IT'S been some year for Cathriona Foley.

The 22 years old fourth year UCC biochemistry student captained Cork to their 23rd All-Ireland senior camogie title.

Her displays were rewarded with a second All-Star award on the spin and the Carrignavar-native crowned a memorable 2008 by helping her club, Rockbán, capture the county senior B championship.

There's little surprise then that Cathriona's achievements were recognised in her selection as the November winner.

Rockbán's rise since their foundation in 1997 is the stuff of fairy tales.

The club is an amalgamation of Whitechurch and Carrignavar and they play camogie and ladies football.

Players wear the Whitechurch colours in football and the Carrig colours in camogie.

In the space of six years Rockbán have gone from junior B status to competing at the highest level in camogie next year.

With Cathriona in the pivotal centre-back role and long-time buddy, Sile Burns, starring in attack, Rockbán laid down a marker in their opening group game against Kilbrittain-Timoleague, scorching to a seven-goal victory.

"At the outset we would have been expected to be among the front runners for the title.

"We reached the semi-final last year, losing to Valley Rovers, who, in turn, lost to Douglas in the final.

There was an air of expectation about us also because of the fact that Muskerry won the senior county in 2007 and we had three or four girls involved.

"I suppose there was no escaping that we would have been one of the fancied teams, especially with myself and Sile on the Cork team.

"Elaine (Harte) and Val (Mulcahy) were also involved with the Cork ladies football team, so there was plenty of experience, too," Cathriona said.

Rockbán would have been expected to make a winning start, but the one-sided score line even surprised them slightly.

"Kilbrittain came down from senior A a couple of years ago and they're trying to re-group.

"I'd say we caught them on a very good day from our point of view.

"We've a very good forward line and don't depend entirely on Sile.

"For example, Margaret Howard and Elaine Casey are exceptional players, while Sile is also very good at setting up scores.

"Val has this habit of

being in the right place at the right time which is great for any forward and she's also got a great work eth-

The next outing against Newcestown offered a sterner test and an opportunity to set the record straight.

"It was a very tough match which came as no surprise to us because they beat us in the championship last year.

"That was in the back of our minds going into the game.

The one thing I can remember is that we left our full-back line very exposed.

"We were definitely relieved to get out of that one."

Rockbán leaked four goals, but their 4-9 tally ensured a four-point winning margin.

With just two group games left a semi-final place loomed large.

Glen Rovers provided the next opponents and they, too, asked awkward questions.

They lost a lot of their more established players in the last couple of years and they're re-building.

"The Glen have a strong under-age system and I think they'll get the benefit of that in the not too distant future.

We built up a good lead at half-time, but the Glen came back at us very strongly in the second-half and it was really tough.

They scored one cracking goal and we had to up our level of performance."

Rockbán duly survived to win by 4-10 to 3-7 to clinch a play-off

spot without having to play their final pool game against Eire Og, who qualified, too.

"Muskerry were involved in the championship and we didn't want to disrupt that.

"As it turned out we lost our title, when Douglas beat us.



"It's impossible to chose between captaining Cork to an All-Ireland and helping your club win a county.

"There's something special about winning a county with your club, because you're playing with girls who you've grown up with.

"I mean I've been playing with Sile on teams since I was nine and the rest of the girls then from under 12 all the way up

der-12 all the way up.
"My younger sisters, Colleen and
Máiread were on the team, as well,

which made it all the more memorable.

"And you've all the mentors who've been involved with teams over the years there to support and celebrate with you as well.

"Nothing can take from that. I've been playing with Cork since 2002 and that's great also."

There are a few stand-out memories from her hectic and historic year.

"The All-Ireland final homecoming is definitely one of my favourites "But going back to Carrignavar tops the lot. The whole parish seemed to be out to greet us.

"I didn't think there were that many people in the area. I think the population must have doubled over-night.

"It was fitting that it should happen then because Eamon de Valera came to Carrignavar to unveil a monument in recognition of 12 poets on the same weekend many years before."

It's fascinating how different people handle the daunting prospect of addressing thousands of cheering fans during acceptance speeches.

Cathriona had a strange experience near the end of that fierce struggle with Galway in the All-Ireland final.

"I was kind of rehearsing the speech in my head about five minutes from the end, but I had to stop myself because we hadn't the game won yet.

"The match was so intense that nobody could afford to switch off and lose concentration.

"I was saying to myself 'you've got

to keep going, never mind about the speech."

"My attifude to sport is that you prepare to win, so I had it prepared about who I needed to thank.

"I did leave out of a couple of things, but most of what I wanted to say came to me as I was up on the podium.

"It was a strange feeling. I didn't feel nervous because the adrenalin was still pumping as if the match wasn't over.

"In the game Galway kept coming at us. They wouldn't lie down. It was the same in the round robin, when my player scored a late goal to give Galway the win at Páirc Uí Rinn.

"That haunted me going into the final and it was certainly on my mind.

"I was thinking there's no way it's going to happen to me a second time.

"It's a bit of a blur now, looking back on the day. The match was really intense, especially the last few minutes.

"Aoife's save is one thing I will always remember. We had all been drawn over to the left and didn't have time to react when the ball was played across the goal."

Away from camogie, Cathriona is working on eight-week project on thermus bacteria as part of her degree course.

"It involves growing them at a very high temperature, like a boiling kettle, finding how they maintain their generic material and what proteins contribute to this.

"Prof Tommy McCarthy and Noreen in the lab have been a great help to me.

"The course I'm doing is the perfect balance between academia and sport and I'd encourage others to following same path."

On the pitch Cathriona's next goal is to win that elusive Ashbourne Cup medal with College, especially as it's being hosted by UCC in February.

AFTER a close and evenly balanced contest the Evening Echo Senior B county camogie championship title is Rockbán's and with it promotion to top grade camogie in 2009.

They defeated Eire Og in a hard fought contest on the splendid Castle Road Camogie Grounds yesterday.

In the finish a goal from inter-county senior star Sile Burns was crucial to the Rockban cause, coming at a vital stage in the game on the three quarter mark as they struggled to shake off their opponents.Sile Burns opened the scoring on two minutes with a point but Claire Meeney replied quickly to signal Eire Og's intentions.

Sile Burns converted a 45, 10 minutes in, to edge Rockbán in front and aided by the strong wind they added four points between the 11th and 18th minute - Louise Crowley, Valerie Mulcahy and Sile Burns (2) were on target as Eire Og still battled to contain the lively Rockbán

Up front Eire Og kept the pressure on and Margaret O'Herlihy converted a free and added one from play as Valerie Mulcahy had one for Rock-

Éire Óg were reasonably happy to be just three points adrift at the interval trailing 0-6 to 0-3.

Turning to play with the wind Claire Meeney cut the deficit with an Éire Óg point but Elaine Casey replied to keep Rockbán three points in front.

Éire Óg matched Rockbán step for step but with the Rockban defence superbly marshalled by Cork senior captain Cathriona Foley, they absorbed strong pressure as they hung onto their three point lead.

There was nine minutes without a score as both defences stood firm but 15 minutes into the half Sile Burns grabbed the goal that was to be so crucial. Keeper Marie Gleeson seemed to be blinded by the sun as she failed to hold the sliothar and critically it gave Rockban breathing space and a six point lead.

Championship format altered

AS THE intercounty camogie By MARY NEWMAN season draws to a close competition structures for the 2009 season were recently announced and again this year there is change to the Gala senior championship

In 2008 we had a change to the format with just one group of seven with each county playing one another with the top four going forward to the semi-final stages. The format was a successful one with some thrilling game along the way as the counties battled it out to the last day before the final four semi finalists were known. However the format placed a huge burden on counties who struggle to fit in their club competitions around such a big fixture schedule and in the coming season we will see the structure reverting back to two groups of four to be played in a round-robin system. The top two teams from each section will qualify for the semi-finals.

Cork will open their championship campaign with home advantage against Dublin, All Ireland Junior champions Clare make the step up and they will face a tough opener against beaten All Ireland senior finalists Galway. Cork will field a

team at Intermediate level in both league and championship and here again there are changes with two groups three teams in group one where Cork are joined by Kilkenny and Tipperary the first game will be away to Kilkenny two teams qualifying from each group for the semi-fi-

At under age level there are also big changes most notably the playing and completing dates for the Under 16 All Ireland champions with games getting under way on April 9 with the All Ireland final pencilled in for May 9 where previously the fiheld the first August. Again there will be two groups with the top two from each progressing to the semi-finals. Cork are in a group of five and open their quest for a place in the final shake up when they play hosts to Antrim on April 9.

A change in format also for the minor championship with seven counties participating winners of the first round will play the losing teams from the same round with two progressing directly to the semi-fi-

The first weekend in March sig-

nals the commencement of the National Senior League, and here similar to the championship format two groups will vie for honours the top two progressing to semi-final stage, Cork meet Galway in both their opening league clashes





Jessica Gill certainly was a major player in ensuring Galway continued to keep in touch in this game, and the Athenry ace was also key in the opening stages, as Galway led by 0-4 to 0-0 after nine minutes, with all of those scores coming from Gill frees.

However it was the reliance of Liam Donoghue's charges on scores from placed balls which cost them dearly, but in reality it was Cork's rear-guard which reigned supreme.

When goalkeeper Aoife Murray leaked a 27th minute goal from midfielder Aine Hillary, it was the only real blip on an otherwise flawless Rebel defensive performance.

Cork opened their account on ten minutes, with the first of seven points from full-forward Rachel Moloney.

Moloney had been a danger player throughout the Championship and again proved to be crucial to this Cork success.

If Moloney was one player for the Galway defence to be watchful of, so too was right-corner forward Sile Burns with the Rockban native crashing home two first half goals - which were really the decisive scores in this game.

Burns first goal came on 16 and a half minutes, after Eimear O'Sullivan and Elaine O'Riordan combined, to flick the ball off to Burns who had no hesitation to crash the ball to the net.

Four minutes later and Burns was again on target, this time crashing the ball to the roof of the net from the 21 metre line; as what had been a four-point Galway lead 10-minutes previously had now been turned into a four-point Cork advantage.

But Galway rallied strongly and a goal, from a speculative Aine Hillary shot in the 27th minute, ensuring the deficit was reduced to the minimum, with the half-time scoreline reading 2-3 to 1-5 in Cork's favour.

Points from Moloney and Orla Cotter opened up a three-point advantage in as many minutes after the restart, and although Jessica Gill had ample goal opportunities, including a 36th minute penalty - it just wasn't to be Galway's day.

Aoife Murray was rock solid between the Cork posts, while at the opposite end Susan Earner also pulled off two fine saves in the closing ten minutes.

Firstly Earner stopped a bouncing shot from centre-half-forward Una O'Donoghue in the 52nd minute, which was cleared out for a 45; and then five minutes later a chance for Sile Burns to complete her hat-trick; but nothing was going past Earner at that stage.

Galway weren't without their scoring chances as the

full-time whistle approached, but a clinical Cork side failed to lose their composure as a seventh Moloney score put the gloss on a hard earned five-point win.

ENRIGHT MAJOR DELIGHTS THE BANNER

Shonagh Enright scored an injurytime winning goal for Clare as the Banner County claimed the Gala All-Ireland junior camogie crown (2-8 to 1-10) for the first time since 1986.

Clare bounced back from the heartbreak of three final defeats in the previous five seasons, including last year's heartbreaking loss to Derry, to finally record a fourth All-Ireland crown at this grade.

Offaly, who were chasing a very first success in this competition, were left devastated as Enright, introduced 12 minutes after halftime, handpassed the sliotar to the net with a minute and a half of stoppage time played.

Offaly, who led by 1-7 to 1-3 at half-time, looked to have weathered a second half storm from Clare but they were caught right at the death by Enright.

Twice Clare fought back to within a point of their opponents in the second half while at the other end, goalkeeper Denise Lynch kept the Munster outfit in the game with two superb saves.

Enright's late clincher was harsh on Joachim Kelly's Offaly, who bounced back from a poor start to lead by four points at the halfway point of an entertaining encounter.

Clare star Carina Roseingrave netted after just five minutes but Offaly hit back with a run of points and the sides were level twice before the midway point in the first half.

Offaly, with Arlene Watkins and Tina Hannon in good form, assumed almost complete control before the break and Watkins found the net ten minutes before half-time, showing great skill to control captain Marion Crean's lengthy delivery before cutting through on goal.

Two further points opened up a 1-7 to 1-2 lead for the Faithful County before Claire Commane hit back for Clare with the final score of the half, her side's first point for 16 minutes.

A brace of Laura Linnane frees

after half-time brought Clare right back into contention before goalkeeper Lynch was called upon to keep out Claire Nevin in the 43rd minute, and Jean Brady just three minutes later.

Those point-blank saves proved crucial for Clare and although Offaly led by three points, 1-10 to 1-7, with eight minutes remaining, Linnane's fourth point of the second half offered a glimmer of hope before Enright struck with that last gasp winner.

2 008 was another successful year in Camogie with league and championship honours spread across Cork, Clare, Kilkenny, Derry, Offaly, Antrim, Meath, Tyrone, Kildare. Ulster won the junior inter-provincial championship while Connacht took the senior title. History was made when O'Donovan Rossa won the All Ireland senior club championship, the first team to take the title to Ulster. At junior level Harps of Laois captured their third successive All Ireland junior club title. At 3rd level UCD retained the Ashbourne Cup while Queens won the Purcell Cup. St. Brigids, Callan consolidate the under-age achievements of Kilkenny when they won the Senior A 2nd Level Colleges title.

At the All Stars, in association with O'Neills, seven counties were represented on the All Star selection while the Young Player of the Year went to Carina Roseingrave of Clare. Liam Dunne and Stephen Dormer won the Manager of the Year for their fantastic achievements with the Kilkenny U16 teams.

CLARE COMEBACK

Once again the U21 Bord Gáis All Ireland Hurling inal was played in conjunction with the Gala All reland Senior and Junior Camogie Finals. Clare and Offaly met in the junior final in a game of eal high standard. Prior to the match all the talk was about Clare who were outdone by Derry with a last gasp goal in the 2007 final. This time round, new kids on the block. Offaly refused to read the script, and led the favourites from post to (almost) pillar. It looked as if Joachim Kelly's charges would take the silverware, but up stepped Banner substitute Shonagh Enright who found the net deep in stoppage time. That Clare managed to rekindle hunger and spirit after the defeat of 2007 says a lot about their character. Earlier in the summer they triumphed in the National Junior League. Brothers Eoghan and Colm Hanley managed the successful team, Cork were back in Croke Park on the second

Sunday in September to meet Galway in the Gala All Ireland senior Camogie final. Cork captained by Cathriona Foley had lost five top-class players from their previous season were, however, worthy winners on the day with a two goal haul from Sile Burns. The ace corner forward is daughter of Denis who wore the red and white of Cork. The Connacht side, appearing in their first showdown in 10 years, were managed by former Galway goalkeeper Liam Donoghue, Damien Coleman and Ann Broderick. Despite the heroic efforts of Jessica Gill, who finished the year as top scorer, the rebels captured their 23rd title.



YOUNG CATS At underage the Cats dominated; the county amassed an amazing four-in-a-row U16 titles, and three-in-a-row minor titles. Many of these young girls also collected National League Division 1 honours and an All Ireland intermediate medal when they overcame a fancied Cork selection in dramatic fashion at McDonagh Park, Nenagh. After the hour, a mere point separated the teams - a shrewd move by boss Ann Downey switching regular centre back Collette Dormer to full forward worked the oracle.

Royal Meath broke new ground when they won both National League and Gala Junior Championship in 2008. Tyrone did likewise and added the Ulster Junior Championship to their honours. Offaly's under-age structures brought success at Minor B level ensuring a pool of talented players for the future. The Lilywhites too made great progress during 2008 capturing both U16 and U18 titles.

Derry and Antrim kept the Ulster flag flying. Derry captured their second successive U16B title while Antrim needed a second day out to beat Offaly in the Division 3 National Leauge.

Connacht won senior inter-provincial honours last spring. Made up entirely of Galway players, it was the start of a very fine year for the Maroon and White who contested both the National League Division 1 and Gala All Ireland Senior Final. Ulster claimed the junior interprovincial championship defeating Munster.

The year ended on a high note with two excellent games in the All Ireland Club Championship. O'Donovan Rossa, led by the inspirational captain Jane Adams, whose return of 2-9 was instrumental in their 2-15 to 1-12 victory over Tipperary and Munster champions Drom & Inch. The equally inspirational Louise Mahony was outstanding when Harps of Laois beat Kilmaley of Clare.

Briege Corkery was honoured as one of the Texaco Sportstars of 2008 for her outstanding performances in Camogie and football.

The game continues to thrive overseas particularly in North America where many teams comprising of many players with no Irish background competed in the North American Finals held in Boston. There are also eight teams competing in the Australian championship.

Bannerettes savour All-Ireland glory

It was a case of fourth time lucky for the Clare camogie team when they defeated Offaly in dramatic circumstances to capture the All-Ireland junior title for the first time since 1986. Here, winning manager Colm Hanley shares his recollections on the success, while looking forward to the prospect of playing in the senior grade next year.

lare's perseverance and persistence finally paid off on September 14 last at Croke Park when they claimed the Gala All-Ireland junior camogie title after a 22-year lapse.

Bouncing back from the heartbreak of three final defeats in the previous five years, the Bannerettes scored a last-gasp goal to edge out Offaly by 2-8 to 1-10, and finally record a fourth national success in the grade. Ironically, Clare had lost last year's final to Derry in similar circumstances, and their manager Colm Hanley acknowledges that they used that defeat as a motivating tool in this year's campaign.

"Instead of feeling sorry for ourselves after last year's heartbreak, we went all out to make amends this year and thankfully everything worked out for us," the 25-year-old Shannon man says.


"The Derry defeat provided us with ample motivation for this year and it was great to finish the year as All-Ireland champions after all the disappointments we've had in recent years. Three weeks after we lost last year's All-Ireland final, we beat Waterford in the Munster junior final and I think that helped us to get over the worst of the disappointment."

This year's success was a case of fourth time lucky for team captain Deirdre Murphy, Cathy Hally, Deirdre Corcoran, Jane Scanlon, Laura Linnane and Claire McMahon - sister of Clare hurling star Diarmuid - who had all been involved with the side that lost the 2003 All-Ireland final to Galway after a replay. Clare were beaten again after a replay by Dublin in 2005, while last year's loss to Derry was arguably the most gut-wrenching of all.

On becoming manager at the start of 2007, Hanley introduced a number of new faces and many of those players came of age in this year's successful campaign,

which saw Clare win both the National League Division 2 and All-Ireland junior titles. Indeed, their only defeat was suffered at the hands of neighbours Limerick in the Munster senior championship, which the Bannerettes were admitted to following their provincial success at junior level last year.

After winning all of their qualifying games comfortably. Clare defeated Derry by three points in the league final at the St. Peregrine's club grounds in Dublin, and in the process, avenged last year's All-Ireland defeat.

Hanley remembers: "I knew we had improved from last year, but it took that victory to confirm it. We didn't play that well, but we still managed to grind out the win. One of the most encouraging things about this year was that we learned how to put teams away which mightn't have been the case in previous years."

Clare's championship campaign started as it ended – with a narrow victory over Offaly in Ennis. They easily accounted for Down in the next round in Shannon before making the long journey north to Dunloy where they produced a great performance to overcome Antrim by seven points.

"I would have no hesitation in saying that was our best display all year. It was a must-win game for Antrim after their loss to Offaly in Birr, but we hurled really well to come out on top. In saying that, I wouldn't like to have met them again further down the line. They are a strong outfit who can call on some of the best players in the game," the young schoolteacher recalls.

Clare survived a stern test from Laois to set up a Croke Park showdown with Offaly thanks to a 1-9 to 1-8 semi-final victory at Banagher, Co. Offaly. The Banner County came from four points down at half-time, 1-6 to 0-5, to clinch a narrow win, although Laois forward Louise Mahony twice came close to scoring a dramatic winning goal for her side in the dying moments.

Clare took an early 0-3 to 0-0 lead but after clawing their way back into contention, Laois had edged into a 0-6 to 0-5 lead before Sarah Ann Fitzgerald struck for a goal just before half-time to give the midlanders a four-point advantage.

Claire McMahon gave Clare the perfect start to second half when she found the net within two minutes of the restart, and they managed to keep their noses in front from there until finish.

Appearing in

their first junior final since 2001 and managed by the legendary Joachim Kelly. Offaly were expected to pose a major threat to Clare's All-Ireland ambitions. And it looked as though the Banner girls were in for more heartbreak until super-sub Shonagh Enright hand-passed the sliothar to the net with a minute and a half of injury-time played to give the Banner a sensational victory.

Offaly, who led by 1-7 to 1-3 at the interval, appeared to have weathered a second half storm from Clare, but were caught right at the death by Enright, who was introduced with 12 minutes remaining. Twice Clare fought back to within a point in the second half while at the opposite end, goalkeeper Denise Lynch kept them in the game with two superb saves.

The Munster outfit made a dream start when Carina Roseingrave netted

after just five minutes, but Offaly hit back with a flurry of points and the sides were level twice before the end of the first quarter. The Faithful County assumed almost complete control before the break and an Arlene Watkins goal in the 20th minute helped them to a four-point interval lead.

Two Laura Linnane frees after halftime brought Clare back into contention before goalkeeper Lynch denied Claire Nevin in the 43rd minute and Jean Brady three minutes later. Those saves proved crucial and although Offaly led by 1-10 to 1-7 with eight minutes to go. Linnane's fourth point of the half made it a twopoint game before Enright pounced for her late winning goal.

Hanley attributes Clare's All-Ireland triumph to their great "heart and character". He adds: "We never gave up and that was the hallmark of the team all year. Once again, we didn't play to our potential and I thought our first half performance was quite poor. But despite missing a lot of chances, we kept at it and we got our just reward in the end."

Hanley and his players received a rapturous welcome on their return to the Banner County when they became the first sports team since the 1997 All-Ireland hurling winners to receive a civic reception.


The victory was hugely satisfying for Hanley, whose playing career with Wolfe Tones in Shannon was ended prematurely by injury two years ago. He cut his teeth in camogie management by guiding the local St. Caimin's college team to provincial and national success, and is one of the youngest managers – if not the youngest – to have led his county to All-Ireland success.

Colm was assisted by his brother Eoghan, who coached the team, and selectors John Nihill and Catherine O'Loughlin, who only retired from playing last year and holds the distinction of being Clare's only camogie All-Star winner. Ciaran McDonagh also played his part in the success by acting as goalkeeping coach.

With Clare also winning the Munster minor title this year, and going on to contest the All-Ireland final against Kilkenny for the first time. Hanley believes the county is well equipped to compete at senior level in 2009.

"We had the option of either playing in the intermediate or senior championship, but we always said we'd make the step-up to the senior championship if we won the All-Ireland junior title. I don't think going into the intermediate would be beneficial to us at all.

"We played all the intermediate teams in the league this year and we've beaten most of them, so the real goal for Clare should be a crack at the senior. The talent is there, the young players are coming through too so there's no reason why we shouldn't aim high," he concludes.

Naomh Aoife - Players recall glory days in the Park

eternal glory, but his name is still bantered around parts of Dublin some seventy -three years later why? The answer is he was the man responsible for the founding of one of Dublin's most famous Camogie clubs!-Naomh Aoife.

Back in 1935, Fr. Stein from James'
St. in Dublin met with John Timmins
one day to see if something could be
set up for young girls in the parish as
up to then the only activity were the
Girl Guides. The smart thinking priest
asked John for advise on Camogie
training. Within a short time, regular
Camogie training was held in the

Phoenix Park and so the famed Naomh Aoife club was founded. They say behind every good man is a good woman, well no better person than Kay his wife, commonly known to one and all in Dublin as Mrs T!

Memories rekindled

All these memories were rekindled recently in the family home of Patricia Woods (nee Timmins), the holder of five senior All-Ireland medals with her native Dublin who brought together six other members of the club who are still playing Camogie in the Phoenix Park on a Sunday morning! Earlier this year, their silken skills did not go unnoticed to the senior Good Counsel

team who were training nearby.

Training with that team was Eve Talbot, one of Regional Development Officers of Cumann Camogaiochta na nGael who was very impressed with the skills of the older players. "We have had great chats with the girls over the months, I thought it was great to see so many players still playing at their age and I hope I can play when I reach the over 50 mark!" quipped Eve. Likewise, the Naomh Aoife players were watching the younger players and remarking just how much the game has changed.

This was no ordinary club. Training the teams were Kay and John Timmins and what joy they had when they won

the ultimate Dublin award back in 1966 – the Dublin senior championship. The girls who gathered in Patricia's warm home relived that day as if it was yesterday. "We beat the best" beamed Frances Whelan. One could see the delight in her face all these years later as she recalled that day when they beat Celtic in the Dublin senior championship final in Páirc an Chrocaigh.

Once the memories of the 1966 final were rekindled the memories came quickly, Nora McDonald recalled marking the great Orla Ní Shiocháin who was held scoreless during one of the championship encounters that year. The seven former players who gathered to do this piece all recalled the words of trainer, Mrs T." enjoy the game but let them score"! was what was said to the team if they were beating a team well! Hard to believe that today where so much emphasis is put on winning, but Camogie was seen by the Naomh Aoife club as a completely social occasion. Winning was important, but it was not the end of the world if they lost the game.

All-Ireland honours

Other players who played for the county included Patricia Timmins (5 All-Ireland medals), Frances Whelan (2 All-Irl medals), Nora Mc Donald (1 All-Irl medal) and Kay Ryder who is the only person to hold ten senior All-Ireland medals. (There are other players with more than ten)

While winning the senior cham-

pionship in 1966, the club won numerous titles over the years, with Patricia's mother Kay playing at full back while daughter Patricia played in the forwards on some of the same teams. The club continued to field teams and in 1983 they celebrated their 50th Anniversary. It was a great year for the club and they set off to celebrate in style with a trip to the USA where they played.

They returned and got back into the Dublin Leagues and championships, but they were gradually having to cope with falling numbers as more and more clubs began amalgamating with GAA clubs. Naomh Aoife chose to go alone. The girls turned out regularly until the mid nineties when it was proving just too difficult to field.

However, with such a distinguished history the players refused to let the name Naomh Aoife disappear from the radar and they remained in touch largely through Patricia Timmins who would host the best of evenings in her lovely home. During the evening Nora McDonald quickly produced a neat note - book with one very important date - 26th of October 2003.

Rebirth

That was the start of something new for Naomh Aoife. It could well be recalled as the rebirth of the famous club. On that day a small number of players travelled up to their old training pitch in the Phoenix Park. There was no turning back now, these mature and very skilful players were on the way back.! Training began on Sunday mornings and the word began to spread that Naomh Aoife were back training! They also turned out on Tuesday evenings!

Fortunately, the following year 2004 was the centenary of Cumann Camogaiochta na nGael and as part of Dublin Board's centenary celebration's came the idea of an over 40's Tournament! Once Naomh Aoife heard of this there was no looking back! Terry Lowndes became the manager and the girls were really enjoying the games in the Phoenix Park. That was not surprising as Patricia Timmins summed up Naomh Aoife in one short sentence, "it was where we were happiest" referring to their golden days in the Phoenix Park.

From the Phoenix Park, the happy team travelled on the 28th of August 2004 to Scoil Ui Chonaill's grounds in Clontarf to take part in the Over 40's Tournament. It was a great day for the club and for Dublin Camogie. One could hear some of the great stories of the past on the sideline as old clubs exchanged stories of past games and probably stories of what went on at some county board meetings!

The real spirit of the famous club was seen quickly as the late Mrs T. encouraged the girls to play to their best. Their opposition that day included the Cuala girls. Playing that day for the Dalkey based club was former Dubs player and former Ardstiurthoir Sile Wallace, while guesting for Cuala was another former Dub, Phyllis Breslin! When the two sides played each other, the great comeraderie was rekindled quickly.

In true camogie spirit, Sile Wallace found some silver foil and craftily formed the shape of a cup and presented it to the Naomh Aoife Manager of the day, the famed Mrs T! That story has been told so often at functions as it summed up the spirit of sport, no matter who wins or looses, it is the taking part that counts.

Mrs T may well be gone to the Camogie fields of heaven, but her memory will never die in Dublin Camogie circles. umann Camogaiochta na nGael are in a very fortuitous position to have several exceptionally good, Regional Development Officers throughout the country under the guidance of Camogie Director Mary O'Connor. One of those officers happens to be former Dublin player Eve Talbot who met up recently for a chat.

Eve, who is only 29 years of age, began playing Camogie at the age of seven. She was lucky to be a member of Good Counsel and enjoyed being on winning juvenile teams at U11, U12 and under 16. Her natural talent for the game was quickly seen and by the age of 15 she was playing on the senior Good Counsel side where she is still to this day.

PLAYER OF THE YEAR, 2004

The new millennium was very kind to the Drimnagh based club as they captured their first senior League and championship two years into the new century. The following year, the young player was awarded Club player of the year and she was back at the helm when they recaptured the senior title again in 2004 when she was voted player of the final. Many other honours came her way and it was only natural that sooner rather than later that would wear the Blue and Navy of Ath Cliath.

She was only 16 when she made her senior intercounty debut and she finally got her award when she was on the 2005 All-Ireland winning Dublin team. Over her career she had the added honour of wearing the green and white of Leinster. In 2005 she was chosen at corner forward against Munster. That day she scored 2-4, but alas Leinster lost by one point! Ashbourne honours came her way in 2001 with Waterford IT.

COACHING

While playing Eve always found time for her club and spent many Saturdays and evenings coaching the young players of the future.

After leaving school she chose teaching, - Business and PE. She worked as a Dublin GAA Games Promotion Officer and in 2007 took up her present position of Regional Development Officer for Dublin and Kildare.

"I always had a great love of all sports and when I saw the job vacancy for Regional Development Officer last year, I thought to myself that is me, that is what I always wanted, even though my Mother said to me once that I would not see such a job in Camogie in my lifetime! "Eve has the challenge of promoting Camogie in a rural setting (Kildare) and an urban one (Dublin). Eve is of the opinion that the major challenges confronting the game are:-

"The fact that we are females, women in sport just never get the same recognition as the men folk do, we do not get the same publicity even though we play the same game as the men, getting more males involved will help to bridge the gap and that is happening at present".

The young officer went to further explain the challenges that she faces in Dublin - "Camogie in any city always faces difficult challenges, the young girls generally will have much more other attractions than their counterparts down the country, in Dublin you need to make it as fashionable as possible, providing snassy gear bags, and jerseys is very important, we must appeal to young girls".

Another major challenge for Camogie and probably for a lot of other sports is the changing face of Ireland in relation to the introduction of many non-nationals. This was looked at earlier in the year by Eve when she organised two days in West Dublin, - one in Lucan Sarsfields and the second in St.Brigids, Blanchardstown. Amazingly 25 different nationalities turned up at one while thirty turned up at the second day, with about three hundred children there between both days.

Eve explained, "some non nationals think we are a closed shop when it comes to things like sport in this country, but by holding these events we are showing them what we can offer, we are working on some primary schools and we believe that it is the best way forward. We must learn to open our arms to these young people, after all a lot of them are born here now and already they are being seen in nurseries and academies".

The Drimnagh player, is very clear where she would like to see Camogie in five years time, " while camogie is one of the most popular games for girls in this country, I hope that in five years time it will unequivocally be THE most popular game and that girls walking down a street with a hurl will become a common sight, we will also need to work more closely with the GAA".

One got the impression from this RDO that she had a very definite plan, was very focussed on what direction she was heading towards for the promotion of Camogie. When Eve was playing intercounty she was very enthusiastic, very focussed and yes she has carried this into her job. The development of Camogie in Dublin and Kildare is safe in the hands of the Good Counsel girl who first played her favourite game at age seven.

Clare Reaney Donohue, the Finglas darlin!

(Q) How did you begin playing camogie, who influenced you to play? My brothers and sisters all played in Erins Isle. My mam and dad both had a very keen interest in GAA and encouraged us all the way

(Q) How young were you when you started?

I started playing Camogie when I was 12 although I had to battle with my sisters, Nora and Jude, as they thought I was too skinny and lanky and would never make a camogie player!. It was on my parents insistence that they took me to Erin's Isle.

(Q) How did your career progress?

I began playing with adult camogie team in Erins Isle as there were no uvenile teams at that time in 1974. The season at that stage was September to March. We won the Intermediate League in 1984. We were promoted to senior B that year. In 1991 we won both League & championship but opted to remain at Senior B. We had the same success in 1992. In 1993 we were promoted to Senior A for the first time in Erin's Isles camogie history. Unfortunately things didn't go well that season and we were relegated to Senior B. The following 2 seasons we again did the double and were again promoted to Senior A. We have remained Senior A since then and in 2003 were successful in winning the senior A champion-

(Q) What was your first day with Dublin like?

Honestly?? Can't remember my first day but every day with Dublin was great. I loved the training, the build up to matches. I always felt nervous the night before and the morning of the matches but once the match got started the nerves were forgotten.

(Q) What did playing for Dublin mean to you? Honestly??

It is such an honour to represent your county and any player that achieves this should consider themselves extremely lucky.



(Q) What about the glory and sad days with Dublin?

Our club had a good history of lads selected for Dublin in both hurling and football. Mary Duane and myself were the first to represent our club for Camogie. I felt extremely honoured to have the privilege of playing with Dublin. I played for quite a number of years and enjoyed every one of them. Our only means of transport were bicycles so Mary and myself cycled 3 times a week, to the Phoenix Park, for training in all sorts of conditions but that didn't take away from the enjoyment. I made some great friends from other clubs over these times and still enjoy meeting and having the banter with them. Winning a National League medal, Leinster Championship and making it to Croke Park for an All-Ireland Junior Final were great. Unfortunately, we were beaten by Cork by 2 points. This was definitely one of the sad days. I was gutted.

(Q) Was retiring from intercounty a hard decision?

Don't recall it being such a hard decision. Think the harder decision will be giving up all together. At least after Intercounty I still had the thrill of playing senior club so it wasn't like giving up all together. That will be difficult whenever the time comes, but hopefully not for a while yet. My husband Tommy and my two boys Conor and Michael don't ever want me to retire so I can count on their support!

(Q) Describe what winning a county championship was like

2003 was the best season of all for the Isles. We had been so close for a few years, beaten in semi finals and when eventually we won it was everything I had dreamed it would be. We drew against vincents in a cracker of a game in Naomh Mearnóg and then beat them by 6 points in the replay which was played in Parnell Park. My Niece Valerie captained the team that year. It was magic. Parnell Park erupted. I consider myself extremely lucky to have been part of this great panel. There had been great teams and mentors prior to this who had put a huge amount of work into Erins Isle camogie but unfortunately didn't reap the rewards. For a long time after that win I walked past Donnycarney and relived that moment (actually still do). 2003 completed Erin's Isles championship honours at senior level, our senior hurlers winning in 1983 and our senior footballers winning in 1993

(Q) What are the changes you have seen in camogie?

The standard of camogie is improving all the time so that has to be good. In my earlier camogie days we played a lot more ground hurling and less lifting but I think that has kind of reversed now. I feel there is almost too much lifting and not enough ground hurling now. It's great when you get a game with a good balance of both. The introduction of the 15 a side team and the advantage rule were definitely forward moves. Camogie is receiving much more profile now than ever before. The introduction of All Star awards is another great change. There is fantastic work being done at juvenile level in my own club and indeed all clubs so the future is looking very

(Q) Playing at intermediate level now is it enjoyable for you?



The Rebelettes bounced back from the heartache of failing to secure the three-in-a-row last year to win their 23rd Gala All-Ireland senior title, but a young Galway side didn't make it easy for them.


The 2008 Gala All Ireland Senior
Camogie Championship was one of
the most competitive in years. The
2007 winners, Wexford, were hoping
they could make it two-in-a-row,
Cork had lost three former All Stars
from their starting line up, and
Galway had put in place a new
management team.
So who would President Lin Hernald

So who would President Liz Howard hand the O'Duffy Cup to on September 14th? Cork had suffered the heartache of failing to secure three-in-a-row All-Irelands last year, but showed huge character in bouncing back. In the final, they needed all their resilience to resist a rookie Galway outfit that fought to the bitter end, but both teams can be



proud of having contributed to one of the greatest matches the game has ever seen.

The five-point gap at the final whistle made Cork's victory look comfortable, but in fact it was anything but, as the Galway girls time and again came back at the Rebelettes, who defended magnificently in a stunning final that demonstrated how much the game of camogie has come on in recent times.

Simply the best! Síle Wallace who retired earlier this year....

Sile Wallace has held the top spot of the country's largest female sporting body for 22 years - a tenure surpassed only by GAA head honcho Liam Mulvihill who vacated the Croker hot seat last year. A most diligent worker she was always availble for everyone and each person always got the same attention from the Ardstiurthóir who has just retired leaving Cumann Camógaíochta na nGael in a much more advanced position than it was when she took up the position in 1986.

Sile, was never a person to seek the limelight, being happy to work in the background. "I never had a public profile. It isn't in my nature. I like to work in the background." explains the true Blue "Dalkeyite".

Despite this reticence, Sile can claim a huge part of the credit for the current healthy position of the game which passed its centenary year in 2004

Participation levels have jumped to more than 100,000 since Sile took up the position in January 1986. Sponsorship income has grown substantially, a Strategic Plan is in place, the game is played in some "shape or fashion" in every one of the 32 counties, the Association now has a full-time staff of four officials in Croke Park and a network of Development Officers throughout the country.

During her first year,1986, Sile established exceedingly high standards of development with which she would continue for almost a quarter of a century. Among her many achievements that year, she streamlined and technologically revolutionised office administration, prepared and presented the first Administration and Development Programmes on a nationwide basis, and also held the Association's first Youth Congress. To add to that she initiated Training Programmes for Coaches through N.C.T.C., gained increased funding from the Irish Sports Council, and obtained increased media coverage for the

Promotion of the game itself was to the fore in Sile's undertakings. She steadily increased the number and grades of All-Ireland competitions over the years to cater for the various standards and age-groups. The success of this policy may be seen today



in the level of county and club participation in competition and the emergence of first-time All-Ireland winners. Coiste Londan was re-established during her time in office and its county and club teams have been participating in All-Ireland competition for many years. Sile was delighted to welcome a Europe team to competition, the first Gaelic Games team to participate in All-Ireland competition.

Not until the year 2000, did Sile have a Personal Assistant in the person of Phil Clarke, whom she described as her right-hand woman and lifesaver. During the last five years, Sile's long-term plans culminated in the appointment of a Financial and Sponsorship Manager Sinéad O'Connor, a Director of Camogie Development, Mary O'Connor and Regional Development Co-ordinators, as well as second-level Colleges Development Co-ordinators. She has rejoiced in the accelerated pace of development and in the camaraderie and enthusiasm of her staff.

Sile has also always enjoyed a very happy relationship with the G.A.A. staff in Croke Park, a relationship built on mutual trust and respect, as with the Handball and Ladies Football Associations. She has often spoken of the joy of working for a game she loves in a place she loves.

Her love affair with camogie began in her native Dalkey where she still resides. "My father Gerry Wallace introduced me to the game. Like my grandfather Jem Fox, he was a stilesman in Croke Park. I used to sell programmes outside the grounds. I played there a few times before playing for Dublin as County Finals used to be played in Croke Park in the 1970s and 80s. I won an All-Ireland Junior medal with Dublin in 1971 and captained the team in the senior final in 1976 when Kilkenny beat us by a point." The opposing captain that day was Mary Fennelly who would go on to become Camogie President during Sile's time as Ardstiurthóir

While playing was of utmost importance to this great defender, she found time to coach her club team over the years, and also coached Maynooth Universitey team! A most modest player she not only played for her county but was also chosen on

einster senior teams.

Sile was on three senior DublinAllreland teams who reached Páirc an Thrócaigh, but alas she was not on the vinning side in any of these games. lowever, when the Dubs won their ast senior All-Ireland title back in 984 she was on the back room team. During her playing career she capured two National League titles, capaining the winning side in 1981 when hey beat Cork. During her long and llustrious playing career Sile maniged to keep the twelve times senior All-Ireland medal holder Angela Downey of Kilkenny as well as the zreat Antrim player Mairéad Magill nee Mc Atamney) scoreless on one occassion! Sile may have kept Mairéad scoreless, but Mairéad coluld not prevent the Dalkey lady from taking a point from the half backs! When she nade her senior intercounty debut in 1972 she met with some of the great players that she knows right up to this

CUALA

The Cuala club enjoys a special place in her affections. "I won an Allireland before I won a medal with the plub and that was when we won the Senior B championship in 1985. John Bailey – former Dublin GAA Cathaoir-leach was the coach of the team."

During her playing days with Cuala and prior to that Naomh Mhuire and Dalkey Mitchels, in common with every other club, all games were played in the Phoenix Park. Sile, has always given as much time as possible to her club, but now that she has some extra time she is joining up with the thriving juvenile section, where her vast knowledge and experience will be very welcomed.

"We used to meet up in town or in Dun Laoghaire and get the bus to Islandbridge. Matches started at 11 and continued on the hour every hour until about 4 o'clock in the Summer time. Doirin Golden's (current Dublin senior mentor) father Mick was the groundsman and he hung the nets and lined the pitches. Everyone knew everyone else and we all had our own patch of the field. You could be playing, umpiring, refereeing – anything!"

The club has often been a welcome refuge for Sile during difficult times in the job. "There have been times when things were frustrating and my outlet was to go to the club and go training and hit the sliothar all over the place".

The much heralded integration project between the Camogie and Ladies Football Associations and the GAA seems to have grounded to a halt. Sile remains optimistic. "I believe that under new GAA Director General, Pauric Duffy, that it will gather new momentum. At club level, it's

more or less completely integrated. We need to work more at county board and provincial levels. Sile worked with eight Uachtaráin of Cumann Camógaíochta na nGael as well as eight Uachtaráin of Cumann Lúthchleas Gael. She worked with GAA Ardstiúrthóir Liam Mulvihill since taking up her position and recently worked with Pauric Duffy.

The celebration of the Association's centenary in 2004 brings back great memories. "I was blessed to be part of it. It brought together everyone and it gave the game an injection that was needed at the time."

Sile departs from her position of Ardstiurthóir leaving a legacy to the Association of consolidation, development, growth and expansion. She has led the Association with idealism, vision and courage, and always with an awareness of the challenges to be faced.

Sile leaves the main stage happy in the knowledge that no matter where she goes in the country the welcome mat is always on the doorstep.

"I go with a sad heart but also knowing that the Association is in great hands" There is no doubt whatsoever, but much of the work began by 5fle will continue to bear fruit for years to come.

Cashel councillor at the helm of Tipp camogie

Cashel Town Council member Mickey Browne was elected chairman of Tipperary County Camogie Board at its Convention in The Ragg on Tuesday night. He held off the challenge of out-going vice chairman PJ. O'Rourke (St Cronan's) by 32 votes to 24 (with two spoiled votes) after the man in situ for the past two years Lar O'Brien (Drom-Inch) declined to go forward again for the position. Several delegates paid effusive tributes to Lar for his enthusiasm, his work and his leadership qualities which were so valuable over the past two years.

Martin Griffin from Silvermines is the new vice chairman. He dislodged PJ. O'Rourke by 23 votes to 18, with Joe Cahill (Kilruane) picking up 12 votes and Donal Kelly

Out-going secretary Liza Carroll (St Cronan's) was returned unopposed while Jim Simmons (Thurles) is the new treasurer, following the resignation of the out-going officer Rose Mannion. (See separate report). Rose Mannion was

elected Registrar, defeating the out-going holder Bernie O'Dowd (Thurles). Kieran Slattery (Knockavilla Kickhams) continues as PRO unopposed but the position of assistant PRO remains to be filled at the adjourned Convention on January 13th as both nominces, Mossie Finn (out-going) and Joe Cahill withdrew. Margaret Skehan (Thurles) remains as Munster Council delegate and the Fixtures committee comprises; Mickey Browne (Cashel), Deirdre Keogh

Lonergan (Moyle Rovers). Johnny Kirwan (Moneygall), Sally Duggan (Moycarkey), Patsy Carroll (St Cronan's), Suzanne Kelly (Toomevara), John Harkin (Drom-Inch), Ailish Maher (Burgess), Martin McCullough (Boherlahan), Kieran Slattery (Knockavilla), Niamh Larkin (Shannon Rovers), Joe Cahill (Kilruane) and Clodagh Loughnane

(Thurles).

On the Development Committee are Bernie O'Dowd, John O'Connor (Drom-Inch), Mannion, Donie Shanahan (Toomevara), Lar O'Brien, Margaret Skehan, Martin Fitzpatrick (Thurles), Liza Carroll, Michael Bergin (Moneygall), Kieran Slattery. Martin McCullough, Liam (Shannon Mannion Rovers), Marty Daly (St Cronan's), Martin Browne

The situation as regards the Referees' Committee for which there were six nominees was held over to the adjourned Convention in January after Joe Cahill (Kilruane) declared that this committee hadn't met at all in the past year. Such, he added, was the dissatisfaction in his club with that situation that they had a motion before Convention calling for the committee to be disbanded. It was also decided to leave over the election of the Steering Committee members until then, this committee's brief not being fully understood by some delegates.

Secretary Liza Carroll said that during the year it had been decided to set up a Steering Committee, comprising no more than five people who would be concerned with seeing how

best camogie might be developed at club and county levels.

It was also decided also to defer all Motions until the adjourned Convention.

National Camogie President Liz Howard had a message for Convention, read by PRO Kieran Slattery. In it she conveyed her apologies for her inability to be present and expressed the hope that the best interests of Tipperary camogie was the only priority. It was the duty of all of them at all levels to promote the game and do the best they could in a fair and objective manner.

'It must also be remembered that it is sport and that fun and enjoyment are important if the sport of camogie is to flourish and attract players and potential officers. My thanks to Lar O'Brien who is vacating the chair. He always represented Tipperary and

Lanigan's Ball scenario in Tipp coaching job

A year ago Tony Delancy stepped out ... well, he was narrowly defeated for the position of manager of the Tipp senior camogie team by John McGrath (28 votes to 25). At last week's Convention the Borrisileigh man stepped out and in stepped the Toomevara man once again! A Lanigan's Ball scenario, if you wish, but it didn't turn out quite as simple as that because even though Tony Delaney was the only one left standing when four other nominees withdrew, there was quite a bit of controversy and discussion as to his eligibility to resume the post he held for one season, 2006/07.

The scene appeared to be clear-cut when John Devane (Clonoulty Rossmore), Declan Browne (Moyle Rovers), James McGrath (Toomevara) and the outgoing John McGrath had their names withdrawn. This appeared to leave the way clear for Delaney to re-enter the fold and when it was established that he was interested in taking the position the chairman Mickey Browne asked for formal ratification of his appointment to the post.

Both Bernie O'Dowd (Thurles) and Patsy Carroll

(St Cronan's) maintained county, would it be necesthat according to rule Tony Delaney had to be registered and they continued to hold that line of argument. Joan Hayden (Cashel) said Tony Delaney was registered with Cashel and the chairman said that as everything seemed to be in order Tony Delaney should be appointed.

Patsy Carroll was of the view that everyone seeking positions had to be registered seven days before they were nominated and after Rose Mannion formally proposed that Margaret Skehan (Thurles) said she could not stand over the fact that there was an onus that all players be registered and Convention was now willing to turn a blind eye to the situation is so far as it affected other personnel, like managers.

When it was suggested that the matter be held over the adjourned Convention in January, Lar O'Brien (Drom-Inch) said Tipp would begin their league campaign on March 8th. Not dealing with the matter until mid January would give a manager very little time to make the necessary preparations.

The rule referred strictly to players. She quoted the appropriate rule and having looked at the rule the chairman agreed. Delaney be accepted Although John O'Donnell (Newport) then proposed that Tony Delaney be accepted as manager, seconded by Kieran Slattery (Knockavilla Kickhams), it was eventually decided that the issue be re-visited the adjourned Convention.

New chairman's dilemma

Only minutes into his new role as chairman of Tipperary Camogie Board at last week's Convention, Mickey Browne found himself in something of a dilemma, writes Gerry Slevin. However, he declined to do so and a second vote took place, this one seeing Rose Mannion with 30 votes as against 27 for Bernie O'Dowd.

Treasurer pulls out over 'bullying and intimidation'

Tipperary Camogie Board's long-serving treasurer Rose Mannion declined to allow her name to be placed before the meeting for reelection at last Tuesday night's Convention. asserting that her reason was based on 'the level of bullying and intimidation' she was subjected to for some time.

The Lorrha-based Shannon Rovers club member told stunned delegates that one of many examples was a phone call she received just days before the nomination papers were due to be returned. The caller, a club delegate informed her that should she seek re-election to the position of treasurer then life would be made very difficult for her in 2009. The intimidation would be increased enormously.

"To add insult to injury, the same individual called me two weeks ago to enquire if I had re-considered my position. I don't usually take heed of threats but I don't need bullying and intimidation in my life for a job I have done and continued to do to the best of my ability and voluntarily," the treasurer added.

She said she was out of pocket severely because of camogie but it didn't bother her because she loved it. She failed to understand why some people wanted to have her replaced as treasurer, so badly, as to go to such lengths to carry out such threats.

In thanking all who had befriended her and co-operated with her during her years as county treasurer Rose Mannion she had made some loyal and trusted friends in that time She felt she still had a lot to offer camogie and

for that reason she was willing to leave her name in for the position of Registrar for which she had also been nominated.

The chairman Mickey Browne said it was regrettable that such intimidation had placed the treasurer in a position where she felt compelled to withdraw. It wasn't something that should be part of any organisation, be it the GAA, camogie or anything else.

Bernie O'Dowd said that anyone who threatened a board officer should not be in the Association. There was no place in any organisation for anyone who indulged in such

O'Connor planning the way forward

HE may share her name with a controversial rock idol, but Moycullen native Sinead O'Connor – who recently took over at the helm of the national camogic association – does not intend to tear up any pictures of the pope any time soon.

It's Sunday afternoon and the Ard Stiúrthóir of Cumann Camógaíochta na nGael is back in Galway for a rare weekend break – and some lunch with the folks at the Clayton Hotel. She is smartly dressed, pleasant in manner, and, thankfully, boasts a full head of hair! Indeed, in image and attitude, she is the polar opposite to her rock star namesake.

These, though, are busy times for the affable Galway woman. In October, the Camogie Association took the decision to appoint O'Connor – a young, vibrant, enthusiastic woman – to run its affairs and, hopefully, advance the profile of the sport and organisation right across the sporting and cultural spectrum.

Recognised as a person who had employed a professional approach when taking on the mantle of Finance and Sponsorship Manager five years ago, O'Connor was tipped by many to take over as Ard Stiurthóir from Sile Wallace when the latter retired earlier this year. So just who is this Sinead O'Connor?

A daughter of John and Mary, the Moycullen native has two two sisters, Louise and Mary Michelle. She is a former Toureeny National School and Colaiste lognaid 'Jes' student, who subsequently attended the University of Scranton in Pennsylvania (USA), where she spent four years studying the American equivalent of a B. Comm.

Following her graduation from Scranton, O'Connor returned to Ireland and completed a Masters TALKING SPORT

in UCD before joining PricewaterhouseCoopers (PwC) in Dublin. "I started with them in October, 1999 and I finished up with them in June, 2003. I would have officially qualified in 2002, but I went back to America for six months to San Jose in California," says O'Connor.

It was while she was with PwC in San Jose that she received an email from her family detailing that there was a job advertised that might just interest her. The position was that of Finance and Sponsorship Manager with Cumann Camógaíochta na nGael.

"I did the first round of interviews over there in San Jose. One of the people on the management committee at the time was going to be that side of the world – our current President, Liz Howard – and she did the interview with me. By the time the second round of interviews came round, I was back in Ireland."

In the Autumn of 2003, O'Connor was unveiled as the new Finance and Sponsorship Manager of the Camogie Association, becoming only the second full-time person on the staff of the organisation. "I suppose, when I joined, all the association's plans were focusing ahead on Centenary Year. That was being launched in November '03, so I had very little time to get my head down, learn the ropes and find out how things worked. It was straight into it.

"The role also grew a little bit and changed a little bit because certain other things had to be done first. For instance, you can't attract sponsorship without increasing the profile. So I had a very wide brief, which was great, because I got a whole lot of experience in different areas. I suppose, a certain amount of management came into it as well as we were heading into our Centenary Year. We had some huge events planned."

Indeed, over the ensuing year and a half, O'Connor was to the fore in the scheduling of an extensive calendar of events. "It was important that everything was done right," she continues.

"Thankfully, there was a great reaction to everything we did and it was a credit to the management committee that put that whole calendar of events together. Our own Olivia Forde was actually on that committee. They did a huge amount of work. It really gave the association a reason to reenergise itself on numerous levels. A lot of the clubs also did great work in celebrating the milestone."

In addition to the annual events such as Congress, Cumann Camógaíochta na Gael also held a Centenary Banquet at the CityWest Hotel – attended by over one thousand people – and hosted its first international camogie tournament, with the final played before the International Rules series at Croke Park.

"Every month, we launched something different, from centenary stamps to starting up the first ever women's shinty competition (with Scotland). We received huge

"I suppose, when I joined, all the ssociation's plans were focusing head on Centenary Year. That as being launched in November events as well." support financially from the GAA that year while we also secured sponsorship for some of the other events as well.

"Really, I didn't have much experience in that area, so I was learning my way. That said, I got a great deal of support from people I had learned from, such as the management committee, then President Miriam O'Callaghan and our current President Liz Howard, who was heavily involved in running a lot of those events."

For her part, O'Connor imbued the Association with a professional attitude and an abundance of enthusiasm, which was vital in overseeing their Strategic Plan. "That helped to change things around. It put us on the right footing and helped us to improve our

structures. That is something we refer back to the whole time," says the Galway woman, who, despite her busy schedule, continues to play her chosen sport with Portobello in Dublin. One suspects, there are not too many Director Generals in other organisations who continue to suit up.

No doubt, O'Connor has already left an indelible mark on the Association, underlined by her appointment as Ard Stiúrthóir following the retirement of Sile Wallace in October. Today, she works alongside nine other full-time camogie officers, catering for about 540 clubs and approximately 100,000 members nationwide. A daunting task,

"Every now and again, you do say 'Oh my God!' I have been there, though, five years and I have learned a lot. There is still an awful lot I don't know. For instance, I am a disaster on the rules!" she laughs.

"I suppose, people often look at the sport and say you do not get that many supporters, but if you look at our biggest day, All-Ireland final day, the attendance we get at that is double what you would get in the UK on Women's FA Cup final day. The only thing that might exceed us is the Women's World Cup. So when you put it into context, the attendance we get on All-Ireland final day is unprecedented in terms of women's sport.

"At the moment we are trying to draw up the next instalment of our Strategic Plan and we are also doing a review of the Association with a guy called Morgan Buckley, who is with Atlantic Sports Management. He is working with a lot of other sports as well.

"So he is looking at our structures and what we need to do to be more professional and businesslike. It has become a business, although it is still sport. So in terms of how you run your association, it has to be professional. People expect that – at every level. If you want to be successful, then that is what you have to do."

Of course, there are many challenges facing O'Connor in the months and years to come. While issues such as securing greater TV coverage to further promote the sport are on the agenda, it is the primary objective of increasing numbers playing the game which O'Connor hopes to dedicate herself to.

She adds: "Overall, I think the one thing that has to drive our Association forward is participation figures. Our aim is to give every girl the opportunity to play camogie and then put in the structures that will allow them to continue playing.

"Worldwide, statistics show that girls usually stop playing sports

around the age of 13. I think if you can continue to make sport attractive to those, the benefits of it will be that they will keep playing. That is very, very important – to make camogic available to girls, not only in the traditional areas, but right across the country. That is vital.

"We have already identified that once girls go into secondary schools, the opportunities are not always there for them. That is why we appointed Jennifer Steede (Sylane) to encourage girls who may not have played in a while to have a go at it again and, hopefully, when they do they will then return to their clubs."

All in all, new Ard Stiurthoir O'Connor would seem to be well on top of things. The pope can rest easy.

O'Donovan Rossa became the first Ulster outfit to capture the Bill Carroll trophy in the 44-year history of the competition as they recorded a 2-15 to 1-12 victory against Tipperary and Munster champions Drom & Inch.

A huge crowd witnessed a splendid game played on a fine pitch at Donaghmore, Asbourne and Adams was the undoubted star turn as two first half goals helped to establish a 2-7 to 0-8 interval lead for O'Donovan Rossa.

Adams collected Antrim's very first camogie Allstar award eight days before this historic club final and she found the net twice in the final ten minutes of the first half to set 2006 runners-up O'Donovan Rossa on their way to a famous win.

With 20 minutes on the watch, Adams collected a fine ball from Seanin Daykin to open up a 1-4 to 0-4 advantage and after Joanne Ryan responded with a point for Drom & Inch, Adams struck a second goal in the 25th minute.

recipients. This is the fourth year of the scheme.


The bursaries, which are supported by the Irish Sports Council, are given to those who have helped the development of Camogie within their own clubs, counties and colleges.



Hungry for success

2008 was predicted to be a tough year for Cork. The successful 3 year backroom team of John Cronin, Fiona O'Driscoll and Lillian Zinkant decided to call it a day after apturing two All Ireland titles. The only nominee for a selector position at convention in December '07 was Bishopstown's Pat Murray. He went through unopposed.

Muskerry secured a position based on their county final triumph and in January Con Malone was confirmed as the Muskerry representative.

Cork was still without a Manager, coach or third selector. In stepped former Cork and Glen Rovers star Denise Cronin as the third selector and she set about securing the services of Jim McCarthy from Glen Rovers to coach the side.

A few weeks into the season Denise Cronin was elected Manger of the side. Apart from the managerial change many of the players had decided to travel or pursue other interests. Jennifer O'Leary, Cork's quality and most consistent forward over the past number of years departed for Australia in June and Anna Geary headed to Luxembourg to continue her studies. Rena Buckley missed part of the season as she too travelled abroad.

Had Cork not captured the O'Duffy cup last September many would have felt that it was a bridge too far. But when a Cork side's backs are to the wall, they will always come back fighting.

A disappointing league campaign, which the mentors used to blood new players, saw Cork open their championship with an away game to Dublin on June 1st. The scene was set for a great days hurling. The sun bore down creating a blistering heat; the pitch was wide and open.

The game didn't disappoint and while Cork may have pulled away from Dublin in the second half, this was a highly entertaining All Ireland championship first round clash in the Naomh Mearnog GAA Grounds in Portmarnock. It was the rebet's second half performance which stole the show. Six points, each more magical than the last, saw Cork take an eight point lead midway through and Dublin had no answer. Three weeks later Cork travelled to the defending champion's back yard and had a surprisingly facile victory over an out of sorts Wexford. The game was over as a contest four minutes into the second half once Sile Burns slammed a text book

style shot into the far corner of the net to land Cork their third goal and put the rebels 3-2 to 0-3 in front. . Cork harried and hassled and frustrated the All Ireland champions whenever in possession and the psychological effect the victory held for Cork was immeasurable.

A hard fought battle but in the finish the right result as Cork recorded their third victory in a row against Tipperary in Ballincollig on July 6th.

Cork's unbeaten run was brought to an end in Pairc Uí Rinn a week later as they lost out to a determined Galway side in round four.

Cork failed to ignite or find the form that had seen them secure victories over Dublin, Wexford and Tipperary. Galway had their homework done and they closed Cork down at every opportunity, they hunted in packs and never allowed Cork get to grips with a game that never really got off the ground.

A comprehensive victory over neighbours Limerick as Cork played their third championship game in a fortnight ensured the rebels dusted themselves down and were on track again. The manner in which Cork disposed of Kilkenny in their final group game was astounding. It was expected that Kilkenny, the National League champions, would really put in up to Cork but the rebels were rampant.

Despite the winning margin; 5-11 to 0-7, it was a one minute spell in the first half which effectively decided this game. Two goals from Sheila Burns and Breige Corkery within sixty seconds sealed Kilkenny's fate and while forty minutes remained it was obvious that the points were going Leeside. Cork advanced to the All Ireland semi-final where they anxiously awaited the draw. Pitched against arch rivals Tipperary, Cork approached the game with caution. Playing Tipperary for the second time in six weeks Cork emerged with a 13 point victory.

A first half which Cork would rather forget saw them enter the dressing room at half time trailing by two points; 0-7 to 0-5. But a powerful second half saw them turn the tide. Cork's winning margin didn't reflect Tipperary's contribution and while Cork had areas to address they were through to the All Ireland decider against Galway after what was a composed and deserved victory.

Cork headed to Croke Park for the sixth September in a row.

Their opponents Galway brought a new excitement to the big day as the westerners reached their first final in 11 years. Much was expected of Galway but one did wonder in advance if their inexperience would catch them on the day and if they could hold the intensity they would undoubtedly have to play with for the entire hour.

After a shaky start a spirited team performance saw Cork take the lead after seventeen minutes and hold it until the final whistle.

Galway strove to get a good start on the renowned slow starting Cork side.

They succeeded! Three frees and a '45 were on the board before Cork had even mustered an attack. But despite Galway's possession they weren't scoring and Cork were slowly beginning to settle. Elaine O'Riordan flicked to the running Sile Burns who struck beautifully to the bottom right hand corner. It was followed with a lethal, powerful strike from Burns as once again she spotted half a chance and struck home.

One sensed that it was going to be Cork's day. They led 2-3 to 0-5 after playing second fiddle for most of the opening half.

It was never going to be Galway's day once Burns had hit the mark. They relied too much on Jessica Gill who on the day scored impressively from placed balls but whose contribution in general play was snuffed out by a hard working Cork defence.

It was down to Cork's grit and hunger that the stats read as they did. It was a big year for Cork Camogie.

When once considers the topsy turvy start they had to 2008 all involved deserve to take a bow. □



Plenty of silverware at underage level for Cork but disappointingly no All-Ireland titles as both the minor and U16 sides lost out to Kilkenny in both finals. The season got off to the best possible start with the U16 A and B teams making it a provincial double by taking the Munster titles.

The A team defeated holders Clare in a game where Cork controlled matters from the start as Clare found the going tough. Cork led 1-4 to no score at the interval and turning to play against the strong wind in the second half it was going to be tough. Katriona Mackey pointed a Cork free but Clare were on the score board, as Lorraine Woods finished to the net inside five minutes of the restart. Just four points separated the sides as Clare threw every thing at the Cork defence, Katriona Mackey pointing two frees and with six minutes remaining Katie Buckley grabbed a Cork goal to finally kill the Clare challenge and give Cork the title at the hands of the defending champions on a 2- 7 to 1-1 score line.

The U16 B team set the foundations when they achieved the first leg of the provincial under 16 double giving a tremendous second half display to deny Waterford. In a close opening half Cork led. Celia O'Driscoll stretched the lead with a goal and they held the advantage to the break.

Aine O'Donovan and Kate Harrington and Sinead Gallen had Cork goals as Waterford battled hard but had no answer to the pace and determined of the Cork side. As Cork are an A graded county they were not eligible to contest the B All-Ireland series. What a pity given the commitment and performance from a superb B side. Cork impressed in their path to the All-Ireland final notching up an impressive 16-77 while conceding just 7-22. From the start of the year they were focused as they progressed undefeated in the All-Ireland open draw series and they turned in an impressive semi-final display defeating Dublin.

Final day was an absolute disaster for Cork as Kilkenny created history completing four in a row of U16 All- Ireland camogie titles. Cork's decision to employ an extra player in defence for 52 minutes of the game was one of the major factors in a final, where aided by the stiff wind. Cork led by two points at the interval and inside 55 seconds of the second half they grabbed a goal. However like true champions Kilkenny responded as they proceeded to hold Cork to just one score for the entire second half.

So disappointment once again for an U16 squad that promised so much as the season unfolded, lets hope that with the wonderful array of talent in the county it will not be long before the title is back in Cork.

The minors got off on the wrong foot as they failed by five points to a determined Clare side that took both the Munster minor title and the two points on offer in a game which doubled as the opening round of the All-Ireland championship round robin series.

From the throw in the Davy Fitzgerald coached Clare side were up for the challenge and Cork forced to play for three quarters of the game with fourteen players after the dismissal of a defender never got going.

The game was to shape the year as Cork losing two valuable points in the round robin series of championship games ended up in second place in the group thus drawing champions Kilkenny as their semi-final opponents. On a horrific day weather wise, Cork and Kilkenny battled it out in monsoon like conditions at the Gaelic Grounds Limerick for a place in the All-Ireland final

In the finish the holders chasing three in row shaded it, but they had to rely on the width of the upright and crossbar which Cork struck twice in the dying seconds to help them deny Cork in rip roaring contest that had everything. Two committed teams gave it their all as conditions were hard on both sides with torrential rain making the surface slippery and the ball hard to control in a contest where neither side

Time after time Cork pegged Kilkenny back as they forged ahead and continuing to throw everything at the Cats, Cork had narrowed the gap to four points but with three minutes remaining Kilkenny looked safe as they led by five. Cork refused to die and when Julia White outpace her marker and fired to the net, they were back in the game.

Niamh Dilworth fired over a point and the game was down to the wire with a minute of normal time remaining. Michelle Quilty pointed a free and from the puck-out Marie Dargan won possession, her harmless long range shot looked to be heading wide but somehow it sneaked between the Cork keeper and the upright and ended up in the net

Disaster for Cork but refusing to let the heads drop they were back with Catriona Collins grabbing a goal two minutes into injury time. Cork piled on the pressure and came agonisingly close as twice the Kilkenny defence stood firm to clear to

Having come so close it was devastating for a Cork side that, as the year progressed, improved with every game, with many of the sides already lining out at intermediate and senior evel with the count and gaining valuable experience that illusive first minor title should not be to far away



A fairytale year

This year saw new County Senior Camogie Champions crowned in Cork. It was a fairytale year for Douglas who in their first year in senior ranks took the coveted Punch cup against all the odds.

2008 will be viewed as a poor year by some clubs and significant progress by others. Impkilly took on Carbery in the Preliminary divisional round on June 15th and had a facile victory of 5-10 to 2-6. With no second chance for provisional sides Carbery exited on day one of the new season.

Just two weeks later the East Cork divisional side were themselves on the receiving end of a comprehensive defeat, inflicted by 2007 County champions Muskerry, Early indications showed that Muskerry would be serious title contenders again.

Seandun lost out to Carrigdhoun 2-4 to 1-13 leaving just Muskerry and Carrig the last two divisional sides standing.

Carrig almost caught the champions when they met in July but experience won out. It was a stiff test for Muskerry in the Evening Echo senior championship but they weathered the storm, 3-9 to 3-7, and booked their place in round two where they were lined up to meet Barryroe.

Courcey Rovers were the first club side to suffer defeat when they just didn't show up at all the day they played Milford. They walked off the pitch dejected after a 3-25 to 1-8 defeat. With the back door system available to them, Courcey's were a different side when they faced Ballygarvan six weeks later. The most bruising and talked about game throughout the championship season was the round 1 clash of St. Finbarrs and Ballygarvan. A closely fought encounter saw the Barrs emerge victorious 0-14 to 0-11. Douglas recorded their first impressive scoring tally of the championship defeating Aghabullogue 1-17 to 1-4. Inniscarra accounted for Barryroe while a last minute Deirdre Twomey goal, a trademark of Catherines during the championship, saw them produce one of the surprises of the season in defeating Cloughduy.

All winners of round 1 went straight into the quarter final while the losers moved on to round 2 where they were matched against each other and the remaining divisional sides.

Cloughduv made amends and had a good victory over Aghabullogue. Muskerry continued their unbeaten run,

destroying Barryroe 5-16 to 1-2 and Ballygarvan won out by 6 points against a much improved Courcey Rovers side.

The guarter finals and things were hotting up!

An excellent game between St. Catherines and Douglas surprisingly served up the only draw of the championship; a last minute Jill Hurley goal giving them another bite of the cherry. The game will go down as one of the season's best. Unfortunately for Catherines there was nothing they could do to stem the onslaught inflicted by Douglas in the replay. It was a perfect performance from the senior debutants and it will be marked as the day followers realised that the championship had a serious team on board.

1-10 from Sile Burns saw off Milford's challenge for another year as Muskerry marched on. Cloughduv exited at the hands of St. Finbarrs and Ballygarvan set up a semi-final repeat showdown with the Barrs when they accounted for

Despite being underdogs Ballygarvan raced out of the traps and gave it their all in a bid to reach their first final but a plethora of goals by Orla O'Sullivan, Vivienne Harris and Gemma O'Connor couldn't be matched and the Barrs



deservedly marched on to their third final in three years.

They awaited the outcome of Muskerry and Douglas. Could the new kids on the block really defeat the all conquering champions? This they did in emphatic style and at the time it was the South side clubs greatest hour to date. But their greatest was yet to come.

On Friday 10th October in floodlit Pairc Uí Rinn, Douglas made history. They became champions for the first time in the club's history and they claimed their title in style. They produced a superb team performance. It was heartbreak for the second year in the row for the gallant St. Finbarr's side and they can hold their heads high for contributing to a marvellous final where the crowd were treated to 6 goals and 22 points in heavy wind and rain.

The opening half was played at a great pace. By the fifteenth minute Douglas had raced into a 1-4 to 0-1 lead and were controlling the game. Vivienne Harris moved out and played extremely deep in an effort to get a supply in. Her excellent low ball found Orla O'Sullivan who clinically finished to the far corner of the net to narrow the gap to three points. Katrina Mackey was causing havor. Aileen O'Donovan, Julia White and Mackey picked off further points. St. Finbarrs found themselves five points behind at the break, 1-7 to 1-2 and with it all to do.

The second half was as good a scoring contest as you'll see; four goals and thirteen points in 34 minutes play. Douglas moved up a gear and led 2-9 to 1-3. Orla O'Sullivan jumped high to catch a dropping ball and spun around to hit a rocket to the net. It was down to six points. The Barrs hit a purple patch and hit 1-2 inside three minutes, Orla O'Sullivan getting her hat trick of spell binding goals. The gap was down to three points. The Barrs sensed a comeback. They pushed, Douglas pushed back.

The next score was going to be crucial in determining the outcome. Julia White hit the steadying point with eight minutes remaining and thereafter there was only one team in it. Katrina Mackey, who was a colossus throughout, came into her own and hit 1-4. The game was over. The large vocal Douglas support went wild.

It was an incredible year for Douglas as they added their name to the long list of clubs with the title 'Cork Count Senior Camogie Champions' to their credit.

amogie has been played in Toomevara since the 'Thirties. The early founding members were Rev. Frs. Guning, Molly Hehir and Minogue, Peg Young and Maureen Flanagan. The club had four members of the Tipperary team for the 1932 Tailteann Games-M. Minogue, captain, P. Young, M. Flanagan and E. Minogue.

Participation in all age groups continues to grow and the club's commitment in catering for these players continues to adapt to the growing demand.

The parish of Toomevara has four vibrant schools, Ballinree, Kilkeary Gurtagarry, Toomevara. The club has an excellent working relationship with each of the schools.





Senior

CORK started 2008 as outsiders to lift the O'Duffy cup, hardly surprising given the shock defeat a the hands of Wexford in 2007 — but the tag suited fine and it was Cork who were crowned All-Ireland senior champions on the second Sunday in September.

The victory was testament to the hard work put in by the players and management.

At the start of the season a new management team was put in place—former All-Ireland winning captain Denise Cronin was joined on the selection committee by Con Malone representing county champions Muskerry, and Pat Murray from Bishopstown. Jim McCarthy came on board as trainer and the scene was set for the season ahead.

The back-room team worked hard and introduced new players to their panel and the team responded and produced some wonderful performances to win the Munster and All-Ireland titles.

Playing Dublin, Wexford, Tipperary, Galway, Limerick to reach the qualifying stages, they defeated Kilkenny and Tipperary to reach the Gala All-Ireland senior final against Galway.

The final was an exciting and skilful game and with play swinging from end-to-end, Cork had to call on all their experience before capturing the title 2-10 to 1-8. On the day, Cork had many heroes. Rachel Moloney continued to make life difficult for defenders, as did Sile Burns, who grabbed two vital goals.

Breige Corkery was superb, covering every inch of grass on Croke Park, while Cathriona Foley played a captain's role in the heart of the Cork defence.

On a horrific day, Cork and Kilkenny battled it out in monsoon-like conditions at the Gaelic Grounds.



A bridge too far

Not to be outdone by their hurling counterparts, Sixmilebridge's underage camogie sides dominated the domestic scene, securing A titles at Under 11 ground camogie, Under 14 Féile, Under 16 and Under 18. They weren't the only club to make positive strides this year though as Orla Considine reveals.

WHILE the re-emergence of the underage club in Sixmilebridge with a cabinet full of trophies was the hallmark of '08, there was a more rounded appearance to the underage role of honour in the club competitions this year. Sixmilebridge are definitely still a force to be reckoned with as they were part of every underage final this year but they didn't have things all their own way in each of these finals. This has been a healthy sign for camogie this year and will encourage many more to strive for that ultimate goal of success.

On a fine evening in Tulla with the cup and shield played as a double header, St. Joseph's upset the odds with a merited win over Sixmilebridge for their first ever U12A title. This is a huge incentive to the Parish club to continue with the work that has gone in over the past number of years. With further developments like this, it is hoped that they will maintain that progress.



Kilmaley's year of success

Kilmaley were unquestionably the team of 2008, capturing a historic domestic double, along with Munster Junior honours and subsequently reaching the All-Ireland final. Orla Considine reflects on a remarkable year for the club as well as the achievements of others at adult level in the county.

IN SUCH a successful year for the county team, competition was strong within the clubs to try and follow suit and gain similar glory for their club and parish.

The senior championship was again fiercely competitive, although it did have it's downside in that Clarecastle - as newly promoted Intermediate champions - were unable to field in the competition and withdrew. Wolfe Tones had their first win in a few years and Clooney are getting more and more competitive and survived the second year at the senior grade which can sometimes be a bogey year. Indeed they were unlucky in the final group game not to defeat Kilmaley.

Kilmaley though were the buzzword for success by the end of the season. They fought hard in their last group game and that fighting spirit was called on many times during the year. They produced it again in the County Final - which they won for the first time in their history, also in the Munster Final and were just unlucky in the All-Ireland final. Not bad for a team that had never won the county title to be crowned double champions in '08. They have a balanced squad and dedicated players and mentors and when they returned from intercounty club fare, settled down to U18 club competition and then won the Senior League to really cap off their season and ensure a truly festive holiday for all involved in Kilmaley.

The Intermediate competition took on a new structure for '08. The league was dispensed with and all teams played each other on a league basis

for the Championship. The top four teams from this emerged and entered the championship semi-finals, while the next four were in the shield semifinals. The competition was not without its teething problems but the general consensus from the clubs is that it was the best Intermediate championship for a number of years.

The final stages were very competitive and it also helped in nurturing team spirit in these clubs that had been absent when clubs were eliminated after one game in recent years.

Bodyke and Corofin contested the championship final with Bodyke winning out and regaining senior status for '09, with the finalists accounting for Kilkishen and Truagh respectively in the semi-finals.

St. Joseph's won the Shield over Ogonnelloe after Whitegate had been defeated at the semi-final stage. Tulla and Killanena were the other teams to compete at this level and all agreed that it was worthwhile championship. This structure is to reach the end of its trial period after

the '09 season closes and will be reviewed then.

Scariff were the all-round package in the Junior grading. They won both league and championship hon-ours and did so with a very dedicated bunch of players who will now be advancing into the Intermediate ranks and with the full league format still in place, this should help the junior champions to develop into the grade.

Truagh were disappointed to have lost out at the semi-final stage in the Intermediate Championship this year but the side had much to celebrate this year as they blossomed under the new system and also used the North Munster League to full advantage in the period where games were absent within the county. They eventually won this out and were delighted with their achievement.

While there were some grievances over the length of the playing season this year, there was much to celebrate and with the emergence of new champions in the adult groups, it should provide some added incentive for all clubs in '09.

Camogie convention

Player transfers pose problems

Agreeing with the sentiments of the motion but endeavouring to put it into practice was a problem for camogie Board chairman Mickey Browne at last week's adjourned Convention when it came to dealing with something of a hot potato that emerged in a view expressed by the St Cronan's club (Roscrea).

St Cronan's asked that a byelaw be introduced which would see to it that 'where a club exists that no player be given a transfer unless they change address out of the area'.

The chairman said it was very difficult nowadays to know where some people were living and while the motion might be okay on paper putting it into practice was another matter.

Patsy Carroll (St Cronan's) said the motion did not refer to people already with clubs. The motion did not ask that they be moved from those clubs. However a player attached to a club should have to stay with that club unless she took up a different address. It was realised that there were areas out there with no clubs and that meant that girls in those areas could play with the club nearest to

Joe Cahill, Kilruane, supporting the motion said that where he came from was close enough to the Offaly border. Camogie was starting to make waves and they had already moved into certain areas of Tipperary where girls would have gone to schools covered by Roscrea or Borrisokane. They were now being forced to decide whether they wanted to play with clubs in Offaly or Tipperary. Offaly, he maintained, would be the beneficiary if something

wasn't done about it.

The chairman said that what was now being referred to was related to county boundaries. But there were also problems within the county itself and he cited parishes such as Boherlahan, Clonoulty, Knockavilla all around Cashel and going to Cashel schools. It was understandable that a girl would like to play for a club

where her cousin or some other relative or friend was playing.

Jean Hayden, Cashel said that from the sentiments of the debate so far it was obvious that what was involved was more than an internal matter but was something to be decided by a higher authority. Also, she believed that when a motion was worded incorrectly, as this one was, it should be ruled out of order.

Patsy Carroll said she had been training young players for the past thirty years and she saw a definite need for this motion to be passed.

"I'm not letting this go, Mr Chairman. Your friend is your pocket at the end of the day. It's alright to say they want to play with their friends, but you don't have a friend if you have nothing in your pocket. It's as simple as that. Put it to the floor, Mr Chairman and see how it goes," she added.

Following further discussion in which parish rule, inter-county and inter-provincial transfer issues were raised the chairman asked delegates to give the matter very serious consideration in casting their vote. As he saw it the matter had very serious implications for all clubs into the future.

The motion was put to the meeting and lost heavily on a show of hands.

Camogie Chairman's plea for end to bullying

An impassioned plea by Camogie Board chairman Mickey Browne for "whoever is doing the bullying or is being bullied, (to) please, for God's sake get it out of the way" was made at last Tuesday night's adjourned Convention.

At the Convention proper in December the then treasurer Rose Mannion informed delegates of telephone calls she had received threatening her, should she seek to retain her position on the Board. She referred to the bullying and intimidation she had to endure as being too much to take and so she withdrew her name for re-election to the

Prior to the commencement of last week's agenda a delegate read out a prepared statement in which he said he wanted to refer to rumours circulated regarding his alleged involvement in the bullying and intimidation of Rose Mannion. He said he totally rejected this allegation

and that he found it very hurtful that his name had been connected with this issue. He was prepared to go to any lengths to clear his good name. He said he wanted the matter looked into and his good name cleared.

The chairman said unfortunately the headlines that appeared on one local newspaper following Convention were not good for camogie.

"If there is anybody out there who is being bullied the only way of sorting it out is to make a report to the County Secretary or myself. The rumours going around the county at present are not good for camogie," he said. adding that he was taking that delegate's statement at face

The chairman said there were two officers from Munster Council present at the meeting and if delegates preferred, they could go to them so that this matter could get sorted once and for all.

"I have no doubt the Nenagh Guardian didn't report as it did in order to

damage camogie. The relationship between Gerry Slevin, the Nenagh Guardian and camogie over the years has been excellent. So, whoever is doing the bullying or is being bullied, please, for God's sake, get it out of the way," he concluded.

Earlier the chairman had referred to media reports following the December Convention and since in which it was stated that Munster Council or Croke Park should be invited in to look into the affairs of the Tipperary County Board. He said he had tried, as had other officers to find out what the problem was but no one seemed to be getting anywhere. Therefore, he was asking any delegates who might have any input to make for the betterment of Tipperary camogie to do so to the Munster Council officials (Eamonn Browne and Marion Graham) after the meeting. They were present at the meeting, he added, solely in a watching brief

Clubs' motions reduced to recommendation status

A large number of motions submitted by eleven clubs could not be entertained at week's adjourned Camogie Convention because the chairman Mickey Browne ruled that in the absence of the appropriate bye laws being quoted. they would have no authority. Therefore, with the agreement of the proposing clubs the motions were reduced to the status of recommenda-

The chairman said he could see much sense in many of the motions but in the absence of relevant bye laws being quoted his hands were tied in the matter and the best he could do was to suggest that they be accepted as recommendations only.

The only motion in which the relevant bye law was quoted came from St Cronan's (Roscrea) and it sought - successfully - that Bye Law 60 on transfers be changed to, from March 1st to February 1st to facilitate grading.

When a delegate maintained that clubs didn't know what the bye laws were, Board secretary Liza Carroll said that when she was elected to that position in 2007

copies of the bye laws were sent out to all club secre-

One of the motions submitted, from Kilruane sought the introduction of a senior B competition for all clubs that failed to make it to the county semi finals and this competition to include intermediate teams. Holycross had a somewhat similar motion but intermediate clubs were not listed in their wording. Siobhan Ryan, Holycross felt that in this competition teams that had conceded walkovers in the championship should not be allowed

The secretary said this was something that seemed to come up every year and it had been tried before. In fact there was a trophy there for a B competition and the staging of such a competition had been discussed at the November meeting.

Another Kilruane motion called for the Referees Committee to be disbanded and when asked why, Joe Cahill said this committee met once in 2007 and didn't meet at all last year. "What's the point in having such a committee if the members don't meet?" he asked.

The chairman said that this seemed to be sufficient grounds for disbanding the committee, although there was a bye law there stating such a committee should be in existence. He warned delegates that there would be problems getting referees to act.

Toomevara sought that the executive committee comprise the Board officers and five delegates to be elected at the adjourned Convention for this year only and at Convention proper in future. Also that clubs be allowed no more than one member on the executive committee. The chairman said the executive at it stood comprised only the chairman, vice chairman and secretary and that to him was ridiculous. He failed to see how an executive committee could be in being without the treasurer being a member and he would like to see a proper executive constituted. At the same time, no bye law was quoted and, with Toomevara's permission, all that could be done in the circumstances was, again, to accept it as a recommenda-

Toomevara said that was acceptable. She said that submitting the motion came about following a Board meeting during the year when discussion on the

venue for Congress (in Tipperary next March) took up almost two hours of debate to reach a decision. This was something that could have been decided by an executive committee, its finding brought back to the Board for ratification. She

said there were several other matters too that an executive could meet on and discuss without taking up the time of Board meetings.

AFTER the heartbreak of the last minute All-Ireland Junior final defeat to Derry in 2007, it took a major strength of character for Clare to bounce back last year but the rewards for years of hard work were finally reaped in 2008. An unbeaten season that included a National League Division 2 title and the coveted New Ireland trophy followed, with goal-keeper Denise Lynch a key factor in that success. Part of a stubborn defensive unit that conceded only

an average of 0-10 per game in the Junior championship, the Kilmaley player only shipped three goals in those six games and considering that in three of those victories, the Banner only clinched defeat by a goal or less, that security from their last line was crucial to their unprecedented year.

Add in Lynch's personal accomplishment of a third successive Clare Puc Fada title while also coming second in Munster and it has been an thoroughly eventful yet extremely beneficial year for the Kilmaley player.

Well worthy of personal acknowledgement with the Camogie Player of the Year award.





LAST WEEK this column looked at inter-varsity aspect of one of the GAA's other sports, handball.

What we found was a band of enthusiasts who are working away at developing their club, UCC, their game and having great craic while they are at it.

Perhaps it's the aura of their college days but they didn't seem to mind the fact that they are, to a large extent, the forgotten children of the GAA.

This week we look at the Universities Camogie Championship, one of the longest running events in the university sporting calendar.

The championship is known as the Ashbourne Cup. The UCC Camogie Club are hosting this year's event which will take place at the Mardyke, the UCC Farm and Páirc Uí Rinn next Saturday and Sunday.

The semi-finals will take place at the Mardyke on Saturday afternoon. UCC will play Waterford Institute of Technology at 1.30pm and current holders University College Dublin will play Cork Institute of Technology in the same venue at 3.15pm.

Two miles further west, at the UCC Farm. the semi-finals of the Ashbourne Shield, a competition for the colleges defeated in the quarter-finals of the Cup proper will be played between NUI Galway and Garda College at 1.30pm with University Jordanstown and University of Limerick finishing off the days activities at 3.15pm. The finals are on Sunday. The Shield final will be in the Farm at 1.15pm and the main event is in Páirc Ui Rinn at 3.30pm.

If handball, is a forgotten child of the GAA, than camogie often plays the role of the forgotten cousin. True, things have improved in the quarter century since the GAA celebrated its centenary; the All-Ireland senior final is covered live on TV; the county championships are well covered - here in Cork at any rate - but camogie coverage is still sporadic.

It is hard to lay the blame at any one door for this. There is no doubt that some of the fault lies within the Camogie Association for not pushing their sport in to the limelight. Most sports associations in Ireland however, suffer in the same way, because the sports media has a very few female personnel and it tends to be hogged by the money spinning 'men's' games.

Ladies basketball, ladies golf and ladies athletics are examples of other codes that suffer the same malaise; they get trampled in the rush to see the big boys play.

There are notable exceptions of course, such as Sonia O'Sullivan in athletics and, more recently Katie Taylor in boxing, but their feats are often greeted by the comment 'Isn't she a tough nut', rather than genuine admiration and awe for whatever achievement has been accomplished.

It is the same in world of print and film. There have been countless books published on the history of hurling and football. RTE, our national broadcasters, has thousand of files, films and documentaries on the deeds of the great hurlers and footballers, but the amount of material available on camogie would hardly fill a shelf of a local library.

Even the World Wide Web, the modern source of all knowledge, contains very little on the history and origins of camogie.

If it wasn't for www.camogie.ie and the efforts of the PROs that work on club websites. it would be difficult to find any information beyond the very basic facts of the game.

Mary Moran, a former chairwoman of the Cork County Camogie Board has written the only comprehensive history on the theme of

The game of camogie was founded in 1904. It was born out work out of the Gaelic they were allowed swim and 1928 before they League. At that time the Gaelic League, which was founded by Dr Douglas Hyde to promote the Irish language and all thing cultural, was thriving.

The Keating Branch of the League was the leading branch in Dublin. They included hurling and football in their programme of activities.

The female members, who were probably influenced by the cause of suffrage and the rights of women to vote (which was not granted until 1918) were frustrated by this; they wanted to play sport too. In response to their demands the branch committee agreed to draw up the rules of a new game for women which would be based on hurling.

The first camogie team wills made up of members of Keating branch of the Gaelic League. A second team, Cuchullain's was founded shortly after that, and the first official game was played in Navan in 1904.

This was a giant step forward for women in

Olympics, women were only allowed play tennis and golf at that time. It was 1912 before were allowed run on the track.

The story was much the same in education. In 1892 there were eight female students at UCC and it was 1904 before Trinity College finally opened its doors to women.

By 1914 however, there was a sufficient number of female students in UCD to form a camogie club.

Agnes O'Farrelly presided at the first meeting of the new club and she remained president until 1951. She was responsible for influencing Edwin Gibson, Lord Ashbourne, to present a cup bearing his name for colleges' camogie and the Ashbourne Cup was born. The first competition took place in 1915, UCD won and apart from 1943 and 1963 the Ashbourne Cup has been contested every year since then.

Over the years, UCD and UCC have enjoyed long periods of success in the competition. UCC dominated the 1920s, UDC and 1930s and '40s and so on only UCG interrupted the pattern with any degree of regularity.

This carried on until the 1980s when the competition was opened up to the 'new' colleges and institutes of technology. UCD won the trophy for the eighth time in nine year in 1988

They could hardly have imagined that it would be 19 years and seven different winners, including Jordanstown, Waterford Institute of Technology and University of Limerick before they would hold the Ashbourne Cup again. What a pity for Camogie in general that the All-Ireland senior inter-county title cannot be so keenly contested! UCD finally made their way back to the winner's podium in 2007 and they retained the trophy last year. Once upon a time, three title in-a-row would have been a common feat for the Dublin college, but the competitiveness of the last 20 years suggests that they will not succeed this time.

She had a vibrant personality and kept up to date about camogie and her beloved Cork, but Dublin was a huge part of her life and she was quietly proud of all the players whom she trained.



Aoife was presented with the award for 2008 Vodafone Camogie Player of the Year at Dublin's Westbury Hotel earlier this week, but she's certainly not dwelling on last season's achievements.

"I still haven't had a chance to take stock of the year and what we achieved. A few years down the line when we're not involved in All-Ireland finals, I'm sure I'll look back and appreciate it more than I am now. Last year was fantastic but now we're focusing on 2009.

"To win an award like this is great, but 2008 is gone and there's a new season to work for. I wouldn't have won this award if it weren't for the rest of the girls. But it is nice to look back and see that I did my job well, though I still think I have an awful lot of work to do.
