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Galway fail to hit their best form in final loss to lively Rebels

IT was heartbreak for Galway's senior camogie team last Sunday as Cork emerged triumphant in the All-Ireland final to secure their 26th crown and successfully retain the title.

In a contest where the Tribeswomen just simply didn't get going, Cork's experienced players dictated throughout the 60 minutes before Briege Corkery's goal six minutes from time ensured despair for Tony Ward's charges.

From the opening exchanges, Galway were coming out second best in intensity and were chasing the contest. However, the maroon and white never reneged from their workrate but just couldn't catch the necessary break to overturn the Rebels' momentum.

After a season where Galway were league champions and went II games unbeaten, their inability to get to grips with this decider was puzzling and a failure to marshal tighter the consistent clearances from Cork centre back Gemma O'Connor couldn't be ignored. But in their efforts to restore parity after falling behind in the second minute, some decision making, efforts on goal and link up play never matched the heights they'd achieved over the previous seven months.

Deflated Galway camp struggle to come to terms with sluggish showing on biggest day of all

"THIS is the game we wanted to win," said manager Tony Ward as Galway came to grips with All-Ireland final heartache. "We really wanted to win and the girls were well up for it. It just didn't happen for us on the day.

"I suppose our first half performance let us down a small bit. But look it, nobody went out to lose that game intentionally. They gave it what was their best and just wasn't to be.

The goal was the killer. But they fought to the bitter end. Every single one of them. Even the girls that came off the bench. They fought, fought, fought. They just didn't want to be beaten. It was a great trait of this team all year. Defeat really, really hurt. You'd hear a pin drop in that dressing room. They really took the defeat bad," said Ward.

Despite the hurt that Galway's players were feeling following a ten game undefeated streak ending, the manager was positive that they would use this loss to come back again.

"It's different to a few years ago when we lost an All-Ireland or two," added Ward. "The team was maybe a bit older. Every girl out there had either an intermediate or senfor medal and had the experience of 2013. And in the dressing room afterwards, they regrouped and said that we'll come back. We know what it's like to win. Now we felt what it's like to lose and we don't want that feeling again."

The captain Niamh Kilkenny echoed those sentiments as they tried to get their heads around another Croke Park loss. "It was a very disappointing day," said the Pearses midfielder. "You're playing it over and over now in the head trying to see

where it went wrong. But I suppose we'll have a while now to think back on it, but we're extremely disappointed.

"We were very consistent this year putting wins back-to-back and winning the league for the first time in ten years. But this is the big one. The All-Ireland final is the one you want to win and unfortunately we

weren't so lucky.' Nine of Galway's All-Ireland winning team from 2013 started this game, but Kilkenny was confident that the new players will learn from this defeat.

"I think there are a lot of girls that will learn a lot," added the four-time All-Star. "It was a big day out for them. Their first day playing an senior All-Ireland final in Croke Park playing an experienced Cork team. They definitely will learn a lot and hopefully they'll bottle the feeling of disappointment in the dressing room and drive it on for next

No glory for determined Kildare - this time

"The true winners accept that defeat is always a possible outcome. The highest achievers are those who are unafraid of failure. The very best are those who use their losses to propel them to victory."-Unknown.

This is not for the purposes of the Kildare camogie panel. Competitors hate platitudes. Even logical commentary on progress and development cannot be broached with them in the immediate aftermath of defeat.

Yet the sense leaving Croke Park on Sunday was

that this was just another overnight camp on the journey Kildare have taken since the beginning of 2009.

Back then, this was a Division 4 team operating in the junior A championship. They experienced league glory that year and since then, have bounded up the levels, adding the Division 3 title and reaching a Division 2 final last year.

More important has been the championship advancement, with two All-Ireland successes, most recently in the premier junior decider at HQ in 2013.

To reach an intermediate final just two years later is no mean feat. Of course, when you are there, it is all about winning. But for context, consider Waterford, who had fallen at the semi-final hurdle three times in succession since their 2011 premier

junior success. The Déise were infused by fresh blood this year, with five minors, many of them accustomed to winning at underage level. They had beaten Kildare twice already this term and confirmed the form book on Sunday.

Defeat should hurt but Kildare's trajectory suggests that they will be back and are the team to beat next season as long as they can retain their key players and perhaps blood a couple of more young guns.

You look back on the game and feel that while Waterford were deserving winners in the end, having recovered well from a lightning Kildare start to exert their authority, it was the goals just before and after half time that ultimately decided the game.

Had they been avoided - and they could have been -Stephen Fleming's crew could not have looked as comfortable as they did in the final quarter especially.

We'd a good spell in the first 15 minutes into the game," said Kildare manager, Stephen Dormer afterwards. 'It seemed after that we were forcing it.

They dropped two people back into the half-back line and snuffed out the space in front of the full-forward line and we never got to grips with that area. We were chasing the game after the goal just before half time."

There was no hint of nerves as the Lilywhitesturned-All Blacks (due to the similarity of colours with Waterford) tore out of the


Noelle Earley had starred at Croke Park with Clodagh Flanagan 11 years previously when Kildare won an AllIreland junior ladies football title and was back in the fold after a lengthy absence.

The former football All Star hand-passed to the net in the third minute after good work from Susie O'Carroll and points quickly followed from Melissa Lyons and Emer Reilly.

They could not have asked for a better start but Waterford dropped Niamh Rockett into the middle and funnelled players back to cut off the supply to Kildare's threatening forwards. Once Leaving Cert student Bet Carton shot a classy point over her right shoulder, the favourites began to settle.


That score was the first of an unanswered 2-4 that swung the game completely in Waterford's favour.

It was Carton's strike from a 20m angled free two minutes after the resumption that really drove the stake through Kildare's heart though.

They fought but could not get the major they needed to breathe new life into their challenge. Lyons and O'Carroll notched up points but Waterford were dominant in the middle third and midfielders Lorraine Bray and Trish Jackman got the last two scores.

The Kildare defence was magnificent in general play, with Angela Lyons, Flanagan and Regina Gorman shining. Afterwards, manager Dormer described Flanagan, the 2013 captain, as an inspirational figure who would

make any senior team in the county.

These are the type of characters that have brought Kildare from obscurity to the brink of the big time. They have ensured that a culture is now in place that is embraced by the next generation. We can say that, even if they cannot see any green shoots in this dark hour.

But the dawn is coming.

Stephen Dormer credited Waterford for the manner in which they reorganised after being torn apart early on by Kildare.

The Munster side's management ensured that there was no space in which to send ball into Noelle Earley and Susie O'Carroll in particular. They squeezed the middle and with more bodies, hoovered up possession.

"We were at a bit of sixes and sevens around midfield and the half-back line. They dropped out their full-forward into the middle of the field and had an extra couple of players in there and we never got to grips with that area. Orla Bambury and Caroline Forde worked really hard but it just didn't happen.

"Waterford had their homework done on Susie. They had two players playing in front of her and we got it very hard to get ball into her. We tried to bring her centre-

forward in the second half to try to get her on a couple of balls but it just didn't happen for her."

If Aisling Power's goal just before the interval hurt, Beth Carton's strike less than two minutes after the restart was too much to recover from.

"It was a bit of a kick in the teethfor us I suppose. We were switched off a little bit. They thought she was going to tap it over and she went for it. It's just one of those things that happens."

Dormer may be a Kilkenny native – and brother of Noreside star Colette – but he knows all about this team's odyssey, married as he is to Kildare midfielder Orla Bambury. When he speaks of the players' commitment, he could be talking about his wife, who was back training in April after giving birth to Conor in January.

"These girls have put in a massive effort. Credit to them they worked really hard. It's disappointing for them today but they should be very proud of the way they've performed all year and how they're after coming on over the last couple of years.

"You'd be very disappointed today but when you look back on the last couple of years, the journey these girls have been on has been absolutely unbelievable. Even during the week, all the clubs, everyone giving their support."

Cork 1-13 Galway 0-9

IT was considered improbable by most observers at the beginning of the season but champions Cork made it two Liberty Insurance All-Ireland senior camogle titles in a row with a resolutely professional performance at Croke Park.

Having lost 13 players from the panel that scaled the summit 12 months ago, nobody gave them a prayer of making a return. Only managing to emerge from their group in third place after defeats to Wexford and Galway, who had also accounted for them in the league decider, seemed to confirm that notion, but not for the first time, they showed their mettle once it came to the knock-out stages.

Briege Corkery settled the game with a 54th minute goal and brought her individual tally of All-Ireland senior medals to 15, six of which have come in camogie. That record is matched by teammate Rena Buckley and the pair will be pursuing number 16 in the ladies football final in two weeks.

Cork also move joint top of camogle's championship roll of honour, with this victory bringing them alongside Dublin on 26 titles. The Leesiders produced a wonderfully committed performance, with a number of stand-out showings.

Gemma O'Connor and Orla Cotter were the real stars though, while Laura Treacy and team captain, Ashling Thompson produced wonderful displays too. Thompson hailed the undying spirit of Paudie Murray's squad.

"Unless you break your legs, you have to keep going," she smiled.

"This is what we came here to do. Every team gets a purple patch and we said that at half time. It was nil-nil again. Some people don't even know the score. We never take any notice.

"We never threw in the towel and that's the difference between Cork camogie and anyone else. When the going gets tough, who's going to throw the towel in first and that certainly wasn't us so we got the result we wanted today."

Cork dominated the first half completely and should have led by more than four points (0-8 to 0-4) at the change of ends. Galway certainly seemed off the pace slightly in the first half as O'Connor hoovered up possession effortlessly, while Cotter came up with some big plays. Had they offloaded a little earier having created a number of overlaps, they might have put Galway away.

Thompson got the champions off the mark with an early point and

Cotter notched up the first three of seven points, with Niamh McGrath landing a brilliant equaliser from the left wing from Galway.

That was to be the Tribeswomen's only score from play until Acife Donohue struck and they never carried a sufficient offensive threat. McGrath, who scored all bar that Donohue point for Galway, kept Tony Ward's team in touch but with Cotter and Corkery doing the business at the other end, it was double scores at the break.

Galway thundered into the fray after the resumption though and three pointed frees McGrath, including one from just short of the 65m line, reduced the margin to one. The challengers were in full flow now with Lorraine Ryan in no mood to yield, while Heather Cooney made a stunning block to deny a certain goal.

Julia White also had a goal correctly ruled out for a square ball but Cotter came up with a big point from play to stop the rot and Cork never really looked back. Once Corkery intercepted Shauna Healy's attempted clearance and raced through to slot calmly to the Galway net, Cork opened their shoulders and Thompson landed a monstrous score late on followed by a Katrina Mackey point to signal the start of the cele-

Second Best

Tr was always going to be difficult for the Galway camogie team to inflict a third competitive defeat on Cork in 2015 in last Sunday's All-Ireland final and that's how it turned out as the injury-hit Tribeswomen stumbled to a seven point defeat. They can have no complaints either as the reigning champions were clearly the superior force and largely dictated the exchanges from the throw-in.

Apart from the third quarter when three Niamh McGrath frees helped reduce the deficit to 0-8 to 0-7, Galway were second best for long periods. They only managed two points from play, with McGrath brilliantly landing their first score from the left-hand sideline and Aoife Donohue finding the target in the second-half, while their defence was under serious pressure at times.

Cork arguably possessed the three best play-

ers on the pitch in Gemma O'Connor, Ashling Thompson and Orla Cotter, and also looked the hungrier outfit. The champions probably deserved to be more than four points clear at the break such was the flow of play to the Galway posts, but when Tony Ward's charges subsequently pared the deficit to the minimum, the Rebels were able to raise the ante again in pulling clear over the closing 15 minutes.

The decisive score came six minutes from the end when the Galway defence failed to clear their lines adequately, allow-

ing veteran Briege Corkery almost an unhindered run through before the Cork dual player beat Susan Earner from close range. The title holders then confirmed their mastery with three subsequent points from Amy O'Connor, Thompson and Katrina Mackey. Having headed into the final as

league champions and undefeated this year, Galway had stood on the brink of their most successful season ever in camogie history, but Cork improved throughout their campaign and obviously also had an edge in motivation travelling to Croke Park. Furthermore, Tony Ward also had to plan without three key players in Ann Marie Starr, Orlaith McGrath and Emma Kilkelly, while overall they lacked the winners' athleticism on the day.


To Galway's credit, they never threw in the towel but too many of their key players just didn't have the desired impact on the action. Their forwards were well held, while they were also living off scraps around the midfield sector where Niamh Kilkenny was tightly marked. Full back Sarah Dervan, Heather Cooney, Siobhan Coen and Lorraine Ryan battled manfully in their rearguard, but they found Cork's dynamic running difficult to counteract. All-told, it was a progressive year for Galway camogie even if the big prize eluded them.

St Finbarr's and Killeagh also meet on Sunday. The Barrs haven't had the best of success in recent times. Defeated by Milford in their opening round this is a big game for them against a young Killeagh side possessing plenty of expertise in Hannah Looney, Laura Treacy, Rebecca Sheehan and Leah McEvoy. If Killeagh curb Gemma O'Connor, they should advance.

It's very impressive that Sars have reached the Senior B final their first year up but an array of underage talent and the leadership of Emer Fennell has them a force to be reckoned with. Mallow had a very good semi-final win over a fancied Eire Og side. Sars, however, should enter top status again.

It's hard to determine who will win both Intermediate semi-finals with little between the final four teams.

'Paudie likes a challenge so he will stay on'

Eight-time All-Star, four-time All-Ireland winner and Southern Star columnist Jennifer O'Leary gives her big match verdict

Kleran McCarthy (KMC): Cork certainly saved their best 'til

Jennifer O'Leary (JOL): It was their best performance of the championship. From one to 15, they really gelled. Their work-rate was immense. They didn't stop from the word go. The defence was brilliant – Galway got to their half-forward line but they just couldn't penetrate Cork then. Everything went well.

Yes, there were patches when Cork drifted out of the game, like the start of the second half, but there was never any stage that I thought they were in trouble; it was a very impressive performance.

KMC: How important was Briege Corkery's goal after 54 minutes? The winning of the game?

JOL: Briege's goal spurred them on and it was a turning point, but even without it I don't think Cork were in trouble. Cork's start to the game was unbelievable. That was something, a fast start, that they hadn't done all year so that gave them an early foothold in the game. They never looked back. Maybe Cork should have been more ahead at half time, but they were just so much more impressive than Galway, who never got going.

KMC: Two of your former teammates, Briege Corkery and Rena Buckley, won their 15th All-Ireland medals last Sunday. Is there anything left to say about these greats of the game?

JOL: I was speaking to them after the final on Sunday and they were just so humble about it all. I was asking them how they felt about winning their 15th All-Ireland but they wanted to talk about the team, not their own achievements. What makes them fantastic athletes and people is that they have stayed the same throughout all their success. They work so hard, they love what they do and long may it continue.

KMC: A new wave of young players is coming up through, taking up the baton from the old guard. Is this the start of a new era for this Cork camogle team?

JOL: There were massive changes in the panel after last season but as the year went on, this team got better with every game.

You could see those young women in Croke Park on Sunday weren't fazed by the occasion. They looked so composed, and the way they won it was never in doubt, so I do feel this is the start of something big. They will definitely go for the three-in-a-row next year, and be favourites for it. Some people have said the championship wasn't as tough this year as other years but I don't believe that. You have to play the teams in front of you; Cork did that, and they won.

KMC: How important is it that Paudie Murray stays on as manager?

JOL: Everyone would have said to Paudie that this year would be his hardest with the team being in transition, but he stuck with them. I think he will stay on as manager because he always likes a challenge and he sets the bar high for himself. He knows the girls well, they know him, and there's a familiarity and a trust there — plus the three in a row is an incentive as well.

But even if he doesn't decide to stay on, hopefully the management that was in place this year stays on because they have played a big role in this success as well.

Cork defy all the odds to top the charts again

IT was considered improbable by most observers at the beginning of the season but champions Cork made it two Liberty Insurance All-Ireland senior camogic titles in a row with a resolutely professional performance at Croke Park.

Having lost 13 players from the panel that scaled the summit 12 months ago, nobody gave them a prayer of making a return.

Only managing to emerge from their group in third place after defeats to Wexford and Galway, who had also accounted for them in the league decider, seemed to confirm that notion but not for the first time, they showed their mettle once it came to the knockout stages.

Briege Corkery settled the game with a 54th minute goal and brought her individual tally of All-Ireland senior medals to 15, six of which have come in camogie. That record is matched by team-mate Rena Buckley and the pair will be pursuing number 16 in the ladies' football final in two weeks.

Cork also move joint top of camogie's championship roll of honour, with this victory bringing them alongside Dublin on 26 titles

The Leesiders produced a wonderfully committed performance, with a number of standout showings.

Gemma O'Connor and Orla Cotter were the real stars though, while Laura Treacy and team captain Ashling Thompson produced wonderful displays too.

Thompson hailed the undying spirit of Paudie Murray's squad.

'Unless you break your legs, you have to keep going,' she smiled.

'This is what we came here to do. Every team gets a purple patch and we said that at

half time. It was nil-nil again. Some people don't even know the score. We never take any notice.

'We never threw in the towel and that's the difference between Cork camogie and anyone else. When the going gets tough, who's going to throw the towel in first and that certainly wasn't us so we got the result we wanted today.'

Cork dominated the first half completely and should have led by more than four points (0-8 to 0-4) at the change of ends.

Galway certainly seemed off the pace slightly in the first half as O'Connor hoovered up possession effortlessly, while Cotter came up with some big plays. Had they offloaded a little earlier having created a number of overlaps, they might have put Galway away.

Thompson got the champions off the mark with an early point and Cotter notched up the first three of seven points, with Niamh McGrath landing a brilliant equaliser from the left wing from Galway.

That was to be the Tribeswomen's only score from play until Aoife Donohue struck and they never carried a sufficient offensive threat.

McGrath, who scored all bar that Donohue point for Galway, kept Tony Ward's team in touch but with Cotter and Corkery doing the business at the other end, it was double scores at the break.

Galway thundered into the fray after the resumption though and three pointed frees McGrath, including one from just short of the 65m line, reduced the margin to one.

The challengers were in full flow now with Lorraine Ryan in no mood to yield, while Heather Cooney made a stunning block to deny a certain goal.

Julia White also had a goal correctly ruled out for a square ball but Cotter came up with a big point from play to stop the rot and Cork never really looked back.

Once Corkery intercepted Shauna

Healy's attempted clearance and raced through to slot calmly to the Galway net, Cork opened their shoulders and Thompson landed a monstrous score late on, followed by a Katrina Mackey point to signal the start of the celebrations.



Sarsfields have won the senior B title in their first year in the grade. A great achievement for them and not a huge surprise. They are a fine side with an abundance of talent coming.

Brian Dillon's won the intermediate league and championship double. A drawn semi-final and replay against Blackrock and a tough final with Tracton was a demanding three weeks but the girls responded brilliantly and having not lost a competitive game all season their victory was just reward last weekend. Dillon's lost both finals, last year to Sars, and Tracton were on a similar receiving end this year.

My consoling words for them is; what a difference a year can make and to keep striving for glory.

Looking back on the club scene here in Cork I think it needs an over-haul. With Cork so prominent at inter-county level and entering teams in U16 A and B competitions, minor A, intermediate and senior, club players are left hanging. It's a problem in all GAA codes and it'll probably never be fully satisfactory, but I feel we could still improve a bit here on Leeside.

The senior championship was disappointing this year for Ballygarvan, Glen Rovers and Cloughduv. Due to the fact that Carrigdhoun, Imokilly and Seandún pulled out of the competition the week they were due to play their opening rounds, it left the three clubs without a first round game. For Ballygarvan and the Glen to train for nine months and get just one championship game was unfair.

With most clubs training three times a week, plus exams, work, and dual commitments, it is getting more and more difficult to get players committing to divisional sides. They need to rest too. In order to prevent the above happening again, any divisional side interested in participating in the senior championship should have a panel of players signed up in February and at least a couple of training sessions under their belt.

Trying to round up a squad a few weeks before championship is too late. They should also have their own divisional championship competition in April and the winner of that group moves into the senior championship proper. We have to stop putting off games for weddings, holidays, other sports etc. We've all utilised every excuse in the book. The dates should be distributed in December for the following year and set in stone. If these dates are given as early as December and people know that under no circumstances will they be changed then there is plenty of time to make the right holiday and work arrangements. The current situation is that even when dates are given there is no guarantee when you plan around them because more often than not they will change.

In order to prevent clashes with ladies football, both county boards should sit down early December (assuming both national fixtures have been distributed) and decide that from March 1, one week is football, the following is camogie and so on.

The request for game changes is a nightmare for the county board. One player should not be allowed put a game on hold for two or three weeks. There should be just one week's grace given to club players playing with their county team up to senior level.

At senior level it should only be a week up to the knockout stages. After that two weeks is fair enough. Anyone named outside the first 20 players should be free to play with their club up to 48/72 hours before their Cork game, at all levels.

The biggest drop out in both male and female players, in any sport, is between 15 and 18, yet our underage competitions in Cork really do come last in the order of priority. The minor league could possibly start in March and finish in early May and the championship start in July/August.

The evenings are long. Yes there are players at minor playing intermediate and senior and for player welfare they need a break but it could work. It will initially be a logistical headache with a multitude of conundrums but we should start somewhere and try and get it as near to successful as we possibly can over the coming seasons.

She recalls a young Gemma O'Connor, who first tasted success on the camogie field as part of the school's first winning Sciath Scol team, that also included her friend and St Finbarr's team mate Lynda O'Con-

"We were honoured to have someone like Gemma start her Camogie career with our school," Mrs Fitzsimons said.

"My earliest memories of Gemma was seeing this tiny stature of a child along with Lynda (O'Connell) tog out for the school team when they were just in second class. team when they were just in second class.
"Both of them so small amongst the sixth

class girls, however, seeing them get stuck in and hurl like they did, I knew I no longer had to fear them getting hurt. "I now feared for the opposition," joked

"Geraldine not only coached when Gemma attended the school, but continued to do so for many years after.

Geral-dine was incredible with the time and effort she gave to our school and once again it was sport that brought a great friendship be-tween me and Ger and in her honour I will always keep sport going in the school for as long as I can." As the momentum for women in sport continues the departments of Justice and Equality and Transport, Tourism and Sport, teamed together to host a 'Conference on Women in Sport' last Wednesday in Dublin Castle

Keynote speakers on the day were from a wide range of sports from Rugby to Athletics and included CEOs from Swim Ireland and ladies golf union who gave presentations on how they increase ladies member-ship, volunteers and safeguard children. Fiona Coghlan, former cap-tain of the Irish Women's Rugby team was the keynote speaker.

This was a major Government sponsored conference looking at 'levelling the playing field' for women and girls in sport in Ireland The conference was about building up the structures in developing ladies sport within Ireland. Its purpose was also to recognise women's sport for what it is, as well as for what it's not, and not just by drawing

comparisons with the men. However some comparisons were inevitable. Fiona pointed to the dis-parity raised by Dr Anne Looney, chief executive of the National Council for Curriculum and Assessment, who highlighted the fact that according to a recent survey of Australian sport, 81% of their media coverage centred on men's sport and the re-

maining 19% on women's. However, that 19% of women's media coverage was unanimously successful or positive. That was an interesting statistic. Why shouldn't women's sport be criticised in the same way as men's is?

When they won the 2013 Six Nations however they were inundated with it. Then, after beating New Zealand to make the 2014 World Cup semi-finals, only to be heavily beaten by England,

they found themselves glamorised by still glowing reports, when actually they'd been given a hard beating. "We weren't happy getting beaten like that, against England," she says. 'And some of the media were still describing us as an overnight success when it actually had taken 10 years.

'And there were people before me too who had done so much to develop women's rugby and didn't enjoy any success. But since that World Cup, in 2014, the IRFU has taken on the women's team under the high performance, so they have an all-year programme. We also have autumn internationals now. And they've taken to hosting the 2017 World Cup. So all of that is encouraging, to have something of that context, not just for Irish women's rugby but Irish women's sport."

Opening the conference Minister Ring said: "Today's conference has been a great opportunity to highlight the good work that is happening through the Women in Sport pro-gramme and to reflect on the positive results that have been achieved in recent years where women's participation in sport has grown from 40.9% in 2011 to 42.7% in 2013. This is equivalent to over 750,000 women and girls aged 16 and over participating in sport on a weekly basis

"I am very hopeful that these numbers will continue to rise and that more and more women and girls

can enjoy the health and social benefits that come with participation in sport and physical activity. My department will shortly be undertak-ing a consultation on a new National Sports Policy, following which we will develop a framework for sport for the next ten years, including a framework for further increasing women's participation in sport.

Minister Joan Burton stated: "I'd like to welcome everybody here this morning and say how pleased I am to see this timely and important conference taking place on women's participation in sport. It may seem a bit odd then to start by mentioning the men's Rugby World Cup. But a couple of weeks ago, during TV3's coverage of the quarter-finals of the tournament, they featured Fiona Steed as part of their panel to analyse one of the key games

"I think every woman here today will immediately appreciate the multi-tasking involved there. I think every woman here will welcome the fact that Fiona was on that TV3 panel. 





Unless you win the title, whichever title that may be, you leave yourself open to criticism and comparison. Only an All-Ireland title will do Milford. And John Brudair knows

Milford have been very fortunate to secure three such top managers; the

standards haven't dropped.

Milford, in my opinion, are stronger and better this year than they have ever been. That comes of course with experience, familiarity, strength and conditioning over a long period of time.

With more or less the same backbone, they should be better. Confidence and hunger, of course, are another two key ingredients and they have both.

While Burgess have the extremely talented Emer McDonald still playing at a very high level, they are a relatively young side. 





On Sunday last, as we stood and said a prayer for Peter at his removal still in shock and disbelief, I was waiting for him to any second reprimand me as was my club colleague who stood with me as we expressed our sympathy to

Geraldine laughed as we both relayed to her our last meeting with Peter when both of us let's just say were "not good girls" in Peters eyes, but Geraldine laughed and quickly assured us "A sure what harm was that I am sure he wasn't bothered afterwards'

A lot of stories are told when someone passes away. One of our club mentors recalled she knew Peter had a sweet tooth so every time he came to us to referee she always slipped him a few jellies which he always enjoyed. But it never had a bearing on the game, he treated everybody the same.

Only one nomination will be accepted from each club and the nomination to the County Board must be submitted by the club secretary only. Nominations from clubs will be considered under any or all the following criteria Games Development/Promotion, Administration, Facilities Management/Support and Club Support.

The nomination form should detail the role held by the nominee within the club and the impact of the nominee on the club in developmental terms. Any additional information deemed necessary to support the nomination can also be added.

Clubs are advised to get their nominations into the county board as soon as possible as they will have to notify the National Volunteer and Officer Support Committee in Croke Park of the Cork Award Winner by January 31.

Buckley and Corkery reap reward for their dedication

Women's football and camogie duo each has 16 All-Ireland medals

Taoiseach pays tribute to each of monthly winners for their achievements

Such was this year's broad scale of excellence, there couldn't only be one winner.

So when Briege Corkery and Rena Buckley were both recognised with the Irish Times! Sport Ireland Sportswoman of the Year award for 2015, there couldn't be any complaints ei-

It was entirely fitting given their achievements were simply inseparable: Corkery and Buckley played starring roles in the Cork teams that won both the All-Ireland camogie and women's football titles last September, and with that wrote their names into the annals of Irish sporting history.

It brought their individual All-Ireland medal tallies to 16 six each in camogie and 10 each in football - and no GAA player has ever won more than that.

"You're always wondering who would come up as the winner, so when both our names were called out, it was a shock, to be honest," said Corkery, who was actually the previous outright winner of the award all of 10 years ago.

"I definitely didn't expect it." Buckley agreed entirely: "Sure it's an honour just to be in this room with all these ath-letes," she said. "We're hugely honoured to be in amongst

Their careers have been largely inseparable too, both playing together for the first time as fifth-class primary school students in Cork. Their commitment is equally complete too, and although essentially amateurs (Buckley works full-time as a physiotherapist, Corkery as a dairy farmer), there is simply no let-up in their schedule.

"It would be hectic, I suppose," Corkery told the awards luncheon at Dublin's Shel-bourne Hotel. "Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday is camogie, then Wednesday, Friday, Sunday is football. And on the Monday we both try to turn up to club training, as often as we can.

Cork pair share award following another outstanding year of success

There's a story in Mary White's book Relentless that begins with Rena Buckley driving through Macroom on a Saturday night in 2011. It's just short of midnight and the streets are teeming with the usual post-pub, pre-club crowd. Buckley's eye is caught by two figures moving faster than everyone else down the hill at the far end of the town.

A pair of women in their early 20s, zipping down the foot-path on rollerblades, ducking through the hordes. Steadier on their feet than most of those in Saturday night shoes, they slalom their way through the crowds and finish by skating straight through the front door of the nightclub at the bottom

Next morning, Buckley runs in to Briege Corkery and falls into stitches telling her about the daredevil duo from the night before.

You should have seen them!" she laughs. ""Twas gas!" "Yeah?" replies Corkery with a big smile. "Sure, wasn't I one

of them!" It is not a story that would surprise anyone who has come across either of the joint winners of the 2015 Irish Times/Sport Ireland Sportswoman of the Year Award.

Rena Buckley and Briege Corkery are night and day, just bout as different as people as it is possible to be. Yet they will be forever entwined nonetheless, holders of a record that it's nigh-on impossible ever to see

broken. When they hugged on the pitch at the end of this year's All-Ireland football final victory over Dublin, they became the first players in the history of Gaelic games to reach the milestone of 16 senior intercounty championships. Ten in football, six in camogie, passing the re-cord of 15 held by Dublin camogie player Kay Mills.

Heaving mantelpieces

Mills won her last All-Ireland in 1961 at the age of 38 so her record stood for 54 years. Buckley is still just 28 and Corkery only turned 29 on Wednesday last. Who knows how much longer they'll both play for? Or how many they'll have against their name when the time

comes? Numbers can be blinding but it's worth laying them out here all the same. In terms of titles, they have those 16 All-Irelands

Corkery was Player of the Match in the All-Ireland quarter-final and final in football and scored the winning goal in the camogie final. Buckley was the dominant midfielder of the year in football and didn't concede a single score to the players she marked in the knock-out stages of the camogie championship.

Both of them were All Stars in both codes. To put that achievement in context, only one other player has ever managed to win football and camogie All Stars in the same year, their erstwhile teammate Mary O'Connor. Yet this was Buckley third time to do it and - unbelievably-it was Corkery's fifth.

With neither of them yet turned 30, there's simply no telling where they will end up.

For now, they are the first ever joint winners of the Sportswoman of the Year award. Long may they roll.

ANNA GEARY Fight for what you believe in

WAS having a conversation last week with some friends and the topic of women's sports came up or, rather, the challenges we face.

For some of my non-sporting friends, it fell on deaf ears while others rolled their eyes quietly muttering "not this again".

'The only potential boring thing about this debate is how many times we've heard it. But it needs to be

heard. Again and again.

I remember going to Senior All-Ireland Camogie Finals growing-up. A group of us would be taken every year to experience the atmosphere and to see first-hand the skill and passion in the teams as they ran around Croke Park. It was so exciting to get your picture taken with these players afterwards. These women were, in my eyes, heroic. They were women I wanted to emulate and aspire to be like. I couldn't understand why they were almost unknown in the wider sporting world. This problem still exists today.

There might be a difference in how women compete but does that mean we are inherently different athletes, or inferior athletes? Realistically, there is a difference in size, in strength, in speed perhaps. But not in the skill, commitment,

athleticism or sporting intellect.

Recently, I was at the inaugural event organised by Seifa Ireland, 'Supporting Elite Irish Female Athletes', which was set up to address the increased need for support for our elite Irish sportswomen. On the night, a charity Vintage Couture calendar unveiled 16 powerful and striking athletes. These leaders in their respective sporting fields have the potential power to influence, to inspire and to elicit a change in the perceptions within our society. Yet at the moment, many of them are unknown to most.

These athletes are wonderful role models for everyone, young or old; male or female. They possess the characteristics necessary to succeed in life, not just in sport. That needs to be celebrated. They need to be celebrated.

But how often do you see them? Why does that need to change? Well, to quote one of the core messages of Women's Gaelic Players Association: "If you can't see it, then you can't be it".

Having awards specifically dedicated to women like The Irish Times Sportswoman of the Year awards are not in place with the purpose to segregate sportsmen and sportswomen. introduced because women are seldom chosen above men for awards in the sporting world.

I won't say never, it's just a rare occurrence.
But this has a lot to do with how recognisable
our sportswomen are compared to their male
counterparts. A lot of the time you don't hear
about the sportswomen and their achievements.

Look at women's rugby. People only started to take notice of the incredible Irish Women's rugby team when they defeated the All Blacks in the World Cup in Paris last year. They were doing Trojan work for their country for years prior to that, albeit behind the scenes. To think that same Irish team had no sponsor during their Six Nations Grand Slam-winning season in 2013!

In 2014, I was privileged to win the 96fm/C103 Sportsperson of the Year award for captaining Cork the All-Ireland title. I accepted it on behalf of my fantastic teammates. The award belonged to each of us. I was in shock as I heard my name being announced. Not just because I was honoured - along with Ladies Football Captain Briege Corkery - but because the nominees for this award were both male and female and yet a women still triumphed.

this award were both male and female and yet a women still triumphed.

There were formidable sportsmen nominated too but the judges had the vision to acknowledge that winning senior inter-county All-Ireland titles should get the nod ahead of the rest. That is progress.

Let me throw something out there to women before I finish. Are we our own worst enemy when it comes to sport? Do we support our sportswomen even if we don't play ourselves? Are those of us who don't have interest in sport engaging in the debate or do we care? But what about if you have a daughter or

But what about if you have a daughter or granddaughter in the future and she wants to participate in sport. Perhaps she will be a talented camogie player, hockey or rugby player and have the potential to achieve great things, maybe be an Olympian.

Would you not want her to grow up in a society where she has a chance to train full time as a top class athlete where opportunities are available, regardless of gender?

Excellence is not defined by gender but by itself. If you don't remember anything else, remember that

Relationships at core of sport

HAVE played camogie for over 20 years. I have played on many teams and subsequently had many managers during my camogie career.

When you hear of successful teams, the old age debate ensues: Is the success a result of the talent and dedication of the players, or is due to the shrewdness and strategic genius of the manager?

Look at Brian Cody and the Kilkenny hurling team. There is no question that Brian Cody is a top class manager, but would he be as successful if he didn't have the conveyor belt of talented players at his disposal? Equally, when he steps down as manager, will the Cats continue to get the proverbial cream as frequently?

The importance of a good manager should never be underestimated. In my opinion, a manager's first and foremost responsibility is to develop a closeness to players. They need to look beyond and learn about the person behind each player and that's necessary when trying to motivate individuals to get the best

Also, mutual trust is paramount. All the tactics in the world will not work for a manager unless he or she gets the players to 'buy in'.

We lost three senior county finals with Milford before we won our first title. The personnel on the panel remained - more or less - the same each season. The talent was there, the will to win was there, but we could not get over the finish line.

Each year we placed so much pressure on ourselves to win and it ultimately cost us again and again. It was heartbreaking to fall short so many times. We had lost belief in the capability of our team. Until, that is, we found a new manager in Frank Flannery (the new coach of the Cork Senior Hurlers for 2016).

Frank came to us with fresh ideas and a new way of thinking. He broke the team down and built it back up from scratch. He made us understand and believe that, as individual players, we were strong but, together, we could be unstoppable. It wasn't about 'my hook' nor was it 'my score' - every positive thing we did was for the team.

In his first training session with Milford he told us we would win the Senior Club All-Ireland title if we believed in what he was doing. We thought he was mad. Maybe he was, but it was just what we needed.

Trust became the foundation upon which our squad was built. In that first year, not only did we win the county final with an incredible 27 points to spare, we also went on to win the Munster title and the All-Ireland title for the first time.

It was the most incredible feeling knowing we

did it working as a team. While we were the players on the pitch doing what needed to be done, he was the one that showed us the correct way to do it.

If a player is under-performing, you cannot just assume they're not trying hard enough or not putting in the required effort. You need to look deeper. Alarm bells should be going off if a player starts acting against his or her character. It could be a sick parent, pressure of exams or a challenging time at work but without open and honest communications existing between a manager and player, it's very hard to uncover the truth.

In 2005 I was given my first Championship start with the Cork Senior Team. I was also in sixth year at St Mary's Secondary School in Charleville. I was studying hard for my exams, but no pressure came from the Cork set up. Instead, I was met with understanding and compromise.

This allowed me to give my attention to my exams and then my focus switched entirely to camogie. My manager, John Cronin, gave me the number seven jersey for the first round of Championship only a handful of days after I finished my Leaving Certificate Music exam.

We played Galway in Páirc Uí Rinn and I will never forget the feeling of respect that I had amassed for him. He believed in me and trusted me to do my job that day. In return I trained as hard as I could all season and played my heart out for the team. I won my first Senior All-Ireland medal and All-Star that year.

Lack of confidence in a manger can manifest itself in a fall in team morale or in performance. If a manager loses the dressing room, then they are in trouble. Look at the Chelsea soccer team.

Seven months ago Chelsea were crowned League Champions and Jose Mourinho was at the helm. Now as they lie in 16th place, close to the relegation zone, Jose was left with no choice but to depart Stamford Bridge. Was it the players or was it Mr Mourinho? Blame is irrelevant when there is a problem, the only thing that matters is the solution.

Eamon Ryan took over as Cork ladies football manager in early 2004, and has overseen 10 All-Ireland victories for Cork in 11 seasons. What a remarkable achievement. With Eamon Ryan's move to the Cork Senior Footballers now confirmed, the journey ahead for the ladies footballers will be interesting to follow. How will they fare without him?

This extraordinary group of players have had in Eamon a natural and charismatic leader for over a decade. He exuded a great belief in his players. They, in turn, repaid him with both class and consistency in their performances.

When I think of the word 'team' in sport, it encompasses the entire squad plus management. For me, the letters in the word team stand for 'Together Everyone Achieves More'.

Phil Jackson of the New York Knicks sums it all up: "Good teams become great ones when the members trust each other enough to surrender the 'me' for the 'we'"

The quality of the relationship between a manager and his/her players largely determines if this can become a reality.

'We are by no means the finished article, but we've come a long way'

audie Murray is unable to stand in the middle of the dressing room. It bothers him. A quarter of an hour out from Cork's national league semi-final and Murray's focus, along with that of his players, is distracted by the stream of water pouring through the centre of the dressing-room ceiling.

On a wet Sunday at Kilmallock in April 2013, the Cork senior camogie team edged past Clare to secure their place in the league decider. Not a single drop of hot water is to be got upon their

because the players expect and demand certain standards. It has gone full circle. We have girls coming to team meetings now with notepads whereas I remember going to a meeting a number of years ago, there was a speaker in and

are looking at a close to 15% improvement.

"We had to be patient and give the new girls a chance. If we went out in the first championship game and Orla Cronin is getting cleaned at centre-forward. return to the dressing room and so, aside from the handful of players brave enough to endure a cold shower, the majority slump onto the team bus cold, damp, and dreary.

The Cork manager cuts a disgruntled figure on the journey home. He simply cannot make peace with the secondclass treatment of camogie's elite.

His sister Aoife has been Cork's firstchoice goalkeeper since 2004 and while he'd have heard from her the odd tale or two before taking up the position of manager in the winter of 2011, it wasn't until staring down at the pool of water gathering at his feet in the Kilmallock dressing room that he fully appreciated what inter-county camogie players have come to expect as the norm.

Sipping on his americano during lunch hour in the Kudos restaurant of the Clarion Hotel, Paudie Murray casts an eye over his four years as Cork boss

First mention is not of back-to-back All-Ireland glory, rather his disappointment at how little has changed in the treatment of the game's elite players and the below-par standards accepted by top-brass.

He's lost count of the number of times he's turned into a venue for a league game only to be greeted by "half a foot of grass" inside four poorly drawn white lines. Even more galling, he remarks, is that referees are not obliged to bring their own linesmen for roundrobin league fixtures.

The Cloughduy native has been involved with the Cork intermediate side for the past two years and there has hardly been a single match, league or championship, where neutral linesman were in place.

One intermediate championship game from the 2014 campaign continues to bug him. Two linesman were plucked from outside the fence minutes before throw in. Over the hour, two contentious line balls were contested; a 'home decision' given on both occasions. Cork lost by a point.

This year's All-Ireland senior final was blotted by 28 frees. The decider produced 23 scores; less than half of which arrived from open play. Cork may have departed Jones Rd with the O'Duffy Cup again resting on the front of the

team bus, but Murray has no qualms in admitting it was a poor game, a poor advertisement for the sport.

The All-Ireland final is one of three camogie matches broadcast live on television each year and so, for the majority of GAA enthusiasts, their opinion of the game is based around the 60 minutes they are treated to on September's second Sunday.

Murray wants more championship games broadcast live, but first port of call, he says, must be a dramatic redrawing of the rulebook. This 'no contact' concept infuriates him.

"The rules are farcical," he remarks, straightening in his chair. "Granted, people will give out about referees and I

ation has gone down the road where they are trying to bring in non-contact. Now, when you have 15 on 15 on a pitch, with sticks, well then there has to be contact. It is just impossible not to have contact.

"The way referees are assessed has to be looked at too. I can't understand, with the technology they have today, that every game isn't videoed and then shown to the referee afterwards as opposed to bringing in an assessor who marks the referee during a match. It is only when you sit down and watch the game back that you see the things you missed

"The All-Ireland final was a bad game. The referee did a good job within the rules, but the rules are wrong. You are either going to go completely noncontact or you are going to let the game

Take the All-Ireland semi-final, now that was a cracking game, with plenty of flow. But sure, who saw it? Only the couple hundred that were there. There is a serious problem there. The game needs more exposure. They are going to have to start pumping more money into the promotion of the game."

amogie, calling a spade a spade, rarely finds itself on the back page or at the top of the radio bulletin, and yet three times this summer, much to Murray's dismay, and many more along with him, the Camogie Association was thrust front and centre.

First, there was the furore over the staging of Cork's All-Ireland championship encounter against Offaly and the county's Munster ladies football final against Kerry on the same day, forcing Rena Buckley and Briege Corkery to play two games in the space of five

There followed the coin toss controversy involving Clare and Dublin; not forgetting of course the decision of the Wexford County Board to appeal the result of their All-Ireland semi-final defeat based on a contentious '45 and their anger at the six-minutes of injury time played.

Joanne O'Callaghan was one of Paudie

"I am a member of the St Finbarr's club and we are all one up there. When it comes to fundraising, the ladies side normally bring in the main chunk. And yet we are separating them at national level.

"I have two daughters growing up at the moment. They have a local outlet to play which wasn't there in a lot of places 20 years ago. If there was a small bit of effort put into it, it could be boomtime for camogie as it is a great game to play. It is quite cheap to play too. I have a daughter in gymnastics. Now, that's expensive."

What bothers him, though, more than fixture clashes, a stone-age rulebook, poor television coverage, absent linesman, and cold showers is that camogie players tolerate the second-class treatment. "Go back to the league semi-final in Kilmallock, a big game, and there was literally water pouring through the roof. That is acceptable to the girls. They know no different.

"No one will give you respect. You have to get it. How can you get it if you tolerate that?

"I brought that to the attention of someone in Croke Park and they did nothing about it. We have gone into pitches where the grass is a half a foot long and it is considered acceptable.

The issue with linesmen is acceptable by Croke Park because surely they have to know what is going on. It is something that I have raised on a couple of occasions and nothing has been done about it. It is unfair on the girls.

Standards. High standards, rather. It is the sole currency Paudie Murray deals in. He knows his position, though He is a manager, not an administrator. The standards he has focused on improving over the past four years have been exclusively confined to the Cork camogie panel. As he says himself, they were in desperate need of attention when he stepped into the job in December of 2011.

Cork had not lifted the O'Duffy Cup since 2009. A two-year absence from the toptable hardly represented a crisis. But in Cork, it constituted a

famine

To put it into perspective, one would have to return to the 1985-86 deciders to locate successive finals which did not involve the red and white.

The team's confidence had lagged, preparation was poor, expectation was low, and the collective attitude was simply indifferent. This wasn't the Cork with which he had seen Aoife win four All-Irelands.

We laugh about it now, but we had girls going to concerts on the night before championship

matches 'We had girls coming to training with one hurley, coming to championship

games with one hurley. And if they had two hurleys, the second one was pulled out of the bag, was way too heavy for them, and no grip on it.

"We have come to a situation now where the pressure is on me to deliver

fore'. That wouldn't happen today.

"Take a typical midweek training; Orla Cotter will be there 40 minutes beforehand practising her frees. That didn't happen four-years

"There wasn't a whole pile of them doing gym work four years ago. They are all doing it now. We are by no means the finished article, but they have come a long way."

Murray recalls one training session in Castle Road where a galeforce wind made hurling next to impossible. Those unfortunate enough to have to play into the elements were making little or no ground when strik-

ing.
"Aoife came over and had a right go at management. We told her we didn't control the weather, but this was the kind of standards they had now reached. They wanted everything perfect."

Said mentality contributed to the All-Ireland final win over Kilkenny in 2013, but the stampede to the departure lounge in the subsequent months meant there weren't many predicting a second O'Duffy Cup during his tenure.

When the revolving door eventually ground to a halt last May, the Murray Browne Auctioneers employee had lost six of his finest troops.

First off the carousel were Jenny O'Leary and Joanne O'Callaghan. Once the final whistle had sounded on the 2013 final win, Murray knew he had seen the last of the long-serving pair. Sara Hayes was third to announce her retirement in the days after the final. Then came the conversation with Angela Walsh in November where the dual star revealed she was pregnant with her first child and so would be sitting out the 2014 campaign.

With the right corner-back slot and two positions in the half-forward line to be filled, Murray cast the net far and wide for the following year's league. Starting positions were handed to relative newcomers Lauren Callanan, Leanne O'Sullivan, Méabh Cahalane, and Amy O'Connor

The new-look side fought their way to a league final, but had been found out by half-time; 2-10 to 0-5 they trailed Galway. Two days later and All-Irelandwinning captain Anna Geary was gone. The retiring group had reached six by the close of May with Joanne Casey, a nurse at CUH, unable to commit.

A week out from their opening All-Ireland championship encounter in mid-June and 2013 final player of the match Eimear O'Sullivan ruptured her posterior cruciate ligament.

"There was no point panicking. What was there to be gained from panicking," asks Murray.

"If you were a betting man, though, and were looking at all the players leaving and the young, inexperienced players replacing them, you would say it is going to be extremely difficult.

"I looked at it from the point of view that if each of these new players could improve by 1% in each match come the quarter-final, then we'd have a chance.

"By that stage, you'd have four championship games, two Munster championship games, and six league games under their belt. That is 12 games so you

two players nudged each other saying | the worst thing you could do is take we have heard all this begoing through a bad patch. that player might want to get taken off. They could be saying in their head, 'Will he ever take me out of my misery?' If you leave her on, though, she has to either figure her way out of it or continue to allow herself be cleaned. That is the way I viewed it. I didn't panic.'

The loss of so many experienced players rang true in the group stages as Cork emerged second-best against

both Galway and Wexford. The 0-13 to 0-10 defeat to Wexford at Riverstown in mid-July turned their season.

"I did say to them at the start of the year that it takes a very good team to retain an All-Ireland because most teams who fail to string back-to-back All-Irelands fail because of a lack of hunger. That is a mental thing more than anything else. I questioned after the Wexford game if the hunger was there, if the real desire was there. We all spoke about this after the Wexford game."

Murray received his answer in the three knock-out games that followed; Tipperary, Kilkenny, and Galway put away by margins of 13, 9, and 7 points respectively. Cork's stay atop camogie's summit extended.

rom the All-Ireland matchday squad, 10 of the 14 subs sitting in the Hogan Stand were in their first year with the panel. On the field, Leanne O'Sullivan, Méabh Cahalane, Orla Cronin, Hannah Looney, and Amy O'Connor were playing in their first All-Ireland final. Not bad for a team supposedly in transition.

"The transition phase was overcome by a weekend we spent in Spike Island between league and championship.

With the way things have gone, you get your senior players showing up for training on a Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday. Of the two hours they are training, the girls are probably talking for 10 minutes of them two hours. The getting-to-know period is very small. When you are inside in a tent on a cold Spike Island for 12 hours and the life probably frightened out of you before you go to bed because you have just been told you'll be marching the island at a very late hour, you wouldn't be long in getting to know people then.

Given Cork haven't achieved the three-in-a-row since '72, will Paudie Murray hang around for 2016? Then again, one Murray has already announced her retirement from the intercounty scene. Could another be tempted to follow suit?

The level of time and workrate that goes into this is pretty extraordinary. I am looking at the championship draws and the likelihood is that I will have 10 weekends on the trot from the middle of June to the middle of August, if we keep winning. That is 10 weekends in a bus going somewhere. That doesn't give you much time for family life. Then you have those 6am starts on the exercise bike where the television is on in front of you and you are studying videos of the team and the opposition. It is pretty relentless. There is a three-in-a-row there and that is the carrot. I talk to the girls about loyalty. It mightn't be so great if I walked away."

'We knew that Eamonn couldn't stay training us forever and that this day would come. We knew we'd have to move on at some stage,' Rena told The Southern Star.

'He has given us so much on and off the field over the years, and we are grateful for the time he gave us for so long. I'd like to wish him the very best.

'The challenge now is to win an All-Ireland without Eamonn. It's a big challenge and hopefully we will be up to it.'

Last Saturday night, the dual Cork camogie and ladies' football star was crowned Muskerry Supreme Sports Star of the Year after her exploits in 2015 that saw her win All-Ireland senior medals in both codes, bringing her total haul to a record 16, which she shares with dual teammate Briege Corkery – the inaugural winner of this Muskerry GAA award last year.

'It's a great award to receive and I'm delighted with it,' Rena said.

'This is the second year that this award has been handed out, and Briege won it last year, so it's amazing to think that two females have won the award. It's a huge honour and it was a great occasion.

Gemma is the toughest of all

Our eight-time camogie All-Star columnist ranks her top ten hardest opponents

IT'S a new year, but he's the same old hard taskmaster, as the Sports Ed set another difficult task—to rank my top ten toughest opponents on the camogie field.

This got me thinking. A lot. Finally, I got there, but it was a dif-

finally, I got there, but it was a di ficult selection process.

Each player I have chosen individually stands out in my memory for various different reasons and each one made me slightly jealous that I didn't possess the calibre they displayed on the pitch.

I have played home, abroad and now up in the North, so there may be players you may not know yourself, but following my breakdown of why I dreaded playing against them, you will find yourself learning quite a lot about what they brought to the game and why they are to be admired.

10. Ciara Donnelly (Armagh/Eglish)

I only recently witnessed what this player can actually do on the pitch. Ciara is a member of the Eglish team from Tyrone but plays county camogie with Armagh. We played her club in a challenge game last year a few times and marking her at midfield position was a very difficult task. She could score effortlessly from just inside the halfway mark and could win a game all on her own.

Her speed, her ability to lift her team's performance and her sheer determination really impressed me. She's a name you will hear in the future as Armagh strives to achieve junior All-Ireland honours this year.

Keira Kinahan Murphy (Kilkenny/Sydney Central Coast)

I played alongside Keira in University of Limerick and we won two Ashbourne camogie titles together but when I wasn't playing with her, I had to mark her as we were often paired up in college training. She has pace, athleticism, natural skill and was a very clever marker that could easily dispossess a forward.

Keira also played with Kilkenny seniors for a number of years and we found ourselves often clashing and tackling each other.

Her desire to travel in her early 20s led her to Australia to play with the Sydney Central Coast team. For a year I, again, got the pleasure of playing alongside Keira, but alas we were once again face to face against each other in training, this time in the scorching heat. I can't say I enjoyed these battles

but one thing I can safely say is she pushed me to my limit and improved my game. She is a good friend and is definitely flying the camogie flag high in Australia with her brilliant style of play.

8. Sile Burns (Cork/Barryroe)

My lucky number eight and a name you are all familiar with. She was a stalwart of Cork camogie and an excellent footballer also. Sile will laugh when I say she inflicted a lot of pain on my former club Barryroe, but that was before she thankfully joined us in 2012 – a day that really enriched the community of Barryroe in so many ways.

Síle was a terror to play against and could individually win a game for her former club Rockbán with relative ease. There was one particular game where we played Rockbán in the championship and she scored at least four goals in quick succession at full forward. No matter what we did as a team we couldn't counteract the powerhouse that is Síle Burns.

Proficient off her left and right side she can strike a ball brilliantly and her strength on the ball itself means that she is rarely dispossessed.

7. Pamela Mackey (Cork/Douglas)

Pam is a famous twin and a fiercely determined player who lives for the game. While I played alongside Pam for Cork she was always someone who trained hard and there always seemed to be a friendly competition between herself and her twin sister Katrina. They pushed each other, marked each other and paired up together as much as they were allowed to get away with. They were a great influence on each other.

Pam is a back who rarely gives you a chance to even get a sniff on the ball because of her pace and her touch-tight system of marking. When playing against her at club level she rarely allowed a high scoreline to tot up against her. She is a consistent player with more to come for Cork and club.

6. Claire Grogan (Tipperary/

Claire is a player who has gone down in history as being one of the youngest to ever play at senior inter-county level - she was just 14 years of age when she made her debut with the

Tipperary senior team. She was a part of the Tipp squad who experienced a dominant period in the late 1990s, early 2000s and she certainly was a player I admired.

She had it all: physicality, a natural carrier of the ball, intelligent in play and an excellent free taker. She had the raw ability to destroy her opposition and notch up many scores from her centre half forward position. While she retired at a relatively young age she will remain a name well known in camogic circles.

5. Joanne O'Callaghan (Cork/ Cloughduv)



number of times we trained together and the many conversations we have had about camogie must now run into thousands!

Yet, despite my knowledge of how she plays with her sticky marking, her amazing fast feet on the training ladders and her lightning touch on the ball, it didn't allow me to get the better of her as she marked me on endless occasions. Therese was a

formidable centre back who orchestrated her backline with sheer class. She ended her illustrious career on the biggest of highs when sne finally achieved All-Ireland glory after 16 years of trying.

She was a player who improved year in year out and on her retirement she was the fittest I have ever seen her. Therese was a back any team would love to have in their arsenal

and I was delighted she finally won a senior All-Ireland final when they defeated Kilkenny in the 2013 final.

2. Kate Kelly (Wexford/St lbars)

The list of accolades awarded to this Wexford inter-county star would amaze you. She is the complete athlete with incredible fitness, a motivated mind set and she exudes class when it comes to performing any skill in the camogie game.

Kate is also a well-known voice in the WGPA, which strives to make positive change and support for ladies football and camogie inter-county players.

She is someone I came into contact with many times in All-Ireland finals and at the height of championship seasons. She regularly received player of the match awards and most definitely always got her name on the scoreboard.

One skill that always left me mesmerised was her ability to strike longrange points on the run from the most awkward of angles. She will definitely go down as one of the greats.

1. Gemma O'Connor (Cork/St Finbarrs)

What can I say about this player that hasn't already been said? She makes me proud to be from Cork. She is not only a fantastic camogie player but a unique, one of a kind individual.

If you had Gemma on yo

ur team, you certainly had the best chance of winning but if against her - as I was many times at club level from underage level up - you certainly wouldn't forget it.

I think the first time I ever met Gemma was in her home pitch when we played her club in the league at UI4 level. She was a name everyone was talking about afterwards. For someone so young she displayed excellent ability and never stopped running.

As each year progressed she got stronger, fitter, leaner and developed an inspirational way with words. At training, nobody wanted to be paired up against her as she was always going to beat you in a sprint, overwhelm you in a physical battle and the commitment to getting to a ball first was never mastered more than by her.

Jacobs experience intercounty career highs and lows

While Rory retires with Leinster title, sister Urusula looks to add to four All-Ireland haul

Parallel lives, lived along different lines. Rory Jacob has just recently walked away from it, melting back into civilian life after 14 seasons playing inter-county with Wexford. His sister Ursula is still there, tilting away, the first down payments on her 16th season with the county camogie team already filed.

They are two of four Jacob siblings to have played for Wexford since the late 1990s. Their father is Mick Jacob, three-time All-Star centre back in the 1970s. Brother Michael and sister Helena have had their days as well in the purple and gold. For a few years, all four were engaged in active service at the same time.

"It was just a way of life," says Rory. "You come home in the evening, you pick up the gear bag and you go out and you go to training. You wouldn't see each other maybe only for a quick second before you'd go away out the door.

"You might see each other again before you go to bed and you might have a quick bit of a give out about how things went at training, but that would be the extent of it. The girls were notorious for taking our gear. There's a lot of missing jerseys gone over the years."

In fairness, it would have been strange if that hadn't been the case. Whereas an intercounty hurler can barely find hot press space for training tops and tracky bottoms, a camogie player has to be a lot more penny-wise. Things aren't as bad as they once were, but there's still a fair way to go.

"I never really had a jealousy of what the lads had because I'm pretty easygoing with stuff like that," says Ursula. "As long as there's a decent pitch and you can get a shower afterwards – I don't mind if we're not getting a freshly home-cooked meal afterwards. As long as we get a sandwich or something, I'd be happy enough. I'm not too demanding.

Positive experiences

"Being fair to the camogie board, we generally had good, positive experiences. Maybe when I was starting out things were a bit unprogressive. But the first year I really noticed that there was a level of professionalism and equality between the squads was in 2007, when we won our first All-Ireland. We were looking for better facilities, we were looking for food after training, nice gear — all the stuff that the lads would get. And definitely in the last seven or eight years, things have come on."

You can't miss what you never had, and all that. But looking in from the outside, it strikes her brother that however sanguine camogie players are about it, they're still being short-changed.

"I wouldn't say we were ever treated like kings," says Rory, "but we were never short of anything we needed. If we wanted a bit of gear, we'd get a bit of gear. If we wanted boots, we'd get boots. We were fed after training, we were provided with gyms for training in, and all that. Everything was there to help us.

"Whereas with the girls, they were on their own with things like that. When it came to gear, they never got too much of it. I'd have box full of stuff at home going back 10, 15 years, whereas if Ursula got something, she'd have to hang on to it for a good while. And expenses? I don't think the girls ever got any expenses. That type of thing has to be improved for them.

"The least they deserve is expenses to cover getting to and from training or whatever. They're making money for the Camogie Association and the GAA along the way. Expenses would only be a small thing, but it would help them. Girls are travelling a long way for training and games and that will only last so long if it's costing them money."

Ursula started playing for the county when she was 15, so for the first few years, she was being ferried to and from training. Eventually, though, she made her own way, and through all her years living, studying and working in Waterford, making her own way mostly meant paying her own way. Hurlers get mileage, camogie players don't. Again though, she sees it as a fact of life more than anything.

"Up until recently, I would have been commuting from Waterford to Wexford two or three times a week for training and for games. And look, the county board would do their best to cover some of the cost of that. But I'm understanding too – they're restricted with their funding.

Personal gain

"I'd rather that the team gets the benefit of whatever bit of money is going rather than er the general expenses of the team be helped out than mine. It's my choice to play and I'm not in the game to see what freebies I can get out of it.

"That's the sacrifice and the commitment that you make to it. You recognise that, look, sometimes it does get hard and sometimes you do get to the end of the month and your bank balance isn't looking great. But you reap rewards too — if you're successful, if you win an All-Ireland, it makes it all worthwhile."

On that score, there's no contest. Ursula has won four All-Irelands and has four All-Stars to find room for. Rory retired with a Leinster medal and the thin gruel of a Division Two title to show for his labours.

"From a success point of view, Ursula has won four All-Irelands. You wouldn't be jealous of that exactly, but it would have been something I'd have set out on my career hoping to come close to. I played in big games, but I never got to play in an All-Ireland final. That would have been something that I'd have been envious of, I suppose — that she was on a team that was capable of reaching those heights."

Flipside

Some days similar, some days not. In camogie, you spend a lot more time with your club, even at the height of the inter-county championship. Rory often watched Ursula come home from a championship game with Wexford on a Sunday and shook his head in disbelief as she went out the door to training with Oulart-The-Ballagh on a Monday.

On the flipside, Ursula looks at the way hurling championship is structured for men and wonders how any team is supposed to grow or develop when it all comes tumbling down so quickly once the summer starts. Camogie has a round-robin phase before it gets to pure knockout.

"There would have been hard years where Kilkenny might have been beating them at times and the criticism they were receiving was harsh," she says.


Killimor have the artillery to the knockout stages that saw All-Ireland semi-finals, Killimor make their possession count on the scoreboard.

IF ONE is for history, a second is for validation, then a third is for legacy. These Outart-The Ballagh players are two steps from their legacy being triple All-Ireland Club camogie championship winners.

For every young girl that picks up a huri around the county, the Oulart-The Ballagh reality is their ultimate dream. The Leinster champions now face Cork side Milford at Carriganore on Sunday (2.30 p.m.) in a bid to continue to inspire.

Undoubtedly 2015 was a great year for Oulart-The Ballagh, great but strange nonetheless. It started in stunning fashion, with the second national crown in four years, but ended with a stuttering county final replay win over Rathnure and a miraculous come-from-behind Leinster final victory against St. Vincent's of Dublin.

Will the real Oulart-The Ballagh appear in time for this Sunday's last four clash against the side which won back-to-back All-Irelands between the Wexford club's

pair? They probably couldn't answer that question themselves, but what is for certain is that they still have most of the components that saw them hit those dizzying

The All Stars are still in situ; Ursula Jacob, Mary Leacy and even Una Leacy is pushing for a return from a knee ligament injury, although to expect much if she does play some part is folly given the short time she has been back in light training and the severity of her injury.

The reliables are there - Karen Atkinson, Stacey Redmond, the Kehoe twins, Diane Ryan, Shauna and Louise Sinnott - and can all be counted on for a performance. But it's elsewhere that Oulart-The Ballagh need a little more.

The youngsters have been thrust into the big time for Oulart-The Ballagh in the last few months and they have shown in patches what they are capable of. Bridin and Shauna Redmond, plus the Katies, Murphy and Gallagher, have all played their part but one of them might need to be the heroine if their side is to head to Croke Park on March 6.

In the battle to face either Loughgiel Shamrocks of Antrim or Galway club Killimor, Oulart-The Ballagh otherwise have a clean bill of health. They know how to peak at the right time and reports from training suggest they are ready for the challenge.

Milford know what this type of occasion is all about. They announced themselves on the scene when racing into a 1-12 to nil lead against the then All-Ireland champions in Oulart in 2013. They won that championship and retained it the following year.

In the Munster final the Rebel women butchered Newmarket-on-Fergus by 5-18 to 1-9. They boast several players who have been in and around the county setup, with dynamic midfielder Aisling Thompson and Anna Geary their most recognisable stars.

Three years have passed since the Cork side embarrassed Oulart-The Ballagh on their own patch, and this is the chance to put that horror show to bed, a chance for redemption and to create their legacy. Oulart-The Ballagh can pull it off but expect there to be little in it at the full-time whistle.

Yet it may not be enough against a side that, although getting a fright in the Munster semi-final from Burgess Duharra, trounced Newmarket-on-Fergus 5-18 to 1-9 in the final.

All the recognisable stars are still doing the business for the Cork representatives; Aisling Thompson, Anna Geary, the Watsons, Elaine O'Riordan, and Marie O'Neill.

This fixture is the most mouthwatering tie you could hope to get in camogie circles.

It promises to be a humdinger with no favours asked for or given and little between them at the finish.

Leacy aiming to keep Oulart on course for double joy

It is all happening for Oulart-The Ballagh. The camogic and hurling teams completed a Leinster double before Christmas and now dream of welcoming two AIB All-Ireland trophies by the end of March.

The teams have much in common, although the camogie representatives are further down the road. Mary Leacy and her team-mates have won two AIB All-Ireland camogie titles in the past four seasons, one on either side of the two-in-a-row achieved by their rivals in Sunday's All-Ireland Senior Camogie Club Championship final, Milford.

They also boast a number of players that have won at the highest level with Wexford. Leacy, Karen Atkinson, and Ursula Jacob have all been winning captains. Leacy's younger sister Una, who has played no part in this campaign due to a cruciate knee ligament injury, was the fourth. Leacy was particularly pleased the hurlers ended provincial heartache and identifies with their travails.

"Both of our successes are mirrored off each other," says the recently-married Leacy. "We lost five Leinster finals before we won our first one as well. The difference, probably, was that a lot of us were very, very young, and were coming up against Freshford, who were a very experienced team at the time. The fellas have had some very tough opposition too."

The point is that while defeats like that leave scars, the girls' belief was total, based on the still unmatched five consecutive Feile Division 1 titles from 1998 to 2002. It would come, and it did.

You never forget that breakthrough though, just as the club went ballistic when the hurlers finally ended their torment. "Everyone was so happy for the lads because they've taken so much stick, particularly from within the county. To win five county championships (2009-2013) was some achievement and they were the only team to have ever done it. Like us, they stuck at it."

Ironically, the hurlers are managed by Frank Flannery, the man who masterminded Milford's march to their two All-Ireland successes in 2013 and 2014. "He's kind of keeping his head down. They don't train the nights we're training but in saying that, he's been very supportive over the last few months."

Flannery has moved on but Milford remain serious opposition, having garnered a fourth consecutive Munster title. "We're expecting a very tough, dogged game. It's down to who wants it more."



'I'm not a woman that's an athlete, I'm an athlete'

MOST of you will never have heard of Skylar Diggins.

She's an American basketball star - a starting guard for the Dallas Wings - who has achieved great things. She's a two-time WNBA All-Star, a fivetime USA basketball gold medallist, a four-time college All-American, and a role model for aspiring young sportswomen.

'I'm not a woman that's an athlete, I'm an athlete,' Skylar once said. And I'm 100 per cent in agreement.

That's a positive (and correct) way to look at women in sport today. It's 100 per cent true.

We are athletes, not women who are athletes.

We are living in a time where women are really pushing the boundaries in sport. Women are showcasing what training hard can do and their ability to inspire the world over is becoming quite a regular part of the time we live in.

Skylar is coming back from an ACL injury and she has set herself a target - to become the best in the world. She's talented, confident, committed and inspiring, and a generation of young women look up to her.

Women like our own Katie Taylor and Jessica Ennis are modern sportswomen who have demonstrated their natural talent in sport. They have captured the public imagination and their success is being recognised as it truly should be.

Clearly there are many women in sport who are truly inspiring today, and there were lots of female sportspeople I looked up to and admired when I was growing up.

My heroes weren't given as much recognition as they deserved. They spanned from local camogie players, to national athletes, to world champions and international superstars.

But no matter how much coverage they received in the media or the success they achieved in their chosen sport, they were inspiring to me for various reasons and made me want to try my very hardest in whatever sport I was destined to play.

Back when I was nine or ten, I remember the excitement I felt leading up to the Wimbledon tennis tournament. My brothers, sisters and myself were often found in the local tarmac tennis court in Barryroe, practising day-in day-out like we were about to feature in this famous tournament.

That was the dream - to be a professional tennis player, to be talent-spotted by some visiting professional tennis coach who would admire our ability to smash and volley the ball (with relative ease, I might add!) over the net. We didn't need to be coached, we had raw, natural talent - sure, you can't teach

And I guess that is why Monica Seles really grabbed my attention and admiration all those years ago.

Okay, leaving her annoying 'grunt' to one side for a while, Seles was a figure I truly admired and wanted to be. She was a huge part of my life growing up. I loved watching her in action and her two-handed style of play was so unusual at the time but so effective in her

I didn't know anyone who had a shot as powerful as her and her ground strokes over the ball were a deadly advantage in her game. I used to practice her type of two-handed shot nearly every day in the summer, when it felt like we actually had the feel of the warm summer sun. Remember those days?

They were great times. It was great to get lost in the moment. to dream I actually was Monica Seles. Her speed and agility defeating names like S Sanchez Vicario and Graf (aka my sister, who used one of these names, while I was Seles) always amazed me.

But the main reason I found her inspirational was because she was so determined and tenacious. She went to each ball with guts and tried her very best in each game she played.

And even in defeat she was gracious and accommodating to her fans. For such a young player to have achieved so much I admired her, and the fact that she didn't give up following her shocking stabbing attack in 1993, it showed me that you cannot allow your dreams to dissipate even when life's trials test you to your limit.

who made me feel proud to be -Irish - but more importantly a proud Cork woman - was Sonia O'Sullivan, She is a household name, a sporting legend, who won national, world and European titles.

I will always remember watching her in the Sydney Olympics in 2000 where she was defeated by less than a second in the 5,000m by Romanian Gabriela Szabo.

I was glued to the TV in secondary school where the final was show on a big screen by our teachers in the study hall. I'll never forget the tension in the room as she sprinted her final 200m, her trademark kick when she needed to give it her opponent. There were many lips bitten and teeth gritted that day and despite her narrowly losing out in the end, she will forever remain a true inspiration to me.

She is living proof that hard work pays off and while we don't always win, we can certainly make a lasting impression on

people. What really struck a chord was how she mentally prepared herself to train on her own. It's such a lonely sport and it has to test your mindset.

How did she keep herself so positive and driven all the time? She was such a talented runner so she must have trained extremely hard but the majority of the time she would have been . olo, I find this remarkable. Her mental strength really amazed

It's often difficult to exercise with a group, you can easily convince yourself to drive home instead of stopping off at the gym and it's too easy to have too many chocolate biscuits in the comfort of your own home. But for her to excel at her sport,

27 not out as dual star **Buckley still** clocking up the titles

IT'S some sporting cv — 27 national titles from 35 finals, which averages out at one for every year the popular physiotherapist has been on this planet.

The medal haul includes 14 All-Irelands, nine in football, and Rena has been a dual player for a dozen years, now. Why then has it taken so long to be recognised by this particular stable? Judges, sure what do they know?

Anyway, two minutes from the end of the

Galway game and the sides tied at 0-13 to 1-10, Rena underlined her importance to the Cork cause by popping up to score the winning point, her second of the game.

The Connacht girls became the latest victims of another Cork late, late show after the pair couldn't be separated in a thrilling 3-8 to 1-14 draw in the first game.

"The one thing in the back of my mind was that I didn't want extra-time," says Buckley. "I remember we had the ball out to the side,

but Galway had us blocked off.

"It came across to me and I was able to go in the other direction and create enough space to

"I was about 30m out from goal and it was reaching the stage that someone had to shoot and it fell to me. I wouldn't be noted for scoring so that made it all the more pleasing.

"Galway were down to 14 players at the time and we won the kick-out which allowed us run

down the clock," Rena recalled.

Rena's accuracy clinched her ninth league medal, a remarkable eighth success on the bounce and Cork's 11th in 12 years.

Her versatility is such that Rena has played across every position in defence, apart from goalkeeper, and now forms a formidable midfield partnership with fellow camogie star Briege Corkery. "My favourite positions would be centre-back or midfield."

The one downside, however, was the game clashed with the Munster championship final in camogie between Cork and Tipperary, which t a 4.30 throw-in in Cashel, with the football replay starting three hours later in Portlaoise.

That was very disappointing. Mind you it wasn't the first time it happened because you'd have league clashes, which is understandable

"What normally happens is that I'd play one game and Briege the other, but that was the most serious clash until recently, when it hap-pened again, this time in the championship,

"I suppose everything is based on the import-ance of the game. Back then, the football was a replay of a national final and while the camogie was a Munster final, there's a separate All-Ireland, which is obviously more important.

"It would be very difficult for either of us to have to make the call, but either way it's hugely disappointing, especially as we're 12 years involved with both teams.

"What's even more frustrating is that the situation doesn't appear to have improved at

"You can understand league games clashing, but not at this time of the year, the height of the championship.

"You'd imagine there'd be some compromise by moving one of the games to a Friday night or Sunday," Rena commented.

The commitment shown by all involved with Cork is well documented and Rena wouldn't

have it any other way "Flove playing. I know it means being out six nights of the week whether training or playing.

Gemma was not born with strength and

composure like that.

None of us are. Yes, her training in the Army has helped, but for those who know her, that strength came from her mum

Geraldine was a leader of women, a great character who did everything with a smile and she would have been drilling that sense of self-worth, self-esteem, self-confidence into Gemma and her brother Glenn since they were born.

And Gemma has displayed that courage since she first picked up a hurley many years ago in Scoil Maria Assumpta, Ballyphehane, under the guidance of Mrs Fitzsimmons, then a teacher, now the principal of

She recalls a young Gemma O'Connor, who first tasted success on the camogie field as part of the school's first winning Sciath Na Scol team, that also included her friend and St Finbarr's team mate Lynda O'Con-

"We were honoured to have someone like Gemma start her Camogie career with our school," Mrs Fitzsimons said.

"My earliest memories of Gemma was seeing this tiny stature of a child along with Lynda (O'Connell) tog out for the school team when they were just in second class.

Both of them so small amongst the sixth class girls, however, seeing them get stuck in and hurl like they did, I knew I no longer had to fear them getting hurt.

"I now feared for the opposition," joked

Mrs Fitzsimons.

'We had some great years with the school teams and are very proud of the girls who went onto play at inter-county level, but equally as proud of those who went to join the local clubs having gained a love for the sport through our coaching.

"Clubs like Ballyphehane and St Finbarr's

always provided great opportunities for the kids and this was always great to see as I truly believe sport is so important in a child's life.

"They make life-long friendships and normally lead a healthy and happy lifestyle when involved in sport.

Buckley picked up an Evening Echo Ladies Sports Star award already this year for kicking the winning point in the ladies football league final against Galway. Corkery got the nod this time round by virtue of her goal in the camogie All-Ireland against the Tribe, and another herculean effort in the football decider against Dublin which earned her the TG4 Player of the Match gong.

It almost seems futile to open up the line of questioning by wondering if these All-Ire-lands were sweeter than any of the others. Or indeed how they can be ranked over such a lengthy spell of success?



oife Lane has just completed a year as head of the Women's Gaelic Players Association. Twelve months of lessons learned. How has it been?

Tough. Affirming. Often at the same

"A year on I'm delighted we did it, because it was absolutely the right thing to do. There were tough times but I hope we've proven ourselves to the players, who are the most important

"As for the public - I don't know if we even exist to the wider public, really. "Personally, I work within my own

environment here in the college (Waterford IT) with students and so forth, whereas engaging with the commercial sector, the media, all of that — it's been tough, but I've loved it.'

Case study number one: The camogie controversy, when it looked like the participants in an All-Ireland senior quarter-final would be decided on a coin toss. That pitched Lane into the middle of the maelstrom.

You talk about learning . . . I don't think we dealt with that perfectly but we did the best we could, we represented the players with the best intentions at heart, to support them and to get a positive outcome.

"The outcome was positive enough it wasn't ideal, but what happened was better than what was in place.

"What I found was that people can be very trusting if you're up front with them — not being naive, but being honest and saying, 'I don't know what the answer is', particularly the print

Case study number two: She's generous towards this newspaper but found the media's general apathy towards the WGPA a surprise.

"We struggled to get people interested early on. You nearly had to put stories in people's laps before they'd write them. It was new to me that you had to work hard to make a story, and it

was fine once I learned that. "We worked hard to find stories but we found them, and we probably doubled or trebled the coverage be-

cause we were there There's goodwill once you do the work. We go to events with the GPA, joint scholarship announcements, and I'm never asked a question by a
