PJ Fulham reviews the camogie year, a year that saw teams from Munster claim the pick of the titles.

First senior championship for Tipperary

Tipperary's absence from the winners podium in Croke Park came to an end on Sunday September 5th when they overcame Kilkenny in the 'Bord na Gaeilge' All-Ireland senior championship final to take the 'O'Duffy Cup' for the first time. On seven previous occasions they were forced to the runner up slot. Their last appearance was in 1984.

Tipperary defeated Clare and Kilkenny knocked out Galway to reach the semi-finals which were staged at a neutral venue for the second year in succession. Parnell Park. Dublin was the setting. Three provinces were competing which drew a great attendance.

The opening match between the holders Cork and Kilkenny proved to be an edge of the seat affair. Sinead Millea was the jewel in Kilkenny's crown when she delivered a 45 metre free to the back of the Cork net with the last puck of the match to give her side a two point win.

It was score for score throughout with Cork holding a one point lead at the break. By the end of the third quarter Cork had built up a five point lead. The introduction of Ann Downey for Kilkenny in the 20th minute made a significant difference as almost immediately Margaret Commerford netted the 'Noresiders' first goal. Sinead Millea sent over the bar to leave just one point separating the sides. Sinead's free on full time was expected to level the match ... instead, it went straight to the net to clinch victory 2-12 to 1-13 as the final whistle sounded.

The other semi-final was one way traffic for Tipperary against Down. The match was over as a contest at half time when Tipperary led 4-12 to 0-2. It was only shooting practice for the winners as Deirdre Hughes notched off 4-3. Final score: Tipperary 6-22 Down 1-3.

Thus the scene was set for a grand finale. The sides had met earlier in the season in the National league when the Munster County got the verdict. Tipperary had previously tasted All-Ireland success at minor, junior and intermediate level and their hopes of clinching the senior crown were finally realised in a closely contested final against Kilkenny on a scoreline of 0-12 to 1-8.

Caitriona Hennessy from the Drom/Inch club was introduced in the 40th minute and ended the game as a legend after putting over two frees to snatch victory.

Both teams put up a great performance that had the large crowd on their toes all through the game. Tipperary were the hungrier side fighting for possession. Kilkenny were always there and in the early stages of the second half it looked as if they would take their 13th title. Tipperary's Deirdre Hughes put over three fantastic frees from awkward angles and deserved the 'Player of the Match' award.

This was the first All-Ireland final played on the full size pitch with 15 players aside. There seemed to be a lot of tension and anxiety between the sides. The first half was close with it going point for point. Kilkenny's goal came

when Sinead Millea who was responsible for seven points of her teams total went on a solo run. Sinead was fouled and her subsequent free went low to 16 year old Lizzie Lyng who banged it to the net, to leave just one points separating the sides at the break. Kilkenny 1-5 Tipperary 0-7

The sides were level at the end of the third quarter. It was stalemate for the next 13 minutes and it looked as if a draw was on the cards, but Caitriona Hennessy sent over the all important point to clinch the issue for Tipperary.

The O'Duffy Cup was presented to Meadhbh Stokes by Phyllis Breslin, Uachtaran Cumann Camogaiochta na nGael.

Clare claim third intermediate crown

Clare became the only county to take All-Ireland Intermediate honours on three occasions when they accounted for Antrim in an exciting final played at Dunloy. Antrim knocked out a fancied Limerick side in the quarter final 4-12 to 2-6 and Armagh in the semi-final, 1-9 to 0-4. Clare recorded a 4-14 to 4-8 victory over Dublin in the quarter-final and accounted for last years finalists Cork in the semi-final 4-5 to 1-5.

The sides were evenly matched but Clare took over when it mattered. Three points by Moira McMahon inside the first ten minutes stopped Antrim from securing their first All-Ireland Intermediate title. Antrim's goalie, 15 year old Ciara McKinley, brought off a number of brilliant saves, while the 'Banner County's' centre back Marie Collins had an outstanding game. It was a low scoring first half. Clare had 1-3 on the scoreboard before Antrim opened their account in the 25th minute with a goal by Oonagh Elliott. Anne McKee sent over two points to leave it all square at the break, 1-2 each. Clare took the lead early in the second

half and with ten minutes remaining the sides were level again. Moira McMahon sealed victory for Clare when she landed three points without replay from 'The Glensiders'. Final score: Clare 1-8 Antrim 1-5.

Second All-Ireland

Junior for Cork

Cork collected their second All-Ireland junior championship title in three years with a one point win over a gallant Derry side in the curtain raiser to the senior decider at Croker. This was Derry's third All-Ireland junior final appearance and the third time to be defeated by Cork. Both recorded

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decisive wins in their respective Provincial final and in the semi-finals Derry, national junior league holders defeated Connacht champions Roscommon 4-11 to 1-3 at Athleague while Cork had a 2-13 to 2-8 win over Offaly at Rath.

The sides had met in the junior league semi-final earlier in the year when Derry had a 3-8 to 1-10 victory.

In the final, Cork's Rachel Moloney's nine point tally destroyed the 'Oakleaf County'. The Courcey Rovers players fantastic display earned her the 'Player of the Match' award. This was a ding dong affair with the sides drawing level on five occasions in the opening half. A goal by Derry's captain Mary O'Kane on the 18th minute was cancelled out a minute later when Orla O'Sullivan raced through the

Derry defence to lodge the ball in the net. At the end of the first half the sides were level at 1-5 each.

The second half was just 12 minutes old when Derry took a three point lead with a Paula McAtamney goal. Cork levelled again and as full time approached the Munster side were leading by two points when Martina Mulholland reduced the lead to one point. Time ran out and Cork claimed the trophy on a score of 1-13 to 2-9.



Cork carved its name on the All-Ireland minor cup for the tenth time when they got the verdict over Galway by a

whisker at Ardrahan. Both counties have a great record in this grade. When they last met in the All-Ireland semi-final last year only one point separated them, Cork 0-13 Galway 1-9. In this year's semi-finals the Munster County had an 0-11 to 1-0 win over Derry while Galway recorded a 2-11 to 2-3 win over Leinster champions Kilkenny.

The final lived up to all expectations, with both sideproducing plenty of speed and skill. Cork held the upperhand in the opening half with Emer Dillon and Jennifer O'Leary notching off some great points. A goal by Orla Curtin left the half time score Cork 0-8 Galway 1-2.

The second half continued to be an edge of the seat affair

as Orla Curtin added two further goalfor Galway which were matched by goals by Gemma O'Connor and Mari, Watson. Cork kept their nose in front to gain a one point victory. Final score Cork 2-12 Galway 3-8

Granagh/Ballingarry secure 1998 club championship

Granagh/Ballingarry, Limerick secured its first All-Ireland club championship title when they defeated a gallant St Vincent's Dublin side at Ballingarry This was the last final of 1998 and the last to be played with 12 players aside or the reduced pitch. On the path to this final they accounted for Cashel of Tipperary to take their third Munster title and Pearses of Galway in the All-Ireland semi-final, 2-11 to 2-4. St Vincents took their first Leinster title when they disposed of St. Lactain's, Kilkenny and recorded a 3-12 to 1-8 victory over champion-Ulster Liamtroim/Fontenoy's, Down.

St Vincent's were slow to get off the mark and Granagh had eight points on the board before Denise O'Leary got Si Vincent's first score, a point on the 16th minute. The killer blow came when Ida Quaid rattled the Vincent's net just before the break to give Granagh a cushion of 1-12 to 0-2. Granagh star Eileen O'Brien was reponsible for seven points in the first half and a total of eleven in all.

The Leinster club came more to grips with the game in the second half with Denise O'Leary giving a star performance. Her goal on the 20th

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minute reduced the deficit to nine points, despite getting the better of their opponents on the scorebord in this half, the first half deficit was too great to overcome. Final score: Granagh 1-19 St Vincent's 1-8

Cork take fifth successive senior league

Eleven teams took part in the senior league in two divisions with the two top teams qualifying for semi-finals slots. Galway and Down emerged from division one and Cork and Tipperary from division two.

In the semi-final Tipperary had a 3-14 to 3-7 win over Galway while Cork registered a

3-13 to 1-5 victory over Down. In the final Cork confirmed their superiority when they secured their fifth National Senior League title on the trot with a massive 9-19 to 2-7 win over Tipperary at Semple Stadium, Thurles.

The home side proved no match for this rampant Cork team who gave an exhibition of speed, skill and determination. match was over as a contest at half time when Cork led 5-13 to 0-3. Tipperary fought hard to the end and were rewarded with two consolation goals.

First Junior league title for Derry

Derry secured its first ever National Junior League by defeating a gallant Wexford side at Gorey. It was both teams first appearance in a junior league final and also the first time for the counties to meet in a final at any grade.

21 teams took part in four zones with the two top teams from each zone qualifying for quarter-finals, where Cork, Wexford, Dublin or Derry advanced to the semi-finals.

Derry defeated Cork 3-8 to 1-10 while Wexford knocked out Dublin 2-15 to 2-12 after extra time. It was a thrilling final. The first half was very closely contested with Derry holding a slender one point lead at the break 1-3 to 0-5.

The Northern County got the better of the second half exchanges and sent home two more goals. This was a severe blow to the Slaneysiders who found Derry defence a stonewall.

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Bord na Gaeilge's support of camogie

It is rare for a government body to become included in sports sponsorship, but Bord na Gaeilge have their reasons.

t is five years ago since Bord na Gaeilge first began its sponsorship of the All Ireland Camogie Championship. Not alone has this particular sponsorship being beneficial to the Bord, the Irish language most especially and to the sport of camogie, but it has also shown how important and beneficial it can be for those bodies promoting various aspects of our culture to support each other.

Sports sponsorship predominates all over the world. In the majority of cases though this is undertaken by commercial companies wishing to maximise the benefit of extensive media coverage, with examples such as the Guinness All Ireland Hurling Championship, The Hennesssy Gold Cup, Bank of Ireland Football Championship. The Heineken Rugby European Cup, The Eircom FAI League prevelant. An increased awareness of their brand is what is most important to these companies, as they hope the repeated naming of their product will lead to an increase in sales. Though Bord na Gaeilge welcomes any increase in the awareness of it as a body generated by this deal, this is not its principle aim. As a state body the success of any particular sponsorship deal is judged primarily on how it helps to further our aim which is that of promoting Irish.

Irish people have always held their native language as with their native games in great regard and affection and today more and more people are realising that the Irish language emerged from the same treasure chest as did the Riverdance spectacular, Gaelic Games, and so many other cultural events Interest in the language has never been greater. This revived interest is evident in various aspects of everyday life in Ireland. Since 1972 the number of all Irish schools have increased from 16 to 154 today. This increased interest in Irish is also evident in the business sector where more and more companies such as Superquinn. The Body Shop, Top Garages, and Easons, are using bilingual signage. Perhaps this growth is best reflected however though in the rapid progress made by the Irish media of late. The potential for even greater success is endless and it is Bord na Gaeilge's belief, that undertaking in certain sponsorship arrangements can help achieve this.

It is vital as a sponsor when choosing a client one chooses carefully and ensures the client has the appropriate image and profile so that any publicity generated by the sponsorship will reach the target audience. Hence the sport of camogie in many ways represents the ideal choice for the Bord. As with an Ghaeilge the number of people involved with camogie is continually increasing, and those that are involved are predominantly young. The organisation presently boasts a playing membership of 70,467 and a total membership of 78,801, and runs competitions each year catering for all ages and levels. This year saw Down, a new competitor not alone enter the championship, but also succeed in reaching the semi-finals. Cumann Camogiochta na nGael also have a National coaching Development Programme up and running, with eight tutors

and two trainee tutors travelling the width and breadth of the country teaching the various skills of the game. This new Development programme, will no doubt eventually lead to many new counties competing for the O'Duffy Cup. They will also see the language being used at large public events, giving the language a higher profile, and consequently we hope encouraging them to use whatever Irish they may have.

The past season has been a tremendously successful one for the camogle players of Cork, whose junior and minor teams brought Munster and All-Ireland titles to Leeside.

The Senior side, while not retaining their All-

The Senior side, while not retaining their All-Ireland crown, did retain their National League and Munster titles, the U18 side rounding off the season with a thrilling victory in a nail-biting Munster final against Limerick.

Tipperary recorded their first Senior All-Ireland success, Clare took their third Intermediate All-Ireland title and Grenagh-Ballingarry made it a clean sweep for Munster sides in retaining their All-Ireland Club title, thus ensuring all the All-Ireland titles played for in 1999 found a home in Munster, a unique achievement for the province.

The big talking point on the camogie scene at the beginning of '99 was the 15-a-side which came into operation at the beginning of the season for a two-year trial period.

As we look back on the first year of the ex-

periment on the Inter County scene, the project seems to have been a reasonable success with the players adjusting well and enjoying the extra space on the playing field.

Adult camogie at club level also seems to have adjusted well but many clubs have experienced difficulties in fielding 15 players.

Struggled

Under age players at club level have also struggled with the bigger pitch.

The experiment is due to continue in the year 2000 and on the feedback to date looks set to stay.

Once again Cork, were to the fore at Inter County level, taking two All-Ireland titles, four provincial titles and the Senior National

But the talking point has to be the disappointment at the senior team's defeat at the hands of Kilkenny in the All-Ireland semi final.

The year began on a high note for the Senior side. With a successful National League campaign behind them they

Cork take eight titles

FORTY five schools participated in an extremely successful year's activities at Munster Colleges level.

Eight titles came to Cork, two to Tipperary and one to Clare. The senior A and B championships were won by St Mary's Charleville and Clonakilty respectively, who later went on to take the All-Ireland titles.

The 1999 Camogie Year

15 a side has changed camogie? It has made players and administrators alike think about change. Some have concluded that it is not the ideal game despite the obvious advantages that it has in that the GAA field does not have to be altered in size, nor clubs provide a set of temporary posts. Others are determined that we cannot go back to 12-a -side when the 2 year experiment is complete.

Option

Both arguments have a solid point and this is why 13-a-side looks like an obvious option. There is little doubt that the disappearance of the temporary posts has provided an improved visual impact for TV. The fitness

Odd Results

On the field of play it is safe to say that 1999 threw up some very odd results. None greater than a first ever O'Duffy Cup success for Tipperary. Yes they have been knocking on the door after a lot of Minor success over the past decade. But how can you turn around an embarrassing 34 point defeat in the National League final in late May and win an All-Ireland with the same players?

Down played in the Senior championship for the first time in nearly two decades and their defeat of Dublin marked a first victory for an Ulster side at this level since Antrim went all the way in 1979. Their subsequent collapse

and strength of the top players has made 12-a-side very frustrating for them. The bigger pitch though (and bigger goals) has not resulted in the expected avalanche of scores. The reason is that teams have not yet learnt how to create and exploit space in the new pitch lay out.

That is why I believe 13-a-side on the full GAA pitch is the answer. Not only do the fitter and more skilful players have the space to perform, but the complaints about 15-a-side ruining small clubs will also be redundant.

There are bigger problems facing the Camogie Association four years away from its centenary but the change this year has resulted in 15-a-side being the main point of debate.

At Intermediate level, there have also been surprise results, culminating in both Antrim and Armagh making up one semi-final pairing. Antrim won and did fairly well in the final. However it is not unfair to say that the Saffrons' level of preparation can be improved and provided they have the hunger this championship is a realisable goal for 2000.

Derry did everything this year but win the Junior All-Ireland. While this was a sore disappointment for everyone, now is the time to reflect on the achievement of a first ever National Junior League title in May and the defeat of Down in the Ulster Senior final in October. The latter in particular should provide the inspiration for Croke Park glory and more next season.

Mixture

The club championships threw up the usual mixture of the old At under age and colleges' level, Derry have continued their domination but there is still no breakthrough at All-Ireland level although the introduction of a Minor B championship may throw up a change.

Dominant

St. Patrick's Maghera consolidated their claim as the most dominant camogic school of the past decade and a half with a clean sweep of the provincial titles including a seventh title at both Senior and Junior level.

At Third level, UUJ still look the strongest Ulster side in the Ashbourne Cup but neither they nor Queen's look the genuine contenders both were in the early nineties. St. Mary's, Belfast are the hosts of the Purcell Cup in February and they must have high hopes of landing the trophy albeit that it is now very definitely second rate to the Ashbourne.

At representative level, Down's Mäirin McAleenan and Nuala

reliables and the surprise packets. Last year's finalists Liatroim Fontenoys and Dunloy returned as county champions and their meeting predictably decided the title race. The Antrim champions were short 4 of the side which ran up 5-15 to clean out neighbours Loughgiel in the Antrim final, It proved too great an obstacle and Liatroim went on to beat Crosserlough of Cavan in the final and collect a fourth title in 5 seasons and set a new record of appearing in 6 successive provincial finals.

Elsewhere the fall of Eglish was completed this season when they failed to take the Tyrone title for the first time in 26 years. Clonoe defeated them in the semi final and Ardboe then caught Clonoe in the final. That certainly opens up the championship for the future.

In Armagh, there was a repeat of last year's final and a repeat result. However if Crossmaglen had taken their chances they would have gone through to Ulster. There was no indication though that Ballymacnab had improved so much from last year to hand out a drubbing to Ardboe in the Ulster quarter-final.

Neither was there an indication that Crosserlough could win through in Cavan and subsequently overrun both Castleblayney and Ballymacnab. Magee both proved their talent in the first Rest of Ireland versus All-Ireland champions challenge in November. They and others similarly dedicated have the ability to take on and defeat the best but everyone on the team, be it at college, university, club, minor or intercounty level, must also believe that teams from the so called stronger provinces can be beaten.

The success of Queen's and UUJ in the early nineties proved that Ulster could compete at the top and this translated into the Junior and Intermediate success that we deserved after the barren eighties. Down, Armagh and Antrim lifted both Junior Leagues and championships. Then Down and Armagh went on to win the Intermediate. Armagh even contested the National Senior League final.

Breakthrough

Sadly the breakthrough which should have been made in the mid nineties at Senior interprovincial level never came. Ulster lost several Gael Linn finals including one with Munster which went to extra time. We did not lose out here because our players were inferior to others. Rather some of our best refused to turn out for their province and for that drawn game with Munster for example there were no substitutes.

While Ulster sides have succeeded during the past decade at many levels, much more could have been achieved. Lack of ability is not hindering the progress of our teams.

No it is a lack of ambition by some and a lack of dedication by others and both translate into a lack of confidence against players driven by both.

The new Millennium should be a time of reflection, a time to set new goals for everyone. Teams at every level in other provinces will set their All-Ireland goals. Ulster teams should be doing the same. Individual players must be single minded in their pursuit of success.

If they are, then the next decade will be brighter than the last and, who knows, some team may even reach the Promised Land, where Antrim once dwelt. 3







Louth held their Convention in Bellingham Castle and was well attended. This was one of the gatherings that failed to elect a Chairperson or Vice Chairperson.





Munster Crown for Nenagh Girls

Št. Mary's, Nenagh . . . 1-6 Clonakilty 0-6

It's the women these days who are keeping the flag flying for Tipperary on the GAA fields of the country. And it happened again last Saturday when Nenagh's St. Mary's Secondary School captured the Munster Senior Schools camogie crow at Kilcoleman.

We live in the days when girl power rules okay in the Premier County. Camogie has engulfed the GAA like a tidal wave from Carrick-on-Suir to Carrigahorig. It's explosion in popularity panifested itself in Tipperary's intermediate All-Ireland victory in 1998 and the county's first ever All-Ireland Senior final win last year.

Now St. Mary's of Nenagh have enforced the county's reputation as a stable which produces top olass camogie squads. These days it's our women who are capturing the limelight on the GAA stage, while the men's game lumbers haplessly along amidst talk of falling standards at club level and angst and frustration over yet another hurling 'famine' at inter-county level.

It's an era that has been a long time coming, but the women and girls are now having their hour in the sun. More and more females all over the county are showing sporting skills that are bringing a new sense of glory and pride to parishes and the county as

a whole

The renaissance in camogie is to a major extent a tribute to a band of dedicated coaches and officials who have managed to lift the game onto a new plane of significance over the past number of years. Among this band is Ger Dulea, the St. Mary's coach, whose glowing achievements with the Nenagh school go back to the early 1990's.

Dulea, a West Cork man living and teaching in Nenagh for many years, guided the school to two successive All-Ireland junior victories in 1992/92 and then to a senior All-Ireland crown in 1994.

The school spent the last five years in the shadows but their team, again with Dulea at the helm, are now back and poised to challenge for the title of first All-Ireland senior champions of the new millennium following their narrow three points Munster final win over Clonakilty.

Nenagh made hard work of it despite the fact that they seemed to be the much stronger side. They did very well against a strong breeze in the first half, managing to lead by 1-3 to 0-4 at halftime.

The goal, by Nenagh's top player, Emer McDonnell, was a gem. Gathering the ball on the right win she raced away on a solo after shaking off two Clonakilty defenders. Then a cock-up seemed on the cards when she slipped on the buttery pitch - but she sprang up, shook off the same two detenders again and blasted the ball

past Ella Harrington in the Clonakilty goal.

The goal, coming just seconds before the half-time whistle, gave Nenagh a distinct advantage. It put them back into a two points lead an dthey could look forward to the benefits of the strong breeze in the second half.

The skill with which the goal was executed showed why McDonnell is a Tipperary senior player. Indeed, her contribution to the game (she scored all but one point of Nenagh's total) proved to be the overwhelming factor which resulted in St. Mary's victory.

McDonnell's excellence was equalled by the Cork minor Jennifer O'Leary whose skill and strength proved to be the one big barrier to Nenagh running away with the match. O'Leary scored five of Clonakilty's total of six points and was always a thorn in Nenagh's side.

Despite the breeze advantage. Nenagh made hard work of it in the second half. Things didn't look too hopeful for the local side when O'Leary registered the first point of that period, thus reducing the deficit to the narrowest of margins.

A point from a free by Emer McDonnell opened the gap to two points again, but Nenagh lived dangerously right up the final whistle. The effectiveness of first time ground hurling was something neither side seems to have yet discovered. As a result the game as a spectacle suffered from over indulgence in futile rummaging and foostering attempts at getting the ball from ground to hand.

In the end, however, Nenagh finished the stronger side and undoubtedly deserved their victory. Emer McDonnell put Nenagh three points ahead from a free with five minutes remaining, and, although Jennifer O'Leary replied with a Clonakilty point, time ran out for the West Cork girls.

Best for Nenagh; were Emer McDonnell, Amy Kissane, Mary Rose Ryan, Deirdre McDonnell, Anna Woods, Denise Ryan and Sheena Howard. That said, all the Nenagh team played a vital part in the victory.



Tipperary County Camogie Board secretary, Marion Graham from Littleton, was thrown in at the deep end of provincial council affairs last January, when she was the unanimous choice of delegates to chair Munster Council for the next three years.

Going to the Convention in the Ambassador Hotel in Cork, Marion had it in mind to seek the vice-chair and so give herself a three year "easing in" process. However, the vice-chairperson Vera Mackey from Limerick who in the normal course of events, would be the automatic choice for the chair to succeed Marie Kearney, Cork, had to withdraw because of work and study commitments.

So instead of a preparatory period for the chair, the very popular Littleton lass found her self going all the way to the top.

It is an appropriate time for a Tipper-

ary chairperson, on view of the strides the game has made in the county over the past decade or so and indeed Marion herself played a major role in such a happy state of affairs through her administrative qualities and her coaching and managerial expertise.

Over the past decade Tipperary's camogie fortunes have been raised considerably with All Ireland titles in intermediate, junior and minor grades as well as All Ireland senior and junior colleges titles (St. Mary's, Nenagh). The "big one", the senior title, eluded the county until September year. What a way to finish the final decade of this century. To capture no less than six All Irelands when Tipperary had failed to etch their name on any trophy until the "90s.

Marion is happy that the dressing room at the Ragg is coming on well. At the moment the plumbing and electricity are being installed, "All we want now is someone to give us a couple of thousand pounds to see it through and if we could get the clubs behind us and into promoting the G.A.A. lotto, we would be doing well", Marion says. She concedes of course, that the problem in this regard lies in the fact their members are also working for their own G.A.A clubs.

It could be an exiting three years of Marion Graham at the head of camogie affairs in Munster. There is no more enthusiastic promoter of the game anywhere and such is the commitment she has always given that it will not come as any great surprise, should she decide to move up the ladder and seek the presidency. That's all for another day, another year. Meanwhile it will do very nicely that her long desired wish of seeing Tipperary become All Ireland senior champions was realised last September, during her chairmanship of the Munster Provincial Council.

From May misery to September glory

ALL IRELAND SENIOR TITLE WON AT LAST

I ho would ever have believed it, the transformation of a team, literally humiliated in May, and less than four months later crowned All Ireland champions?

That Saturday evening in May, 22nd to be exact, an experiment in giving hurling fans an opportunity of seeing top class camogie played prior to an inter county game, in this instance Tipp and Kerry in the Munster quarter-final.

National League champions Cork against Tipperary, the Cork ladies, reigning All Ireland champions seeking their 5th successive league title.

An added attraction of course was in the courageous decision of the camogie authorities to bring into being in the final year of the century, the extension of the players complement from twelve to fifteen.

Camogie could now stand shoulder to shoulder with hurling!

Alas, Tipp could not stand shoulder to shoulder with Cork that summer's evening in Semple Stadium. A 9-19 to 2-7 score line tells its own story. Utter humiliation, utter disappointment for a team that had put aside the league hopes of Kilkenny, Clare, Limerick, Wexford and Galway, while losing out narrowly to Cork with an under-strength side. No contest in the final.

Phrases like 'freak result', 'one of those days' were to be heard afterwards by those who believed in the future of camogie in Tipperary. There were other remarks too, not so pleasant ones, from people who chose to scoff and jeer.

The latter - in hindsight - probably had much to do with what happened afterwards, because eighty-five days later Tipperary were crowned All Ireland senior camogie champions for the very first time.

Who indeed would have believed it! All Ireland senior champions. An achievement several great teams in the past tried in vain to bring about. At last it fell to the girls of '99, a team so ably led by Maedhbh Stokes, a team that was dismissed after May 22nd, but which resurrected itself through initiative, dedication and fierce determination, so much so that when final day came against Kilkenny, each and every member was imbued with a frenzied approach that refused to contemplate anything other than a climb to the very

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The immediate aftermath of the Cork defeat brought a mixture of frustration and hope. The championship draw could hardly have been kinder to Tipp because what were considered to be the 'big guns' were neatly slotted into the opposite group - Cork, Kilkenny and Galway. Clare and Down or Dublin would stand between Tipp and an All Ireland final place. With all respects to the other teams in Tipp's group, the odds looked good in Tipp's favour but before getting down to the task, a psychological exercise had to be embarked upon. That league final defeat had to be exorcised and mentors Biddy Phillips,

Jim Madden and Timmy Moloney along with Board officials Noel Hennessy and Marion Graham had to set about ridding the players of any self-doubts there

Thankfully, it wasn't too difficult because each and every player well knew that the events of May 22nd did not represent a true picture of the Tipp scene. Indeed Cork appreciated that too and when less than two weeks after the league final debacle. Tipp travelled down Lee-side to meet Cork - again - in the provincial championship. While victory went to the home side, it was of proportions far easier to come to terms with than the previous meeting.

THE CHAMPIONSHIP

It was now time to expend all energies on All Ireland championship preparations. Added to the back-room were Michael Cleary and Colm Bonnar, former inter county hurlers whose worth in pursuit of excellence would prove hugely influential as the season pro-

This championship was like no other previous championship in that each team now had fifteen players with games on a full size pitch. Bringing in the assistance of well established hurlers who had been through it all was an excellent move.

Fitness levels were improved, confidence was increase and came Saturday July 10th, and Tipp were ready to host Clare in the opening round in the Ragg. Noelle Kennedy sent home 1-12 of Tipp's total, all bar a point from frees and Tipp were leading 1-16 to 0-4 with two minutes of normal time remaining, a late Clare rally leaving it at 1-18 to 1-6 when Vera Mulcahy sounded the long whistle.

The first hurdle had been crossed and Down were coming next in the semifinal. In the other side, Cork and Kilk nny had come through decisively enough and both semi-finals were fixed for Parnell Park, Dublin on Saturday, August

The Cork-Kilkenny game was first on the programme and what a surprise that brought about! The All Ireland champi-

ons were in the driver's seat throughout, and though never able to get away from the dogged Kilkenny lassies with the ease their status might suggest, at the same time they seemed they seemed to be doing enough to win until disaster struck with, literally, the final puck of

As Tipp run out for their game against the Mourne ladies, the fact that Cork have departed the scene must surely add a spring to their step. Twenty minutes into the hour, Tipperary ahead 3-5 to 0-1 and the game is as good as over as a contest. The luckless Down girls are simply out of their depth and with Deirdre Hughes in rampant mood. blasting home four goals along with three points and other like Eimear McDonnell, Noelle Kennedy, Caitriona Hennessy, Niamh Harkin and Helen Kiely scoring almost at will, vision of the Croke Park sward on final day entered the consciousness.

It's 6-22 to 1-3 in Tipp's favour. Down's goal coming six minutes from the end and from none other than former Tipp star Joan Henderson (nee Tobin), who played for Tipp in the junior All Ireland final of '91, which Down won with a late goal.

Into the All Ireland final and against Kilkenny, a team they had beaten earlier in the season in the league and whose hopes of championship progress had been dashed by Tipp in the quarter final in Semple Stadium in "98. Yet, Kilkenny were the favourites and few could guibble with that. Their pedigree over the past couple of decades suggested they were ripe for another title and after all, only once had they ever suffered defeat in a final.

THE FINAL

Yes, Kilkenny it had to be, but they reckoned without the fire and determination of their opponents whose overall play was of such quality as to greatly surprise not only their opponents but the thousands who looked in at the live telecast of what turned out to be a magnificent final. No fears of the big occasion, this was a well tuned Tipp side that gave as good as it got.

When Kilkenny, through Lizzie Lyng, struck for the game's only goal four minutes before half time. Tipp's response was immediate, an Eimear McDonnell pointed for parity at 1-4 to 0-7.

No, this Tipp team would no longer be fodder for anyone and as the game progressed it was noticeable that the

best camogie was coming from the Til girls. There was a worry though that the work rate was not complemented by ti scores it deserved, and even fro placed balls chances were lost. 
The year 1999, the dawning of a new Millennium, and what a historic year it has been in the annals of Tipperary camogie with the Senior team bringing the O'Duffy cup to the County for the first time ever. But as the saying goes, a week in politics is a long time, so too is a year in camogie.

Fifteen years seems like an eternity as that's how long it's been since Tipperary last contested the Senior All-Ireland. However, here I deal with their league run earlier in the year which was a good practice run-up to the championship. They recorded a great victory over Wexford that brought them through to the National league semi-final against Galway.

And so to the final and what a devastating blow this game turned out to be. All confidence after such a fine run, was now shattered and took a major blow. The Semple Stadium venue was a curtain-raiser to the Tipp/Kerry S.H.C. game, and what a disappointment to both the girls and their management team as Cork totally annihilated this promising outfit. A small following of supporters watched on and could not believe what was happening before their very eyes, but as the crowd gathered into the Stadium for the hurling match. they were shocked into disbelief that the girls could be taking such a beating in this National League final.

All-Ireland champions Cork, were totally in control going for their five-in-a-row league title and twelve of that team that played in last year's All-Ireland, were now lined out in Semple Stadium. One might ask what chance did Tipperary stand, a side that lacked so much experience compared to the opposition? The Cork side too looked so much fitter while their speed caused problems throughout the field but even more so on the




