







Tipp's Unique Togetherness Makes It A Clean Sweep

It was a clean sweep for Tipperary's Senior Camogie side as they collected their third trophy this year when they defeated Cork in the All-Ireland Final on Sunday last at Croke Park.

On a weekend that started out badly it was the female of species that kept the flag flying high for the Premier County. Appearing in their sixth All-Ireland final in a row this year they now have five titles to their names with many of the panel collecting their fifth All-Ireland medal.

A tense but exciting game, Tipp showed why they are at the top for the past six years. They never panicked even when things didn't go their way and worked as a team




Tipperary made it a clean sweep for the first time in the County's history on Sunday as Joanne Ryan lifted the O'Duffy Cup at Croke Park.

For their Manager Raymie Ryan it was a fulfilment of a goal set out at the beginning of this year. 'I am delighted with the win. We did work towards this but to be honest though I don't think there was much focus put on winning all three but as it happens it has turned out that way ,' commented Raymie.

Asked whether he was more delighted this year than last, 'I don't know about that but there was certainly more pressure on us this year. We really didn't know what to expect from Cork so we focused mainly on our game to get us here,' added Raymie.

Reflecting on the game itself he said the opening quarter in particular was very tense and low scoring but that it was the first goal that opened up the game. 'It was Deirdre's goal in the first half that opened the game initially. Really the two goals were well timed Joanne blasted our second goal to the back of the net just when Cork were beginning to narrow the gap on

Full of praise for his charges, Raymie highlighted in particular the work done by the backs, 'They were brilliant. The half backline spent the whole day tackling and keeping the pressure on. At full back Una O'Dwyer was superb; she came thundering out with ball on a number of occasions. Suzanne and Julie our new addition, there were also super. Tipperary defence shuts out Cork challenge

No indeed, five out of six ain't bad. In fact it's quite outstanding, a tremendous achievement for Tipperary's camogie stalwarts whose 6th successive All Ireland final appearance in Croke Park on Sunday saw them lift the coveted O'Duffy Cup for the fifth time.

Purpose, intent, commitment, dedication, determination, and throw in several other words too, all relevant, all part and parcel of the approach of these amazing players to their task, in all sectors of the field. And to achieve it all in the Association's centenary year and with such conviction, marks this Tipp squad down as one of the all-time greats.

Maybe in the end it was easier than expected, maybe it wasn't as exciting a game as last year (the fussiness of the referee tended to slow down things somewhat) but Cork will always keep one on one's toes and if the Rebels had managed a goal in the final quarter, who knows how things would have

Then again, such was the might of the entire Tipp defence, the utter defiance of each one, the absolute authority exerted, an authority that worked its way throughout the field, that Cork for all their endeavour were not going to be allowed the opportunity to have that green flag raised.

A sweet victory then. The sweetest of all, perhaps, the second successive one over Cork and proof if such were needed that Tipp stand alone as camogie's most successful exponents in this new millennium. They are throwing down the gauntlet at the commencement of the Association's second century to all-comers with flair and a passion, the emulation of which can only serve to improve both the all-round standard and interest in the

Prior to Sunday's final, there was a general consensus that there would be but the puck of

a ball between these great Cork's one, 1-6 to 0-4. rivals. A year ago a goal separated them and while Tipp scored the same total as in 2003 (2-11), Cork were somewhat short of their 1-11 of last year, notching but four points in all from play.

The longer the game went on, the sturdier Tipp's defence became and Jovita Delaney between the posts teamed up with those in front of her, notably Una O'Dwyer, a veritable colossus at full back, Suzanne Kelly in the corner and Therese Brophy on the left wing to erect the 'thou shall not pass' notices that continued to frustrate the Cork attack. There was such cohesiveness about the Tipp defence, which also included a debutante at 17 years in Julie Kirwan from Moneygall, a lass who slotted in with complete assuredness. Ciara Gaynor in the centre also showed great command and leadership with Sinead Nealon on the right wing, recovering from an early knock to rally those around her in splendid tackling and clearances.

While the backs were doing their job so well and providing the inspiration, mid field (a big improvement on the semi final) and the attack were playing their part significantly.

In the opening quarter, the sides were level three times. Eight minutes into the half, a goal attempt from a penalty saw Eimear McDonnell's shot sent directly at the opposing keeper. A foul on Deirdre Hughes had led to the penalty

Tipp had yet to score from play, a somewhat disconcerting feature. Claire Grogan had lofted over three fine points from frees and Cork's replies had come from play. Hard to believe, though, that for the remaining three quarters of an hour, Cork would add but a point from play. Eighteen minutes in to the half came the score that sowed the seeds for Tipp's retention of the title. Another final debutante, Jill Horan came out and collected the ball under the Hogan Stand. She lofted it across the goalmouth and following a melec, Deirdre Hughes in typical fashion, grabbed the half chance there was and belted the sliotar

It was a score that put Tipp on the high road. Confidence began to grow and by half time three points were added to

An expected early second half Cork surge materialised to some extent but not as much as Cork would have liked. Two pointed frees brought the margin down to three but there was nothing coming from play. Two of Cork's inside forward line were replaced and just before the end of the third quarter came Tipp's second goal, an incisive up-field move with Eimear McDonnell neatly flicking the ball into the path of Joanne Ryan, who collected and soloed through before lashing it beyond the reach of Cork keeper Aoife Murray. With two clear goals now between the sides it was going to take a miracle for Cork to come back. But the Tipp defence was in no mood for granting miracles, nor, to be truthful about it, was the Cork attack up to achieving

Cork tried hard but the more pressure put on the Tipp defence the more they rose to the challenge. Farther out, top scorer Claire Grogan showed that her scoring forte was not exclusively with placed balls. A delightful point from play flowed from her caman as well as two from frees. Eimear McDonnell too was on target to add to the fine point she notched just before half time.

Paula Bulfin replaced Philly Fogarty three minutes from time, and Geraldine Kinane and Emily Hayden in replacing Jill Horan and Deirdre Hughes were barely on the pitch when the referee brought proceedings to a close.

No doubt the major plus inthis fantastic Tipp team is the 'all for one and one for all' attitude that prevails. While the defence has been rightly lauded for its brilliant work, the input mid fielders Angie McDermott and Philly Fogarty cannot be underestimated. Both covered acres of ground and worked unceasingly throughout. In attack, Noelle Kennedy swapped with Joanne Ryan in a pre-throw-in switch, the captain moving to the wing. It was a move that worked for both players. Joanne's goal was the perfect complement to a great hour's foraging and tackling. Noelle also left her mark with some neat striking while the half forward line was completed by an in-form Claire Grogan, the game's top scorer who was always a source of worry to the Cork defence with

the overall strength of her performance.

Inside, Deirdre Hughes as is her wont, came up with the goods in the shape of a fine goal, when it was needed. She worked very hard and took quite an amount of punishment as the Cork defence descended on her all the time. Eimear McDonnell was also a thorn in the defence, with her probing runs while Jill Horan enjoyed her first final and made a few darting runs of typical Jill Horan fashion. The manner in which she set up Tipp's first goal showed great foresight.

Cork had no complaints. They lacked the experience, the overall balance and composure of Tipp and while suffering defeat in two successive finals was a bitter pill to swallow, they took defeat gracefully.

All that mattered in the end as far as Tipp were concerned was that the O'Duffy Cup stays in the county and that became a reality at around 4.45pm on Sunday. A very special reality in this the centenary year of the Camogie Association.

Cork juniors' superb All-Ireland win

After the success of the Cork hurlers on the previous Sunday, a huge contingent of supporters trav-elled to Croke Park on Sunday last for both the junior and senior All-Ireland camogie finals, with Cork involved in both.

However, the 'grand slam' was not to be, although Cork juniors led the way with a comprehensive win over Down, the seniors had to give way to a super Tipperary team who showed a vast improvement from their semi-final perfor-mance over Wexford.

Being the centenary occasion of the Camogie Association, the finals had an added attraction because, as well as the two games, a pageant was held after the junior game with two-hundred-and-fifty children from seventy national schools taking part. Another historical part of the pageant was the dis-play of the 'torch' which was brought to Croke Park on the previous day by players from Meath and Dublin all the way from Pairc Tailteann, as the first ever game of camogie was played in Navan in Co. Meath in 1904. The final run of the torch was performed by Stephanie Gannon of Galway, who was the first winner of the ladies' 'poc fada'.

JUNIORS

The Cork juniors opened in a blistering pace and a point from team captain Valerie O'Keeffe in the third minute was fol-lowed by a goal a minute later by Marian Jagoe. However, the girls from the Mourne found their feet after five minutes and for the next ten minutes enjoyed a golden spell which yielded two goals and two points to leave them having double scores on Cork and

motoring.

A few bad mistakes in the Cork defence made that sector vulnerable but Cork rallied and a goal from Eimear Farrell in the fifteenth minute and two points from long-distance frees by Valerie O'Keeffe in the sixteenth and nineteenth minutes had Cork back in the lead.

A pointed free by Down's scorer in chief Catherine McGourty had the teams level

after twenty-five minutes, but a minute later the elusive Liz Bugler got the first of her two goals before Mairin McAleer had a point just before the short whistle.

On the resumption it was a carbon copy of the start of the first half with O'Keeffe pointing a 45 in the third minute and two minutes later she placed a sideline cut into the lap of Liz Bugler who blasted home her second goal. It was the position of a serving Garda placing one of the trainees to finish off the job.


Two more pointed 45s by O'Keeffe concluded the scoring before Down who were held scoreless in the second half launched their first attack after twenty minutes.

After the game, the captain, Valerie O'Keeffe (the Dublinbased Garda) having received the cup from Miriam O'Callaghan, president of the Camogie Association, was gracious in complimenting the Down team for the manner in which they fought out to the finish. She was loud in her praise of her fellow players who blended in so well as a team, also the trainer, coach and manager.

The team was extremely strong up the middle with Amanda O'Regan of Douglas outstanding at centre-back, backed up well by Elaine O'Ri-ordan of Milford, while Valerie O'Keeffe played a captain's part at midfield, helping backs and forwards at times and scoring all five points. No doubt these three should soon catch the eye of the senior selectors, as will goal poacher Lie Boules.

Valerie O'Keeffe, Cork, lifts the cup after victory over Down in the All-Ireland junior camogie championship final at Croke Park on Sunday last.



The formalities took place in the main function room, as the players worked their way through the crowd, finding much more resistance than they did the previous day in Croke







Reigning champions Tipperary careered their way to a fifth All-Ireland senior camogie crown in six years when they possessed too much firepower for Cork, winning on a 2-11 to 0-9 scoreline in a cracking Centenary Year decider at Croke Park.

layed in front of a passionate and record crowd of 24,569 fans. the game was a predictably fast-flowing affair with Tipp's ability to snatch vital scores at opportune times key to their eventual victory.

In this respect, Deirdre Hughes' success in latching onto a dangerous lobbed centre by Jill Horan in the 19th minute and thereafter a classy Joanne Ryan goal fourteen minutes into the second half proved all-

The game began at a hectic pace and there was no let-up until the final whistle.

However the defending champions, with Claire Grogan in outstanding form up front, proceeded to force the pace throughout, leaving an embattled Cork side relying for long periods on wreaking damage from quick counter-attacks.

Although Cork's half-back line impressed in augmenting their teammates' advances on the Tipp goal, a fine point by Gemma O'Connor helped edge the red and whites into the lead by the odd point in three inside

Cork were the more energised lot as the second half got underway with the wind-backed Tipp side labouring as they attempted to get off

Jenny O'Leary helped the Rebel County cause with an unerring free less than one minute after the restart in a fast-paced start to the second

Cork pushed forward in search of another point to put further pressure on the leaders who found themselves very much on the back

foot in the early minutes after the restart. Then Suzanne Kelly was forced to make a timely clearance after a long free by the aforementioned O'Leary dropped dangerously into the

Jenny O'Leary continued to reflect the new verve and drive from the Cork ladies when driving over another free to leave just a goal between the sides (1-6 to 0-6) after just seven minutes of the second half.

But Tipp held firm and when Claire Grogan rifled over her 6th point - from a Rosarie Holland knockdown - the Cork deficit was stretched to four points once again.

The aforementioned Grogan had an opportunity to narrow the gap just moments later but her free drifted narrowly wide.

The pendulum continued to swing from one end of the field to the other with one team and then the other threatening to grab the game by the scruff of the neck only for them to see the initiative rested from their grasp

Una O'Donoghue was in fine form throughout and with arguably the point of the game she kept the issue very much in the boiling pot as the end of the first quarter beckoned.

Just when it seemed as if Cork were about to nick a way back into the game, Tipp crafted a fine opening which resulted in a crucial score with Joanne Ryan racing in from the right wing to smack the ball to the Cork

Then St. Finbarr's club stalwart Gemma O'Connor reminded Tipp of the battle that remained on their hands with 16 minutes played.

A seventh point from the influential Grogan helped maintain the status quo as Tipp looked comfortable, sitting on a 2-8 to 0-8 lead.

It looked ominous for the red and whites as the eight wide was recorded for Cork as against three for Tipp as Jenny O'Leary saw her free drift wide of the Tipp goal.

Then great work by Grogan paved the way for Eimear McDonnell to stretch Tipp's lead to seven points as Cork appeared to be running out

Grogan continued to be a menace in the heart of the Cork defence and another fine point by the Tipp ace served to catapult the Premier County into a 2-9 to 0-8 lead with eight minutes to go.

Una McDwyer effected a block on Rachel Maloney's attempt at a goal from a close-range free as the tension became almost unbearable in the dving minutes.


Tipp continued to come under pressure and yet another Jenny O'Leary free served to reduce Tipp's lead to 2-11 to 0-9 with just over three minutes left to play.

And despite Cork's best efforts, that's the way matters stayed until the final whistle with Tipp's greater experience and nous helping to copperfasten yet another fantastic title win








A delighted Joanne Ryan lifts the trophy for Tipperary







Time and again the ball went in and time and again it came back out. That tears the heart out of any team.

I spent Sunday night and Monday with the team and have to admit I was saddened by the attitude. You their turn and they will dominate. could count on one hand the players, who appeared distraught.

For a few it was a case of "Ah well, next year."

That is why Cork were beaten on Sunday. Unless you go into the game with it being the most important thing in your life for that particular hour then you're wasting your time.

One player on the panel said to me a couple of years ago that when she joined the Cork set-up she felt it was only a matter of time before she won All-Irelands.

The death of Sighle has closed a chapter in the history of the Association, a chapter which spans almost eighty years of a national organisation to which Sighle has made an inestimable contribution.

Sighle first played Camogie with the Betsy Gray Club in Warrenpoint, a club of which she first became Rúnaí at the age of nine in 1925. Sighle gave a long life of service to the game and, at the time of her death, was Life Uachtarán and an active trustee and member of Ardchomhairle. She was also an active member of the Central Management Committee.

Born Nancy Mulligan, the Belfast native served the game of camogie in many capacities.

As a player she was on the first Antrim side to win the O'Duffy Cup back in 1945, when they defeated Waterford in Cappoquin. Antrim retained the title for the next two seasons, with Nancy playing a leading role in midfield (1946) and in defence (1947). On her marriage, she gave up playing at inter-county level but she returned as the Antrim coach in the fifties, and she was at the helm in the next two All-Ireland victories of 1956 and 1967.

She also continued to play club camogie and was full-back on the great Deirdre side that captured 7 Antrim titles in succession in the mid sixties. Deirdre won the first 6 Ulster club titles and appeared in the first two All-Ireland club finals.

Nancy also had the distinction of refereeing 4 All-Ireland Senior deciders during the period 1958-70 – and probably would have been in line for more had not Antrim featured in them so regularly during the period.

She had a long career in administration at local and national level and had the unusual experience in 1971 of presenting the Portglenone captain with the Cup for their first ever Antrim title – after spending an hour trying to deny them as Deirdre full-back.

After becoming President of the Association in the midseventies, she continued to serve her county in an administrative capacity, but her interest in sport competitive sport continued on the fairways, where she again performed with distinction.




Orla Ní Shiocháin Uí Riain

rla, who sadly departed this life in December 2003 was a most elegant camogie player with her native Åth Cliath. Born into a most famous GAA family, her late father was the well-known former Ardstiurthoir Seán Ó Siocháin. A member of the famed Austin Stacks club in Dublin Orla won three consecutive senior All-Ireland medals with Åth Cliath. She went on to win two All-Ireland club medals with Austin Stacks. She also won National League medals.

She married Jack Ryan, it was the perfect GAA marriage as Jack's father Séamus Ó Riain was a former GAA President. Their three children, Naoise, Shane, and Fergal are all involved in Gaelic Games. Shane is a duel Dublin player and daughter Naoise also wore the Blue and Navy of Dublin.

Earlier, this year Orla was selected on the Leinster team of the century. Her love of Gaelic Games and Irish culture was very strong. Orla once said "if our children can get as much enjoyment from playing the games as Jack and I got, we will feel we will have done something right". Orla certainly gave it her all, on and off the pitch.

Centenary Camogie special for Killaloe

Unfortunately, except for the girls in Ballina Primary School, ladies interested in playing camogie must go to other clubs such as Burgess, Portroe, Clonlara, Trook etc. This was not the case in the forties when local lady, Mae Mulcahy founded the Killaloe Camogie Club in 1944. Now May Gough, wife of the late Paddy Gough, is quite willing to share her exploits on the pitch with young and old and still remembers that day, in Nenagh, August 18th, 1946 when she captained Clare in a Munster semi-final against Tipperary. The final score that day was, Clare 2-2, Tipperary 1-1 and both goals were scored by Mae. In the Munster final, she again scored 1-1 to lead Clare to Munster victory against Cork.

Let me share with you an excerpt from one of the many books of the great Scan Kierse, Killaloe: "The first recorded

on Sunday, September 29, 1940 between Ballina and Castleconnell, on the occasion of the Killaloe Hurling tournament. Since no "parish rule" existed where camogie clubs were concerned, a number of the Ballina members were from Killaloe. The Ballina camogie team in their maroon costumes were first on the field. The Castleconnell girls wore rich green. Castleconnell was the more experienced team and held Ballina scoreless in the first half. Positional changes made by Ballina in the second half proved very effective. Present on the field on that day was Mick Mackey, Limerick's hurling hero."

It is quite fitting that in 2004, Camogie Centenary Year, we salute a great lady, May Gough (Mulcahy), who founded the Killaloe Camogie Club, sixty years ago.





WOMEN IN SPORT: Conference discusses how to improve the gender imbalance

Working towards a level playing

THE formation of a new female sports body was touted yesterday as the key to finally allowing women to emerge from the shadows of their male counterparts in Irish sport. The proposed national body would

be a coherent group to represent the needs of all female sports in Ireland.

That may not seem too significant, but such a move would be a major change in policy as the current approach of the Irish Sports Council (ISC) is to cater for all sports, whatever the gender or ability, under the one umbrella.

Fine in theory but the reality is that male sports dominate the landscape in most organisations. Females are seriously underrepresented at all levels of sport, both on and off the pitch and, consequently, in the media too.

The knock-on effect of that goes beyond the sporting sphere as it has major implications for the general health of Irish society. A change of tack is required, according to a Joint Oireachtas Committee report on women in sport.

"This inequality cannot be allowed to continue," said Fine Gael TD Jimmy Deenihan in Croke Park yesterday at the "Women in Sport"

conference. "Women are being marginalised and major work on policy must be done, perhaps through the establishment of a Women in Sport Committee, to cusure that women can meet their full potential in this area, as in all other walks of life."

Perhaps it's worth noting that the two biggest Irish female sports organisations — the Ladies Gaelic Football Association of Ireland and the Camogie Association of Ireland

 already operate independently of their male counterparts.

Deenihan cited the Women's Sports Institute in the UK and pledged that he would be pushing for an Irish equivalent in the near future.

The report also calls for the ISC to appoint a full-time Women's Devel-opment Officer to implement the Brighton Principles, drawn up by 82 countries to develop a sporting culture that enables and values the full involvement of women in every aspect of sport.

Ireland is not yet one of the 82 sig-

Much of the problem for women in sport, however, is a lack of exposure.

Bad in itself in the short-term, this also means that there is a shortage of female role models for young girls to look up to and dream of emulating. It's a vicious cycle.

To combat this, the report also suggests other initiatives such as a high-profile Annual Women's Sports Awards scheme, for which a prospective sponsor has already apparently been brought on board for an experimental three-year term.

Of greater concern is the lack of media coverage women's sport

A recent study has shown that female athletes account for less than 3% of sports photographs in Irish newspapers.

"There is a media problem across the world when it comes to recognising women in sport," claimed Mr

"The UK, for example, has very poor coverage of women's sport,

Women who exercise face less risk of osteoporosis and breast cancer

REGULAR exercise and physical activity can significantly reduce the risk of both breast cancer and osteoporosis the keynote speaker told a women in sport conference yesterday.

From her research with DCU, Dr Catherine Woods sald females who took up physical activity at a younger age were at far less risk of asteoporosis, a condition affecting one in four Irish women.

"From a study into two groups of women, one who did regular exercise over a year, the other which didn't, found there was a much higher rate of bone mass density among the girls who exercised," said Dr Woods.

On average, they have a 5 to 10% higher bone destiny than sedentary females.

"Women who didn't exercise over the year lost 2% in bone density, while those doing regular exercise saw their bone density increase by 1%.

Regular exercise also reduces

the risk of breast cancer.

"Ireland has a higher rate of breast cancer than the EU average," Dr Woods said.

But we found that women doing just one to three hours exarcise a week can see a 20 to 30% reduction in the risk of breast cancer. This rises to a 60% reduction in the risk for women doing four or more hours exercise a week.

However, participation in sport among young girls is falling in the country and it is a problem that needs to be addressed.

Results of another study into 15 to 17-year-olds in South County

Dublin found 32% of the girls in this age group were not physically active in any sport.

There are a variety of barriers to young girls getting involved in sport." Dr Woods said.

"It is still a male-dominated arena, and the ratio of male to female coaches is 2:1. Sport is still feminised, finals are still known as ladies finals and some women teams feel the need to hire image consultants.

"In this age of obesity, we have to be careful not to link physical activity in with weight loss, but we have to look at ways of getting more young girls involved in sport. We have to get rid of this attitude where girls don't believe themselves to be the sporty type.

Fine Gael spokesman Jimmy Deenihan TD said the work

should start in primary school.
"The big issue from people on

the ground is physical education in primary schools," he said. "Teachers are saying that there are kids coming to them very unfit and uncoordinated and teachers are having to work on basic skills like walking and running properly with them before even getting them involved in sport.

"There is no onus on teachers to do PE, it is not obligatory and that is a factor. Another thing that bugs teachers is that when inspectors come around to schools they never ask them about their PE classes. It is vital to instill an attitude of fitness at a young age. Children might drift away from physical activity for a spell but are far more likel back to it later in life if they were active as children."

Australia too where participation levels are far higher than many countries.

"Women's sports account for about 8% of all coverage there.

"In Ireland, for every 100 sports images in our papers only three of

them will be of women. Some of those will even be of a derogatory nature, alluding to something apart from the action or game in question.

There has been no study done here about TV coverage but, apart from TG4's coverage of the ladies

football and camogie, it is fair to say that the coverage of women's sports is poor in this area too."

However, TG4 Head of Sport Ronan O'Coisdealbha emphasised the importance of a focused media strategy from women's sporting organisa-

tions to help to raise the profile of their games.

"It is up to each sport to be proactive in generating media coverage, rather than waiting for the media to approach them looking for coverage." O'Coisdealbha said.



Women are being marginalised and major work on policy must be done, perhaps through the establishment of a Women in Sport Committee, to ensure that women can meet their full potential in this area as in all other walks of life

"My father Patrick Cusack was a carpenter and he used to make the lads their hurleys. Naturally this saved a lot of expense when they were growing

up," she added. With three sports-mad young boys and a girl, Treasa, who plays camogie for Father O'Neill's, budgeting was an important consideration.

"We would often go through 35 litres of milk per week, at least four loaves of bread per day and huge amounts of meat," said Gearóidine who also has a one girl Martina, aged 28.

"On top of that my husband Gerry and I had to deal with countless smashed windows, broken lampshades and damaged hurleys," she added.

Probably biggest expense was that of washing clothes and kit.

Gearóidine would go regularly use ten packets of washing powder per week and the washing machine had to be changed every three years.



The fastest field game on grass. Well, that's what it says on the Milwaukee Hurling Club's web-site! Hurling is a phenomenal game to watch. So what are the basic ingredients of a good hurler or camogie player? Some would say madness. For those who know and love the game it's the speed, fitness and skill that are the basic ingredients. A little bit of madness probably helps! And what we are finding with time is that more and more people outside of Ireland have all of these ingredients in abundance.

In drawing up the plans to celebrate the Centenary Year the Centenary Committee wanted to include a fitting way of marking the contribution of all those women who have played Camogie abroad over the past 100 years. There are records of camogie played in places like New York as early as 1905. The committee, chaired by Therese O'Callaghan of Cork, wanted the year's celebrations to reflect the work done by all unit's of the Association, both at home and abroad

Many girls travelled here this week from Britain and America to participate in the

inaugural Coca Cola International Camogie Competition, some with Irish connections, some with no Irish connections. For those with Irish connections playing Gaelic games comes naturally. With Wexford, Kilkenny and Galway and other counties hot on their heels Cork and Tipperary have no room to become complacent as kingpins of camogie. With the way young people travel these days to every corner of the world, we have ready made worldwide ambassadors for the game of camogie. Many of the top inter-county camogie players will take off to Australia for a few months before settling back into the next camogie season. Maybe they can ignite an interest in camogie in the many countries they will visit on their travels.

And so to a prediction: in 100 years time what countries will participate in the Coca Cola International Competition? The Irish might will be facing the girls from Australia or Italy, the Americans might do battle with the Swedish and the Canadians and Britain might be meet the Asians and the French on the way to Croke Park. So what ideas will the bicentennial committee of 2104 come up with to commemorate 200 years of Camogie? No. doubt they will look back at the first ever Coca Cola International Camogie Competition and marvel at how the game, and in particular the international dimension, has grown. Those of us here today will be keeping an eye on them from our lofty perches in Heaven, or Hell as the case may be!



O'Dwyer was magnificent in a defence that was the real springhoard for a 2-11 to 0-9 win that gave the Premier County their second successive title and their fifth since

She was a mighty bulwark at full back with her reliability, industrious play and well-directed clearances. A performance worthy of the rare occasion that was the Centenary final and one that left her really unchallenged for selection as the Player of the Final.

Little behind her, however, was Grogan at left half forward. She was a clever and creative attacker, who also demonstrated her ability to make the most of scoring opportunities.

Claire chalked up nine golden points, seven from frees, for the highest return by a Tipperary player in a winning All-Ireland senior final. Previous to that Deirdre Hughes led the way with 2-2 in the 2000 win over Cork and exactly the same score a year later against Kilkenny.

Grogan's eye-catching display brought her tally of All-Ireland senior medals to

An excellent return that for the young Cashel forward at just 18.

Hughes has been one of the brightest

stars of the Tipperary side since the Premier County made the long-awaited breakthrough as recently as 1999 by winning the coveted O'Duffy Cup for the first time.

It is an indication of the quality of the Toomevera club player's consistently high standard play since Tipperary's arrival on the All-Ireland Roll of Honour that earlier this year she was the only current player included in the Team of the Century.

Joanne Ryan captained the side and led by example with her purposeful play. She also really sealed the title for Tipperary with a well-taken goal in the second half.

Ryan was put in possession by Emer McDonnell and went off on a brilliant solo run before sending to the net to give her side a six points lead.

However, Tipperary had many other outstanding players. Indeed, all eighteen players who appeared in the county colours during the game could feel well pleased with their individual contributions to the

Tipperary have been so prominent in the sport of late that it is hard to credit they had to wait so long for their initial All-Ireland senior title. That history-making team, 0-12 to 1-8 winners over Kilkenny, included Jovita Delaney, Suzanne Kelly, Una O'Dwyer, who captained the side, Therese Brophy, Sinead Nealon, Giara Gaynor, Angela McDermott, Noelle Kennedy, Emer McDonnell and Deidre Hughes.

All helped to fashion the latest success. Philly Fogarty, who went in as a substitute in 1999, was on from the start in the recent

final. That was her third appearance in the starting line-up.

Top scorer for Tipperary in that historic first final win was Noelle Kennedy with six points, all from frees.

The latest outing was Tipperary's sixth successive final appearance since 1999 and their only defeat was to Cork in 2002. A really impressive record.

The Cashel club has solid grounds for extra special rejoicing at the modern success story nationally. The club provided four All-Ireland senior title winning captains- Meadhbh Stokes, Jovita Delaney in 2000, Emily Hayden, 2001 and Una O'Dwyer last year.

What of Cork? They battled gamely all through but were a wellbeaten side at the final whistle. Left

half forward Jennifier O'Leary impressed in the attack and finished her team's leading scorer with four points, three from frees.

Vivienne Harris and Gemma O'Connor provided some bright features at midfield, while team captain Stephanie Dunlea, goalkeeper Aoife Murray, who saved a penalty early in the first half, and Paula O'Connor impressed at the back.

ROLL OF HONOUR

Cork were bidding to "come of age" in terms of All-Ireland senior titles. The are second on the Roll of Honour with twenty championships.

Dublin are well out in front with 26 titles, but surprisingly have not captured the Blue Riband since as far back as 1984. The county's long absence from the title winners ranks is one of the most surprising feature of modern-day camogie.

There was a time when Dublin were virtually unbeatable-they held the title without a break from 1948 to 1966 inclusive.

Tipperary became the seventh county to win the title when they chalked up that first triumph in 1999.

Third in the Roll of Honour after Dublin and Cork are Kilkenny with twelve crowns between 1974 and 1994. Wexford have three titles (1968, 1969 and 1975) and Galway won their only crown in 1996.

Cork did not leave Croke Park on All-Ireland finals day empty handed. Their juniors captured the All-Ireland crown for the seventh time by seeing off the challenge of a great-hearted Down side by 4-5 to 2-4.

Elizabeth Bugler was top scorer for Cork with two goals while Mairin McAleenan led the way for the Mourne County with 1-1.

Giving kids a chance

"THE best thing about all of this is that children are playing. You can't dismiss that.'

These are the words of one of Cork's unsung heroines, one of the many people who, behind the scenes, work tirelessly to develop our national game of hurling, Camogie and football at underage level.

Mairead O'Callaghan of Glenville National School and Watergrasshill just recently retired as Secretary of Cork Sciath na Scol after a hectic four years, having previously served as Chairperson.

Her legacy is one of the most efficiently run competitions the association has at present and when one considers the volume of players and various grades the competition caters for it is all the more spell bounding.

Sciath na Scol, involving just hurling and football began 101 years ago. Camogie was never part of the original set

phasis was purely on the promotion and enjoyment of the game. Only six teams took part the first year.

The 'immense satisfaction' Mairéad took from her work made it all worthwhile.

we want it," she says.

One of Mairéad's proudest moments was when Glenville won their 5th Sciath na Scoil girls football title in a row this year. "I was particularly delighted because I entered them this year in the top grade. When we won it was one of my proudest moments.' She is quick to point out the effort and dedication her co-workers also put into Sciath na Scol.

Many present day Camogie stars had their love for the game enhanced while playing for their school in the competition. It gave them a sense of excitement and pride which undoubtedly drove them on to the bigger stage.

Sile Burns, now a member of the Cork senior Camogie panel, had a glorious few years while playing with Scoil Oilibheir. The highlight of her school career came in 1998 when she captained her team to win her fourth Roinn A

Vera looks to add another title to haul

THE thought has crossed my mind many times over the years of how lucky I was to be playing for a county like Cork.

There were many magnificent players who graced the fields over the years, with far more skill than I, that never tasted success particularly at inter-county level.

That thought rose to the surface again the other day when I met excellent Granagh Ballingarry and Limerick midfielder Vera Sheehan.

Small in stature, but a giant in heart Vera would walk onto any inter-county team in the country.

Her performances over the years have won her many admirers and while that's nice, it's medals Vera wants.

Vera has had more success than most when it comes to her club camogie, playing since the age of seven with the famous Granagh Ballingarry club.

Underage titles in every grade form part of her medal haul along with 10 senior county titles, seven Munster and three All-Ireland titles.

Throw in an All-Ireland Kilmacud Crokes seven-a-side title for good measure and you get an idea of the type of club career she has had.

Granagh Ballingarry set out to defend their All-Ireland crown tomorrow against Freshford of Kilkenny.

It could well be All-Ireland number four. So what about the Limerick intercounty side?

How can a county with such an excellent club record fail so miserably on the bigger stage?

An All-Ireland junior title in 1995 followed by an intermediate championship victory in '96 and the entire country was looking over their shoulder.

What went wrong?

Of course the step up to senior status is immense but Limerick began losing to teams they should save been beating

2003 saw some spark of a revival but 2004 saw the county once again take a massive step backwards, not even qualifying from their group to reach the semi-final stage.

"I don't know," says a forlorn Vera.

"We only have three or four clubs in Limerick and that's a problem.

"Things just weren't right this year and our defeat against Wexford must be one of the worst defeats of my inter-county career.

"It's heartbreaking but at least I have Granagh. For us our club camogie is our inter-county camo-

Vera is luckier than most. She is playing with one of the most successful clubs in the country during the last 10 years.

Granagh's first All-Ireland title



came in 1998 after two heartbreaking semi-final defeats in '96

Vera was captain of the 1998 team and marks it down as her greatest moment. Another title came her way in

1999 and 2003. Will there be another in 2004? It is amazing to note that

Pearse's of Galway and Granagh of Limerick have won the last eight All-Ireland club titles between them. Yet Galway at senior inter-county level are as far behind as Limerick.

The mind boggles! Without doubt the talent is in these counties. Maybe they don't have the selection Cork do, but that doesn't mean they can't strongly contest a championship title. With the right structure and organisation they can.

Vera feels that the camogie association is doing little to help the situation.

"We need full time officers in each province and full time coaches in each county, particularly the weaker ones. What's been done at present just isn't enough and we're losing players."

I agree!

Tomorrow's club final between Kilkenny and Limerick is being played in Parnell Park in Dublin, behind closed doors as I like to put it.

I can guarantee you that the only people who will travel, particularly from Munster, to watch the game will be family and friends.

Thurles would have been ideal and would most certainly have drawn the crowds.

In 2001 Cork and Tipp met in the All-Ireland semi-final.

It was probably the best of the two counties ever produced to-

And where was it played? Mullingar, Co. Westmeath!

Why did two Munster teams have to travel to Leinster to play in a pre dominantly footballing county?

If there was a 100 people at the match it was a lot.

We have to play our big games in the most easily accessible venues to the public to draw the crowds.

For now Vera and her team mates will concentrate on the task ahead tomorrow. The mood in the camp is good and the girls "are really up for it."

Vera deserves her moment in the spotlight just like any other successful inter-county player because without doubt she is up there with the best of them.

Scene set for camogie classics

CAMOGIE'S centenary calendar comes to a close on Sunday with all four provinces battling to capture honours in the senior or junior All-Ireland club finals at Parnell Park.

Down side Liatroim Fomtenoy take on Roscommon's Four Roads in the junior decider while top billing goes to the latest duel between old sparring partners Granagh-Ballingarry of Limerick and Kilkenny representatives St Lachtain's.

Granagh bid to retain the title they won for a third time last year against a St Lachtain's outfit appearing in their first decider. The pair have met in two semi-finals in the past four years and, although Granagh won both, a bruis-ing challenge match earlier this season ended all square.

"I suppose some people would see us as favourites," Granagh captain Deirdre Sheehan admitted yesterday. 'We played them last year in the All-Ireland semi-final and we beat them by about seven points, but they're a very tough, physical side and we'll all have to stand up and be

counted on Sunday. It would be very special to win it in centenary year though. In '98 we were the last side to win it as a 12-a-side game and we were the first to win it as a 15-a-side game in '99. It'd be nice to add the centenary year to those two,"

Whoever wins at the weekend, it has been a landmark year for the association, even aside from reaching the century of existence.

Staging a number of key games before male senior ties this summer raised the profile as did the decision to have the inaugural International Camogie final as a curtain raiser to the first Rules test at Croke Park last month.

Another first step will be taken next month when the first ever camogie Allstars selection is announced.

'It has been a fantastic year for us in Cumann Camogaiochta na nGael," said the association's PRO Maire Ui Scolaí at Croke Park yesterday.

"It is a year that has put camogie on the map, both here in Ireland and abroad. On Sunday we will bring the curtain down on the inter-county scene with what I hope will be two

cracking club finals. This year we have four provinces represented and that is a fitting way to end the year.'

Talks are at an advanced stage to amalgamate the association and Ladies Football under the one umbrella with the GAA while a Strategic Development Plan that will guide them for the next four years is already in opera-

"We have almost 90,000 people playing the game here now," Ui Scolai said. "This year we had almost 25,000 people at our All-Ireland final this

year, which was the third highest attendance for any senior final this year. Not only that, but it was the highest attendance for any female organisation in this country. We have a fantastic product to sell and we have to get out there and prove it is every bit as good as the men.

ONE of camogie's most successful modern day managers Raymie Ryan of Tipperary has called it a day after two successful years of county management.

The Cashel club member, who still lines out with the senior hurling team, guided the Tipperary team to two successive All-Ireland victories, two Munster championship titles, and this year completed the hat-trick when they won their first National League title since 1977.

Replacement names have been mentioned, but it will not be known for some time yet who will guide the Tipperary team into the future.

Ryan, who took over from fellow county hurler Michael Cleary after the 2002 All-Ireland defeat by Cork, had very little knowledge of camogie before taking up the position.

However, in his first year he managed to win the first Munster title in 26 years, defeating the old enemy Cork in the Munster final, before going all the way to the All-Ireland final.

"My highpoint was the 2003 All-Ireland final," said Ryan. "That day the entire team in my opinion hurled exceptionally well.

"When I came into the position, I had very little background information on camogie but very soon I realised just how focused these girls were and it was a joy to work with them over the past number of years. But I now intend to take a well earned break, but my interest will always remain.'

Whoever takes over from Ryan will have a tall order to follow, as the Premier County will be very determined to maintain their winning pattern that has seen them participate in every senior All-Ireland final since 1999 when they won their first ever title.

Meanwhile, last Friday the Munster Camogie Coun-cil launched Mary Moran's Munster's Camogie Story in the Ambassador Hotel in Cork, the first publication of the entire history of Munster camogie compiled in

Championship revamp needed

A SUGGESTION that the format of the Cork County Senior Championship be revised resulted in a meeting last week

Representatives from the clubs brought ideas to the table. On top of everyone's agenda was the fact there is no back door in the championship.

Many 'suggestions' were made. A round robin series was one such suggestion and initially I was of the opinion that this was the way forward.

We place little or no emphasis on the league in camogie. Clubs play if it suits them.

Very few clubs fulfil their league obligations. By combining the league and championship into one with each league game a 'must' win to ensure qualification for the championship.

I felt it would solve both issues. Each club would receive a minimum of four games, the league fixture would be treated with respect and you would still have your championship, albeit in the latter stages.

Those who finished at the bottom of the league would be demoted to intermediate status (were this re-introduced) and those who finished above bottom stayed put.

But reasons why this wouldn't work were voiced.

You would have to start the championship far sooner that we presently do. With so many involved in colleges and third level education this would prove a problem.

Cork is also very successful at inter-county level. It is almost impossible to find a spare week during peak championship season as it is, not to mind increasing the level of games.

onship would lose its 'excitement' were a league system introduced and I tend to agree with that. There were some great games this year with many going down to the wire.

Yet we must do something with the first and maybe second round losers. We must introduce a second chance for these teams.

The draw for the 'back door' should not be made until the first rounds have been completed to prevent clubs selecting the easiest route.

In all it was an interesting informal meeting with no decisions / proposals whatsoever taken.

The representatives were asked to return to their clubs and reconvene in the coming weeks with more 'formal' suggestions. These will then be analysed and either rejected or proposed. It is the clubs who will decide.

BOXING

ANDY LEE, the IABA's Boxer of the Year, has been national senior middleweight champion for the past two seasons. A tall, rangy southpaw from St Francis BC Limerick, he won a bronze medal in the European Senior Championships in Pula, Croatia in February and followed up with a silver in the inaugural EU championships in Madrid in June.

His European bronze medal qualified him for the Athens Olympics in August when he was our lone boxing representative. 26-year-old Lee won his opening bout by defeating Mexico's Alfredo Angulo Lopez on points but lost his second contest when he was narrowly defeated on a countback by Cameroon's Hassan Njikam after both men were tied on 27-27.

CAMOGIE

UNA O'DWYER was again the source of defensive power which helped Tipperary to a second successive All-Ireland title and in the process she is elevated to the status of Texaco Award winner.

In an historic year in which camogie celebrated its centenary, full-back O'Dwyer played a pivotal role in a Tipp team which won the National League, the Munster title and clinched the All-Ireland title with victory over Cork.



In what was their fifth title in six years, the young Cashel girl rounded off a wonderful season with a brilliant final display that ensured Tipperary cruised to an eight-point win. Una joins an elite band from her sport as she is one of only five camogie players ever to win a Texaco Award.

GAELIC FOOTBALL

COLM COOPER followed in the footsteps of past greats by becoming 'an untouchable' in the course of the 2004 championship.

The Gooch' built on the promise he showed when bursting onto the scene a few years ago by producing a remarkable body of work right through the year, triumphing in a Man of the Match performance in the All-Ireland final against Mayo.

In scoring 1-5 and leading Kerry to victory, he joined Sheely, Spillane, Liston and Fitzgerald as an individual who had left an indelible stamp on the way to collecting the coveted Celtic Cross.

The Dr Crokes star wins the award for his capacity to gain possession, his excellent distribution and his wonderful scoring ability. And he has that other mark of genius - he makes it all seem so simple.

RACING

IT PROVED to be a fantastic year for Offaly jockey PAT SMULLEN who won the Budweiser Derby riding Grey Swallow and then partnered Vinnie Roe to a remarkable fourth successive Irish St Leger success.

In the Derby, he showed great judgement and timing as he took Grey Swallow clear from a furlong out to beat the hot favourite and English Derby winner North Light

at the Curragh. The 10/1 shot, trained by Dermot Weld, won by half a length from the odds-on favourite with rank outsider Tycoon in third place.

The celebrations continued in September when Smullen partnered another Weld horse Vinnie Roe to a record fourth successive Irish St Leger with a convincing success over 12 rivals at the Curragh.

HURLING

WHEN Cork wing back SEAN OG Ó hAILPÍN was seriously injured in a car crash a few years ago, he could hardly have envisaged not alone returning to hurling but to play to the level he attained in this year's campaign.

He was never less than outstanding in his contributions to the Cork cause as they went in search of the Liam McCarthy Cup, proving a defensive anchor and an

attacking linchpin for Donal O'Grady in the heat of battle. And he kept the best wine until last by putting on a



fantastic display against Kilkenny in September's All-Ireland final. A member of the Na Piarsigh team, he hails from a talented hurling family. His ability to win possession, mark intelligently and hit quality ball underscored his achievement in winning his second All-Ireland senior medal.

RUGBY

GORDON D'ARCY soared with the eagles in a series of breath-taking displays during Ireland's Triple

The 24-year-old Ireland and Leinster centre was first capped in the World Cup game against Romania in October 1999, but man seemed to be in danger of falling to the ground as he failed to make a lasting imprint in the squad.

But the last year has changed all that, so much so that Gordon was the only player from these islands nominated for the IRB Player of the Year Award.

His adventurous, attacking running, sleight of foot and hand and crucial try-scoring ability makes him a jewel in the green crown. Such was the impact of what he achieved, he was voted the outstanding player of the Six Nations tournament.

SOCCER

REPUBLIC of Ireland international goalkeeper SHAY GIVEN has been one of the Premiership's top goalkeepers since first burstin into the Newcastle team seven years ago.

Since he was first capped against Russia back in 1996, he has become a vital cog as the last line of defence for Ireland. Following in the footsteps of another famed Irish goalkeeper, fellow Donegal

man and former Texaco Award winner Packie Bonner, Given has the happy knack of pulling off saves at vital times in important matches.

This year, he has stepped up to the plate to become an inspirational performer for Brian Kerr, and there is no doubt his displays have helped the boys in green to achieve their position at the top of a tough World Cup qualifying group.

SWIMMING

PARALYMPIC swimmer DAVID MALONE from Ballinteer in Dublin produced a magnificent performance to claim a silver medal for Ireland at the recent Paralympic Games in Athens.

Competing in the S8 100m Backstroke, Malone, 27, battled superbly over the last 15 metres of the final to take a deserved silver medal. A world record holder and former Paralympic gold medal

winner from the Sydney Games, Malone felt going to Greece he would finish outside the medals after taking a break in the aftermath of his Australian exploits.


COCA COLA CAUGH UP....

The US's score having come from Louise Weste after just minutes of the half gone. The girls from across the broad Atlantic gave it their all in the second half with Ann Morrissey striking home the first USA goal midway through the half and then two minutes later Rosie O'Reilly struck what was probably the goal of the day from almost thirty yards out. It was a superb strike. However, further scores from the girls in green and white left them in front at the final whistle, 5-9 to the USA's 2-3.

So it was all to play for on the following day where Naomh Brid in Blanchardstown was the chosen venue. The welcome given to the visiting teams was second to none. The hard working committee comprised Collette Cody, Patsy Powell and her son
