

All Ireland Camogie club final......

County stars should give Cashel the edge to lift historic first title

A couple of years ago date only All Ireland senior believe that they have a Tipperary camogie stood on camogie title in 1996. the sidelines watching rivals such as Kilkenny. Cork and Galway scoop all and club accolades.

That scenario changed short years ago, after securthree senior All Ireland's in succession and a Junior title.

Now Cashel hope to add the All Ireland club title to the success story that Tipperary Camogie has become over the last three

Galway side Padraig Pearses, who are the reigning all Ireland club holders. stand in their way of success. Throw-in for this final, which is being played at Cashel is 1-30pm on Sunday.

Despite Tipperary's apparent dominance of the game and home venue, Cashel see themselves as rank underdogs, due to the Tribeswomen's record in the club championships over the last couple of years.

Then again nobody wants to be dubbed pre match favourites. Club secretary Ann Moloney reckons that despite Tipp's success, and home advantage Pearses will be very difficult to

Pearses got to the decider by virtue of their 4-14 to 1-6 victory over Ulster champions Keady

Sharon Glynn, regarded as the best camogie player ever produced by the Western County, scored 2-4 out of that total.

She was the driving force behind Galway's first and to with this Cashel side do ical work has been done by

'A lot of the cute ones will say we have no chance, but we are confident that we the game's top intercounty can do it," added the Cashel club secretary.

There is no shortage of around drastically just three All Ireland medals and big match experience in the Cashel camp. A grand total of twelve All Ireland medals from the junior and senior wins were scooped by Cashel players.

Cashel's Jovita Delaney, Paula Bulfin, O'Dwyer, Claire Grogan, Philly Fogarty and Emily Hayden were all on the starting fifteen that secured Tipp's third All Ireland senior title in row when comprehensively defeated Kilkenny.

In addition to that Helen Breen, Helen Grogan and Linda Grogan were on the junior side that defeated Offaly in the curtain raiser.

"We need all the support we can get, so we are calling on people to come and support us," stated Ann.

Cashel have been playing well, and the team are nicely balanced. Their defence, with Jovita Delaney at full back as opposed to playing in goal and Una O'Dwyer in the half back line, is exceptionally strong. Up front the club was

boosted by the arrival of the three Grogans, Claire , Linda and Helen who transferred to Cashel from Templemore.

On the down side however a few players, for various reasons, have departed the club and are unavailable for

good panel of players, with a fair blend of youth and experience.

"Jovita Delaney and Sharon Glynn will provide the duel of the day," added Anne Moloney, who is confident that the goalkeepercome full back will come out on top in that particular head to head.

En route to the final Cashel defeated Leinster champions St Ibars of Wexford in the All Ireland Semi Final by 1-15 to 1-9.

They won their first Munster title after beating Clare's Newmarket-on-

Grannagh/Ballingarry of Limerick in the Munster Final. That was their first ever provincial victory. In the round-robin series

in County Tipperary, they secured a place in the final after finishing in the top two of the group stage.

Their record consisted of two draws with Burgess and Toomevara, and wins over Portroe and Drom/Inch. Cashel won their fourth

county final in a row after a battle Toomevara.

Up until this year their subsequent sojourns in the Munster Club championship ended with disappointment and heartbreak. Getting into the final in itself is a major victory for the Cashel girls.

"Given everything and how difficult it was to get out of Tipperary and the Province this may be our best chance to win this competition," said Ann.

Martin O'Dwyer has been training the team, the phys-

Sean Hennessy and Tommy Grogan, while Timmy Moloney. Michael O'Dwyer and Aine Marie Fitzgerald are the selectors.

Tipperary's involvement in the respective camogie championship, added to the fact that many of the players are either working or studying outside the county has made it difficult to prepare for the club competi-

According to Ann, a win on Sunday would mean an awful lot to the club.

Catriona Bonnar, a sister of the All Ireland hurling winners Conal, Colm and Cormac Bonnar, and Michelle Kennedy, in particular have give great service to Cashel camogie

A club win would be a just reward for those players, who have given so much to the club throughout their playing careers to

They would be the first club side from Tipp to win this competition for quite a number of years. Since then the county's club sides have not done too well in this competition.

'Gortnahoe were the last Tipperary side to this competition, but that was quite a while ago," continued the club secretary.

However Tipperary camogie players have spent the last couple of seasons banishing the memories of the many defeats and failures of the past. A win for Cashel on Sunday would add greatly to the claim that Tipperary are the premier force in camogie.

LATE SCORE DENIES CASHEL VICTORY

Cashel's dreams of win-ning their first All-Ireland club title and further cement Tipperary's reputation as the Premier force in camogie was shattered when a point scored deep into injury time from Padraig Pearses' Carmel Hannon secured victory for the Galway side.

That score from Pearses' wing forward, scored in the sixth minute of injury time of what was a tantalizing affair from start to finish. came just after Cashel's Claire Grogan scored what seemed to be the equalizing score, after several near

However the Galway side were able to keep a slender advantage over the home team, and as the game seemed destined to end as a draw they mustered enough strength to produce the match clinching score.

Pearses, winning their fourth All Ireland club title and their second in a row. deserved their narrow win, Their success in recent years ensured that a large following from West of the Shannon came down to Cashel to support the team.

Tipperary may be the side to beat in intercounty camogie, however teams from Galway have proved to be specialists in the club com-

In this tight and hard fought game the Galway side's experience of playing together in so many big club games over the last few years gave them that little bit extra, which was just enough of an edge to hold out for a narrow win

while on enemy territory.

They always seemed able to get scores just when they needed them. At the other end of the field their defence put in a tremendous game. amount of work to frustrate Cashel's forward line.

Cashel, who enjoyed home advantage for this tie, missed too many scorable chances. Defensively they were sound, especially in the latter half, and won a lot of ball in the midfield and half forward lines.

They were denied goals by some heroic last gasp defending by Pearses keeper Caroline Cunniffe, and late in the game when Cunniffe seemed to be beaten, corner back Patricia Burke came out of nowhere to clear the ball off the line.

Cashel had their opponents under the cosh for most of the second half, but were unable to convert possession into much needed scores.

With so many near misses it seemed that it was not to be Cashel's day. On the other side of the coin their opponents claimed a brace of well taken goals from their star player Sharon Glynn midway through the first half.

Both teams played some excellent quality camogie, despite the breezy, greasy conditions on what was a soft pitch. They served up a brilliant final, which was more than a good advertisement for the game of camo-

All the players who took to the field should be congratulated for their efforts in providing so much entertainment for the sizeable crowd that attended this fixture at Cashel on Sunday afternoon.

The home side got off to a promising start, and were two points, thanks to scores

Philly Fogarty, to the good ry, and looked good to win ahead before Pearses full their first ever All Ireland forward Sharon Glynn crown, made her mark on the Unfo

Glynn, who opened the scoring with a wonderful point in the first minute, then laid off a pass to midfielder Michelle Glynn who sent over the Galway side's second score.

In the 12th minute Pearses surged ahead. Glynn doubled on a ball, sent into the danger zone by centre half-forward Aine Hillary, to the net.

Two minutes later Cashel then found themselves in further trouble when they conceded a second goal. Sharon Glynn sent a 30yard free, after the full forward was fouled, beyond Sandra Ricken in the Cashel

Pearses seemed on course to swamp their opponents by taking a six point led, when they followed up with points from Lally Lorraine Michelle Glynn

Cashel though didn't panic and countered back. They also managed to put a tight reign on Sharon Glynn, by moving Una O'Dwyer to full back from centre half back.

Three points in succession by Claire Grogan put them back into contention. And the sides exchanged points in the final few minutes before the interval.

24 minutes into the game there was controversy. Just as the Cashel supporters in the stand side of the pitch grouned at what looked to have trailed wide by Claire Grogan, the umpires signaled that the effort was a

Cashel trailed by 2-5 to 0-8 at the half time break. The Co Tipperary side started

Unfortunately all they had to show for all their efforts at the end of a spell they dominated in terms of play was one score, a pointed 45 by Claire Grogan. Sadly it was not enough.

Their momentum was broken somewhat, when the game was halted following an injury to Cashel half back Helen Breen. Following the resumption the visitors regained some ground thanks to a pointed 45 by Sharon Glynn, and one from play by Shauna Ward.

With five minutes of regulation time left Cashel launched a brave last gasp effort to try and wrestle the title away from the Galway

Again it was wing forward Claire Grogan who provided the scores. She hit three points in the space of six minutes to leave the bare minimum between the sides.

Officially time was up, but there was plenty of stoppage time to be played. In what was a hectic and pulsating final few minutes Cashel seemed to have earned a draw when Claire Grogan scored a point from the right hand side of the

When it was felt that would be the last action of the final, the referee allowed enough time for Carmel Hannon to pop up and score the winner.

Pearses can be thankful for the interventions of Caroline Cunniffe in goal, Aisling Ward. Patricia Burke, Martina Harkin, Martina Haverty and Tracey Laheen in the backline played exceptionally well

Michelle Glynn in the midfield had a good game, while Sharon Glynn and Shauna Ward were the pick of their forward line.

After their failure to win this match it probably comes as little consolation to Cashel that they more than played their part in what was a fantastic game of camogie.

Claire Grogan could not be faulted for her efforts over the hour, while Emily Hayden and Paula Buffin dominated the middle of the

Una O'Dwyer curtailed Glynn's influence in the latter half, while Kaiffe Moloney, Helen Breen and Triona Bonner also enjoyed productive afternoons.

TIPPERARY DOMINATE MUNSTER LINE-UP

FOR the first time in 20 years Cork will have their smallest representation on the Munster Interprovincial senior camogie team when they take on Ulster at St Anne's GAA grounds in Bohernabreena, Tallaght next

All-Ireland champions Tipperary hog most of the limelight on this occasion with only three of the Leesider's selection, Linda Mellerick (captain), Fiona O'Driscoll and Paula O'Connor selected on the starting 15.

Eleven of the Tipperary side that won the O'Duffy cup two months ago and Vera Sheehan of Limerick complete the team.

Ironically, this is a re-arranged team from that picked a few weeks back, because now with Toomevara's Deirdre Hughes and Noelle Kennedy missing the selection had to be altered.

I wonder who would have missed out if these girls had still been around?

Mary O'Connor, who was also on the original 15 is unavailable, as are substitutes Vivienne Harris and Eithne Duggan.

Fiona O'Driscoll and Paula O'Connor are now elevated to starting positions, while Ger Casey, Eileen O'Brien (Limerick), Una O'Donoghue, Jennifer O'Leary and Sarah Hayes are listed as replacements.

In last year's competition, the Munster girls were surprisingly ousted at the first hurdle against Connacht.

With Schwarzkopf again sponsoring the competition for the third year, there is much incentive to succeed. The player of the tournament in both the senior and junior competitions will receive a £1,000 for her club, a £100 worth of hair styling and a commemor-

ative plaque. Meanwhile, the Rebel County has six representatives on the Munster junior team -Jean O'Sullivan, Nora Ahern, Valerie O'Keeffe, Geraldine Collins, Marie O'Connell and Breege Corkery. They kick off the day's activities when they also clash with the Westerners at 11.45am.

Elsewhere, it is interesting to hear that UCC have expressed their intentions of participating in the Cork County senior camogie championship for the coming season.

I do not know what their line-out would be next summer, but they have one hell of a team when it comes to the Ashbourne Cup.

Of course there is also the situation of opting to play with your club, if you are a senior

Players like Una O'Donoghue from Cloughduv, Ger Casey plays with Inniscarra, Rachel Moloney and Sarah Hayes are the backbone of the Courcey Rovers side, while Sinead O'Callaghan is back from a summer in the USA to join her club Bishopstown would make a formidable side.

Then, players like powerful Tipperary fullback Una O'Dwyer would be eligible to play here with UCC, while also playing at home in the Premier County.

I'm sure there will be a lot of interest in the outcome of this one.

Cork battled on and a Gemma O'Connor point narrowed the gap before substitute Marie O'Connell pounced for a vital goal. Two minutes later, Emer O'Farrell added a point to level

With 10 minutes left, Colette Desmond gave Cork the lead with a point, but again Paula McAtamney scored two frees, to

regain her side's advantage. Emer O'Farrell then scored a great goal for Cork, and they pressed for the killer blow. Points from Colette Desmond, Gemma O'Connor and a goal from Amanda Murphy ensured the title was retained by the Rebels. Another weekend of champion-

ship activity saw Carrigaline book their place in the Under-16 A county final with a victory over Ballinahssig. In the quarter-finals of the same competition, champions Milford remained on course for three in a row, with a good victory over neighbours Ballyhea, while Inniscarra had to fight hard before recording a two-goal victory over Newcestown.

In the Under-16 B championship, Eire Og had a goal to spare over Clonakilty, while Douglas advanced at the expense of Na Piarsaig. In an all East Cork derby, Fr O'Neills were too strong for Watergrashill.

Aghbullogue beat St Finbarrs, and they now meet St Catherines in the quarter-final, with Youghal awaiting the winners. In the second semi-final, Killagh will meet Carrigaline.

Sunday's meeting of Ballinhas-sig and Watergrashill in the County Junior A final is a game that will draw the crowds to Delaneys, as Ballinhassig go in quest of their first title, while the Hill will be endeavouring to take their

Both sides have looked impressive on the path to the final; Ballinhassig accounting for Tracton, Sarsfields and a fancied St Catherines, whilst Watergrashill ac-counted for Brian Dillons and Douglas.

The bare fact is that Tipperary had the title parcelled and bound before half time, as a goal from each of their thoroughly destructive full forward line put Kilkenny in the

Signs were already ominous for the underdogs inside the first couple of minutes. A brace of frees from centre forward orchestrator Noelle Kennedy was followed by another point from midfielder Philly Fogarty, who created and ended the opportunity herself after a long solo run through the heart of the Kilkenny defence.

Midfielder Lizzie Lyng responded with a point for the Cats, but it was to be their last score for 13 minutes as Tipp went on the rampage.

The pace of Eimear McDonnell caused untold anxiety for her opponents, and Marie Maher was rarely able to get to grips with the corner forward, McDonnell forcing an excellent save from Kilkenny goalkeeper Catriona Ryan in the 7th minute.

Yet it would be wrong to single out any of the inside attacking trio, as both Deirdre Hughes and Claire Grogan enjoyed brilliantly productive days as well. Indeed, the Tipp full forward line helped themselves to a collective total of 3-6 from play, Hughes top-scoring with 2-2 and

McDonnell and Grogan firing 1-2 apiece.



At the 1998 convention, Lillie was chosen as the county board's president.

This was an honour which was received with great pride by both Lillie and the Ballincollig club and in her role as president she carried out her duties with style.

One could sense her pride in the posi-tion and she deemed it an honour that she was chosen to act in the role.

At the time of her death she had completed three years of her five-year term.

Not content with acting as an officer of the county board, Lillie also served as a selector and her greatest love was for the county junior side, where she acted as a selector for a number of years.

One of her greatest thrills was acting in that role in 1984 when, against all the odds, a young Cork junior side took the All-Ireland title.

Another event which Lillie regularly attended was the national congress where she acted as a delegate for the

The pace of Eimear McDonnell caused untold anxiety for her opponents, and Marie Maher was rarely able to get to grips with the corner forward, McDonnell forcing an excellent save from Kilkenny goalkeeper Catriona Ryan in the seventh minute.

Yet it would be wrong to single out any of the inside attacking trio, as both Deirdre Hughes and Claire Grogan enjoyed brilliantly productive days as well. Indeed, the Tipp full forward line helped themselves to a collective total of 3-6 from play, Hughes top-scoring with 2-2 and McDonnell and Grogan firing 1-2 apiece.

Grogan was the first to strike, taking a pass from Kennedy and blazing past Ryan to open up a five-point lead after a quarter of an hour. On the day that was in it, it was a fitting moment for Grogan - her two sisters had earlier helped Tipperary obliterate Offaly in the All-Ireland junior camogic final.

Less than two minutes after Grogan's intervention. Hughes notched the first of her two goals, handpassing the sliothar to the net (the move, illegal in hurling, is allowed in the women's game) to put Tipp in command. Hughes added another point immediately afterwards as the full forward line tormented their immediate opponents.

Full back Sinead Costelloe could rarely handle the explosive talent of Hughes, while captain Mairead Costelloe in the left corner also discovered, in trying to curtail Grogan, the most arduous of tasks.

Eimear McDonnell completed the set of goals for the full forward line with a fine strike to the far corner before halftime, and soon after the break Hughes got the second of her goals as Tipp's auto-cruise proved all too much for Kilkenny's outclassed resistance.

Midfielders Brigid Mulally and Lizzy Lyng kept the gallop up throughout, and Sinead Millea tried valiantly from start to finish, but to no avail. Millea, the summit on which Kilkenny so often pin so much of their hope, managed to hit the net from a free late on, but the fact that it needed a late, late free for Tipp net minder Jovita Delaney's goal-line to be breached tells its own story.

The Tipp back line is as worthy for praise as their brilliant attacking master class, with Delaney in goal impenetrable on the relatively few occasions when Kilkenny managed to carve out clear chances.

The day, the month, the year itself, is Tipp's: the problem for the rest, in the camogie world at least, is finding a means of preventing the type of dominance that the runners-up once exerted on the game. It may be no easy task.


2001 saw increased activity on the playing field and while most people welcomed the back-door structure of the senior championship, introduced this year, a little tweaking should make it a perfect arrangment.



This was the case with defeated finalists Kilkenry who were already ousted by Tipperary in their opening game. The All-Ireland showdown between the "Cats" and the blue and gold proved to be an uneven pairing, however, and consequently we had a very one-sided decider in Croke Park on September 9th.

Tipp will have no complaints, though. They had more cause than most counties to rejoice. They won again - it was their third, and they came in succession. It was also made it an All-Ireland double for Tipperary in headquarters on camogie day, the junior side having upset the formbook in the curtainraiser when they defeated first-time finalists Offaly. And of course a week previous, Liam MacCarthy came back to Toomevara with Tommy Dunne after the hurling final, As if that was not enough, Emily Hayden and Una O'Dwyer received a "new look" from the RTE fashion programme Off the Rails! Clearly it was a good year for stick-swingers clad in blue and gold.

Many trips were made around the county showing off the O'Duffy Cup. Emer and Marie Watson, were lethal. St Finbarr's Gemma O'Connor is another player of note. Briege Corkery ran herself into the ground and "Player of the Match" Elaine O'Riordan never tired of roaming the Eire Og pitch in Nenagh.





N SATURDAY, Munster Camogie Council gathered to pay homage to a lady who has served Colleges and Schools Camogie in Munster with

distinction.

For Mary Moran, the recent Annual General Meeting of the Munster Post Primary Schools council where she stepped down from office brought the curtain down on a ca-reer that has spanned 32 years. In that time there have been many changes, none more so than when the name was changed from Munster Colleges to the present format of Munster Post Primary Schools Council - this came about with the inclusion of post primary and vocational schools top competition.

Mary Moran was honoured with a presentation in recognition of her work through the years. In that time she has seen many of the victorious Munster Champions go all the way to take All-Ireland honours with St Aloysius, Scoile Mhuire, Cashel, North Presentation, St Patricks, Cork and Shannon, and St Marys, Charleville and Nenagh, to bring Senior crowns to the province. In recent years Clonakilty brought the Senior B crown while the Junior scene has been littered with success.

Mary Moran's dedication to the game is well known; she has pub-lished several outstanding books one which charts the story of the All-Ireland colleges scene spanning 30 years and aptly titled "A Re-sounding Success." Without doubt, the story of Munster Colleges is one which is very dear to her heart, titled "Gymfrocks to Headbands" it tells a remarkable story from the be-ginning in 1968 when Munster Council notified the county board of their intention to organise a Munster Schools championship, little did they envisage what a success story they were setting in motion.

Mary brought to the market an-other publication with "Cork Camogie Story" hitting the shelves, again her wonderful knowledge and deep love of the game is evident. It was with St Aloysius that Mary first learned her camogie, lining out with the school side to win several honours, on joining Old Aloysius Mary went on to win Senior County Championship honours before a move to Dublin saw her line out with Celtic where she won an All-Ireland Club championship medal. On returning to Cork she rejoined Old Als and it was as a member of the club she won her All Ireland medal in 1970.



BRIMFUL OF ASHBOURNE

The longest-running show in camogie history moves to a new venue in 2002, Cork IT.

n 1915 Lord Ashbourne, Edwin Gibson a Trinity College graduate who was prominent in Gaelic League circles, presented the Ashbourne Cup for camogie to encourage the Irish game in the National University and enhance the social life of students. It was, in effect, the first national camogie competition in existence. Its tradition has been carried on and today it marks the highlight of the sporting year in premier third-level camogie. Up until recently the Ashbourne competition was limited to the larger third-level institutions but this was overturned in the early 1990s when it was decided to allow all colleges to enter.

Ashbourne games are always special. They are highly competitive and hunger for victory is obvious, yet sportsmanship always prevails both on and off the pitch. It also gives the unique opportunity for girls from different counties to play together and develop a camaraderie that lasts long after college days are over.

CORK IT 2002

On the weekend of the 16-17 February, Cork Institute of Technology (CIT) will host the 86th Ashbourne Cup competition (it was not contested in 1943). Historic for many reasons as it will mark a very significant milestone in the history of the sport at CIT. Not only is it the first time that the competition will visit the college but it will be the first time that they house any sort of an inter-varsity GAA tournament. And to add to the occasion it will be the first time in the history of the Institute that CIT will have a team competition.

Unlike near neighbours and great rivals UCC with their long history and a remarkable 29 Ashbourne titles, the emergence and success of CIT is very recent. CIT won the seven-a-side Meaghair Shield competition in 1993 but unfortunately suffered a lack of interest over the following few years. They were not down for long, however, and the camogie club was revived in 1998, when the college's current Sports Officer, Miriam Deasy, led a team to the final of the Meaghair Shield, only to be



denied narrowly by Limerick IT. Camogie began to flourish within the Institute and the breakthrough came in 2000 when they qualified for the Purcell competition (2nd division) for the first time ever by beating old rivals LIT in the qualifier. After a long journey north to Belfast they succumbed to the home side, St Mary's, in the semi-final. But this learning curve proved vital as twelve months later CIT ended the wait when they beat Carlow IT to take home the silverware.

Having won the Purcell Cup, CIT were given the opportunity to play an Ashbourne qualifier. Further history was created on 23 October 23 2001 when they upset the odds to beat Mary Immaculate College of Limerick by a single point. Whatever the outcome against UCD in this year's quarter-final, the Cork college has come full circle and will undoubtedly do justice to hosting this prestigious competition.

"It has been a hectic four years for the CIT club and it has taken a lot of work to get to where we are today," said Sports Officer, Miriam Deasy. "It is a great honour for the Institute and especially for those involved in the sports department who have lived through the highs and lows to see that we are now successfully competing at the highest level. For too long we were always in the shadow of UCC. Now it will be realised that there are two very dominant and competitive camogie col-

leges in Cork. The hosting of the Ashbourne can only further enhance our future and hopefully attract prospective students and players to the college."

Miriam, who is also a member of the Cork senior camogie panel, is coach to the CIT team, while Keith Ricken is the GAA Development Officer. His sister Sandra (who plays her club camogie with Cashel) is a member of the UCD line-out. So loyalties will be well tested. All quarter-final games will be decided on or before the first Saturday in February. No doubt, there will be some very interesting clashes before the winning team will claim one of the major inter-varsity trophies on 17 February.

THE CONTENDERS

It will be the ambition of every participating team to strip Waterford Institute of Technology (WIT) of their crown. But with Tipperary senior county player Sinead Nealon in charge, it is unlikely that they will fall too easily. Granted, some of the bigger guns have moved on from last season, but with Kate Kelly, Catherine Corkery and Helena Jacob they will still fancy their chances against St Mary's, Belfast. The victors here will meet the winners of the National University of Ireland Galway (NUIG) and Athlone IT (AIT) clash. And here there is plenty of talent on both sides. Therese Maher, Michelle Glynn and Aine Hillary will head up the AIT selection

and will meet Galway county team-mate Lourda Kavanagh on the NUIG side along with Lizzie Glennon from Roscommon.

Down south there is great interest in the other quarter-finals. With a star-studded team in the 2001 competition, UCC were many people's favourites to win out. Now, they wonder will they get the green light in 2002. Again, with many household names -Sinéad O'Callaghan (captain), Elaine Burke, Una O'Donoghue, Criona Harte, Sinead Buckley, Joanne O'Callaghan, Sarah Hayes, Rachel Moloney, Eimear McDonnell, Una O'Dwyer and Lizzie Lyng - they surely must secretly fancy their chances of advancing to the last four especially with John Considine, a Fitzgibbon medal-holder himself, and Séamus Coffey in charge. Standing in their way of a last four position is the University of Limerick (UL) who are also strong contenders for the title this year. Captained by Dublin. inter-county player Fiona Ni Chorcoráin from Ballyboden / St Enda's, they are also boosted by Tipperary All-Ireland medallists Louise Ryan and Niamh Harkin, Aoife Lane (daughter of Noel) and Orla Kilkenny. With home

venue they will put it up to the Leesiders. Should UCC go through to the semi-final they will meet the winners of the CIT and UCD clash. This is where the competition could get very interesting. If CIT emerges from this encounter the famed St Finbarr's GAA grounds should be full to capacity for the all-Cork clash. But this is probably a tall order for CIT in their first year participating in the College's premier competition. Nevertheless, they won the Purcell Cup last season in impressive style and with home venue in this tie they will pull out all the stops to get to the penultimate stage. They are captained once again by their 2001 leader, Nora Ahern who says: "Playing in the Ashbourne for the first time is achieving a lifetime camogie ambition for me. Getting to this stage of the competition is testament to the efforts of the CIT Camogie Club over the years*. The team is further strengthened by the inclusion of Cork players Paula O'Connor (sister of Rebel hurlers Ben and Gerry), Orla O'Sullivan, Valerie O'Keeffe, Mairead Kelly who has starred with the Limerick seniors and Anne-Marie Raftice from Kilkenny.

Meanwhile, UCD will not relish the long journey to Cork. But players like Caoimhe Harrington and Sandra Ricken will be more than comfortable on home soil. Their captain, Deirdre Corcoran is from the Traugh club in Limerick.
