

Cork U-18s in bid for fourth Munster title on the trot

WHILST Cork continues to bask in the success of the senior side's victory in last weekend's All-Ireland camogie final, the county U-18 team are busy preparing for their opening championship game against Limerick today.

The U-18 grade is always a keenly contested one and Cork have had a marvellous record of success.

This year they are striving to make it four-in-a-row of Munster titles and will be hoping today to take their first steps towards ultimate honours.

The team can call on several of the junior side who contested last Sunday's All-Ireland final, Goalie Sandra Ricken, Caoimhe Harrington, Criona Harte and Minor players Sabrina Buckley, and Mary Ennegues.

A doubt surrounds the availability of Karen Riordan who injured her ankle mid week and the selectors will wait to decide until later today if she is fit to play. However, its a strong Cork side and in form one would favour them to advance over a relatively young Limerick side.

In the Junior A Championship quarter final, St. Vincent's and Watergrasshill will clash at Watergrasshill tomorrow and here the St. Vincent's side, who are favoured by many to take the honours this year, will look to Donna O'Leary and Orla O'Shea to guide them.

In the 8 championships St. Finbarr's clash with Courcey Rovers while Glen Rovers take on St. Catherine's and here one would expect Courceys and St. Catherine's to advance. In the remaining Junior B game Bishopstown will be expected to beat Carrigtwohill.

Old rivals Clare and Tipperary will battle it out for the title as they did in 1995 when Clare emerged winners by the minimum score 1-10 to 1-9. The competition was inaugurated in 1992 and has fallen into place. There are now four graded Intermediate team Cork, Galway, Down and Tipperary. They are joined by seeded senior teams, if defeated in the first round of the Bord na Gaeilge All-Ireland senior championship. They are Armagh, Dublin, Clare and Limerick.

The meeting of near neighbours Clare and Tipperary should be an interesting tussle. Tipperary have been trying hard for a number of years to reach senior ranks. Clare have the experience of playing in the Bord na Gaeilge senior championship when they went under to Cork 3-13 to 1-9.

A week after the hurlers doing battle the camogie players of the respective counties will be locked in combat in a repeat of the 95 All-Ireland final. It will be remembered that the Banner ladies snatched a sensational one point victory on that day in Toomvara, and Sunday's clash is expected to be every bit as

Tipperary are bidding for their first title in the grade, and if they can achieve that goal they would quality for the senior grade. It is hard to believe that Tipp's last appearance in a senior final was as far back as 1984 when they lost to Dublin by a point. All associated with the game in the county have striven might and main to try make the eagerly awaited return to the senior grade, and they earnestly hope that Sunday's match will be a stepping

The chances of a Tipp victory are more than realisttic. With a nice blend of experience, and youth, in their ranks they have come through the championship series impressively, and, are not in the least over-awed by the challenge facing them. Tipp beat Cork and Armagh decisively, and have already beaten Sunday's opponents in the league by four points. But the final is bound to be a different matter and Clare are very determined to put "two" over Tipp.

Since 1992 when Tipp won the Junior crown the main focus is on equalling the achievement in the intermediate series. Eight of the '95 side help comprise the present squad and coach Biddy Philips (Thurles) and Sheila Delaney (Borrisoleigh), and Liam Hogan (Burgess) have put in a huge effort with the side in an effort to make the breakthrough



Kay won 21 Leinster championship medals with Dublin, seven championship and eight league medals with her club C.I.E., originally G.S.R. Kay, and Christy Ring both first appeared in All-

Ireland finals in the same year, 1941, but though Christy then collected his first medal, Kay was on the losing side, the winners being Cork. She collected her first medal in 1942 in a replay against Cork in the first drawn All-Ireland final and recorded her historic 15th on October 8th, 1961 when she retired from inter-county level.

When Dublin won the All-Ireland in 1949 Kay was unavailable. She won her 15 medals in the following years - 1942, 1943, 1944, 1948, 1950, 1951, 1952, 1953, 1954, 1955, 1957, 1958, 1959, 1960, 1961. She was captain in 1958.

Those 15 medals will continue to aspire generations and are unlikely to be surpassed.

PREPARE TO RETAIN ALL-IRELAND CLUB CAMOGIE CROWN

hile the rest of the country watches with interest as the provincial hurling and football club championships unfold, Ballymacward in Co Galway prepares to host the All-Ireland Club Camogie final.

Far from the public eye, (as most ladies competitions are) the local side and defending champions, Pearse's will battle it out with Lisdowney of Co Kilkenny, who boast the talents of the Downey twins, Anne and Angela, who together have secured 24 Leinster camogic medals with Kilkenny. The hosts, meanwhile, have the services of Sharon and Michelle Glynn, and Ann Ryan Forde, as well as Treacy Laheen, Martina Harkin, Aine Hillary and Louise Curry, some of Galway's most revered camogic players.

With Pearse's All-Ireland title at stake the interest in the local area is understandably high. "The team has been together for six years now and they have won four county finals in that time," says team manager Mick Kennedy who also holds the prestigious positions of Chairman of the Galway Camogie Board and Secretary of the Connacht Council.

"We have got a very good team. They are a very ambitious bunch of players and even though it was hard to get them focused at the start of the year, they have performed very well and worked hard to get here."

Knowing each other for so long can take its toll, enthusiasm drains and players can fatigue. Pearse's have dominated Galway and Connacht camogie for the past number of years, having claimed four Connacht titles on top of their county accolades. In 1992, they went on to meet with Rathnure, the Wexford and Leinster champions, in their first All-Ireland semi-final, but were beaten. In 1994, Glen Rovers of Cork accounted for them. Last year, however, Pearse's met Ballinagarry of Limerick in the All-Ireland final, 3-15 to 3-13, to claim their first ever All-Ireland club title. This year's All-Ireland semi-final was played against the Ulster champions, Loughgiel Shamrocks of Co. Antrim. Travelling to Ulster, via the club's long-time main sponsors Greaney Coach Hire, the team was optimistic that a second successive All-Ireland final appearance was on the cards.

Their 13-point drubbing of Loughgiel proved that taking their crown from them will be less than easy for Lisdowney, however,

Mick Kennedy is not ready to assume victory.

"Lisdowney will be far from easy to beat," he insists, agreeing that camogie is as competitive and as skilful as its brother sport, hurling. "They have got a number of very good players, the Downey's especially, so we have to pay close attention to them and keep our concentration throughout the game.

"You have to take every game as it comes. The next game is the one you have to win and to that you have to think positively about your own strengths. That is how we approached this campaign."

Without doubt, the occasion is causing considerable excitement in Castleblakney a small village in Galway, born on the spot where four parishes meet - Mountbellew, Caltra, Menlough and Ballymacward. The area is predominantly hurling though the football region of the county does not lie very far north. Hurling, however, is the main activity in Castleblakney and take up most of the natives' free time.

Gerry McDonagh returned home after a career in the Forestry Department which led him to several counties - Cork, Donegal, Wicklow and Kildare - but on being offered a transfer to Dublin, he deserve to be All-Ireland champions."

Gerry's words are those which are shared by many in the camogie world. There are 33 camogie teams in Galway and eight of them

figure amongst the favourites each year to claim the county title. Pearse's has been consistently among those eight.

Victory on November 23 will bring enormous pride to the village of Castleblakney, and will act as a spur for their brother hurlers to attain similar accolades sometime in the future. Perhaps Castleblakney will emerge as the hurling capital of the West in place of Athenry.



This will be the 34th All-Ireland final and the first time for those two clubs to meet. Clubs from Galway and Kilkenny met on four previous occasions. In 1973, Oranmore defeated St Pauls. 
