THE debate has often been raised as to whether county champions in camogie should hold the captaincy of Cork.

When you have an experienced household name, a leader, holding the position it's never an issue that's raised. When it's a player on the fringe of a team it's a different story.

It can also be the case that a particular player is young, shy and the position holds more fear for the individual than honour.

It can in that situation be both detrimental to the captain's performance and to the team. The individual can forfeit the role, state that it's not for them and pass it on, as has happened in the past.

Julia White has the honour of captaining Cork for 2012. She doesn't seem overawed by the title. The fact that she has been on the Cork senior panel since she was 16 is a telling factor. She will be 21-years-of-age next month Julia is modest and grateful for the opportunity and has her views on it.

"It's a huge honour. It was a surprise to be

"I am aware that the only reason I am captain is because of Douglas winning the County Championship last year. Without wanting to sound ungrateful, I think this rule should be changed.

"I am extremely lucky to have the opportunity of captaining Cork and am happy in the position.

"However, there are some older girls on the team that are such natural and inspiring leaders that have never and may never get the chance to captain their county even though they have given years and years of commitment and have all the qualities necessary.

"It just seems a bit of an unfair system. This year our management has helped me out greatly. They have appointed six other team members (Gemma O'Connor, Anna Geary, Jenny O'Leary, Aoife Murray, Emer O'Sullivan and Rena Buckley) as co-leaders, each with their own team of four or five players reporting back to them.

"So really I am not all on my own as captain. I have huge support from the girls and any decisions or meetings etc. are all done collectively as a "team of leaders".

"I think I would find things much more overwhelming without this new system we have going'.



The Cork A panel that won the 13th James Hurley inter-county U14 camogie blitz at Mallow on Saturday June 2. Captain for the final was Aoibhinn Kidney (Tracton). Cork group games saw them win 1-5 to 0-0 against Limerick, 3-2 to 0-2 against Kilkenny and 2-6 to 2-1 against Wexford. "2012 is going well for the personable Douglas girl. Cork regained their national league title after a lapse of five years. It was an important message. Julia agrees.

"I think it was quite important, it has been five years since we won it last. It was good as it was a means of telling ourselves that all the hard training we had done up as far as then was paying off.

"It was like a reward for our efforts in a way, telling us that we were definitely headed in the right direction for September. It was also brilliant to experience the feeling of winning with the team once again; it's a few years since we won our last All-Ireland."

It was obvious that Douglas, having unprecedented underage success, was going to put some great players in Cork's direction. The O'Regan's, the Mackey's and Julia White epitomise the talent Cork have at their disposal. Julia is quick to give credit where it's due. "The reason we were so successful underage is simply because we were lucky enough to have three excellent main trainers; Jimmy O'Mahony, Breda Heffernan and Finbarr O'Donovan. They were with us from when we were about 10 or 11, right up to when we won our last U18 championship.

"The team and panel of girls also remained largely unchanged, we knew each other inside out; spent a lot of our time together both on and off the pitch.

"In 2008 we won the Senior B Championship, beating Valley Rovers in the final and in 2009 we won the Senior A Championship, overcoming an experienced and favoured Barrs team in the final.

"We were quite poor for the following two

years, failing to get further than the semi-final stage. We won the 2011 Championship last year, winning by a margin of one point against Milford, a match that could easily have gone either way."

Presently studying Physical Education and Chemistry in UL Julia is a person that knows what she wants and isn't afraid to take the necessary steps if events stray off course.

"I started studying Mathematical Science in UCC last year after my leaving cert but hated the course immediately and dropped out after three weeks, just in time for a second chance at the CAO. I did volunteer work and then went to Spain to work for a few months to occupy my year out. I absolutely love the course I'm in now."

DERRY'S senior camogs will this Sunday head to Casement Park to take the next step in their effort to regain the Ulster senior title.

The Oak Leaf girls have come out on the wrong side in their recent battles with Antrim, but Derry attacker Karen Kielt is fully confident that her side have got what it takes to turn the tables on the Saffrons.

Derry qualified for the decider thanks to an extra-time win over Down in the semi-final, a stern challenge and a psychological boost which will stand to them as they prepare for Sunday's provincial showdown, and Kielt insists that her side have left no stone unturned in their quest for glory combined with a so far successful 'one game at a time' approach.

"So far everything has gone well for us. We've set out and achieved everything that we set out to do, but we know that the real tests come in championship. John A Mullan has

kept telling us all year that it's all about the next game, and that has served us well so far. This Sunday will be no different. It's our biggest game of the year so far, and we're looking at nothing other than Sunday's Ulster final and going all out for a win."

Derry certainly booked their place in Sunday's final the hard way, coming through a mammoth tussle with Down in the semi-final to eventually emerge victorious by 3-13 to 1-17. Antrim enjoyed a much more straightforward win over Armagh in their semi-final, and Kielt is hopeful that their tough battle with the Mourne girls might well give her side an edge at Casement.

"We had a massive test against Down last time out, and thankfully a few things went our way which saw us emerge victorious. We were two points down with two minutes left to go in normal time, and I think we showed good character to turn it around and force the game to extra time. We were five points down with five minutes to go in extra time which was an even bigger challenge. I think it's a very positive sign of a team that they're able to come through a game like that."

Antrim have been very much the standard-bearers in recent seasons, and attacker Kielt believes that it's high time for her side to reverse the trend. Having already secured National League honours, and with the start of their All-Ireland title tilt just a matter of weeks away, she is in no doubt as to the significance and importance of Sunday's Casement Park clash.

"We haven't beaten Antrim in the championship in a few years now, so it's time for us to get a result. Psychologically it's a big game as we will be facing them just a few weeks down the line in the All-Ireland Intermediate championship again, so it would be nice to get one over on them.

"Last year I don't think we played well, not to our potential, and we've always been missing a few players as well which hasn't helped our cause.

"Two years ago in Glenariffe, we conceded a goal in the last minute and lost the game, so it's those sorts of mistakes which we'll have to cut out if we're going to be successful on Sunday. Hopefully, combined with a little bit of luck, things will go our way."

New rules come into force

New camogie playing rules came into operation on Jun 1.

Among the new guidelines is a rule that will stop players going down injured to break play. How often have we seen a defender go down with an injury just as their opponent is in possession in front of goal and may be about to score?

This happens regularly with many referees automatically stopping play for fear of serious injury, only to discover the injury was not serious at all, and with their hands tied, only a throw in could be awarded.

This led to annoyance amongst players and mentors as play was continually being stopped and momentum lost by the team in possession.

The new rule, it is hoped, will cut out deliberate stoppages as when play is now stopped due to an injury, the team in possession of the sliothar retains possession when play recommences by being granted an



When a team is awarded a free and an opposing player shows dissent, the referee may move the sliothar forward 10 metres.

Another new change is that for league games from under 14 up to and including adult competitions, eight substitutes may now be made.

New format excites Lawlor

Camogie president Aileen Lawlor is predicting an increase in the competitiveness and quality of the championship, which gets underway on Saturday.

There is a new format which will see the introduction of two quarter-finals, while the group stages will be used as a seeding process for the knockout stages.



Jenny O'Leary's eighth pointed free, struck two minutes from full-time, edged Cork ahead of Clare in the county's opening All-Ireland Senior Camogie Championship group game in Newmarket last Saturday.

When the teams met three weeks previously in the Munster final, Clare scored a famous win and were keen to prove that performance wasn't a once off. Cork have already won the 2012 Division 1 league title and have multiple All-Ireland winners in their panel.


Cork know they were lucky to come away with a win.



FOUR Cork camogie legends were honoured from their exploits in Rebel red this week.

Sandie Fitzgibbon, Mary O'Leary, Colette O'Mahony and Cathy Landers were celebrated at the second Bord Gáis Cork Camogie Hall of Fame awards at The Rochestown Park Hotel.

It was a special day for the four former players, and a fitting recognition of their magnificent contribution to Cork camogie.

The four were household names in Cork camogie circles and among the county's greatest ever players. The huge success of Cork teams from the 1970s through to the 1990s, gave the judging panel of former county board presidents Nora Newman, Mary Moran and Sile Golden a huge task, but they came up with four players who were without doubt worthy recipients.

Mary and Nora were selectors on many of the teams in the 70s And 80s, as well as both being former county board officers, while Sile is currently county board secretary and gives huge commitment to the

O'Leary, from Watergrasshill, was a magnificent striker of the ball off her left side. A great opportunist, who grabbed every chance she got, she was also an impeccable free taker and a forward who positioned herself around the edge of the square, where she added the finishing touches to anything within reach.


The lack of goals continued to be a worry and nine points over the hour simply will not win games.

"The likes of Wexford and Cork are very strong and we're chasing to try to get to that physical strength but we're hoping this year that we are up to the standard."

They have taken steps to try to stand toe-to-toe with the likes of Mary Leacy, Una Leacy, Catherine O'Loughlin, Gemma O'Connor and Briege Corkery.

"We're doing a lot of physical work at training with Paul Quigley and going to the gym nights when you're off, getting programmes and doing your own work."

Not that Doherty's slight figure is going to be transformed to such an extent that she will be pursuing a career in bodybuilding.

"Maybe when I finish and retire I might but at the moment I wouldn't be going for them kind of muscles!"

Expelled club feared for kids' well-being

A GAA club has accused the organisers of Feile of failing them following their expulsion from the

Cork club Aghabullogue took part in the Féile na nGael competition in Dublin last weekend and qualified from their group in Division 1 after a long play-off process at approximately 5.45pm on Friday. They were scheduled to play their semi-final 20 miles away at 7pm.

"A medical doctor had very strong concerns with regard to what the girls were being asked to do and made representations about this to two separate Féile officials at that time," a club statement read.

"Two nurses attended one of our players who was in some distress and was subsequently taken to the doctor to receive medical treatment. Amid this scenario, alongside further deteriorating weather conditions, the children's parents present convened a meeting and made a unanimous decision not to allow their children to play any more camogie on Friday evening on the grounds of child welfare, health and safety, and serious concerns for the well-being of their children."

Though the semi-final was moved to 7.30pm, Aghabullogue did not field and their opponents, Davitts of

Galway, were given a walkover.
"We lodged an appeal to allow us to continue in the competition on the grounds that the club was never officially informed that we had been disqualified from the competition. We were granted our appeal in Croke Park at 11.30am, on the Saturday.

"At the appeal, we put forward our position, that it was a totally unreasonable request to ask the girls to play a further match on the Friday

evening.
"We felt we got a very fair, understanding and sympathetic hearing from the Central Appeals Committee.

"The Roinn 1 final was delayed due to the appeal and the hearing went on for three hours. We offered to accommodate the games in any way possible if we were allowed to

Continue in the competition."

But it was defeated on the grounds it had not been lodged within the 15-minute time limit allowed.

"We feel the Feile organisation

failed our girls and us as a club.
"We felt the completion of the competition within the scheduled timeframe was more important to the Féile organisation than the wellbeing of our children.

"All through the weekend we received great support from the Cork Camogie Board, the GAA Cork County Board, fellow Cork clubs and fellow Féile teams present in Dublin and the team received a great reception when they arrived back in the parish on Saturday

THE 2012 Senior Camogie Championship format threw up two surprise victories this past weekend.

Dublin recorded a shock victory over Kilkenny after extra-time while Clare hammered Tipperary to ensure that two fresh faces progress to this weekend's quarter-finals.

Much has been made of the fact that under the new structure a team like Clare, with just one point accumulated from their group phase, has progressed ahead of a team that recorded more victories.

While it appears to have worked against teams that were more successful during the qualification process, it will stand to all concerned in the coming years.

For the past decade there have been the same four to five teams consistently in the mix when it came to the crunch in August.

The championship was stagnating and as a result the ladies football championship, a more competitive affair by comparison, was garnering all the media attention.

Ladies football has thrived in recent years because of an emphasis on exposure in the national media, helped in no small way by a partnership with TG4 which guarantees vis-ibility for the championship throughout the summer.

The camogie association have attempted to redress the balance by teaming up with RTE and negotiating a slot for themselves on the Sunday Game.

Unfortunately the five minutes of exposure between the hurling and football segments cannot compete in terms of exposure with the six-hour marathon of ladies football games being shown on TG4 of a Saturday afternoon.

To compound matters for the camogie association, the junior and intermediate ladies football championships are proving extremely competitive and entertaining which is adding to the feel-good factor associated with the sport.

It naturally helps that it is more feasible, in terms of participation, for players to adapt to football by comparison to camogie.

The skill-set required by players to play camogie at a high level is a stumbling block for counties with a small population of players, it is a time-consuming business and there are no shortcuts.

The new format is allowing the weaker counties a minimum of four championship games in the course of the summer to blood players at the highest level.

This gives these players an opportunity to grade themselves against the top teams, Wexford, Galway, and

While Dublin, Clare and Offaly may have been going in to this championship with rose-tinted glasses, they will know exactly what to expect from next year's championship and can train accordingly, if they have the stamina for it.

Increasing competition for the top teams will keep players of the calibre of Breige Corkery, Gemma O'Connor and Jenny O'Leary in the game for longer.

Poor decision-making, a failure to pass the ball to a player in a better position and hitting wides on the near side have been a feature of the games in the group phase and will have to be stamped out.



Cork camogie team targets championship

This Saturday sees Paudie Murray's senior camogie squad line out against Clare in the All Ireland quarter-final. Despite being defeated by the Banner in the Munster final, Murray is confident. "If we play to our full potential, it will take a very good team to beat us," he told Keith Watterson...

aving lost to Clare in the Munster senior camogie final by two points, and only scraping past the Banner by a single point in the opening game of the All Ireland championship on June 23rd, Cork camogie manager Paudie Murray is fully aware of the challenge presented by Clare tomorrow in the All Ireland quarter-final.

"The mood is good. It's good to play in Páire Uí Chaoimh, which is the home advantage, and it's also among the best playing surfaces in Ireland, which suits our style of open, fast hurling. We would look on ourselves as very fit and very fast, and the bigger and better the pitch, the better will be our standard of play," he says.

"But Clare are very aggressive and committed. They play an 'in your face' type of camogie that we have got to equal. We have to match that aggression. Clare have developed substantially, and even last year, we found it difficult to beat them. This year, we lost the Munster final to them, and only beat them by a point in the opening championship game," Murray adds.

"We would look on ourselves as very fit and very fast, and the bigger and better the pitch, the better our standard of play."

Paudie Murray Manager However, while not giving anything away about the team that will take to the pitch at Páirc Uí Chaoimh tomorrow at 2pm, Murray says observers should not take Cork's performances in the most recent games against Clare as any benchmark.

"We were short some players due to club activities, exams and injury, and it was a terrible night on a pitch-The Ragg in Tipperary-that wasn't suited to our style. I thought that by our standards we were poor, not matching Clare's aggression and commitment. But even then we were beaten only by a point. In the championship opener, I thought we played well enough. However, we conceded two easy goals and made life difficult for ourselves," he recalled, of a match that ended 0-16 to

Murray says it is Clare who should most resist any temptation to regard the teams' most recent encounters as a blueprint for Páire Uí Chaoimh tomorrow.

"Remember, we're a new management team this year, and it has taken us time to get to know the players and the best combinations. I think we are getting very close to a settled side, but we are still working out the best combinations, and the Cork team that played the first round match will not be the same as the line-up for Saturday," he said.

The start to Cork's championship was rocky, with that narrow victory over Clare followed by a 0-14 to 0-9 defeat to Wexford on June 30th, before successive victories over Offaly (4-20 to 1-5) and Kilkenny (2-15 to 1-7), and a 1-13 to 0-9 defeat of Tipperary in the play-offs, to take them to tomorrow's quarter-final.

As the season has progressed, Paudie Murray has discerned a ramping up of the intensity of his players, especially in training, and in particular following their defeat by Wexford in June.

"Since then, I've noticed a big change in the focus of the girls, and training is where you notice it most. It's been really noticeable at the past three training sessions. Some of the girls have been at this level before, too, and that helps the team, but I believe all the girls could not be any more aware of the seriousness and the importance of training at this level. We're at a stage now where they know what is expected of them, in training and on the field," he reveals.

Murray refused to make any prediction on the outcome of tomorrow's match, saying that all thoughts are fixed on Clare. "The way I'm looking at it, I see a possible three All Ireland finals ahead of us. We have to treat each one of those remaining championship matches as a final. I find that's the best way to motivate the team and sharpen the minds, and we've been doing it throughout the championship. And by treating each round as the final, hopefully when we get there, we can't be any better prepared," he said.

"I am confident, but I think that's the only way that you can go into games at this level. I won't make any predictions, but what I will say is this: if we play to our full potential, it will take a very good team to beat us. And if we do play like that, and we are beaten, well, there is nothing more that can be done," he concluded.

CLARE face their biggest test since entering the senior ranks in 2007 tomorrow when they take on Cork in Páirc Uí Chaoimh.

Cork looked tired against Tipp two weeks ago. Justifiably so. Despite the club games played in the earlier part of last week they should be that bit fresher

And they'll need to be. Just two weeks away from an All-Ireland semi-final, Cork would really want to be closing this game out comfortably.

Home venue is an advantage. Heading to Clare for this one would have been a concern. Cork need to peak now; there are no second chances. They can't wait for Nowlan or Croke Park. They may not get there it all hinges on tomorrow.

In hindsight, Cork's loss to and close encounter with Clare in the Munster final and championship opener should be of benefit now. Surely the players won't take Clare for granted. The Clare of old is gone; we now have a young, eager, no fears side champing at the bit for further success.

Cork 1-10 Clare 0-10

CLARE'S thrilling journey through the All-Ireland series finally came to an end on Saturday afternoon in Páirc uí Chaoimh with a three point reverse to the home side.

This was the third meeting of these sides this year and with each having a win out of the previous encounters, both fancied their chances in a game that pitted the National League champions versus Munster Senior Championship holders. Cork, playing with the aid of a strong wind in the opening half, quickly got into their stride and were first to get on the scoreboard with a point from Joanne Casey.

A Chloe Morey long range free levelled matters for the Banner side with five minutes played. In a tight opening period, both sides battled hard and with Jennifer O'Leary and Fiona Lafferty accounting for the next two scores, the sides remained locked together by the ten minute mark.

Cork had the opportunity of a goal in the 17th minute, having been awarded a penalty as the Clare defence were penalised for being overzealous in defending against Sile Burns as she tried to go through for goal.

Cork goalkeeper Aoife Murray was called to strike for goal but instead sent her shot blazing over the bar. Still, Cork added another three points, O'Leary with two frees and Katie Buckley from play, in the remainder of the half. With the Cork defence keeping a tight rein on Considine, she did well to get the pass to Niki Kaiser who in turn fed the unmarked Naomi Carroll to point from 30 metres. O'Leary was on target on target for the Leesiders with a free in the 35th minute to keep Cork in front by four points.

The deciding moment came only three minutes later when Cork raided for the only goal of the game. Denise Lynch, having pulled off a great save on the original shot, was dispossessed as she came away with the clearance and it was Katriona Mackey who sent her shot to the back of the Clare net. Mackey added another point to extend the Cork lead to eight points a minute later and while there was still ample time, it was certainly a steep mountain for Clare to climb.

To their credit, Clare responded well and fought back admirably when laying siege in Cork territory for the remainder. Three points from frees—Claire McMahon (2) and Morey with one of her trademark long range shots, narrowed the deficit to five. A long break in play ensued for treatment to Cork's Pamela Mackey, which saw the Douglas player eventually



stretchered off the field, leaving O'Leary to point from a free for Cork's last score of the game. Clare continued to attack, and with two more frees from Morey, the gap narrowed to four points. 30 years ago in Ballinasloe, Dublin overcame Galway to capture the U16 All-Ireland title. Three decades later - different location, same team same result. A wonderful All-Ireland title and long after the game was over, Dub fans, players, mentors, families were still on the O'Connor Park sod savouring the occasion.



To win All-Irelands you need a team capable of winning; prepared to put in the hours; good coaching and management and a few breaks on the day. For once the whole

scenario fell into place for Dublin.

This side is laden with talent and fiercely committed to the game. They have put in countless hours and miles over the past four years in pursuit of excellence and they got their reward. The management of Paul Beecher, Stephen Hoary, Ciarán Hayes and Eimear Butler has been painstaking in their preparation and the performance demonstrated their work. Great teamplay, intelligent use of the ball and astute tactics all hallmarks of a well-prepared team.

The few breaks were also important but in most games you make your own luck so they are not to be overstated. Nevertheless they played their part. For instance - Galway attacked from the throw-in and aided by the slight breeze they had the first three assaults on the Dublin goals in the opening four minutes - all came to naught. Dublin make their first raid into Galway territory in the fifth minute and Orla Beagan taps over the first of her personal tally of 1-3. Two minutes later Aoife Molloy takes a pass from very hard-working Martha O'Donoghue and Dublin are two points to the good.

Dublin are in full flow now and Tara O'Flaherty keeps the ball in play and from the tightest of angles sticks the ball in the net. Next up Aisling O'Leary places Orla Beagan for a point before the superb Doireann Mullanney parts to Aoife Molloy who points for the second time. Five minutes of superb play and Dublin lead by 1-4 to nil after 10 minutes.

Fast forward to the 16th minute of the second half. Galway are fighting tooth and nail to deny Dublin. The Dublin defence is defending heroically. Galway win a free. The excellent Emma Helebert lines up - another point will leave just a single goal between the sides and the initiative will be with the Westerners. The ball slips wide - Dublin still four to the good. Doireann Mullanney wins the puckout, Aoife Molloy sends it on the full-forward Aisling O'Leary who palms to the net. Dublin go for the kill. The magnificent Orla Beagan secures the puckout and drives the ball into space behind the full-back, Aisling O'Leary sees her chance and first times to the net. In the space of two minutes Dublin have gone from 4 to 10 points clear - game over (more or less).

It was a pivotal moment but in truth Dublin had the edge in most departments. None more so than at full and centre backs. Tradition has it that these spots should be filled by players blessed with a lot of centimetres but not in Dublin. Niamh Byrne and Annemarie Courtney conceded height but in skill, striking, positioning and their first to the ball approach they were not bettered. An outstanding performance.

CYC Games

HE CYC games held from July 25th to 29th in Gaelic Park, Chicago were attended by 2,000 children who played in all three codes, Hurling, Camogie and Football, on eight dedicated pitches set over a magnificent 62 acre site.

Teams from New York, Boston, Philadelphia, San Francisco, Buffalo, Connecticut, Toronto and Chicago took part. While Camogie is in its infancy at the CYC games, it has grown considerably since its debut in 2009 and ten camogie teams took part in the 2012 event, with games played with huge degrees of skill at U8, U10, U12 and U14 level.

The work of the coaches and the mentors was quite evident on the playing fields and it was fantastic to witness the national games played with such pride and passion.

The International CYC committee, chaired by John O'Flynn and the Chicago CYC committee were tremendous in organising this event with enormous attention to detail, ensuring that it was a hugely positive and enjoyable experience for all involved.

One of the major highlights of the tournament was the huge family involvement. While the venue of the CYC games changes each year, families plan their annual holidays to coincide with the event, with many driving long hours and incurring large expense to reach the CYC destination. Stories from this year's CYC range from one family from Boston undergoing a 14 hour trip with five children and two parents in the car while

another such tale was of a family driving I hours from Philadelphia for the event.

Over the course of the CYC tournamen 2,000 children from the ages of 6 to 18 year took part playing all three codes- Camogie Football and Hurling – with 438 games played in total.

These children have inherited their Gaeligames passion from their Irish parents and grandparents who immigrated to the Statesome years ago. It is not just a link for the children to their Irish roots, but also as important element for their parents to remain connected to their native culture.

A special thanks to the three camogic referees Catherine McNamara from Clare Jordan Hynds from Down (who were in Chicago for the summer) and Annie Redmond (Chicago) who officiated excellently over the course of the tournament.

The CYC games were also attended by the President of the Camogie Association Aileen Lawlor: Liam O'Neill, President of the GAA and Pat Quill, President of the Ladies Football Association. It is recognition of the huge esteem in which the CYC Games are held, that all three codes were officially represented, while it further underlines the commitment to assisting with the coaching and development of the games in the US and also acknowledges the huge work that has been done to date.





I genuinely got the impression last weekend that for many of the players it was a case of 'if I win this ball I win it, if I don't, I don't; no harm done'. Of course the players won't agree with me at all, but actions speak.

Maybe the players are too young nowadays. Maybe they don't realise the honour of what they're wearing on their back. Maybe they haven't sacrificed enough to want this All-Ireland title more than anything else. Is that

Sometimes I think that is the problem, but then I remember losing an All-Ireland final at 23 years of age and being genuinely upset for over three months. That was young. It was only when we resumed training for the following season's campaign that I put it behind me

The players need to take responsibility on the field and over the years there has been too much finger-pointing when things haven't gone right. Yes there are times when the management and training has been poor, but there are many when there is nothing wrong from a preparation point of view and it's the players who have failed to deliver, nothing more.

Make no mistake but that the team which wants it the most will win the semi-final next Saturday. It's a victory apiece between Cork and Galway this year. I expect Cork to either change the direction of their play next Saturday or start Katrina Mackey at centre forward.

It was only when placed there last week that Cork got to grips with the Clare challenge. Mackey excelled once fed and had a direct hand in 1-3 within eight minutes of the second half. Today's semi-final is 50/50.

My earliest memory goes back to 1996 when Galway defeated Cork in the All-Ireland final when we were hot favourites to claim back to back titles but lost 4-8 to 1-15.

We were six points up heading towards half time when Denise Gilligan goaled and Sharon Glynn pointed to leave just two between the sides. Galway hit the net three further times in the second half and in truth is was a dismal performance by us. Nothing went right for us on the day, from a number of players playing below par to having an off day from placed balls. The scenes of jubilation from Galway, having secured their first senior All Ireland title, tore at us all while we stood on the pitch waiting the presentation. Galway were ecstatic and rightly so. In fact Galway celebrated that victory for 12 months - until Cork gained sweet revenge in '97 and '98

The pain of '96 was still there in '97 and we couldn't wait to meet Galway again. We both ended up in the final and it was exactly what Cork wanted, winning 0-15 to 2-5.

On a wintry September day in '98, with driving wind and rain we again emerged victorious and this victory really stands out in my mind. It was a titanic battle, one which we were struggling to cope with until Irene O'Keeffe struck two goals in the first half. Playing against the dreadful elements in the second half we dug deep and it was a performance of grit and determination which saw us finish on the right side of the 2-13 to 0-15 scoreline.

Cork again had the measure of Galway in the 2008 final: 2-10 to 1-8.

It took two Sile Burns' frees in the fifty seventh and eight minutes to pull Cork back level in the 2010 All Ireland semi-final after they had led by four entering the last quarter. In a game that had the large crowd on the edge of their





A step too far for Offaly?

T IS the quintessential David versus Goliath clash.

In one corner you have the dominant force in camogie chasing a three-in-row and containing some of the greatest players to

Standing just as proudly in the other, is a county appearing in an All-Ireland senior semi-final having scorched up the rankings from Premier Junior.

Of course, Offaly aren't junior now. Their progress in the intervening period is staggering. That championship was annexed in 2009 and the intermediate crown followed 12 months later.

In just their second season of senior fare, they have established themselves as one of the country's top four teams. Supreme talents such as Elaine Dermody, Siobhán Flannery and Arlene Watkins are being exposed to a larger and very appreciative demographic.

John Troy took over from Joachim Kelly as manager this year and has maintained his former team-mate's good work.

When they beat Kilkenny in the Leinster semi-final earlier this year, Troy equated it with the breakthrough success of Offaly's male flag-bearers as they overcame Kilkenny in the 1980 provincial decider.

Mick Spain was a selector on that neverto-be-forgotten occasion and is Troy's right-hand man with this unit. He told Troy that he derived as much satisfaction from reaching the Leinster final with this team as he did from that historic success 32 years ago

Wexford prevailed in the Leinster final, but only after a very strong effort by Offaly. In the end, || Doyle's charges - laden with Celtic Crosses and All-Stars - had five points in hand. Given that the margin was 20 when they met in the league at the end of February, it was a very notable effort.

It kick-started a run that included a repeat victory over Kilkenny to secure a quarterfinal spot and they edged Dublin by a point in

a thriller to cement a spot in the last four. Having secured the direct route to the semi-finals. Wexford will be playing their first game in five weeks, and that was a heavy defeat to old rivals Galway.

It would be unwise to read too much into that though, as this experienced outfit is accustomed to doing just enough in the round-robin stages. Indeed they have lost to Galway early on a few times now but it is the results of the last two All-Ireland finals that count.

And that is the key point about Wexford. They know how to win when it matters. although losing the league final which they were looking to win for a fourth year in a row was the first chink in that regard.





It could all have been so different for the Tribe. On nine minutes, following a brilliant point by Veronica Curtin, they looked confident leaders at 0-6 to


However, their failure to again in the first half, plus a Briege Corkery goal on 22 minutes, earned Cork an unlikely half-time lead of 1-8 to 0-8.

LIKE a dam finally bursting its walls, Cork unleashed weeks of pent-up frustration with a dazzling display of desire, passion and guts to book their place in the All-Ireland senior camogie final on September 16.

This was a terrific contest, the second half in particular, where great defending, a bit of luck and great goals gave the spectators a memorable afternoon.

Cork needed to fire on all cylinders to overcome the All Ireland finalists of the past two seasons. Playing with a nice wind it took 13 minutes for them to settle.

Cork trailed 0-6 to 0-2 after nine minutes as Galway, first to the ball and delivering the near perfect pass into their sharp forwards, picked off some majestic points. Cork's play wasn't as fluent but slowly they started to relax

Jennifer O'Leary, free, and Sile Burns struck over, Aislinn Connolly replied with a point with Gemma O'Connor matching it as the play flowed end to end.

On 16 minutes Galway's Niamh McGrath struck Galway's eighth point and they were on song but their failure to score for the remainder of the half will mystify them. They fell apart, their confident game plan up to then falling by the wayside as soon as Cork applied the pressure.

Briege Corkery's brilliant goal on 21 minutes gave Cork the lead for the first time, a lead which they never relinquished. Two further points from Corkery and O'Leary (f) gave Cork a three-point advantage entering the dressing room.



Ward's charges fail to deliver after making great start against Cork

OH dear. Galway camogie has seen many a black day in its long litany of frustrating chronicles, but this must surely rank among them as one of the most trying defeats out-of-sorts Tribeswomen self-destructed against a more streetwise

It was certainly not an easy day being a Galway supporter in Nowlan Park on Saturday as the harsh reality sunk in that the Westerners would not be returning to Croker for a third successive year.

Crucial to note, however, is that it was not Cork who denied Galway a September showdown with Wexford or a chance to bridge a 16 year gap to the county's last O'Duffy Cup success - no, the Galway players were fully responsible for their own downfall on this occasion.

There were plenty ifs and buts about this All-Ireland semi-final loss, not least a rudderless forward unit which squandered a handful of guiltedge goal openings, but on the balance of the hour's play, Cork were deserving of their victory as they completely outgunned Galway in terms of sheer desire to win and attacking know-how.

Not surprisingly, postmortems were in full flow in the immediate aftermath of the game and no doubt, many more were conducted this week, but why Galway came

out second best lay in the fact that they delivered a sub-standard, error-ridden perform-

Things like clearances out of defence going astray, an inability to win primary possession around the middle, the pickpocketing of Galway defenders close to Susan Earner's goal and five clear-cut goal chances being spurned, all cost Galway dearly in the end.

Added to this, too many of the players were found wanting over the hour. It really says something that aside from the hard-working Niamh Kilkenny, whose two second half points were of the highest order, Galway's top performers were two players who have given over 15 years service in the maroon and white.

One can only hope that we haven't seen the last of Veronica Curtin and, in particular, Therese Maher, but it must be soul destroying to exhaust every last ounce of energy and effort for the cause, while others all around you were content to hide in the wings.

Overall, it was a disjointed Galway display, particularly as they had controlled this contest early on. By the 10th minute, Tony Ward's charges led 0-6 to 0-2, with Niamh McGrath (2), Curtin (2), Martina Conroy and Orla Kilkenny finding the range.

Jenny O'Leary's accuracy from both play and frees proved a lifeline for Cork in the opening quarter, but Galway continued to hold the upper-hand and Aislinn Connolly clipped over a neat point to make it 0-7 to 0-4 after 16

Though Galway bossed the



against Cork.

opening exchanges, the key period, arguably, was the 13 minutes leading up to half-time when Cork hit 1-4 in reply to just a solitary minor from the Tribeswomen to take a 1-8 to 0-8 interval lead.

Gemma O'Connor initiated that sequence with an absolute belter from distance and though Niamh McGrath (free) issued an instant response, Cork were beginning to play with more confidence and

A second O'Leary free narrowed the gap before the menacing Briege Corkery picked the pocket of full-back Sarah Dervan to fire past a hapless Susan Earner in the Galway goal. There was no doubting that the defence were at fault, but it beggared belief how referee Alan Lagrue did not award Galway a free when Orla Kilkenny was pushed -

clearly so - by Jenny Duffy at the other end. The corner back got off scot free and the sliotar was moved down the field where Corkery profited amid atrocious Galway defending.

It was some turnaround given Galway's blistering start, but one always felt that if Ward's charges could breach the Cork defence for a goal they had the potential to post a match winning score. The attack, however, were not at their most obliging, failing to capitalise on a whole host of opportunities.

First, Brenda Hanney superbly fielded Martina Conroy's probing delivery on 30 minutes, but the wing-forward was descended upon by Rena Buckley just as she was about to pull the trigger, while in the ensuing passage of play, Veronica Curtin - after showing a great burst of pace in the right

corner - blasted straight at found themselves unmarked Aoife Murray.

Eleven minutes into the second half, Galway were to miss the goal target for a third time in the match when a Niamh Kilkenny delivery broke inside to the unmarked Curtin, but failing to make clean connection the effort of the Kinvara stickwoman dribbled harmlessly wide.

As it was, Katriona Mackey and Sile Burns traded efforts with Niamh Kilkenny and when Connolly and Curtin popped over successive points to narrow the deficit to the minimum, 1-10 to 0-12, the pendulum had swung firmly back in Galway's favour.

Galway could have even leed in front on 48 minutes galloped when Hanney through the Cork cover and with Curtin unmarked on the edge of the square, all that was required was a simple handpass. But just as they did all afternoon, Galway baulked in front of goal and Hanney's attempted pass didn't find its

In the remaining ten minutes, Galway failed to raise another flag as Cork ignited one final energy surge to comfortably take them over the line. Jenny O'Leary carved open the Galway rearguard with a scorching run, offloading to Katriona Mackey who dispatched to the net despite the attention of four Galway

Credit to Galway, though, even when things were not going their way, they continued to battle and when Ann Marie Hayes' low delivery evaded full-back Rena Buckley, Connolly and Curtin

and with only 'keeper Aoife Murray to beat.

Just as the Galway fans were on their feet to cheer the expectant goal, the pair collided in going for the sliotar and a Cork defender pounced to avert the danger. It was that kind of day.

Sensing they game had gone from them, Galway heads dropped and on the stroke of full time, Sinead Cahalan failed to control a Therese Maher pass and robbed of possession, Sile Burns was on hand to punish the error in rifling the sliotar past Earner.

In the cold light of day - no matter which way they look at it - Galway will view this as an opportunity lost. They ruled the opening exchanges and even though they fell behind subsequently, they created ample opportunities to overtake Cork.

As noted, the amount of unforced errors Galway committed bordered on the criminal, while too many of the team's big name players performed well below par. Then again, this isn't the first time this has happened - Galway flopping on the big occasion.

THREE YEARS, three All-Ireland Senior camogie championship finals for Wexford. Whether they will make it three titles in a row is definitely up for discussion after a bitty performance against an Offaly side who simply couldn't match their experienced opponents for quality.

It took just eleven minutes for Wexford to race 0-6 to 0-1 ahead, for John Tory to drop a forward deep and basically throw in the towel in Nowlan Park. From that juncture there was just one winner, Wexford.

The winner certainly wasn't the game as it turned into a dour struggle, filled with injuries, stoppages and very

little hurling. It really didn't suit the All-Ireland champions who really needed a crisp, free-flowing contest to get ready for the challenge that a rejuvenated Cork

Yes, it's Cork again. The first time the Leesiders have reached the final since 2009 was confirmed when they ground-down a panicked Galway by 3-10 to 0-12 in the opener of the dou-

The result might have acted to buoy Wexford into a performance having easily dispatched the Rebellettes in Bellefield at the end of June, and those first ten minutes certainly were

Ursula Jacob took less than 30 seconds to get on the scoresheet, Kate Kelly combined with Louise Codd to make it two moments later, and Katrina Parrock opened her account in the third minute for a 0-3 to nil lead.

Arlene Watkins picked up Offaly's opening score in the fifth minute but such was the dominance of the Wexford defence that the Faithful girls wouldn't register from play again until 13 minutes from time.

That stat is hardly a surprise, as if Wexford are to three-peat it will be on the back of that strength in the defence.

Yes, five of those did start the league final defeat to Cork but Claire O'Connor was inexplicably left on the bench that day and when the unity of the group is broken something is lost back there.

That rearguard continued to strangle the life out of Offaly as Kate Kelly, driving the side on from her midfield berth, received Mary Leacy's pass and drilled over from halfway.

More good work by 'player of the game' Kelly gave Ursula Jacob the chance for her third point, which she took with ease to cancel out Dermody's second point, however, Wexford's struggles in the half-forward line, apart from the excellent Josie Dwyer, prevented further chances for scores materialising.

It was Dwyer who helped to create the second Wexford major, combining well down the right with Lenny Holohan who centred for Parrock to bat home her opening goal (2-8 to 0-3) and finish the Offaly resistance.

The longer the half wore on, the easier the scores came for the Slaneysiders as gaps began to appear in the Offaly back six.

Fiona Kavangh drove through for her score as the third quarter expired and Parrock grabbed a second goal soon after, forcing in a handpass from close range after good battling by herself and Jacob (3-9 to 0-3).

Two quick Offaly points from Michaela Morkan and Siobhán Flannery made sure that any complacency that threatened to set in was quickly extinguished.

This, combined with the introduction of Fiona Rochford, made the final few minutes an excellent spell for Wex-

Indeed, St. Anne's star Rochford did her push for a final starting place no harm at all by firing over three stunning picture-perfect points from the right side in her ten-minute cameo.

There was still time for a little more drama when Evelyn Quigley was hauled down for a last-gasp penalty but Kelly topped her performance with her third point rather than going for goal and Wexford wrapped up the all too easy victory.

One thing is for sure, Cork will be ready, so Wexford will need to up it significantly from this showing, and a reshuffle will almost certainly be needed to produce a performance like the one that stifled the Leesiders in Bellefield this year.

If there's one thing the people of Wexford have learnt in recent years, it's that they are certainly capable of better, and of claiming trophies.



Should they become the new senior team for next year, their aggression throughout the field will without doubt fend off all obstacles as they so willingly displayed in this outing. Their tacties were admirable spurred on by a massive will and hunger to succeed.

But what went so terribly wrong for Tipp? A disappointed Caoimhe Kennedy said: "We knew it was going to be tough but we didn't expect to go down so badly. ODAY, 12-time All-Ireland winning champion Mary O'Connor will be publicly recognised on par with some of Ireland's great sportsmen; shoulder to shoulder.

It's taken almost three decades of sweat, glory and tears, but in there too lies the story of our nation's failure to recognise Ireland's best female athletes on the same podium as their male counterparts. At noon, the Killeagh native was bestowed an honorary doctorate from University College Cork (UCC), along with former Manchester United player Denis Irwin, rugby star Ronan O'Gara, eight-time All-Ireland-winning Kilkenny hurling boss Brian Cody and horse trainer Aidan O'Brien, whose winners include Istabraq, Rip van Winkle, and Giant's Causeway. The doctorates are the latest in a series of events marking UCC's centenary of sport 1911-2011, and it just goes to show how far women's sports have come in 100 years. Yet, when O'Connor - who retired her intercounty camogie and football boots in 2009 - first read the letter inside the UCC-embossed envelope in May, she laughed, thinking it was a practical joke. Keeping it to herself, it wasn't until a second letter of correspondence arrived in August that she realised it was the real deal. But the enormity of it has yet to sink in. "I'm still in shock, flabbergasted really. "It's such a great honour, and I'm so appreciative of it, but I hope that people see

appreciative of it, but I hope that people see it as a nod to female sports, and ladies football and camogie in particular. "I've played with a lot of people over the years and we were on the same winning teams and had the same attitude; I'm just lucky that I've been around a long time and had the chance to win what I did." O'Connor — who temporarily resides in Clontarf in Dublin whilst acting CEO of the Camogie Association as Sinéad O'Connor is on maternity leave — has amassed a whopping 12 intercounty All-Ireland titles — four times that of Cork hurling great and Freedom of the City bestowee Seán Óg Ó

But, she's quick to deny any sort of comeback, remarking that there's a balance in knowing when your time is done, and instead, the young talent coming through in both Cork camogie and football is "insurmountable".

She became a selector with Wexford in 2005 and when the opportunity arose to take over as manager two years later she 'was coaxed into it'.

2007 ended up a fairy-tale for Wexford; defeated by a last-minute point in the National League final by Cork, they proceeded to take the scalp of the 'big guns' throughout the round robin championship series and stopped Cork's All-Ireland three in a row bid with a 2-7 to 1-8 victory in Croke Park.

The roles are reversed this year. Wexford bid for three in-a-row and Cork are out to stop them.

Stella gives her thoughts on the appetising final ahead; "I think it's going to be a very intriguing final, an interesting one and one I'm really looking forward to."

It's well documented that this is Wexford's three in-a-row bid and it was Wexford that prevented Cork's three in a row in 2007.

THE push is on to complete the Castle Road complex, and with planning permission granted, it's all systems go to get the dressing room structure built. In order to do this the board have to once again raise a substantial sum of money. The pitch is a credit to all involved but it did not appear over night, and years of hard work went into ensuring that Cork camogie now has top class facilities for generations of camogie players to come. The facility as it stands is now debt free, but the hard work must continue and it is here that the support of the clubs and former players is once again needed. The board development committee are launching their fund raising with a monster fund raising table quiz which will be held at the Rochestown Park Hotel, Thursday October 18. Teams of four at €50 per team are invited to participate, and supporters are urged to organise a team and come along and get the dressing room fundraising off to a great start.

RORY NOONAN talks to Cork's Orla Cotter ahead of next Sunday's All-Ireland camogie final clash with Wexford

WHEN Cork take to the field on Sunday for the senior All-Ireland camogie final one of their key players is sure to be Orla Cotter.

The St Catherine's player has been a part of the senior set-up for more years than she cares to remember, but the burning ambition to win the final is as strong as it ever was.

Quietly spoken off the pitch Orla is a natural leader on it and her ability to win more than her fair share of possession in midfield will be crucial to Cork's chances.

Orla's love of camogie started at a young age and she could barely walk when she was out the back, pucking a ball with her brothers.

Most of the family have been involved in the game at some point and it wasn't long before Orla was.

"People like Dick Morrison and Rena O'Leary (RIP) were among my first coaches and had a huge influence on my game," said Orla, "their dedication to training young players was second to none.

She started off playing at school, with Ballynoe NS, and was on the side that won the Sciath na Scol in 2000 in football.

It wasn't long before her club, St Catherine's, came calling and long before she officially started there, the pitch was familiar to her.

"I used to go down there with my brothers and sister and we were always pucking around and I just loved camogie and football from the start."

Orla won her first major medal with them at U14 level when they won the county championship and followed on with success at U18 level and eventually at senior level.

Her reputation with the club grew quickly and it wasn't long before Cork came calling and the elegant midfielder quickly established herself on the inter-county team.

Her first success with Cork came in 2003 when she was part of the side that won the All-Ireland and went on to retain it the following vear

She added medals all the way up to, and including, senior All-Ireland ones and she was also honoured with the captaincy of her

To be made captain of Cork was a huge honour for me and my family. To captain your county is the dream of all camogie players and I was lucky enough to fulfil that dream.

Unfortunately we didn't win the All-Ireland but it was still one of my proudest moments to lead the side out for championship games."

side of my face towards the other and I broke my jaw in two places.

"My teeth were moving all over the place and as I said it felt like that one side of my face had been driven across and hit the other.

"Once I got to hospital I was given morphine and naturally this helped to quell the pain as they started to look at the extent of my injuries."

The next 24 hours were somewhat of a blur for Orla as it was CAT and MRI scans and other tests to see if it was 'only' a broken jaw she had suffered.

Orla also suffered a severe cut to the side of her ear and with any blow to the head it had to be checked out and thankfully it was 'only' a broken jaw.

ated on and they put four screws into her jaw, two on top and two on the lower jaw.

Following the operation the long journey to recovery started. She spent the first two weeks at home and will be eternally grateful to her family, and in particular her mother Bridget, for all the help and care she gave her.

After six weeks it was back to the doctor and she got great news as they agreed to take the screws in her jaw out.

"This was the best news I could get and getting the screws out meant that getting back on the pitch moved a step closer for me."

"After a few weeks, I played a club game and I was very nervous going on to the field. I was apprehensive and not really looking for-

ward to the first challenge. But I knew it had to come and when it did I started thinking that's over with and slowly but surely started to work myself into the game."

That's all behind her and Orla is looking forward to Sunday and is delighted Cork are back in the final, though she accepts they will be underdogs.

"We are up against a very strong Wexford side and they will be all out to win the three in-a-row."

"It's been a few years since we have been in the final so we are all looking forward to getting on the pitch on Sunday. We have been going well in training but it's all down to what happens on the day and nothing less than our best will be good enough against Wexford.

"As well as going for three in-a-row they are also champions at intermediate level and a side from Wexford are also the All-Ireland club champions. This shows how much effort they have put in over the last few years.

"Our win over them in the league final will count for nothing on Sunday as both squads know this will be much higher in intensity and there is far more at stake.

"Of course we are delighted to have won the league but there is a massive hunger in the squad to win the All-Ireland title.

"It's been a few years since we have been in Croker on finals day and there is no better feeling for a player than running out on to the pitch, knowing you are playing in the biggest game of the year. I can't wait for Sunday and hopefully we will be bringing the cup back."



IF there is one word that could sum up the feeling amongst the Cork squad and management ahead of next Sunday's senior All-Ireland camogic final it's hunger.

"Our coaching and management team have also kept us going and you couldn't ask for better people, led by Paudie Murray.

"They have no favourites and you know that if you don't put in the effort in training and in games there is someone to take your place and they won't hesitate to do so.

"We have not been there in a while, and we have nothing to lose, except to enjoy it, and give it absolutely everything.

"Wexford will be favourites naturally enough, but, being the underdog will suit us. Gemma is currently in her 10th consecutive year playing senior camogie with Cork.

She is regarded by her peers as one of the best ever, and one of the most feared camogie players in the

country. She has picked up five senior All-Ireland medals in that time, but more impressively, she is the leading All-Star awards winner, having picked up six consecutive All-Stars, playing in three different positions, centre-forward, midfield

and wing-back. Gemma, being the versatile player that she is, has moved positions so many times over the years

Sometimes to do a marking job, on other days to create scores, but she has never hesitated in moving. "You are put into that position for whatever reason the management deems necessary, and you just have to accept those decisions whether you like them or not.

"During the course of my career I have been moved into several positions.

"Lining out in the half-back line, to midfield, then to the centre-forward position, and back to midfield again. "Midfield is where I played mostly and relished playing there. "It gives you great scope of

movement and a certain freedom that other positions don't possess. "However, this year I have been moved and positioned in the centre-back role.

"It's somewhere that I wouldn't have played much, but I would have experience as regards to defensive positions where I played before.

"I now have a whole different set of responsibilities and have to adapt to the change. That goes for a few of the other girls on the team also." As her All-Star awards tell, it's evident that Gemma's presence is of huge importance to Cork.

Being able to play in several positions takes huge commitment and effort, but for Gemma it is all worthwhile.

People sometimes ask me 'am I mad for the time I spend playing camogie', but ask anyone involved in sport, and they will know that when you find something that you love and enjoy doing, then the commitment and hard work, and the rewards and success that follow, makes it all worthwhile.

Doyle keeps focus off Wexford's historic ambitions

WEXFORD go into the All-Ireland final against Cork on Sunday chasing their third consecutive title. And manager JJ Doyle has stressed that while you won't hear any mention of the possible historic three-in-a-row inside their camp, they're not shying away from it either.

"We're not talking about it but we're not afraid of it either because we know other people will talk about it," he said. "But it is really irrelevant, because all we can do on Sunday is win one game.

"If we lose, no one's going to be sitting in the dressing-room

thinking, 'ah sure at least we won the last two.' This one is all about the 60 minutes on Sunday and whichever team performs."

It was Cork who Wexford displaced at the top of the game, and the Rebelettes once again stand between them and what would be another huge landmark for the county, who made their big breakthrough in 2007.

The Cork women won five of the eight All-Ireland finals they contested in the past 10 years but they haven't been in a final since 2009 and lost to Wexford in the '07

Cork have a new-look team and management in place now, but Doyle says it isn't their rivalry that has kept his side motivated, but rather the last-gasp manner of last year's win over Galway.

The defending champions needed some late heroics from Ursula Jacob, who scored 1-3 in the final 10 minutes, to pull victory from the jaws of defeat.

"We don't believe we've performed in either of the last two finals," Doyle said. "I know that might sound strange because we won both of them, but we didn't perform to the level we know we're capable of.

We were very good in the first half of the 2010 final but at no stage last year were we really good and, in the final, we got away with it.

'We didn't perform in the league final this year either and Cork beat us. We know if we don't perform on Sunday they'll beat us again."

Wexford have benefited from the

huge competition for places created by the slew of players that won both senior and intermediate titles last year. But Doyle's innovative attitude to training has also helped, and he admits to taking a Brian Codyesque approach to refereeing their internal games.

"I don't blow the whistle at all, just start the match and end the match," he chuckled. "It's not that it's dirty but it is physical. You just hope matches are let flow and people can see that the game is no longer about players standing off and looking at one another.

"It's a brilliant game. We're not saying it's the same as hurling, it's obviously different, but the 30 girls here on Sunday will be the top camogie players in the country. They're the best females in their

"Look at what Katie Taylor did in the Olympics. That surely showed the male-dominated media that these women are just as good in their own field as the lads are.

"Okay, maybe the long-range scoring is not as big in camogic but in the semi-finals I saw Gemma O'Connor putting the ball over from midfield for Cork, and Kate Kelly doing it for us. A lot of lads who play club hurling are incapable of doing things like that.

There's often more evidence of the skills in camogie because, like ladies football, there isn't the huge physicality that's there now in the men's game.

"These girls are the best of the best at their sport and they deserve acknowledgement."



Cork still playing catch-up, says Murray

Cork manager Paudie Murray isn't placing too much store in the team's previous national final appearance igning All-Ireland champions Wexford.

They denied JJ Doyle's side a fourth consecutive Division 1 title with a four-point win in Thurles in May only for Wexford to exact revenge in the championship a month late in Enniscorthy.

It's that five-point defeat which Murray insists is a truer reflection of the counties' form this season ahead of Sunday's All-Ireland final.

"If you look at the league final, I think we were certainly six or seven

weeks down the road training-wise compared to Wexford so I don't think Wexford will read too much into that.

"I think the outing in the championship probably gave people more of an idea of where we were at against them.

White's absence Captain Julia through injury hampers Cork's chances and Murray feels Wexford aren't finished yet despite finally breaking through and winning the last two All-Ireland crowns.

"If you look back over the last four or five years Wexford have been the team setting the bar. I think we probably fell off over the last couple of years so we are trying to catch up.

"When you see the subs Wexford

brought on against Offaly they are going to be there for a while more."

Wexford manager Doyle said they aren't speaking too much about the prospect of emulating the Tipperary team of 1999-2001 and doing the three-in-a-row.

"I'll be 100% honest, it's an irrelevance for us because all we can control is what happens on the field on

"Girls will look back when they're retired in 10 or 15 years time at what they've done in their careers but they're not looking back now saying, well, we've won two' because if we don't win on Sunday then the last two are irrelevant, they're no good to us.

'We won't sit in the dressing room

after being beaten on Sunday thinking, 'Jeez, it was great to win the last two

"What we'll be thinking is how sickened we'll have been for leaving this one behind us. So it's all about this

"The last two years are a complete irrelevance other than maybe having the experience of playing in Croke

Doyle confirmed 2010 All-Ireland winning captain Una Leacy will be fit for the game despite picking up an injury in the semi-final win over Offaly.

"It would be unfortunate for her had we missed it but it would have been someone else's opportunity.

"Like, I mean, we've seen it here

two years ago here, Karen (Atkinson). who is the captain on Sunday, went off after 12 minutes with a knee injury and another girl came on and got her

"The same thing could happen, it could happen after five minutes or 55 nunutes and that's where you need your squad."

Wexford boss knows what to expect from Cork

Wexford team since 2010, has yet to lose an All-Ireland final, writes LINDA MELLERICK.

Since he took over two seasons ago he's brought his county enviable success; Two All-Ireland senior titles, two national leagues and an intermediate title.

He believes however that this counts for nothing on Sunday. "It's been a great couple of years. Like anything else though you're only

JJ DOYLE, at the helm of this as good as your last game. The past two years will count for nothing on Sept 16. They have no relevance at all. All our focus will be on Sunday and Cork. In the past couple of years we've met Galway but now it's cork and it's good; it's nice to challenge yourself. We all want to play the best and whichever team performs better on the day will win."

Does he feel more threatened by Cork than he would Galway? CAMOGIE

"Well Galway have been beaten so many times in Croke Park whereas Cork have a great history there. But we love going to Croke Park. Every player wants to get there and win it. We're really looking forward to the game.

"There's never an easy game against Cork but that's what you want. Cork beat us in the league final and we had no complaints.

They were the better team, far hungrier and we had to take it."

JJ believes motivation won't be a problem for his three in a row chasing side. 'There's a hunger embedded in the girls. Despite the fact that they have won the last couple of All-Irelands many of this team remember the lean years. We had to get over the mental block in 2007 and did that to win yet we got beaten in '08 and '09 almost as if we expected it. We won it back in 2010 and the girls realise that their chances of playing and winning in Croke Park are

few. They've had enough bad days to appreciate this. The girls know the Cork girls well and in camogie the top teams get to play each other a lot so they are all very familiar. We're under no illusions as to the outfit Cork are."

Rebelettes' intensity gives White hope that glory days will return

CORK captain Julia White has had something of a nightmare summer, but if the Rebelettes get back on top of the camogie pile again on Sunday it will surely provide some consolation.

A bout of glandular fever meant she couldn't even enjoy any 21st birthday celebrations and missed most of Cork's championship run.

The Douglas forward, a second-year PE student at the University of Limerick, is "feeling good again now thankfully" but she will still miss lining out in Cork's first game at Croke Park since their last All-Ireland senior title in 2009.

Cork were camogie's dominant force then and White was just a teenage panellist, alongside rising stars like the Mackey twins, Katriona and Pamela.

So why did the side who contested nine finals since 2000. and won five of them, suddenly get knocked off their perch by teams like Wexford and Galway?

"I think that rather than us disimproving it was more a case of other counties catching up with us," White said.

"We didn't do anything to counter that. We kind of panicked for the two years, we couldn't handle them being so close to us.

Successive changes of management probably didn't help either.

Denise Cronin, who had led them to victory in 2008 and 2009. finished up after they were beaten in the 2010 semi-finals, and Joe O'Brien was with them last year before Paudie Murray took over this season.

White (pictured below) credits St Finbarr's man Murray, brother of Cork's star goalkeeper Aoife, with helping them find their mojo again.

The whole management changed, selectors and everything, and they've come in with a completely new approach. We've done very different kinds of training, it's been extremely well organised," she said.

"I wouldn't say what we're doing is totally different but there's a lot of intensity to it. It's not about all these elaborate drills - we'd be working on simple things but with a lot of intensity.

"We're playing a lot of direct ball now and everything is into the

Cork's 2012 panel may hand. no longer be anchored by the legendary Mary

O'Connor, whose services to sport and status were recognised with an honorary doctorate from UCC this week alongside Brian Cody, Ronan O'Gara, Denis Irwin and Aidan O'Brien.

But it includes some new rising teenage stars again in Katie Buckley and young soccer international Clare Shine.

Yet many of their brilliant 'old guard', like Murray, Gemma O'Connor, Rena Buckley, Briege Corkery, Anna Geary and Orla Cotter, are still there and they got Joanne O'Callaghan and Sile Burns back from brief sabbaticals also this year.

There is a feeling that they really clicked in their emphatic semi-final defeat of Galway (beaten finalists the last two years), when they racked up an impressive 3-10, but against Wexford it's been one apiece so far this year.

Cork won the league final (1-8 to 0-9), while Wexford won their subsequent championship meeting 0-14 to 0-9.

"In the first half of the league final they were blowing us out of the water, but in the second we matched them for intensity and that was the difference, but it was very close," White stressed.

"When we played in the championship you could tell they weren't bothered by the league defeat, it was completely gone from their minds. They were back to themselves and we lost by five points.

"The pitch (Enniscorthy) was a bit tight, and hopefully Croke Park suits us better, but we're not going to win or lose because of the pitch.

"Wexford are very mentally strong and very physical, they just seem to have the whole package really.

"They're so physical that you wouldn't think they'd be so fast, but they've got lightning speed as well and their forwards are top-

"It is a big achievement for us to get to the final and get back to Croke Park again for a start, so we're really excited

Derry gun for clean sweep

They have yet to lose a game of camogie in 2012, now Derry aim to make it the perfect year, in every respect

HE MOST exciting All-Ireland Intermediate final for many years looks set to be played out on the hallowed turf of Headquarters this weekend when Derry and Galway go head to head for the All-Ireland crown.

Galway looked impressive as they topped group two of the Intermediate Championship series unbeaten, with three wins and a draw from their four games. The only blip on their record was a 2-9 each draw with Tipperary when both sides were already through to the last four.

They came past Waterford in the semi-final on a final scoreline of 1-14 to 0-13, with Emma Kilkelly their top scorer with 1-3 to her credit, but it is at the other end of the field where the Tribeswomen will know they really need to perform if they are to put the shackles of free-flowing Derry attack.

They hit 3-16 past Tipperary in their semi-final clash, Tipp managing just six points in reply to complete what was a very impressive day's work from the Oak Leaf girls.

Karen Kielt was their chief markswoman with a personal tally of 1-4 over the hour, but the most striking aspect was that the scoring burden was shared between seven different Derry scorers.

It was just the latest step in what has been a hugely impressive season so far for the Ulster side. They strolled through the Championship group stages, three straight wins and having conceded an incredibly low tally of just 25 points along the way, and averaging almost 23 points a game them-

Already this season they have laid claim to the National League Division Two title, courtesy of a resounding 2-11 to 0-6 victory over Meath in the decider having also gone through their league campaign with straight wins.

They also beat Antrim to win back their Ulster Senior Championship title, it means that Derry take an impressive 100 percent record into Sunday's All-Ireland decider. Is 2012 to be their perfect season?


Galway though will have plenty to say about that. Having watched their seniors lose out to Cork in their bid for an All-Ireland final spot, the Intermediate Camogs will hope that they can instead take their inspiration from the exploits of their county hurling counterparts who set the Leinster and Allireiand championships alight this summer.

Their girls have already shown that they have the hunger and drive for success. When a four point lead turned into a one point deficit in their semi-final against Waterford, it would have been easy for Galway to falter. Instead, they chose to dig deep and showed real fervour to turn the game back in their favour.

Galway managed to side-step a physical battle against a physically stronger Waterford, and with Derry a less imposing presence, the westerners should once again be able to open up and play the sort of game which suits their skills.

They wasted chances against Waterford, in the first half especially, and they will have to be much more clinical against a Derry side who will bring the game to them from the very out-

AVING missed out by the narrowest of margins in last year's decider, Down are back and ready to make amends for their 2011 disappointment.

It was Waterford who provided the opposition in last year's Croke Park final, the Mourne girls going down by 2-11 to 1-13 as they lost out in the most heartbreaking of fashion.

Waterford were forced to hold off a remarkable late surge to deny Down, the Ulster side hitting eight unanswered points to reduce the gap from 11 points to three. Unfortunately for Down, substitute Nicola Braniff's injury-time goal came just too late to complete the comeback.

Down's round robin stage this year was pretty unremarkable, making the semi-finals by finishing third in the group behind Meath and Laois. It was Laois who provided the opposition for the semi-final, with the Mourne girls coming through on a 2-8 to 2-5 scoreline. Niamh Mallon was their scorerin-chief with 2-1 beside her name, with their inspirational captain Fionnuala Carr chipping in with four points.

There is no doubting that Meath have been the form side in the Pre-

They surpassed expectations by making it through to the National League Division Two decider where they fell to today's Intermediate finalists Derry, and carried that rich vein of form into their Championship campaign where they went on to register five straight victories to top the table.

They racked up some impressive scores along the way, hitting 4-27 against Roscommon and 3-10 against Kildare.

Their narrowest win of the entire group stages came when they faced Down at Downpatrick back at the end of July, 1-10 to 1-9 the final score in favour of the Leinster side.

Tight game expected in curtainraiser at Croke Park

MEATH camogie players will break new ground when they run out at Croke Park shortly before midday next Sunday for a historic All-Ireland Premier Junior final against Down, a team that was beaten in last year's decider by Waterford.

The players, officials and supporters have every reason to travel to Croke Park with expectations of victory, but manager John Davis and his selectors Sharon Raleigh, Valerie Curtis and Tom Walsh will adopt a cautious approach.

The reason for optimism is well-founded as Meath have already defeated the Ulster side twice this year, once in the National Camogie League Div 2 and also in the qualifying phase of the All-Ireland series where the Royal County remained unbeaten.

However, 12 months ago at Clontibret, Meath faltered at the semi-final stage of the All-Ireland against Down and that setback will put everyone involved with the team on guard next Sunday.

Based on Meath's performances this year alone, they have the ability to win one more game and make the leap to the intermediate grade.

Buoyed by a fine debut season in the Div 2 league, Meath have thrived in the higher grade after coming through the ranks of Div 4 and Div 3 under the guidance of Davis.

The Down manager will also be aware that if his team produces a display similar to their second-half performance in the 2-8 to 2-5 semi-final victory over Laois, that they will be heading for the runner-up position again.

Down failed to score in the second-half against Laois and were ahead by 2-8 to 1-4 at the interval, but if they can get the best out of players like Catherine McGourty, Niamh Mallon, Catherine Rocks and Lisa Mc-Crickard, then they will make life difficult for Meath.

Meath will also be conscious that they conceded two late goals to Karen Gribben in the league clash and they will want to prevent that happening on Sunday.

The final will be a tight contest, but with the experience of the last few years behind them and a good league campaign, Meath have the ability to take the silverware back to the Royal County.

Down manager anticipates a close encounter

DOWN manager Alister McGilligan will be attempting to lead the Mourne side to All-Ireland success at his first attempt after he took over the reins for 2012 in the wake of last year's disappointing final defeat by Waterford at Croke Park.

"I wasn't in charge last year, but Waterford won by a point and now we are determined to make amends for that defeat," he told the Meath Chronicle.

And 12 months ago Down negotiated Meath at the semifinal stage at Clontibret where the condition of the pitch didn't help either side.

Since then Meath have played Down twice this year and the Royal County won

into Sunday's big clash, but McGilligan feels that it's a game that could go either way and Down also have the added experience of playing in Croke Park on All-Ireland final day last September.

"We didn't play well in our semi-final win against Laois, the weather conditions were poor and the grass was very long, it was the same for Laois, but it's a bit unfair to put teams into venues where the grass is too long," said McGilligan.

"We were in control of the game against Laois with a seven-point lead at half-time, but we didn't score in the second-half and it wasn't just the wind and rain that stopped us, Laois deserved credit for their efforts also.

"We just didn't perform in the second-half and if we do

pected to have the edge going something like that next Sunday then it will be very difficult for us to beat Meath.

"We showed great battling qualities against Laois to dig out the win and that's a positive aspect of our game, but failing to score would be a major worry because it can't all be attributed to the weather conditions either," he added.

McGilligan feels very strongly about the venues where some of the games have been fixed by the Camogie Association, but he has no worries on that front for next Sunday.

"At least we know that on All-Ireland final day we will have a pitch that will facilitate good camogie," he commented.

Maybe the Camogie Association need to look at the venues for the teams in this grade, if the camogie officials feel that a pitch like Blakestown where

we played Laois is suitable for camogie then that's fine, but I wonder did anyone look at the

"The facilities and the pitch were fine for football, but not for camogie and especially not for two All-Ireland semi-finals, it was the same for Meath and Kildare although the weather was better for that game," he remarked.

The Down manager also suggested that there would be extra pressure on his team after last year's defeat in the decider and that's a burden that Meath don't have to cope

"There might be a little bit of extra pressure on Down now as they lost last year and might have been considered the most likely winners this year before the competition began," he said.

"All the teams we played this year have raised their standard when they played us, but that's good for the overall development of the game.

"Meath have beaten us twice this year, by a point each time so that will give them an advantage and they were also able to watch our semi-final against Laois, that might give them an advantage also.

"Maybe the Meath selectors will feel that what we produced against Laois is the best we can offer, but I somehow doubt if they will make a mistake like

"Next Sunday we will have a decent pitch, a big open pitch and two teams that can play camogie, the best team on the day will win, there won't be much in it and hopefully Down will be in front at the right time," he concluded.

All-Ireland Premier Junior camogie final:

Meath's long journey

eath camogie manager John Davis has a proven pedigree of success. Previously it was with the Meath hurlers - he brought them to the National Hurling League Div 1 and collected a few trophies along the way including an All-Ireland SHC B title back in 1993.

During his terms at the helm Meath were also good enough to play in the Walsh Cup for a couple of years instead of the Kehoe Cup.

Appointed manager of the Meath camogie team only six years ago at the end of 2006 he took over a team that was low on morale, a team that rarely ever won a game and reached a low that year when they were beaten by Dublin (second team) in a Leinster Junior Championship game at Ratoath by a massive 28 points.

The appointment of Davis was a move that probably raised a few eyebrows, caused a surprise amongst the few people that were even aware that Meath had a camogie team.

Cue the changes.

Success in the form of silverware was not immediate, but nevertheless there was success.

It was fairly simple success - Meath started to win a few games.

And while the camogie fraternity in Meath might not like to be reminded of just how low they ranked in overall terms, or more bluntly, how bad they were, the transformation is something that they can take great pride in.

Meath Camogie Association admitted there was a problem - the first step to finding a solution - and then they solved it.

Three final appearances in 2007 - Leinster Junior Championship (beaten by Westmeath), Div 3 final and All-Ireland B final (lost both to

At that stage there was a disappointment of a different type - failing to win finals - and it gave

the players and officials something to build on. However, it was as if the Camogie Association was conspiring against Meath because

they promptly re-organised the leagues. For 2008 Meath, after enjoying a great year,

were downgraded to Div 4. Showing real Royal battling qualities Meath won the Div 4 title and defeated Roscommon in the All-Ireland B final at a remote venue in

It appears that the lesser camogie counties also have to deal with GAA-style 'red tape' but

Meath kept winning and in 2009 landed the Leinster Junior Camogie title. There was the first of three successive All-Ireland semi-final defeats - Offaly (2009), Wa-

In between those disappointments there was a double of Leinster and Div 3 titles last year - already this year the Leinster has been retained and a Div 2 league final reached - a

However, to make it to the Div 2 final in their debut season at that grade was another success and in 14 competitive games this year Meath have won 13 times.

But it's not only on the pitch that Meath camogie has progressed.

Meath Camogie Board has made tremendous strides in the administration stakes and last Friday night's 'Press Night' was another

If Meath Camogie Board had organised a similar event back in 2006 it's fair to suggest that the players probably wouldn't even have turned up.

Fast-forward to last Friday night and a packed Trim GAA centre where the players completed a training session on the pitch watched by hundreds of supporters.

After that, the supporters and lots of children were able to meet the players and get autographs and photographs.

Camogie Board chairman Christy Mangan introduced each player, including one "who lives with me" - his daughter Emily, as individual photos flashed up on a big screen - refreshments were provided for all.

Two stalwarts of Meath Camogie were there also, Terry Tormey from the Donaghmore/ Ashbourne club and Brigid Carney from Kil-

The two ladies were quite happy to sit, almost unnoticed, and enjoy the occasion, camogie in the limelight would have been their goal and over the years they kept the flag flying.

Perhaps it might have been easier to walk away in the days when no one was that interested - when survival alone could be deemed

No doubt they will be first into Croke Park on Sunday, they will enjoy the occasion and it will probably evoke some sad memories too when they think of those who fought the good fight with them and will not be there.

One person who immediately springs to mind is the late Brigid Donnelly (nee Curtis) from Kilmessan, but she will be represented on the field and on the sideline.

Her daughter Aileen will line out in the final and her niece, Valerie Curtis, is a selector and is also vice-chair of the Camogie Board.

Tradition is as important as the future for the health of any organisation and Meath Camogie Board tick all the boxes.

Crucially, the Meath u-14 development squad was there on Friday night - they were acknowledged as the players who, probably

inside the next six years, will be preparing for more finals and attending more nights like last Friday night.

Meath playing in the Div I Camogie League by then perhaps?

While all this was going on the manager with some players and officials were involved in various interviews with the local media.

And on this occasion it wasn't just a reporter from the Meath Chronicle - a 'one-man and his computer' type of thing.

Having followed the Meath camogie team regularly over the years, and to some remote away venues with the predictable long grass and bumpy pitches, it's good to see the team emerging into the limelight.

Venues like Athleague, Leixlip, Clontibret, Ballymore-Eustace, Clonkill - all a long way from Croke Park.

The Camogie Association need to give the counties like Meath and Down, Kildare, Roscommon, Kerry and Carlow a level pitch to

The first line of defence

Combining her role in the army with her inter-county camogie career has been a labour of love for Con Gemma O'Connor, who chats to **KIERAN McCARTHY** ahead of Sunday's All-Ireland final against Wexf

GEMMA O'Connor is the first line of defence, on and off the field, for both county and country.

But the similarities don't end there. There's more.

Both her job as a corporal in the Irish army and her standing as one of Cork camogie's leading stars are roles that demand commitment, passion, an intensive work rate, a high level of fitness, an ability to lead, and so much more.

Gemma has all these attributes, and then some.

Still, while she may be just days away from Sunday's All-Ireland camogic final against defending champions Wexford, the versatile 27-year-old centre back admits that even the defence forces have felt the full brunt of the recession fallout.

A part of the 4th Infantry Battalion, based in Collins Barracks, that is currently being disbanded, it's a testing time on the work front for the Ballyphehane woman.

'At the moment it's a bit difficult, my current unit is being disbanded so there is an element of uncertainty as to where people will end up. People will find out in the next few weeks where they will be stationed, that could be Limerick, Cork still, or Kilkenny. Due to the current economic climate things aren't as good as they used to be,' Gemma pointed out.

But the four-time All-Ireland winning Cork camogie star has never been one to shirk a challenge, in any walk of life.

Take her two overseas peacekeeping missions in Liberia and Chad for example, struggling African nations that exist almost in a different world.

'They were both eye-openers,' Gemma explained.

'My first mission was to Liberia, for six months, when I was just finished training. It was 2004. As a young soldier leaving home for the first time, to go to Africa was something that I'll never forget.


'It showed me a different side to life, the poverty, the living conditions that those people struggle with. But it was also an opportunity that I cherished.'

War-torn

Five years later came her deployment to Chad, for four months, another war-torn African country that needed help, and Ireland answered the call.

'That wasn't too similar to Liberia but the Africa missions themselves are similar enough in what we are there to do,' Gemma explained.

'Our main mission overseas is peacekeeping. The Irish are very well respected for that role alone and that's why we are in

the Lebanon at the moment. We are a trustworthy nation and that's why we have been asked back to missions over and over again. Lebanon is a prime example of that.'

In her current rank as a corporal, over the last few years Gemma has been training recruits in her instructor/supervisory role, over troops and training centres, and it only makes sense that there is a connection between her job and her sporting passion, camogie. Together, they work in harmony, benefitting and complimenting the other.

'When you join the army it has the whole physical fitness element, and that's probably one of the main reasons why I joined it originally. You can always apply that onto the pitch. You might have that extra bit that others don't have, and that bit of extra motivation,' she

'There are certain aspects of the army, the defence forces that you can bring onto the sporting field, that might give you an advantage. I think they work very well together.'

ork very well together.'

And Gemma will be hoping

that's the case in this Sunday's All-Ireland final against favourites Wexford, who are bidding for the three-in-a-row.

It's not going to be easy against the Leinster county, she points out, but while Cork did lose to Wexford earlier in the championship, the Rebels did defeat them in this year's league final (denying Wexford's four-in-a-row bid), so this decider is delicately poised.

While Gemma was a key cornerstone in the Cork team that has dominated a large chunk of the camogie scene over the last decade, they have had to watch on over the past couple of seasons as Wexford have reigned supreme.

But Cork's league final win (1-8 to 0-9) announced their return to the big time and they want to continue that this weekend.

'Since '07, Wexford have been the young, up-and-coming team whereas we have been there over the past decade, on good and bad occasions, but certainly over the last few years Wexford have proved themselves to be a very hard team to beat,' she said. 'At the start of the year, for us it was about establishing the new management and new players, and trying out a few new things. The league was good for that.

'We got to the league final and we beat Wexford but then in the championship stages we lost to Wexford in the roundrobin system.

'Between ourselves, Galway and Wexford, there probably are just two or three points that separate the three teams. On any given day, any team can

beat the other.'

Taking huge confidence from their 3-10 to 0-12 semi-final win over Galway last month, that result was a big boost for Cork, as Gemma explains.

'We were beaten by Galway in a semi-final replay two years ago so people were a bit apprehensive going into the semi-final this year.

'People remembered how badly that hurt us as a team two years ago, and last year we were beaten by Wexford in the semifinal so this season we were very determined to get back to where we think we belong and that's the All-Ireland final."

And even for a team that, as a whole, has won so much in the game, Cork are approaching this All-Ireland final as if it were their first.

Hunger

Having missed out on the big prize over the past few years, there is a renewed hunger and determination to, again, be crowned the best team in the land, and every effort is being made to ensure that those dreams come to fruition this weekend.

'We have talked about this, how much winning this All-Ireland would mean to us. The last few years was such a disappointment for us because we know what we are capable of as a group of players and individuals. We haven't reached or played to our potential,' Gemma said.

'We have won All-Irelands and there are a lot of All-Irelands in the team. But that doesn't really matter. We are now playing in 2012. What we have achieved before isn't going to win another All-Ireland for us. We have to do that our-

selves, by playing to our potential.

'Certainly, we will have the attitude that this is like a first All-Ireland and that we have never won anything before. We are going to give this everything. We have nothing to lose. We haven't been there the past few years so we will cherish the opportunity.'

Even for the highly decorated Gemma, there is a real sense of excitement surrounding this showdown with Wexford.

Despite all that she has won over the years, including becoming the first camogie player to win six successive All-Star awards ('03 to '09) – ironically, the night of the awards ceremony in Dublin, her mother Geraldine accepted the award, as Gemma was on duty in Chad at the time – her passion for the sport has never waned.

'The love for the game is still there and once you have that the desire to win will be there as well,' she said.

But what is the secret of this current team's success and longevity? Gemma explains.

MOTIVATION will not be an issue for Cork in Sunday's All-Ireland camogle decider against defending champions Wexford in Croke Park (4pm throw-in). Having had to watch on as the Leinster county won the last two All-Irelands, Cork are chomping at the bit to wrestle the crown from Wexford's grasp, having not won the title since '09. Having already beaten Wexford in the Division 1 league final, T-8 to 0-9, in Semple Stadium earlier this season, Cork will have the confidence and self-belief that they are good enough to win. Wexford did, however, defeat Cork in the groups stages of the championship, 0-14 to 0-9, but the Rebels haven't looked back since, beating both Offaly (4-20 to 1-5) and Kilkenny (2-15 to 1-7) before getting the better of Tipperary (1-13 to 0-9) in the play-off.

Grace under pressure

Some players might wilt in the face of an All-Ireland final, Grainne McGoldrick wouldn't be one of them-

HIS weekend, Grainne Mc-Goldrick will return to Croke Park in search of another All-Ireland title to add to her collection.

The difference is that this Sunday, she will lead her side out as Derry captain, in search of the ultimate glory alongside her Oak Leaf colleagues instead of the maroon and green of her Eoghan Rua Coleraine club who have enjoyed so many outings at Headquarters.

After a series of semi-final disappointments, Derry have finally broken through to take their place in the decider against a fancied Galway side. It's a well-worn path to the gates of Croke Park for the Oak Leaf skipper, but that doesn't mean that it gets any easier.

"Do you get nervous? Yeah, you do. But it's about trying to control your nerves and not let them get the better of you.


"I'm very fortunate that I don't get all that nervous before games, it really doesn't bother me. I just don't see the point in getting nervous to the point where you can't perform. I enjoy playing camogie, so although there is a lot at stake, it's good nerves because you are on the brink of success.

"There are up on half a dozen girls on the team at present who won the All-Ireland title with Derry in 2007, so there are no shortage of players who are used to dealing with high-pressure situations, where people are expecting them to perform."

ple are expecting them to perform." Now 28, McGoldrick is at the peak of her powers. A star for club, county and province, she is one of the most recognisable names and faces on the national stage. Her own rise to prominence has ran parallel with her club's own rise to the top, claiming the last two All-Ireland Intermediate club titles. The Eoghan Rua club has come a long way in an incredibly short space of time, a rapid elevation through the ranks since Sean and Schira McGoldrick, Padraig and Susan O Mainain and students from University of Ulster Coleraine decided to start a hurling/camogie side back in the 1990s in Portstewart.

"I started playing when I was 11 years old. What we used to do was play on the hockey pitch at Dominican. We were fortunate that we had so many quality coaches available to us. The people who were coaching us were very good tactically, which meant that although we took to it late, and a lot of kids now are running about with hurls in their hands from the age of three or four We used to meet up there and play games from 12.30 until 1.30 or 2.00 every single Sunday afternoon.

Then it went to Friday nights and

other sessions during the week, indoor sessions as well.

"There was no camogie team at that stage, the first camogie team didn't come along until I was 14, so myself and four or five others would have played on the underage hurling teams. We struggled a bit for numbers at the start, but when you look at where we are now, it has come such a long way in such a short space of time. Things really took off when we won the intermediate county final in 2005, having lost the three previous finals. That did wonders for the club, lots of young girls saw the success and came onboard, and it was a lot of those girls who joined at 11 or 12 who played such a key role in us winning the All-Ireland titles in recent seasons aged 15

Grainne's own rise to the top is hardly a surprise considering the background she is coming from. Earlier this year her father Sean was awarded an Unsung Hero award by the BBC for his role in establishing and developing Gaelic games in the I'm looking forward to this weekend's game and to the possibilities that it presents for us. You want to win. I don't like losing, in fact I hate losing. I want to win everything

local area, alongside his wife. Her sister Maeve is the club camogie captain, while brothers Sean Leo and Barry have been prominent figures for the county mens' side. It's that sort of support network which has allowed each of the Mc-Goldrick's to blossom and to reach the top of their respective games, combined of course with no short-

"I don't live at home any more, but the house is always very busy. From March through till October time, there's something every night of the week. With mum and dad both coaching, the boys playing and the girls coming and going. Then there's all the friends running in and out too, so it's always hectic. But that's what I've always liked about our house, it's open doors and there's always such a buzz about the place.

"If the boys don't have a match then they'll definitely be there. The year Derry won the McKenna Cup final [2011], we had the All-Ireland club final the following afternoon and the boys had come straight from

the Athletic Grounds to Dublin ahead of our game. They're very supportive, and they understand level of commitment which goes i playing camogie at a serious enoulevel.

"Unlike the mens game, where if you're playing county then you're not expected to train or play with the club, we're expected to train a lot simultaneously. I've seen us playing games for the club on a Wednesday and Friday night, then going out on Sunday afternoon to play for the county. It is a big undertaking."

While the majority of inter-county players tend to hail from sporting professions, McGoldrick's day job as a primary school teacher means that she breaks the mould. Looking after a class of Primary Two children in St Colum's PS in Portstewart means that the teacher always has to bring her 'A-game' to proceedings, but she welcomes the fact that her students tend to be oblivious to her sporting endeavours.

"The current batch of kids have only known me for just over a week,

I'm very fortunate that I don't get all that nervous before games, it really doesn't bother me. I just don't see the point in getting nervous to the point where you can't perform

and are completely oblivious to the fact that I play sport, except when my competitiveness gets the better of me in a wee PE lesson and I try to get the ball off some poor five year-

"You come in every day and you're basically putting on a big performance. You can't be down in the dumps, you have to always be so energetic and enthusiastic about things. It can be hard after a loss, because you come across people in your school with connections to other counties or other clubs and who like to get a wee dig in.

"The last bunch that I had though, when we had success with the club, were aware of what I was doing and would have asked me about it. They would have cut pictures out of the papers and brought them in to me, and wee things like that are always

nice.

And it's a similar story outside of the classroom. Portstewart is not exactly a traditional hot-bed of Gaelic games, which means that you are not immersed in the GAA 24/7 as would be the case else-where. Grainne's first sporting love was actually swimming, which she did competitively up until the age of 18 competing in national junior championships. Cross country running was another of her exploits during her school years when she represented NI in competition.

The fact is that Gaelic games remains a niche sport in the area, which according to McGoldrick can have its benefits.

"I guess I'm fortunate in many ways that in Portstewart there are a lot of things other than Gaelic games available to children and to people in general, although Gaelic games are certainly on the increase. It's nice to not be immersed in that GAA world all of the time. I love not having people constantly asking me about games and camogie and

"All of the girls who I play with at Eoghan Rua I would consider to be very good friends of mine, players who I have grown up with, both older girls and younger girls who all get on extremely well together.

"But then if I want to go out for a night, get your head showered or chill out for a while safe in the knowledge that camogle is not going to be mentioned, then I have a great bunch of friends who tick that box as well. I'm very lucky in that respect, having so many good people who I can turn to."

Those opportunities though can be limited, with the camogie season lasting almost the full 12 month cycle when things are going well on both the club and county front. Tough work, the attacker admits, but more than worth it when you are rewarded with success

"You're going for months without being able to go out, but when you win and you're going out for a few consecutive weekends to celebrate, then that's what makes it all worthwhile, all those Friday and Saturday nights when you're sitting in, or when you're going out with friends

McGoldrick and her colleagues now find themselves within touching distance of an All-Ireland title. Their semi-final success helped them to shake off the psychological millstone which had hung around them over recent seasons. They didn't exactly tear up the plans and start from scratch this year, but rather tweaked a formula which had almost got them over the line previously.

Obviously we were doing most things right, getting to the semi-final stage each year, so we weren't far away. We have had the same man-

agement so that has

given us the con-

sistency to keep building,

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this year we have got all the talent available in Derry out on the pitch playing for Derry. When you have everyone playing who should be playing, it gives everything such a boost and takes it up a level. That's the difference, the intensity in training and the atti-tude which we have approached every training session and every game with." Although Derry have everyone on board this campaign, there is one notable absentee in the form of Jane Carey. The Eoghan Rua player had her wedding a few weeks back, with lifelong friend Grainne McGoldrick on bridesmaid duties. However, Grainne admits that her friend's honeymoon has left her with an unusual dilemma ahead of this weekend's trip to Dublin. "Since I've been 12 or 13 and playing for Derry u-14s, I have always

roomed with Jane Carey. It's the same with any game we've had with the club. Jane went and got married a few weeks ago, she's in Australia and I don't have anyone to room with this weekend.

"A single room would be too lonely, so I'm not sure what I'm going to do. Maybe Meabh, my own flesh and blood, wouldn't see me stuck. She usually rooms with Maureen Hennigan, but maybe she'll let me sleep across the bottom of their bed or on the floor or something! As I said before though, the team is so close that you wouldn't care who you were sharing with."

With the National League Division

Two and the Ulster Senior Championship titles already having been secured this season McGoldrick is now well practised in lifting silverware, and so Derry head to Croke Park in confident mood. They sport an un-blemished record in 2012, straight wins in all competitions. Now there is just one game left, one win away from the perfect season. The skipper has total faith that her side will be able to finish the job.

"We took a lot of confidence from the Tipperary semi-final win, because it was a really good team performance. Everything went as planned, and since then you can feel that things in training have just gone up a few notches.

"I'm looking forward to this weekend's game and to the possibilities that it presents for us. You want to win. I don't like losing, in fact I hate losing. I want to win everything. Galway are an exceptionally good team, they'll have a few players who will have dropped down from their senior team and will be very strong.

"Equally though we're aware and fully confident in our own abilities. We have some unbelievable players, our defence is exceptional and we have complete faith in the players all around us. It means you're looking forward to the game because we know that we're in a good place to get the job done and to realise our potential as players and collectively as a team."

Her pupils will be ready and waiting for Miss McGoldrick next Monday morning, regardless of the result. And the Derry captain insists that win, lose or draw, the P2s of St Colum's in Portstewart will have the big kid at heart' that they know and love ready for action as she swaps

Croke Park for the classroom. "Miss McGoldrick has never had a day off after an All-Ireland final yet. If we win, quiet time certainly will not be on the agenda. I'll be the life and soul of the party. You don't feel tired or sore when you've got an All-Ireland medal in your back pocket, so the kids will be in for a good week of it if we win on Sunday!"
