurer.

The team held its first practice near Cavan town in Killymooney on December 6. Although the club was still in

of the sport ended there. The pattern of the game changed in the county through birth, growth and decline and was moribund for long periods. While the game may have ceased over periods of time the tradition never quite died and it was left to a small band of dedicated people prepared to take up the challenge and try again where others had

Camogie always seemed to struggle financially at club and county level and there was a far from happy relationship with the GAA. Venues were difficult to find when football matches were fixed by the football board and it rarely, if ever, obtained financial support in those early days.

### No hurling tradition

There was also the handicap that Cavan had never a hurling tradition, and was deprived of its natural ally, and in the main struggled to maintain its identity due to the strength of the football clubs. In 1917 a second and more successful attempt was made to revive the sport in Cavan. This time it was boosted by the wave of nationalist feeling arising out of the Rising in 1916 and the early years of the War of Independence. The revival this time was centred around Belturbet and was largely the work of Fr Michael McLaughlin, who was curate in the town. He was aided by Dr Stuart and Pat McEnaney.

The sport spread to Cavan town where it had as its patron Dr Martin Comey, CC and from there it developed in Ballinagh, Drumbo and Lavey. At the 1921 camogie convention it was decided to run a county championship competition for the first time. Belturbet became the first winners when they defeated Lavey in the final by 0-1 to 0-0.

The 1922 championship was won by Cavan who defeated Belturbet by 2-0 to 0-0. Five teams contested the 1923 competition: Belturbet, Ballinagh, Ballyhaise, Tullyco, and the winners, Alacken. However this marked the end of another chapter in the sport in the county and the game was not revived again until 1932 when the centre of gravity shifted to Virginia.

Dr Comey brought his enthusiasm for the game to Virginia where he was appointed parish priest in 1930. When the first convention of the revived Cumann Camogalochta was held on 25 May 1932, four existence in 1909 the revival of the six clubs represented

cinity of Virginia - Ardlow, Maghera, Munterconnaught and Virginia. The other two were Cavan and Loreto Col-

Fr Comey was appointed president of the camogie board and presented the board with a trophy. A league was formed on a home-andaway basis in which Virginia, Cavan. Lurgan, Munterconnaught and Maghera took part. In the final, Munterconnaught defeated Maghera in Virginia on November 13.

#### Flourished

Camogie, like all other gaelic games, flourished in the thirties. From 10 clubs in 1933 the number increased to a record 25 in 1935. After this great burst of enthusiasm the game declined until 1940 when there were only five clubs left in the county and all of these were centred around Cavan town.

The year 1935 was a peak one in the fortunes of the sport in the county. With 25 clubs affiliated they were able to run a senior and junior championship. For the first time, a Cavan town lady, Miss Anna McEntee, took over the duties of chairman from P. J. Bartley, Mountnugent.

### County team

In 1936 the county was strong enough to enter a team in the Ulster championship. From here on the association was in steady decline until in 1940. One of the big problems was the lack of finance. Attempts to raise funds through raffles, carnivals and ceilithe, all proved a failure. In the late thirties the early enthusiasm gave way to objections, disputes and failure to fulfil fix-

In 1934 the county board was faced with a rather novel objection. Cornafean objected to Belturbet on the grounds that they played a boy dressed up as a girl! A similar problem arose in 1951 when Laragh claimed that Kingscourt played two boys against them dressed as girls with headscarves and gloves. When challenged at half-time they withdrew.

Killygarry dominated the championship, winning it every year from 1935 to 1945. In the early 1940s people like Con Browne, Limerick; Jackie Coogan, Kilkenny and Tommy O'Donnell, Tipperary, all contributed to boosting the strength of the club. At that time there was great rivalry

between neighbours, Cavan, Crubany and Killygarry. A game between Killygarry and Crubany in 1940 attracted 2,800 spectators.

### First Utster title win

It was not until 1940 when the game was on the decline that Cavan won it first Ulster title. They complained that after nearly 30 years they received no medals from the Ulster Council. Cavan went on to the All-Ireland semi-final but were beaten by Galway.

The following year Cavan retained their provincial title and drew with Dublin in the All-Ireland semi-final at Breffni Park but were beaten in the replay by what The Anglo-Celt described as 'rather savage play'. The loss of Nancy Cody through injury was a major blow to Cavan.

The Board was in such serious financial difficulty that the transport for those two games had to be obtained on credit and some of the outstanding debt remained until

The war years, with their transport difficulties, dealt a

severe blow to the game and it continued to struggle.

### Junior Championship

In 1956 the Ulster Council started a junior championship in order to help weaker counties. Cavan ran out easy winners defeating Donegal by 7-1 to 0-0. Cavan was well served by Joan McCarville, Dodo Gaffney, Kathleen Moore and R. Farrell. However the toast of Cavan was Evelyn O'Hare who scored six of the seven goals.

The game died out in the early sixties and was not revived until 1967. Six clubs, Cavan, Butlersbridge, Cootehill, Castletara, Cornafean and Killygarry attended the convention on April 9, 1967. The league wasn't completed until May, 1968 and was won by Ballyhaise who were subsequently suspended from the Association for their behaviour after the final. Kill won the 1968 title at the expense of Cornafean and this was the beginning of Kill's dominance. They won it again in 1970, '71 and 1972, and scooped the double in

### Schools involvement

By 1970 the game was going well in the various schools throughout the county, among them St Clare's, Cavan; Loreto College and St Aidan's, Cootehill. St Clare's became the first holders of the Fr Davis trophy in 1971 and their seniors were beaten in the Ulster final by Sacred Heart College, Newry, in the same year.

Cavan schools continued to win trophies including the Ulster Colleges' First Year title for four consecutive years. In 1976 Templeport made history by winning the All-Ireland U-16 title in the National Community Games and this was repeated the following year by the Knockbride area.

Fr Oliver O'Reilly, then a curate in Denn, became Co Board Chairman in 1972 and a primary schools league was organised. Towards the end of the 70s teams like Craobh Rua, Drumgoon, Maghera and Ballymachugh were senior title winners with teams like Castletara making an

impact in the league and would go on to dominate the championship in the '80s and

### Achievements

The book contains a history in text and photographs of all the camogie teams which were affiliated throughout the county as well as the success of teams at community games, club, county, provincial and All-Ireland, as well as the achievements of the various colleges in the county.

The problem is, as I referred to a number of months back, that secondary schools in Cork city and county are no longer the force they used to be. The knock-on has been no underage All-Ireland title in eight years and Cork now have a problem at senior level.

I never believed it was solely the club that provided quality players to Cork. I always believed it typically started in the schools and the clubs benefited. Of course the clubs enhanced the players but the school was the nursery.

We have a problem. We should see some fruition from the work of the development squads coming through, yet I wonder about the real upshot they will bring.

The squads, while excellent, are brief. Even in a short period of time you can see players improving but sustained repetition isn't there.

These are all voluntary efforts. It would be great if Cork had the funds to put two or three full-time personnel on the job

Wexford face Antrim in intermediate final, Waterford-Down to battle in premier

Wexford will be represented on the double on camogie's final day at Croke Park on September 11, after the county's intermediates won their semi-final of the All-Ireland championship in association with RTE Sport at Pairc Tailteann.

Antrim stand in the way of their bid to go one step further than last year, when Offaly wrecked the Yellowbellies' dreams of matching senior and intermediate glory.

Wexford were given the fright of their lives by a powerful Derry unit that recovered from a slow start and the concession of two second half goals to fall just on the wrong side of a 3-8 to 2-10

A Fiona Rochford goal gave Wexford a four-point lead at the break despite playing into a strong wind but the magnificent Karen Kielt had a goal for Derry within seconds of the resumption and the sides were level soon after.

Wexford responded with goals from Linda Bolger and Tracy Nolan to move seven points clear but Derry continued to chip away at the deficit courtesy of points from Kielt, Attracta McPeake

and Gráinne McGoldrick. The margin was down to one when Wexford's top scorer, Clara O'Connor registered her fifth point and though Kielt replied in similar fashion in injury time to bring her personal tally to 2-5,

time just ran out on the Oak Leafers. Apart from their scorers, Wexford can be thankful for the defensive contributions of Aine Codd and Francis Doran, and especially the spectacular saves made by goalkeeper Helena Jacob that

denied Derry a famous victory. The second game at Navan had the most dramatic ending possible, when teenage substitute Orla O'Hara bagged an injury time goal to snatch victory from broken-hearted Limerick, 2-11 to 2-9. The Shannonsiders were leading by a point when 17-year-old O'Hara collected a pass and

hammered the sliotar to the Limerick net in the tie's last act. The sides were level at the interval, Nora Collins' goal helping Limerick to keep in touch with Antrim, for whom Jane Adams was outstanding in both a scoring and play-making capacity. Last year's premier junior champions began the second half in impressive fashion but Limerick, with Niamh Mulcahy unerring from placed balls, edged in front with time running out. O'Hara struck to keep alive Antrim's hopes of emulating Offaly and winning the intermediate title, 12

months after the junior. Like Wexford, Waterford will be looking for a shot at redemption when they go toe-to-toe with Down in the premier junior decider. The Suirsiders have been runners-up in the past two campaigns but having won the Division 2 league title earlier this term, seem intent on shedding the bridesmaids tag this time around.

There was no doubting their superiority over Laois as they prevailed 2-17 to 2-3, having led by 11 points at half time. Goals from Karen Kelly and captain, Nicola Morrissey helped them earn that advantage, despite Elaine Mahony's major at the other end of the pitch.

Kelly was in sensational form, finishing with 1-10, while Poc Fada champion Trish Jackman showed that she has accuracy to go with her power-striking by converting a free from the halfway line and adding two points from play that were struck outside 65m. With debutant Aoife Hannon adding two points, it was a very satisfactory day's work for Waterford.

Down will provide much sterner opposition though, as evidenced by their 1-17 to 2-11 win over Meath. Katle Mullan hit two goals for the Royals, while the fantastic Jane Dolan added eight points but such contributions weren't enough to derail the ambitions of their opponents. Niamh Mallon was a significant reason for that, as was the excellence of Catherine McGourty, who scored nine points and was also very good from open play. With Fionnuala Carr also scoring a goal, the Mourne girls held a two-point advantage at the interval and in a close second half, it was McGourty's accuracy that ultimately decided proceedings. In the junior A semi-final, Westmeath defeated Offaly, 0-12 to 1-2.

### All-Ireland final place at stake in Clontibret

Meath camogie manager John Davis will be hoping that his team can maintain a winning habit when they travel to Clontibret for the All-Ireland Premier Junior camogie semi-final against Down on Saturday, 2.0.

The other semi-final between Waterford and Laois will be played at Nowlan Park, Kilkenny, also on Saturday, 2.30

A return to Clontibret might evoke some memories of a previous visit in the distant past for Davis when he was

in charge of the Heath hurlers. On that occasion, the local officials had to remove grass

from the pitch as it had been cut that morning and wasn't really in any state to host a game.

Times have changed and something like that would not occur now? The challenge facing Meath in this semi-final is fairly daunting as Down have the experience of playing in a higher grade, Div 2 of the league, and that will be a major plus for the Uister side.

Meath camogie is certainly on an upward curve at the moment and Saturday's assignment will answer some questions - how much has the team improved, can they raise the level of performance, have they the ability to survive in Div 2 next year?

Already this year Meath have achieved promotion to the National Camogie League Div 2 following a solid campaign that produced a final victory over Kildare.

The Royal County girls recorded victories against Dublin, Roscommon, Armagh and Kildare on the way to that decider against the Litywhites while in the championship they defeated Laois by 2-12 to 1-9 and Rescommon by 4-14 to 0-5.

The only encouraging result from that series of games, ahead of the Down challenge, was the six-point victory over Laois at Trim.

Meath enjoyed some good fortune this year as they were drawn in a three-team group in companson to the other semi-finalists, Down and group winner Waterford, the likely favourites for the title.

Kildare and Dublin were also in the other group and neither caused Down or Waterford too much difficulty.

Add in the fact that Laois did not fulfil their Div 2 League fortures, conceding walkovers to all the other teams, including Down, and Heath's task looks a lot more difficult. There is a chink of light at the end of what could yet be a dark tunnel in Clontibret, Down only won once in

the league and that was against Wexford by 3-10 to 2-12. They were besten by Galway, Antrim and Derry, but the key fact there is that they have been playing at a higher level and will be expecting to cope with Meath quite comfortably.

Meath played Wexford in a challenge game about a month ago and, according to reports, performed well as the manager used the game to give everyone a chance to impress. That was before the last outing

against Roscommon. Meath also have the experience of last year's semi-final defeat by Waterford to build on and they also can

point to a great victory against Antrim at Kiltale two years ago. The return to the panel of players like Adeen Donnelly, Elizabeth Lynch and Frances Lynch will be a major boost and will make the job of the selectors more difficult.

There are some doubts about the availability of Jane Dolan who played against Roscommon despite the handicap of a broken rib, but if the Blackhall Gaels player is available for selection it will also be a major

The Meath defence has shaped up in terms of tackling without conceding frees and another big performance will be expected from minor player Kristina Troy at centre-back. She will also be looking forward to the All-Ireland Hinor C decider the following week against Armagh.

The pressure will be on Down to deliver a victory. They will be looking to players like Namh Mallon and Catherine McGourty in the forwards along with facola Branniff and Laura Hughes to get the vital scores.

back Karen Tinnelly, Kelly O'Higgins, Orla Maginn and Paula Gribben will make life tough for the Royal County girls, but not tough enough. Meath can win.

# Antrim and Down fly the flag for Ulster on finals day

ULSTER will have double representation in Croke Park on Camogie All-Ireland finals day next month with both Antrim and Down having won through to their respective deciders.

Unfortunately the dream of an all-Ulster All-Ireland intermediate final came unstuck as Derry fell to Wexford in a hard-fought semi-final last weekend. The Oak Leaf girls recovered from a slow start and the concession of two second half goals to fall just short on the wrong side of a 3-8 to 2-10 scoreline, Karen Kielt responsible for 2-5 of her sides' tally.

The Saffrons kept their side of the bargain as they staged a late surge to see off Limerick by 2-11 to 2-9. Teenage substitute Orla O'Hara was the Antrim saviour as she hammered the ball to the back of the Limerick net in the last action of the game to snatch victory for her side and send them through to another All-Ireland final.

Down also made sure of a Croke

Park appearance as they attempt to emulate Antrim's achievement of last year by beating Waterford to claim the All-Ireland Premier Junior title.

The Mourne girls secured a 1-17 to 2-11 win over Meath, with Catherine McGourty leading the way in the scoring stakes with nine points. Niamh Mallon and goal-scorer Fionnuala Carr also made telling contributions as they now turn their attention to that All-Ireland final where they will be doing all they can to ensure that it's third time unlucky for the Deise girls.

Ulster have representation in every final other than the Senior grade as Armagh and Monaghan will contest the Junior A and B deciders respec-

The Orchard side will take on Westmeath in the Junior A decider on September 17, Westmeath having seen off the challenge of Offaly in last weekend's semi-final with Armagh's place in the final having been already secured courtesy of finishing top of the table.

This weekend it's Monaghan who will bid to lead the Ulster title charge as they take on Wicklow in the Junior B decider. There has been nothing to separate the pair all season, and this Sunday's showdown will be no differ-

It finished as a 3-9 to 2-12 stalemate when they met in the group stages, but it is the much greater scoring returns which the Farney girls have managed which makes them favourites to claim the title when they meet at Donaghmore Ashbourne (Sunday, 2.00pm)

IN A REAL heart-stopper right up to the final whistle, the Wexford intermediate camogie team held out for a one point victory over Derry in Saturday afternoon's All-Ireland championship semi-final at Pairc Tailteann in Navan, County Meath to secure a final showdown against Antrim.

Despite leading at halftime by 1-5 to 0-4, Wexford had to dig very deep during the second-half to fend off a strong and determined Derry challenge, and only for the goalkeeping brilliance of Helena Jacob combined with the hard-working Wexford backs, the result could have been very different.

Wexford have already beaten final opponents Antrim in the group stages of the current championship, when the purple andgold came away 2-11 to 1-7 victors on July 9th last. But the Glens-women will pose a major test as they look to build on last year's outright success in the All-Ireland Premier Junior championship.

Karen Kielt gave Derry the first taste of the lead with a pointed '45 on six minutes.

Ciara O'Connor equalised from a free before Wexford gained a huge breakthrough. Aine Codd cleared to Stacey Redmond and she picked out Fiona Rochford who had found some space to get through and fire straight to the net in the eighth-minute. Wexford picked off the next two scores with a point apiece from Linda Bolger and O'Connor.

The backs, and particularly Aine Codd and Frances Doran were working tirelessly to keep Derry at bay.

Meanwhile, at the other end Ciara O'Connor added a point from play on eleven minutes. Derry had struck several wides before O'Connor added another point for Wexford after 24 minutes.

Kielt eventually ended Derry's scoring impasse with a pointed free in the 25th-minute, before sub Maria Mooney and Kielt grabbed late scores to reduce Wexford's interval lead to 1-5 to 0-4.

Determined Derry wasted time in setting about trying to make in-roads, and Kielt really boosted the Oak Leaf County when she netted in the opening minute. It was quickly followed by an equalising point from Attracta McPeake.

But Wexford were back in front on 35 minutes when Siona Nolan pointed after she had been impeded.

Frances Doran and Lisa Bolger combined to stop some Derry advances before Wexford were lifted hugely when Louise Codd gained possession in midfield and picked out Linda Bolger, who blasted to the net in the 40th minute.

It got even better for the Slaneysiders a minute later when Fiona Rochford located sub Tracey Nolan, who struck to the net in the 41stminute to put Wexford clear by seven points.

Derry were not giving up though, and Attracta McPeake pointed before they forced a penalty, which Kielt blasted to the net in the 45th-minute.

The gap was reduced further when Kielt added a pointed free. Wexford kept working hard though, and Linda Bolger pointed in the 52nd-minute, only to see it negated by a similar score from Grainne McGoldrick.

Fiona Rochford was on the end of a heavy tackle which resulted in a free that Ciara O'Connor pointed just on full-time.

But there was still injury-time to be played, and Derry really dug deep in a last desperate effort.

A free taken by Grainne McGoldrick was stopped on the goal-line by Helena Jacob and parried out at the expense of a '45. McGoldrick pointed same to leave just two points between the sides, before Kielt cut the margin to the minimum with a further point.

But, as the Ulster women went on a final attack in search of at least an equaliser, the referee blew the final whistle, much to the relief of all Wexford connections, as they ensured it will be another great double AllIreland finals appearance for the camogie women, as their intermediate showdown with Antrim on September 11th forms the curtainraiser to the senior rematch against Galway.

# ERS PASS BIGTEST

3-8 WEXFORD 2-10 DERRY

IT SEEMS the words 'history-making' follow the Wexford camogie sides around these days.

Well, they've done it again as the Intermediates joined their Senior counterparts in the 2011 All-Ireland final after a stunning one-point victory over Derry in an enthralling game in Páirc Tailteann on Saturday last.

Wexford, to their credit, always looked to have the upper hand, but in a contest that they went into as warm favourites, they were made to fight every step of the way by a resilient northern outfit.

It was a nervy start for those favourities as four wides preceded Derry taking a seventh-minute lead. Yet that lead was more than fortunate as they benefited from a clear square ball infringement with Karen Kielt pointing from a '45 that Helena Jacob shouldn't have been credited with conceding.

Yet the bad luck wasn't a sign of things to come for Jacob as she put in a superb performance throughout the 60 minutes. Indeed, she was called into action moments after Ciara O'Connor drew Wexford level as she saved well from Gráinne McNicholl,

That stop would prove more significant mere seconds later as Wexford marched down the other end with the excellent O'Connor finding Fiona Rochford who smashed past Claire O'Kane for the opening goal (1-1 to 0-1).

Also bright was the growing-in-confidence Linda Bolger who picked up Wexford's second point, as well as being involved in most of their good first-half moves.

O'Connor's pulled shot in the eleventh minute was fantastically flicked over the crossbar by O'Kane before the Rathnure hot-shot added a further brace of points as Wexford led by 1-5 to 0-1 with seven minutes of the half remaining.

Playing with the breeze, Derry hauled themselves off the ropes with a strong finish to the opening half. The main protagonist, Kielt, picked off a pair of frees while early tactical substitute Maria Mooney sandwiched a point in between to leave four in the tie at the interval (1-5 to 0-4).

The previous eight-point lead evaporated completely two minutes after the break. Kielt, who, in an inspired move, was put at full-forward midway through the opening period, broke through to goal before Attracta McPeake pointed to level the scores (1-5 each).

Siona Nolan flashed a 20-metre free narrowly over the bar when Derry only had two players on the goalline in the 34th minute but better was soon to follow.

A powerful run by Louise Codd gave Linda Bolger the opportunity to pull home a vital second goal, and with the wind in their sails Wexford moved seven clear when Fiona Rochford picked out substitute Tracey Nolan at the back post and she collected before lashing last year's beaten finalists seven clear.

A second McPeake point dragged her side one point closer with 17 minutes remaining which helped Derry build up a head of steam which Kielt took advantage of as she went to ground in the large rectangle to win her side a penalty.

The midfielder-cum-forward lashed home the penalty, via the hurl of an unfortunate Jacob, and followed it with a pointed free to narrow the gap to two with 13 minutes remaining (3-6 to 2-7).

Linda Bolger's second point increased her side's lead to a slightly more comfortable three - a lead an exchange between Gráinne McGoldrick and Ciara O'Connor did little to dent.

Leading by those three heading into injury time almost proved to be too few as Jacob made a stunning point-blank save from Katie McAuley although Derry did pull closer through McGoldrick and Kielt.

this possible. In 2010 Wicklow were unable to field an adult team at inter-county level.

So what has happened to bring about this amazing change of fortunes? That is the question we put to the Chairman of Wicklow Camogie Board Dave Murray and this is what he told

The modern game of inter-county camogie requires not only the same levels of skill, commitment and dedication that can be associated with the men's game of hurling but also requires an increased professional approach to be taken by the management and county board executive to back up the panel.

'In May 2010 the Wicklow County Camogie Board conducted a review of the requirements of the county team and decided that if Wicklow was to prosper then we would require someone with the necessary knowledge and experience to bring the county team to that level. Following a recruitment drive the Wicklow County Board appointed Tara Warren to the role of team manager. A former trainer of the Kilkenny Intermediate carnogie team, with an Honours Degree in Sport and Exercise Science, a Masters in Business Management added to the experience and skills she had picked up in her time as star of the Kilkenny camogie team.

Tara who hads from Johnstown in Kilkenny certainly had the background to guide Wicklow in the right direction. Throughout the year Tara has been backed up by Bridie O'Neill from the Donard-Glen Camogie Club. Bridie has huge experience in the game and has also doubled as the team physiotherapist. For the following months Tara went about assembling her panel of players and was a regular attender at championship games throughout the county. Training began in earnest in January and given the very cold weather we were very lucky to have the new community hall in Aughrim at our disposal.

Each of the girls gave a personal commitment to their training program and as the months ticked by the intensity of training increased with two sessions a week the fitness and skill level rose dramatically.

'The group stages of the championship began in July with a trip to Monagnan where Wicklow came away with a draw, Monaghan 3-9, Wicklow 2-12. This was followed by the visit of Kildare which saw the girls secure their first win on a scoreline of Wicklow 2-10, Kildare 0-2. Next up was the away match to Meath where on a very windy day the Wicklow girls had to battle all the way to run out 2-10 to 1-02 winners. Everything was to play for when Monaghan came to Avondale for the return leg and despite scoring more times than the visiting team Wicklow went down by three points, Wicklow 0-13, Monaghan 2-10.


'Having dropped these points it was crucial to get back on track as quickly as possible and the away game to Kildare gave just that opportunity.

Kildare having beaten Monaghan were right back in with a chance to progress so the stage was set for one of the most important games of the campaign. Wicklow were hampered in the run up to the game by losing key players to injury and it was then that the panel would be really tested. In what was a bitanic struggle the Wicklow girls dug deepest to secure the points and the ultimate honour of representing their county in the Alf-Ireland Junior B Championship final where Wicklow will again face Monaghan.

It is a tremendous honour to represent your county in an All-Ireland final at any grade and it is a great credit to Tara, Bridy and their panel that Wicklow have this oportunity. The work in preparing the team has been outstanding and we hope that a large contingent will travel to support on the day. There is a quiet revolution in Wicklow camogie with a new found sense of belief and professional attitude. In hurling Dublin have Anthony Daly and Limerick have Donal O' Grady in Wicklow we have Tara Warren driving us to improved standards. This is only a beginning. Well said Dave, and a beginning crowned with success is what every lover of camogie in the county will be hoping for (Dave Murray is definitely playing down his own role in all of this). Dublin born with strong Wicklow connections, Dave played hurling and football with Round Towers, Clondalkin before marrying Mary Whelan and coming to live in Shanrock.

With Mary still playing camogie for club and county it is not surprising that he became involved in the game. He was Chairman of the Camogie Board from 2004 to 2008; vice-chairman in 2009 and chairman again in 2010 and 11. His dedication and hard work has played a major role in the revival of camogie at this level in Wicklow.

Camogie president Joan O'Flynn lashed out at what she called the "gratuitous" representation of women, dressed as GAA players, in an advertising campaign for Hunky Dorys crisps.

Ms O'Flynn said the multimedia campaign, which features women wearing revealing crop tops in sport poses, was particularly illtimed given that camogie's top teams will be starring in Croke Park this Sunday.

"This is the week when our very best players - top-class female athletes who demonstrate the very best skills of their gender in sport and are ideal role models for young girls - will be lining out in our All-Ireland finals.

"To see such gratuitous and exploitative images of women being linked with sport, and also taking up valuable space in the media in the week of our All-Ireland finals, is particularly distasteful and disappointing," she added.

The Wexford senior camogie team will be looking for a two in a row against Galway as part of a trebleheader of Gala All-Ireland camogie finals in Croke Park this weekend.

### **Provocative**

This is not the first time
Hunky Dorys has been
criticised for its provocative
advertising campaigns – last
year, the Advertising
Standards Authority of

similar ads for Hunky Dorys,

caused grave and widespread

He said the current campaign, which is mainly print-based but does include a number of outdoor poster sites, had cost in the region of €600,000.

The Ashbourne, Co Meath, company's latest campaign has a tag-line that states Proud supporters of Gaelic Football', even though it does not have any formal sponsorship with Croke Park, which means that the GAA may step in now to try to stop the brand piggy-backing on its image.

However, the company does sponsor GAA teams within the Royal County.

It sponsors reigning county senior football champions Skyrne and another local gaelic football side, Curraha, as well as Navan rugby club.





AS A group they are not unfamiliar with final victories.

Three league titles in a row, a pair of Leinster titles, the All-Ireland title last year, and of course in 2007. The most common term would be winners. That breathes something

There are few counties in the country where you can rock up at a Senior club football or hurling tie and hear conversations on the latest triumph for the ladies.

Listen as you go to the football knockout stages on Saturday - you'll hear those conversations, reasonably knowledgeable conversations.

There is genuine pride in those conversations too.

Ask the ten thousand on the Wexford quayfront the Monday after last year's success, or the ten thousand in

It a similar foe in Galway. For a while they held a psychological edge over Wexford.

A late goal in the 2008 semi-final sent the westerners to Croke Park, a powerful comeback eased them to a round-robin win in 2009, while a goal from halfway, again in injury-time, condemned Wexford to another defeat last year.

But then came the final. A controlled victory, clinical and efficient, same in the league final this year. Then bang, Bellefield happened.

A defeat to undo all the good mojo built up, an air of uncertainty left. Now they meet again. And many believe that it's Galway's time to shine.

Sweeping positional changes are the most common reason for hope, with this year's final side set to be dramatically different from last, and it seems 'camogie' wants this Galway win.

Wexford have had minimal changes. Caroline Murphy continues to live thousands of miles west of Croke Park but her place in the team will be the only difference from last year's.

Josie Dwyer, so uncomfortable yet gallant at corner-torward last September, takes the midfield berth, with the gap at corner-torward almost certain to be taken by semi-final recipient Lenny Holohan.

Catherine O'Loughlin, the only real injury doubtfor the last few weeks, will start and be as important as ever, meaning Wexford will be laden with experience. Experience that will be vital in what should be a superb spectacle.

Indeed, with the 30 games played this championship season yet to produce a margin of victory less than three points, this not only has the hallmarks of being the most intriguing tie of the year but also the closest.

The slow start last year is something Galway manager Noel Finn will be preaching against, and early fireworks will be expected from the Tribeswomen.

However, should they not get the lead they will need - at least five or six points - that early effort may do more harm than good as 60 minutes at razor-sharp intensity is difficult to achieve.

That's where Wexford will strike and their experience will prove vital. Expect a hard battle but Wexford can, and will, complete a jubishin double by less than a goal. The people's champions will reign again.

IT'S CERTAINLY been an interesting campaign for the Wexford Intermediate camogie side. Last year, going into the All-Ireland final, they had yet to

lose and had beaten their fellow finalists Offaly twice before.

This year they do come in with a comfortable win over
Sunday's opponents, however the rest of the season has
not been the same procession.

The year started with Wexford as Division 2 league champions, but a raft of defeats put paid to any hopes of a threetimer.

However, there is a real belief, amongst observers and within the camp, that this is a stronger side, a side that believes it's their time.

And why not; the introduction of the returning Aine Codd and Bernie Holohan has added Senior-side quality to the spine of the second string. Indeed, had the intermediates not progressed so far, both would likely have been back playing part roles for the first team already.

Add to that the experience that a year brings for the younger players - and unlike their Senior counterparts it is a very young side - and they are primed to go one step further than last September.

After the shaky league campaign it was always going to be necessary to up the level of performance.

An opening draw with Galway in Bellefield (2-8 to 0-14) proved to be neither lucky nor unlucky as both had chances to win it. A visit to Cork was next on the agenda and, knowing a win was crucial, a six-point triumph was delivered.

And then on to Antrim in Ashbourne and a winner-takesall tie. Antrim were safe in the knowledge that should they lose they had a final chance for progression. Wexford didn't have that comfort but produced when it mattered to blow away the Saffrons.

They never reached those heights, certainly defensively, against Derry in the one-point semi-final win, but any win at that stage is perfect as the first goal was reached - another visit to Croke Park.

But what of the final? Both sides have experience of the big day in the showpiece stadium (Antrim beat Waterford in last year's Junior decider, albeit after a replay). In forward Jane Adams the Ulster side also possess arguably the best player on the pitch.

Yet one player does not a team make as Wexford proved in Ashbourne. Anyone who was there that day will likely be of the opinion that this is Wexford's final to lose.

However, a comfortable win over Galway and a surprise upset of favourites Limerick suggest their opponents have come on significantly from that day.

Wexford have the strength in defence, anchored by the ex-Seniors and ably assisted by a young, energetic bunch. The midfield has solidified with Siona Nolan improving all the time and Shelley Kehoe an energetic bundle.

Linda Bolger, Fiona Rochford and Clara O'Connor can all produce goals as inside forwards and with the talents of Stacey Redmond and Louise Codd added to the mix there's plenty of creativity.

All-in-all it's set up perfectly for a great battle. There's real belief that this is the Intermediates' year and should they not go in complacent they are the better team and should prevail by a goal or so.

Galway have done quite a bit of surgery on their team since last year's final and on the evidence of their semi-final defeat of Kilkenny, a lot of the changes have proven successful. I felt looking at the game they were vastly superior to the Cats even though this wasn't fully represented in the scoreline.

Two of the major positional switches from last year have been Therese Maher from centreforward to number six and Niamh Kilkenny moving out to midfield. Therese Maher was magnificent in the semi and Wexford will need to find a way to bypass her and get the ball into our full-forward line.

However, overall I would rather be going into battle with the talent at our disposal than Galway's.

Anyone who was in Croke Park last year couldn't have helped but been touched by the heartbreaking defeat in the Intermediate decider, and it speaks volumes for these girls who have lifted themselves back to reach another decider this year. They rode their luck to some extent in the Derry game and can thank two excellent saves from Helena Jacob for bringing them through.

But they did show, particularly in the first-half, that they are a hugelytalented outfit. They got a taste of the northern threat from Derry, and Antrim, who graduated from the Junior ranks after last year's epic final against Waterford, will pose similar problems.

They have fine players in Aishling Jackson, Rhona Torney and the high-scoring Jane Adams in their ranks, and I was very impressed with their performance in upsetting the fancied Limerick girls in Navan the last day.

However, I think the Wexford girls have the talent necessary, and boistered by the addition of Aine Codd at centre-back, they should get through to achieve what will be just rewards for the resolve and dedication shown to bounce back from last year.

Good luck to all the girls and we look forward to the homecoming on Monday night.

# Dee relishes her midfield position

OFTEN IN sport, as you get older, you get ushered further out of the limelight. So for Deirdre Codd to make moves from corner-back to wing-back to midfield gives some reflection of how important a player she has become for Wexford.

Having said that, mid-twenties is not exactly over the hill anyway - even these days when you're asked to believe

But Galway are a bit more of a balanced team this year.

Just lining out against them on the red carpet you can see that they are big, strong, physical girls. They always give a really physical battle no matter what time of the year it is and its always going to be a tough battle.

I think from playing them last year we know what to expect. They are a really good team but I think it's nearly like a lucky omen that they beat us earlier on in the championship because it gives us a drive for this time. Hopefully it'll still be lucky in a week's time."

OT even some make-up can hide the fresh cut that is mending over Ursula Jacob's left eyebrow - but she didn't get a lot of sympathy for it at home, she explains, laughing.

No surprise really, because four stitches over your eye probably counts as a mere scratch in the famous Jacob household in Oulart-The Ballagh, where hurling/camogie is the second religion.

But how Wexford's 26-year-old fullforward got it is revealing. Her teammate Noeleen Lambert clipped her through the helmet during the county semi-final against St Martin's a week

Yes, they've all played senior for Wexford and would have picked up multiple injuries over the years, but a county senior hurling semi-final would simply never be held two weeks before the All-Ireland final.

And that's one of the reasons that convinces Jacob that the county's female players - the reigning All-Ireland senior camogie champions who have won two titles in the last four years - work just as hard, if not harder, than their male counterparts.

"At this stage of the year it's just as intense for us as the boys," she said. 'We're training three nights most weeks with Wexford and then sometimes you're one or two nights with the club as well.

"We played the county semi-final last week and played two club championship games, on Tuesday nights, during the seven weeks of the group stages.

"That'd never happen with Wexford hurling," she points out. "When the lads are with the county it's solely with

But Jacob is not complaining, thanks to Wexford's new-found success.

After breaking a 32-year gap with their 2007 breakthrough, they contested both the senior and intermediate finals last year, beating Galway in the former and losing to Offaly in the latter.

They're back in both deciders again on Sunday and completing the Jacob family's 'set' is her younger sister Helena, who wears the No 1 jersey for the intermediates and is also back-up goalie for the seniors.

### PROMINENCE

Both sides train together, which many believe is a huge factor in Wexford's rise to prominence, and it isn't just the Jacobs who bring the strong family feel to the Model's success.

Across the two squads are five O'Connor sisters from Rathnure, including senior wing-back Aoife, who is married to Declan Ruth.

There's the inspirational Leacy sisters Una and Mary, Karen and Coleen Atkinson and even three sets of twins: Shelley and Stacey Keogh, Lenny and Bernie Holohan and Lisa and Linda Bolger.

All of that has helped create a strong family atmosphere in the Wexford camp, but their unity is not accidental. Manager JJ Doyle, who took over from Stella Sinnott last year, leaves absolute-

"I don't even know where it was, somewhere in the midlands!" Jacob laughs. "It was very enjoyable, but I had to throw out every single piece of clothing I wore there afterwards."

Doyle enlisted a former middle-distance athlete, Gerry McQuaid from Monaghan, to take care of their fitness and he brought people like Mickey Harte and Liam Griffin in to give them motivational speeches.

He has also invited several former county hurling stars to give specialist help at training and Jacob confirms that the likes of Tom Dempsey, Ger Cush, Adrian Fenlon and Gary Laffan have all helped out on different occa-

And Jacob, who has a masters in sports psychology and has been playing with the county since she was 15, is the first to appreciate what Doyle does to keep training fresh.

"When you're getting to All-Ireland finals it is easier," she admits. "It is always easier to go training when you're

'Oh we will be called a great team if we win'. We are a good team and have done well in recent years but aim to win a league and championship double back-to-back for the first time in their history.

For any sporting body to survive those number of years is remarkable, but to actually make strides marks it out even more so. Thus, a mouth-watering repeat of last year's final is a fitting way to mark the occasion.

# 1996 camogie final hero believes Galway can do it

ORMER Galway camogie star Denise Gilligan knows all about the highs and lows of sport. She has seen it all ... be it collecting the Player of the Match accolade when guiding the Tribeswomen to their one and only senior All-Ireland victory in 1996 or sustaining an injury which, in effect, ended her playing days with the county.

This Sunday, Galway's senior camogie side - under the direction of manager Noel Finn - will seek to bridge the 15-year-gap since the county's last All-Ireland triumph. For Gilligan, who bagged two vital goals in the Westerners' 4-8 to 1-15 victory over Cork in the '96 decider, this time of year evokes warm and happy memories. Nostalgia reigns.

"When that final whistle went, it was pure shock and elation and it was just a feeling that I can't describe," recalls Gilligan, who returned to her native Craughwell from London, where she now works as an Education Accounts Manager, for her cousin Fergal Healy's recent wedding to another local girl, Karen Ryan.

"I remember, afterwards, walking across the Shannon with the O'Duffyl cup and [RTE commentator Marty Morrissey driving past and we all shaking the living daylights out of his car," she laughs. "Another memory was coming into my own village here in Craughwell at 2 o'clock in the morning and seeing my grandparents out in the crowd that was waiting for us. It had taken us about elebt hours to come down from Dublin

"Dancing at the crossroads in Gurtymadden was another memory, but, you know, the celebrations really went on for a year afterwards. We brought the cup the

length and breadth of Galway and the amount of media coverage we got was absolutely fantastic. Ten years later, I still had people doming up to me and saying I rentember you playing in the '96 final'. It was really good."

No doubt, Gilligan - who, at 18 years of age, was the second youngest member of the team after 16-year-old Veronica Curtin was a name on everyone's lips in those days, particularly after her towering performance in the All-Ireland final. It earned her the Player of the Match award.

"To be fair, though, Sharon Glynn was responsible for the two goals I scored," states 'Gilly'. remember the first one: I will never forget it. It was coming up to half-time - it was 12-a-side at the time and there were four forwards - and Imelda Hobbins, Martina Harkin and Veronica Curtin had all scored and I was the only forward that hadu't scored. I was like 'if I don't do something quick, I am in trouble'

"I remember a big, long, high ball coming in from Sharon Glynn and it bounced in the square. I

was literally on my knees and I had to dive for it and it ended up in the back of the net. We had been about six points down at that stage. Then at half-time, the referee gave us another point on the scoreboard because he hadn't registered one of Sharon Glynn's frees in the first half. So, we were only down two points at the break.

"Then, in the second half, about 10 minutes in, another big, long ball from Sharon landed in front of me. I ran onto it, let fly, and it went into the far corner. I think I knew then that we had a chance. With Sharon putting the frees over. Martina Harkin got the next goal before Dympna Maher got another. Once we had the four goals, we were on our way."

An All-Ireland senior medal, the world was at Gilligan's feet. Already, she had claimed minor and junior All-Irelands with the Tribeswomen in '94 while she also collected a brace of national medals in the mid-90s with St. Brigid's Vocational School. The trophy cabinet was filling, and, she believed, it would continue to do.

"Of course I did. Even when we won in '96, we were a youngish team and we thought we would be back in '97 and that we could do the same again. And do it again in '98. We did get to the finals those years but we were beaten by Cork in both of them.

"We have watched videos of both of those games and, to be fair, we threw away both of them. Sharon was injured going into one of them - the '97 final - and had she been fit, it would have made an awful difference. The '98 final, we missed so many goals. Definitely, we should have won that game as well."

Gilligan did subsequently win a National League medal in 2002,

but the heartbreaks were beginning to mount. "I took a break from camogie then for a couple of years, before I later went back playing Senior 'B'," continues the 33-year-old.

"I was playing a challenge match with Galway against Pearses over in Ballymacward one Sunday morning and we were doing the warm-up, waiting for Pearses to come out of the dressing-room. I just took off to do some sprints and I ruptured my Achilles tendon, which ruled me out for the rest of the year."

For a competitor like Gilligan to be sidelined for so long, it took its toll on the camogie star. However,

### The County Board weren't willing to help me and I was very upset with that

this disappointment was nothing compared to the hurt and abandonment she subsequently felt over the ensuing months.

"I didn't play a camogie game for Galway after that, partly because I got absolutely no financial support from the County Board when I hurt my leg. I was out of work for 26 weeks - I was working as a sales rep. at the time - and when I added it all up I lost out on about €16,000 or €17,000 in wages.

"The County Board weren't willing to help me and I was very upset with that. The fact that I had given so much to Galway Camogie, the fact that my mother [Carmel] had served as both Chairperson and Secretary of the County Board for so long. I just decided I had enough and I was not going

back playing camogie with Galway again."

In many respects, that was the culture - and, to some extent, it still is. "Things have improved for players, but not enough," she states. "Camogie players don't get the pat on the back that they deserve. Even when I trained with Galway seniors we used to train up in a field in the corner of Kilrickle. There wasn't even a changing room: there wasn't even a toi-

"Then you had girls coming from the likes of Cork and Dublin training and, afterwards, they would hop back into their cars, soaking wet, and drive back without even a cup of tea. You would wonder why you did it, but we did it for the love of the game.

"I think, nowadays, players are looked after a lot better, but camogie players still need a lot more support than what they are getting. I feel people don't realise that camogie players put in the exact same effort as their male counterparts. People don't realise that."

In any event, Gilligan - who plays her club camogie with Tara in London, but hopes to return to the green and gold of Craughwell one day - is now looking forward to this Sunday's All-Ireland senior final at Croke Park. She says it is time for new camogie heroines in Galway.

"I think if they don't win it this year, they will never win it," states the former Young Player of the Year ('96). "They have a great chance. The fact that they went to Croke Park last year - some of them for the first time - that experience will stand to them. Then you had Killimor, who had that fantastic win in the All-Ireland club championship as well. All those girls being in Croke Park previously, experiences like that

will definitely stand to them.

"I also remember being involved with the Galway minors a number of years ago and we had the likes of Emer Haverty, Noreen Coen, Lorraine Ryan and Niamh Kilkenny and I knew that time that these girls, at 14 or 15, would make the senior team some day. They are fantastic players. A lot of them have improved immensely and fair play to the management,

they have done one hell of a lot of work with them.

"Obviously, I wish them all the best of luck. What I would say is 'give it stick'. There is absolutely no reason why they can't do it. We are sick of looking at Imelda Hobbins ('96 captain) lifting the O'Duffy Cup," laughs Gilly, "We want to see someone else litt it We want to see Brenda Hanney lift it on Sunday."

Galway will, in itself, be a step up from recent games. The westerners are firmly established as the land's second-best side and will be looking to claim the scalp of the champions and the elu-



IT'S a CV, built up over the past 12 months, that reads like no other. Captaining Killimor to county and All Ireland Club success, not to mention an All Star award at left half forward. Little wonder then, that Brenda Hanney will be expected to lead the Galway charge in this weekend's intriguing All Ireland showdown with old nemesis Wexford.

Taking a seat in the dressing. room at Kenny Park, Hanney is in buoyant form. Just one hour away from All Ireland glory, the towering stickwoman is delighted to be back in the final, but certainly not content to play the role of bridesmaids this time around.

A year on from their defeat at the hands of Wexford and the optimism and expectation surrounding the team has resurfaced, more than justified given their recent form. After their tame league final effort, not many expected the Galway camogie side to be up to much this year.

But not alone did they scorch Wexford in their subsequent championship meeting; they overcame a much fancied Kilkenny side to put themselves within reach of capturing the elusive O'Duffy

"It has been a busy year so far. Killimor was fairytale stuff and a great start to the year, but that was all forgotten then once we got back into the county. A job they failed to complete on their last two September outings in the Capital. On both

occasions, Galway supporters were left frustrated with the side's attacking shortcomings. Just one score from play in the 2008 final was followed by a mere three last year, but Hanney points out that it is an aspect of their game they have worked relentlessly on to cor-

"I suppose it's something we always hang ourselves for. We're very hard on ourselves and every time we look at the stats, it coming up. It's been something we've been working very hard on. We've been working hard at training throughout the drills to build that forward movement. It's coming around, we've working hard on it since the semi and we'll just be hoping that it all comes out on the pitch at Croke Park."

Still, Galway have plenty of positives to build on ahead of the final, not least a midfield partnership that's improving with every game. The full forward has also been impressed with the injection of new blood into the side, Lorraine Ryan, Heather Cooney and Ann Marie Starr certainly repaying the faith shown in them by the management.

"It's been brilliant to see girls like that breaking into the team. We've been very lucky there's massive competition all through the panel and that's a real positive sign. That's what every management wants, what every team wants, absolute competition. There are so many girls that can step in and do a job.

"There's our dynamic duo (Niamh Kilkenny and Ann Marie Starr). That girl (Starr) covers ground so easily. Niamh is really coming into her own in the last couple of games. She gave an outstanding performance in the semi-final and is absolutely flying it in training. Very confident that she can repeat that in the final."

That said, whether victory is carved out by the backs, midfield or forwards will matter little. All Hanney is contemplating is the win and the opportunity to bring the O'Duffy Cup west of the Shannon for only the second time.

# It's now or never for Galway girls in big showdown

Finn's charges aiming to gain revenge for last year's All-Ireland final loss to Wexford

AHEAD of their third All Ireland final appearance in four years, you get the feeling it's now or never for the Galway senior camogie team as they face reigning champions Wexford in what promises to be an explosive final encounter at Croke Park on Sunday (4pm).

The eagerly awaited joust represents the second instalment of All-Ireland final clashes between the two counties and one of the biggest crowds in many years is expected for a contest with countless subplots ready to develop – the big question is whether Galway can go that extra mile in their quest to bridge a 15-year year without a senior title.

Wexford, without a doubt, represent Galway's greatest challenge in this year's championship. The Model County possess that perfect mix of youth, experience and unwavering confidence, which gives them the belief, that even on an off day, they can still do enough to claim the spoils.

This was no more evident than in their semi-final against Cork, where despite playing into a stiff breeze in the opening period and being virtually outclassed in every quarter, they struck for 1-1 approaching the interval to take a one point advantage into the change of ends. Reality is, the further Wexford go in the championship, the more difficult they are to displace.

As for the Westerners, the defeat at Croke Park last September was a real heartbreaker

for the side, after Aislinn Connolly's 59th minute goal left them just two in arrears, but they falled to further add to their tally losing, in the end, by 1-12 to 1-10.

They regrouped for this year's campaign and certainly, over the last four months or so, have the look of a team on a mission. In their opening championship tie at Enniscorthy. Noel Finn's troops trounced the title holders by 2-14 to 0-9; a remarkable result given Wexford had inflicted a similar heavy defeat on Galway in the league decider just a month earlier.

Veronica Curtin, the last remaining link to the '96 team, came off the bench to strike for two goals before the break with Therese Maher and Ann Marie Hayes delivering tour de force performances in the half back

line. Galway subsequently clashed with Clare, a game they trailed throughout, until Curtin, again sprung from the bench, hit 1-3 in the final ten minutes to claim a 1-10 to 1-7 win for the home side.

That unbeaten record, however, was unceremoniously ended as Cork inflicted a 14 point drubbing in round three. Galway, though, responded in style recording four wins on the trot, overcoming Offaly, Dublin, Tipperary and Kilkenny to finish top of the table alongside Wexford, before turning in a quality performance against Kilkenny, winning by 2-13 to 2-7, to advance to the decider.

Therefore, given the nature of their display at Nowlan Park, the management team are unlikely, such as they did last year, to tinker with the dynamic of a winning formula. Susan Earner will continue

between the sticks, while Mullagh's Therese Manton and Sinead Cahalan, along with the ever impressive Lorraine Ryan fashion a resolute full back line.

Ann Marie Hayes, Therese

The midfield duo of Niamh Kilkenny and Ann Marie Starr may not be the most imposing of figures, but they cover a lot of ground. Probably the most refreshing aspect of the Kilkenny game from a Galway view point was the display of the two such was their ferocious work rate and scoring contribution.

Up front, Galway have the potential to unhinge Wexford's defence, it's just a question of will they deliver. Curtin, likely to line out at left corner forward, remains their most potent attacker scoring 5-15 in the championship to date, all of that tally arriving from play. Aislinn Connolly, as expected, has also featured prominently, tallying 1-19, while Niamh Kilkenny (1-16) and Brenda Hanney (1-15) have also shown a keen eye for the target.

Indeed, Hanney's battle with All-Star full back Catherine O'Loughlin could be the defining tassie of this final O'Loughlin was outstanding in the semi-final, before being carried off the field with what appeared to be a serious ankle injury. News from the Wexford camp, however, is that the

Moonageer-Boulavogue stickwoman will be fit for the decider.

As for Hanney, the Galway captain struggled throughout the round robin series to recapture the spark displayed in leading Killimor to All-Ireland club glory. That said, the full forward was nothing short of excellent in the penultimate round, registering 1-2, as well as proving a devastating target woman on the edge of the square.

Wexford, bidding to secure a third title in five years, won't lack anything by the way of confidence after their 2-11 to 1-9 victory over Cork and with the county's Intermediates appearing in the curtain raiser, they are sure to enjoy huge support at GAA HQ.

Their defence, backboned by O'Loughlin, Mary Lacey and Claire O'Connor, is unchanged from the sextet that limited Galway to a mere three scores from play in the final of 12 months ago.

The All-Ireland champions also pack quite a punch in attack, especially in the full forward line where captain Ursula Jacob has troubled defenders all through the championship amassing an astonishing 3-51, while top of the left, Katrina Parrock, has also notched some critical scores including her side's second goal in last month's semi. That's not forgetting Lenny Holohan of course, the Rathnure speedster wreaked havoc in the League final, a game Wexford dominated, winning by 3-10 to 0-10.

Galway mightn't have the heavy artillery that Wexford possess up front, but they have a balanced team built on the foundation of a rock solid defence. Encapsulating this is the fact that they have conceded the remarkably low average of 11 points per game, but are about to be hit by a Wexford team which has averaged 19 points per game.

JJ Doyle's charges have shown an insatiable hunger for goals, rattling the net on no fewer than 15 occasions in their last six championship encounters. In any event, Galway now have the task of halting the Wexford charge. Despite a ten minute lapse in concentration when they leaked 1-3 to Kilkenny, the Galway rearguard have been faultiess.

In their most recent appearances in Croke Park Galway have been forced to chase the game from the off, something

that cannot be allowed to happen this around. Wexford do have natural score getters, but can only thrive on what is fed into them.

If Galway can win the midfield battle, which they are more than capable of doing, and curtail the dominance of Mary Lacey at centre back, then there is every chance Noel Finn's side will carry the day.

Though Wexford are the 2/5 favourites to retain their crown, encouragingly, Galway is the only team, in both league and championship, to have scalped Wexford this season.

All in all, this is Galway's 14th All-Ireland final appearance. Only once have they emerged victorious. It is a third final for the majority of this current crop, for others it is their fifth and sixth. It really is now or never.

### WHERE ARE THEY NOW?

DENISE GILLIGAN (Former Galway camogie player)

IN 1996, Denise Gilligan picked up the player of the match award for her performance in the All-Ireland camogle final. The wingforward scored two goals as Galway were crowned champions.

Fifteen years later, Galway are back in the final looking to win their first All-Ireland since that day Gilligan shone for them. And she believes that this could finally be their year after last year's defeat to today's opponents Wexford.

"I think they are in their best position ever to win it again," says Gilligan. "I think the experience of being in Croke Park last year plus with the likes of Killimor being there earlier this year in the club championship and them having a few girls on the panel will stand to them against Wexford today.

"And I'd love to see them do it especially for the Bloes of Veronica Curtin and Therese Maher who have given the county so many years of service."

Remarkably, Gilligan joined the Galway minor panel at just 12 years of age, and the side lost three consecutive All-Ireland finals to Tipperary before they eventually beat their rivals in the final in 1994. That same year she also won a junior All-Ireland title.

Although Gilligan was very young when she started representing her county, she believes that she was ready for the challenge.

"I think if you are good



enough then you are old enough.
"The only problem is that you are expected to train with the minor team, the senior team, the club and the school so burn-out can be an issue."

The talented player made her senior debut in 1995 and went on to play for Galway for almost a decade, winning a National League title in 2002 in which she scored 1-2 in the final. Her greatest memories of her those days are of lining out in Croke Park and that 1996 homecoming.

She moved to London in 2008, where she works as a sales rep for an educational company and plays for the Tara Camogie Club.

They have won their senior championship for the last three years and Gilligan captained the team for two of those victories.

"The standard of camogie is very high in London," she says. "Lots of the girls that are here would be playing for their county if they were at home.

"The biggest challenge we face is funding, it's always an issue for us over here."

# More streetwise Galway can atone for 2010 defeat – Finn

GALWAY manager Noel Finn believes his side's 11 point victory over Wexford in their champles ship opener last June has ingrained the belief required to succeed on Camogie's biggest day.

After successive disappointments in the 2010 All Ireland final and this year's League decider, Galway finally delivered a performance of style and substance, leaving the Camogie Queens of Wexford in no doubt as to who were the greatest pretenders to their throne.

"I think that was really a turning point for us that day. The pressure was on going down there. We lost a league final a few weeks before that and that could have had a big bearing, but fair play to the girls they stepped up and got a result. We moved the ball really well and got some great scores.

"A lot of people didn't really think that we would have got a result down there, but I knew myself training was going well. It was a bit disappointing in the league; we just didn't perform. Having said that, we got the result below in Wexford and I felt as the game went on into the second half, we could have beaten them a lot more if we stayed going at them."

With all minor injuries more or less cleared up, Finn anticipates having a full squad to choose from and is well aware that strength in numbers will be required when they face Wexford. "It's not about the 15 that go out, this is the whole panel. You need a good panel and you need girls pushing hard in training and this year we have that.

"We moved Therese Maher back to centre back at the start of the championship and she's been a rock there. She's hurled really well and she's a great leader. The six backs have hurled well, Susan Earner has done well, and all the girls ... you couldn't ask for much more from them."

Like most camogie followers in the county, Finn has been delighted with the performances of the midfield partnership, an area where Galway struggled in recent years. "Their work rate is super. It's a

work rate that will win matches for you. When we needed scores in the semi-final, Niamh Kilkenny came up the field and got them. The rest of the forwards chipped in with their few scores as well. You can't be relying on one or two or frees to keep you in a match. This year, thankfully, that hasn't happened."

No doubt, Galway, boasting of seven wins and only one loss in this year's championship, would appear to have banished the demons of last September's defeat and the manager says this has been the driving force behind their impressive showings.

"We needed to get back because we didn't ourselves justice last year. It has been a long championship, but thankfully we're back there now. Hopefully, we can go up there and get a result this time.

"People were doubting their mental attitude, but I never had a problem with that and I knew myself that we were good enough to get back, but the work had to be done on the training ground and you have to get the results in matches and that's what we have done. They wanted to atone for last year and it was a big goal to get back."

Aspirations of reaching the final for a second successive year, however, received a set-back as Cork inflicted a 2-14 to 0-8 hammering at Pearse Stadium, Galway though, remained focused on the bigger picture.

"We didn't perform that day, nothing went right us. We just didn't get to the pace of the game at all. Cork wanted to settle a score from last year. We beat them twice last year in the championship and I think Cork peaked for that day against us. You'll get days like that, but we were out against Offaly the following week and we put up a good performance.

"There's no point peaking for the third or fourth game. Bertie Sherlock said to me earlier in the year that he was going to try change things around and he has got it spot on. Their fitness levels are excellent and their hurling ability has improved immensely from the start of the championship.

As preparations so, Finn is confident that all has gone to plan. To this end, he acknowl-

edged the contributions of his backroom team comprising of trainer selectors Noel Power, Helena Huban and Peter Kelly along with trainer Sherlock.

"Training, as far as I'm concerned has gone excellent. You couldn't ask for any more from the players they are very committed. It's a relief to be back there because we had a tough year in fairness. We were put to the pin of our collar by Clare but, to be honest, I think we're kinda hitting form at the right time.

"The semi-final performance against Kilkenny showed how strong they are, they (Kilkenny) hit us for 1-2 straight after the re-start and that could have knocked a lot out of them, but the one thing I'm really happy with this year is that we're getting scores when we need scores.


The resilience his charges demonstrated in that semi-final was nothing short of superb, but it was their scoring exploits which eventually killed of the home challenge that was most pleasing.

"They don't panic. I might take us a little bit of to settle down when the game starts, but once we get into our rhythm, we do the simple things right and we're getting the scores. The main thing is the scores are coming easier than last year."

Despite that encouraging win over Wexford in Enniscorthy, Finn is keen to stress that Galway won't have it so easy come Sunday. "Let's not get carried away. The day below in Enniscorthy was the first round of the championship, but the pace on All-Ireland final day will be a lot faster.

"We're not going up there thinking we beat Wexford 11 points. It's going to be a different scenario. We're well prepared for this. We're a lot shrewder, the management have learned from that day. I don't think there is going to be an awful lot between the teams. You need the rub of the green up there and we didn't seem to have that last year."

It's been a long road back for this side, but Finn, once more, has brought them within sight of the summit. It's time to complete the journey.

WHEN Mags D'Arcy was just 15 she got the call-up to the Wexford senior camogie team. Without thinking, the goalkeeper jumped at the opportunity.

After a few months of hard training, she got the nod for a championship game against Tipperary in Semple Stadium, her idol Jovita Delaney was in the opposite goal and four-time All-Ireland winner Deirdre Hughes was playing at full-forward. D'Arcy was understandably excited — it was games like these she had always dreamed about, but it didn't go to plan.

"Seven goals went past me," she says, looking back. "It was awful and after the game we went back to Wexford and into the pub. I stood at the back with my orange juice and *The Sunday Game* came on, people around me were saying 'who is that Wexford goalkeeper she got destroyed'— and I was thinking 'what am I after getting myself in for?"

D'Arcy wonders now if it was madness going into the senior goals at 15. But taking everything into consideration she is glad she did it.

"I'm only 23 now and have two All-Ireland medals and I'm hoping for a third today. Learning from those mistakes and experiences made me the person and player I am."

In 2007, Wexford won their first All-Ireland in 32 years. They had been knocking on the door for a while, suffering a few semi-final losses before eventually taking the title.

In the years leading up to the victory, a crop of young players including D'Arcy had came through the ranks to merge with the experience of Aine Codd, Kate Kelly and Aoife O'Connor. In the final they ended Cork's bid for three in a row in front of 33,000 people at Croke Park.

Last year they repeated that feat, beating Galway by two points to add another title to their tally. That time round though there were only 17,000 people watching the final and D'Arcy feels that the game could be promoted better.

"It's very hard to deal with the lack of coverage when you see the build-up to the Kilkenny and Tipperary hurling final last week compared to what we got in the run-up to our game. But the camogie association are not at fault, they can only do so much.

"It's up to the media to come on board and work with the female sports associations in Ireland. And it's not just the Gaelic games, the women's national soccer and hockey teams are doing very well and they don't get the publicity they deserve."

D'Arcy would like to see ladies football and camogie coming together as one association so the two sports can work side by side on promoting their games and improving player welfare.

"If you had two senior finals on in one day, camogie and ladies football, you would definitely get 40-50,000 at it. In order for ladies Gaelic games to try and get to that level, they will have to take that step forward.

"In fairness to the camogie and ladies football associations, they are doing the right things with social media and a lot of work is done at ground level but if we want to try and catch up with the men's games, something will have to be

D'Arcy doesn't feel that joining the Gaelic Players' Association is the answer. In fact, she doesn't feel they would benefit at all from coming under their umbrella.

She says Wexford are looked

after well, they get tea and sandwiches after training and if they need anything they can ask. But in general she thinks that player welfare is still an issue within camogie.

"There is a player welfare committee in camogie, they work from Croke Park. It was set up last year but as of yet I haven't seen any developments being made. They don't go out of their way to tell us what they are there for and that needs to be looked at."

Last week president of the camogie association Joan O'Flynn spoke out against the Hunky Dory advertisements which appeared in national newspapers. The ads showed scantily-clad models in county colours playing football.

"I think it is disappointing that when there is large-scale coverage like that that it doesn't emphasise the skill and the athleticism of the athlete," says O'Flynn. "It is preferential that it emphasises abilities and skills of the players rather than focusing on anything else."

Although D'Arcy agrees with O'Flynn, she feels that if camogie players were featured in the ads then the match would be sold out today.

"If it was the first week in January people would probably laugh at it but it's bad timing with the finals on. I'd back Joan in what she was saying but at the same time if that was us in the pictures we'd have no problem filling Croke Park."

Today's meeting between the sides is their fourth of the year and a repeat of last year's final.

Galway have made a number of positional switches since last year, moving Therese Maher to centreback. Her match-up with Una Leacy will be one of the crucial points of the game, while the duel between captain Brenda Hanney and Catherine O'Loughlin is anoth-

er vital match-up.





Down Camogic are no strangers to these environs who were last here in 2004.

Whilst some counties may carry the favourites tag, there is no such thing as certainties in a final. That's the thrill and promise of today - it's all to play for.

#### Our marquee day

Top inter-county action by our star players in the three finals is, unquestionably, the centrepiece of today's programme. And there's also a full package of complementary activities:

- The All Ireland Senior Camogie Referees from 1961-2010 are our special goests at the games. It is a great pleasure to celebrate and recognise their amazing service.
- The Camán & Run relay race made its début at the All Ireland Club Finals in March and is back today, this time for our U-14 and U-16 clubs.
- The mini-games are a much loved part of the programme,
- The Camogic Association launches Cairde Camógaíochta, our new initiative supporting former and current members to stay in contact.
- I am also delighted to welcome club teams from all over the country that played in the Daintree Paper All Ireland Kilmacud 7s tournament yesterday. A special welcome to teams who participated in our inaugural Club Twinning initiative. Visiting teams played challenge games against Dublin clubs this morning and join us here this afternoon.

### Creating equal opportunities to play Camogie

Since that first championship final in 1932 when the Dubs beat Galway, much has changed about women's sport. Eighty years ago, a woman in sport was unconventional. Today, the law expects women to be treated fairly. Social attitudes increasingly expects so too.

Just as gender should not be a barrier to sports participation, geography should not be a barrier to playing Camogie.

The idea that Camogic is particular to certain geographical areas always worries me. The opportunity to enjoy Camogic should not depend on which county a person lives in or which part of the county a person lives in.

Tradition is something to treasure. Creating more opportunity to play Camogic is the best way to enhance and strengthen that tradition. Our Game, Our Passion, the Association's development plan, reflects that idea. We are working hard to expand playing opportunities. Camogic is alive with new clubs in, for example, Donegal, Wicklow, Sligo, Longford, Carlow, Kerry and Mayo while the more established counties and urban centres also continue to grow and consolidate.

#### Confidently creating the future

The development of Camogie playing grounds around the country is a really strong sign of the well-being of our game. To cater for our growing needs, there are at least nine Camogie grounds under independent management by Camogie clubs and county boards. Twenty years ago, there were little or none. That said, we enjoy fantastic access to Gaelic grounds throughout the country.

- Today is the second consecutive year that Croke Park hosts a triple header of the Senior, Intermediate and Junior Finals.
- The qualifying rounds of our national championships are played in county GAA grounds.
- Our All Ireland senior semi finals in August attracted a record crowd to Nowlan Park in Kilkenny.
- Our 2011 All Ireland Senior and Intermediate Camogie Club Finals will again be played in Croke Park in March 2012. Over five thousand fans flocked here this year for the first occasion of the Camogie club finals in the new Stadium.

Looking ahead, the Playing Rules Review report is on the horizon. Our Constitution allows us to examine the rules every three years. The recent national survey on the Rules was our most extensive consultation. It generated the highest number of hits on our website. Further consultation continues with the National Referees' and Coaching and Player Welfare Committees. The Review Group, including Wexford's manager, J.J. Doyle and Down player, Fionnuala Carr, will shortly report to Central Council, Annual Congress in March 2012 will adjudicate on relevant playing rules' motions.

Camogie is in good health on several fronts: high playing standards, growing participation and an expanding profile. This is not an accident but due to the work and commitment of many many people.

### Appreciation

In our busy lives, volunteering is the gift of people's time. I generously acknowledge its importance to Camogie's growth and development and warmly congratulate and thank all our volunteers.

This year RTÉ Sport came on board as the official partners of the All Ireland championship series. We have enjoyed a very successful season. The profile of the game has increased and the relationship between our national game and our national broadcaster has strengthened.

My final word of appreciation is to today's participants – the players, managers, team mentors, referees, match officials, musicians, volunteers, staff of Croke Park Stadium, the Camogie Association's outstanding staff team and you our supporters.

Galway tried hard to snatch a dramatic late goal but never looked like doing so and so they were condemned to a fifth All-Ireland defeat since winning their only title back in 1996. Wexford had the perfect start when Una Leacy goaled from a fourth minute penalty after Kate Kelly was unceremoniously dumped by Therese Manton, but with Ann-Marie Hayes, Maher and Heather Cooney dominant, Galway edged back into proceedings.

Aislinn Connolly, Veronica Curtin and Martina Conroy all had points and Mags D'Arcy pulled off a smart save from Curtin. Jacob slotted two frees though and it was Wexford who led at half time by 1-2 to 0-3.

Galway exploded out of the traps after the resumption, points from Noreen Coen and Rutledge giving them parity before Rutledge pulled first time on a breaking ball from 18, after Maher's free from distance, to billow the net.

They never managed to pull any further clear though, despite having more of the play and that ultimately was to prove their downfall as Jacob and Wexford showed their champion pedigree.

# Jacob heroics seal Wexford fightback

WEXFORD proved why they are camogie's new queens by pulling off a magnificent All-Ireland double in Croke Park yesterday.

It was the Slaneysiders' first senior two-in-a-row since the Swinging Sixties and their intermediate victory completed a double that only Cork have previously achieved.

Yet only a late flurry and some specular heroics from their 'Captain Fantastic' Ursula Jacob, who scored their last 1-3, kept their senior crown intact.

Galway had them on the back foot for a good 45 minutes and Wexford really needed to show the true character of champions to dig out this third title since 2007 and, by doing so, confirmed themselves beyond question as the game's new superpower.

The Tribeswomen were inconsolable afterwards, many of them still sobbing as they left the pitch, and no

It wasn't just that they'd lost their 14th senior final and a second in a row, by just two points again, to Wexford.

It was how they had dominated the defending champions for so long but couldn't kick on and apply the killer

With just one senior title (1996) to their name, Galway camogie has suffered some horrendous heartbreak in Croke Park.

But this, surely, was the worst, especially for veterans like Therese Maher, who put in a magnificent player of the match stint at centre-back yet still suffered what was her fifth All-Ireland final loss.

Noel Finn's gutsy side had done the unthinkable by stopping Wexford from scoring from play for 38 minutes and, after trailing by two at half-time, had quickly gone three points clear after the restart.

They were still three clear with 10 minutes left after Jacob (free) and excellent substitute Orla Kilkenny traded points.

But Galway, fatally, also missed three great scoring opportunities around the end of the third quarter; Brenda Hanney dropped a shot short, Aislinn Connolly missed from 25 metres and no one was there to pounce when Tara Ruttledge had a shot off the upright.

Wexford, smelling blood, finally bared their teeth.

A full 52 minutes had elapsed when their midfielder Josie Dwyer lobbed in testing diagonal ball from the left wing and Jacob rattled the net to swing the game their way.

"I wouldn't be known for my aerial ability!" the full-forward chuckled afterwards. "A high ball came across the square and I just said I'm going for this, because I knew we weren't going

to get many chances. I just remember putting my hand up, turning on my left-hand side and shooting and thankfully it went in."

Jacob's superwoman act didn't end with just levelling matters.

Five minutes later, she coolly popped over a 25-metre free to edge them ahead. Then, when hard-working Kate Kelly found her wide on the right wing a full 88 seconds into injury time, she swung over a magnificent long-range insurance point.

A daughter of Mick and sister of current Wexford seniors Rory and Mick, she continued a magnificent family tradition yesterday and as soon as the final whistle sounded bolted for the dugout to find her sister, Helena, who was goalkeeper for the intermediates and also a sub with the


