





"You were marvellous ambassadors in Croke Park last Sunday and you have set a wonderful example for others to follow.


"It has been a lean year for Cork hurling and football, but a victory like yours has lifted the spirits considerably.

# A Croke Park finalist at 15



Just one more time would please Angela

Angela Downey-Browne tells Brian O'Neill that she would love just one more more day in Croke Park before 79,000 cheering spectators

he was the greatest camogie player of her era, perhaps of any era, and Croke Park was her stage time and time again. Angela Downey-Browne doesn't miss the showers in the old dressing rooms there, though. "They were always cold after a match". She says with some asperity. Always. "And we could have done with the warm-up areas they have there now!"


Angela had her first view of the new stadium last Sunday when the Kilkenny team she helped to win the 1977 All Ireland title were feted. Truth to tell, she wouldn't have minded being involved in the big match herself.

"I would love to experience the thrill of playing in Croke Park as it looks now. Just watching it on television on All Ireland hurling final day - the size, the atmosphere, the noise of 79,000 spectators. Walking out in front of a full house must be an amazing feeling". The Ballyragget native could write a book on the subject of Croke Park finals. She received her first taste this month 30 years ago. She was only 15, a student at Colaiste Bhride in Callan, and remembers little of her final debut other than that Kilkenny lost by four points to Cork.

Two years later she and they were back, this time sampling victory against the same Leesiders. A great day. Your first All Ireland medal is always a milestone.

It was the Noresiders' first ever All Ireland senior camogie triumph. They've won 11 more in the meantime, and Angela was present and correct for all of them. Seven of those titles came in successive seasons between 1985 and '91 - a feat that is not likely to be equalled or surpassed in this day and age.

Not surprising then that the Dublin 3 venue became a place of pilgrimage for her. "You sometimes heard people saying that

the camogie final was lost in Croke Park, that the stadium was too big for the crowd. Lots of people believed that a provincial ground would have been a better location and that the attendance would have been bigger as a result. I never thought that way. There were so many screaming schoolgirls there, they made more noise than double that number of adults would have. Definitely it never felt like we were playing in a morgue or anything.

"Also, camogie players are no different to hurlers or footballers. It's every young lad's dream to play in Croke Park. That goes for young camogie players as well".

For a large part of their careers, Angela and her twin sister Ann were known to members of the older generation solely as Shem Downey's daughters; their father, who's still hale and hearty, was one of the heroes of Kilkenny's epic 1947 All Ireland

victory against Cork. After a while, however, people learned to distinguish between the pair of them - and not very diplomatically in the famous case of the individual who marched into Shem's butcher's shop in Ballyragget one day, pointed to Ann and asked, "Is this the good one or the bad one?"

True, Angela was the headline-grabber. Free-scoring forwards always are. If Ann was less spectacular than her sister, that's because midfield dynamos normally have to take a back seat in terms of the media spotlight. "It was only in the closing stages of her career than Ann received due acclaim as the driving force she was. Ann used to be going 90 miles an hour from the throw-in to the final whistle, up and down the field, always in the thick of the action. I could never do that".

Among Angela's toughest opponents were Wexford's Elsie Walsh, now Mrs Brian Cody, Sandie Fitzgibbon of Cork and, on the train-

ing field domestically, the one and only Biddy O'Sullivan. But none of them was quite as sharp as the photographer who snapped Angela scoring a goal after losing her skirt in the 1987 All Ireland final. The picture was splashed across the front of next day's papers and has pride of place in the TV room at home. Thank goodness she was wearing black knickers!

She's endured her bad days in Croke Park too, mind. None was more disappointing than the afternoon of the 1975 All Ireland colleges' final, which pitted Callan against Athenry. The match ended all-square after Angela missed a late free that would have given Callan victory if converted. In extra time, she got cramp and had to be put between the posts, whereupon Athenry proceeded to rattle in the goals and run out comfortable winners.

Angela cried all the way home on the bus.


"That was my last year in school. I was never going to play in another colleges' final. The disappointment of that day still hurts".

Her final appearance at Croke Park was an altogether happier day, even if it too ended in defeat. The occasion was the 1995 All Ireland final. Angela was Kilkenny captain. Little Katie Browne was the team mascot and was introduced during the prematch parade to the special guest, President Robinson. "The poor child had been dragged to almost every training session in the previous weeks and was well used to our stretching routine. She copied every exercise as we warmed up that day, much to the amusement of the spectators in the Hogan Stand\*

What price Katie following in her mother's footsteps by leading Kilkenny to camogie glory in the future and giving Angela Downey-Browne another wonderful Croke



end of the day, victory was ours to hold" Further success came for Gilly when in 1994 she won her first junior All-Ireland medal when they defeated Limerick. To play on one's county senior team is the dream of many and for Gilly that dream chance came in '95 and the following year saw her in Croke Pk. in the Senior All-Ireland Final. "Running out on the Croke Pk, pitch was nerve racking, but it was a dream come true for me' said Denise who put away some fine scores early on the League campaign and the Forus na Gaeilge championship. Of the many guests in Páirc an Chrócaigh that day was the former Uachtarán of the GAA, Joe Mc Donagh, himself a Galway man.

That victory meant a lot to Joe as several times since then he has made reference to that famous September Sunday of '96. During '96 Gilly continued on her winning way winning an All-Ireland medal with her school

continued on her winning way winning an All-Ireland medal with her school St.Brigids Vocational School, Loughrea. Not a bad year for this young lady, and while '97 did not see Galway retain their O'Duffy Cup, Gilly did capture a second school's medal with St.Brigids. Returning home to Galway after that famous win of '96 was something Galway wanted to make the most of and they savoured one moment in time when they crossed the River

Shannon in some style. Denise describes that moment as if it was today" We travelled by bus from Dublin, so as we approached Athlone we all got out and walked across the Bridge with the O'Duffy Cup, that was some

thing special, very special".

"As we walked one of the first people we met was RTES Marty Morrissey" who probably took part in the celebrations! as well as working! When a county wins a senior title in camogie, hurling or football it means a lot to the county and creates a huge awareness among the people. This was some thing Denise became aware of very quickly" people had much more respect for the game, they were now much more aware of the game and suddenly people came and asked for

Since their victory of '96 Galway have failed to lift the O'Duffy Cup once more and although they did capture the National league this season they were denied a trip to Croke Pk by Cork in this year's All-Ireland semi-final. This year saw the return of Denise to the maroon and white following a lengthy break, firstly she had suffered from burn out following the '96 period, and then unfortunately she picked up a knee injury. However, it remains Denise's dream to win another senior All-Ireland medal and with youth very much on her side that certainly remains a possibility. September 2001 she was asked by Michael Kennedy, the well known Galway manager if she would be interested in joining the Galway panel.

Denise did not have to be asked a second time. She immediatley set to the task of loosing some weight and generally getting herself into shape. She knew this was her chance. When the Galway team was announced to play Wexford in the first round of this year's Foras na Gaeilge All-Ireland, Denise was there and she wanted to make the most of it and on that occassion she did as I witnessed for myself.

Denise often blamed herself for Cork's winning goal in the '98 All-Ireland. so making a mark in Wexford pK, that day was of buge importance to her. While that day at the end of June resembled a day in the middle of winter for Denise it meant work and when she combined with fullforwad Sharon Glynn they sure made a pair, however, it was a dream that as I saw Cork killed at semi-final stage this year. Having played at the top level Denise has come across several great players and among those whom she rates is Cork's Denise Cronin and her fellow player Sharon Glynn, while she also admires greatly that Tipperary full forward Deidre Hughes. Denise is one of the many players who has seen the transaction of the game from twelve a -side to fifteen a-side, which Denise favours very much, "I enjoy it a lot, it is great, and it also gives five more players a chance with having five subs

It is only fair to say that when one is playing at top level, one begins to take notice of much more, and publicity for the game is high with this Galway player."We need more publicity and more pictures Denise describe it. It is also Denise's thought that players should think of giving back something particularly when they have retired from the game. either at administration level or in the field of county management

While it is great to hear Denise talk of 'giving back' something to the game she dearly loves, I think most people would join with me in saying that let's hope it is along way off. With the camogic intercounty-calendar finishing on November 3rd with the All-Ireland club final, who knows Galway may still pull something out of the fire this season if Pearses hold on to the All-Ireland Club title. Time will tell.





# RED ADMIRABLE

The All Ireland senior camogie final was a marvellous spectacle, with Cork thwarting Tipperary's four-in-a-row ambitions with a surprise late flourish. But it might not have been possible were it not for the mid-summer return of corner-forward supreme Fiona O'Driscoll.

t is definitely the year of the returning officers. First there was D.J. and then there was Fiona. Both wore helmets, played at corner-forward and had no 15 affixed to their backs. One was in black and amber the other in red and white. The similarities are amazing. Even the results are the same.

lust as D.J. Carev came back in August for the All Ireland hurling semi-final, Fiona O'Driscoll had made her comeback, one month earlier, for the All-Ireland senior camogie quarterfinal against Limerick. Both players had a ferocious appetite and a tremendous will to win. and in September both players slipped away with the most coveted prize in Gaelic games an All-Ireland senior medal. Surely there is something to be learned from such short individual seasons vielding such positive results. There was no time for a lapse in form. No burn-out. When Carey and

O'Driscoll hit the field running late in their respective All-Ireland campaigns, their pure freshness stood them apart from the rest. Just as D.I. did the business

against the Premier County and the Banner, Fiona O'Driscoll emulated him with her own sublime performances. The scorer of nine magical points against Limerick, she did not take too long to get going a few weeks later against Galway in the semi-final. Amassing 2-4 with considerable ease, it was so apparent that O'Driscoll was having the time of her life. She could do no wrong. The Forus na Gacilge All-Ireland final awaited, a mouth-watering con-

test against three-in-a-row champions Tipperary. Cork relished so much the chance to get back at their newest rivals. Going through the league the Rebels' form had slipped alarmingly. For the first time in eight years they did not

contest the final but

O'Driscoll's return to the fold was to be the catalyst they so badly needed. She was later to become the leader of the attack. She had done it all before. Yet the holder of five senior All Ireland medals was still the hub in the wheel when it came to Croke Park. Her family and friends from east Cork were there in plentiful numbers. Even a banner emblazoned Good luck to Nora, Fiona and Liz' found its way into the team picture after the game. (Nora and Liz were playing with Cork in the junior final - all three come from the Fr. O'Neill's club in Ballymacoda).

#### FIRST STRIKE FIONA

Fiona sat very quietly in the bus on her way to GAA headquarters. Linda Mellerick was perched alongside her, equally silent. These two players were going for their sixth nugget of gold and spent this precious time in deep thought as they speculated on their prospects of striking it rich once more. But once the sliotar was thrown in the O'Neill's girl was anything but still.

She drew first blood when the Artane Boys Band had scarcely stopped parading. They could still be seen scuffling from the scene when O'Driscoll fired over Cork's opening score. Another three minutes and she was busy involving Emer Dillon for the Rebel's second point. The Premier County enjoyed their best spell over the next ten minutes and accelerated into a four-point lead. The Cork ladies were vulnerable and needed to score. Thus the bus partners combined, with Fiona providing the finishing touches after Linda's shot was parried by Iovita Delaney. Goal number one had arrived, but most crucially the red and white was back on track. Another five minutes passed

before the O'Neill's pocket rocket struck again. She rifled a

pile-driver at the Tipp custodian forcing her into a magnificent point-blank save, and the ball was deflected over the bar. The All Ireland champions led by one point at the break, but the east Cork girl was far from finished. Spurred on by an interval tongue-lashing from manager Pa Finn and trainer Jim McCarthy the final thirty minutes of play were put into context - it is now or never, and you have one half-hour to do it. The final act, scene two. Another miracle was needed. Rachel Moloney of the Courcey Rover's club in Ballinspittle was introduced, and she was capable of producing it. It only took the blue and gold a mere 29 seconds to stretch their lead to two, and then three, with points from Philly Fogarty and Deirdre Hughes. At this stage Cork folk were preparing to wave goodbye. Tipp now looked hot favourites for the four-in-a-row.

But the fat lady had not even warmed up her vocal chords. In fact she had to learn a new song as Cork rewrote the script. The Rebels' half-time lambasting gradually took effect and over the last 25 minutes of play they were a transformed Rebel outfit.

No Tipperary player was allowed to play. First, Leaving Cert student Dillon popped over her third point (again orchestrated by O'Driscoll). Jennifer O'Leary (starting her first year as a third-level college student) reduced the deficit to one. The red and white was at least staying in touch. But the final 20 minutes were going to reveal an unbelievable ending.

#### THRILLING FINISH

This is how it all unravelled. Captain Una O'Donoghue steered Cork's second goal into the right corner. Two minutes later Fiona decided to take a mini-tour of Croke Park. She started out around the 40 and those tiny steps grew faster and bigger but she almost came a cropper at the edge of the square. There she was surrounded, with nowhere to go. Yet she found a crack, and managed to free herself for one instant to palm to the net. Wow! It was impossible to keep up, but one dared not look away. O'Driscoll had it again. Her perite frame defied all gravity when we saw her grab from amongst a forest of sticks in the midst of the danger area. When she landed she unleashed a piledriver that Delaney stopped

brilliantly but the high voltage forced the sliotar to inch over the line. Agonisingly for Tipperary the green flag was raised. Cork players went on bended knees thanking God for this All Ireland title that was surely theirs. The red and white in the crowd

The red and white in the crowd of 13,287 (which I firmly believe to have been an underestimate of the actual attendance) went 'ballistic'. They had to wait another few minutes though, Ciara Gaynor went up the field to score Tipp's third and last point of the second-half. O'Donoghue and O'Leary carefully put the icing on the cake for the Rebels. The scenes that greeted Aileen Lawlor's final whistle will linger for some time yet. For not alone did it signal the end of a contest that had everything - pace, skill and drama - it also saluted two great teams that had brought

the level of the game up anoth-

er peg or two. Tipperary may have lost the match but they still are a great team. Cork's thirst for success, after a relative drought by their standards, was what caught Tipp in the end. For that the Premier girls cannot be faulted. They are champions since being chastened by the red and white in that infamous league final of 1999. Players like Una O'Dwyer, Ciara Gaynor, Therese Brophy, Philly Fogarty, Deirdre Hughes, Emer McDonnell and Claire Grogan and others still have much more to give in the county jer-

Whether Michael Cleary remains at the helm is a matter for another day. Strong rumours suggest that he will be the next Tipperary hurling manager now that Nicky has called it a day. Cleary's playing qualifications alone would suffice but his sublime record with the ladies over the last four years will do his case no harm either.

As for Cork, they look that they will stay at the top of the game for a while at least. Nine of the starting fifteen are students. Of the remaining six, Mellerick is the only one to publicly declare her retirement. Eithne Duggan is attempting to withdraw, but it is clear that her colleagues will not let her go without a fight. O'Driscoll is not even contemplating such a bizarre idea. In fact is seems a trifle absurd to even mention the Rword. Stephanie Dunlea, Vivienne Harris and Mary O'Connor have still loads to

#### JUNIOR BREAKTHROUGH FOR KILLKENNY


Folk who travelled to Croke Park on All-Ireland day were not alone served up with one good game, but two.



# Remarkable recovery as brave Maura grabs prizes

PEOPLE in sport who triumph over adversity deserve special mention.

Stories of courage abound throughout the broad spectrum of sport and next year, on our very own doorstep, we will see the results of great effort and determination when Ireland hosts the Special Olympics.

From time to time we have had tales of remarkable recoveries from injury and illness in these columns and we heard of another recently. Maura McNicholas is currently a five handicap golfer at the Ennis golf club in Clare, which she joined as a junior back in the early eighties. "My first sport was camogie and I really only got into golf towards the end of my camogie days," said Maura.

Like many camogie players who make the transition she showed a flair for golf and was a member of the Ennis team that won the Munster Senior Cup in 1993. A bank official with AIB she transferred to Dublin where she joined the Grange Club through an introduction by Sheena O'Brien Kenney, a former Irish International and team manager.

It was around this time that she became afflicted by "chronic fatigue" which has symptoms similar to the debilitating condition Myalgic Encephalomyelitis or ME as it is more commonly known.

"It was on and off at the beginning but then it got really bad. I got wiped out, exhausted, no energy after any kind of exertion."

She had always been fit and admits to being a perfectionist. "I would always drive myself hard and give full commitment." Such devotion and enthusiasm must have come from her mother Kitty who is one of Clare's best known camogie characters.

She won an All-Ireland senior camogie medal with Clare in 1974 (Maura was the team mascot) and subsequently trained the winning All-Ireland winning teams of 1981, '86, '93 and '95.

Kitty is also a keen golfer and mother and daughter play together regularly in fourball and foursome competitions.

Maura, herself, played for her school's under 16 team when she was only 12 and went on to win Junior and Intermediate All-Ireland medals with Clare.

Her determination also showed in her golfing days when she was one of only two junior girls in the club.

James Meade was looking after the junior boys at the time and invited the two girls to join the squad.

She remembers her first score as being 156 gross but the following year she went to the final of the Fergus Cup for juniors where Brian Gilligan beat her. Three years later Maura had reduced her handicap from 36 to 16.

It was during her time in Dublin that chronic fatigue began to affect her and she transferred back to Ennis.

"I went to doctors and hospitals, anybody I thought might be able to help but no one could tell me the reason why." Maura is not one to take no for an answer and she set about the search for a cause and a cure.

"I tried acupuncture and it was the only treatment that brought me back to some kind of normality. I then began to study it in Limerick University and was able to treat myself.

"I had to change my lifestyle. I learned that people who tend to push themselves need proper rest and a proper diet. They also need to supplement the diet with extra minerals and vitamins."

It was typical that she should throw herself into the study with the same commitment as she did in sport. She actually went to Nanjing in China for an intensive course. Apart from acupuncture, she has also studied nutrition, kinesiology, injury management and fitness in sport and Swedish massage over a period of six years.

Maura is now back to full health, plays golf regularly and successfully off a five handicap. Ennis lady captain Maura Ryan was browsing through the club results recently and noticed the name Maura McNicholas appearing on several prize lists and decided to investigate.

She discovered that Maura had actually won eight gross prizes this year and featured in many other competitions, including winning the President's (Michael Connolly) prize to the ladies.

"I really didn't know how many I won. I'm really a club golfer at the moment because I'm pretty busy with my new profession but you never know what my happen a little down the road.

Maura did win the Leinster Junior Championship and was runner-up in both the Munster and Connacht Junior Championships before her problem manifested itself.

# Meath's camogie Royals

The Royal County of Meath may be much better known for their footballing skills but back in '69 the St. Francis club of Cortown put camogie on the map. It is also well known that the Meath King of football Sean Boylan had his hand in camogie some years ago, so who knows what he may do if he ever retires from his footballing position! By Máire Uí Scolaí.

In those far off days gym slips and sashes were the order of the day, quite different to the sponsored Kepak jerseys worn by this year's Meath team when they took on the then reigning Leinster champions Offaly down in Rath one rainy summer's day in the Leinster championship.

Cortown is not renowned for it's camogie or hurling history, but back in '69 a group of young girls decided to do something about it. One Maureen Kenny who later became the first chairperson of the club decided to get the priest to announce it from the alter at Sunday Mass that there was talk of a camogie club being formed.

That was the start of the St. Francis club. From a starting fifteen the club grew until they reached the senior grade in '73 but sadly they folded in '74. However, during those intervening years they put Cortown very much on the map with their major win of '72 when they beat Kentstown in the junior championship Final.

While the early years saw Maureen Kenny as chairperson her vice-chairperson of the day was Mary Ward. The first secretary of the club was Eileen English while Marie Coogan looked after the money matters. Fundraising soon became an important aspect of the club and a disco was

held in the parish hall. which then made a handsome figure of £100, a lot of money back in '69 and '70. It was thought that other discos might be held but the parish priest of the time said the lights would have to be on and that as the younger generation will know that is not on and so no more discos were held. How times have changed!

However, that still did not dampen the spirits of St. Francis, as they were determined to keep the camogie alive. Their colours became purple and white and in '71 the girls reached their first ever championship final. The girls made

their own uniforms when they purchased rolls of material. Many may have thought that 1971 was going to be their year as they reached their first junior championship final, but Stamullen had other ideas. There was joy and excitement as they drew with Stamullen in the final but the replay sadly did not go their way and thus they had to wait until the following year.

While success was gathering within the club, the members soon began to wear the Meath colours of green gymslip and yellow sash. Rose Healy, Kay Maguire and A. Waters were among several players who wore the county colours with pride. Talking with Rose Healy the excitement in her voice about playing for the county was evident, "It was brilliant to play for your county, you made such friends." While Dublin beat Meath in '72 in the Leinster championship it still has fond memories for Rose.

That Meath /Dublin match saw some great play according to a local paper of the time. Meath were ahead at the break by 2-0 to Dublin's 1-02. However, the second half saw the Dubs pull away and thus they won 6-02 to Meath's 4-0.

Without a doubt '72 was a year that Rose and St. Francis will not forget too easily. Early that year the signs that

silver ware might rest on the house began to take root. Pat McElhenney, who hurled with Athboy realised that these young lassies had talent and so he trained the girls. According to Rose: "He certainly put us through our paces, it was tough, but in the end rewarding as we went on to win our first final that year."

Rose was accompanied with her three sisters Brigid, Elizabeth, and Therese and when they reached the junior championship Final that year they were more than determined to make up for the previous year. And so the first ever silverware of any kind made it's way back that year to Cortown after beating Kentstown 3-01 to 1-01 in the final, which was played in Pairc Tailteann.

That day the Cortown girls were

made fight for their first title as Kentstown were leading 1-01 to Cortown's 0-0 at the break. However, they came back out in the second period and they kept the Kentstown girls scoreless while they ran out worthy winners. Needless to say the celebrations lasted far longer than a day. That year the club won several

Tournaments, but sadly that became the last year for the club, as they folded in '74.

While they folded the memories live on and for their twenty fifth anniversary they decided to come together and rekindle the memories of that famous win of '72. While camogic may not be played in Cortown nowadays these ladies refuse to let those golden memories fade away into the sunset and so every five years they get together for a reunion.

Later on this month they will hold a reunion, it promises to be a night of nostalgia, when the scrapbooks are likely to be cleaned of the cobwebs and the photographs will be laughed at. Sadly missing from this year's reunion will be the late Helen Mulroe who died some time ago following a road accident. May she rest in peace.

Today, camogic may not be played in Cortown, but the Royal County can now boast of seven clubs. Kilmessan are

"We have had several calls from people enquiring about very young girls wishing to play, so perhaps we may well go down the road of indoor camogie, and with a possibility of further sponsorship in the future who knows what we may well do."

commented Anne, who is also thinking ahead of coaching courses for the county as well. It sounds that we may well see Meath coming back on stream in the near future.

Playing colleague Paula O'Connor was there, along with Cork manager Pa Finn and selector Rose Desmond. Representing the county board were chairperson Sheila Golden and Mary Moran.

After accepting her award Fiona, who is a child welfare and liaison officer with the county juvenile board, said: "Winning the All-Ireland was the be-all and end-all, everything else is a bonus.

"If Cork had not won there would be no awards, so this is in recognition of the work and commitment that the girls have shown."

It has been non-stop recognition since winning the All-Ireland, with awards from the Irish Independent/Jury's Hotel, Silversprings Moran Hotel, RTE Player of the Match and later this month she will be honoured by the Jury's Hotel group in Cork.







So, what changed in twelve months? Very little really: Tipperary were as strong as ever and they had their eyes firmly fixed on winning a All-Ireland fourth in-a-row

The Cork panel was much the same too. However, coach Pa Finn had made one vital change to the backroom team. He brought in Jim Mc-Carthy to look after the physical preparation of the team. All of the players that I spoke to on Sunday evening agreed that Jim's arrival gave the Cork squad the little extra edge that they needed for last September's classic final.

"It's not that Jim changed very much of our training

ise Cronin told me. "It was that he brought a new focus and sense of purpose to what we were doing. The Cork panel is a very experienced group of players and unknowingly, we had begun to go through the training routines without pushing ourselves for that little extra

"Jim changed all that. We noticed the changes in small ways when we played. Players started to win more ball against the odds."

Another former Captain Lynda Mellerick agreed. "Jim constantly reminded us of the importance of each session. As well as making sure that we drank plenty fluids during training and that we ate the correct foods."

# History of Gaelic Games in St. Michael's Lurgan

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L. Michael's Grammar School, Lurgan stands in an idyllic elevated setting on the outskirts of Lurgan overlooking Lough Neagh enjoying panoramic views of the Sperrins to the west and the Mournes to the east. Founded by the Sisters of Mercy in 1924 as an all girls' boarding school, St. Michael's has been a co-educational school since 1972, catering for students aged 14-18. It has

a long and proud history of achievement in Gaelic games.

St. Michael's Grammar School has been a nursery for camogie players for many decades. When a girls only school, it dominated Ulster Schools Camogie. In the 50's and 60's lifting the Ulster Colleges Senior and Junior titles on many occasions. They won the senior titles in 1957/58; 1966/67; 1967/68; 1968/69 and also achieved junior success in 1955/56; 1956/57; 1957/58; 1964/65; 1966/67; 1967/68; 1968/69; 1971/72.
