ALL-IRELAND club camogie champions Glen Rovers have been drawn against Carbery in the first round of this year's Cork county championship. The draws which were made at Monday night's Co. Board meeting were unusual in that the Blackpool side were the only club team in the hat.

As a result of a decision taken at the annual convention, there will be two senior camogic champions in Cork this season.

The enormous strength of the Glen Rovers Club resulted in all the others pushing through a motion to allow them compete with their divisions in the "A" grade and as individual clubs in the "B"

Many clubs felt that they had little chance of competing with the Glen, and indeed threatened not to compete unless something was done to level the pitch so to speak.

Whether it's a tribute to the Glen is a matter of debate, but was the two tier championship system means that the Blackpool club are automatically through to the Munster club championship for this

It also means that the reigning champions can also expect some tough opposition in defence of their titles this year from the divisional sides which can only be good for them.

Exiles Need Help

BRIDIN UI MHAOLAGAIN was at the American Convention

A n invitation to the North American Camogic Association Convention provided me with the opportunity to pack my bags and go to U.S.A.
Waiting to welcome me was the President of the North American Camogic
Association Kathleen McDonagh originally from Tipperary and Frances Dillon from Galway. Later we were joined
by N.A.C.A. secretary Breige Lavery
from Tyrone. The warmth of their
welcome, their enthusiasm for the
promotion of camogic in the U.S. will
remain with me for a long time.

Boston was the venue for the convention and Delegates attended from Canada and Philadelphia, New York, Boston, Pennsylvania, Chicago, San Francisco and Los Angeles - on the eve of the earthquake! When one considers the distances involved for games or meetings it is indeed a miracle that camogie flourishes in the Land of the Brave!

Convention was both vibrant and constructive with many interesting discussions on the game as it pertains to our players abroad. I was very moved by the importance and significance which they placed on the visit of a president and it is something which should be part of every president's schedule. Sometimes it is very easy for us at home to take our emigrants for granted. It is important for the association at home to be aware of the difficulties which they face when trying to promote our national game abroad.

Even the equipment - sliotars, sticks, helmets - are not readily available. Likewise promotional material - rule-

books, posters, registration forms etc. all must be sent out from Ireland. It is a great credit to those involved who are so committed to the development and promotion of the game when it would be so easy to become involved in other sports where equipment and facilities are readily available.

One of the highlights of the visit was a reception in my honour organised by the N.Y. Young Irelands Camogie club. Present at the function was Donal Hamill, Consul-General of Ireland, Bill McEvoy, President, U.S. Comhaltas Ceoltoiri Eireann, dignitaries from the G.A.A. and from all the major Irish bodies.

It was very interesting to see how the different bodies, sporting, musical and cultural support each other. I was really moved by the concern which the members of the Camogie Association show towards each other. They embody all that is good in camogie and meet all the aims of our National Body and indeed go much further. Any member unfortunate enough to fall on hard-times be it through unemployment or much more traumatic in U.S.-illness, is taken care of adequately. They very much embrace the social responsibilities of the association.

Now that Britain participates in the All-Ireland series it is imperative that moves take place at once to involve the U.S. to a much greater extent. While it would not be practical for the teams in America to participate in the League or Championship it is important that an Allstar and/or the All-Ireland winners visit America at least every second or

thir'd year with a team travelling in the opposite direction during the intervening years. There is an opportunity for a corporate body with interest on both sides of the Atlantic to undertake sponsorship of these trips.

Diuring my exciting visit I was surprised at the number of camogic players whom I knew from home. Former pressident of N.A.C.A., Marion Conroy holder of an All-Ireland (senior) medal with Dublin, now playing with Boston Eire Og, has offered to organise a seminar for referees similar to those being organised here, with a view to keeping refereeing standards in line wherever the game is played.

Katthleen McDonagh, founder member of the Young Ireland club (with the full co-operation of her Galway born husbrand, John) 20 years ago, is a jewel in the crown of camogie in America. She seems to be behind the organisation of all that takes place in New York. She maintains very close links with the G.A.A. to the advantage of both associations.

Breige Lavery, secretary of the N.A.C.A. is a graduate of Coleraine University and played Ashbourne here before emigrating. She will readily admit that only for camogie she would not have stayed in America. Both Kathleen and Breige are steeped in Irish culture and reflect the ethos of what camogie is.

It is important that America/Canada, like Britain, becomes much more an integral part of the association. Too often it can be viewed as a type of body out there on the periphery.

There is no reason why our home players cannot participate in games in America during the summer season. It means a lot to the clubs there and they are always most welcome. There is a need for a much greater two-way flow of information, ideas and personnel. Al of this would help to make our association much more vibrant and effective.



n the 1932 Tailteann games Louth were selected en bloc to represent Ireland against Great Britain in a camogie match played along with a football match Ireland v America. The Louth girls had a very easy victory on a score of 4-5 to 0-0. In the Inter-provincial final that year Leinster defeated Connacht 7-11 to 1-9. Nan Boyle was again on the team and a very promising young player from Darver

Tailteann games final there were two girls from Darver club on the Leinster team: Nan Boyle and Rose Quigley.

Kathleen Hanratty was also selected and scored 4-1 of Leinster's total. They won the Leinster senior championship in 1934 by defeating Dublin, Kilkenny and Meath in the final 7-3 to 5-1. They went on to beat Galway in the All-Ireland semi-final 2-3 to 2-1 and lost to Cork in the final 4-3 to 1-4. Leinster senior Champions again in 1936 after defeating Dublin, 5-4 to 4-1 and in the All-Ireland semi-final lost out to Galway 3-6 to 2-3 and to Cork in the All-freland final in Croke Park on a score of 6-4

1939 again brought success at Leinster level accounting for Meath 8-2 to 4-1 but were knocked out by old rivals Cork in the All-Ireland semifinal. The next year they retained the Leinster Championship title with a 7-6 to 2-2 win over Kildare in the final. The All-Ireland semi-final played at Darver again saw the girls from the 'Wee County' play second fiddle to 'the Leesiders', the score 4-3 to 1-5.

They were re-graded junior in 1962 and won the Leinster junior championship, qualified for the Intermediate final and lost out to Wexford 3-4 to 2-2. In 1964 they met the same fate against the same opponents. Kilkerly Club won the Leinster Junior Club Championship in 1977 defeating Dunboyne, Meath 3-2 to 1-2. The following year St Anne's kept the Leinster Club Championship title in Louth when they overcame the Kildare Champions Cappagh in the final 6-4 to 2-0.

Leinster junior champions again in 1980 and defeated by Tyrone in the All-Ireland semi-final. In 1981 they reached the National junior league final, and were defeated by Cavan in a replay by 0-2. 1982 was their year or giory. They beat Galway for a first All-Ireland title

After that victory they were graded senior, but after three years at the top without success they were re-graded junior in 1986.

There are six clubs registered at present and competitions are organised for all grades from under 12 to senior in League and Championship. Recently the County under 14 team won the Leinster Championship. At junior level they are team building and should be a force to be reckoned with in the not-too-distant future.

the Chair. For ten of those years he was joined by his daughter Bernadette as Secretary. His hard work and dedication was rewarded when he was elected Chairman of Leinster Council. Peter is currently on the Management Comittee of Central Council and County PRO.

Annual Congress held at Howth Lodge Hotel elected a new President of the Association Belle O'Loughlin, Warrenpoint, Down, Belle won this prestigious position at her second attempt. Last time she was defeated by two votes, and had four votes to spare over Phyliss Breslin, Dublin. The new President hopes to continue the good work of the Association, which is stepping up in pace in preparation for its Centenary in ten years time.

It was one of the largest attended Congresses for many years. representing 65,000 registered members of the Association. There were 44 motions tabled. Among those that got through were: 1. That a Committee be set up to look into the possible affiliation between Cumann Camogaiochta na nGael and Cumann Luithcleas Gael. 2. That a player of the match award be presented in the following All-Ireland finals: Senior, Intermediate, Junior and Minor.

A motion proposed by Kilkenny that the size of the sponsorship logo on uniforms be increased was also passed and is sure to create more sponsorship. The North American Board tabled two motions that the All-Ireland Camogie Champions and an All-Star selection visit the US as ambassadors for the promotion of Camogie in the US at least every three years, and in alternate years US All-Stars go to Ireland to play against Championship teams. This was defeated because of the expense it would incur.

They also lost out in their second motion that a Camogie Co-Ordinator for oversees be appointed to concentrate on the needs and aims of clubs and teams overseas.

The All-Ireland Primary Schools Committee launched their firstever Camogie Magazine at a reception at the Howth Lodge Hotel. Dublin's Lord Mayor Tomas MacGiolla launched the book, which is the a credit to those involved. (More about it later.)

Our Association has developed and expanded in various ways during the nine decades of it's history and has met the challenges of the various eras. Over the years, each stage in development, and each new direction taken by the Association, has contributed to it's overall growth and present position. The organisation has adapted to changing times and values while keeping sight of it's ideals and aims.

The pace and nature of change in the modern era pose new challenges for us and touch virtually every aspect of our Association. Cumann Camogaiochta na nGael has much to offer in terms of the game itself, it's ideals and aspirations, and it's potential as an influence for good in society. The challenge lies in promoting our game in a way which will attract and retain the young people of today so that we may look forward to continued growth as we reach our centenary.

In reviewing the past year and in planning for the future, we need to recognise both our strength and weaknesses, build on those strengths, avail of opportunities to develop and, in doing so, enable our Association to embark on it's second century with well founded optimism.

There were several interesting aspects to the competitions during 1993. Kilkenny, which initially proposed the 15-a-side Test Series hosted the first weekend trial, won the first National Senior League final to be played with 15-a-side. Armagh achieved a unique double in winning its first Junior Championship title with 12-a-side and the National Junior League tiel with 15a-side Armagh was the first name to be inscribed on Corn De Burca when it won the first Junior League in 1980. Clare won it's first Intermediate title, bringing to four the titles won by Munster.

Galway had the unusual distinction of reaching the Senior, Junior, Minor and Club Championship finals, as well as the semi finals of both Senior and Junior National Leagues. Now, with the disappointment of losing behind them, the people of Galway may look back with pride on a tremendous achievement and equally tremendous displays against excellent Cork, Armagh, Tipperary, Kilkenny and Dublin teams.

Dublin also suffered the disappointment of losing two finals but, like Galway, should take heart from it's achievements.

It is heartening for all of us to see All-Ireland titles go to six different counties, and two different Provinces, and also, to see the progress of several other counties. Down contested three semi finals, Intermediate and Minor Championship and Senior National League. Wexford reached the Senior Championship semi final, Kildare the Intermediate semi final and Carlow it's first ever Junior Championship semi final. Derry and Donegal shared top points in their zone of the National Junior League, while Limerick joined Galway as leaders in their zone.

London continues to make steady progress and is now in a position of having competitions at three grades to cater for it's players. They have also established a Referees Committee. A very welcome development during 1993 was the introduction of Camogie at

underage level. Despite the enormity of the task the American Board making also is progress and making every effort to develop both in the United States and Canada.

The work of the three Colleges' Councils is vital to the consolidation and development of Camogie. continued progress at every level augurs well for the future. C.C.LA. has found it necessary to restructure it's competitions in order to cater for the growing number of Colleges affiliating to it. With the of Colleges affiliating to it. increasing number going on to third level, and with the growth of Third Level Colleges themselves throughout the country, C.C.I.A. is looking to the future and streamlining it's organisation so that it will be in a position to avail of opportunities for development.

Comhairle na n-Iarbhunscoileanna continue to expand and to successfully manage the task of catering for the various school structures at second level 1993 marked a milestone in the history of Na nIarbhunscoileanna as it say Ulster Colleges Council celebrate fifty

years in existence.

It is self evident that we need to bring our game to as many primary school girls as possible. With our own girls as possible. Comhairle, Na Coiste Contae, Cumann na mBunscol and the LN.T.O. working together, we should be enabled to realise

our potential in this area.

Feile na nGael proves to be an annual high point for our participating Under fourteen teams. It is a delight to all of us to see our young girls and boys displaying the skill of the game at such a high standard and, in particular, to see them enjoying our own Gaelic games. Feile na nGael gives an opportunity to each county to promote and develop Camogie and to attract both the young people and their parents to our Association.

As we enter the last few years of our first century in existence and, as we face the changes and challenges of the twentieth century, we might ask ourselves what we need to accomplish in order that Cumann Camogaiochta na nGael can adapt to change and meet those challenges

TWENTY Cork Colleges titles, 16 Munster titles, seven All-Irelands, Senior county winners for the last three years in-a-row, junior winners for the last four years, and - signs that there's no fall-off in talent the first-years recently won their county title, another four-in-a-row. And all in the last 10 years!

In the '93 season, they were eligibile for 10 competitions - they made the finals of all 10, losing only two. Unfortunately, these were the two big ones - the All-Ireland senior and junior.

On the week that I called to see them, they wrapped up two more titles - the Munster Senior League, when they beat Templemore by 3-8 to 2-7, and the First-Years County Championship. They are the reigning All-Ireland junior and seven-a-side champions.

Surely, you would think, this College is a household name? St. Mary's Secondary in Char-

You've probably never heard of them, and, after this brief moment in the limelight - such as it is possibly won't hear of them again for a while. And that is bugely unfair.

Two principal reasons for this — the sport at which they're picking up all those titles is camogie, and the school is in limbo — on the Cork/Limerick

border.

Well, in the last few years, the girls of St. Mary's have defeated more than a few all-boys teams. In some of those cases the boys, admittedly, were a year younger than the girls, but still...

NOT SURPRISED

I am not surprised at the levels of ability in camogie. Both my mother and my older sister could fairly hurl - though when I think of it now, my sister could also unfairly hurl! But that's another story.

Suffice to say for the moment - camogie doesn't get the recognition, support or publicity it deserves. Promotion, publicity badly needed. Perhaps a

few good camogie reporters from within the ranks... could go on, but this is not a camogie treatise. Let's get back to St. Mary's, and the second reason they're denied recognition. Limbo - the Cork/ Limerick border.

Most of the players of St. Marys come from Limerick clubs, Granagh and Ballyagran being the two power-bases there. A few come from the only Cork club in the area, Newtown (an amazing statistic that - only one camogie club in the hurling stronghold of North Cork), with the occasional player from Ballyhea. In just a few years playing camogie, Frances Broderick and Claire O'Callaghan

have more All-Irelands than most of the male hurlers that Ballyhea ever produced, and this they achieved almost anonymously.

Because the expense of travelling to Cork was prohibitive, the Newtown camogie club opted to play in the Limerick competitions, but as a result of that decision, the Newtown girls end up playing for Limerick in inter-county competition, which contributes to their lack of recognition in Cork.

This article, then, is a belated attempt to recognise the achievements of the school.

The driving force behind camogie in Charleville is the due of Spanish and Maths teacher Vincent Harrington and PE teacher Anne-Marie O'Keefe. It's a tough job

"In every school, it seems to be left up to just a few teachers to do all the work. We have to try and organise the buses, the players, the jerseys, hurleys, balls - the whole lot. On a few occasions, half-time came around before we realised we forgot to bring water! Sometimes we wonder if the girls themselves realise all the work involved...

They do, Vincent... "I think Mr. Harrington is great - he never criticises us if we get things wrong, always finds reasons to praise us. He and Miss

O'Keefe give up lots of their spare time..."

DEDICATION

So spoke Muireann Harrington - no relation of Vincent's - the current junior and senior full-back of St. Marys. The girls also gave up much of their spare time, training twice a week right through the Christmas break, the mid-term break, and Easter. That's dedication.

Is Muireann worried about injuries? "Full-face helmets are compulsory, even in training. Anyway, if you know the game, know how to pull, you won't get injured..."

Muireann is one of those Cork girls currently playing inter-county with Limerick, at U-16 level.

Camogie at the school is almost self-financing, with most of the year's expenses met through a sponsored walk on the beautiful Ballyhouras and a well-supported camogie parents' flag day in Char-

Vincent was also unstinting in his praise of the Newtown and Charleville GAA clubs, for their work in preparing fields, dressingrooms, showers etc for the "home" games. Charleville GAA also hostest a formal evening for the teams at their impressive social club—the girls appreciated being appreciated. And don't we all.

n March 1994, Belle O'Loughlin was elected by a four-vote margin to lead Cumann Camogaíochta na nGael towards its centenary in 2004. She became the 23rd President and the seventh from Ulster. Gallant Tipperary fail to Galway

Galway 1-13 Tipperary 1-8

ALL-IRELAND Junior Camogie champions in Tipperary must wait a while tonger in its attempt to become a force at Senior level, but if their display against red hot favourites Galway in this keenly contested senior league final at sun-kissed Ballinasloe on Sunday last is anything to go by, the wait will be well worthwhile. In the end Galway's experience allied to a crucial goal from Imelda Hobbins, three minutes into the second-half, saw them kill off a very spirited challenge from the Tipperary ladies.

Hobbins goal was a gift from heaven for last years All-Ireland senior finalists. Galway had started in rivetting fashion and looked like demolishing Tipperary as they raced into a 0-5 to 0-1 lead after seven minutes. However, a grand goal from Noelle Kennedy after eleven minutes brought Tipp on level terms, and the sides were deadlocked again when referee sounded the half time

Within three minutes of the second period the favourites had amassed 1-2 and how crucial Hobbins goal turned out to be as on the strength of it the home county took a grip that they never relinquished. Tipp fought like tigers but could never break down a Galway three point advan-tage, and the winners fin-ished with style to fully deserve their five point tally.

So, Galway girls reversed the result of the Senior hurling league final. And it happened in a game played in scorching sunshine on a beautiful Duggan Park sur-face. But in defeat Tipperary can take a sizeable dollop of consolation. After all the

Westerners had contested last years Senior All-Ireland final only to lose to Cork, and on the way to this years league decider they defeated the same opposition. They had plenty of experience therefore, and it showed up when the crunch came in this entertaining tie.

Tipperary, on the other hand, had come from the Intermediate grade last year to the Senior league to gain experience, and that they certainly achieved. Disappointed they may have been to have fallen at the final hurdle, but the great work being invested in the county in recent years, winning three Munster Junior titles and one All-Ireland, as well as last years provincial Intermediate success, is paying handsome dividends, and it augurs well for their future in Senior ranks. The bulk of the side is young and this sprightly performance should give them great heart.

Tipperary took the scalps of some of the games strongest outfits on the way to the final of this competition that, incidentally, was played with fifteen a side. And there can be no argument that they had every chance of winning this game had they availed of several chances in the firsthalf. On the contrary Galway used all their craft in the early stages to build up an advantage, and in centre-forward Sharon Glynn they had a magnificent target-hitter. She accounted for ten points of their total, nine from frees, and it was her accuracy that time and time again scuttled Tipperary's confidence just it seemed the Premier County were in a promising position. She had four of her sides five points in seven minutes, the other coming from the stick of Deirdre Costello, and Tipp had one in reply from Noelle Kenne-

Indeed we witnessed seven frees in seven minutes.
Noelle Kennedy scored Tipperary's second when Ann
Glesson was fouled, and then came Tipps goal after a beautiful move involving Deirdre Hughes and Catise-rine Bourke was finished to the net by Noelle Kennedy (0-7 to 1-2). That score gave Tipp great confidence and the defence took a grip on the dangerous Galway attack, while Kaiffe Moloney at midfield, and Claire Madden were particularly prominent. Indeed, up to the half way stage the much vaunted Galway only managed two points and Tipperary were in with a great chance as the sides remained tied on a scoreline 1-4 to 0-7.

The early stages of the second-half were going to be vital bowever, and Galway made its mark in good time. Sharon Glynn pointed in twenty seconds, and fol-lowed with a score from a free. And then before Tipperary had time to take corrective action Hobbins struck for her goal. Ironically, another forward had mishit the ball, and the half forward got a great chance, and made no mistake from close range. In three minutes Galway had moved five points to the good. Any fears, however, of a Galway runaway, from a Tipperary viewpoint, did not one is happy to say, materialise. But fair dues to the home county they never let their strangle-hold slip and had tremendous performers in Sheila Coen at full-back, goalie Tracey Laheen who made vital saves from Ann Gleeson, and Catherine Bourke, Brid Stratford at centre-back, Sharon Glynn, Imelda Hobbins, and sub Martina Harkins who made a huge difference when in-troduced scoring two nice points.

Tipperary fought with all

they knew to the end, but they could never reduce Galways three point advantage. In Claire Madden in the firsthalf they had a royal perfor-mer, and Regina O'Meara, who replaced the injured Suzanne Kelly from the start, also did well. Teresa Bourke and Cora Kennedy played well too, particularly in second-half, while Kaiffe Moloney and Meave Stokes were always battling hard.

Noelle Kennedy took top honours up front and never gave up the chase while Ann Glesson worked like a beaver from start to finish. Goalie Ailish Delaney made one fine save. Helen Kiely also caught the eye in the second-half. To be fair every player of the fifteen made a big effort against a much more experienced side. Now Tipp must continue in the Intermediate championship and hopes are high of doing well after such a fine sojourn in the Senior league.

IT will be different, and it ought to be close, very close. The "different" bit I can vouch for; the "close" bit is always a bit dodgy when it comes to sport, and camogie is no exception.

On paper, tomorrow evening's County Senior Camogie Final at Clonmult Park in Midleton ought to be a finely balanced contest.

After all, it pits one half of the Cork senior team against the other half. More or less.

In theory, you can't get much closer than that. In practice - as so often in sport - the outcome could be very different.

What matters overall and this is surely what everyone will be hoping for - is that this Final should be good for camogie in general in Cork.

Different

This final itself is cer-

tainly different, as I have already said, because for the first time in nearly 20 years it is being contested by a club side (Glen Rovers) and a divisional side (Seandun).

The whole thing is by way of an experiment -and one which has not been universally welcomed.

This is especially so on the part of the Glen, and the attitude of the Blackpool club is understand-

But it is possible to argue that what is good for the Glen isn't necessarily good for camogie in general in Cork.

Crux

That's the crux which



the Camogie County Board had to confront.

Because of the Glen's dominance in Cork in recent years - and the effects of this on the morale of other clubs - the County Board decided to make some changes.

In order to stiffen the competition for the Glen, it was decided that in the 1994 County Championship they would play divisional sides.

And these sides, being based on a panel of players drawn from a number of clubs, should put it up to the Glen.

That's the theory anyway.

Practice

How it works out in practice is very much another matter.

And, of course, the whole idea has left the Glen aggrieved.

They feel - with some ustification - that they are being penalised for being

That argument has

Looking at things from the point of view of the County Board, however, a somewhat different picture emerges.

The good of the overall game in Cork, and the responsibility for fostering that game, lies with the County Board.

Healthy

It so happens that right now the sport is in a healthy condition in the county, with the Cork senior team attempting this year to win their third All-Ireland title in a row.

Similarly, at club level, the Glen will be trying to capture their third All-Ireland senior club championship in a row.

So 1994 could be the year of a double treble (if you see what I mean) for Cork camogie.

So why isn't everyone happy?
The problem is the Glen's dominance.

If they go on sweeping them in the manner in which they have been doing it in recent years, then other clubs will simply throw in the towel.

Not quite: they'll come out and play, but their hearts won't really be in it.

This is the scenario with which the County Board had to contend.

Cork may be flying just now in the All-Ireland series - but how long can that last if the bottom starts to fall out of the club structure, club competi-tions and club morale?

Clubs are where the game is nurtured, so if things start to go wrong at that level, then the rot soon spreads.

Which is why we have this year's experiment.

It may not have the desired effect, and it may have left the Glen feeling badly done by.

But at least it is wellintentioned, and it can be reviewed and altered.

Okay - Glen Rovers see things differently.

They are entitled to. They have enjoyed great success in recent years, but they have worked very hard for it.

I have said it before, and I'll say it again - the girls who play camogie don't get anything like the credit they deserve for the effort they put in, and the sacrifices they make.

That said, it must also be acknowledged in a wider context that what's good for the Glen isn't necessarily good for camogie in Cork.

So will tomorrow evening's game in Midleton be good for the game overall? I think it will.

And I think it will be a true test of the Glen's greatness.

GLEN ROVERS created history at Midleton last night when they won the Cork county senior camogie championship title for a record 20th time and their fifth year in-a-row with a five point victory over Seandun in a magnificent final.

In a match that gave the championship a tremendous boost, Seandun put it up to the champions, but buckled under the enormous pressure the Glen applied in the closing minutes.

When it comes to writing the history of Glen camogie, the name of Lyn Dunlea will figure prominently. Almost single handedly she rescued her side from impending defeat with a display that will rank as one of the best ever at this level.

Down four points 15 minutes into the secondhalf and defeat staring her side in the face, she grabbed the game by the scruff of the neck and turned it right round in Glen's favour.

On moving to full-forward, she plucked Therese O'Callaghan's long delivery out of the sky, but with only the 'keeper to beat, blasted the ball

inches over the bar. She tacked on two further points before bringing the crowd to its feet seconds later when she beat her way past two defenders before unleashing an unstoppable shot to the net.

However, Lyn's display didn't earn her the "person of the match" award because that went to Therese O'Callaghan for her marvellous secondhalf display at midfield. But Dunlea's contribution

of 1-10 of her side total easily marked her out as a player of exceptional ability.

Seandun lost no caste in defeat and can be very pleased with their contribution to an outstanding match played in the proper spirit. Inspired by the brilliance of Colette O'Mahony, Paula Goggins Sheehnagh Morley and Karen Mellerick, they took the game to the Glen from the throw-in and were

well worth their 0-6 to 0-1 lead after 20 minutes.

Glen were shocked by the ferocity of Seandun's early challenge, but gradually they came more into the game in the closing five minutes and the accuracy of Dunlea from frees had them on level terms at the end of the first-half.

The divisional side made the running in the second-half and were rewarded with a splendid goal from substitute Eithne Duggan in the 27th minute.

The champions were rattled, but responded superbly and in those closing minutes the "Spirit of the Glen" was seen at its very best as they fought back to retain their title.
