THE long wait is over - Muskerry are the new Cork camogie champions. They won their first county title in 74 years with a hard earned victory over reigning champions St Finbarr's in a closely fought final at Pairc Uf Rinn on Sunday last.

The divisional side made up of players from Ballincollig, Eire Og, Grenagh and Rockbán went into the match as second favourites - but from the throw in they looked the more likely winners. Muskerry was the more hungry side and in the end it was their greater passion

that won the day. Top scorers Rockbán's Sile Burns gave the challengers an early two point lead with a point from a free and one from play. The resolute Muskerry defence magnificently mar-shalled by Captain Catriona Foley held their opponents scoreless for the opening quar-

ter. Eventually Vivienne Harris opened the Barrs account with a point from a free. Ellen O'Herlihy of Eire Og replied with a minor for Muskerry, which was cancelled out by a pointed free from Harris. Enter 'player of the match' Margaret O'Herlihy who bisected the posts with two spectacular points. Harris successfully completed her hat trick of frees to make the half time score 0-5 to 0-3 in the mid cork sides favour.

The city team made a number of tactical switches for the second half. They appeared to be working as the Barrs threatened to take over. But the Muskerry defence and midfielders worked like beavers to close down their opponents. Sile Burns then put three between the teams with an excellently taken free. Vivienne Harris immediately brought the margin back to two.

THERE was a Cronin double on county final day at Páirc Uí Rinn yesterday.

Brother and sister Pa and Denise Cronin both starred as Bishopstown and Muskerry landed the last two Evening Echo championships up for grabs in 2007.

Denise pointed the way for Muskerry with an all-action display from wing-forward as the divisional side bridged a 74-year gap to win their second Evening Echo senior camogie title.

Just two hours later Cork senior hurler Pa was man-of-the-match for Bishopstown as they retained the U21 hurling title.

There were wild celebrations after Muskerry dethroned the Barrs in a tight and tough 0-8 to 0-5 battle, but Bishopstown were more subdued with a winner takes all City Division showdown against Douglas on the horizon.

Bishopstown were the Seandun nominees, so despite the conviction with which they retained the county after beating Duhallow, Newtown and Carrigaline they put their title on the line against Douglas next Saturday night at 7.30pm in Páirc Uí Rinn. Erin's Own lost in similar circumstances back in 2003 to their arch rivals Sars.

For Denise Cronin and Muskerry there was no holding back after the division put in a huge effort under the guidance of Éire Óg's Con Malone.

Éire Óg. Grenagh, Rockbán and Ballincollig supplied the core of the Muskerry team, with Éire Óg's Margaret O'Herlihy winning the player of the match award after scoring three points from play.

Rockbán's Catriona Foley was the captain, with Sile Burns, daughter of a Barrs' legend Denis Burns, and Cork ladies footballer Val Mulcahy, a surprise late sub, also doing the club proud.

Ballincollig supplied four players to

There was also major celebrations in the household of the fourth Ballincollig starter Maria O'Donoghue.

Her brother Stephen, who won an All-Ireland U21 football medal with Cork this year, secured a Muskerry U21 hurling medal with Ballincollig yesterday afternoon when they defeated Cloughduv in Ovens.

In another link, Muskerry chairwoman Máiréad Donovan's son Alan was also involved in Ballincollig's first win in the U21 competition since 1996. Grenagh were represented by Linda Dorgan, who scraped for every breaking ball in the middle.

It capped a memorable week for the Dorgan clan from Grenagh, the club landed the Evening Echo intermediate football championship just nine days

All the Muskerry players will return to club action over the next week with Eire Og facing Rockbán in the Senior B final, Ballincollig meeting Tracton on Wednesday night (8.30pm Cloughduv) in a Junior A play-off to meet Fr O'Neill's in the semi-final.

IN A CORK county senior camogie final devoid of excitement, Muskerry stripped defending champions St Finbarr's of their ti-

tle at Páirc Ui Rinn yesterday.

St Finbarr's were expected to have the edge with players like Cork captain Gemma O'Connor and Vivienne Harris.

Muskerry, however, were not short on motivation and having waited for more than three decades to contest the final the divisional outfit were not going to leave this one behind them.

Muskerry scored first with a point from Síle Burns but they suffered an early loss when full-back Siobhán Gleeson, who was handed the task of marking Harris, was taken off through injury after just five mintites.

It made little difference up front though as Burns pointed again from wide on the right player-of-the-match O'Herlihy flicked the ball into her path. The Barr's enjoyed far more possession than the divisional team, but they couldn't turn the pressure into points.

Harris knocked over the first of her four frees as Gemma O'Connor became dominant at midfield and she dug her side out a number of times with some good back-

Ellen O'Herligh hit a fine score for Muskerry and after a few more wides the Barr's were back in it with another Harris free. It was a scrappy first-half, with neither

side taking control and defences on top.

At half time, Muskerry led by two points, a couple of well-taken scores from Margaret O'Herlihy boosting their tally. The young Eire Og player caused the defence major problems, her pace and accuracy a constant

The crowd was vying for a more exciting second-half as the Barr's chased the game but it never really did climax into the kind of county final everyone was hoping for. Burns put further daylights between the teams with another free as players like Denise Cronin and Lynda Dorgan began to dominate.

Cathriona Foley, who had an excellent second-half, and Leah West got through a tower of work in defence, while the Barr's were forced to rely on some outstanding defending from Jermy Duffy to stem the tide of attacks.

Muskerry managed to push the lead out to four points at one stage and with the advantage then reduced to three, after Harris pointed again, the Barr's were awarded a free right in front of the posts and O'Connor stepped up hoping to get the goal her side badly needed.

She missed the clean pick up she needed though to get a strike off and though she responded with a point a minute later you sensed it was Muskerry's day.

The Barr's pushed hard to get that elusive goal with Lynda O'Connell and Duffy driving some good balls forward but it was too little too late as Muskerry took the title home to mid Cork for the first time in



A unique sporting day is hailed as a big success

FOR the first time the FAI, Munster rugby and the Camogie Associations combined recently at a unique event.



HISTORIC FIRST FOR CARLOW

As sponsor, the Borris builder was even more delighted to

see Carlow triumph and he has been involved with camogie through his club St Mullins for many years now. The win was made all the more special as his daughter Aoife was part of the successful panel.

"I've been involved in camogie for a good few years now and I've seen the profile of the game rise since then. I was asked earlier this year to sponsor the team and I was glad to be able to belo out."

The junior camogie championship was run on a blitz basis with all five teams - Mayo, Donegal, Monaghan, Europe and Carlow - playing each other.

Following the early round of matches, it was Carlow and Monaghan that would compete for the title and following some all round impressive displays, the Leinster side were surely confident of success.

"The girls played well in the earlier rounds, but they knew Monaghan would provide a stern test in the final. They certainly were not taking the match for granted." Carlow faced Monaghan in the final at 6.25 p.m. The Carlow girls had now proved themselves the most sporting and popular team of the day.

The Europe, Donegal and Mayo crowds were all rooting for Carlow and if goodwill won the match, Carlow were winners before the sliothar was thrown in.

However, they had to work hard for this one. Niamh Quirke opened the scoring with a point in the first minute of play. By the fifth minute Carlow had shot five wides, lost scores that may have been needed.

Valerie Crean pointed in the sixth minute, and Monaghan pointed a free in the 12th minute. By now Carlow had sent another four shots wide.

Margaret Coady was on target for a point in the 13th minute. Crean pointed a free in the 16th minute and added another two points from play. The half-time score was Carlow 0-6, Monaghan 0-1.

The second-half got under way with the first scores to Carlow, two pointed frees by their ace attacker in the fourth and tenth minutes. Monaghan scored a point in the 12th minute, and she added a point for Carlow three minutes

Monaghan pointed in the 16th minute, and with only two scores between the teams Carlow fought on.

Another pointed free in the 20th minute gave Carlow some breathing space as Monaghan now needed three scores with only two minutes of injury time left. In the 22nd minute of play Monaghan got through for a goal but this was too late for them. On the puck-out from the Carlow full-back, Mary Coady, the whistle blew and Carlow had won their first All-Ireland camogie title ever.

I GET up, shower and dress. Before I go to work, I have a bowl of two-minute microwaveable porridge with full-fat milk.

I get into the car and drive to the office.

8.30am

Upon arriving at the office, I tart clearing administrative ks before my day officialgins at 9am.

is the business manager company that produces student ID cards, my responsibilities include the co-ordination of work carried out by our IT team and that of our support desk.

The weekly staff meeting starts in our canteen. As we discuss scheduling for the IT staff, I have a cup of tea with milk and a fruit scone spread with butter and strawberry jam.

After the meeting, I return to my office and continue working until lunch. By this time, I have finished a bottle of water.

I go to one of the Waterford Institute of Technology canteens for lunch. As I'm not training today, I order meat and salads, choosing cooked sliced ham, a tossed green salad, a portion of coleslaw and some potato salad. I also have a cup of tea.

1.45pm I snack on an apple and a kiwi and drink another bottle of water while working.

If it had been a training day, then I would have eaten a chicken or turkey sandwich with some lettuce and mayonnaise at around 4pm, because I go to training straight from the office.

6.30pm I finish for the day and drive home. When I'm training, I



leave the office at about

I get home, change and begin making my homemade shepherd's pie with lots of vegetables.

I sit down to dinner, having more water with my meal. After, I take a short walk.

During the six-week period that we aren't training, I rest my body, allowing it to recover from the gruelling physical work we do six days a week.

We will be given our winter programme in the middle or end of November. From that point until we begin our intensive sessions in late January, I will train on my own in the

I have a cup of tea and a chocolate digestive biscuit, while watching some television.

I go to bed.

How does Kate's diet rate?

"KATE starts the day off well with a bowl of porridge. This is a popular choice these days as porridge contains slowreleasing carbohydrates and the soluble fibre can help to reduce cholesterol. "The full-fat milk is fine, but

dairy products tend to contain d fat and for many people, it is advisable to opt for the low-fat varities. These tend to contain most of the important nutrients, but without the fat.

"Mid-morning, Kate has a fruit scone, which is a good choice but I would advise against the butter. Jam on its

own or a low-fat spread would be a better choice here.

"For lunch, Kate has a saled with ham, green salad, coleslaw and potato salad. This is a good choice but if you are watching the calories it is advisable to bulk up on the salad and have only small amounts of colesiaw and potato salad as these tend to contain lots of mayonnaise.

"Including a wholemeat roll or some bread would also increase the carbohydrate content of this

"It is great to see that Kate snacks on fruit in the afternoon, and in the evening she includes

lots of vegetables in her shepherds pie. Bulking up dishes with veg is an easy way to help you reach five a day.

"Kate heads for a walk after dinner-she tends to be more physically active when she is training but it is good to include some activity each day.

"Afterwards, Kate has a light snack of a digestive biscuit and a cup of tea. She also drinks plenty of water, which will keep her hydrated."

It's not as if the effort wasn't made. With the new inter-county re-structuring that has taken place over the past couple of years it is virtually impossible to get a run

Every inter-county championship is now based on a round-robin series. The senior championship was typically divided into two groups with the top two teams in each group advancing to the semi-finals. With only six or seven senior teams participating there was typically three games before you reached the semi-final stage.

Two years ago this system was revised. Now all teams are in one group and there are five championship games to be played before ever advancing to the

The same applies for the senior B championship.

Therefore our senior teams are out almost every fortnight from July to September. To give the squads any decent run up to these games, where they have their full compliment of players, the County board agreed where possible to give them two weeks uninterrupted

On the other side of the coin, they also have to give the clubs ample time for their inter-county players to recover before fixing their matches

The result? Cork can't get their club games played. We are hit more than most as we have 17 senior clubs. We have a first round back door system, we have inter-county teams at all levels so it's proving virtually impossible.

Once again I re-iterate the fact that while the central committee have re-structured the championships to keep players playing and the championships attractive. they are in fact doing the opposite, it's the clubs which will keep the players playing.

We can't ignore the fact that we failed to submit a Cork club team into Munster this year. That will have a knock on effect if we continue down that road.

Credit to Munster Council who were willing to give Cork an extension but central council refused.

The only solution I can see is that we will now have to begin our championships in Msy. But you will have a lot of players refusing to play because of their junior and leaving cert exams. As it is we don't play during the month of June:

It's Cashel's day of glory ... at last

Much easier than expected but for all that, a tremendous feeling of elation in the knowledge that at long last, the most earnest desire in Cashel camogie, the capture of the All-Ireland senior club trophy was achieved. Such was the reaction of the blue and gold clad players in Limerick's Gaelie Grounds on Sunday when Armagh referee Frank McDonald sounded the long whistle.

It was never a secret that Cashel yearned for this accolade, having gone to within a point back in 2001, and with ten of that side back in action on Sunday it was going to take much more than Athenry had in the tank to stop them. Alas, from the Galway side's viewpoint their tank was emptied by half time when they found themselves 0-5 to 0-7 in arrears. In a four minute spell immediately after the break Cashel lofted over four points and the easing away process had begun in earnest. It now became only a matter of what the final margin would be as the Cashel machine, beautifully oiled, proceeded to stamp its authority nail on the day's proceedings.

It was 0-12 to 0-6 after nine minutes, 0-15 to 0-6 at as a team. Philly soloed her the end of the third quarter, 1-18 to 0-6 eight minutes after that. Game well and truly over. Then, some understandable slackness set in in the Cashel defence and three points were conceded. They were only face saving scores for a wellbeaten opposition that had tried so valiantly throughout but which had come up short in terms of strength, balance and scoring know-

It's over forty years since the All-Ireland club title came to the Premier St Patrick's, County. Glengoole winning in 1965 and '66. The Cashel status of recent years clearly suggested that if this gap was ever to be breached, they would be the team to do it. And yet they entered Sunday's final as underdogs, not because of any doubts about the Tipp and Munster champions abilities but because Athenry had shocked the reigning champions St Lachtain's, Freshford in the semi final.

On Sunday they were never allowed to display

the attributes they showed then, Cashel making sure that their preparatory work had covered everything and taking the game to their rivals from the start. Peppered with county stars and All-Ireland medal winners Cashel oozed confidence and flair, their back up play superb, the deployment of their forces to meet the expected threats of the opposition very well exe-

Full back Una O'Dwyer was sent out to the centre back berth to take on Athenry's greatest threat Therese Maher. The Galway captain tried very hard but lacked support around her. Along with that, the Cashel, defence as a unit was extremely solid and the amount of ball released was a god-send to an eager and accurate attack.

The opening quarter was even enough, Cashel leading 0-3 to 0-2 at the end of it. Midfielder Philly Fogarty whose partnership with Jill Horan was highly productive then moved to the corner in a swap with Claire Grogan, the move proving to be a very valuable one, both from the viewpoint of both players and what it did for Cashel way through and ended it with a fine point. She also accepted a well delivered hand pass from Emily Hayden to add another while it took a fine save from the Athenry keeper to deprive her of a goal. Certainly, Philly was providing headaches for the Athenry defence and such would continue well into the second half when she had now moved to the full forward position.

As for Claire Grogan, she opened up to deliver lethal blows to the Athenry morale with her speed, her long deliveries and, of course, her expert free taking. Claire was an ideal support for Jill Horan's excellent running perfor-

How the second half would begin was going to be crucial. Clearly, the Cashel plan was to take control straight from the throw-in and that was exactly what happened. A Cora Hennessy point after twenty seconds and one each from Alison Lonergan, Philly Fogarty and Emily

A great day for Cashel. therefore. A great day for Tipperary camogie too and, hopefully, the catalyst that will see the Premier County back on top of the inter-county ladder very soon. Each player gave it everything on Sunday, a star studded team showing composure, flair, strength and ability in abundance. And if such as Philly

Fogarty, Sinead Millea, Claire Grogan, Cora Hennessy, Jill Horan, Una O'Dwyer, Mairead and Emily Morrissey Hayden figured more in the limelight, the remainder of the team were no less imaginative and effective in their contributions, generously bringing about an All-Ireland winning performance, truly deserving of the spoils.

What an occasion too for team manager T.J. Connolly, He had his homework done efficiently and well. Nothing was left to chance and the end result was all that could have been hoped for as Cashel, at last, reached their long desired goal.

By the second half it appeared they just did not have enough steam left to curb the fast and hungry Cashel girls who had full-forward Emily Hayden to thank for their only goal of the day in the 23rd minute of the second half when, once again, inspirational Claire Grogan was the girl on hand to pass to Hayden who smashed to the net.

With captain fantastic Sinead Millea having a great game at left half back, Jill Horan at midfield and Claire Grogan up front, it was not long before the Cashel machine made life very difficult for the Galway champions, who having defeated last year's champions St

semi-final may have thought this was going to be their year. A delighted Cashel captain Sinéad Millea was presented with the cup by Uachtarán Cumann Camogaiochta na nGael, Liz Howard.

She could not hide her happiness after the game. "It is just a great feeling, a crowning glory, I always hoped for a club All-Ireland medal and now I am just thrilled," commented the player who is the proud holder of two All-Ireland medals, National League, an All-Star, as well as Gael-Linn Interprovincial medals - all with her native Kilkenny.

A striking difference between the sides was the fact that of Athenry's total scoreline, four of their scores came from frees, while only two of Cashel's eighteen points came from frees, with two further scores coming from 45s.

There was no dispute on this occasion as to who the eventual winners would be.

Will this be the inspiration Tipperary need to become a force once again on the inter-county scene? Only time will tell.



Sunday. September 9 2007 was a red letter day for Wexford camogie as the Slaneysiders came in from the cold to claim their first All-Ireland senior title since 1975. For all associated with the team, it was a dream come true after years of frustration and disappointment.

ne of the sporting stories of 2007 was Wexford's capture of the brand new O'Duffy Cup after a 32-year lapse.

The long-awaited success sparked the biggest party the Model County has seen since the hurlers' All-Ireland triumph of 1996 and has ensured Stellah Sinnott and her magnificent team of their place in Wexford GAA folklore.

Wexford's memorable 2-7 to 1-8 victory over reigning champions Cork at Croke Park on September 9 was the realisation of a dream for the Wexford players who had given a phenomenal effort all year. The journey began in earnest last November when Stellah Sinnott, who had tasted defeat as a player in the All-Ireland finals of 1990, '92 and '94, was appointed manager in succession to Willie Carley.

Along with assistant manager Alan Aherne, selector Noel Ryan and jointtrainers Eddie Flynn and Jim Kielty. Stellah met the players for first time at Good Counsel College in New Ross on November 18. By the time Wexford faced Cork in the All-Ireland final, the players had 62 training sessions, 13 competitive games and five challenge matches behind them.

Having flattered to deceive in previous years. Wexford were determined to make their mark early and they did just that when beating Cork by a point in their opening National League game. The victory was a huge psychologist boost and gave the Wexford players the belief that they could not only compete against, but beat the best.

Both teams made it through to the final where a late Jennifer O'Leary point gave Cork a dramatic 3-8 to 2-10 victory at Nowlan Park. Unrealistic demands were placed on five of Wexford's dual players, who had lined out for the ladies football team in their National League decider the previous evening, and it certainly didn't help the camogie side's cause.

Cork looked set for victory when goals from O'Leary, Una O'Donoghue and Sile Burns in the space of five minutes propelled them into a 3-6 to 0-9 lead. But Wexford hit back with a brace of goals from Michelle Hearn to restore parity, only for O'Leary to grab the winning point in injury-time.

In the weeks before the National League final in early May, Wexford

had accounted for Dublin to win the Leinster final and, in doing so, claimed their first piece of silverware since 2004. They also beat Tipperary in a competitive fixture for the first time in 16 years with an injury-time point, a result that provided them with a further fillip ahead of the start of the All-Ireland championship.

Wexford's championship opener was a daunting trip to Ballincollig to face their National League final conquerors. Anxious to turn the tables, the Slaneysiders produced an impressive display to run out 4-12 to 0-14 winners and signal their intentions for the rest of the campaign.

The visitors never trailed after Una Leacy swooped for her first goal in the second minute and further majors from the Wexford captain and Michelle Hearn (two) had the purple and golds perched on a 4-5 to 0-7 interval lead. Cork tried to close the gap following the restart but Wexford were resilient with Sinead Kelly scoring six points, while Ursula Jacob, Brona Furlong and Michelle O'Leary also made valuable contributions.

Wexford subsequently beat Dublin (2-10 to 0-8) and Kilkenny (1-20 to 4-5) before an inexplicable late fade-out saw them lose their unbeaten record to Tipperary (0-11 to 1-17). However, a 3-13 to 0-11 victory over Galway in their final match of the round-robin series sealed their place in the semi-finals where they squared up to Galway for the second game in succession.

Once again, Stellah Sinnott's charges underlined their superiority over the Westerners with an emphatic 2-18 to 0-14 victory at Nowlan Park. Midfielder Kate Kelly scored 1-11 in a player of the match performance as the Model girls secured their place in the final for the first time since 1994.


The St. Ibar's-Shelmalier player netted midway through the first half and this score, combined with Michelle Hearne's earlier goal, had Wexford ahead by 2-3 to 0-5 after 23 minutes. But Galway finished the half with a flurry of points from Anne-Marie Hayes, Lourda Kavanagh, Veronica Curtin and Jessica Gill to trail by 0-11 to 2-7 at the break.

However, Wexford took control in the second half thanks largely to the efforts of Kelly, Ursula Jacob, Rose-Marie Breen and substitute Brona Furlong. Kelly added six more points, while Una Leacy was unlucky not to score a third goal when her shot rebounded from the upright four minutes from the end.

Wexford went into the All-Ireland final as underdogs, but proving that their earlier victory over the three-in-a-row chasing Rebels was no fluke, they reached the Promised Land with a stunning victory. Showing few nerves on what was their first Croke Park appearance in 13 years, they led from start to finish and survived six minutes of injury-time to become All-Ireland champions for only the fourth time.

The challengers set the pace with a fourth minute goal from the younger Leacy, Una, and a second from the same player 11 minutes later. Thereafter, Cork were always chasing the game and their forwards were never allowed any time on the ball by an heroic Wexford defence, which was superbly marshalled by centre back and team captain Mary Leacy.

Wexford's early goals were effectively the winning of the


game for them. From their first attack, Una Leacy latched onto a long delivery and sent an unstoppable shot past Aoife Murray in the Cork goal.

Kate Kelly and Emer Dillon traded points before Leacy struck for a second time when she smartly hand passed beyond Murray on the quarter-hour mark. Cork had just two points on the board by the 22nd minute and they could only muster one more before half-time as Wexford went into the break leading by five.



It was entirely fitting that Oulart-The-Ballagh's Mary Leacy should skipper the Slaneysiders to their long-awaited success as her mother Margaret (formerly O'Leary) was on the last Wexford team to savour O'Duffy Cup glory in 1975. It was appropriate too that Mary's younger sister Una

Paying tribute to Stellah Sinnott, the Wexford captain added: "Because she was there herself, it just means so much to her. Everyone in that team would die for Stellah." And she certainly wasn't exaggerating!

Briege Corkery, who had a tremendous game in defeat, produced some rousing play in the Cork midfield in an attempt to lift her colleagues and full forward Orla Cotter took the cue as she came out deep to gather possession and float over an impressive point.

Worryingly for Cork, it was their first score in some 25 minutes and only their third point of the entire first half. The Wexford full back line of Noeleen Lambert, Catherine O'Loughlin and Avis Nolan had a tremendous first half-hour and the underdogs were full value for their five-point interval cushion.

Gemma O'Connor raised Cork spirits with the first score of the second half and Ursula Jacob replied with a rasping drive from close range after being set up by the ever-dangerous Kelly. The Rebelettes still had no answer to the considerable menace being wreaked by Wexford's No.8.

Seven minutes into the second half. Cork were back in the match when Ballygarvan girl Emer Dillon drove emphatically to the net. A low ball from Sile Burns evaded Nolan as Dillon turned and the Cork No.13 found herself with just goalkeeper Mags D'Arcy to beat.

The result was conclusive as Dillon - Player of the Match in the 2005 decider - made no mistake.

Rosemary Breen and Angela Walsh swapped points and there

were two points between the sides with 40 minutes of the hour played: 2-4 to 1-5.

Cork were much more competitive than they had been in the first half and O'Connor landed another point from distance after a breath-taking spell of intense, frenetic camogie. Leacy almost got in for her third goal but this time her shot was blocked magnificently by Cork full back Caitriona Foley.

Joanne O'Callaghan, who had switched corners to deal with the threat posed by Leacy, did well to repel the next Wexford attack and the Model County had a lucky escape when the ball squirmed across the face of their goal to safety in the 48th minute.

The pressure from Cork was relentless now but O'Connor fired wide from out around the middle after great work from Amanda O'Regan and Walsh. The Leesiders continued to press for a leveller but they were restricted to shots from distance and the all-important score was not forthcoming.

It was Kate Kelly who lifted the siege with a lovely Wexford score seven minutes from time and Ursula Jacob followed up almost immediately with a fine score from an acute angle on the left. Suddenly, Wexford were three points to the good, 2-6 to 1-6, and the holders were hanging on by a thread.

When you're a goal ahead bidding for a first All-Ireland in 32 years, the last thing you want to hear is that there will be four minutes of injury time – but that's exactly what happened Wexford.

D'Arcy made a fine save to deny Cotter in the last minute of normal time and Cork didn't manage another attack until Corkery ran at the heart of the Wexford defence and took her point in the 64th minute.

With that, Cork's three-in-a-row bid was over as Wexford held on for a remarkable, historic victory.

A fifth point from Commane eased Clare ahead in injury time and another point from the same player then left two between the sides.






What is the most important skill?

Coach O'Driscoll not interested in top job

CORK: Camogie coach Fiona O'Driscoll has ruled herself out of the race to replace manager John Cronin, who stepped down after the All-Ireland final loss to Wexford.

Said O'Driscoll: "There had been some talk around the county of me taking on the role but I can say now that I definitely won't be in charge for next year's

> "There's a county board meeting scheduled for sometime next week and there should be a decision made around then. I'm not really concerned about

Fiona O'Driscoll: won't be in charge next year. who gets the job because I know there are plenty of talented people out there who can take the county forward."

Cronin was one of Cork's most successful managers, leading the Rebels to All-Ireland titles in 2005 and 2006. The farmer from Cloughduv guided the county to five All-Ireland minor titles from 1998 to 2003 before his step up to the senior side but sees now as the right time to leave. "I've been around for almost 10 years and I think it's best for things to be freshened up. Nobody wants to hear the same voice at training and matches every week, that'd leave things very stale."

"We all feel now is the perfect time for an injection of something new and it leaves things very exciting for the future of Cork Camogie," said Cronin. "I'm very proud of what I've achieved and proud of the girls I've worked with."





ALL-IRELAND TITLES FOR CASHEL AND HARPS

The All-Ireland club senior and junior titles wound their way to Cashel of Tipperary and Harps of Laois after two thrilling finals in November.

Cashel backboned by eight senior All-Ireland medal holders became All-Ireland club champions for the first time in their history when they defeated Athenry of Galway 1-18 to 0-9 in the Gaelic Grounds, Limerick.

The Bill Carroll Cup has not rested in the Premier County since St. Patrick's Drumgoole made it back to back victories in 1965 and 1966 and ironically then the Tipperary ladies had to call on a Kilkenny intercounty player Ann Carroll to assist them in their victory, while Cashel's captain Sinead Millea also played with the Black and Amber!

There was no doubt about the outcome of this final in the Gaelic Grounds as the Cashel back room team had their home work done already and smartly moved player of the match and 2007 All-Star, Philly Fogarty from midfield to corner forward, a move that allowed Tipperary's only other All-Star of 2007. Claire Grogan to move out to midfield where she played very effectively between the half forwards and midfield area.

Athenry, who were seeking their second ever title and their first since 1977 tried hard, but their captain and Galway senior star Therese Maher very soon was given little room when Una O'Dwyer moved from her starting position of full-back to centre back to curb the classy Maher. It worked, the Galway player was held scoreless.

However, the opening half saw the Connacht champions give it their all as they just trailed by two points at the break. 0-5 to Cashel's 0-7. By the second half it appeared they just did not have enough steam left to curb the fast and hungry Cashel girls who had full-forward Emily Hayden to thank for their only goal of the day in the 23rd minute of the second half when once again inspirational Claire Grogan was the girl on hand to pass to Hayden who smashed to the net.

With captain fantastic Sinéad Millea having a great game at left half back, Jill Horan at midfield and Claire Grogan upfront it was not long before the Cashel machine made life very difficult for the Galway champions who having defeated last year's champions St. Lachtain's of Kilkenny in the semi-final may have thought this was going to be their year, but a delighted Cashel captain Sinéad Millea, could not hide her happiness after the game " it is just a great feeling, a crowning glory, I always hoped for a club All-Ireland medal and now I am just thrilled" commented the player who is the proud holder of 2 All-Ireland medals, National League, An All-Star, as well as Gael-Linn Interprovincial medals all with her native Kilkenny.

A striking difference between the sides was the fact that of Athenry's total scoreline, four of their scores came from frees, while only two of Cashel's eighteen points came from frees, with two further scores coming from '45's. There was no dispute on this occasion as to who would the eventual winners would be and so the Cashel can rock the night away. Athenry will have to come again and no better person than Manager Midge Glynn, (nee Poniard) who was on the winning All-Ireland team of 1977 to rally the troops again.

Then the Ulster champions stepped up the gears and were 1-4 to 0-1 up after a 16th minute goal from Colette Mc Keever, However, Harps were not prepared to loose their title without a fight and within the final five minutes of the opening half sent over 1-4 to put them marginally ahead at the break, 1-5 to Keady's 1-4, the goal having come >from full-forward Elaine Mahony two minutes from the whistle.

The same player stung the Keady

girls with her second goal just two minutes into the restart to put Harps ahead 2-5 to Keady's 1-4. Both sides exchanged further scores before Michelle Murphy got the final touch to Keady's second goal of the day, to leave just two points in the difference, Harps 2-7, Keady 2-5. Both sides played defensively, especially Keady, where captain Michelle Murray was very accurate with fine long clearances, especially in the opening half.

THE curtain comes down on the Evening Echo Junior A championship on Sunday.

All-ireland finals in two codes, draws, section play-offs and semi-final draws all conspired to push the final back, but it's finally arrived and no doubt their will be sighs of relief in both camps come Sunday evening, barring of course the dreaded draw!

They beat Clon again, with a brilliant Denise Cronin proving vital, and then Tracton to secure a semi date with Fr O'Neill's.

The first game was a dour low-scoring draw where Ballincollig missed a host of chances and a number of scoreable frees, but in the replay they bounced back from conceding two early goals with a great second-half display. Ashley Lovett struck over some sweet scores and beat Newtown but lost to drilled home a goal, while Killeagh and Tracton and Leah Weste dominated from

six-point deficit into a 2-6 to 2-2 win.

It's a huge achievement for the club given they decided to step up from junior B to improve their players. This, as well as Muskerry's senior county win in which four of their players started with five more on the bench, has worked a treat and they're a far better side than they were at the start of the summer.

Leah Weste, Tina O'Donnell Cronin, Maria Denise O'Donoghue and Brea O'Callaghan are excellent performers who have gained plenty of experience at intercounty and colleges levels.

After years of success at enior, camogie in Killeagh fell into decline and they re-graded to junior B but took that championship title in 2002 and have been a force at junior A for a few of years.

The injury to senior intercounty player Mary O'Connor is a huge blow but they still have the players for the big occasion. Cork senior Angela Walsh, Ciara Walsh, Anne Marie Walsh, Clare Keohane and Amy O'Shea are all experienced campaigners. They have a nice blend of youth and experience and they will not be overawed by the occasion, though they may be quite

tired after a long season which included an All-Ireland club football appearance with Inch.

Killeagh have been there before, look stronger (their physicality could be factor if the conditions are poor) and as favourites may just shade it. However Ballincollig in the words of their coach "have the heart to win it". ATHLETICS

David Gillick Early this year, he ran 45.91 in Dusseldorf, becoming world leader over 400 metres 684 indoors and in March he went to the European Championships in Birminghám where he won the final in a sensational 45.52. In August, he went to the World Championships in Osaka where he ran the second and third fastest times of his career to get through to the semi-finals.

BOXING

Katie Taylor world champion, two Amonths ago the Bray. Co Wicklow boxer won her third European title. Fighting at lightweight and weighing in at 60 kilograms, she is so far ahead of the opposition that she can be considered one of the best pound-forpound fighters in the world. In her four fights in Denmark where she won the European crown, she conceded only four points while amassing a total of 49. In the final, she led 8-0 the first round, and when the referee stopped the fight midway through the second round, Katie led 15-0.

CRICKET



TRIBUTE TO MICHAEL KENNEDY

On September 13th 2007,
Michael Kennedy, passed
unexpectedly to his eternal reward.
The man from Banogues,
Castleblakney, was the father
figure behind the birth,
development and success story that
became the Pearses camogie club.
Sean Walsh, his son in law, pays
this tribute.

Strange how all the good people are plucked while in their prime. Mike Kennedy would certainly fall into the category of only the good die young. The gentle giant from Kilchreest left an indelible mark on all who met him, and particularly on the people of Banogues, Castleblakney and Pearses. After his work as a machine driver brought him to the Mountbellew and Ballymacward areas in 1962, he bravely delved into the world of camogie and set up the Pearses camogie club.

His achievements were many. Success at u-10 & u-12 levels was the prelude to Pearses' All-Ireland Feile success in 1988, and an appearance in the 1989 final. The first county senior title arrived in 1992 and then onto the dizzy heights of 5 All-Ireland senior club titles, incorporating a 2 in a row (1996 & 1997) and a 3 in a row (2000, 2001, 2002). Names like Sharon Glynn, Tracey Laheen, Aine Hillary, Martina Haverty, Martina Harkin, Anne Ryan and Carmel Hannon, to name but a few, became household names along the way.

Mike also managed Galway and Connacht teams. Fittingly, he was chairperson of the County Camogie Board when, under manager Tony Ward, Galway won their historic first All-Ireland senior title. A picture taken with Captain Imelda Hobbins and the O'Duffy cup sticks in the memory as a unique moment.

Mike was a great administrator, with his wisdom and knowledge being frequently sought. He served on the Galway County Board, the Connacht Council, and had involvement at national level. He more often than not championed the cause of the smaller club and the weaker county. They never forgot him for it either. One of his later feats was the establishment of the North Board which provided competition to help the development of various clubs on his own doorstep. Typical of the man.

Often you wonder about the difference between achievement and impact. People often achieve a lot in life, but did they have an impact? At times other people make an impact, but achieve little. Mike managed to marry both and his impact was more significant.

The many people whom he came into contact with would bear testimony to this. So many grown men cried when they heard of Mike's shock passing. Often there is a special bond between teams and managements that


taste success at the highest level. But the bond between Mike and "his women" seemed even more unique. The players respected, admired, trusted and believed in Mike and he reciprocated this. The scenes at his funeral spoke volumes. The grief, sorrow and genuine sense of loss expressed by the Pearses club players and members smacked of losing a hero, and their mentor. They gave him a "send off" at his funeral fitting of the man. They can be forever proud of that. Mike Kennedy had indeed made a profound impact. Typical of the man, he eased away from management at the highest level and had spent the latter years back with the Pearses underage section, cajoling, praising and imbuing the stars of the future with the foundations they needed. He had gone full circle. The looks of anguish and tears in the eyes of many of his young protégés at his removal spoke volumes. They too felt the

For the purposes of this tribute we concentrate on the sporting aspect of Mike's life, but there were so many other strands to his life. One significant one was his work. He built up a successful garage business, developing it the hard way to such an extent that it became a fundamental part of the community it served. It would only be fitting to remember the many people who passed through the gates of the garage and who became friendly, and in many cases friends for life, with the man that always seemed able to solve any mechanical problems.

The stories about the genial giant with the silver in his hair are many. It is alleged that the bank was never broken in the quest for success, and that ONE old nuri sliothar was repeatedly produced in training during the glory years, with the mantra "mind the nuri". Thus when the players got a new ball in a game, their striking and control improved dramatically it is alleged! Sounds good anyway!

Memories of taking a particularly heavy championship beating from the then kingpins Glenamaddy in the late 1980s were often recalled. After the trimming on the field, Pearses had to watch in anguish as Glenamaddy went on to train afterwards. When questioned on it Mike responded that maybe someday the wheel would turn. It surely did. Kennedy's car packed with camogie players, the "Gone to a match" sign up on the garage door and the pen writing down the scores of the game on a spare hurl were all part of the Kennedy package. Only last January, Pearses had a function to honour their All-Ireland wins of 1996 and 1997. All of the players and management got a warm reception as they were introduced. There wasn't a chance to introduce the manager though. When it came to Mike's turn to step forward for his presentation, the crowd spontaneously burst into applause and gave him a standing ovation. It was a telling display of the esteem in which Mr. Camogie was held by his own people.

On a personal level, he often approached



me to see if I could give a mention, as he termed it, via the airwaves to many and various camogie activities. He well appreciated that camogie rarely got the exposure it deserved, but instead of lamenting that fact, he operated on the basis that any publicity was a bonus. His devotion to the game was such that you could get a missile on happenings in the Connacht Council or in his beloved North Board as easily as some information about Pearses. In truth it was hard to refuse any request from him, and that was despite the obvious connections.

Mike Kennedy was a gentleman. A man whose very presence lit up a room, he was clever, sincere and unassuming, preferring the shadows rather than the limelight. He always saw good in everyone, everything and in every situation. Nothing was ever a problem. Invariably there was a smile on his face, and in many ways he was ahead of his time. His love of camogie, hurling, sport, his work, his friends, his neighbours, comedy films and a good meal served him well, Above all though, his wife - you never saw Mike without Mary - and family were the apple of his eye, his whole existence revolving around them. No wonder their loss is so great. It is not easy to give up something so special.

A wise man once said that you will be judged by what you leave behind you. Well Mike Kennedy has left a rich legacy after him. A true legend. He has left his imprint on many of his grandchildren. His heartbroken wife of 43 years Mary, daughters Collette. Ann. Maura and Nuala, sister Myra and brother Sean, along with all of the extended family and his wide circle of friends will forever cherish the fond memories they got to share with a special man.


His presence will never leave them. A LIGHT was shone into the wondrous world of Clare camogie last week. The size of the crowd that turned up for the 2007 convention at the Auburn Lodge Hotel would suggest that camogie in the county isn't short of woman or man power.

However the scenes which followed didn't reflect that promise. First off it emerged that Clarecastle's Bernie Ryan, who had allowed his name to go forward for the position of chairman, wasn't at the meeting. He had, however, forwarded a letter to the county board stating that he couldn't be in two places at once. He had committed a while back to travelling out of the country and couldn't change his plans. It didn't seem like a big ask; camogie people know Bernie Ryan and a contest for the chair would have done no harm surely?

Amidst a blur of confusion it was decided that because Ryan wasn't there he couldn't stand. This despite the fact that Clarecastle delegate Mike Griffin told the meeting that he had consulted with camogie Ard Comhairle and they had said that Ryan could stand for the post even if he wasn't present at the meeting.

Good enough for those who run camogie in Ireland but not good enough for the Clare camogie board.

Maura Sheedy told the meeting that she had considered not attending and that she had received a number of unwanted, camogie related, phone calls.

She decided, however, to remain in the chair and is in place for the coming year. Although the chairperson sent out mixed signals regarding the possibility of Bernie Ryan challenging her, at least she possesses the strength of character required to sit in the chair again.

If she really wanted out Maura Sheedy could have stepped down but she insisted that Bernie Ryan couldn't stand because, "this is the rule within our own board." However she later admitted that "there isn't a by-law."

Confusion escalated. It doesn't exactly augur positively for Clare camogie. If the AGM night is up in the air, it's hard to see the organisation in Clare running smoothly on the field.

As the minutes added up to long hours, debate raged. Fifty nine motions found their way onto the agenda. The first motion wasn't discussed until about 10pm and the thought that 58 more of them were to be discussed at length couldn't have enthused all but the most hard-core of the gathering.

Indeed, many of the motions should never have made the agenda as they were clearly issues that need to be examined by a structures committee. Furthermore a sizeable proportion of motions were narrow in the sense that they applied to the welfare of individual clubs and had nothing to do with the development of camogic in Clare.

Maura Sheedy touched on the divisions that will continue to scupper camogie in Clare when she told the meeting that "we are not working together."

That definitely appears to be true. Treasurer Michael Maher addressed the funding deficit in Clare camogie and his point is a valid one. Unless the county board provides clear and authoritative leadership, the sport in Clare will flounder.

Of course, if the county board step up to the mark, clubs will have us follow their lead. At the moment it seems that clubs are preoccupied with their own concerns and not with the broad development of Clare camogie. DEC. 2007

Maura back at the helm once more

FOLLOWING a protracted, emotional and often heated Clare Camogie Convention last Thursday evening in the Auburn Lodge Hotel, outgoing chairperson Maura Sheedy was returned as the premier board officer.

Bernie Ryan (Clarecastle) and current PRO Orla Considine were also nominated for the position of chairperson. However, Orla Considine withdrew, while Bernie Ryan informed the meeting via a letter that he was willing to stand.

The letter had been submitted to the Clare camogie board in advance of the meeting and explained that Ryan was unavoidably abroad but was interested in contesting the post.

However, Maura Sheedy cast

doubt as to whether Ryan could stand for the position or not, given that he wasn't present at the meeting.

A number of delegates claimed that a county board bylaw indicated that a candidate had to be present in order to stand for a position. However, Maura Sheedy indicated that no such bylaw existed.

"There isn't a bylaw," she said.
"This is the rule within our own board. You must be present to take part in the vote," the chairperson explained.

Clarecastle delegate and club chairman Mike Griffin outlined how he had checked with camogie Ard Comhairle in Croke Park and that they had indicated that Bernie Ryan could stand, while the outgoing committee could "see out the meeting". In reply, Maura Sheedy said that she was "just going by the rules of what we have done in Clare".

"I'm going on what we have done here over the years," she added.

Earlier in the debate, the chairperson had asked the meeting for direction on the issue.

"If this meeting wants him (Bernie Ryan) to go forward, he can. What does the meeting want?" she queried.

During the debate, Maura Sheedy told the meeting that she "very nearly" had decided not to attend at all.

"What has gone on in the county with phone calls that I've had is absolutely unreal," she said.

"All we have here is clubs coming in here with their own agenda," the chairperson had said earlier. She claimed that conflict had stalked the Clare camogie board "from last June to last night. I don't want to be here," she stated.

The chairperson also claimed that she had been "stabbed in the back", before adding that she "had fully intended not standing".

Maura Sheedy advised the meeting not to be "in any rush to get me in here".

However, having been proposed from the floor by Kevin Halpin (Newmarket on Fergus) and seconded by Michelle Mahon (Éire Óg), the outgoing chairperson accepted the role.

"I will see it as far as I can," she promised.

Board secretary raises fixtures issue

CLARE Camogie Board Secretary Mary Hogan has raised the issue of girls playing too many games for club and county, which leads to fixture difficulties. She made her comment in her secretary's report to the camogie convention.

"The board had extreme difficulty in getting the fixture programme completed," Mary Hogan admitted. "The extra games associated with the All-Ireland competitions at all grades is putting huge pressure on counties trying to get their club competitions played," she added.

The question of camogie players suffering from burnout was also addressed in the secretary's report. "This can be made even more difficult where girls are playing two or even three games for their club, as well as representing their county and at the same time playing football," she pointed out, "It can be near impossible to make fixtures that ensure players have reasonable time between games."

In her report, Mary Hogan reflected upon the hard luck of the Clare junior camogie team in Croke Park, when they lost the All-Ireland final to an injury-time Derry goal.

"Hopefully the girls will bounce back next year, more determined than ever to win that elusive title," she said, may be the said.

She also made reference to the fact that the Clare U-14 development squad lined out in Croke Park. "The excitement and awe in their voices as they spoke of actually getting to play in Croke Park.

In conclusion, Mary Hogan paid tribute to her fellow officers, field caretakers, referees and sponsors who had helped Clare camogie during 2007.

Clubs urged to raise more funds

THE Clare Camogie County Board balance at the end of 2007 is €10,577.60. Income for the year amounted to €62,245.27, while total expenses for the 12 month period were €57,372.36.

The biggest expense was 'food for teams'. This figure amounted to €13,806, while €12,675 was spent on travel expenses for teams going to games.

On the income front, €17,527 was collected in gate receipts, while the fundraising dog night resulted in a profit of €7,020 and the annual flag day resulted in a total of €3,999 being collected.

Having distributed his report to delegates, treasurer Michael Maher pointed out that there were no expenses available for managers of the various Clare camogie teams. They had to give of their time completely voluntarily and weren't supplied with petrol expenses.

He pressed clubs to be more proactive on the fundraising front and asked parents if they were happy that their daughters weren't as well looked after as their sons were, in terms of representing Clare.

"What are people doing about it? What are you doing about it?" he asked.

He also mentioned the player grants, which male inter-county hurlers and footballers are due to receive. "There wasn't a word about camogie or ladies football," the treasurer noted. "I want a bit of equality for everybody that's involved in the GAA. We haven't got equality," he said.

Michael Maher also noted that despite the fact that he has been integration officer in Clare for 14 months, he has never once attended a meeting dealing with the issue of integration.

"There was no meeting held," he explained.
"They (GAA) would have had to fork out some money," he stated.

The board treasurer thanked Clare GAA Secretary Pat Fitzgerald for his co-operation throughout the year. "Only for Pat Fitzgerald, Clare camogie would be non-existent in the GAA," Maher said with reference to the provision of venues for camogie fixtures.

However, he repeated his view that Clare camogie must improve its fundraising structure. "I think it's time that people with a bit of influence cop onto this. What I'm after presenting here is not the way forward," he said pointing out that raffles and various collections were not modern fundraising methods.

Camogie board to work on Ballyline facilities?

CLARE GAA may fund the Clare Camogie County Board's voluntary improvement works at the GAA's pitch in Ballyline, Crusheen.

Camogie treasurer Michael Maher told last week's county convention that the camogie board had access to Ballyline once the GAA teams are finished their physical training programmes there. However, he admitted that the condition of the dressing rooms and shower areas in Ballyline are unacceptable. "If you don't go in and do a bit of remedial work there, it's very hard to use it," he said. "I'd love to be in a position to say we'll spend x amount of money to do it up."

However, Munster Camogie Development Officer Deirdre Murphy informed the meeting that she was confident that the GAA county board would help to fund improvement works if the camogie board did the work. "The thought of the facilities there is what puts people off because the surface is quite good during the summer months," she commented.

Criticism for clubs who didn't sell tickets

CLUBS who didn't contribute in any way to the Clare Camogie Night at the Dogs were heavily criticised at last week's Clare Camogie Convention

While the fundraising meeting, which was held at the Galway Greyhound Track last summer, realised a profit of €7,020, treasurer Michael Maher was disappointed at the lack of effort from some Clare clubs. "Some of the clubs failed to function," he said. "There's nothing new in that," the treasurer added.

However, Michael Maher thanked the clubs who had sold tickets for the fundraising night but pointed out that he had hoped to make a profit of €10,000.

"I'm very disappointed with some of the bigger clubs that just do nothing," he noted.

Kilmaley Camogie topped the list of ticket sellers with a total of 89, while Clooney sold 50 tickets.

Éire Óg sold 39 tickets, Corofin, Kilkishen and Kilnamona sold 30, Ogonnelloe sold 26, Newmarket sold 24 and Broadford sold 23 tickets. Inagh sold 21 tickets, while Ballyea, Clarecastle, Killanena, St Joseph's and Tulla sold 20 tickets apiece.

However, Sixmilebridge, Wolfe Tones, Bodyke, Scariff, Whitegate and Parteen did not sell any tickets.

A total of 553 tickets were sold, with €2,000 distributed in prize money, while the cost of hiring the track also amounted to €2,000 and printing and phone costs amounted to €600.

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Camogie also adds greatly to our list of sporting connections, Mamie Kenneally who was on the Cork team which won its first All-Ireland was a member of the famous Barrs family of that name and her brother Johnny, while still a minor, hurled magnificently on the Cork team which defeated Kilkenny in the 1929 senior final having had earlier been withdrawn from the minor curtain raiser. Maureen and Pattie Hegarty were the first twins to win All-Ireland Camogie medals

when Cork defeated Dublin in 1941 and some years earlier the Cotters of Mayfield, Joan and Kitty, became the first sisters to win those coveted medals. Mary Fitzgerald a winner of three medals (1939-41) was a granddaughter of Sir Edward Fitzgerald and her father Andy, a Rockies stalwart, played with Cork in the 1912 final. She was also a sister-in-law of Peggy Hogg who won four medals. In modern times the glorious camogie exploits of the Dunleas, Lyn and Stephanie are still fresh in memory. Marion McCarthy who has more Duffy Cup medals (8) than any other Leesider is sister of Seanie who starred on the Cork side which completed the first leg of the historic double in 1990 — where would I be without 'Mary Moran's Cork Camogie Story'! Cork's all conquering Ladies Football team currently has three sets of sisters on the panel, Norita and Mairéad Kelly of Rockchapel. Deirdre and Sinead O'Reilly and Angela and Ciara Walsh of Inch Rovers. Between them they have

ended his career as second highest goal scorer (182 goals) in the history of Irish soccer. Jackie actually won four League Championship medals with Waterford. Pat, who played 16 times with the League and was PFA & PFAI Player of the Year, won a League medal with Cork City and a Cup medal when Shels defeated Derry in 1996. Basketball fans are never likely to forget the immense contribution "the Flying Forde's" Miriam. Caroline and Annette made to the game in Cork after their arrival in Blarney. The Tipperary natives were revered in their adopted county and had their names etched in sporting history. Miriam went on to win over 120 internationals, a record unlikely ever to be surpassed. Regularly in the news are the Scannell family of Team Montonotte / Glanmire who won u18, u20 and National Senior Cups in 2007. Jessica played on all three teams and her father Mark, a former International and winner of three National Leagues in his

accumulated 18 senior All-Irelands. Angela is a Volleyball International and along with Ciara has won All-Ireland medals in cross country and track with Glenbower AC Ladies All-Star forward Nollaig Cleary who is also a National Cup winner in Basketball is brother of John Cleary who starred on the Cork teams which won back-to-back titles defeating Mayo and Meath in 1989 & '90 Hurling All-Star Sean O'Leary, holder of four Senior hurling medals, heads another distinguished family; he inherited the skills of his grandfather Tom O'Mahony who excelled when Cork (Dungourney) beat Dublin and London in 1902; Seanie's son Tomás is a rugby international and sister Mary a former camogie great. Cork's Interprovincial Camogie star Joan Clancy married Jack Morley who has won every honour in League of Ireland soccer except an FAI Cup medal. Children Pat, Dave and Sheena have all represented Cork. Sheena followed in her mother's footsteps while Pat an Inter League player like his dad

The Kelly family are synonymous with refereeing in Cork; Tim was a League of Ireland referee in the 60s and his son Pat, now manager of referees in the FAI, used his father's whistle when commencing his own glittering career which saw him take charge of FIFA Internationals and FAI Cup finals, accolades also attained by his son, third generation, Alan who has now been joined on the National League panel by brother Graham who was recently given charge of Ireland v Chile U19 international

id you know that former Inter League goalie Derry Barrett refereed the Texaco Cup (All-Ireland) final and his assistants were his nephews Kevin O'Sullivan and Noel Kearney.

Kevin and Derry refereed FAI Cup finals as well as European Internationals. Derry's brother Noel played in the League with

Cork Utd. Noel Kearney's brother Barry was also a knight of the whistle as was Kevin's brother-in-law Jerry McGrath. John, Mick, Frank and Joe O'Keeffe from Evergreen Street all were popular referees. Mick, known by the fans as Slap, took up the whistle after a very successful playing career with Evergreen/Cork Celtic and his son Mick played with Cork City and Cobh. They were not related to the other sporting family of the same name who lived on Evergreen Road — Rooker O'Keeffe a great Redmonds player who won All-Irelands with Cork in 1902 and '03 and his son Jimmux who played in the League of Ireland in the lean thirties.

Gene Cifford, who was forced to curtail a promising career with Celtic, was delighted when son Mark got to play with Cork City, Waterford and Ramblers. He was a nephew of Johnnie Clifford and Ray Cowhie. Johnnie was immortalised in 1954 when he scored the winning goal in the all-Ireland final against Wexford which gave Christy Ring

his eighth medal and in later years had the honour of helping Cork to further All-Ireland glory as a selector in '77 and coach in '86. Ray Cowhie was wing half on the classy Cork Celtic team of the sixties and was on the bench when Ireland played mighty England in 1964; his son Kevin went on to play senior football with Cork and was superb when Nemo hammered Castlebar in the All-Ireland Club final in 1994. Cobh's great sporting fame has been embellished through its association with legends like Jack Doyle, Sonia O'Sullivan and Roy Keane. It has always been a traditional soccer stronghold and from its earliest days family continuity has been maintained. Irish international Jack O'Sullivan of Spike captained Fordsons in 1926 and his son Jerry, though a useful soccer player, was a prominent Rugby Inter Pro with Munster. Tom Burke, Jackie O'Reilly, Johnny McGowan, Pat Saward, and Stephen Ireland were others born

CASHEL HIT THE JACKPOT IN '07

Having knocked loudly on the door since the turn of the millennium, Cashel finally came good on their promise in 2007 by claiming the All-Ireland senior club camogie championship. Hogan Stand visited the Tipperary camogie stronghold to investigate a historic breakthrough.

Tipperary and Munster champions Cashel made 2007
a year to remember when they captured the AllIreland senior club camogie championship with a
stunning victory over Athenry in Limerick on Sunday
November 18.

Backboned by eight All-Ireland intercounty medallists, including Emily Hayden, Una O'Dwyer, Philly Fogarty, Cora Hennessy and Sinead Milea, Cashel became All-Ireland club champions for the first time by virtue of an emphatic 1-18 to 0-9 win against highly-rated Galway opposition.

Indeed, Athenry were many people's favourites to win the national decider. They had eliminated holders St Lachtain's of Kilkenny at the semi-final stage and had previous experience of annexing the All-Ireland – albeit 30 years earlier. They also included in their ranks the prodigious talent of Connacht Young Player of the Year Jessica Gill as well as the deadly Therese Maher. But Cashel were not to be denied their moment...

There was a real sense of history to the breakthrough as the Bill Carroll Cup hadn't forayed into the Premier County since 1966, when St Patrick's of Drumgoole completed back-to-back victories. Having won a third successive provincial title, Cashel progressed to their second-ever All-Ireland final, having lost to Pearses of Galway in 2001. While they were confident and well prepared, one couldn't have blamed the Cashel girls if they'd been a little apprehensive in the run-up to the big game. After all, finals can be notoriously fickle affairs and the occasion brought incredible pressure bearing down on their young shoulders.

However, on the biggest day of all, the players produced an exceptional display. There was never any doubt about the outcome at the Gaelic Grounds as the Tipp and Munster queenpins bounced back from their All-Ireland semi-final defeats of 2005 and '06 with a devastating performance.

The Cashel backroom team had their homework done, cleverly re-locating Player of the Match and 2007 All Star Philly Fogarty from midfield to corner forward in the second half, a tactical switch that allowed Tipperary's other '07 All Star Claire Grogan to move out the field, where she exerted a big influence between the half forward and midfield sectors during a viral period.

Another key switch saw Una O'Dwyer moved from full back to centre back to curb dangerous Galway senior star Therese Maher, who was held scoreless. The opening exchanges were tentative and Cashel led by two points at the interval, 0-7 to 0-5. They turned the screw thereafter and Emily Hayden's goal 23 minutes after the resumption effectively sealed Athenry's fate.

The outstanding Grogan provided the assist for the game's

only goal and Cashel were also well served by captain and Kilkenny native Sinéad Millea at left half back and Jill Horan at midfield, though it is unfair to single out individual efforts as the team produced a solid and comprehensive team display from whistle to whistle. The fact that 14 of the winners' 18 scores came from open play tells us just about all we need to know about what was a stellar display in the depths of winter.

Anne Moloney has acted as secretary of the Cashel camogie club for the past 22 years. She got involved when her daughter Kaiffe (O'Connell), who was on the All-Ireland winning panel, started to line out for the club. She has given sterling service, also acting as a selector on the all-conquering team last year. Reflecting on the '07 triumph, she admits that it was a relief to finally see the door open after Cashel had knocked for so long:

"We felt we should have won an All-Ireland in the past three or four year but things just didn't go our way, so we were delighted to finally get one in the bag. We've been waiting so long we thought it would never happen. The All-Ireland was the icing on the cake."


With 14 county titles to their credit inside 20 years, as well as five Munster championships, Cashel were desperate to land the biggest prize of all. With TJ Connolly at the helm and the triumvirate of Mickey Browne, Michael Lawrence and Anne Moloney alongside him on the sidelines, they rallied in '07 to put those heartbreaking defeats to Freshford and Davitt's in 2006 and '05 respectively behind them.

Considering that traditionally Cashel didn't have a particularly good record against Galway teams, the conviction exhibited by the players in the All-Ireland final was worthy of nothing but the highest praise. "We felt we should have beaten Freshford in 2006 and we went into last year's competition determined to make amends," Anne continues. "We knew Athenry would be tough but we were ready.

"The girls played very well in the semi-final against O'Donovan Rossa of Antrim in Newry. That was our hardest game of the year and O'Donovan Rossa were our toughest opposition. I'm sure they can win an All-Ireland in the next couple of years if they stick together - but we wanted it this year."

A panel of 25 players got together in March and participated in over 60 training sessions between then and the All-Ireland final in mid-November. This represents massive commitment from a special crop of girls. "They showed great commitment," Anne confirms. "They are a great panel to train and always have been. And they are all young enough to win another All-Ireland, so hopefully there's more success to come."

After completing another three-in-a-row of county titles with victory over the Duharra amalgamation, Cashel were trailing in the provincial final with six minutes to go but

staged a dramatic late revival to eclipse Killeady (Limerick) on a 3-16 to 1-10 scoreline. That was the first sign of the awesome character that would see history made in true Cashel style.



Though their ultimate goal, a remarkable three-in-a-row, was a bridge too far against a hungry Wexford, it was a still a decent enough year for Cork camogie.

Cork became National Senior Division 1A League Champions after three highly competitive games in just eight days at the start of the summer. Having drawn with Tipperary in the semi-final and winning the replay four days later they had just 90 hours to recover before meeting Wexford in the final in Nowlan Park on May 6th. Trailing by five points at half-time. Cork turned around a six-point deficit ten minutes into the second half to clinch the winner two minutes into injury time in a game that had the large crowd on the edge of its seat.

Based on Cork's league victory over Wexford in the league final, it was always going to be hard to achieve the same result against a side who felt they had left league honours behind them. There were some pluses - Sile Burns who had come back into the side for the 2007 campaign continued to impress while Emer Dillon's sharpness was improving. Cork took the game 1-10 to 0-8.

Round four on July 15th could have proved a dangerous one for Cork but in fact it was Cork's best display of the year to date and they tore asunder the poor Kilkenny challenge. Ann Downey was back at the helm of a team that promised so much twelve months ago but a young

half comeback. Cork's performance was very impressive, most notably their point scoring, work rate and teamwork. They dominated from centre field up. All of Cork's six forwards got on the scoreboard and substitute Emer Farrell also got in on the act once introduced. Cork emptied the bench comfortable in the knowledge that they were now through to the All Ireland semi-final regardless of the result in their remaining group game against Dublin on July 28th after a comprehensive 4-16 to 1-4 win.

This was a poor game in Pairc Ui Rinn. Dublin needed to get something out of the game if they were to have any hope of forcing a play off with Galway to advance to the semis. As the rain poured down for the entire duration, the game was always going to be a scrappy affair. The outcome was never in doubt. The gap in standard was clearly evident and Cork just ran out the clock. Even without the services of dual players Mary O'Connor, Rena Buckley, Breige Corkery and Angela Walsh Cork were in control. They ran out convincing winners by 3-10 to 1-3.

Semi-finals are 'nomans land'. So close and yet so far! Teams are at their most vulnerable at such a stage of the competition. Rumour had it that Tipp were working very hard behind the scenes. Their-nine point victory over Wexford was an eye-opener particularly as they were the only side to beat the Slaneysiders in the championship. For this reason Cork were worried and on their guard. It paid off. Apart from Cork doing their job, Tipp were poor and a disappointing game yielded a score of Cork 2-11, Tipp 0-9. Cork dominated midfield and their defence were far too disciplined for an ineffective Tipp forward line. The signs were there at half time after Tipp had scored a solitary point from play in the opening 33 minutes. Catriona Foley gave a masterful display at full-back. Angela Walsh caused problems for the Tipp defence and but for some excellent goalkeeping from Paula Ryan the gap would have been far greater at full time.

The only worry from a Cork point of view was their lack of scoring prowess with the supply they enjoyed. The Tipperary defence were poor and yet Cork as a unit failed to ignite.

Cork prepared for their sixth final on the trot and three in a row of All-Ireland titles. Unfortunately the dream ended on September 9 when Wexford, the team who had impressed so much throughout the season, played with a maturity far beyond their years and snatched Cork's title away. They weren't intimidated by what was for many their first visit to Croke Park. Two goals in the third and fifteenth minutes from Una Leacy rattled Cork and saw trail by five points. Wexford played a two-player full forward line of Michelle Hearne and Ursula Jacob. Wexford knew they had the speed up front on one to one marking and wanted to break up Cork's sextet, the backbone of their successes in the past.





A Famous First for Cashel in All Ireland Camogie

It is always an extra special occasion for any county or club to win an All-Ireland title in any grade of Gaelic Sport for the first time ever. The success is enhanced when it is also achieved in impressive manner and with flair, writes Sean O'Brien.



hat is exactly how Cashel made their entry to the All-Ireland Club senior camogie championship Roll of Honour towards the end of last year. They displayed skill, flair and class when seeing of the challenge of a fine Arthenry, Galway, outfit in the final at Limerick.

The success was not only a tribute to the high quality of the Cashel side, but also an excellent advertisement for the standard of the game in the Premier County. This was the first title win by a Tipperary club since St. Patrick's, of Drumgoole, won the crown in 1965 and again in 1966.

It is inevitably a difficult road to an All-Ireland club crown, via the county championships and national semi-final and final. Such a successful campaign not only takes all round ability but consistency.

Cashel travelled that road in a manner that left no doubt they are very worthy newcomers to the national rankings.

They lost the 2001 All-Ireland final by a point to Na Piarsaigh, Galway. In 2006 Cashel went down in an All-Ireland semi-final to then defending champions St. Lachtain's, Kilkenny, who went on to retain the All-Ireland crown.

The Tipperary side had a solid framework of survivors from the 2001 team, so they brought much

valuable big game experience to their latest title bid.

Athenry went into the final buoyed up by 3-11 to 3-6 win at Ballinasloe over St. Lachtain's, who were bidding to advance their prospects of a fourth All-Ireland crown in a row.

There was much to admire in the Tipperary team's performance in the final. They were in top form right from the start and six points from play powered them to an 0-7 to 0-5 lead at the end of a keenly contested first half.

SECOND HALF SPARKLE

Cashel really excelled in the sec-

ond half. They scored four points in the opening four minutes and went on to finish very convincing winners by 1-18 to 0-9.

Their goal was scored by full forward Emily Hayden twenty three minutes into the second half. A fine movement involving centre half forward Mairead Morrissey and left half forward Claire Grogan put the full forward in possession, and she provided the perfect finish.

Cashel had many stars. Claire Hogan, no stranger to match-winning roles, stamped her personality on the success with her clever general play and finishing technique. She did well first in attack and later in the midfield area and also led the scoring parade with a splendid return of seven points, three from frees.

Emily Hayden highlighted her polished all round performance with that solitary and splendid goal of the game.

Mairead Morrissey got through much valuable work in attack, while Philly Fogarty, first at midfield, and later up front, also did really well.

Una O'Dwyer was an outstanding pivot, with her dependability and well placed clearances, while former Kilkenny ace. Sinead

Millea, played a real captain's role in the half backline, with her leadership and solid play.



ipperary ended a long wait on an early September afternoon in 1999 when they beat Kilkenny by the minimum margin-0-12 to 1-8-in the All-Ireland senior camogie final before an attendance of 15,084.

The win ended a run of seven All-Ireland final defeats for the Premier County between 1949 and 1984, all but one to Dublin. The 1999 game was doubly historic as it was the first 15-a-side decider.

The win was all the more pleasing in that it was forged out in what ranked as one of the best-ever finals up to then.

Tipperary went into the decider as outsiders and also under the shadow of crushing defeat earlier in the year by Cork in the National League

The Premier County were appearing in their first final since

1984 when they lost to Dublin, once almost unbeatable in the championship, but who that day won their first final in 18 years. Surprisingly, the Metropolians have not captured the O'Duffy Cup, the prize for the winners of the All-Ireland final in the meantime.

Tipperary started their history-making win in fine style, but a goal four minutes from the end left them trailing by 1-5 to 0-7 at the break.

The Noresiders were two points clear after eleven minutes of the second half, but Tipperary battled back bravely, and were on level terms with thirteen minutes remaining.



AYBE the achievements of the Limerick camogie team were overshadowed by the extended run of their county hurlers in 2007. Be assured though, it was a phenomenal 12 months for the Shannonside ladies. The spin-off from their unique double (winning the Division 1B league and All Ireland senior B championship) puts them back in top-flight camogie.

Let's put this in context. At the start of 2007 Limerick had never won a senior All Ireland camogie title.

We will rewind a few months to September and All Ireland final day against age-old rivals Cork at the Gaelic Grounds. The home side is a point down as the clock ticks into the seventh minute of injury time.

"We were awarded a free about 70 metres out," recalls then 17-year-old Niamh Mulcahy, who was told by her coach, the renowned Ciarán Carey, to have a go at converting it.

"I was was completely outside my zone. But, I decided to take it anyway." The rest is sporting history. She con-

The rest is sporting history. She converted, securing a precious replay. They travelled to Páirc Ui Rinn for the rematch a week later and came away with a famous 2-9 to 0-6 win. Niamh was the replay's Player-of-the-Match but, more significantly, changed the course of Limerick camogie.

"It took a few weeks for it all to sink in. When Ciarán took over as manager we had already played a few rounds of the national league. We would have struggled to beat Cork then. But, he instilled a massive self-belief. I remember thinking we could actually win this game."

Overcoming Cork quite convincingly in the league final in Nowlan Park was regarded as a giant leap forward. Niamh's versatility was spotted too.

Then again, she always stood out. Dad Ger recalls when the county team were looking for her at the age of 10 to play in goals for the U16s. Or when she played in three All Ireland Féile competitions with her club Ahane — football and hurling with the boys, and camogie. They won the hurling and were beaten by eventual victors Douglas in the camogie. These games were played on the one weekend, but she still managed to fit them all in.

There's serious heritage on her side too. Mum Vera is daughter of John Mackey and niece to the legendary Mick Mackey, and made her own name winning an All Ireland junior medal with the county. Dad played many years of senior club hurling with Dromin/Athlacca and Ahane, and played with the Limerick seniors too. Both parents then progressed to serving on various management teams. Niamh's other siblings Claire (eldest) and Judith (youngest) also wear the county colours, and there is great satisfaction derived from all three being involved.

way, it was kind of the unorthodox way. But, when she changed, it made

her a better player."

At the moment Niamh is studying for her Leaving Cert in Castletroy College. Ideally, she would like to continue her education, hopefully in UL, where no doubt, a much-coveted Ashbourne medal could be in sight.

For now though, this star athlete is enjoying the moment. Last year's breakthrough brought a National League medal and an All Ireland senior championship medal, and a Munster minor medal — all in the one season. She was also voted Young Player of the Year at the All-Stars gala banquet in November, which proved to be yet another highlight.

"My ultimate goal would be to play with Limerick in an All Ireland final in Croke Park. However, you have to be enjoying yourself above all else. Play every match like it is your last," she says.

A simple, but, effective motto. Niamh has learned well. Her primary teacher in Lisnagry, Paul Kennedy, her underage coach in Ahane Sean Og Herbert, and Carey get special mention. Her parents too, who gave her the greatest gift of all.

Cork dig deep to edge out Clare for title

IT was a great start to 2008 for Cork as the county junior sides took the first silverware of the season with a superb victory over Clare at De-

laney's on Sunday last.

Cork had to dig deep before victory was secured deep into injury time. Cork made all the opening-half running — Denise Luby had three first-half points while one from Lydia Cunningham gave Cork the edge as Danielle Sheedy pointed to keep Clare in touch. Aided by the strong wind, Cork piled on the pressure and a Denise Luby goal was followed by a point from Margaret O Herlihy, with Cork leading 1-5 to 0-1 at the half-time whistle.

Clare settled quickly into the sec-ond half and had edged in front by the three-quarter stage. Cork drew level with two points from Margaret O'Herlihy and Kathleen O'Brien before Denise Luby pointed a 45. But Cork then conceded a free and when Marion O'Brien tapped it over, extra time beckoned.

Cork made the better start against the strong wind when Denise Luby rattled the net after four minutes. Marion O'Brien converted two Clare frees as Cork led 2-8 to 2-7 at the turn over. On the restart Carol Kaiser pointed to put one between the sides and the Cork defence came under pressure. Luby gave Cork a two-point advantage and Clare piled on the pressure in the two minutes remaining. But a spirited Cork held on for a deserved victory.

Cork camogie star to step up preparations for another All-Ireland bid



CORK camogie player Rachel Moloney says that the senior side are determined to win the senior All-Ireland this year following the heart-breaking loss to Wexford in last year's final that denied the Rebels a three-in-a-row.

"We are, definitely," says the Courcey

"It's not just the fact that it was a three-in-a-row, though. Any All-Ireland final that you lose hurts, you always want to win.

"When you consider the commitment put in, the levels of training and preparation, and to lose makes you more determined to win it

"Just because you lose one, people will say that you've reached the end of the line as a team, but I don't agree with that at all.

"Tipperary lost the final in 2002 and came back and won two more. You can't just write a team off after they lose.

Educated in Ballinspittle NS and Kinsale Community School, Rachel then did a nutritional science degree at UCC, following that up with a master's in nutrition.

Rachel, who has two sisters and three brothers, is now working in that field for the HSE at Wilton, though still lives at home in Ballinspittle with parents Raymond and Imelda.

It is her parents that she regards as having had the strongest influence on her success.

"My parents would definitely have been my biggest source of inspiration," she says.

"Dad always trained me when I was playing underage, and all of my family would always have had a huge interest."

Rachel has won All-Irelands with minor, junior, intermediate and senior levels with Cork, as well as two Ashbourne Cups in her time at UCC, in 2002 and 2003.

It is a very impressive roll of honour and one that Rachel hopes to add to this year.

Under a new management team of Jim Mc-Carthy (Glen Rovers), Con Malone (Muskerry), Denise Cronin (Glen Rovers) and Pat Murray (Bishopstown), Cork have been back training with just over a month, and Rachel says that while it's good to be back, it will take a while for the team to settle under the new regime, as well as the departures of Jennifer O'Leary to go travelling and with double dual All-Star Rena Buckley also rumoured to be doing likewise, and Anna Geary on college placement abroad.

"We're just getting back into it now," she

"At this time of year it can be difficult to get numbers together, what with girls playing in the Ashbourne Cup for their colleg er things like that.

"We played one challenge game before the league started, against Galway a few weeks ago, and we beat them.

"It was a good workout and some new players were given a chance to show what they can do.

"Training is going well though, Jim (Mc-Carthy) has us doing a lot of running out in Ballincollig on the astroturf there, as it's hard to get pitches at the moment."

"I do think it will be a transitional phase in the league for us though.

"As has been well-documented, Jennifer and Anna aren't playing this year, and there might be others, but those are the only two definites so far.

"As a result of that, it will take time for the new team to gel, but hopefully come championship, everything will be in place.


"With some girls being gone, it opens up s for other players to come in, and it's always good to have new faces.

One or two players were added to the panel each year but that was it.

The turnaround meant there was always a mature, experienced element in the side mixed with youth.

Very few counties have 30-year-olds playing today.

Getting a call-up for the senior panel at 17-years-old is now the norm more so than the excep-

Mary Leacy, captain of Wexford last year, won her second All-Ireland colleges title in 2004 with Colaiste Brid of Enniscorthy, meaning she must have been about 20 years of age when she walked up the steps of the Hogan stand.

Female stars should get the grants as well

I THINK we are all happy that a resolution for player grants has finally been agreed between all the parties involved. This is a big step for Gaelic games in the country.

The scaled ratification is well thought out. The level of grant is determined by a team's involvement in the championship.

Should the inter-county camogie and ladies footballers not receive the same government funded performance/support scheme, then it will be a highly contentious issue.

I hope and I'm assuming that it's only a matter of time before the grants are passed onto the female hurlers and footballers.

The Camogie Association recently voiced concern over the issue. Liz Howard, president of the Camogie Association, feels that top level female players deserve to be recognised in the same way that their male counterparts have been.

"I am delighted that a resolution for grants has finally been agreed," said Howard.

"Players des ve to be recognised in this way. However, the commit-rently claim from the county comment shown by top level female GAA players is on a par with their male counterparts.

"With this in mind, we feel that our players should be included in a similar grants scheme to recognise the outstanding contribution that they make to our national sport and



to meet the additional cost and expenses that they incur when competing at the highest level."

She added: "We have an excellent relationship with the Irish Sports Council and we are conscious that they have always been well balanced in their distribution of government grants to both males and females throughout Irish sport.

"We hope that, given the level of inclusiveness that has always been present in the ISC, we can come to an agreement that will also recognise the contribution and needs of our top female GAA players.

"We will be in touch with Minister Brennan on this subject over the coming weeks and we will expect a positive outcome."

One line which stood out in a statement issued over the past few days was that 'Players will be entitled to claim a refund of eligible expenses in same way they cur-

The hurlers and footballers will receive this grant on top of their reimbursed expenses. I don't begrudge them a cent. The GAA is a large profit making organisation and thanks to the GPA, players are now getting what they richly deserve

while remaining within the 'amateur status' (which should never change).

It's not a huge amount of money by any means but its significance is invaluable.

That line stood out to me because once again it highlights the vast difference between male and female GAA players.

Sure, camogie and ladies football will never be the draw that hurling and football are. They will always struggle.

And struggle we do, from one end of the year to the next.

Camogie players don't receive a cent towards their expenses. Some players are doing 60-80km round trips three times a week to training. They pay for their own boots, shin guards, hurleys and helmets.

They make their own way to physio, paying as they go, to be reimbursed at the end of their treatment from their insurance. There is no meal after training.

Despite having not eaten since lunchtime, it will often be 10pm before players get home and eat again (apart from a banana they purchased themselves).

Many of these players are students. It's an expensive and hungry sport for some

But the players know the limitations of our sport and individual county boards. It's difficult to get sponsorship and when we do secure it, there's just not enough to cover player's expenses.

Cork, thankfully, is a successful county in camogie. We are well respected. But success comes at a price. To take two teams to All-Ireland final day in Croke Park, as Cork has done so many times in the past, costs approximately €10,000. And that's just one weekend.

We are used to watching the pennies and to the sport's credit, will always get there.

But when it comes to government grants, which isn't determined by a cash-rich county board, it's the one chance the female players of our country have to get something back.

And oh how they deserve it!
