This year has been a very successful one for Cumann Camogaiochta Ard Mhacha, having had considerable success with county teams, fantastic achievements at club level and a number of prestigious individual awards for Armagh camogs.



It was another fine year for our County Senior Team, having come through a difficult national league campaign; they began to find their feet and progress steadily through the Nancy Murray Cup Championship. Under the guidance of Patsy Magee and his dedicated backroom team the girls advanced to the All Ireland Nancy Murray Cup Final for the second consecutive year. Having been narrowly defeated, after a replay, in last years final the Orchard Cailini approached the final with great determination and hope. However, despite leading at half-time, the hard work throughout the year did not see them gain success and they were unfortunately defeated by a superb Kildare side. Nevertheless, the resolve of these young players shone through in the end, as having suffered defeat in the All Ireland Final they bounced back to obtain the Ulster Intermediate Championship title only a few weeks later.

The County Minors also had a very successful year, winning the Ulster Shield competition and progressing to an All Ireland Final against Carlow. However, despite a superb performance, showing a very high standard of skill, they were narrowly defeated by an outstanding Carlow team who have contested the Minor Final for two consecutive years. The achievements of this squad is testament to the management team of Micheal Murphy and Olive McGeown. This very young panel produced some fantastic performances

Under the management trio of Margaret McKee, Bernie McBride and Roisin O'Neill, our Under 16 panel achieved success. They produced some exceptional displays of skill throughout the Ulster competition and went on to claim the Ulster Shield title. Having done so they progressed to the All Ireland series where they performed well against a strong Derry squad who went on to win the competition.

Our Under 14 squad continues to be the foundation of our County Teams for future years. This year's squad saw 40 children benefit from having a number of coaching sessions with a variety of experienced coaches from within the County. They participated in the Ulster Blitz and showed



a great display of talent for the future of Armagh Camogie.

A year in Armagh Camogic never goes without a huge number of prestigious awards or memorable events for individuals and clubs within our sport. This year St. Brenda's, Ballymacnab and Sinead Kiernan, Madden represented Armagh in the All Ireland Feile and Skill competition respectively. Despite no silverware on this occasion, both were great ambassadors for our County.


Armagh have been extremely honoured in recent years to have a number of girls from various clubs within the County who receive Ulster Colleges' All Star Awards and this year has been no

Mallow held their composure and continued to work away.

Ballygarvan goalkeeper, Mary Ellen O'Donovan, had to be at her best to deny them with two excellent saves, and with her defence solid under pressure Mallow found the going tough.

Ballygarvan stretched their advantage with points from Christina Murphy and Aisling Byrne, but Mallow, fighting hard, replied with a Katie Buckley point before Bronagh Ganley cut the Ballygarvan lead to just a point with a goal with four minutes remaining.

From here to the finish Mallow gave it their all in search of an equaliser but Ballygarvan held their lines under a lot of pressure to ensure they were not going to be denied the title on this occasion.

THERE'S a very thin line between agony and ecstasy in sport. It can be so cruel and yet so kind. It was kind to Inniscarra yesterday and it hit Imokilly a sucker-punch.

Leading by two points entering the fourth minute of injury-time, it looked as if Imokilly had done enough to win their first title in 34 years. Inniscarra won a 45. Seemingly undecided at what option to take, Niamh Dilworth didn't cleanly connect. Imokilly defended and Inniscarra won a free nearer the posts. Dilworth had to go for goal now. Her low strike was blocked. In the scramble for possession, Rena Buckley reacted best connecting to the net and sending the Inniscarra supporters into frenzy.

Gearoidin Kearney had a last grasp chance to send the game to extra-time with a 45 but it dropped short and with it came the final whistle.

Winning the toss Inniscarra played into the watery sun. They had the better of the early exchanges but came up against good Imokilly defending where Niamh O'Keeffe and Mary O'Connor were on top. Two points from Joanne Casey and one from Gearoidin Kearney from placed balls settled the teams.

As has happened so often this season, Imokilly took the lead despite Inniscarra winning the possession stats. In the mucky conditions, a Marie O'Neill cross hung around the goalmouth too long and Emer O'Farrell kicked home to give the divisional side a 1-1 to 0-2 lead 12 minutes in.

Niamh McCarthy hit an excellent point from out around the 40 and

CORK CAMOGIES LITTLE ALL IRELAND

Since the competitions inception in 1932 ninteenn names have been engraved as holders of Cork Camogie most prestigious title. Fifteen clubs, three divisions, one university and one school have garnered the honour of being crowned Cork senior county champions. Today Inniscarra and Imokillt will be hoping to be added to the roll of honour, Inniscraa looking for a historic first imokilly for their seventh title.

In 1932 a group of school girls made history taking the Science Cup for the first time when the pupils from St. Aloysius became the first winners. 1933 saw Nora Kelleher carry the trophy in triumph as Muskerry took their first title they had to wait until 2007 before Catriona Foley follow in her footsteps. Kitty Cotter led Mayfield to their crown in 1935 and in 1936 there were new champions as U.C.C. led by Lil Kirby defeated Hillside.

Lee Hosiery were led by Mary Valley to the first of their successes in 1937, again in 1938 new champions climbed the victory rostrum as Old Aloysian's Past pupils were crowned champions captained by Renee Fitzgerald, the club would later go on and add fourteen more titles to their collection.

1947 heralded success for another divisional side when Imokilly defeated Lee Hosiery, Imokilly in later years added a further five titles taking five in a row from 1972 to 1976. Mary Delea led Blackrock to glory in 1948 when the Rockies proved to strong for the champions Imokilly as they brought the first of two titles to the famous club.

1950 was Glen Rover's year as Siobhan O' Brien led her side to victory over Blackrock, Glen went on to add a further twenty one titles to lead the roll of honour with the most titles to their credit, achieving a historic seven in a row on two occasions 1962 to 1968 and again from 1990 to 1996.

We had to wait until 1969 before another new name was added to the roll of honour and it was again past pupils who were creating their own bit of history when Mary Crowley led the South Pres., girls to title number one, in later year's two more titles were added.

Again a big gap until 1977 when Mid Cork were to the fore with the emergence of Eire OG as champions led by Marion Mc Carthy (Reck) The Ovens girls have added to their achievements on three further occasions.

East Cork was to the fore as Breda Landers led Killeagh to their first success in 1980 four more titles followed.

A big gap between 1980 and 1997 before new champions emerged when Eithne Duggan led Bishopstown to the first of their four county championship successes. In less than two year's we again had new champions when Stephanie Dunlea held the trophy aloft for the girls from Cloughduy, they retained the title the following year.

In 2003 Fr O Neills finally broke the hoodoo that had followed them when Fiona O' Driscoll carried the Punch Shoe Care Trophy in triumph to Ballymacoda as Fr O' Neills defeated Inniscarra. The following year divisional side Carrigdhoun took their first title led by Ballygarvan's Catriona Kelly. Cloughduv were back the following year as Inniscarra again suffered heartbreak.

Twenty one year of trying came to an end for Colette O' Mahony in 2006 as her beloved Blues finally took the title Lynda O' Connell receiving the trophy from her fellow club member and Barrs selector on the day county board chairperson Marian Mc Carthy.

Divisional side Muskerry bridged a seventy two year gap in 2007 to take the cup out to Mid Cork as Rockbans Cathriona Foley captained her side to victory. 2008 saw Douglas reach the top to take their first crown spearheaded by the youthful Julia White and the Mackey twins Pamela and Katriona with proud captain Amanda O' Regan becomining the first Douglas player to lift the trophy.

A new chapter was written last year as St Catherine's Faith Noonan became the first player from her club to lift the coveted trophy after they held off the challenge of Milford at their first attempt. Today Inniscarra will be hoping that it will be third time lucky for them having lost out in 2003 and 2005 they are hoping today is the day, Imokilly will be battling to reach the top as in the former glory days of the seventies. A late Inniscarra point from Margaret Cosgrove has ensured we are all back again today for what we hope will be another thrilling contest. Will it be Edel Murphy or Margarter Noelle O' Sullivan who gets to lift the famous trophy????

We wish both sides the best of luck in their endeavours.

The certificate is a level six single module award on the National Framework of Qualifications.

Speaking about the Certificate in Sports Administration, President of the Camogie Association, Joan O'Flynn, said:

"Under the Camogie Association's five year national development plan "Camogie - Our Game Our Passion", Volunteer Development and Leadership and Excellent Governance and Organisational Development are two of five key objectives.

"Our Administrators have identified a need for training to us as an Association. This course provides a fantastic opportunity to those intending to improve their existing skills and knowledge in their roles while also receiving a recognised qualification from AIT - one of the country's leading institutes for sports and related programmes."

Four Roads reach All Ireland Junior Club Final

All-Ireland Junior Club Camogie Championship Semi-Final

A wonderful display of commitment, passion and skill catapulted Four Roads into this season's All-Ireland junior club final after they proved far too streetwise for Leinster champions Kilmessan in Sunday's semi-final at Ballyforan. The South Roscommon girls produced their best performance of the season to dominate their Meath opposition and leave themselves on the cusp of the ultimate accolade.

Twelve months ago, Four Roads were left floored on the canvass after a chastening experience against Lavey from Derry at the same stage of the competition. But Simor Coyle's charges were not to be denied for the second year in succession on their home patch as they outplayed Kilmessan for large periods of Sunday's semi-final.

A good start certainly proved to be half the battle as far as Four Roads were concerned. They pulverised Kilmessan from the opening whistle. Lizzie Glennon-Tully and Niamh Coyle were on fire up front and, aided by the dominance of Gertie Dowd and Catherine Rogerson at midfield, they quickly established a six-point interval advantage, 0-9 to 0-3.

A feature of that prosperous opening 30 minutes was Four Roads' sheer desire not to let Kilmessan any time to settle in possession. That pressure resulted in numerous Kilmessan turnovers and Four Roads duly reaped the rewards with a succession of brilliant scores.

Kilmessan matched Four Roads for the third quarter but they had left themselves with far too much to do. A heroic defensive effort from the Tisrara girls blocked off numerous avenues to goal. The three-pointer that the Meath girls needed to make life nervous for the home side wouldn't come, and two late goals in the final five minutes from substitute Aisling Rogerson and Glennon-Tully sealed the deal for a delighted home side.

Four Roads were imperious during the opening half. They were far stronger than Kilmessan and showed the hunger necessary to build up a substantial lead. They didn't get off to the best of starts, however, as referee Cathal Egan signalled for a debatable penalty in the opening minute. No one was quite sure what the penalty was for but wing-forward Aileen Donnelly drove the sliothar over the bar.

Kilmessan wouldn't score again for another 14 minutes às Grainne Egan, Niamh Coyle, Glennon-Tully and Donna Kelly posted excellent points from play.

Kelly's score was particularly impressive as the Four Roads captain had been badly injured as a result of a wild pull from one of her own players only minutes earlier.

Donnelly reduced the gap to two points with an impressive free from distance in the 15th minute but a Glennon-Tully free was followed by three more points from play by Patricia Lennon, Gertie Dowd and Glennon-Tully to open up a 0-8 to 0-2 advantage. Both sides swapped scores before the break from frees, Glennon-Tully and Donnelly predictably on target.

Kilmessan enjoyed far more possession in the third quarter but they were confronted by a Four Roads brick wall in defence. Donnelly was presented with a few opportunities from close-in frees but she couldn't manufacture the goal her side required. She did manage two points but Coyle and Glennon-Tully were also on target from frees.

Frustrated by their inability to make inroads, Kilmessan visibly tired as the half wore on and this allowed Four Roads the latitude to finish with a flourish. Glennon-Tully pointed from play before substitute Aisling Rogerson announced her arrival with a goal within 60 seconds of her introduction as she took possession around Kilmessan netminder Noreen Sheridan to fire into an empty net.

Lizzie Glennon-Tully kept her composure to grab a second Four Roads goal two minutes from time and the Player of the Match finished the scoring with a free to leave her side dreaming of All-Ireland glory against Corofin from Clare on Sunday week.



Eoghan Cormican looks ahead to the All Ireland Junior Club Final Eoghan Cormican looks ahead to the All Ireland Junior Club Final With Christmas just around the corner, the All Ireland junior crown up for grabs this afternoon is undoubtedly top of the wish list for Munster Champions Corofin and Four Roads of Roscommon, who lock horns in this eagerly awaited joust.

Today's encounter may not carry the same appeal as other deciders around this time of year, or generate the same media interest but you can be sure that there's not many sporting enthusiasts in North Clare or South Roscommon who won't make the short journey to Kenny Park, Athenry for what promises to be a riveting contest.

Adding to the Nancy Murray Cup captured last year, an All Ireland club title for Four Roads would represent another major step in the development of camogie in Roscommon. Nevertheless, their presence in today's final is proof positive of the huge strides made by all involved in the small ball game in the county.

Boosted by provincial success, Corofin will certainly not be lacking in confidence ahead of their first All Ireland final appearance.

Their talented centre-forward Clare Commane stepped up to the plate in the semi-final shooting 2-9, while, on the other side, Four Roads sharpshooter Lizzie Glennon-Tully tallied 1-7. Indeed, both teams possess a potent forward division and it may come down to which defence can best stamp their authority on proceedings.

Four Roads manager Simon Coyle will be hoping that his half back line and midfield can get the kind of possession grip that they enjoyed in their historic semi-final win against Kilmessan, for there's enough wile to Lizzie Glennon-Tully and power in Niamh Coyle to turn the screw on the Corofin rearguard. Although at the other end Corofin will be confident that they too can inflict damage.

Centre-forward Clare Commane-whose battle with Siobhan Coyle should be one of the intriguing subplots of Sunday's tie-will spearhead the attack, ably assisted by Aoife Davoren and Marie Rafferty, both of whom are well capable of finding the target.

Dead ball specialist Commane amassed an incredible 2-9 in the semi-final, with Edel Keating and Clare minor Niamh O'Dea forming a formidable midfield partnership. Further back the field, full back Muireann Kelleher, Lisa Clancy and Brenda O'Donoghue operate a frugal rearguard.

Certainly, Four Roads semi-final win was a statement in itself, decorated with unrelenting commitment, flair, skill and electrifying pace from a potent offensive unit. Each of these ingredients contributed to a comfortable 2-13 to 0-6 win over Leinster Champions Kilmessan.

Interestingly, Four Roads were unsuccessful at provincial level losing out to Sarsfields of Galway who will represent Connacht at intermediate level.

That said, for Four Roads, this afternoon represents a shot at redemption. Having lost out to Lavey of Derry in the semi-final twelve months ago, their semi-final victory over Meath outfit Kilmessan ensured their passage in the showpiece event.

Corofin, however, were made to work all the way at the penultimate stage with two goals in the third quarter proving vital in carving out the win. Despite trailing Ulster hampions Tir na nOg (Antrim) at half time, the Clare side who defeated Cappoquin to capture the Munster title rallied superbly to seal a final berth.

The outcome may be very much in doubt, but what is a certainty is that an intriguing tussle lies in store as two parish's battle for the ultimate accolade.

Gertie Dowd and Catherine Rogerson provided the platform at midfield, while Siobhan Coyle and Marie Glennon-Kelly hurled as if their lives depended on it in defence.

In an interview with the Roscommon Herald ahead of today's final, Simon Coyle, who is joined by Joe Mannion, Mark Crosbie and Marie O'Brien,

on the management team was in no doubt what was required for All-Ireland success.

"In sport you challenge yourself to improve. We want to get back to the level we were at against Kilmessan but it won't be easy.

When Corofin hosted Four Roads this year in the All-Ireland Féile na nGael competition, little did they ever contemplate that the clubs would meet again so soon and at such a critical stage of the championship season.

Back in the Féile weekend in June, both clubs simply had their eye on county titles although admittedly from totally different perspectives. Four Roads were intent on completing a three-ina-row of county senior titles while Corofin were hoping to avoid a three-in-a-row of intermediate final losses and finally make the leap to senior for the first time.

However, Clare supporters' familiarity with Four Roads doesn't simply end with their Féile links and no, before you say it, it has nothing to do with Big Tom's greatest hit either, a song that has probably haunted the residents of Glenamaddy ever since. No, the connection stems from the Roscommon side's meeting with Kilmaley in the All-Ireland semi-final equivalent only two years ago. You would be forgiven for not remembering it as the game was hardly a classic, with the Clare champions strolling to a 4-11 to 0-03 victory that in hindsight was of scant preparation for the final.

However, how much information Corofin can extract from that game is questionable as there were mitigating circumstances for the one-sided result that November day in Gurteen. Clare camogie was on a high at the time, having just won the All-Ireland junior championship, with three Kilmaley players in the squad as well as four on the county minor panel that also reached the All-Ireland decider in early September. That buoyancy plus the first-half dismissal of Four Roads' county senior Donna Kelly ensured that Kilmaley cantered through their challenge but more significantly, the inequality in the championship was perhaps as pertinent to the final scoreline.

Kilmaley were the Clare senior champions and realistically should not have been in the same competition as the Roscommon senior champions when viewing it from a neutral camogie viewpoint. That format has since been restructured to provide a more level playing field and therefore after two successive losses, Four Roads finally got past the semi-final stage to meet the Clare intermediate champions, Corofin.

It makes this a difficult game to judge but in general terms, Corofin will go into this game with nothing to lose. The north Clare side have endured far more stringent tests along the way than their Roscommon counterparts and that alone has instilled a great bond within the camp than no domestic championship ever could. In contrast, Four Roads, despite an average winning margin of 15 points, don't really know how they will react when really put to the pin of their collar. Outside of their own county final against rivals Athleague, they have pretty much had it their own way against London side Tara and Meath's Kilmessan, hardly world beating camogie regions in the broader scheme of things. In fact, their only real challenge to date came in the form of Galway intermediate champions Sarsfields in the Connacht Intermediate decider but that ended in defeat.

Corofin may not have the All-Ireland series experience of their opponents but on the flip side they also are without the baggage caused by repeated defeats at the business end of the competition that Four Roads carry. Momentum has carried Corofin this far and as a once-off experience, they are fresher and not as war weary as their opponents and will be more than willing to give it everything in order to create further history for both club and county.

While 12 of the current Four Roads side also played

against Kilmaley in 2008 and 11 represented the county in their Ali-Ireland Junior A (Nancy Murray) victory last year, Corofin also have their aces in the pack in the form of Ali-Ireland Junior title winner from 2008, Claire Commane who has been their stand-out performer in recent years as well as rising star Niamh O'Dea who is surely one of the country's finest dual talents.

Corofin certainly didn't expect to make it this far. A long awaited county intermediate title was essentially their Holy Grail when setting out at the start of the year after two successive heartbreaking final defeats. However, now that they have made it this far, they will be determined to finish the job, no matter what their opponents or indeed the weather throws at them.

"From a personal point of view, being recognised as the player of the match in the 2006 final was a stand-out moment. It is of course only a bonus in a team sport where the goal is to train together and win together.

"I think that particular year I was at home and had that little bit more flexibility to train and do that bit extra and I would say the All-Star and the award in that year had the most meaning because I worked the hardest that year. It wasn't all plain sailing though as Cork were landed back to earth with a bang in 2007 with a heart-breaking loss to Wexford.

"I think the fact that Wexford hadn't won an All-Ireland title since 1976 had a huge bearing on the game.

"There was a positive pressure on them to do something for Wexford camogie that hadn't been done since the time some of their mothers had graced a Wexford jersey and credit to them, they relished that pressure.

"It came down to those two goals they scored in the first five minutes. We recovered and fought our way back in to the game but simply ran out of time, five minutes more and I think we would have won that game, hand on heart." Geary took a year out after the 2007 loss and ventured to Luxembourg on a work-placement with college before

returning to the fold again in 2009.

"There was a fear when I left that I might come back and not be good enough for the team anymore because as with all things, life can move on without you.

"I found myself on the outside looking in when I did come back to the panel in 2009 and they won an All-Ireland without me ever pucking a ball in Croke Park.

"The 15 the management picked to play did the job and I suppose it was a motivation for me, coming into 2010, to work harder and earn my place back.

"Constantly this year I reminded myself of where I was in 2009 and it made me committed to every aspect of playing with Cork, from the training to the league games and obviously the championship games."

Regardless of Geary's efforts though, Cork were the ones on the outside looking in at this year's All-Ireland final and Geary hopes there can be a reversal of fortunes in 2011. "Losing is never nice and not making the cut this year was a

difficult pill to swallow. "Picking up the All-Star was a small-consolation but to be honest it was a bit lonely being on that stage without my aw a teammates, as in previous years, so hopefully next year we can right the wrongs of 2010."

IT'S little wonder that the Cork County Camogie championship is viewed as the best in the country after once producing some again tremendous battles during the season.

Imokilly advanced from their own divisional playoff after a first round victory over Carbery and a comprehensive defeat of Carrigdhoun which very early on signalled their scoring prowess. Muskerry provided a walkover to Carrigdhoun in round one and Seandún didn't field, which was disappointing.

There were some shocks in the opening round of the championship proper, most notably with the shock defeat of St Catherine's by championship newcomers Ballincollig.

Events were hotting up. The semi-final pairings became Inniscarra v Douglas and Imokilly v Ballincollig. Both games ended in a draw. Niamh Dilworth grabbed the equaliser for Inniscarra in the final minute while two Marie O'Neill goals in the space of two minutes

gave Imokilly another bite of the cherry after it looked as if Ballincollig had done enough to see them through to their first senior county final. It was Ballincollig who levelled the match a minute into injury time to force a replay.

Inniscarra and Douglas served up another enthralling encounter when they met again seven days later with the game nearly heading for extra time. Level five times, it was Laura Burke's point eight minutes into injury-time which sent Inniscarra to their first final appearance in five

Amidst greasy underfoot conditions the sides were level four times in the opening period, six in total. The physical strength of Angela Walsh again proved crucial as casting aside the defensive challenge 49 minutes in she finished clinically to the net. Setting up teammate Emer O'Farrell for a second a minute later proved to be decisive as Imokilly emerged with a 2-8 to 1-8 victory.

The final was eagerly anticipated and extremely hard to call. And so it proved to be with it finishing all square in CIT, 4-9 a piece.

The atmosphere was electric. Substitute Margaret Cosgrove hit the equalising point as the third of the three minute's injury-time struck the clock. Inniscarra were rocked by the injury to Rena Buckley who failed to line out with a heavy shoulder injury. Imokilly too were hit for six when star player Angela Walsh had to leave the field 13 minutes in with ligament damage to her ankle. She re-appeared heavily strapped as the second half got underway, making a powerful impact. hitting 1-3.

It took five weeks to schedule the replay due to Inniscarra's involvement in the Munster series which they won in spectacular fashion and Inch Rovers' involvement in the Munster and All Ireland ladies football championship.

The replay was worth the wait.



League was also run over the two days with the girls split into eight teams playing seven games each. The games were very competitive and played with great energy.



Crumlin celebrate All-Ireland club title of 1985

All-Ireland Club Camogie Champions 1985

uchulainn is a name that might well be associated with a famous hound in history but it is also a name linked with one of the most famous of Dublin clubs, Cuchulainn nowadays known as Crumlin.

Some decades ago Camogie clubs did not form part of GAA clubs as they do these days. Many clubs had close ties with their local GAA club, but it was not until the late over the years. 1970's or there abouts that Camogie clubs began amalgamating with their local GAA counterparts.

The Cuchulainn club was founded in 1968 and always wore a smart blue and white outfit. They were always a smart outfit and when you met them in the Phoenix Park which back then ('70's/'80's) was the Mecca of Dublin Camogie you knew it would be a good game of camogie. They were always a tough side and competed well at various levels including senior A for a long number of years.

In 1980 a major decision was taken by the club to join up with the local GAA club - Crumlin. At that stage Crumlin had just won the Dublin senior hurling championship and had taken the Leinster title as well. This writer recalls the Cuchulainn club when they joined up they became known for some time as Crumlin Cuchulainn, They later became known as Crumlin.

It was a brave decision but one that put them on a firm path leading to an All-Ireland club title in 1985. By joining forces with Crumlin the camogie club suddenly found they had a great base as a large number of their girls came from the immediate area and many of the members already knew each other and had attended many matches

From 1982 until 1986 it might be hard for some to believe now but Dublin competed in every senior All-Ireland final, sadly only winning one in 1984. Many players from the Crumlin side were honoured during that glorious time by wearing the Blue and Navy of Dublin.

In 1983, Dublin hosted Feile na nGael which had a hugely positive impact on Dublin Camogie, Crumlin were one of the clubs that took part that year in the National Festival. More and more young players took up the game of Camogie in Crumlin and so Camogie was set for a bright future.

The girls were very fortunate that Crumlin were steeped in hurling history and that two dedicated men - Jimmy Boggan (RIP) and Billy Maloney were there to lend a hand to the Camogie team. The two men saw there was a lot of talent among the girls and so the hard slog began. Much

work was put in towards building a senior team of the future. Training under the two gentlemen took on a different aspect. It now became structured and suddenly the skill of the girls began to shine and it all fell into place when they won the county senior championship in 1985 beating UCD.

It was a huge day for the Crumlin club, but then they realised they might go on further and so the campaign began for Leinster and All-Ireland glory. They had a tough task in Leinster. Their first opponents were St.Anne's of Louth, they then took on the mighty St.Paul's of Kilkenny home to many famous Kilkenny players including the famous Downey twins Ann and Angela. Having overcome the Black and Amber champions it was on then to face the Wexford champions Buffers Alley who had won a remarkable four All-Ireland senior titles on the trot. Among the many famous players who played with Buffers in those winning All-Ireland sides was one Elsie Walsh who is now married to Brian Cody. With their first Leinster title now safe, they were a step closer to the coveted prize, but they knew they did not have an easy final ahead. No other GAA club in Dublin have managed to win a Leinster senior title in both hurling and Camogie.

Celebration time

Back in those days the All-Ireland final was played in one of the competing club grounds and so Crumlin were fortunate to have the All-Ireland played in their home ground of O'Toole Park. Their opponents in the final were the Galway champions Athenry who had many players who had won Colleges All-Ireland titles with Presentation Athenry. The Dubs knew it was a tough side, but any team who came under the influence of Jimmy Boggan were well trained and they ran out confidently on to the pitch that day. It might have been rather a dull-day weather wise but let me say the celebrations that night in Crumlin were anything but dull! The Bill Carroll Cup was safe in the hands of the Crumlin side for the first time ever.

Once again, Dublin Camogie was back in the limelight where it deserved to be. After all the hard work over the years the Crumlin side achieved glory. From there they made it back to back county titles, winning again in 1986. They were now the side to be reckoned with in Dublin. 1987 saw them complete the double of senior League and championship. They missed the title in 1988 but made up in 1989 by again winning the senior championship. Since then they have not won a senior title but like many Camogie clubs they are on the way back up.

New generation

With the assistance of GPO's the juvenile section is now flourishing and once again they are competing well at juvenile level. Many of the girls who played in the glory days of the 80's now have daughters playing in the juvenile ranks!

While many of the Crumlin girls played for Dublin many of them also became very involved in administration. Phil Gough (nee Barry) became the first female in Dublin to hold the position of Chairman of a GAA Club. Anne Redmond went on to referee at senior intercounty level and had the honour of officiating the 1987 All-Ireland senior Final. Her younger sister Aileen also became a very respected senior intercounty referee. When the Club won in 1985 four Redmond sisters played that day, Yvonne in goals, as well as Anne, Barbara and Aileen. All four sisters also played for Dublin.

It might be hard to credit that it is 25 years since the Crumlin outfit won that title, having been at the game it only feels like yesterday. It would be nice to see another Dublin club win an All-Ireland title, but it might be a little bit down the road yet.

Earlier this Autumn they re-enacted that glory day of 1985 when they had a puck around in Pearse Park where under the guidance of both Jimmy and Billy all the tough training of 1985 took place. They finished the day with a nostalgic night in O'Toole Park club-house where many recalled that famous day of 1985. Thanks for the memories girls.

AN extremely busy season for juvenile camogie was reviewed recently when the juvenile board held their convention at the Silversprings

Everybody in Camogie can be proud of the achievements of 2010. It was a fantastic year. It's impossible to do justice to the year in this Blog but I want to acknowledge some key accomplishments including some notable 'firsts'!



January

Settling into our new offices in Jones' Road and welcoming the Association's first Director of Communications and Marketing, Claire Egan, were significant moments early in 2010.

Hosting the premier third level competitions - the Ashbourne and Purcell Cup and Shield Finals together over one weekend was an early 'first' in 2010. The Committee of Comhairle Camógaíochta an Ard Oideachais (CCAO) under its then President Lynn Kelly and the local organising committee in the Cork Institute of Technology did a superb job.

The facilities and games were outstanding. I heard the 'off field' fun was pretty good too! Standard is now set for the 2011 competition in NUIG!

March

The Association's six year National Development Plan, Our Game Our Passion was ratified at the annual National Congress in Newbridge.

The Plan was developed by a very hard working Central Council sub-committee, under the chairmanship of Louise Byrne.

It signposts the future development of more clubs, competitions, coaches and referees, more people coming to our games, greater public profile and strong governance and organisational

In Semple Stadium, Thurles, Wexford put everybody on notice by coveting back to back national league titles in Division 1 and Division 2 - another first! Laois and Tyrone get their name on the Division 3 and Division 4 league titles.

We were back in the meeting rooms for Special National Congress in Croke Park. This considered proposals to amend our governing instrument, the Official Guide or An Treoir Oifigiúil from a review group, again chaired by Louise Byrne.

Special Congress used e-voting for the first time and ratified several innovations including:

- helmets mandatory for all;
- a designated home club;
- new procedures to deal with transfers, hearing and disciplinary issues;
- age ranges for participation in competition;
- new procedures around player gradings;
- adoption of modified games for under 12 competition;
- designation that a player's native county is automatically her county of representation regardless of where she lives;
- new rules in relation to offences in games and abuse of referees and
- setting five years maximum service in any one administrative role and ten years in total.

Launch of Gala All Ireland championships. Great profile. Camogie TV is launched on our website.

Annual Féile na nGael hugely successful in Clare with support of RDO and Clare native Deirdre Murphy, Orla Considine and Mary Hogan, Clare Camogie Board. Cillard from Kerry win their first national title at Division 4. Wonderful young players of future there.

VHI Cúl Camps underway with more girls than ever getting opportunity to play Camogie for the first time.

Busy month. Gala All Ireland championships were active in the best playing conditions. Inaugural system of referees' assessment introduced. County u14 Development Squads have a ball at annual activity day in Croke Park - one of the best days of the year!

Pioneering development work continues under the leadership of Ard Stiúrthóir Sinead O'Connor and Director of Camogie Mary O'Connor.

Over 20 new club start ups throughout the year including in Sligo, Mayo, Donegal, Wicklow, Cork, Kerry, Limerick, Tipperary, Galway, Westmeath.

New Coaching Plan adopted. Significant increase in number of Camogie coach tutors. New Player Pathway, launched at Congress, taking effect with new structure of supporting players from nursery to adult to off the field.

Competitive summer camogie for under 16s - they said it couldn't be done. The inaugural Leinster under 16 inter county club tournament proved different. With the moniker 'the pink weekend' in recognition of its support for the Marie Keating Foundation, Eve Talbot, Leinster Camogie Council and Thomas Davis Camogie club all combined to put on a great show. Intention in 2011 is for all Provinces to adopt the inter county interclub u16 model.

New Camogie acorns planted in the US and Britain. The annual Continental Youth Championships of Gaelic Games in Long Island incorporated underage Camogie for the first time. Players and teams from San Francisco, Philadelphia, Chicago, New Haven and a couple of new juvenile teams from New York take to the game with great gusto. Hope to build on this at 2011 Games in Boston.

Similarly across the pond, underage Camogie development squads commenced in London with lots of support from Jacqueline Thornton, Ronan McCarthy, Katie Forde and Rita McGrath.

August

Senior semi finals month. Two great games in Nowlan Park. Wexford best the locals Kilkenny. Cork and Galway produce a thriller that ends evens.

These were the best ever attended semi finals.

In Nenagh, Clare and Galway also produce a memorable game in the Gala All Ireland Minor Finals in front of another very big crowd. These teams couldn't be separated either.

September tas to be the best month of the year every year.

Historic occasion as first time three All Ireland Camogie finals take centre stage in Croke Park. President McAleese watches as Wexford rejoice. Offaly take their first Intermediate title. Antrim overcome Waterford in replay.

There was excellent attendance and presentation of games on the big day. Great feedback and appreciation from 600 families and community leaders we invited from minority ethnic groups to join us on All Ireland Day as part of our work on social inclusion.

Young camogie and hockey players from St. Enda's and Bredagh Camogie and Mossley Hill Hockey in Belfast also enjoyed All Ireland Finals Park as part of an interesting peace and reconciliation cross-community initiative.

October

We announced some money in October! Good news in the middle of a recession. Paula Bruen Finance Director passed on the good news to several counties who benefited from development grants from central funds. The monies will be used to support the implementation of our national development plan at county level.

The inaugural national meeting of County Chairs and Secretaries Network was held in Croke Park. This initiative is intended to strengthen the dialogue between key administrators at county and central level.

Congrats to Ireland on retaining Shinty title v Scotland. We were captained by Niamh Breen and managed by Tom O'Mahony (Kildare), Paul Ward (Monaghan) and Mary Connor (Louth). Amongst those wearing an Irish jersey it was great to see two Camogie personnel- well done Regina Gorman and Brid Boylan.

Great to see Development Committee established in Ulster.

This month is always deceptive. Expect it to be a bit quiet but not so.

The Presidents of the three Gaelic Associations - Camogie, Ladies Football and GAA jointly announced an initiative to explore the feasibility of a single administrative structure at local level to promote and develop all gaelic games. This 'one club model' is a strategic initiative that has the potential to benefit and strengthen all. An initial report is due in Spring 2011.

Camogie and Ladies Football Associations, also convened a joint meeting at central and Provincial level chaired by both Association Presidents. The meeting sought to co-ordinate fixtures planning. The Presidents of both Associations are also jointly writing to county boards in both codes urging them to co-ordinate at local level.

Highlight of the month, and maybe of the year though was the annual All Stars Dinner and Presentation. Truly memorable.

69 players nominated for awards and all 'dressed to kill'.

The words and presence of special guest President Mc Aleese made everybody ten feet taller.

We acknowledged the life long contribution of Micheal Ó Muircheartaigh. He told us he has watched 50 All Ireland finals. He went to his first Camogie All Ireland to watch Dublin legend Kathleen Mills whom he called the Christy Ring of Camogie.

Inaugural Intermediate All Stars were presented along with the All Stars and Soaring Stars.

On the field action continued pre the snow! Jenny Duffy, Ger Gribben and Eve Talbot pulled off a huge Leinster Schools Blitz in Rathcoole under the auspices of Leinster Camogie and supported by Leinster GAA. Yvonne Byrne got several new Donegal players involved in Go Games. Four Roads claimed their first All Ireland Junior title.

The inaugural Provincial Intermediate club finals were held as a fore runner to the new All Ireland Intermediate club championship. The cup for this inaugural competition was named after Agnes O' Farrelly, a Cavan woman who an exceptional activist in the Gaelic revival, a pioneering academic and nationalist and former President of the Camogie Association.

We also announced this and the All Ireland Senior Club Finals will be played as a double header in Croke Park on March 6th 2011 for the first time.

I'm delighted with this development. It gives club players the genuine aspiration of playing for one of the highest honours in the game in the best stadium in the country. It's a shot in the arm for our premier club competitions.

There are not too many Camogie clubs that celebrate a silver jubilee so congrats to St. Ibar's Shelmaliers on their special birthday which they marked in November.

We now have 5,000 facebook fans signed up, don't forget to join the page. The Hope Foundation announced as offical charity partner of Camogie Association

ALL year long they had one word drilled into their heads... believe.

Now, they faced the moment of truth as the county final replay against Imokilly dipped well into injury-time and Inniscarra were chasing down a two-point deficit.

How fitting then that two of their leading players should be central characters in what proved to be a sensational climax.

Niamh knew what was required. Her free had to drop deep into the danger zone to sound the alarm bells in the divisional side's defence and hope a colleague might get a decisive touch.

The ball was blocked, but not cleared and in the subsequent mother of all scrambles Rena Buckley somehow managed to squeeze it into the corner of the net for the winning goal in a 1-9 to 1-8 triumph.

There was no way back for gallant Imokilly after that and the immediate final whistle brought unbridled joy for the Inniscarra club, the crowning glory in an incredible season.

Niamh's importance to the side was reflected in her player-of-the-match award, a fitting tribute for the 20-year-old forward, who notched 1-9 in the championship.

"I suppose a small part of us thought the game was gone all right, but, as I say, we had that belief all year that we could do it and we were never going to give up until the final whistle.

IT'S been a roller-coaster year for Inniscarra camogie, featuring an historic Cork County Senior Championship title and similar success at Munster level. One player, Niamh Dilworth, has beén the stand-out performer in the club's historic rise and is our November Sportstar winner. She talks to MARK WOODS about an amazing season.

Under-age achievements are no guarantee of anything at adult level, more laying the foundation stones and instructing the girls on how to cope with the greater demands at senior level.

Niamh is a product of that system.

We're up senior A now about 12 years, We've a very young team and winning the county was a direct result of the major emphasis placed on under-age camogie in Inniscarra.

'The side has a lot of players in the 18-20 age bracket and we've all come up through the same way. I'm not surprised with the success we've enjoyed this season.

"Last year we got to the quarter-finals, where we lost to Milford, but there was a lot of belief in the squad that we could go places this year.

"On top of that we've a fantastic management team of Fergal O'Leary, Irene O'Keeffe, Sean Twohig and Paula Goggins, all of whom have the same belief as the players.

"And that belief was evident all year, because players battled and fought for one another and showed the willingness that you must have to succeed.

"Everyone put in a huge effort. We've 32

players in the squad and hardly anyone missed a training session during the year."

The third year nursing student at Tralee IT has had little time to dwell on a great season, because it's back to training this week to prepare for the All-Ireland semi-final against St Mary's of Belfast at a neutral venue on February 6.

There's added incentive for the Inniscarra girls to do well, because the club final will be played at Croke Park a month later, when Wexford's Oulart-the-Ballagh are likely to be the hot favourites to land the spoils.

And to make sure there's only a remote chance of putting her feet up, Niamh is an integral part of the Tralee IT side operating at Purcell Cup level.

We got to the final last year, but lost to DIT. We've a few from Kilkenny in the side, but we're restricted enough in terms of numbers and we're rebuilding again for 2011. The finals are in Galway, so we hope to make

On a loftier note, Niamh has ambitions of staking a claim for a place in the Cork senior side for next summer's championship and her club exploits have certainly enhanced her prospects, particularly as she figured at inter-county underage level, too.

"I was captain of the U18 team in the Munster championship which was a great thrill for me and everyone in the club.

We managed to get to the final okay, but lost by two points, which was unfortunate.

"I also represented Cork in the Feile skills competition in Tullamore when I was U14 and at second level in school I was picked for the Munster Colleges Allstar team. Leinster beat us by a point.

"I played for Cork intermediates last season and made the senior panel this year without playing. I didn't finish Tralee until June, so I was late starting out.

"It's been a fantastic year, beyond our wildest dreams really. At the start of the season, I suppose, winning the county championship was our only goal and, to be honest, the Munster championship never entered the equation.'

Now, Niamh and the rest can dream of running out on the biggest stage of all. From Ballyanly to Croker!

Cork Dethroned

The 2010 championship saw holders Cork dethroned. Nothing too out of the ordinary there. What was significant however was the fact that it was the first time in nine years that Cork didn't appear in an All-Ireland final. Galway and Wexford was the pairing on September 12 with both teams previously there in 2008 and 2007 respectively. Wexford of course were victorious in '07 and took the O'Duffy Cup again this season while Galway still await that elusive second title.

What sort of championship did we have in 2010?

I couldn't understand the reasoning behind commencing this year's championship on June 12 with the Leaving Cert exams starting in and around the same time. With senior inter-county camogie panels younger than ever almost every county has secondary school students in their squad. Many counties commenced their campaign without these players. Cork started theirs without Katrina and Pamela Mackey and Julia White.

I can't grasp either the idea behind compelling teams to play six championship matches in seven weeks in a round robin format, with Galway and Wexford playing six weeks on the trot. An abundance of games during the National League would have been welcomed with open arms. That is the time to bombard counties with matches, not during championship. Some got just two league games.

Cork were fortunate enough to advance to the league semifinal and got a third match, but defeat to Wexford saw their league campaign over in early April after commencing in early March. It seemed counties had only started competitive playing when they stopped again. Nothing then for two months until all counties were thrown into an abyss of games. The intensity of championship was possibly lost at times with the volume of games. Most knew they could afford to lose a couple and still advance. It's hard to build yourself up for championship week in and week out. While they say that a match is worth a week's training, training is crucial for working on areas of weakness exposed in a game, weighing your options and assessing the form of your panel.

I'd flip the league and championship formats.

At the outset the top five in the running to reach the knock out stages were Cork, Wexford, Galway, Kilkenny and Tipperary. Yet I felt it was always going to be the first four. Kilkenny and Galway topped the leader board with ten points a piece having dropped points to Wexford and Kilkenny in that order. There were no draws throughout the championship. Cork and Wexford both dropped four points. Cork suffered defeats to Kilkenny and Galway white Galway and Cork took points from Wexford.

The results table showed very little between the top four with points picked up and dropped by all along the way. There was many an exciting game: Galway and Wexford in Athenry, Kilkenny and Tipp in Nowlan Park, Clare v Galway in Corofin and Cork and Wexford in Páirc Uí Chaoimh. It was as certain as it can be on July 3 who was going to emerge to the semi-finals after Tipperary lost their third game with Wexford still to come. Wexford's scoring prowess stood tall with 131 pts for and 62 against [14-89 to 4-50] from six games.

The semi finals on August 14 saw Cork take on Galway while it was an all Leinster affair between Kilkenny and Wexford in a double header in Nowlan Park. Cork lived to fight another day after a pulsating draw. It took two late Sile Burns frees to pull Cork back level after they had led by four entering the last quarter. In a game which swung back and forth and had the large crowd on the edge of their seats a draw was the fairest result for both teams. It was Galway who did all

the early running aided by a strong wind as a typically slow starting Cork team failed to settle. In general play Galway were well on top. Great fielding, teamwork and speed saw their midfield and half forward line in control as Cork couldn't match them for pace. Twenty six minutes in Galway led Cork 1-7 to 1-2. A game can turn in minutes. Numerous stoppagesledtoreferee Karl O'Brienannouncingsix minutes of additional time. And from here on it was all Cork.

Orla Cotter was instrumental in Cork's revival while the move of Gemma O'Connor to midfield also bore fruit. Five points from play, two from the excellent Jennifer O'Leary, one from Julia White, Emer O'Sullivan, Rachel Moloney and a Burns' free saw Cork take the lead in a sensational eight minute spell. Galway's heads were low as they trooped off the pitch at half time. Two Galway points from play within four minutes of the re-start signalled they weren't going to lie down.

Entering the final quarter Cork led 1-13 to 1-9. In spite of this lead it was Cork who had to fight to equalise as the game turned on its head yet again. Therese Maher won a great ball at half forward and raced through. Her hand pass to Veronica Curtin saw the latter rocket the net. With a point still separating the sides with five minutes of normal time remaining. Veronica Curtin again gained possession and sidestepping the defence struck the net. Sile Burns' two frees saved the day. Wexford comfortably booked their place in the Gala All Ireland senior final thanks in the main to a superb second half performance where they produced three goals to which Kilkenny had no reply.

The semi-final replay failed to live up to the expectations of the drawn encounter due to the stop/start nature brought on by poor referring. That is an area of concern I have, the poor standard of inter-county referring. Because referees are regularly at the receiving end of criticism in most sports, justified criticism tends to be overlooked and thrown into the pool. Galway hung on despite Cork having an opportunity to level the game in the sixth minute of injury time to bring the game to extra time. But Cork could have no complaints against a Galway side which had their homework done since the drawn encounter. Galway advanced to their second final in three years with a 0-10 to 0-9 victory. Cork never really got into their stride this season and it was no real surprise when they took their exit.

All-Ireland final day was a great occasion with the junior, intermediate and senior finals all taking place. It wasn't the best of senior finals, not as free flowing as we'd hoped for but Im sure Wexford won't care. They added the O'Duffy cup to the National League they won in April. No disputing the team of the year.

Camogie scholarships for NUIG Clare duo

NUI Galway camogie club received a timely boost this week as they prepare to compete in, as well as host, the 2011 Ashbourne Cup, as two of their star players were awarded camogie association scholarships.

Two Clare players, Sixmilebridge's Chloë Morey and Crusheen's Anne Marie McMahon received the scholarships. Both come from well-known hurling families in Sixmilebridge and Crusheen and both have lined out with their clubs and county with distinction.

Chloe has played for the Clare senior team and for the Clare minor side for the last four seasons and is underage for minor once more in 2011. She has won many honours with Sixmilebridge and joined NUI Galway this year. Her brother, Caimin, who is a final year engineering student in NUI Galway, was an integral part of the successful Fitzgibbon Cup side last season.

New crowned county champions for the eight time in eight years after Inniscarra took their first senior county title after a replay against Imokilly with an injury time goal. It's little wonder that the Cork County championship is viewed as the best in the country after once again producing some tremendous battles throughout the season.

lmokilly advanced from their own divisional play off after a first round victory over Carbery and a comprehensive defeat of Carrigdhoun which very early on signalled their scoring prowess. Muskerry provided a walkover to Carrigdhoun in round one and Seandun didn't field which was disappointing.

There were some shocks in the opening round of the championship proper most notably with the shock defeat of holders St Catherine's by championship newcomers Ballincollig. A Patricia Buttimer goal with three minutes remaining made it a dream senior championship debut for the newly promoted side. Torrential rain and a swirling wind made the game a battle. Ballincollig hit three points without reply to take a half time advantage of 0-7 to 0-5. Orla Cotter got St. Catherines back on level terms inside ten minutes. Goalkeeper Aisleen Sheehan denied the champions numerous opportunities as Buttimer's goal became the deciding factor.

Imokilly continued their high scoring victories with a 3-16 to 0-1 victory over Rockban in July. Cloughduv had a one point victory over Barryroe after a thrilling final six minutes saw them hit 1-2 without reply. Jennifer O'Leary gave a magnificent performance scoring 11 points of her side's 1-12 tally while Joanne O'Callaghan and the industrious Katherine Corkery were Cloughduy's driving force.

The losers of round one went into a second round qualifier. Again there were some games which went to the death. Courcey Rovers edged out Ballygarvan 0-9 to 0-8. St Catherine's had thirteen points to spare over Barryoe while eight goals and twenty points saw St. Finbarr's knock Rockban out of the 2010 championship. Lining out without the services of Gemma O'Connor St Finbarr's pulled out all the stops in the remaining six minutes. With scores coming fast and furious and sitting at 3-11 to 4-8 it was anyone's guess as to who would emerge victorious. A draw was very much on the cards. That was until Rachel Myers showed up for her third goal to put the game beyond the reach of a worthy Rockban side. With nine teams remaining an additional round was drawn and it fell to Cloughduv and St Finbarr's to battle it out for a quarter final spot.

An injury time point by the excellent Katherine Corkery granted Cloughduv their passage into the last eight. Three points behind with five minutes of normal time remaining things didn't look good for Cloughduv but a spirited last seven minutes epitomised by the lion hearted Corkery denied St Finbarr's. St Finbarr's could only look at themselves after failing to capitalise in the opening half where they dominated for long periods. They didn't get their just reward on the scoreboard and paid the price.

Douglas reversed the pain inflicted last year when they faced Milford. Despite a late revival by the north Cork side which saw them hit 1-4 in seven minutes Douglas had done enough with their 1-10 to 1-1 lead entering the final quarter to hold on.

Ballincollig continued to defy the odds over Courcey Rovers. The pick of the quarter final previews was the clash of Imokilly V St Catherine's. By the end of the game imokilly were fast becoming favourities to win the little. As was becoming the norm a second half goal onslaught [three] knocked their opponents for six.

Inniscarra comfortably accounted for Cloughduv; 3-12 to 0-5. Now things were really hotting up. The semi-final pairings became Inniscarra V Douglas and Imokilly V Ballincollig. Both games ended in a draw. Niamh Dilworth grabbed the equaliser for Inniscarra in the final minute while two Marie O'Neill goals in the space of two minutes gave Imokilly another bite of the cherry after it looked as if Ballincollig had done enough to see them through to their first ever sensor county final. It was Ballincollig who levelled the match a minute into injury time to force a replay. Inniscarra and Douglas served up another enthralling encounter when they met again seven days later with the game very nearly heading for extra time. Level five times it was Laura Burke's point eight minutes into injury time which sent Inniscarra to their first final appearance in five years.

In a replay which never really came to life, albeit the final 10 minutes, Imokilly finally saw off the challenge of Ballincollig to reach their third final in 34 years. Amidst greasy underfoot conditions the sides were level four times in the opening period, six in total. The physical strength of Angela Walsh again proved crucial as casting aside the defensive challenge forty nine minutes in she finished clinically to the net. Setting up team mate Emer O'Farreli for a second a minute later proved to be decisive as Impkilly emerged with a 2-8 to 1-8 victory.

The final was eagerly anticipated and extremely hard to call. And so it proved to be with it finishing all square in CIT; 4-9 apiece. The atmosphere was electric and we had a highly charged crowd at the final whistle. Substitute Margaret Cosgrove hit the equalising point as the third of the three minutes informed injury time struck the clock. Inniscarra were rocked by the injury to Rena Buckley who failed to line out with a heavy shoulder injury. Impkilly too were hit for six when star player Angela Walsh had to leave the field 13 minutes in with ligament damage to her ankle. She re-appeared heavily strapped as the second half got underway, making a powerful impact, hitting 1-3.

Two goals in the seventh and eighth minutes by Niamh McCarthy and Laura Burke gave Inniscarra a six point lead they themselves possibly didn't envisage. Their joy was short. lived when from the puck out Marie O'Neill found Emer O'Farrell who finished to the net from the edge of the post. By the end of the half Inniscarra led 3-4 to 3-3. Play swung end to end during the second half. The tension was palpable, the crowd playing every ball and disputing every decision which went against their side. Angela Walsh hit what seemed the winner on full time. Margaret Cosgrove saved the day in injury time.

It took five weeks to schedule the replay due to Inniscarra's involvement in the Munster series which they won in spectacular fashion and Inch Rovers' involvement in the Munster and All Ireland ladies football championship. The replay was worth the wait. Utter agony for Imokilly yet sheer

county board elected a manager and selectors for the under 16 and minor teams. The minor committee for 2011 is up and running while the under 16 selection committee is to be announced shortly.

Former senior inter county player Fiona O'Driscoll gave a report on the development committee's activities during 2010 while setting out plans for 2011. The board also elected a new officer with Mairead O'Donovan, Ballincollig, who takes on the role as development officer, Mairead comes to the post with huge experience having served in previous years as county board treasurer and secretary.

Chairperson Marion McCarthy wished all present seasons greetings and said Cork camogie can look ahead with confidence as the game continues to grow the big aim for 2011 is the completion of the Castle Road project and a return to the victory rostrum for the Inter county teams.







Biddy Phillips, one of camogie's greatest ambassadors

An Appreciation

When news broke of the untimely death of Biddy Phillips in July, an air of gloom descended on all associated with Camogie in Tipperary and further a field.

Biddy, a native of Ballytarsna which was her first club, later transferred to Thurles Camogie club. Throughout her long association with Thurles, Biddy won 5 senior county titles, 2 Munster club championships. In 1972 Thurles embarked on a 14 day American tour, and the club had the honour of playing in Gaelic Park new York.

Biddy also represented Tipperary at junior and senior level. In 1980 she became involved at administrative level with Tipperary County Board. From 1988 to 2000 Biddy served as assistant secretary and as treasurer. In addition, she was a selector of the senior team with Timmy Delaney and Bernie O'Dowd. Throughout to 1980s, Biddy was totally committed to the rehabilitation of Tipperary Camogie, and was synonymous with the development of the game from junior to senior levels, which culminated in winning the All Ireland Senior title for the first time for Tipperary in 1999. Tipperary went on to win three in a row under the stewardship of Biddy, Michael Cleary and Jim Madden. Also in 1999, Biddy was awarded with a Tipperary sports star Cidona award for her contribution to Camogie.

Refereeing was another of Biddy's major inputs into the game. She served on the National referee's committee for many years, and she took charge of the All Ireland Junior final in 1993, a Senior final in 1997, and had the honour of refereeing the senior All Ireland club final in 1999.

Biddy will be sadly missed by all who knew her, and her passing leaves a huge void in Tipperary Camogie.

Dad pays tribute to his daughter Aoife killed in tragic accident

THE heartbroken father of teenager Aoife Downey, who died following a sledding accident, paid a touching tribute to his daughter today.

The 15-year-old was killed when the homemade sleigh she was travelling on crashed into a tree at Frankfield Golf Club on Saturday afternoon.

This morning her dad Sean described how the bubbly and popular teenager touched the lives of everyone she met.

"Aoife was an amazing girl and touched the lives of so many people. She was a real homebird and loved Douglas. She could never consider leaving it. She seemed to know everyone. We have been overwhelmed with the support from everyone who knew her."

The young girl is remembered by everyone in the community and at her school, Christ King, as a sports-loving teenager. Aoife was a member of Douglas Camogie Club and Douglas Ladies Football Club and had won U12 and U14 county championship medals with the camogie club.

Her dad said: "Aoife lived for sport. She was on the team that won the Féile All-Ireland camogie title this year and she had scored the winning goal in the final. Last year, when she was just 14, she was on the U16 Cork football team and she was very proud of that."

He recalled how Aoife would bring her hurley with her on family holidays to Portugal and they would play on the beach.

The eldest of three girls, Aoife was looking

forward to spending Christmas with her family and was hugely excited about one of her presents — tickets to see Rihanna in concert next October.

This morning her devastated classmates at Christ King Secondary School gathered in the school library to remember their friend.

Aoife was a third year student at the school. Her classmates were being offered counselling today to help them come to terms with her death.

Her PE teacher, Pauline Hayes, described Aoife as a very bright girl, who always had a smile on her face.

"She was very loving with her friends and always friendly."

Her close friend, Chelsea Noonan, who was injured in the accident, remains in a stable condition in hospital this morning, with a Continued on page two.

All that was missing from Stillorgan's Saturday spectacular was a saw to cut the OZO trophy in half.


But the two captains, Louise O'Hara and Catriona Power, happily agreed to polish the silver for six months each.



"It's a broad-ranging brief, but essentially it's all about trying to grow the game in the weaker areas and trying to consolidate in the likes of Cork, Tipperary and Kilkenny.

"I have seven regional development officers and I work closely with them.

"There have been huge advances in camogie in places like Mayo and Donegal which would be non-tradicional areas but we are putting the effort in because we want to have a



presence in every county," said Mary as she collected the Boardwalk Sports Star of the Month award yes-

"The football counties are obviously going to be mainly football counties, but it's no harm for them to get a taste of camogie as well," said Mary who has been working with Croke Park for the last two

"One stat to prove the growing popularity of the game is that in 2006 we had 490 clubs and, at the moment in the Association we have 557 clubs

and that's a huge growth rate by any motivation on All-Ireland final day standards," she said.

On the club front, Mary is delighted that Killeagh are back in the spotlight again.

'It's great that we are back senior and great for the club. It's our first year back since 1988 and for a club like Killeagh with such a history in men and women GAA, it's great to be back senior.

"With Inch Rovers we have been knocking on the door for a while and Donoughmore had been the dominant force in ladies football in Cork for a number of years - they won 10 or 11 county titles in a row - but then we came through the intermediate ranks and we had players that came back and we won the county and the All-Ireland.

"We certainly weren't lacking in

having lost twice to the opposition,' O'Connor said.

Killimor face massive test against Wexford camogie aristocrats in Ballinasloe

Callagy's charges must hit new high in All-Ireland senior semi-final as Oulart rivals will take beating

WHEN the whistle sounded at the end of last October's County camogie semi-final, Killimor must have surely thought their toughest hour was behind them. In retrospect, it was just the calm before the storm.

Having finally seen off their great Athenry opponents, Killimor were odds on to land their first ever county title at the expense of an inexperienced Mullagh outfit. In the end,however, Killimor staggered over the finishing line courtesy of two gift wrapped goals.

Now within just sixty minutes of a place in the All-Ireland decider, Killimor face their toughest challenge to date, a joust with Wexford's Oulart the Ballagh on Sunday, at Duggan Park (3pm)

The County champions have enjoyed a lengthy lay off since that memorable Saturday, but preparations over the winter months which included four challenge games, have gone well according to manager Tommy Callagy.

"We've a lot of hard work done. We played four challenges and Bertie Sherlock has worked really hard with the girls. We were in Kiltormer complex on St. Stephen's morning with brilliant numbers and we were in Ballinasloe last weekend and we had 28 girls."

In any event, both the management and players will be acutely aware that they will need to be at their very best if they are to compete, never mind overcome, an Oulart the Ballagh side fleeced with intercounty talent.

The enormous challenge facing the East Galway outfit is underlined by the fact that between Wexford's senior and intermediate camogie teams that lined out in Croke Park last September, 11 were of Oulart origin while a further two were substitutes on the

intermediate side.

On this evidence alone, one would have to favour Oulart the Ballagh to advance. The central spine of the team is remarkably strong with Cara Storey – daughter of Martin Storey – and Mary Lacey, at full and centre back respectively, anchoring the defence.

Emma Moran and Stacey Redmond, both of whom lined out for Wexford in last year's All Ireland Intermediate final, more than likely will form their midfield pairing.

All-Ireland winning Captain Una Lacey will lead a formidable attack that also includes All-Star full forward Ursula Jacob and Stacey Kehoe.

Brendan O'Connor's charges possess that near perfect mix of youth, experience and an ability to grind out the win even when not at their best, a trait very much evident in their Leinster final triumph over Ballyboden St. Enda's.

Consequently, Callagy was

quick to acknowledge the massive task facing his side: "We're up against, it's going to be a very tough task, but we'll have a right crack at it and hopefully we'll give a good account of ourselves. Its important we're still in it at half time."

In terms of physicality and experience the Wexford girls may have the upper hand but Callagy insists Killimor won't be phased by their opponents. "We've talked about them (Oulart the Ballagh), we know they've won a lot and were only beaten in last year's All-Ireland semi-final, but we have four county seniors and a good few girls were involved with the Galway Intermediate side that won the All-Ireland there in 2009."

For Killimor, who boast a clean bill of health ahead of the tie, Helen Campbell is an assured goalkeeper. Although slight in stature the defence is an extremely hardworking unit backboned by Nicola Lawless, Karen Brien and Ann Marie Hayes.

Ann Marie Starr and Emer Haverty will renew a midfield partnership which has served Killimor well in recent times while All Star recipient Brenda Hanney will carry the threat up front ably assisted by player of the match in the county final Martina Conroy and Susan Keane. Indeed, Hanney's battle with Mary Lacey is sure to provide an intriguing subplot to the tie.

The Killimor management will be hoping their half back line and midfield can get the kind of possession grip they enjoyed in their historic county final win in Loughrea for there is enough strength and guile in Hanney and Martina Conroy to turn the screw on any defence, even one as talented as Oulart the Ballagh's.

At the end of the day, it's difficult to envisage anything other than an Oulart the Ballagh victory, but if Killimor can hang in there until the final quarter, few would bet against what would be a truly sensational scalp.

Sunday's senior game will be preceded by the meeting of Sarsfields and the Harps of Laois in the All-Ireland Intermediate semi-final (1pm)

Having secured the Galway championship with a 0-14 to 2-5 win over Portumna last October, Sarsfields subsequently added the Connacht crown when dismissing the Four Roads challenge a fortnight later.

Like Killimor, Sarsfields will have it all to do against a side who has won the last five Leinster championships, securing All-Ireland junior titles in 2006, '07 and '08.

Still, Sarsfields are unquestionably the emerging force in Galway camogie, capturing last year's county minor title to add to the Intermediate crown. Backboned by exciting young talents Niamh McGrath and Tara Kenny, they won't be far off come the final whistle.



U16 SUCCESS FOR GALWAY CAMOGIE

Galway 2-11 Tipperary 2-7

A year after Galway defeated Tipperary in the All Ireland U16 camogic final, the 2010 decider threw up the same final pairing, the same scoreline, but most importantly the same outcome.

The scenes of unbridled joy at O'Connor Park, Tullamore after a much fancied Galway outfit outfought Tipperary in a thrilling contest to emerge as deserving four point winners, will be savoured in the County for some time to come. Unquestionably, the state of underage camogic

in Galway received a tremendous endorsement following the successful exploits of Johnny Kane's charges. Building on the success of this latest triumph at U16 level must now be the next step in the development of the game in the West, but an 11th title at this grade will suffice for the time being.

This year's crop of U16's were identified early in the year as a side of serious potential, that however is no guarantee of ultimate success, but under the guidance of manger Johnny Kane, the training of Tom Page and the sideline contributions of Noel Kelly and Erner Kearney, Gahvay produced a performance of real substance thus ensuring the residency of the All Ireland

crown west of the Shannon once again.

Despite leading the contest from pillar to post, Galway supporters -who travelled in large numbers-were left fretting during the games final minutes as a Teresa Ryan goal in injury time reduced the arrears to just three points. However, the defence led by the majestic Maria Cooney held out and when Rebecca Hennelly slotted over a close range free, the two-in-a-row was complete.

The decider represented the first time Galway were put under serious pressure after an uneventful campuign where Galway recorded comfortable victories over Kilkenny (4-12 to 2-7), Dublin (9-14 to 2-9), Wexford (4-22 to 1-2) before a one-sided semi-final encounter with Cork (1-20

to 1-00) Playing with the aid of a stiff breeze, the defending champions led by four at the break, but it was the performance rather than the scoreline that was causing concern amongst the Galway supporters as several scoreable chances were spurned

Rebecca Hennelly opened the scoring on 51 seconds with a converted free, but, they would not score from play until the 24th minute. In the interim period three placed ball efforts from Hennelly were answered to by Aosfe Ryan (*45). Michaela Graham and Andrea Loughnane

No doubt, one of the major failings of Galway journey's en-route to the final was that they were never put to the pin of their collar by the opposition and forced to respond. Consequently, Tipperary's physical approach clearly rattled the tribeswomen in that opening half and they were made work like dogs for every score.

Crucially, Galway mode the wind advantage count with three late scores from Orlaith McGrath, Hennelly ('45) and the outstanding

Tipperary badly needed a bright start to the second half and their plight was not helped by two early wides. Then came arguably the key score of the game a goal from Davitt's Maria Brehony.

Clodagh McGrath initiated the score dispossessing Anne Eviston in the middle of the park before sending the sliotar in the direction of Sarsfields club mate Aoibhin Kenny. The wing forward flicked possession to the onrushing Ailish O'Reilly who in turn, moved the sliotar to the inside Brehony who drilled low for her tenth goal of the championship.

Scarcely another minute had elapsed when Galway struck again. Rachel Monaghan set up O'Reifly, whose effort from outside the '21 dipped under the crossbar to leave the

tribeswomen ten to the good.

Tipp, to their credit, didn't lose heart, ratcheted up a notch and responded with three points on the trot-Anne Eviston and Ciara McGrath (0-2) both finding the mark for the

Premier County. In truth, they were desperately unlucky not to find the net when Sinead Cormican was adjudged to have brought down Aoife Ryan in the Galway square. The penalty, however, was excellently stopped by 'keeper Catriona Daly.

Senior Camogic began 2010 full of hope and ambition and concluded with their second Croke Park appearance in three years. After leading the intermediate team to All-Ireland glory the previous year. The quest for the O'Duffy Cup didn't start smoothly in Nowlan Park in June as Kilkenny had the proverbial sign on Galway again holding out for a three point victory but a comfortable win in Ballinasloe over Tipperary the following week

seemed to get Galway's campaign on track.

But two consecutive Saturdays in Kenny Park would prove decisive as they recorded important victories over reigning League champions Wexford and All-Ireland champions Cork.

Struggling to close out games in recent times, Jessica Gill's marked her return in emphatic fashion as her 80 yard free four minutes into injury time found its way to the net and Galway beat Wexford by 1-8 to 0-10.

Then seven days later in arguably their best performance of the season, the Tribeswomen dominated the Rebellettes with Tara Rutledge's early goal and Aislinn Connolly's scores setting them on their way before a strong second half resistance led by Anne Marie Hayes. Brenda Hanney and Veronica Curtin ensured Noel Finn's side ran out 1-14 to 0-11 winners.

Qualification for the semi-finals was secured in their next game against Clare but their encounter in Corofin was anything but comfortable as it took four late points for Galway to snatch a two point victory. The squad players got their chance to impress against Dublin in the last encounter and 20 points separated the teams.

The semi-final draw saw Galway pitted against Cork and in what many considered the game of the season; the teams couldn't be separated playing out a 1-17 to 3-11 thriller. Tara Rutledge got the early Galway goal as they went 1-7 to 1-2 ahead but were a point down at the interval. Cork stretched that lead to four by the three quarter mark but Galway's new found resilience was in abundance in the final 15 minutes as they fought back with Veronica Curtin's two goals crucial.

It wasn't as open eight days later in Semple Stadium when the teams met to decide again but that fighting spirit of the Tribeswomen would be required again. A strong defensive performance led by Sandra Tannion and Regina Glynn kept the Cork score down and a critical free from Aislinn Connolly plus a stunning run from Brenda Hanney leading to a point turned the game Galway's way and the Westerners had achieved their target of returning to headquarters in

Preparation seemed perfect leading to the All-Ireland and confidence was high after but sometimes things don't go according to plan and Wexford came out of the traps quickest with Katrina Parrock's giving them a seven point half-

Yet again, Galway responded and had they more time (only one minute of injury time was played), they could have nicked it. Aislinn Connolly's goal from 50 yards got them back to within a puck of the ball but other little factors would eventually deny them - a Parrock point that wasn't in the second half, a missed penalty and the fact they only got three points from play in total proved their downfall ending up on the wrong side of a 1-12 to 1-10 score line.

It would be hoped all involved stay again for another crack at glory and with some promising underage players set to make an impact over the next 12 months, there's every reason to be positive. This is the challenge that stands in front of this team if that deserved All-Ireland medal is

to be achieved!

GALWAY ALL IRELAND MINOR CAMOGIE CHAMPIONS 2010

Galway were crowned All Ireland minor camogic champions for the first time in 2010 following a well merited 2-12 to 2-8 victory over Clare in Semple Stadium, Thurles.

For Johnny Kane and his background team of Tom Page, Noel Kelly, Emer Kearney and Tommy Kenny, this proved a sweet success adding to the U16 title captured in May. Consequently, Johnny's record at underage level is quite phenomenal considering the Turloughmore man has presided over the three All Ireland titles Galway captured in the past two years.

This was powerful stuff from a Galway side of which just four are overage next year, who displayed terrific composure in dismissing emphatically the Clare challenge to ensure a clean sweep of underage titles for Galway in 2010.

In truth, Galway should have won by more had they showed a real ruthless streak at the turnaround before allowing Clare a glimmer of hope deep in second half stoppages.

In a peerless performance from the front eight where Killimordaly's Laura Mitchell was awarded player of the match, although the accolade could easily have gone to either of the Galway corner backs, there was excellent showings from Rebecca Hennelly, Ailish O'Reilly, substitute Niamh McGrath and the aforementioned Mitchell.

Lacking nothing by the way of commitment and spirit, the young tribeswomen defended their lead vigorously, epitomised by the ferocious nature of Galway's full back line who were quicker and hungrier in the scavenge for possession.

In fairness there were very few weak links in Thurles with Siobhan Coen and Lorraine Farrell outstanding on the left flank of defence. Tara Kenny and Karen Brien didn't put a foot wrong in the full back line, while outside them Noreen Murphy and Laura Donnellan did a lot of mopping up which made a big contribution to possession supplied to the attack. A measly return of just 1-3 from Clare's starting forward unit speaks volumes about Galway's dominance in this area.

In any event, All Ireland success in August was the last thing on peoples mind in the aftermath of Galway's first round defeat

at the hands of Kilkenny with the concession of three soft goals condemning Galway to a 4-5 to 1-9 loss.

Galway though, regrouped and recorded a comfortable 3-16 to 0-7 over Limerick to leave them just sixty minutes from a first All Ireland appearance since 2006.

The semi-final clash pitted Galway against Kilkenny, where in a tight and tense affair the young tribeswomen achieved glorious redemption for the defeat in the earlier rounds of the championship, but not before surviving a late comeback from the Noresdiers which saw the sides deadlocked entering injury time.

Galway, however, refused to panic and Cloudgh's McGrath dissecting run through the heart of the black and amber defence brought about the game's defining score and, in the process, ended Kilkenny's dream of five-in-a-row.

In negotiating the penultimate hurdle winning out by 1-14 to 2-10, there were splendid displays from Tara Kenny, and the outstanding Loraine Farrell in defence. Laura Mitchell hurled with great gusto in the middle of the field, while Aoife Donoghue, Rebecca Hennelly and Clodagh McGrath showed promisingly in attack.

In the decider, Galway forced a replay first time out with Rebecca Hennelly holding her nerve to tie proceedings deep in injury time after Clare's Chloe Morey appeared to have dealt the killer blow with time almost elapsed.

Johnny Kane's charges started all guns blazing in the replay hitting four points without reply in the opening eleven minutes. Clare, on the other hand, could only manage four score's in the entire first period and this proved their ultimate downfall. In stark contrast, all six Galway forwards were on the board after just 22 minutes.

The turning point of the first half came on the quarter hour mark when Ailish O'Reilly carved open the Banner defence for the game's first goal. Shauna Healy snapped up possession before dispatching the sliotar with a perceptive pass to O'Reilly who still had three blue and gold jersey's to negotiate before rattling the net with a low drive. The goal diluted Galway's scoreboard dominance with Rebecca Hennelly (free). Aoife Donoghue and Finola Kelly splitting the posts subsequently and it looked as if Clare were in danger of being whitewashed.

Trailing by seven points it was crucial for Clare to make a positive start to the second half and that they duly did finding the net to pare the margin back to four. Rachel O'Halloran pounced on a Chloe Morey delivery and blasted to the Galway net to raise hopes of a Banner comeback. The champions though, responded in true fashion with Rebecca Hennelly tallying two further score's from the placed ball.

Thereafter, Niamh McGrath exchanged efforts with Chloe Morey, before Marie Brehony capitalised on a mistake by 'keeper Suzie O'Shea to register her side's second goal. It put Galway seven points to the good after fifty six minutes of action and well on their way to a first minor All Ireland.

FRANK O'GRADY



In September
Galway Camogic
lost one of its
greatest ever servants
with the passing of
Frank O'Grady.
Frank was honoured
several years ago by
Camogie in Galway
when he was named
as the first ever
lifelong President.

Frank was a native of Castlepollard in Westmeath and came to live and work in Galway in the sixties. A founding member of Mervue GAA club and Mervue Camogie club, Frank quickly became a leading light in both associations.

Frank O'Grady made a tremendous contribution to Camogic in Galway, serving as an official of Galway Camogic spanning six decades. While Camogic is strong today

in Galway, this would not be the case without the enormous effort that Frank O'Grady put in during days of difficult communication and transport. Frank took over as Chairman of Galway Camogie Board in the mid sixties and served in the position over three decades. He also served as President of Connacht Council and as a delegate to Central Council for many years. Frank O'Grady was instrumental in starting a minor camogic team in the county and acted as manager and selector for many teams. In 1971 Frank O'Grady was instrumental in getting Galway regraded from senior to junior and the following year, success eventually came, when Galway won the All Ireland Junior title in 1972, a victory that came just months after Oranmore Presentation Convent brought the first ever All Ireland Camogie title to the province. When Frank went to organise something there was attention to detail, and the fruits of his efforts can still be seen today.

From those first successes in 1972 Frank O'Grady watched many more success come to Galway in schools and colleges and in various levels and was involved as a selector with many successful county teams, including All Ireland minor in 1977 and an All Ireland Junior title in 1988. However by the time that Galway eventually made the ultimate success at senior level in 1996, when the county won their only All Ireland Senior Camogie title Frank O'Grady was proud to be still involved as President of Galway Camogie Board. Frank was honoured with the distinction of being the first ever live long President of Galway Camogie Board, an honour he humbly accepted, but was a deserved recipient. May his gentle soul rest in peace. Ar Deig De Go Raibh ar Anam Dilis.

V. Rev. Liam Murray, retired Parish Priest of Whitegate/Mountshannon, Co Clare died in May 2010. He served as priest of the Killaloe Diocese for 58 years. Fr Liam was a native of O'Callaghan Mills, Co. Clare where he was born in 1926. He studied for the priesthood at St Patrick's College, Maynooth where he was ordained in 1952. After ordination he served in the Diocese of Brentwood for four years before retuning to become curate in Killaneana in 1956. He was appointed curate in Whitegate, in 1960 and in Castleconell, Co Limerick in 1965. He served there until 1969 when he was appointed curate in Cloughjordan Co, Tipperary. He was appointed Parish Priest of Coolmeen/Cranny, Co Clare in 1986 and returned to Whitegate/Mountshannon as Parish Priest in 1989 where he served until he retired from that post in 1998. He was Assistant Pastor in Whitegate/Mountshannon from his remaining years, bringing his total time in our parish to over a quarter of a century. Fr Murray had a deep and abiding interest in the promotion of Camogie and he was the founding father of Camogie clubs in Killaneana, Cloughjordan and Whitegate. His unwavering interest in the promotion of Camogie allowed him to hold key posts on the Clare Camogie County Board for many years. In March 2010 the Whitegate Camogie Club held a presentation in the clubhouse to celebrate his 50 years involvement in the sport and Fr Liam was on hand to unveil a plaque and to remind us of the importance of Camogie and sport in general to local communities. At the time of his death he was President of the Whitegate Camogie Club and the Clare County Board. This year, the Intermediate championship cup was named after the late


The Clare u13 development squad were in their first year of formation and took part in a special u13 blitz with other counties from Munster.

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Turning hurling into a fun, non contact sport for all

Tmay have been some time in the pipeline but the GAA has finally come up with its answer to tag rugby as Portumna hurling enthusiasts have discovered to their joy over the past three months.

Camán Abu is the hurling recreational sport being cultivated by the National Coaching & Games Development Committee. under Pat Daly, and they have entrusted Portumna GAA Club, in conjunction with local community group, Sign Out Youth Company, to formulate a practical version of the

While the Gaelic football equivalent is very similar to tag rugby, modifying the game of hurling as a recreational sport has proven much more challenging. However, hurling and camogie enthusiasts in Portumna. under the guidance of Connacht Hurling Director Damien Coleman, have devised a set of rules which should form the basis for the new game's success.

In summary, Camán Abu comprises of five-a-side mixed teams, with games lasting between 10 to 20 minutes. Carbon fibre hurleys - with rubber bases and a soft sponge ball are used, which means there is no need for helmets, while there is no physical contact permitted. Also, hurls cannot be raised above shoulder level.

"I suppose, this is the GAA's response to tag

rugby, but it is also to give a huge majority of GAA people, who may have nothing really to do in the evenings. a sporting and social outlet," says Coleman. "It is for both those who

are traditional to the game and those who are not traditional to the game. Really, it is an opportunity for some people to get out in the evenings and become fit by playing a game that they love. For others, who might not have played before, it gives them an opportunity to play a game they have seen on TV and they like the look of it."

With no contact permitted, he says there is no risk of injury, and, indeed, in the 14 weeks so far that Portumna have piloted the game, there has been not one injury. Already, they have submitted their feedback to Croke Park and the powers-that-be will now finalise their plans before rolling the game out nation-

According to Coleman, if the response to the game from both young and old alike in Portumna is anything to go by, Camán Abu has the potential to become a massive success. "I can see this game developing like wildfire throughout the country. You could even have an inter-club competition on a recreational basis, where Craughwell might invite down Portumna or Kinvara or Athenry. Whatever clubs you care to mention."

He also says there is scope there to develop a competition for retired inter-county players, or, indeed, promote the sport internationally, particularly given that competitions can be run on a five-a-side basis and on outdoor, indoor or Astro turf facilities.

"There is no reason why other countries couldn't play," states the Chairman of . Portumna Hurling Club. "It is a lot like hockey, so I could see other countries taking part. Again, though, Croke Park will be the decision makers on all this and where it develops from here. The National Research and Development Committee have the ideas from the pilot scheme that we ran in Portumna and, hopefully, they will be launching it nationally over the next couple of months."

No doubt, the game has

captured the imaginations of not only those in Portumna GAA Club, but the wider community as a whole. Central to promoting Camán Abu has been the input of Portumna's Sign Out Youth Company, a voluntary organisation, which provides a social outlet for teenagers through its many projects, youth café and all-weather pitch. It is supported by County Galway VEC.

Through the group - and both Connacht and Galway Coaching & Games Comittees - the GAA were able to access the wider community. Indeed, Sign Out project coordinator, Susan Royston, who never played any sport, never mind hurling before, was one of those to join the Tuesday night sessions.

"For us, who never played hurling before, it is great to come in and meet new people," says the Cork City native. "So, there is a great social side to it. I have lived in this town for the last 24 years, but I hadn't talked to half of the people out there before.

"So, it was just great from that point of view. It is also

great exercise and it is safe. The sliotar is really soft, so you could get walloped by that and you are not going to get hurt. I really am getting into now."

Of course, in addition to the recreational and fitness elements of Camán Abu. there is also the social aspect. "We had a tournament, where we made these homemade badges and we gave them out for 'The Most Stylish Player' - the player who looked the best - and 'The Most Breathless Player' - the one who was giving out the most, not the one who was running the most!" laughs the mother of four.

"Then, The Most Absent Player' (badge) went to the one who was in the sin-bin the most! So, it was a real fun event. We just went down to the pub afterwards and had a few drinks. It was a great night and it helped to bring everybody back to basics. That this is non-competitive. It's social and recreational."

Another to experience the joys of the sport for the first time is Christine Gantley. who, like Susan, attends weekly with her husband Noel. "I used to play volleyball years ago, but I hadn't done much else. Then I heard this was starting up and I thought I would try it, have a bit of fun, a bit of craic, and get fit," says the fifty-something-year-old.

"For people who never got into sport when they were younger, never made teams or anything, this will

catch on, particularly among the older people. You have a social side to it as well. You make an effort

to get ready every Tuesday night to come hurling. I hope it takes off because it is something that should. It is a sport everyone can play. It is never too late and it just makes you a bit more It is a sentiment shared

by former Portumna hurler. Vincent Treacy, who attends with his wife Bernie. "To the hurling purist, it might not look the thing. But for recreational

active."

purposes, it is absolutely brilliant," says Treacy.

"For lads who finish up hurling, there is nothing unless you get involved in five-a-side soccer. However, when you have played hurling all your life, it is great to be able to go back and start swinging again. As well as that, when you are playing here for an hour and a half, the sweat does be pumping out of you," he laughs.

In all, a core group of 30 adult participate in Portumna, although the youth club and local schools have also taken the new game to their hearts. "Youngsters from the school take part during the day. They come out here and boys and girls who wouldn't normally be on school teams take part," says

Coleman.

"Of course, it can get competitive as well, at times, but the big thing here is the refereeing of it. If the refereeing is done strictly, it is safe. Otherwise, people can get over enthusiastic The whole philosophy though, behind the game is recreational and social hurling."








"It's been a long season that started back in February 2010; the girls have had only a three-week break in that time and that was after we won the county final. The commitment they have shown us has been fantastic.

Inniscarra Camogie Club

THE CLUB was founded in 1967, the founding members and first officers were Fr. Michael Twohig (President), Mary O'Callaghan (Chairperson), Mary O'Connell (Secretary), Ann Buckley (Treasurer), Pat O'Sullivan who was first captain and Nora O'Brien (vice captain). Tim Berrings provided a

field for training and playing of matches. The GAA club and camogie club work closely together and on July 25th July 2004 Miriam O'Callaghan, the then President of the Camogie Association, opened Pairc Camogaiochta Inis Cartha in Ballyanly. This was the first pitch in Cork and the third in Ireland to be dedicated to camogie only. It was a wonderful achievement to mark Centenary year and demonstrated the vibrant spirit of an ambitious club. The facilities are first class in picturesque Ballyanly a few miles from Blarney. Inniscarra won three Féile na nGael titles and thirteen county championships. They graduated to senior ranks in 1996 and contested the county finals in 2003 and '05, defeat was their lot until 2010 when they beat Divisional side Imokilly in a close and thrilling replay. They went on to become Munster champions on October 30th.

Former Inniscarra and Cork star Irene O'Keeffe won five Senior All Ireland Medals with Cork, and was Player of the Match in two finals, Dual current star Rena Buckley holds four Senior All Ireland camogie medals and five football medals, while Ger Casey won both Senior and Junior All Ireland medal and was Player of the Match in the junior final. Joanne Casey and Niamh Dilworth are members of the Cork senior panel. Rena Buckley is secretary of CCAO and won Ashbourne Cup medals with UCD. Captain Noelle O'Sullivan served as club secretary for a spell.

Inniscarra club members have played a significent administrative role in camogie, the late Mary O'Callaghan was President of the Association, a wonderful and colourful character. Sheila Golden has filled many roles including County chairperson and is at present County secretary. Con Hayes and Tim Buckley were founding members and officers of Cumann Camógaíochta na nÓg in Cork. The club has also won three All Ireland Scor Question Time titles.

O'Donovan Rossa Camogie Club

O'DONOVAN ROSSA camogie club was established in 1985, as part of the O'Donovan Rossa CLG. Lily Spence was the driving force in establishing Rossa. One of the leading figures in camogie for decades, she is still very much involved; she is President of the club.

Underage structures were firmly established and the U14 team won Féile na nGael Division 3 in 1995. Three players who were part of the Féile winning team are in action to-day, Jane Adams, Kerrie O'Neill and Seainin Daykin. Interestingly, Seainin Daykin is the current club chairperson and Kerrie O'Neill the treasurer, while goalkeeper Theresa McGowan is the secretary. That success was a huge boost for Rossa and they won several underage Antrim championships and featured in two other Féile finals.

Now Rossa camogie club fields teams in every age group from U8 to senior level. The first adult championship was won by the junior team in 1989, followed by another in 1991. A minor title was picked up in 1992, a talented side that includes a number of the present senior side

The seniors started to establish themselves as a real force in the late 90's and won the first county championship in 2000. They went on to claim the title in '02, '04, '05, '06,'07, '08 and '10. Provincial honours came their way in '04, '05, '06, '08 and '10. They crowned their achievements in 2008 by winning the All Ireland club championship, defeating Drom and Inch in the decider. A dazzling performance by Jane Adams won her Player of the Match. Michael McCullagh managed that team, a very committed and shrewd mentor, Martin Devine is the manager now and Gavin Kennedy is selector.

O'Donovan Rossa recorded success in the Kilmacud senior 7's in 2003 and '08. They are 7's specialists and have won many tournaments.

Jane Adams picked up an All Star Award in 2008 and a Soaring Star Award in 2010. Kerrie O'Neill was also a Soaring Star recipient in '10 . She was also a recipient of the Ulster GAA Writers Award, Another Rossa player to be awarded that accolade was goalkeeper Theresa McGowan.

Inniscarra display their mettle again

IT was hard not to spot Inniscarra selector Fergal O'Leary among the supporters such was his broad smile after Sunday's All-Ireland club semi-final win, writes LINDA MELLERICK.

He was understandably very proud of his team as the club heads towards history book territory

The last 15 minutes of our performance was superb. I thought Orla Healy's interception with about 15 minutes to go as she cut out Jane Adams was fantastic.

"Niamh Dilworth when she came out won great ball, Rena came really into it in the second half.

"I thought player for player, our subs that came on, everyone was fantastic. Laura (Burke) came on as a blood substitute and won a free for us. Our full-back line was solid."

Fergal and his team played a 'tactical blinder' and he acknowledged the work his co-selectors put into this.

"O'Donovan Rossa won the All-Ireland two years ago so you have to give them respect. We travelled up to Belfast four weeks ago to watch them when they played Queens. We then travelled to Dublin and watched them play WIT and we set our system up to beat them.

"Our big rule was not to lose the game in the first half. We won the toss, we played the way we wanted to and things worked out for us.

"Our response after the goal went in, the character, the heart was brilliant. They're doing it the whole time for us.

!We might not be the flashiest team in the world but we've got great heart. They don't give up; they don't know how to

"We came up here during the week and we spoke about positive attitude. The mood was very good on the way up and the moment we walked in here (Nowlan Park) the girls were switched on. You could see it.

Fergal's co-selector Irene O'Keeffe reiterated her colleague's words.

"When the Rossa goal went in (41st minute) we said 'they'll either collapse now or they'll take off' and they did what they've been doing for us all year - took off.

"Orla Healy's interception was crucial and that's what really turned it for us. Niamh Dilworth was on antibiotics all week so she probably didn't have an hour on the 40 in her but when she came out for the second half she was fantastic

"We wanted to hold O'Donovan Rossa in the first half and have the girls in the race. In fairness the girls that came on played very well as well'.

"The Cork championship helped us an awful lot because there's such physicality in it so we knew we'd probably have the upper hand on that side of things.

"And any one of ours can score from out around the 40 and that was the difference," she said.

Rossa feel the pain of defeat

All-Ireland run comes to an end but poor performance hurts



T wasn't supposed to end this way. As the Rossa players gathered themselves from the Nowlan Park surface last Sunday, their All-Ireland dreams shattered, Croke Park seemed further away than ever, when just sixty minutes before it was within touching distance.

Instead, it is Cork side Inniscarra who progress to contest for the All-Ireland club crown at Headquarters on March 6, while Rossa are left to rue what might have been. They tasted the ultimate glory back in 2008, but now those dreams are back on hold for one more year at least.

For Kerrie O'Neill, the chance to climb the steps of the Hogan Stand as an All-Ireland winning captain has been snatched away, and it's going to take some time to get over. Even though the dust has now settled on the defeat, emotions are still raw and the hurt cuts deep.

"It's bad enough when you lose in any game, but when you miss out and you know you haven't played to your full then that's hard to take. If we'd gone out and gone hell for leather and still been beaten, then that's maybe easier, but coming off the pitch knowing that you haven't performed makes it tougher.

"We had an up and down sort of a season. We had a few managers in and out at the start of the year, and if They beat us at our own game. We might not have the most skilful players in the country, but we work hard and we tackle in packs and play to our strengths

you miss out on that foundation at the start then you're always playing catch-up. We knew ourselves that we hadn't done the sort of work and preparation that we'd put in other years. At the same time, so many teams would love to be in the position we've been in, and we don't lose sight of that."

All but one of Rossa's scores last weekend in their 1-14 to 1-6 loss to the Munster outfit came from the stick of Jane Adams, and it was no coincidence that Rossa were very much closed down from open play.

As well as bringing an unbelievable hunger to the game, Inniscarra had also done their homework on their Belfast rivals. Rossa had recently played QUB in a challenge match at the Dub, and Inniscarra had sent representatives to watch the game. Rossa had also travelled to Dublin to take on Waterford IT, and again their rivals took the opportunity to observe Rossa first-hand.

They had also studied their successful 2008 final against Drom and Inch. Come last Sunday, Inniscarra's gameplan was very much in place, and Rossa struggled to cope.

"They beat us at our own game. We might not have the most skilful players in the country, but we work hard and we tackle in packs and play to our strengths. But on Sunday, every time one of our girls was on the ball there were three or four of their players around her, instead of the other way

It was obvious that they had their homework done, and it worked for them."

Within the next

fortnight, many of Rossa's play-ers will be back in competitive action with Antrim in the National League. Then before too long they will be back in club colours for the start of the Antrim league, and in turn the defence of their Antrim championship. All of that seems a long way right now, but O'Neill can look ahead with confidence and is adamant that despite having plenty of miles on the clock, her side can come back stronger than ever for another All-Ireland title tilt.

"When we set out at the start of the year, for us it was all about getting that Antrim title back. Losing to Loughiel last year cut us really deep, but walking off Casement Park that day we knew we would be back this year. So in that regard it's been a success.


"I think there have been about two changes, but this team has basically been on the go non-stop since 2005. We're tired, there's no point saying different.

"The challenge now is to go away, recharge the batteries, and come back with something new.

1) What are your hopes for camogie this season?



Being as it is early season, Sunday's clash represented the ideal opportunity to blood new faces, but only St. Thomas' Finola Keely made her senior debut as the management opted for a tried and tested starting 15. That said, on the evidence of this lethargic showing, there is still much work still to be put in, by both management and panel alike.

The 100 or so hardy souls who turned out to catch a glimpse of last September's All Ireland final pairing will, no doubt, have been unimpressed with the quality of fare as Galway registered a meagre 1-1 from play over the hour, failing to score in the second period until the 58th minute.

participative sport more than a spectator one and this is a step towards making it a spectator sport as well as a participative one.


"Fair dues to Dubling But the GAA who worked closely with the Dublin camogic board to put the programme in place.

Ex-minor selector is new coach

FORMER Cork minor hurling selector Joe O'Brien has been formally ratified as the coach to the Cork senior camogie team, writes MARY NEWMAN.

A native of Glanworth, Joe was involved with the Cork minor hurling team as a selector for two years up to the end of the 2009 campaign and he takes over the reigns from Denise Cronin.

Denise stepped down at the end of last season's campaign following defeat to Galway in the All-Ireland semi-final replay.

While it's a new departure for O'Brien, he comes to the job with plenty of experience having been part of the Cork minor hurling backroom set-up for two years. He won senior county championship honours with Glen Rovers in 1969, while he also won honours at intermediate football level with Glanworth.

Joe will be joined by a representative from county and Munster champions Inniscarra, who are expected to announce their appointment this week, while a third selector will join the backroom team to be appointed by the county board.

Following on the defeat at the hands of Galway in last season's semi-final, Cork will be determined to make amends and Joe intimated his intentions of working hard towards bringing the O'Duffy Cup back, when he met with the players last weekend.

His first game in charge will be on Sunday week when they travel to Tipperary to take on the home side in the opening game of the National League.

A further boost to the game came with the news that Bord Gáis Networks are to continue their sponsorship of the Cork Camogie teams for the season ahead. Bord Gáis Networks have been sponsoring the Cork senior team since 2008, but have now extended their sponsorship to all Cork teams for league and championship.

(T'S been a while since Cork were on the receiving end of a defeat to Tipperary yet that's how it turned out at the Ragg yesterday after-

The signs weren't good at the break when Cork, despite turning around 1-6 to 0-4 in front, had scored just one point from play with a gale to their backs.

The home side made far greater use of the elements striking 10 points to Cork's four in the second period thereby holding out for what is for them a very pleasing victory.

Cork were without the services of key personnel such as Rena Buckley, Orla Cotter and Jennifer O'Leary so when Gemma O'Connor was forced off early in the second-half it was a significant additional loss.

With a new look lineout, Cork tried a number of positional switches throughout the game. Amanda O'Regan commenced at full-back and seemed comfortable, catching good ball. The narrow pitch didn't allow for open play with the game scrappy at the best of times. Julie Kirwan at centre-back was having a tough battle with Gemma O'Connor and when both collided midway through the half, O'Connor came off the worse, switching to full-forward shortly afterwards.

What was notable was Cork's lack of threat on goal while it took them 19 minutes to register a score from play, Katrina Mackey the provider. A fortuitous O'Connor goal from a 70-metre free put a rather flattering reflection on the scoreboard.

Five points wasn't a considerable advantage and so it proved when Tipperary hit four unanswered points within five minutes of the restart to narrow the gap to one.

Historic appearance in All-Ireland Senior Club Camogie Final for Mid Cork side

WHATEVER happens on Sunday March 6th this has been a golden year for the parish of Inniscarra, Can it get much better for a Camogie Club in one year. Ballincollig Invitational Tournament February 2010, County U18A Championship, Senior A Championship and League, Junior Shield Championship, Munster Senior A Championship 2010.

Having beaten the Ulster Champions O'Donovan Rossa two weeks ago in the All-Ireland semi-final Inniscarra have now a place in the Senior A All-Ireland final in Croke Park on this Sunday March 6th next against Connacht champions Killimor from near Ballinasloe.

The whole parish has come out in great numbers to support the teams all through the year. An estimated 500 to 1,000 people travelled to Nowlan Park, Kilkenny, to the semifinal against O'Donovan Rossa of Belfast on February 13th and came away very satisfied and proud of their team's performance.

Team coach Fergal O'Leary describes passionately the decisions the team made together especially in the dressing room after they were beaten in the 2009 championship by Milford. Everybody knew this was a game they should have won and came away from that dressing room with a determination for the future to keep going and never give up until the final whiste. This trait has

been the big difference this year. Games have been drawn or won in very tight situations but never lost.

The winning the Ballincollig tournament in the beginning of 2010 was key to building confidence and the development and maturing of the squad as a whole throughout the county and munster championship and now to the All Ireland final.

In the first round of the county Inniscarra accounted easily for the Barr's. Then followed Cloghduv who had no answer for their superior scoring power. After that they accounted for the Barr's who had come through the back door in the third round the word in reports was Inniscarra looked like the finished article but their toughest encounters were yet to come.

In the semi-final against Douglas Inniscarra built up a good lead by half-time. But instead of defending the lead Douglas came back to draw the match. The replay was a tough, bruising encounter in which Cork All Star and winner of nine All-Ireland medals with Cork Rena Buckley got a severe shoulder injury but despite this severe setback Inniscarra went on to win by two points.

In the county final against Imokilly Inniscarra had to line out without injured Rena Buckley and survived a rip-roaring game full of atmosphere, thrills and spills in CIT. The game ended 4 – 9 apiece. Before the replay of the county the Munster semi-final between Inniscarra and a very fancied Burgess Duharra (Tipp) went ahead in Ballyanly and what a huge performance in front of the home parish winning 2-10 to 2-6.

One girl Niamh McCarthy stood out in these two high scoring games with a canny ability to score goals at crucial stages to give the team huge confidence. Niamh, who is only 14 years of age, has a brilliant sports career in front of her. She is daughter of Andrew Mc-Carthy from Drimoleague selector with Cork minor footballers, and Rose Breen from Skibbereen, former international basketball player with Ireland. Then it was on to Newtownshandrum for the Munster Senior A Championship final. Inniscarra wrote a brand new chapter in their camogie history beating Limerick champions Granagh/Ballingarry 0 - 10 to 0 - 7 on Saturday 30th October, 2010.

It was all getting a little surreal! The driving motivation of all their endeavours since Inmiscarra achieved semo was to win the county. Well, they did it and in what a fashion! Grit, determination and the never-say-die attitude were in full evidence for the county final replay. It looked as if they had given it their best shot, two points adrift and time ebbing away rapidly; supporters were resigned to what seemed inevitable when the indomitable Niamh Dilworth and the magician Rena Buckley combined to conjure and deliver the

"Having beaten two teams who would have won the championship in recent times we began to believe we could do it.


"Our back-room team instilled the belief in us, and Fergal O'Leary continued to build on the foundations he laid in 2009 when he came on board.

Forty-three years of remarkable progress for club

CAMOGIE has been played in Inniscarra since the early 1940s but it was not until 1967 that the Inniscarra club as we know it today was formed and a great debt is owed to those people who had the vision to embark on a great adventure because an adventure it has been.

Along the way Inniscarra have won 13 county titles and 3 Feile na nGael titles. Since going up to senior A in 1996 Inniscarra are this year's Cork County Champions at the third time of asking having being beaten in the finals of 2003 and 2005.

The founder members must be very proud of the progress the club has made over the last 43 years, especially as on October 30th last Inniscarra became Munster Senior Club Champions for the first time.

On and off the field Inniscarra people have made a great contribution to the game of camogie, Mary O'Callaghan RIP was national president, Sheila Golden county chairperson and county president and is at present county secretary. Con Hayes and Tim Buckley were officers of Cumann Camógaíochta na nÓg at its formation. Also Inniscarra has won three All-Ireland question time titles.

One of our most famous

players is Irene O'Keeffe who won five Senior All-Ireland medals with Cork, and was also voted player of the final on two occasions. Rena Buckley has four senior medals with Cork. Ger Casey also has a Senior and Junior All Ireland medal and was voted player of the final in the Junior All Ireland Final, which was a great achievement as she was goal-keeper. Rena Buckley, Joanne Casey Niamh Dilworth represented the club on this year's Cork Senior team.

Exactly one hundred years and one week since the first official camogie game was played in Navan on July 17th 1904 history was made in camogie circles in Co Cork on Sunday 25th of July 2004 when Miriam Ui Cheallacháin, Uachtarán Cumann Camógaíochta na nGael, officially declared Páirc Camógaíochta Inis Cartha in Ballyanly open for business.

This was the culmination of an extraordinary feat for the Inniscarra club in the historic Centenary Year of Camogie as this was the first pitch in Co Cork and only the third in the country to be dedicated to camogie only.

No doubt, if Killimor are to secure the Bill Carroll Cup it will require an almighty effort, but according to Callagy one that is not beyond the ability of his

"It's going to be tough on the day, but we're hopeful and we have prepared well. You don't know what will happen on the day, but I believe our girls will do okay.

As preparations go, the Killimor manager is confident everything has gone according to script alluding to the expert contribution of trainer Bertie Sherlock as a primary factor in the side's excellent run of form.

"Preparations are going well. We had a challenge against the Galway senior team last week. The training has been absolutely brilliant. Bertie has a serious effort put

in with us and the girls. Their commitment is second to none. I've being involved with a lot of teams in my time, but these girls are absolutely totally, committed."

Certainly, Killimor's semifinal win was a statement in itself decorated with spirit, heart and an unrelenting tenacity.

That said, flaws were apparent none more so than the side's erratic shooting in front of goal. Almost every forward was guilty of adding to the wides tally, especially towards the latter stages of the tie when the game hung delicately in the balance.

"We probably hadn't enough shooting practice done before that game. It was more about getting the players up to speed and up to fitness," admits Callagy.

"Looking back at it they probably missed a goal but we missed two or three goals and several points. What I really liked about it was the characinjury time we went a point down and we came back and got two points in injury time."

Callagy, who was at the helm when Killimor suffered final defeat in 2009, points to the Athenry game in which Killimor won out courtesy of a late Lorraine Donnelly goal, as the turning point in their

"The girls had to get that out of their system that they be able to beat Athenry. Once you get into that winning feeling, it's very hard even in tight games to accept defeat. I think that carried us through against Mullagh as well, Mullagh had it all to play for because they were underdogs. They put it up to us and we had to answer it in the second half and we did."

With Callagy at the forefront, Killimor won't be lacking anything by the way of passion or conviction come throw in on Sunday. He has brought them to the gates of immortality. All that remains is for those on the field of play to finish the job.

With six titles to their name already in the 2010/2011 season, O'Sullivan is quietly confident that Inniscan another in bringing the Bill Carroll Cup to

the banks of Leeside - the first time since Lynn Dunlea of Glen Rovers in 1993.

"We've prepared very well as a panel, and management have left no stone unturned, and we're happy with our preparation.

"There's also been great work done behind the scenes

HE doesn't say it lightly, but for Inniscarra selector Irene O'Keeffe, a win in Sunday's senior All-Ireland club camogie final would be a dream come true.

She knows only too well the pressures of major finals, having won five All-Ireland titles with Cork in the 1990s, but club glory on a national stage for Inniscarra would top it all off. As a fresh-faced 11-year-old with sliothar and hurley in her hand, Inniscarra Camogie Club was where O'Keeffe honed her skills to become one of the most memorable corner-forwards in the county, and now it's time to give something back. Having spent some time over the

county bounds in Kerry as part of her work commitments with AIB, a transfer back to Leeside 15 months ago was a blessing as club members approached her

to once again give of her expertise as she had done before.

This time however, it was the senior squad that needed her, and although an All-Ireland title was never part of the blueprint, O'Keeffe became a member of a management team which

brought renewed energy and a refreshing blast of professionalism.

"We had a team meeting in January 2010 and we basically told the girls that we weren't going to be there for the good of our health - we'd only be in it if they were willing to give equal commitment.

"We began training three nights a week shortly after that, and it wasn't until two months later that they first picked up a hurley.

"They've made many sacrifices to be fair, and although we never thought at the beginning of last year that we'd be in with a chance of an All-Ireland title, they gave it everything to win the county."

And that they did, albeit in reverse having first ended Cork's 16-year drought in

winning a senior Munster title against Granagh-Ballingarry last October, before eventually lifting their first ever senior county camogie title against Imokilly.

Their domestic clash with the east Cork favourites proved to be a thriller, with the final providing an eight-goal thriller which ended in stalemate - 4-9 apiece — with Margaret Cosgrove notching a late point to ensure another day out for Inniscarra.

But, before they could play the domestic final replay, there was a Munster semi-final against Burgess/Duharra to be dealt with, given they were to represent Cork due to Imokilly's divisional status.

But O'Keeffe believes playing the Munster showdown before the county final replay - which

they won by a solitary point, 1-8 to 1-7 — was a blessing in

"Our goal at the start of the season was to have a crack off the senior championship because we had never won a senior A title, and anything after that would be a bonus. "It's been a long season, but I think having won Munster before the county definitely helped us in the long run. "It worked out well in that had

we played the county first we'd probably have been celebrating, but you're out the next weekend in the Munster championship, so it helped us

to stay focused. "As I said, being in Sunday's final wasn't something we'd expected or anticipated because you can never look beyond the Cork senior championship because it's so strong. There's been about eight or nine different title holders in the last decade or so and the standard in Cork is very high. "I suppose as a county, the Munster championship wasn't taken as seriously because to win Cork alone was such a huge achievement, and the county probably paid for that over the years

"It's been 16 years since the last club, Glen Rovers, were in this position, and for a county our size and with such a big stature in camogie circles, that's been too long altogether."

With the finals taking place in Croke Park, O'Keeffe is concerned that some of the younger players may be affected by the big venue, but there's experience in the camp which she believes should help settle the nerves come throw in at 3pm on Sunday.

"Well, we were using playing in Croker as a carrot to the girls before the semi-final and it was an added driving force, and perhaps that might affect the younger gang. But, they've grown up winning a lot, whether it's been in ladies football, camogie, hockey, or the other sports they play and that'll help."

As to who are the favourites, O'Keeffe is calling it as anyone's game, with both sides having only just secured their first senior club championship titles last autumn.

"Well, Killimor beat the raging hot favourites Oulart the Ballagh of Wexford in the semis by a point, so people might be looking at them.

Inniscarra timeline

 INNISCARRA Camogie Club was formed in April 1967 although camogie was played in the inniscarra area long before.

 Mary O'Callaghan, a founding member and subsequent national president, played for the Lee Valley Club, as did Shella Hourihan (nee O'Leary) who won an All-Ireland medal with Cork in 1941.

In 1976, Inniscarra won their first junior county title and were re-graded to intermediate level. It wasn't until the nineties that Inniscarra began to win silverware at regular intervals. This was largely due to the enthusiasm of Emma Dineen, a primary school teacher in Cloghroe National School.

 In 1991, the club won its first county Féile title.

 In 1992, it won the U16
 County Championship, in which present-day captain Margaret
 Noelle O'Sullivan played.

 In 1994, Inniscarra won another U16 title and its first intermediate title.

 In 1996, the club won its first senior B title and in the process finally reached senior A status.

The club's star player in the Nineties was Irene O'Keetle who won five All-Ireland medals with Cork, and was named the RTÉ. Player of the Match in her first final in 1992 and her last in

In 1998, the club won its

second county Felle title.

In the Noughties, under chairwoman Joan O'Leary, Inniscarra decided to acquire its own grounds. It succeeded, by purchasing land within the Ballyanley Sports Complex, and it was officially opened on July 25, 2004.

In doing so, Inniscarra became the first camogle club in the country to purchase its own grounds.

 In 2003 and 2005, Inniscarra were beaten in the Evening Echo Senior A Championship finals.

 On October 10, 2010, Inniscarra drew with Imokilly in the senior A county final — 4-9 apiece — in CIT.

 As Cork representatives, Inniscarra faced Tipperary champions Burgess-Duharra in the Munster Club Championship semi-final and won 2-10 to 2-6.

 In the Munster final, they defeated Limerick's Granagh-Ballingarry by three points, with Joanne Casey scoring nine of their 10 points.

 Late last year, they went on to defeat lmokilly in the county final replay by a solitary point — 1-8 to 1-7.

 On February 13, they deteated Ulster champions
 O'Donovan Rossa in the All-Ireland semi-final in Nowlan Park — 1-14 to 1-6 — to reach Sunday's final.

"But, then again we beat the second tipped team, O'Donovan Rossa of Antrim, so it's the two underdogs really that have made the final.

"We watched them in their semi and they've a very similar style to ourselves.

"They also have a great appetite for the game, so on that basis I think it's going to be a cracking final. But if we show the same self-belief we've done all year, we're in with a shout."

The hype in Inniscarra has been huge in the lead-up to game, with bunting, painted cars and flags galore, and keeping the girls grounded hasn't been easy.

"The hype has been unreal, and trying to keep the girls from that has been bit of a handful, but it's been great. It's been 10 or 15 years since a local team has been in big final at adult level and the buzz around the place has been excellent.

"The support we've got from local businesses, John Keating of the Wayside Inn in Cloghroe, Centra in Tower, to other GAA clubs in the area like Dripsey and Donoughmore, and the hurlers, the support has been great.

"On top of that, a huge aspect that has been a great help is the finance committee which was set up about six weeks ago. They're a crew of about half-a-dozen and the work they've done has been Trojan. Their efforts have taken a lot of pressure off the management team, and it's allowed us concentrate on what we're supposed to be doing, and we're very grateful to them for that." And so, to Sunday's final, and O'Keeffe is hoping Inniscarra can bring back an All-Ireland club camogie title, not just for the parish, but for Cork too. "My heart is in this club and it would be a dream come true to see them lift the cup on Sunday. I'd be out there with them if I could, but I'm not sure the 'ole bones could take it. "On a good day we're as good as any team in the country, and it would be very disappointing if we didn't come home with

the win.
"If we do it, it'll be fantastic for everyone whose supported us in Inniscarra, but I think it would be a big boost for Cork camogie too."

Rena relishes chance to give back to beloved club

RENA BUCKLEY is perhaps best known for her dual exploits with Cork and her footballing success with Donoughmore. But, the importance of being in an All-Ireland final with her home club Inniscarra, is obvious from the off.

"It's a new challenge for a start, but I'm just really happy to have been able to give commitment to the girls and the club. "In the past it's been hard because playing inter-county can take away from your club commitments, and you don't get to train with them as often as you'd like.

"It's hard then to come in for games, and you've been training differently, or even catching up on the news, so I've really enjoyed the last few weeks."

With numerous accolades to her name, Buckley has had the advantage of playing in Croker before, but she's not concerned that the venue will be daunting for her teammates who haven't yet played there. "Croke Park can be daunting, but we were talking about that amongst ourselves. I actually think the pressure on us before the county final was a lot greater than it is on

us now in a funny way.

"The county final was our major goal, and we'd never aimed to be here so the pressure feels a little less this time out."

A physio by trade, Buckley has been trained by some of the top coaches in the business, be it Eamon Ryan, Fiona

O'Driscoll or Mossie Barrett, but the Inniscarra management team have come in for

huge praise.
"They've done such a good job. Their preparation has been immense all season and they've left no stone unturned." Buckley took a step back from her dual intercounty league campaigns in recent weeks such is her desire to give 100% to

Inniscarra in their search for glory, and

should they win, she'll hold All-Ireland intercounty titles in both ladies football and camogie at both intercounty and club level. The camogie club title has alluded her until now, and she's every intention of giving it her all to repay her club's loyalty to her for when she represented them over the years for

IT'S THE news every team dreads; that one of your key players has picked up an injury and there isn't the slightest chance they'll be taking to the field at any stage in a crucial decider for you.

That's the news Inniscarra received last week when star forward Niamh McCarthy damaged her cruciate ligament in a basketball game which has, in all probability, ruled her out of action for 12 months or more.

She is out for the All-Ireland club final on Sunday and it's a massive blow to the side and Niamh personally.

The open space in Croke Park was made for players like Niamh.

But as in the case when Rena Buckley sat out with a shoulder injury for a number of weeks earlier in the season; Inniscarra played some of their best hurling.

Rena's teammates stood up and answered the call and I have a feeling they'll do the same for Niamh and Aoife Kavanagh.

Aoife is another to miss out having also picked up that most dreaded of injuries in the county final replay.

Her cruciate ligament was operated on last week.

While not participating on Sunday both players remain key members of a squad sixty minutes away from a prize they scarcely dreamt of achieving when they commenced their championship journey last summer.

The mood in the village is incredible ahead of the weekend with houses, cars, billboards, even the animals painted or covered with flags and buntings.

The entire village is surely travelling to Croke Park and those who aren't better not admit to not do-

Inniscarra's defeat of O'Donovan Rossa in the All-Ireland semi-final was comfortable; 1-14 to 1-6 despite the sides being level 11 minutes into the second half. It never looked dangerous for Inniscarra; they always looked the better hurlers. But that doesn't necessarily mean you'll go on to win a game.

They play Killimor of Galway in the final. Killimor, like their opponents, won the Galway county senior title for the first time in the club's history.

Relatively little is known about the side, except that they didn't spring up overnight; rather they had many missed opportunities over the years.

Ann Marie Hayes and Brenda Hanney are senior inter-county players and Hayes is one who has impressed me over the years. Holding the centre back position she plays a commanding sweeping role. She is their driving force from the back and reportedly Killimor's defence is as tenacious as you'll get. Oulart-the-Ballagh were hot favourites heading into the All-Ireland semi-final yet it was Killimor who emerged from a dogfight in very heavy conditions. With the fine weather all week and the Croke Park setting this final should be a different ball game and fitness will come into play in the last quarter.

It's been a long season and while you wouldn't have it any other way, it's when limbs get tired that you are most likely to pull a muscle and slight strains are creeping in here and there. Respecting those warning signs is critical.

There was a time Galway would have feared Cork teams but with the county seniors having defeated Cork in the All-Ireland semi-final replay last August that respect may have diminished somewhat. Killimor won't fear Inniscarra on Sunday.

It will be interesting to see how Inniscarra handle Niamh McCarthy's absence.

They may well choose to start Laura Burke but she is such an impact sub, the decision may be to delay her introduction. Niamh Dilworth, switching to the 40 at the right time, has worked every time for Inniscarra and she has had a tremendous club season.

They would possibly be wise to start her inside again and spring her late in the second quarter, if not entering the third. It all depends on how the game is developing.

The second-half is typically Inniscarra's stage and if they are level or close at half time the signs will be looking good.

Their second-half performance in the Munster club semi-final against Burgess Duharra stands out in particular, their never-say-die attitude in both the county semi-final and replay, their injury time winner in the county final replay and their final 20 minutes against O'Donovan Rossa epitomise a spirited team united in their goal, a goal and dream which is only an hour away.

The occasion will be huge and no doubt the added pressure of Croke Park may just take its toll, the winning and losing of the game may be decided by who reacts better to the big occasion.



RENA BUCKLEY'S mantelpiece needs just one more bauble to be

"It would be just unbelievable," the

couple of years back, discussed our plan for the future and they all seemed to row in behind it. That came to the fore, it meant minors, juniors and seniors all working together to improve things. Some would've questioned bringing young girls into the panel, some as young as 14, but it has benefited us."

Club chairman Sean Twohig must've won-dered if he'd ever see such a day. "It's a dream come true for the club to be in the final and we really are determined to do well, having won the senior county for the first time in our club's history. It would be the icing on the cake to be crowned All-Ireland champions.

"They're a fantastic bunch of girls, the best you could hope for. We've a panel of 33 and they'll do whatever it

takes to make it down for training without a complaint. It makes our jobs as selectors very difficult because we've such a panel and we still haven't a team picked for tomorrow.

That tells you how hard it is." He's under no illusions about the job in hand: "We're the underdogs. We went up to see the other-semi final between Oulart-the-Ballagh (Wexford) and Killimor, and Oulart were favourites so to see them beaten tells us what we're up against. It's a massive test but we're up for it.

Twohig pays tribute to the talent

on the team. "People think it's all about our Cork contingent but it's not. We've Rena (Buckley), Joanne (Casey) and Niamh (Dilworth) but Rena's twin sister, Mary's a quality player too. Niamh McCarthy in the corner is



Today's Cups

Senior Bill CARROLL CUP

THE first All-Ireland
Championship was played in 1964 as the main event in the Camogle Association's Diamond Jubilee celebrations. Celtic (Dublin) overcame Deirdre (Belfast) in the final at Croke Park. Celtic were allowed to keep the specially-made Jubilee Cup on a permanent basis.

It was decided to make the All-Ireland Club Championship an annual event and, therefore, a new trophy was required. Bill Carroll, father of wellknown Tipperary and Kilkenny star, Ann Carroll, donated a cup for the new competition which bears his name.

A native of Desert, near Callan, in Co. Kilkenny, Bill Carroll worked in London for some years where his daughter, Ann, was born. The family returned to Ireland in 1950 when Bill set up a joinery business in Ballintaggart, Co. Tipperary. Ann, an only child, had a brilliant camogie career

Ann won her father's cup on five occasions, twice with St. Patrick's, Glengoole (Co. Tipperary) and three times with St. Paul's, (Kilkenny). She was the first player to win All-Ireland club medals with two different clubs.

Intermediate AGNES O'FARRELL CUP

AVAN-BORN Agnes O'Farrelly was a noted Gaelic scholar, educationist, writer and champion of women's rights. Cáit O'Donoghue, the first Organiser of the Camogie Association, wrote to Agnes O'Farrelly, then lecturer in Modern Irish Poetry at U.C.D., inviting her to become involved in camogie and to use her influence to set up teams in the universities. Agnes presided over the inaugural meeting of the U.C.D. Camogie Club and became its first President, a position she held until her death in 1951. She prevailed on her friend, Edwin Gibson, Lord Ashbourne, to donate the impressive Ashbourne Cup for intervarsity competition. By 1932, Agnes was one of the most prominent women of her time. She was appointed Professor of Modern Irish Poetry at U.C.D., elected to the Senate, held a seat on the Governing Body of U.C.D. and was an established writer.
