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
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



Midfielder Kate Kelly makes a break past Anna Geary of Cork.




■ Wexford's Ursula Jacob sizes up her options against Cork.

# Ladies must regroup after second-half flop to Rebels

Cork 2-16, Wexford 2-7: The worst thing the Wexford Senior camogie team could possibly do is to dwell on the bitter disappointment surrounding their second-half collapse against Cork in this Foras na Gaeilge All-Ireland championship encounter in sun-scorched Wexford Park on Saturday last.

Naturally enough the display will have to be dissected to some extent in a bid to see what went wrong, but the need for a positive approach has never been greater as their do-ordie away clash with Galway on July 30 looms large.

The Wexford players are now faced with a very simple choice. They can either wallow in self-pity and allow a glorious chance of making progress to pass them by, or they can respond to this setback in the best possible way by giving absolutely everything to the cause over the next ten days and rescuing their season on Saturday week next.

There is too much talent and potential in this squad to exit the championship race without even a whimper of protest. Clearly this defeat was a big blow, but all is most certainly not lost and it's important for the players to remember that.

They went down to Cork by a similar margin last year and bounced back with a brave and spirited display when the width of the crossbar denied them an All-Ireland semi-final success against eventual winners, Tipperary.

With Cork qualifying for the last four on the strength of this win, the game with Galway is now a quarter-final clash in effect and the loser will be out. At times like this, the character of any group of players is put to the ultimate test, and I remain convinced that the Wexford ladies can and will redeem themselves.

It's a pity that they flopped on Saturday because it truly was a memorable occasion for camogie in the county. Great credit is due to the County Board officers for doing all in their power to attract a decent attendance, with a skills demonstration by Under-12 players at half-time providing a very colourful spectacle in the brilliant sunshine.

Wexford Park was buzzing like never before for a big camogie match, and the only negative aspect of the day was the result. One clear fact was re-inforced in this game, something which always holds true - you can have all of the training sessions you like, but there is absolutely no substitute for a tough match.

Cork had been pushed to the last by Galway in their championship opener a fortnight earlier before scraping through by 2-8 to 0-13, and they played at a different tempo to Wexford who had been idle since going down narrowly to the same opponents in the league semi-final in early May.

Of course, the threadbare nature of the home side's panel was also highlighted in the second-half when changes were needed but the options were limited. A combination of defections and injuries left mentors Willie Carley, Peggy Kelly and Stella Sinnott with a mere 18 fully-fit players to choose from - the latest blow coming earlier in the week when Evelyn

Quigley was diagnosed with a fractured thumb picked up while playing ladies football.

Team manager Carley was also in the wars when he sustained chest injuries in a fall on Wednesday last, and he looked on gingerly as his charges faded alarmingly after one very bright spell approaching half-time.

There was immediate cause for concern at the throw-in when Kate Kelly went down with a leg injury, but happily she was able to continue after receiving treatment for two minutes. However, the early exchanges lacked the cut and thrust one expected from a game of this nature, with both sides appearing tentative and anxious.

Nearly five minutes had elapsed when Cork captain, Elaine Burke, opened the scoring after a pass from the best player on view, wing-forward Jennifer O'Leary who gave Wexford a torrid time.

Full-back Catherine O'Loughlin then did well to cut out a dangerous delivery from Angela Walsh and earn her second free in quick succession, while netminder Margaret D'Arcy made a smart save from Emer Dillon.

Cork doubled their lead when Rachel Moloney and Angela Walsh combined to present Gemma O'Connor with an opening, but Wexford responded in the twelfth minute.

St. Ibar's colleagues combined for the score, with a centre from Kate Kelly won by Michelle Hearne who tapped it over the bar (0-2 to 0-1).

The point filled the home side with self-belief, and they drew level at the end of the first quarter when Kelly converted a 65-yard free with the wind in her favour after the hard-working Claire O'Connor was impeded.

Wexford then enjoyed a major let-off when Margaret D'Arcy blocked a shot from Elaine Burke but Emer Dillon finished the rebound to the net. The goal was ruled out for a 'square' infringement though, and shortly afterwards the Slaneysiders took the lead for the first time when Kate Kelly converted a '45 (0-3 to 0-2).

It was a temporary advantage, as a short puck-out taken from a training ground routine backfired on Margaret D'Arcy in the 23rd minute. Her low ball to the left flank was cut out by Angela Walsh, and her delivery found the experienced Stephanie Dunlea who had moved from full-forward to the left corner.

She controlled the ball expertly and hammered it home to push last year's beaten All-Ireland finalists into a 1-2 to 0-3 lead. What followed was the best period of the game for Wexford as they showed great spirit to strike an unanswered 1-2 in less than two minutes.

Kate Kelly earned a free which she converted before a golden goal gave the large home support plenty to cheer about. Aoife O'Connor won the resultant Cork puck-out and embarked on a scorching run before picking out her Rathnure club colleague, Lennie Holohan.

Her tricky head-high delivery was batted clear by netminder Aoife Murray, but Mag Kelly was following up and slammed it to the net.

Wexford were briefly flying as Una Leacy set up Ursula Jacob for a point to make it 1-5 to 12 in the 26th minute, although that admirable effort wasn't sustained.

Kate Kelly was narrowly wide from a free before Cork re-grouped and Jernifer O'Leary pulled back two points before the interval - the first from a placed ball before last year's All Star added a fine effort from play after a blistering

Wexford resumed with Orla Hernan moving to right half-back in a bid to keep tabs on O'Leary, while Deirdre Codd was posted at midfield. Ursula Jacob and Lennie Holohan also swapped places on the left flank of the attack, but it was a half to forget as Cork set about sealing that semi-final spot with a sublime display of camogie.

Their half-backs and midfielders shut up shop to such an extent that Wexford didn't even strike a single second-half wide along with their late tally of 1-2 which was registered when the game was well and truly lost.

This was a clear reflection on the lack of chances created rather than good finishing on the home team's part, whereas Cork attacked relentlessly with the elements now in their favour.

The writing was on the wall once Jennifer O'Leary equalised in the fourth minute from a free. Michelle Hearne had a minor chance for a goal denied when her flick on a Kate Kelly delivery was knocked out for a '45.

Kelly returned the sliothar to the danger zone but Lennie Holohan was penalised for being in the square, and the Wexford attacks were few

and far between after that.

The lead Cork point came from Elaine Burke in the 37th minute after a scramble ensued on the '21 when Margaret D'Arcy darted from her goal.

A powerful run and clearance from cornerback Amanda O'Regan then set up Emer Dillon for her opening score before Gemma O'Connor widened the gap to 1-8 to 1-5.

Corner-forwards Mag Kelly and Lennie Holohan were swapped at the other end but the play going into them dried up completely. In contrast, the Wexford backs were faced with wave upon wave of attacks, and the floodgates were always going to open in such warm conditions.

The rampant Jennifer O'Leary struck two points from play before adding one from a free to leave Cork in a commanding 1-11 to 1-5 lead with eleven minutes to go.

Emer Dillon, Angela Walsh and Gernma O'Connor all followed suit before Wexford managed a score for the first time in 27 minutes. It came from a kicked effort by Michelle Hearne after Ursula Jacob had initially won a Margaret D'Arcy clearance, but the Cork response was swift and decisive.

Emer Dillon initially struck her third point before substitute Briege Corkery made it 1-16 to 1-6 shortly after her introduction. The misery was compounded with less than two minutes of normal time left when an Elaine Burke centre was palmed to the net by another new arrival, Sarah O'Donovan.

At least Wexford kept trying and received some small rewards for their efforts. A quick line ball by substitute Michelle O'Leary enabled Kate Kelly to blast home the best goal of the game from long range in added time before Ursula Jacob picked off her second point.

This was Cork's day though, and they will now meet Limerick in the semi-final on August 20, assuming that the Shannonsiders will lose to a hotly-fancied Tipperary in their last group

Wexford may have suffered a reversal on the first part of their journey in search of All-Ireland glory, but they are more than good enough to respond with a win in Galway. It's up to the experienced players to show leadership now and ensure that the heads don't drop, because the Model county ladies are so much better than they suppested on Saturday.

On a very hot July afternoon Tipperary got their All-Ireland campaign off to a winning start with victory over Kilkenny in Nowlan Park.

Although at the final whistle only 4 points separated the sides, reigning All-Ireland champions Tipperary always looked in control of this game and a late goal from Kilkenny's Marie O'Con-

nor reduced Tipperary's lead. Kilkenny had to win to stay in the championship and as a result threw everything at Tipperary from the start. But Tipperary showed their experience and worked hard to claim a deserved victory. Kilkenny's captain Imel-da Kennedy was the first to score with a pointed free but this didn't

unsettle Tipperary who quickly settled into the task ahead. Good passing in the forward line meant that Claire Grogan was picked out and she duly sent the ball neatly over the bar.

Both defences were playing well making scores difficult to come by. For Tipperary Trish O'Halloran was having an impressive game at mid-field covering lots of ground and setting up numerous attacks. While Joanne Ryan popped up in the tenth and eleventh minute with two well-taken scores. Eimear MacDonnell was being tightly marshalled but midway through the opening half she gathered possession got pass her player and pointed.

At the other end Imelda Kennedy pointed her second free

white flag. Kilkenny's Gillian Maher had her hands full marking Deirdre Hughes who posed a constant threat. In the 21st minute Tipperary's captain won a clearance from Therese Brophy and turned before scoring a point. Minutes later Jill Horan pointed from a difficult angle as Tipperary continued to enjoy a good spell. At the break Tipperary led 7 points to 3 with the premier's side final point coming from Sheenea Howard who was working endlessly at centre forward.

Kilkenny came out in the second half determined to narrow Tipperary's lead and did just that with two early points from Imel-da Kennedy. However thanks to some solid defending by all six backs Kilkenny were unable to score again till the 55th minute,

without reply from Joanne Ryan, Jill Horan, Sheena Howard and Claire Grogan, This gave Tipperary a 7 point lead with under 10 minutes to go but a Sinead Millea point was quickly followed by a goal from Marie O'Connor from an unstoppable shot on the edge of the square.

This left only 3 points between the sides on a scoreline of 12 points to 1-06. However Tipperary showed their composure and tenacious defending by Niamh Harkin and Susanne Kelly along with a point from Deirdre Hughes ensured victory. The high temperatures meant the conditions were difficult but both teams overcame this to produce an

exciting game of camogie.

Tipperary's forwards worked very hard throughout the hour and took their scores from difficult angles under pressure while the opposition seemed to find scores harder to come by mainly due to some decisive defending most notably by Sinead Nealon and Susanne Kelly.

At mid-field Tipperary dominated for most of the game with Trish O'Halloran and Angie McDermot linking up well. The management will also be pleased with the fact that all 6 forwards scored but will be aware that tougher challenges lie ahead.

THE Kilkenny Cats got a real bowlful of cream yesterday when they won their first Minor All-Ireland title since 1991, defeating Tipperary 4-7 to 2-7 in the Minor 'A' All-Ireland final in Parnell Park.

Aoife McLoughney started the game well for the Premier, notching 1-1 in the first two minutes, but then the Cats, who tasted defeat in last year's All-Ireland, began to play.

With nine of last year's team available, Kilkenny's experience began to show gradually and after eight minutes player of the match Katie Power got the first of her two goals to level the game at 1-1 each.

Two minutes later centre forward Edwina Keane made it 2-3 to 1-1 for the Cats.

The gap was 2-6 to Tipperary's 1-3 at the break, and on the resumption Kilkenny carried on where they had left off, scoring a third goal seven minutes in, through Katie Power.

The Noresiders took their foot off the accelerator after that and when McLoughney got Tipp's second goal there was only a goal in it.

Tipp fans were on the edge of their seats when referee Fintan McNamara awarded a 13-metre free to their side on the brink of injury time.

McLoughney gave it her all but the Kilkenny defenders saved and cleared.

The Cats raced down-field and Marie Dargan goaled two minutes into added time to make the game safe. Meanwhile, the Minor 'B' final was the best All-Ireland in years, with Of-

faly edging out Armagh 2-14 to 3-9 to take the first ever All-Ireland camogie title to the Faithful county.

Both counties were chasing their first ever All-Ireland title and in Offaly's case it also meant they had won their first ever major camogie title.



### Vera Sheehan

#### Limerick Senior Camogie Team Captain

With the Foras na Gaeilge senior camogie championship now at the knockout stage, HighBall spoke with Limerick captain Vera Sheehan about her county's march to the semi-final. Sheehan, a merchandiser with Lucozade in the Cork/Kerry region, is the most decorated club player in the country bar none. With her native Granagh-Ballingarry she has won three All-Ireland club camogie championships, several Munster club camogie championships and ten county championships, and she has also won national, provincial and county championships with her football club, Donaghmore of Cork.

#### How long have you been playing camogie?

My father used to play hurling so my four sisters and me would have been pucking around in the yard from a young age. All of us played camogie, although two of them have stopped playing. They've settled down,

#### Have you settled down yourself?

No. not yet. (laughs)

#### Did you play under-age with Limerick?

Yes. I played under-16s and minors and Cork were our big rivals. Even though we'd get close to them - we lost a couple of Munster finals by a point or two - we didn't have much under-age success.

#### When did you make your senior debut for Limerick?

I've been playing with Limerick since 1995. In my first year we won the junior All-Ireland and the intermediate All-Ireland the following year. Things seem to have gone downhill for us since then. Tipperary won the intermediate All-Ireland in 1998 and have gone on to win five senior All-Ireland titles. That's the difference.

#### Limerick have qualified for the All-Ireland semi-finals.

Yes, and we beat Kilkenny on the way to that. Everyone else probably saw that as a shock, but we knew ourselves that we had the ability to beat them. That means that we're still involved in the championship until 20 August at least. It's great to get to the semi-finals.

#### What is the team doing differently this year under the new management?

The profile Ger Hegarty has as a former Limerick hurler means that the players respect him. The training sessions are different to what we've been used to and more players are coming to them. That win against Kilkenny has brought players on and hopefully it will do Limerick camogie good. There's only a puck of a ball between the teams in the last four.

#### What's a typical week like for you at the height of the season?

With the county, we're out two, occasionally three, nights a week and have a match at the weekend. The club trains twice during the week and again at the weekend, so I'd be out maybe six times a week. I play football as well, and trying to keep all the managers happy is tough. My social life is curtailed at this time of the year. In fact, I don't have a social life.

#### Limerick have qualified for the All-Ireland semi-final. Can you go on and win the O'Duffy Cup?

There's always hope. It's been a bonus to get to the semi-final and who knows what will happen after that? We'll definitely be trying to build on this for the next year or two.



#### Can anybody stop Tipperary?

They've been around a long time and have been a great team. Fair play to them for getting to where they are now. They can be beaten, but I don't know if it will happen this year or not. Deirdre Hughes is captain this year, so they'll all row in behind her because she's been such a great player for them for so long. It's younger she seems to be getting!

#### You've won club All-Irelands in camogie and football. Tell me about them.

I've won three camogie All-Irelands with the club and two football titles with Donaghmore. I captained the team to the first All-Ireland in 1998 when we beat St Vincent's of Dublin, That was a huge thing for the club. We had won Féile na nGaels and Community Games titles, they were the stepping stones to the All-Ireland, and eight players from those teams played in the first All-Ireland winning

That was the last ever 12-a-side game. Camogie moved to 15-a-side the following season. We lost a few players from our All-Ireland winning team, and we struggled to even get 15, but we managed to win the All-Ireland the following year and claimed backto-back titles. It was a great achievement for such a small club. We thought that things might change for Limerick around then, but it probably doesn't happen

#### You play club football in Cork. How did that come about?

There was no football club near me when I started playing. I went to college with two girls from Donaghmore and they asked me if I wanted to come up and play football. My first ever football game was with the college and I had my two front teeth knocked out and thought I'd give it up, but I persevered and survived.

At the time Donaghmore had just won their first senior county title. I've been with them for seven or eight years and we've won every county title since then, as well as a couple of Munster club titles and two All-Ireland club titles. But last year shows how fortune can change. The year before last I won club All-Irelands in both football and camogie. Last year, we were beaten in both All-Ireland finals, losing the camogie to St Lachtains of Kilkenny by four points and the football to Ballyboden of Dublin by a point on the hooter.

### Hurling folk often claim that playing football dulls a hurler's touch. Have you found that with football and camogie?

No, I think they complement one another. The senior championship in Cork doesn't start until the end of August, which is great because the county camogie has usually been over by then and all I'd have left is the club. This year is different. But I don't find mixing the two codes to be a hindrance.

#### Would you ever consider playing county football with Cork?

I was asked to play senior with Cork last year, but I had to turn them down - I couldn't bring myself to put on a red and white jersey. I'd get shot down in Limerick if they saw me putting on that jersey! Cork are fairly strong in the football now and I'd say they'll win the All-Ireland in the next year or two. They have been winning so many All-Ireland minor titles in recent years, so they definitely have the players.


#### Male footballers and hurlers are benefiting from endorsement deals more than ever. Do you ever see that happening in camogie?

No, not at the moment anyway. Something might happen for teams like Tipperary or Cork around All-Ireland final time, and rightly so. Fair play to them if they do get endorsements. I'd say the players wouldn't mind having something written on their boots if they were paid for it.

### Camogie doesn't get much attention in the media. Is there anything it could do differently to promote itself?

I know they are trying very hard in Croke Park to put camogie matches on before big championship hurling games, but it doesn't seem to be working at the moment. The only exposure camogie gets is All-Ireland finals day, and maybe a couple of days beforehand and a day afterwards. The championship is still in the group stages, and camogie might only get a small paragraph in the newspapers. We put in the same effort as the boys, but I don't know if the coverage will change or not. I'd love to see it change,

# Camogie must sort out fixtures

WHILE the majority of eyes have been focused on the senior A championship these past few weeks with the large volume of exciting ties taking place, the senior B championship is also starting to hot up.

This year for the first time a round robin system was introduced into the B championship again with the intention of giving teams more games. With only nine teams contesting, two groups were formed. Each team play each other once and the top two teams from each group advance to the semi-final.

Section One: Valley Rovers, Eire Og, Carrigaline, Newcestown and St Catherine's. Valley Rovers defeated Eire Og. Carrigaline and Newcestown and are through despite still having to play St Catherine's Catherine's too have emerged victorious in all of their outings and the only deciding factor in their clash with Valley Rovers is to determine who tops the group.

Section Two is not as clear cut. Ballygarvan, Bishopstown, Glen Rovers and Ballinhassig battle it out here. Last year's hot favourites Ballygarvan top the group to date having defeated all three. Bishopstown beat Ballinhassig but Ballinhassig defeated the Glen. Bishopstown and Glen Rovers meet on August 23. If Bishopstown win they advance as runner-up group winners. If Park, Kilkenny at 2pm. Tipperary play the Glen are victorious it will be a three-way play with Ballinhassig.

While the extra games are indeed



welcome and clubs are active far longer the feedback from some is that the competition is like a league and holds little excitement or championship 'sting'. A suggestion of a backdoor system like that in the A Championship which is proving successful, would be preferred.

Ballygarvan are again raging hot favourites to take the title and advance to Senior A status.

The junior A and B competitions also need a revamp. We are still at a first round knockout stage and its unthinkable that one midweek game in early July sees you hang up your boots for another eight months.

The second finalist to line up against Cloughduv in the Senior A County final at the end of August will be known today at approximately 5.15pm.

Inniscarra and Carbery battle it out in Carrigadrohid this afternoon and with Newcestown, a senior B club, making up the majority of the Carbery team it is hard to predict anything but an Inniscarra win.

Cork are back action next weekend, when they take on Limerick at Nowlan Wexford at the same venue at 4pm in a repeat of last year's semi-final.

Of course predicting a Cork annihila-

tion of Limerick is completely going against the grain of how to approach a championship game of any sort but I cannot honestly state on paper that this will be a close encounter. Cork will beat Limerick and comfortably.

Certainly, the squad's training has been hampered these past few weeks with a heavy county championship schedule in progress, so maybe a handy game against Limerick is welcome

I still think the whole club championship has to be looked at. The Cork county board can do little about the situation as it is.

The All-Ireland club camogie finals are typically played towards the end of November: The county champions must be made known to Munster Council by the end of August. There is a couple of weeks for manoeuvring here. August-November gives three months in which to play an All-Ireland semi-final and final. Ok, the majority of September is out with the All-Ireland Camogie final but there is usually two weeks left to play around with here

The other scenario would be to hold the All-Ireland final the following calendar year. I have to admit I think this set up is crazy. I understand why it is so but its still crazy.

By the time the All-Ireland final is played on St Patrick's Day the teams involved have probably at this stage been training for 15 months while the new season has already begun for everybody else. The chances of retaining a county title? Very slim!

WHEN Cork take to the field on Saturday afternoon in Nowlan Park, Kilkenny to face Limerick in this year's All-Ireland senior camogie semi-final, similarities to last Sunday's All-Ireland hurling semi in Croke Park must be to the forefront of the players' minds.

# Kate confident as Wexford face up to huge challenge

THESE ARE heetic times for Kate Kelly, and indeed several of her inter-county colleagues. Tonight (Wednesday) she will be in action with Shelmaliers in the ladies' county senior football championship final against holders Clonee. before trying to recharge her competitive butteries in time for next Saturday's battle with standard-bearers Tipperary in the All-Ireland senior camogie semi-finals. A week later, it will be duty with the ladies' county junior footballers, in the national quarter-finals against Leitrim, the winners of which will be out in the last-four the following weekend.

That is without mentioning the fact that St. Ibar's will be involved in the county senior camogie championship semi-finals too. Such is a demanding schedule for anyone, particularly in terms of physical recuperation. Kate shares this sort of burden with such Shelmaliers/St. Ibar's team-mates as her younger sister Mag, and Michelle Hearne, together with Clonee aces Caroline Murphy and Josie Dwyer, among

Kate wouldn't mind if the schedule was a little more flexible. But, she's enjoying it nevertheless, "It's great," confirms the current camogie All-Star, and leading All-Ireland footballer. "There's really no point in saying. 'It is a pity the way all the fixtures have fallen', we just have to get on with it, and ensure to have our minds right for each challenge: it all comes down to having the right mental attitude, a determination to play each game to the best of your abilities. It (the schedule) is not the most ideal situation. But (after tonight's county football championship decider), we will have 48 hours to recover in time for Saturday's camogie match, and for any athlete, 48 hours should be sufficient time to recover.

Powers-of-recovery are something which Kate and her fellow dual stars have recently proven they have in abundance. After the Wexford senior camogic team were crushed by Cork in the first of the All-Ireland qualifying games in early July.

purple-andgold's chances of claiming victory away to Galway in a subsequent winor-bust fixture were written-off by most observers However, against one of the best organised sides this year, who were just fresh from having captured National League first division crown, Kelly and company returned from the West victorious. A day later, she and her colleagues dual helped Wexford to the Leinster junior ladies' football title. at the expense of Dublin's secondstring.

Returning to the camogic. where Kate, who was one of the few Wexford players to emerge with her reputation very much intact after the 2-16 to 2-7 drubbing at the hands of Cork, was

once again instrumental against Galway, when she, along with Ursula Jacob and Una Leacy, bagged goals inside the last 10 minutes to surprise the championship favourites by 3-6 to 0-7. As a result, Wexford face Tipperary in the lastfour next Saturday, while original title-favourites Galway are left kicking their heels.

Kelly admits that the mood of the camogie dressing-room was as depressed as that of the Wexford supporters in the aftermath of the loss to Cork, a team Wexford ran so closely in the

National League semi-finals just two months earlier. "We honestly felt just like the supporters that day - disillusioned. But we knew we were much better than we had suggested in that performance. People had expected a lot more from us, especially after our results last year, and the year before."

Last year, under the charge of Aidan Breen, Aidan Moran and Kevin Murphy jnr., confidence was restored to Wexford camogie after several years of underachievement, as they pushed

Tipperary, the code's primary force of the modern era, all the way in the National League Division 1 final, before giving the Premier County another huge fright in the All-Ireland semi-finals, when the width of a crossbar eventually separated Wexford famous from a victory. They bowed out by 1-10 to 2-5 that day at Kilkenny, with Tipperary eventually going on to capture their fifth All-Ireland title within the space of six years.

With the discussion still on the recent game against Cork. she continues: "We watched that game on video, and we knew we were bad that day. But we knew we were much better that that too. and we basically going to prove a point (when

playing Galway), that we are still a team to be reckoned with. There is a lot of heart in this team, which is a very positive thing.

Wexford will be rippling with a desire to try to make amends for last year's two near misses against Tipperary when battle between the two recommences in a few days time. But, Kate stresses: "Last year's result (in the All-Ireland semi-final) is far from any Wexford player's mind. This is a totally different year, a whole new ball game. We had our ups-and-downs in the

League. But we have the confidence in ourselves to put it up to Tipperary, and hopefully get one over them.

Still, she must wonder what mighthave-been last year, had team-mate Evelyn Quigley's contact with a free from Kelly found the net instead of the woodwork, "That's true - it could so easily have been us in the final. But it wasn't to be." Leaving the past in the past is clearly something the 25-yearold is eager to do.

On that anything into Tipp's indifferent form in this year's League, where they lost to Kilkenny and Cork, while only managing to beat junior outfit Dublin as they relinquished their League title. "Tipp usually don't bother about the League, instead keeping themselves fresh for the championship. Kate, despite her crazy schedule, intends to be in peak shape too for Saturday's battle.





He stepped down after that disappointment, before helping to recruit Raymie Ryan as his replacement.

Ryan went on to manage Tipperary to the last two All-Ireland senior titles, together with the National League Division 1 title last year. But Raymie moved on after last year's entenary All-Ireland final win over Cork. Cleary then came to McCormack's doorstep. "Michael is involved with the Tipperary Supporters'

Club, and he asked would I be interested in the camogie job," Paddy explains. "At the time, I was still quite eager to take a break from management. But, when the knock came to the door, it was hard to say, 'No'. I was just delighted to get the

"It is difficult to get players to com-mit to the demands of county teams these days. There are multi-stranded issues to be addressed. Players as young as 14 and 15 have to perform at senior level. We have our county final on Friday and will focus in on that. We also look forward to the forthcoming appointment of two regional camogie development officers, one to be based in Limerick," he added.

Notwithstanding the opposition, Cork look revitalised. Once they eased into their stride, they looked very im-pressive. Even the absence of the inured Rena Buckley did not upset the game plan — Jennifer Browne ade-quately filled the void at corner back. Leading 1-9 to 0-1 at the interval,

### What they said

JOHN CRONIN, the Cork manager, had mixed emotions after the game.

While delighted to be in another All-Ireland final he agreed that the opposition could have been better and that they learned nothing from the game.

"It was a complete mismatch," he stated.

"We expected a far tougher game. They were strong and physical, but we matched them for that and that's how we beat them.

"We're in the All-Ireland final and that's what we wanted, that's what we came up here for.

"We've a few weeks now to prepare and with the help of God, everything going well, we'll be ready."

The Limerick team's facial expressions said it all as they despondently left the field.

Emerging from the dressing room some 40 minutes after the game, it was obvious that they had some serious talking to do.

"Cork are a serious team," he said. "But, there is no way I expected the drubbing we got.

"It was going to be a huge task to win the game. We knew that, But we never expected this.

"The key difference for me is the pedigree of the Cork players. The experience and the confidence they

"They need to get used to the intensity of games like today and play with that intensity for 60 minutes," he concluded.

### Three reasons for victory

1. Cork's experience: Heading for their fourth All-Ireland Final appearance in five years, Cork are so experienced when it comes to Championship camogie. They played with an intensity and pace that comes only with years spent at the top. Limerick, on the other hand, have yet to experience an All-Ireland senior final.

2. Strength in depth: Cork have so many positional and personnel options in their squad. The introduction of their five substitutions only widened the gap even further between the two counties on the day. Una O'Donoghue, Sarah O'Donovan and Colette Desmond. when introduced midway through the second-half, scored 2-4 in eight minutes and are pushing hard for a place on All-Ireland Final day.

3. Cork's fitness: Without ever being pushed to the limit, Cork were far superior in the fitness stakes than Limerick. While appearing to be playing at second pace they were still out first to every ball and hunted in packs when not.

Cork defender mopping up. Meadbh Nash burst through at times, but again tried to take too



# Competitions review raises good points

I MENTIONED a few months ago that a National Camogie Competitions Review committee was set up last January.

It was set up to examine the following:

 The format and structure of each inter-county competition.

 The grading and re-grading of players and counties and the present criteria applied.

 The overall aim of the committee was to design competition structures which will facilitate greater participation in inter-county competitions.

The committee engaged in widespread consultation with the membership, seeking the views of managers, coaches and players. This consultation also involved reports and communications on the camogie website, inviting views and expressions of interest.

It was through this medium the committee were best able to understand some of the issues / proposals the members had.

An in-depth analysis of each competition was carried out, taking in the current structures in operation, the strength and weaknesses of same and the key issues to be addressed.

The main issue with the senior championship is the small number of teams participating.

In 2005 the competition was reduced to six teams after Antrim's late withdrawal. The main advantage with the current system is that it is played on a group round-robin series and that teams each have two and three games before qualifying for an All-Ireland semi-final.

The strongest four teams emerge to contest the semis.

While it would be desirable to have more senior counties participating, it is unsatisfactory to have counties just making up numbers who are outclassed and humiliated.

The issue of progression to senior level is a development rather than a structural issue. The structure of competitions below senior level require revision if it is to become conducive to that progression.

One such competition is the junior championship. Players from senior and intermediate counties can play junior provided they are not graded higher.

Players are only graded higher if they win an All-Ireland medal at junior, intermediate or senior level. This effectively means that until a team wins an All-Ireland the same players can play in all grades of championship.

Even when a county wins one of the three All-Irelands the players are re-graded after three

The re-grading is decided at provincial level. Because of the



different standards between provinces, a junior player in Munster is not comparable with a junior player for example in Ulster. The feedback to the committee was that a competition designed to help junior counties has become dominated by the second string teams of senior counties.

The committee recommend the competition is re-designed to cater for the needs of junior counties with a minimum of three games at a group stage which will also incorporate a championship knockout format at the latter stages.

While junior counties have called for senior counties to be omitted from this competition altogether I don't think this should be the case.

If that were to happen, what would become of all our underage inter-county players?

If a minor player didn't make the senior grade does that mean that apart from the intermediate championship they never play inter-county camogie again?

No, the junior championship must exist for senior graded counties also but I do agree that the re-grading of certain star players must be looked into.

The intermediate championship was introduced in 1992 to provide a second tier of competition to help developing counties.

However this never really appealed to anyone and none of the junior counties, with the exception of Tipperary, made any progress during their period in intermediate status. The competition is run on a knockout basis with a low profile final at the home venue of one of the participating teams. Junior counties feel that this championship should hold more prestige and be completely revamped. They are adamant that it should be the second stage for senior counties and not the junior championship.

There was strong support for camogie to align with the other Gaelic codes and move minor to under 18.

The competitions review report submitted last weekend is just that, a report.

It is not the ideas wishes of a few individuals, but a synopsis of much consultation.

These recommendations must be passed at congress and it is there counties can have their final

The competition for the hearts and minds of the young has never been greater.

The need to offer games and fair competition to everyone regardless of ability is crucial.

### Dillon double enough for Rebels

Cork 5-17 Limerick 0-5 CLASSY Cork marched into this years All-Ireland final following an easy victory over Limerick in the Foras na Gaeilge All-Ireland semi-final in Nowlan Park yesterday. The Rebels got off to a dream start and were 1-2 up after six minutes thanks to a goal from a Rachel Moloney long-range free which Emer Dillon finished to the net. Despite playing against the wind Cork added a further three points before Limerick's Eileen O'Brien sent over her side's opening score, a free, in the 16th minute.

Despite the very best efforts of centre-back Michelle Casey, Cork who were defeated in last year's All-Ireland final, showed too much skill for a Limerick team that lacked the experience of the big stage.

### Grogan edges it for Tipperary

Tipperary 1-13 Wexford 1-8 TIPPERARY, who have contested every All Ireland since 1999, got off to a dream start with Emer McDonnell goal after just 33 seconds. They looked very threatening at this stage and went a further point up thanks to a fine Emer McDonnell point almost immediately.

The large Wexford crowd got behind their team and when Kate Kelly hit a goal to tie the game the game at 1-1 each, the excitement was running high and it appeared that Wexford were more and more coming into the game. Tipperary's Claire Grogan sent over four frees before the break to put Tipperary ahead 1-9 to 1-1 at the interval.

Wexford came out in the second half full of bite and seemed to have really upped their game in all sectors especially in the halfbacks where Aine Codd, Oria Hernan, and Claire O'Connor were superb.

Though Tipperary opened a four point lead with seven minutes to go, a golden opportunity for Wexford's Ursula Jacob was brilliantly saved by the Tipperary goalkeeper Jovita Delaney and with it any chance for Wexford.

### Camogie players to see more action as new measures adopted

by Therese O'Callaghan

THE Camogie Association received a welcome injection at the weekend when Central Council unanimously adopted the recommendations of its Competitions Review Committee. The recommendations will take effect in 2006 and will operate as a two year pilot scheme.

1. A restructured junior competition run on a league basis that will ensure a minimum of three games for all counties. A shield and cup competition will also be introduced at this grade.

Senior counties no longer eligible to participate in the junior championship.

 The intermediate competition to be restructured to cater for the second string teams in senior counties. The competition will be run on the same basis as the current senior championship.  The term minor will now refer to U18, in line with the GAA, with a new All-Ireland competition introduced accordingly. The U16 All-Ireland competition will be retained.

5. Two additional divisions will be introduced into the national leagues to cater for weaker counties The senior championship is the one competition not affected by the changes but it is hoped that with these alterations more counties will be competing at senior

level within the next few years.

According to chairperson Bernie McNally who is Director of Social Services, North & West Belfast Trust, the most important thing to achieve through the new structures was to ensure players play more camogie. McNally said, "the biggest problem we found was inter-county camogie finished for the majority of counties in May or June after just one game. Junior counties were also unhappy with

the current grading system. The new structures should ensure these problems will be eliminated."

President of the Association Miriam O'Callaghan said, "we recognised changes needed to be made to our competition structures and we put a strong committee in place, headed by Bernie McNally. We were delighted with the quality of the report and with the unanimous adoption of it by Ardchomhairle."



**CAMOGIE** has announced the appointment of three new fulltime officers, just days after its Central Council agreed revolutionary change to its competition structures.

Current Cork star Mary O'Connor will line out against Tipperary in the upcoming All-Ireland final on September 18 and is also on the Rebels' football team that has reached the semi-finals.

But she is also now one of three new paid camogie 'coaching' appointments which have come about thanks to the Government's special grant aid of €1.5million to hurling this year, with €250,000 of the Sports Council allocation going directly to camogie.

Limerick's Lynn Kelly, formerly a Gaelic Games Officer at the University of Limerick, is the new National Development Co-ordinator while O'Connor and Galway's Caroline Murray — a cousin of Galway hurling star Richie Murry — will be Regional Development Co-ordinators. Michael McClements already fulfills this role in

O'Connor is a former Gaelic promotion officer at Limerick IT and has most recently worked as a Coaching Development Officer with the East Cork GAA Board while Murray is a Sports Science graduate from UL who has played for Galway at all grades.

The appointments come on foot of some radical changes made last weekend, agreed on the recommendations of a high-powered fivewoman 'Competition Review Committee' that included Linda Mellerick (Cork), Germaine Noonan (Dublin), Bernie McNally (Down), Mollie Guinan (Offaly) and Marie O'Brien (Ros-

The most significant of the two-year experi-ments includes the decision to bar counties with senior status from fielding teams in the All-Ireland junior championship, the altering of age-groups so that 'minors' are now under-18 (though U16 will still exist) and the inclusion of two new divisions in the National League for weaker counties.

Rena Buckley, despite carrying an injury, played herself to a standstill while Ger Casey and Trish Murphy tried valiantly to haul Inniscarra back.



## Any Tipperary weakness must be exploited

FOR THE fourth year in a row, its Cork and Tipperary in this year's All-Ireland senior camogie final. Are neutrals getting bored with

Maybe, but at the end of the day, if you want a competitive, great game of camogie then you'd pick these two every time.

September 18 is the day. Who will win this year's final? On Munster championship form, Tipp will. I missed the Munster final. Cork were defeated and friends tell me Tipp played a different brand of camogie to Cork.

Their speed, awareness of their team mate's whereabouts on the pitch and first touch were sublime.

But that was then and this is now. Tipp can be beaten! They are not a perfect team and have weaknesses.

The difference between Cork and Tipp these past few years is that they have played to their strengths

and we have yet to address it. Time and again they use the

same game plan. Their half forward line, typically made up of Noelle Kennedy, Claire Grogan and Joanne Ryan pull Corks half back line way out.

Inside you have arguably the fastest two corner forwards in the country, Emer McDonnell and Jill Horan. At full forward, the deadly Deirdre Hughes who needs just the one chance.

A long low ball into the wide open space in the corners and 90% of the time these two are out first. They gather, turn their marker and head straight for the danger

In the 2003 All-Ireland final McDonnell scored a goal exactly like this and it was the beginning of Cork's downfall.

She did so again last Saturday against Wexford in the semi-final.

Our corner backs do not have the speed to match these two, not many would. The golden rule, even at underage, is not to play from behind. But even starting the sprint at 50/50 Tipp have the edge.

Cork cannot be dragged out on a wide open pitch like Croke Park. They must hold their positions and protect their full-back line. If our centre field and half-forward line have to fall back and come out a bit then so be it.

Cork need to play with aggression. We don't have it. In 2002 when we beat Tipp, we pulled (cleanly) on anything that moved. Be it in the air or down low, no ball or person went unchallenged. After the game Tipp criticised our play, but it wasn't dirty. It was tough. Twelve months later and the roles have reversed.

It is now Tipp who blow us

We are too fancy. Skill alone will not win the All-Ireland.

You have to be tough enough to hold on to possession when you get it and hurt yourself if needs be to dispossess.

Tipperary's midfield is where Cork should capitalise. A line of the pitch Tipp cannot settle. Year in and year out, it changes as Tipp try to find a winning combination. They still don't have it and Cork must take advantage.

Vivienne Harris needs to be the influential player she was a few years ago and up her game to the point where she dictates.

Rachel Moloney, while a trojan worker, needs to toughen up and drive that ball 50 or 60 yards.

Up front, the selectors have work to do. Angela Walsh, while

impressing in her first year in the squad, will not have the strength or experience for Tipp's left half back Therese

Gemma O'Connor, three years ago was the best half-back in the

Last year she was the best centre field player in the country and won an All-Star.

This year, the Cork mentors have slotted her in at centre forward and its just not working.

She is a pale shadow of the player she can be and no matter how the selectors persist in trying to make a forward out of her, her talent is stifled.

She ran herself into the ground in last year's All-Ireland and only for her the losing margin would have been far greater.

Cork need her outfield and I would love to see her in the half back line again or at centre field where Cork can capitalise bursting past players and driving the ball the way only she can.

Ok, maybe they want her there to mark Ciara Gaynor in the final but I wouldn't sacrifice one of my top players for it.

There are other ways around Gaynor's dominance. Cork must put thinking into this final and a

While people say that you should concentrate on getting your own house in order and ignore what the other team are doing, I don't always agree.

Tipp are going for their sixth title in seven years and they have defeated Cork in three finals and one semi-final. Cork need to do more than concentrate on their own preparations.

They need to minimise Tipp's strengths and capitalise on their weaknesses. To do this they must think about it.





# Credit must go to Council for changes

THE Central Council of the Camogie Association has been criticised over the years for not moving with the times. In fact they are still being criticised. Results from change will not happen overnight and we should be aware of that. The association has initiated more change in the past few months than ever. It will take a while for these to come to fruition, years with some, but they have begun and for this the association must be complimented. First and foremost the Competitions Review Committee which I mentioned previously had all its recommendations passed unanimously by Ardchomhairle last weekend. This must be a first; that every recommendation by those on the ground was taken on board. The recommendations were the result of wide consultation with all members and not just the

views of five committee The recommendations will take effect in 2006 and will operate as a two-year pilot scheme. The most important ruling, particularly for junior counties, is that senior counties are no longer eligible to participate in the junior championship. The junior competition will now run on a league basis which will ensure each county gets at least three games The intermediate championship will become more interesting and competitive, becoming the second most important competition for senior counties. The term minor will now refer to an U18 player and opposed to U16. A new minor All-Ireland competition will be introduced and the U16 All-Ireland competition will remain. The National League will introduce two additional divisions to cater for the weaker counties and this is very welcome.

More than anything else we need to promote and develop our game and full credit to Central Council for taking the bull by the horns.

A sports science graduate of UL, Caroline has played camogie at all grades with her county. Finally we are taking action and not a year too soon. Failure to provide your county's team line-out by September 9 team line-out to go to press for September 14 — €250! Failure of a player to pull up their socks or tuck in their jersey for the team photograph or parade -€100 per player! To be fair I'm quite sure the same rules are in place for the hurling and football finals. The fines are there to ensure the highest standards are achieved for the presentation of the finals. ACCORDING to economic gurus, the days protectionism and sentimentality are gone.

Companies must sell their wares on the open market. If your product or service is good enough, then the world will beat a path to your door.

However, if you do not have a competitive price or a perceived value you will fail.

The same is true of sport and sporting organisations. Entertainment value and competitive structures are the sporting equivalent of economic laws.

Entertainment and competition draws the crowds. If the crowds attend, the publicity follows. The publicity generates more crowds, which in turn generates more revenue, and the sport thrives.

Unfortunately, the converse is also true. While tradition is sacred to most sports, sometimes traditions can drag a sport down.

Sky Sports and its involvement with such tradition laden sports such as rugby and cricket has provided some of the great examples of how tradition can be at once maintained and developed to draw in mass audiences that heretofore were unimaginable.

In Ireland, camogie is the latest sport to announce that it is to undergo a major overhaul of its competitive structures.

Beginning next season, the inter-county structures of camogie will change dramatically.

While the senior All-Ireland will remain the same, senior counties will no longer compete in the junior championship. This will be confined to the weaker counties.

The stronger counties will enter their second teams in a intermediate re-organised championship. Other important changes will see the minor grades move from U16, U18 and new tiers will be introduced to the National Leagues to cater for weaker counties.

To make these changes work and to help spread the gospel of carnogie, the Carnogie Association has appointed Lynn Kelly of Limerick to the role of be huge potential to develop the tional Development Coordinator along with Mary O'Connor of Cork and Caroline Murray of Galway as two Regional Development Coordinators.

logy and then with the Limerick County Board.

"I see the job as a challenge," Mary said. "We are effectively starting with a green field site. My job will be to raise the profile of camogie throughout Munster as well as in Kilkenny, Carlow and Wexford.

"While camogie is strong in some of these counties, there are other parts where hardly any camogie is played.

Take Waterford for instance, there are some very strong and well-organised hurling clubs such as Mount Sion and Ballygunner, but camogie is not nearly as strong. There should game in places like these.

"But the job is not just about recruiting new players and teams; there are other aspects of the job too.

'We must look at refereeing and the training and recruiting of new people for this role. We also hope to put coaching committees in place in each county and, leading on from this, the introduction of development squads at underage level.

This will help to raise the standards of camogie and help the newer counties compete with the traditional ones."

At present Mary is busy preparing for an All-Ireland ladies' football semi-final next Saturday and the All-Ireland camogie final on September 18.

As she has successfully man-

aged to weave her camogie and football careers together, I asked her if she felt that camogie and ladies' football, which are controlled by separate organisations, can continue to develop and complement each other in the future.

"I certainly hope so. I would like to think that the organisations are sisters in sport. The two sports have worked reasonably well in Cork up to now although it can be difficult on the players as fixtures sometimes clash. It would be great if the two bodies could work well at national level as it should help both bodies develop."

On the subject of the All-Ireland camogie final, I asked Mary which counties she sees rising from their current status to challenge the Cork and Tipp dominance of recent years.

"Galway is the most likely county to make a breakthrough" she said "They won the National League this year. I thought they would do better in the championship, but I think their inexperience caught up with them.

"Some of the other counties that are likely to do well are Wexford and Limerick. Wexford under-achieved big time this year, probably because their selection is small and a few girls concentrated on football.

"Also Dublin and Clare who have qualified for the junior All-Ireland final have great po-

Mary had some interesting things to say about the local Cork scene.

"The power base in Cork camogle seems to have swung away from the city clubs at present. The city clubs are well organised at underage level but the players seem to drop off when they reach 18 or 19. Some girls move out of Cork to go to college while others just seem to drift away. It's a problem we'll have to look into.

"We've also got to look at the second-level schools situation. There are some very strong schools such as Charleville and Fermoy but there is a need for a lot more activity at this level.

Manpower is a huge problem. Everyone is depending on the goodwill of teachers to organise the games, but that's not fair on them. We will have to look at organising leagues for first and second years that should help introduce more girls to the sport this should develop strong senior school sides in a few years time."

The Camogie Association are lucky that they have people with the ideals and energy of Mary O'Connor interested in developing the game.

If the laws of economic and sporting survival prevail, camogie will continue to provide the sporting public of Ireland with quality sport and entertainment for years to come.
