The presentation of the New Ireland Cup this afternoon is bound to be an emotional moment. Whether it is Paula Brown or Geraldine Dwyer who runs up the steps of the Hogan Stand to receive the trophy, she will be aware of the special significance of the occasion in the history of her county.

She will receive the cup from Uachtaran Mary Lynch and hold it aloft to salute all who have worked and played in her county over the years, to pay tribute to a team which has reached its goal and to inspire the up and coming generation.

The fact that neither Kildare or Armagh have previously won an All-Ireland title adds to the occasion. Both have come close to realising their dream. Two years ago, Armagh contested the final against Galway. They were unfortunate to meet Galway in such superb form. To their credit they kept plugging away when other teams may have crumbled.

Many counties reach a junior final, lose the match and, subsequently, fade into oblivion. But not Armagh, they felt that they did not do justice to themselves and longed for another chance. With slightly over half the team still available and some talented newcomers drafted into the side, they consider that they are ready for the fray.

Players like Sally McCone, Ursula McGivern, Denise McStay, Paula Brown, Fionnuala O'Connor, Mary Donnelly and Rita McGuigan are not in the mood to miss out a second time. They travelled a hard road to reach the final in Ulster, they overcame Antrim, Down, Derry and Tyrone. A win over 1985 rivals Galway boosted their confidence.

In many ways, the Kildare story is similar to that of Armagh. Last September, they came to Croke Park full of hope. Tension and nerves prevented the team from settling down. In the meantime, a young Clare side notched vital scores. By the time the Kildare girls found their form, the damage was done. In spite of that, they turned in a great last quarter and nearly pulled it off.

Delighted to be back so soon, the Kildare girls do not intend to permit the opposition to dicate the game. With ten of last season's team in the starting twelve, they will not be over awed.

Kildare have played twelve competitive matches this season. A feature of their play has been point scoring. A massive total of 105 points have been scored. The majority came from play and many players were involved.

They have excellent players in Miriam Malone, Pat Keatley, Bernie Farrelly, Melanie Treacy, Rose Merriman and Marianne Johnson. These counties met in the final of the inaugural National Junior League. Armagh pipped Kildare by two points. Will Kildare settle that score today?

Phyllis Bambury (Cappagh). Phyllis won several county championships with Broadford before transferring to Cappagh. Played colleges camogie with St. Mary's, Edenderry. Is deirfiúir le Máire Ul Riain a imríonn le Ceatharlach í. National League and Leinster medals.

Melanie Treacy (St. Laurences). Kildare Player of the Year in 1985, Melanie is an established member of the side although still in her teens. Her mother captained the Laois county team. Gael-Linn, National League and Leinster medals.

Geraldine Dwyer (Prosperous). Captaen na foirne inniu, Geraldine is a fine defender. Played colleges camogie with Vocational, Athy and won her place on the county team while still a schoolgirl. National League, Gael-Linn and Leinster medals.

Antoinette Merriman (Prosperous). Sister of goalkeeper Rose, she has been a regular on the side since the start of the decade. Fielded with Scoil Mhuire, Clane, in Leinster Colleges. Senior League with her club Prosperous and Gael-Linn, Leinster and National League.

Miriam Malone (Broadford). Best known member of the Kildare team, Miriam started her inter-county career at the tender age of fourteen. Has played senior and junior for Leinster and won a host of county medals. Gael-Linn, Leinster and National League medals.

Teresa Hanley (Carbury). A 1987 County minor. She plays colleges camogie for Edenderry. A good gaelic footballer. National League and Leinster medals. Patricia Keatley (Broadford). Patricia had a great game in the semi-final against Cork. Former colleges player with St. Mary's, Athy. Holder of National League, Leinster and Kildare championship medals. Marianne Johnson (Prosperous). Marianne has been a regular member of the county team since 1977. In her fifth year as County Secretary, she is also a capable referee. National League, Leinster and Kildare medals.

Bernadette Farrelly (Broadford). Bernadette has secured a permanent place on the county team this season. A colleges player with Vocational School, Edenderry, she has Leinster and National League medals. Gradam Tailte winner, 1987.

Nuala Kerrigan (Johnstown Bridge). Past pupil of Scoil Iosa, Kilcock, she comes from a sporting family, four of whom have played for Kildare. Leinster, National League and Kildare medals.

Kathleen Elliott (Prosperous). Has played colleges camogie with St. Marys, Naas, and Maynooth University. Is a niece of former Tipperary stars, Kathleen and Terry Griffin. Represented the Combined Universities and holds Leinster and National League medals.

Therese Farrelly (Broadford). Sister of Bernadette, she also lines out with Edenderry Vocational School. Played minor for the county. National League and Leinster championship medals.

Claire Moloney (Athy). Former County Clare player, she is employed in the Bank of Ireland, Newbridge. An chéad bhliain le Cill Dara di. National League and Leinster Junior Championship medals.

AISLING TREACY (St. Laurence's): A sixteen year old schoolgirl who has come up through the ranks. Represented Cill Dara at both. Under-14 and Minor level. Very promising player.

Four minutes into the 1970 All-Ireland Senior Final Ann Carroll cracked home a great goal. This was just the type of start which the young Kilkenny side had dreamed of. Play swung to the other end. A point from Liz Garvan was followed by a Peggy Dorgan goal. Cork were ahead.

The scene was set for an epic contest. Kilkenny were chasing their first ever All-Ireland title. Cork were attempting to bridge a twenty nine year gap to Kitty Buckley's 1941 winning team. Colourful fans were on Éilis Ní Náraigh, Cill Chainnigh the edge of their seats as they roared encouragement to their heroines.

An eighteen year old schoolgirl, Liz Garvan, came into her own. Giving one of the greatest individual performances seen in a final, she turned the game in Cork's favour and finished with a personal tally of 3-6. One can only wonder what influence Liz would have had on the game in the intervening years had she not chosen to make her home on foreign soil.

Two years later, red and white flags and black and amber hats bedecked Croke Park once again. Both teams started nervously and chances were missed. It was a day in which defenders were on top. An Angela Downey goal was balanced by a similar score from Liz

The turning point came when Cork forward, Anne Phelan, found herself in possession in front of goal. She made no mistake. The score settled Cork and they tacked on a few points. Ever popular Hannah Dineen stepped up to receive the O'Duffy Cup on behalf of a Cork team which wore the old style gymfrocks for the last time.

In what was widely described as the best final of modern times, Kilkenny and Cork proved what a wonderful game camogie is when they met in 1974. A match of great excitement, wonderful skill, classic scores and outstanding defensive play did not deserve a loser. Auburn-haired Helena O'Neill pointed a 35-yard free to draw the game in the closing seconds.

They placed shackles on the Cork forwards. At the other end, Angela Downey, Ursula Grace and Helena O'Neill notched the scores which mattered.

Years of striving by Kilkenny had at last been rewarded. There was no doubting which was the better team on this occasion. Kilkenny had joined the elite. In a sporting gesture, a group of Cork players lead by Hanah Dineen shouldered Ann Carroll from the field. d'Imigh an Corn abhaile go Cill Chainnigh don chéad uair ariamh.

Seven years later, Kilkenny and Cork provided the contestants for the 50th All-Ireland Final. A great start by Corcaigh saw them 2-6 to 0-4 ahead at half-time, but a wonderful fightback by Cill Chainnigh culminated in a last-minute levelling point by Margaret Farrell.

The weather for the replay was atrocious. Constant rain fell on a greasy pitch. Ann Downey, Bridie McGarry, Liz Neary and Biddy O'Sullivan were superb in the Kilkenny defence. Their mastery of the situation was so complete that only Mary O'Leary found her name on the scoresheet.

Martha Kearney and the appalling conditions restricted Angela Downey for much of the game. She danced her way through the Cork backline to palm the only goal of the match with minutes remaining. Liz Neary, a player who had made a major contribution to victory over the two matches, held the O'Duffy Cup aloft.

The counties enter their fifth All-Ireland Final with the score standing at two victories apiece. We look forward to an enthralling contest between two sides who are capable of putting on a magnificent exhibition of camogie.

Christy Ring and Shem Downey were key figures in the 1946 and 1947 All-Ireland Hurling Finals. Their daughters are likely to play an influential part in today's senior final. Angela and Ann will wear the black and amber while Mary Ring will don the red and white.

Strong links exist between camogie and the Galway team which won the 1987 All-Ireland Hurling championship. Coach Cyril Farrell has trained St. Raphaels, Loughrea to win three All-Ireland Colleges Senior Championships. Galway stars Joe Cooney and Eanna Ryan are brothers of camogie players Angela Cooney and Ann Ryan, both of whom hold All-Ireland Junior and Minor medals.

Three of the Cork players have represented Ireland at other sports — Anne Leahy (Volleyball), Sandie Fitzgibbon (Basketball) and Mary Geaney (Hockey).

Only three camogic players have been honoured with Texaco Awards — Una O'Connor, 1967, Sue Cashman, 1969 and Angela Downey, 1986.

Three of the successful Kilkenny Under 14 team have famous fathers. Gillian Dillon, Sinead and Tracey Millea are daughters of All-Ireland hurlers, Pa Dillon and Joe Millea. Orla Ryall's dad, Tom Ryall, is the author of the Kilkenny G.A.A. history.

Kildare player Kathleen Elliott is a niece of former Tipperary greats, Terry and Kathleen

Four girls playing in the senior final won All-Ireland Colleges Senior medals — Liz Neary (Presentation, Kilkenny); Clare Cronin (St. Aloysius, Cork); Sandie Fitzgibbon (North Presentation, Cork) and Liz Dunphy (St. Patrick's, Cork).

Cork player, Patricia Fitzgibbon, is a grand-niece of Dr. Edwin Fitzgibbon who donated the Fitzgibbon Cup for intervarsity hurling.

The four Fennelly brothers who fielded with Kilkenny in the All-Ireland Hurling final are cousins of former Camogie President, Mary Fennelly. Their sister Teresa played for the Kilkenny Juniors this season.

Kildare player Marianne Johnson has four brothers who have won national honours at one level or another in the colours of Kildare.

Elaine Barry-Murphy, who scored 3-3 for the Cork Minors this Summer, is a first cousin of All-Star hurler Jimmy Barry-Murphy.

All-Ireland hurler Tony O'Sullivan recently married Mary Owens who won an All-Ireland Minor medal with Cork in 1979.

Sean McCarthy, who won an All-Ireland hurling senior medal with Cork in 1986 is a brother of Cork goalkeeper, Marion McCarthy.

Julie McGuinness is a daughter of former Armagh great Lily Reynolds. Lily played many times for the Ulser senior team.

Armagh brother and sister, Paddy and Margaret Moriarty, have fielded for Ulster. Paddy has Railway Cup medals and Margaret won a Gael-Linn medal in 1979.

Both Kildare and Armagh won their first ever provincial title in the same year - 1961. Kilkenny made their Leinster breakthrough in 1959 when they took the junior title. Cork won the first of their 38 Munster Senior titles in 1932.

Gloria Lee (Kildare) refereed the 1963 All-Ireland Senior Final. Armagh also produced an All-Ireland referee. Bernie Byrne of Crossmaglen, now the Ulster Cathaoirleach, was in charge of the 1966 Final. Helena O'Neill (Kilkenny) controlled the 1978 Senior Final. Four Cork girls, Noreen Murphy, Lil O'Grady, Miriam Higgins and Betty Joyce have referees' medals.

Sister Mair&ad from St. Clares, Keady, is the President of the All-Ireland Post Primary Schools Council.

YOUTH gave way to experience at Croke Park yesterday when Kilkenny won their third All-Ireland senior camogie title on the trot. Cork came to the match with basically a young team leavened with some survivors of their "Golden Years" of the late 1970's whereas Kilkenny had players who went right back to the county's first All-Ireland in 1974.

But it was those wise warriors who won the game for Kilkenny. Bridie McGarry was outstanding in defence, Liz Neary opened up many routes to the Cork goal, most of which were taken by the peerless Angela Browne, Downey as well, who was quite outstanding in this match scoring 1.7.

Almost as prominent was her sister Ann Downey, who dominated midfield as well as scoring the goal which sealed the match. Between them these twins now have a remarkable fourteen all-Ireland senior medals and, on yesterday's evidence, there doesn't seem to be a team in the country who can stop them making it sixteen next September.

An attendancae of 5,496 took some time to warm to the match as the opening ten minutes were anything stylish with far too many missed strokes and wides. But Kilkenny set the game alight with a goal in the 16th minuute. Clare Jones delivered a long ball in from the right wing, all the Cork backs missed it and Breda Holmes stayed calm to paim the slio-thar past a helpless Marion McCarthy.

Thirty seconds later Cork got their first score through captain Val Fitzpatrick but in the 20th minute they fell way behind when Browne got her gdal, beating two defenders and then bravely diving to flick the ball goalwards when the chance seemed lost. The ball bounced off McCarthy's shoulder, but was already over the line by the time Holmes raced in to finish it to the

Cork managed to hold Kilkenny to 2-3 to 0-2 at half time and with Sandie Fitzgibbon, Claire Cronin and Linda Mellrick all beginning to come to erms with the Kilkenny chalenge, they were by no means out of the match especially with the slight benefit of the breeze to come in their favour in the secord half.

They got a great boost when, after the teams had swopped points, substitute Mary Geaney got a goal. Another replacement Cathy Landers had sent in a long delivery which, like the pass for Holme's goal, eluded all the backs and ran nicely for the multi-talented Geaney to Score

Kilkenny's response was to turn Browne loose. She gave Mary Ring a torrid time, firing over four points in five minutes with a delightful mixture of skill, pace and power as sister Ann and Anna Whelan really began to get on top at midfield.

This burst forced Cork into going for goals and it was a tactic doomed to failure with McGarry, Rita Weymes and Deirdre Malone all commanding their area in great style. Behind them Marie Fitzpatrick was in fine form in goal, making three good saves and topping all of them with a bril-liant effort, when ten minutes remained, to foil Mellerick who had been allowed run through unchallenged. But the Ballycallan girl ran from her line and blocked the Cork girl's effort.

Ann Downey's goal, from a 13-metre free with four minutes remaining was merely icing on a very sweet cake. Despite the fact that only three players managed to score for the team, this Kilk-enny oufit looks set to domi-nate for some time to come.

Cork girls outgunned

Kilkenny 3-10, Cork 1-7

IT was indeed an historic All-Ireland for the heroines of Kilkenny at Croke Park yesterday, By comprehensively defeating Cork in a very competitive and entertaining final, they emblazoned their county's name in lights as the first to win three All-Ireland senior camogie championships in succession.

And not even the most ardent Cork supporter in the attendance of 5,496. which included the President of Ireland, Dr. Patrick Hillery, and Cardinal Tomas O Fiaich. could deny the splendid Kilkenny ladies their great triumph.

Cork battled bravely and at times, particularly in the second half, fell victims to cruel misfortune. But in the end, they were outclassed by a tactically superior and more skilful Kilkenny side.

Displaying great letermination, Cork gave s good as they got in the pening sequences, even bough the game's urrent outstanding ersonality, Angela rowne (nee Downey) pinted two frees to spur ilkenny into the lead ter 12 minutes play. But en, in the twinkling of eye, Kilkenny pounced id two palmed goals om full forward, Breeda olmes and Mrs. Browne

rned this final into

both a victory and funeral march, depending on the side of the fence one sat.

Kilkenny's golden goals in the 17th and 20th minutes were scores of paramount significance because Cork were always fighting an uphill battle, one they never really looked like winning.

They trailed 2-3 to 0-2 at the interval and the signs looked ominous. particularly with Kilkenny growing in stature around the middle of the field where Ann Downey and Anna Whelan performed artistically and authoratively for the supreme champions of camogie.

Cork might have been closer on the scoreboard but for some inexplicable misses from good positions when the tension was at its zenith early on. But, with full forward Breeda Holmes playing deep, with great affect, the Cork defence always looked vulnerable as Kilkenny's decisive goals conclusively proved.

Kilkenny goals highlighted Cork's deficiencies at the back. However, the introduction of Cathy Landers-Karnedy brought about a steady influence, Mrs. Karnedy, team captain Val Fitzpatrick, and Sandy Fizbgibbon, on the turn

over, tried their hearts out to keep Cork in the hunt.

And courage against skilful odds was rewarded four minutes after the break when substitute full forward. the multi-talented Mary Geaney, goaled to narrow the deficit to just four points.

But, before Cork could draw inspiration, the devastating Angela Browne shattered their dreams of a real revival with a succession of brilliant points.

Worse was to follow for Cork, as Kilkenny, spearheaded by Mrs. Browne and her twin sister Ann, exuded marvellous confidence.

With the last quarter dawning, Cork found themselves six points in arrears. From a long puck out from Marion McCarthy, Brian Dillons defender, Linda Mellerick, who had been transferred in attack, ran in behind the Kilkenny defensive cover to gain possession.

Alas, her attempted hand pass to the net was acrobatically saved by the alert Kilkenny goalkeeper, Marie Fitzpatrick. Then, two minutes later, Miss Mellerick powered forward a goalward drive only to see it deflected by the head of team colleague Clare Cronin.

These huge setbacks

sounded the death knell for Cork and their ambitions of All-Ireland victory were finally laid to rest when the elegant Ann Downey goaled from a 15-yards free four minutes from time to give the history makers their sweetest victory of all time.

KILKENNY 3-10 CORK 1-7

Ladies of camogie in Ireland! At Croke Park on Sunday, a talented and super fit Kilkenny stormed to victory over Cork in an excellent All-Ireland senior final, and in the process clocked-up the county's first three-in-arow in the code.

But the re-writing of the records did not stop there, because these super ladies took home the county's fifth national title in three years, and completed the second National League/Championship double in the same time. As Sean Kelly might say: 'Super stuff'.

And really, it was just that kind of fare that was served up by both Cork and Kilkenny. Cork were good. Kilkenny were great. The standard of play was excellent, and the individual skills displayed by some of the ladies was hard to credit.

In recent years lady athletes have made tremendous strides, and for track runners in particular, tumbling times have highlighted the advances. But after watching the splendid fare at Croke Park, one must suggest camogie has come on a bomb too. This final was all about skill, and more skill, and some of the competitors showed as much neatness in handling the camán as any man, and one means that in the most complimentary manner.

Cork had stars in the daring Sandie Fitzgibbon, the big hearted Claire Cronin, Val Fitzpatrick and Mary Greaney.

Uncanny eye

On the other side there were stars aplenty. Goalkeeper, Marie Fitzpatrick showed an uncanny eye to spot trouble, and she had the class to snuff out dangerous situations. The defence as a whole was superb. Anna Whelan pushed an ocean of possession forward-from midfield, and was equally good at striking right or left. In the second half Angela Downey (Browne) provided the scoring power that blasted Cork into oblivion. Another player of sheer class, Breda Holmes, repeatedly ripped the losers defence to shreds as she went on piercing solo runs.

This Kilkenny performance had all the signs of first rate coaching. The lifting and striking were good. Catching the ball and hooking an opponent came as second nature to the players, and the hand-pass, a beautiful part of Gaelic games when used properly, was maximised to the full. Trainer-coach, Tom Ryan and captain, Bridie McGarry can be proud of the way their charges executed their duties, both individually and collectively.

By half-time, few in the attendance of about 4,500 must have doubted Kilkenny were going to win. The Leesiders had fallen into arrears of 0-2 to 2-3, and were so stretched to cope at times, the destiny of the O'Duffy Cup seemed decided. It was, and a huge black and amber banner depicting the trophy and with the slogan 'Bridie — Hold Me Now', really did tell the true story.

The early exchanges, which were played at breakneck pace, suggested Cork were good, but their opponents could be their masters. A second minute foul on Breda Holmes gave Angela Downey an easy point from a free, and the latter hit the next score in the 12th minute (0-2 to 0-0).

Near mid-half, Kilkenny goaled and took a firm grip on proceedings. The elusive Breda Holmes started the rot. The St. Paul's player cut through the Cork defence on a solo run. She passed to Angela Downey, who had a shot blocked out and hastily pushed out to the right. Clare Jones drove the ball back in, and Miss Holmes caught it well and palmed into the net (1-2 to no score).

Four minutes from the end Kilkenny put the game beyond all doubt. Breda Holmes was fouled 20 yards out in front of goal. Casually, Ann Downey approached the free shot, but she blasted the ball low into the net. The three-in-a-row was a reality.

One could not praise both teams enough. This was a wonderful advertisement for the game, and proved when played by two skilful sides, camogie can be a real joy to watch. It was exactly that at Croke Park on Sunday.

This is again proving the year of Angela Browne (Downey) in camogie. When the great Kilkenny forward decided not to defend her Gradam Tailte title in June, there were those who felt she might not leave nearly as strong an imprint on the camogie scene in 1987 as in past seasons.

Gradam Tailte is the sport's annual day-long competition for the camogie player of the year in each county. It is decided on a points system over a number of disciplines or exercises, and the brilliant Kilkenny ace won the title for the third successive time in 1986.

But her absence from that important test has still not prevented Angela, who earlier this year became Camogie's first Texaco award winner in 19 years, from once more proving a dominant force in the sport. In all the other competitions - League, Championship and Club and Interprovincial ties - she has been turning on the skills to a remarkable degree.

In the National League final at Nowlan Park in June, the dashing forward was in sparkling form. She displayed all her extra special gifts in impressive style, and scored 1-4 to power Kilkenny to a most convincing win over Dublin.

Even better was to come in Kilkenny's defence of the All-Ireland senior championship - especially in the final with Cork at Croke Park in September. This was an-

other five-star final show from one of the game's greatest-ever exponents.

Browne played very well in the first half, but really came into her own in the second. She also did much in that spell to end the bid by Cork to stage a come-back. The Leesiders trailed by 0-2 to 2-3 at the interval, but for a spell after the change of ends looked like making a genuine effort to get back into the game. Then, we saw Angela at her dynamic best as she rifled over four superb points to effectively halt the challengers come-back bid and set Kilkenny firmly on course for a first treble of All-Ireland senior champion-ships.

Interestingly enough, Kilkenny have won seven All-Ireland senior titles over-all, the first in 1974 - and Angela has played in every one of the successful teams.

Since the O'Duffy Cup triumph she has been just as prominent with her club, St. Paul's, in their quest to regain the All-Ireland club title after an interval of ten years, and with the Leinster side that retained the Gael-Linn interprovincial crown at the end of October.

There was an unusual feature to the Kilkenny-Cork summit, by the way. Angela Browne and Mary Ring (Cork) were in direct opposition in the game and as a result maintained probably a unique family link - certainly a most rare one.

Their fathers, Shem Downey and Christy Ring, were prominent figures in the All-Ireland senior hurling finals of 1946 and 1947. Downey "marked" Ring in 1946, when he played at centre half back. Cork won that final, but Kilkenny were successful the following year when both Downey and Ring were forwards.

The O'Duffy Cup game in September confirmed Kilkenny's status as one of the most efficient powers ever in the game's history. Apart from recording a first-ever treble of All-Ireland senior titles, the Noresiders completed the big double of the National League and the championship in the same season for the second time in two years.



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Anti-man 'bias' by camogie board

CORK'S Camogie County Board could become "a laughing stock" because of a sexist bye-law which prohibits men from holding any positions in the board, from becoming selectors or attending meetings, outspoken Cork city councillor Pat Murray claimed last night.

According to Cllr. Murray, who trains an under-age team, the byelaw was still in place because of an anti-man bias by middleaged women board members and supporters.

"I am discriminated st and cannot come a selector if I wanted to because I'm a man, yet at club level men coach teams and the county team is trained by a man, Tom Nott," maintained the person known in the Bishopstown club as 'Mr. Camogie.'

Cork County Board is one of the few, if not the only boards which has the by-law operating, he

told the Echo, and said it was hypocritical for them to discriminate against men in Cork, while other counties depended on them at all levels.

National PRO of the Camogie Association Ms. Mary Moran last night dismissed the allegation of the board being "antiman." "It's a girls sport and it make sense for

girls to run it. A number of men do help, and we're very glad to have them but we made a decision to run our own affairs 46 years ago and we're doing it very sucessfully in Cork," she said.

It was not hypocritical to discriminate against men when the county was strong, while allowing them in key positions when the association was weak. "Maybe it's because we're all girls that we're strong," she suggested.

Two other counties, Dublin and Antrim also had all women boards, and this may be as a result of a bye-law, she

Pat Murray trained the Bishopstown Under 14 camogie team, which this year won an All Ireland title, and several years ago the club put forward a motion that men be allowed hold positions within the board. The motion was defeated at the county board annual convention.

CAMOGIE COMMENT BY MARY MORAN

THE year 1987 belongs to Kilkenny. Two years ago, Bridie McGarry lead her county to a unique National League and All-Ireland Championship double. Captain again this season, Bridie stepped up to receive the two major trophies in senior camogic and had a hand in winning the Club Championship and the Gael-Linn Cup for good measure.

Prior to 1970. Kilkenny were regarded as also-rans in the camogic world. Seventeen years later, the county's position on the Roll of Honour is third place behind Dublin and Cork. Seven All-Ireland Senior Championships and four National League titles have gone their way.

Angela Downey, Bridie McGarry,
Anne Downey and Liz Neary have
long been reckoned as the stars of the
Kilkenny team. With her memorable
displays this season, full-forward
Breda Holmes now ranks alongside
them. Biddy O'Sullivan, Marie
Fitzpatrick and Clare Jones will
harbour special memories from the
campaign.

Kildare will always remember 1987. Camogic was introduced to the short grass county in 1908. Years of striving and disappointment were forgotten as their loyal and overjoyed supporters cheered Geralding Dwyer as she received the New Ireland Cup. It was very pleasing to see players like Miriam Malone. Anna Dargan, Pat Keatley Marianne Johnson, Rose Merriman and Geraldine Dwyer, who have given much to the game, awarded with an All-Ireland medal.

Galway remain on top in the teenage scene. A minor side containing exciting prospects in Mary Treacy, Triona Dolphin Aileen Brett and Bridget Fabretained the All-Ireland crown.

St. Raphaels, Loughrea etched the own special niche in colleges historwhen they lifted Corn Sceilg for the third successive year. Nine girls were part of the three victories. Of these, Angela Cooney, Anne Fahy, Brid stratford and Deirdre Costello have already advanced to senior interprovincial camogic. No small credit is due to their coach Cyril Farrell who, no doubt, regards 1987 as a special year,

The new Colleges Sevens proved to be an outstanding success. The new prophy commemorates the late Agnes Purcell. The young players thoroughly enjoyed the seven-a-side game Claire O'Callaghan, Frances proderick, Helen Cagney and Eve Watson combined delightfully to bring the cup to St. Marys, Charleville, To underline their rating in the college arena, the school also captured the All-Ireland Colleges innor championship.

Speciators at the National Feile in Clair were concerned that the standard was not as high as in previous years. Division One winters, Bishopstown (Cork) brought better teams to Feile in other year and lost. While the present team is short on big names, they stuck to their task with great determination and were rewarded.

Unrelenting rain spoiled the Club Championship final and erased any hope of a repeat of the epic encounter between St. Pauls and Glen Rovers in the year before. Defences came out on top and the only goal of the match by Breda Holmes decided the issue in favour of St. Pauls.

Leinster retained the Gael-Linn Cup without undue stress. Munster came back to snatch the junior interprovincial trophy when it appeared that Ulster had it sewn up. Bernie Farrelly (Kildare) took over as Gradam Tailte champion and Claire Lynch (Galway) was a deserving Feile Skills winner.

1988 fooms around the corner. It will welcome a new president and the report of the Special Commission. An event to capture the imagination will be Dublin v The Rest of Ireland in June as part of the Millennium celebrations. Perhaps Dublin will have an All-Ireland in mind as well.

More Inter-County Disappointment

HE 1987 season will not be remembered with any great affection by Dublin's camogie fraternity. It proved, once again, to be a very dismal year from the point of view of recapturing former glories.

A season which had started out with such hope and expectations lay shattered in ruins at the hands of arch rivals and eventual All-Ireland Championship winners, Kilkenny. They had already brushed aside the metropolitans' challenge in the league final earlier in the year and Dublin's pride was badly dented by their defeat in the semi-final of the O'Duffy Cup.

So, what went wrong? Many long hours of discussion have been spent in trying to assess the reason or reasons for Dublin's demise from the top rung of the ladder in camogie!

Having been involved with the running and organisation of the county team in the season just past, perhaps it would be appropriate to suggest that some of the answers may have emerged during 1987. A completely new team of selectors was chosen to take care of the county's fortunes, and when these three got together they certainly were not slow to show their hands.

Phyllis Breslin, Ann Carey and Rita White initially called a panel of 23 players together when they outlined their plans for the National League. It was spelt out to them what the ambitions were for future months, but that Dublin's ultimate aim was a senior championship title.

Already, the selectors had omitted from their panel six of the team who has been defeated by Kilkenny in last year's final. And so, from the outset, the players knew that nobody was sure of their place.

The first league game

against Wexford turned out to be a revelation. Recalled stars like Barbara Redmond and Ann Colgan, along with goalkeeper Toni O'Byrne, proved that there was no substitute for experience. And this was shown to the full when complete newcomer Louise Lynch, Jo Holden and Patricia Clinton began to play as if their lives depended on it.

Two points in the bag against Wexford gave this much-changed metropolitan outfit the confidence to travel to Cork for their next engagement with new-found relish. Again, they came out on top and the players began to realise that maybe this was to be Dublin's year.

Because of the make-up of the league, the first 1987 meeting of Dublin and Kilkenny was of little academic interest as both teams had already qualified for the final proper.

Although only beaten by a point in that game, the national final proved to be a disaster. Well in the game at half-time, Dublin fell apart dramatically in the second period and, although they had the monopoly of possession for much of this tie, it was Kilkenny who triumphed eventually.

With yet another meeting against the Noresiders in the Leinster championship imminent, the selectors were now burdened with major headaches. Not only had they the task of trying to lift their side after this debacle, but the economic condition of the country had robbed them of Jo Holden, Breda Kenny and Marie Connell, who had left these shores to seek employment elsewhere.

However, work had to be done and when the metropolitans again faced the might of Kilkenny in the Leinster Championship, the team bore no resemblance to that which had gone before. Toni O'Byrne was on holidays and Anne Byrne, from county champions Crumlin, was named as the custodian. Elsewhere, backs were converted into forwards; forwards were moved to midfield; midfielders were moved to the defence and a complete newcomer to senior inter-county fare, Michelle Donnelly, was introduced.

All of these changes turned out to Dublin's advantage and while one might argue that this particular competition carries no importance as regards the open draw competition, the manner in which Dublin completely destroyed Kilkenny in that semi-final was very encouraging.

Another defeat of Wexford in the Leinster final left the metropolitans in good shape for their championship clash with the famous black and amber once again.

Trainer Ann Carey spared no time or energy in her efforts to bring the players to peak condition for this vital test. Players replied with total commitment and when captain Marian Conroy led her players out on that August afternoon it was felt that the tide was about to turn.

Alas, 50 minutes later the dream was shattered. Once again, Kilkenny had proved they are quite nigh invincible at present. Players like Bridie McGarry, Rita Wemyss and Biddy O'Sullivan completely stifled the efforts of the Dublin forwards and, elsewhere, Angela Downey, Breda Holmes and Anna Whelan had too much panache for their opponents.

So Dublin would now appear to be back at the beginning. Nobody will disagree with the brilliance of this Kilkenny team. Every senior team in the last decade has, at some time or another, succumbed to them. But Dublin must bounce back.

Perhaps the most obvious problem is the lack of real talent emerging. True, the junior team won their national league but there were a number of junior players tried this year and, while there are some very good and promising stars at minor and under 14 level, it will be a couple of years before they reach senior standard.

Another problem nowadays is that players are involved in other sports. G.A.A., soccer and badminton have taken many players from our game, and as has been seen with the dual players in the G.A.A., total commitment at the top level in more than one sport eventually takes its toll.

Also, I feel that the senior league in Dublin is not of as high a standard as perhaps it should be. There are really only three or four teams who can compete at the top level and this surely can't be for the good of the game when it comes to inter-county fare.

Nonetheless, young players like Mairead Cronin, Louise Lynch and Michelle should prove to be the backbone on which Dublin may build for the future.

This coming season will be something of a recovery mission for the metropolitans. The aim of the county must be a senior championship title and all administrators, players, mentors and spectators must strive honestly and earnestly towards this ambition. After all, one senior championship title in 21 years is not good enough for a county like Dublin!

On the club scene, Crumlin once again retained their championship crown and made it a double by capturing the senior league. Celtic remained the only Dublin club to win the prestigious Kilmacud Crokes All-Ireland Seven-a-side competition when they beat a very gallant St. Mary's, Galway, side in the final.

GLEN Rovers celebrated their fortieth playing season by taking the Cork Senior Championship for the fifteenth time. The popular Val Fitzpatrick captained the Glen as they set out to defend Cork, Munster and All-Ireland crowns which they won in style in 1986. Aghabullogue and Blackrock presented no problems in the opening rounds. The Glen brushed St. Finbarr's aside with such ease in the semi-final that many fans saw the county final as a formality.

In the other half of the draw, Sarsfields provided the main talking points. Liz Dunphy, Lilian Zinkant, Eileen Noonan, Valerie Twomey and Ann Brady toppled Na Piarsaigh in a most exciting game and held the fancied Killeagh team to a draw in a cliff-hanger. Killeagh were better organised in the replay and qualified to meet Eire Og in the semi-final. Killeagh lacked adequate replacements for Ann Marie Landers and Barbara Kirby in the Eire Og match. At times they split open the Eire Og defence but were found wanting themselves in vital areas. Goals from Claire O'Regan, Noelle O'Driscoll and Deirdre Callinan earned the Ovens side a place in the final.

The expected runaway victory by Glen Rovers did not take place. Indeed the nervous looking THE CAMOGIE SCENE

champions were in deep trouble at half-time. The determined play of Eire Og prevented the Glen from getting into their stride. Points from Val Fitzpatrick, Denise Cotter, Ger McCarthy and Therese O'Callaghan brought the Glen back into contention but it took two last minute goals from Claire McCarthy to settle the issue in their favour.

With the Science Cup replaced on its stand in Blackpool for another year, the Glen players prepared to take on the best club side in Munster. The most striking aspect of the Munster Club Championship was the huge gap in standards between the Cork champions and the representatives of the other counties. Sixmilebridge, Lismore and Cashel in turn provided Glen with target practice but with no real challenge. Glen went on to contest the All-Ireland final in which they made a rather tame exit, to the Kilkenny champions.

INTER-COUNTY

At inter-county level, it was a disappointing season. True, Cork retained Munster titles, but to a demanding following, that is not enough. The senior team started the National League campaign as title-holders but finished pointless. An eleven point defeat at Nowlan Park at the hands of Kilkenny underlined the difference between Cork and the top team in the game.

The draw presented Cork with a clearcut path to the All-Ireland Senior Final. Five goals in the opening half ended the Antrim challenge in the first round. Cork struggled in the Wexford game. While winning possession, they were unable to convert it to scores and the match remained for the taking until two goals by Irene O'Leary in the dying seconds.

Val Fitzpatrick lead Cork onto Croke Park to face Kilkenny with six girls, playing in their first All-Ireland Final, running behind her. The panel

had prepared diligently since July and hopes were high that this young Cork side could pull it off. It was not to be. Cork came up against a Kilkenny team at the pinnacle of their form. The key players in the Kilkenny side used their experience and craft to dominate the game. To their credit, the Cork girls tried all they knew to the finish. There is plenty of ability in this Cork side and Kilkenny cannot go on forever. Cork should groom a young side to be ready to take over from the champions.

JUNIORS

Seven goals from Irene O'Keeffe in the Munster Junior Championship whetted Cork appetites for a good run in this grade. However, the runaway wins over Tipperary and Clare only flattered to deceive. Cork were found wanting in several positions when they came up against Kildare. With only Claire O'Regan, Fiona O'Driscoll and Niamh Cotter available from the Cork team which failed to Galway in the 1986 All-Ireland Minor semi-final, Cork had to find many newcomers. Waterford and Kerry presented no problems. Clare tested Cork in the Munster Final and it took storming displays from Eileen Buckley, Maria O'Brien, Imelda Leahy, Claire O'Regan and Claire Barry to carry the day.

Imelda Leahy was the star of the semi-final against Armagh. The long journey northwards took its toll. The team tired visibly in the second half and were relieved to hear the final whistle. Cork ran up against a fine Galway team in the final. With a number of the team affected by the big occasion, mistakes were made. The players battled away to the finish but were two points short.

COLLEGES

St. Mary's, Charleville continued to dominate at colleges level. The traditional Cork colleges have slipped back somewhat. Indeed, the level of individual skill on the minor panel was not on par with other years. It is significant that Na Piarsaigh, Blackrock, Bishopstown and St. Finbarrs did not have a player

in the starting twelve. These clubs formed the backbone of previous Cork minor teams. The influence of basketball is a major factor in the case of Na Piarsaigh. Many girls tend to play a number of sports which reduces the time allotted to camogic. Therefore, the basic skills are not being mastered to the required degree.

We may expect to see several Bishopstown players in Cork colours over the next few years. The concentration on young players paid off this season when the club won Division I of Feile na nGael. Aisling O'Leary, Cecilia Crowley, Orla Higgins, Grace O'Connell, Gillian Conlon, Deirdre Moynihan and Aine White caught the eye time and again,

U.C.C. were caught by U.C.G. in the semi-final of the Ashbourne Cup despite the best efforts of Eileen Noonan, Patsy Keniry, Paula Carey and Rose Desmond. The Cork university will stage the 1988 series in early February Hopefully, they will be able to put a good side together and get the new season off to a great start.

W HO is the best hurler in Kilkenny? Who has the most skill, the most craft, the most star quality? Those questions are likely to produce a dozen answers but one name is certain to figure, even when the judges assess the candidates from the most chauvenistic of male viewpoints.

For although camogie players dislike having their game referred to as women's hurling there are enough similarities to make it a reasonable comparison.

And, in those circumstances Angela Browne (Downey) is a perfectly valid contender for any award where hurling skills are involved.

It has been quite a year for Angela. Her excellence hauled camogie onto the national sports stage early on when she won a Texaco award. It was an honour which she richly deserved but it was only the start.

Her rich array of skills helped Kilkenny to a National League success and then onto the All-Ireland final against Cork. In a remarkable display she scored 1-7 of Kilkenny's total as they outclassed Cork by 3-10 to 1-7.

Interestingly, her direct opponent in that game played before 5,496 speciators in Croke Park, was Mary Ring, daughter of the late, great Christy Ring.

That All-Ireland victory has established Kilkenny as one of the great all-time forces in camogic. It was their 7th senior title since 1974. Angela Browne (Downey) has figured in all those successes, as have Liz Neary and Bridie McGarry, who captained the team this year.

Could teach the men a thing or two!

Indeed, this trio have played a major part in the Kilkenny success story and it speaks a great deal for their devotion to camogic that they have managed to stay at the top for so long. And on the evidence of their performances this year there is every reason to assume that the fairytale will go on.

And with Kilkenny hurlers currently going through a rough patch, they might be well advised to seek some help from the talented girls whose range of skills are incredible.

While Kilkenny continue to dominate the senior camogic scene, Kildare fired out a warning for the future with a fine win in the All-Ireland junior final. Miriam Malone did for Kildare what Angela Browne (Downey) had done for Kilkenny, scoring 1-6 in the final against Armagh.

Kildare, who lost the 1986 final to Clare, were never unduly troubled en route to a comprehensive 2-10 to 0-7 win.

CAMOGIE HISTORY FOR KILDARE

FAMOUS FIRSTS FOR GERALDINE AND BERNIE

Geraldine Dwyer, an accomplished half back from Prosperous, and Bernadette Farrelly, a teenage forward talent from Broadford, have more cause than most in camogie to look back in a special way on the past year.

The reason? Dwyertook her place in the ranks of history-makers in the sport as captain of the Kildare team that captured the county's first-ever All-Ireland championship in any grade. Farrelly became the youngest-ever winner of Gradam Tailte, camogie's annual day-long competition for the player of the year in each county, and decided over a number of disciplines or exercises.

Kildare's first All-Ireland crown in the sport was recorded at the expense of Armagh in the junior grade last September, and the win proved a rich measure of compensation for the county for their defeat by Clare at the

same stage last year.

Geraldine Dwyer, who proved an outstanding team leader, and had an excellent game all round, is a top-class defender. She won her place in the Kildare county team while still at school, and has enjoyed much success. Her medals collection includes in addition to the All-Ireland souvenir - trophies for Leinster, the National League and Gael-Linn (interprovincial series).

Kildare may have had a long wait for that elusive first national championship crown, but they made it all worthwhile with a stylish performance. The Leinster girls combined well, displayed top-class skills and play of a high standard, as they powered to a convincing 2-10 to 0-7 success.

A high point of the winning show was the performance in the middle of the park of sure-striking Miriam Malone of Broadfor.d She gave one of the best individual displays of the year in the sport, as she stamped her personality on the final with her intelligent play, and superb accuracy.

Miriam, who is Kidare's best knownplayer, socred 1-6 of her team's total - two points more than Armagh scored. She now has added an Alllreland medal to an impressive collection that have been won in the interprovincoal competition for the Gael-Linn Cup, the Leinster chamionship

and National League.

Kildare went close to a major national titles double in 1987. They qualified for the National Junior League decider last August, and playing at home at Clane were well fancied to take the honours. But, the Dubs ended the Kildare hopes as they chalked up an unexpectedly easy win by 6-4 to 1-7. It is a tribute to the Kildare players that their second national final defeat in under a year did not discourage them, and that they recovered to take the All-Ireland junior crown.

Marianne Johnson, of Prosperous, who is the Kildare County Board camogie secretary, scored her team's other goal in the All-Irealnd final. Teresa Hanley, a county minor this year as well, and who is from Carbury, scored two points. Patricia Keatley, of Broadford, and Nuala Kerrigan, of Johnstown Bridge, with a point a piece completed the Kildare scoring against Armagh.

GRADAM TAILTE

Gradam Tailte could be described as camogie's own superstars compettion. This is an annual event, launched in 1982, and the disciplines or exercises cover camogie skills, athletics and gym events.

Bernadette Farrelly, at only 16, became the youngest-ever winner of the coveted title. She displayed tremendous ability in the various tests, and joined an exclusive company of players as a result of her success.

Bernadette. who was introduced of the Kildare team during last season's National Junior League campaign, is the first from the county to win this prestigious aware.

She played with Kildare in the minor grade, and was one of the outstanding players in the march to the New Ireland Cup for the All-Ireland junior

championship.

Educated at Derrinturn National School, and Edenderry Vocational School, Bernadette thus completed an outstanding double in 1988. A clever player of much potential she has undoubtedly a wonderful future at the sport.

Camogie star's first medal was won with hurling team

KILKENNY senior camogie goalkeeper Marie Fitzpatrick has experienced the opposite extremes in the game she loves. In the early part of her career she couldn't get a break. Now things have changed completely and she can hardly believe her good luck.

URING the past three years she has won three all-Ireland senior medals. She has played on two National League winning sides. And she is still only 20 years old.

"Things have really turned around for me in recent times, and I hope the good run continues", she said with jollity in her voice. "With this present Kilkenny squad anything is possible".

Before the good times there were many dark days for this young Piltown lady who, strange as it may seem, plays her club camogie with St. Brigid's (Ballycallan). About five years ago the local club in Piltown fell through, and she was forced to seek club involvement elsewhere. She got the opportunity to join St. Brigid's, and jumped at it.

Such an arrangement obviously presents difficulty for training and matches, bearing in mind the distance the two areas are apart, but Marie's obvious love for the game helps her surmount all obstacles.

In Piltown, her Gaelic career started with the local under-11 hurling team. It wasn't a very auspicious beginning. The team played 16 matches and won just one. Still, Marie was presented with a medal for being the best player, so someone recognised her talent with the ash.

Later, better things were to follow. In 1980 she won the camogic skills competition at Féile na nGael, and was runner-up the following year.

AMPLE COMPENSATION

Thereafter followed a series of disappointments with the Kilkenny under-14, 16 and junior teams. They could never manage Dublin, and year after year the girls from the capital downed the Noresiders in every competition.

"I was picked on goal for Kilkenny for the National League final in 1985, and when we beat Dublin I had a particular reason to celebrate", she recalled. "At last I had been on a team

that beat them. Since then we have beaten them in a second League final, and two all-Irelands, so I have received ample compensation over a short few years".

Indeed, there was a little story behind her selection in goal in 1985. Two weeks before the big match Kilkenny still hadn't settled on a 'keeper. Marie was asked to give it a go. She did. The rest is history. She has figured on two double winning teams and the side that completed the all-Ireland treble.

"I had been playing outfield, but I mustn't have been doing that well", Marie said with a tone of amusement in her voice. "I had played in goal before and always liked it. I am happy in the position, and would not change for anything".

Going on her commanding performance in this year's all-Ireland final win over Cork, any would-be contender for the No. 1 jersey will have a job ousting her.

"I was more nervous that day than ever before", she conceded. "I don't know why. I think perhaps it was because there appeared to be more interest than ever in the final. Even at home in Piltown the interest was great, and a bus load of supporters travelled for the game. I think in the back of my mind I was afraid I might let those people down. Thankfully, everything worked out well".

"I was pleased with my all-Ireland performance. It was probably my best game ever".

Now what about the future?

"There is definitely another all-Ireland in this Kilkenny team", Marie assured. "Right now Angela and Ann Downey, Bridie McGarry and Liz Neary have seven all-Irelands each, and the best record of modern times is the eight held by Marie McCarthy (Cork). It would be great for our girls to be ranked up there with the best. They deserve to be".

NOW A TRAINER

She said when she was growing up she always wanted to play senior camogic for Kilkenny. After the all-Ireland win she brought the O'Duffy Cup to the local national school at Templeorum and there was such enthusiasm she felt sure there must be girls there who have similar ambitions.

"The standard of camogic at club level is very good at the moment", she thought. "The successful run of the county team has helped a lot".

Indeed, Marie's own exploits would seem to have rubbed off and encouraged youngsters in Piltown. An under-14 team was fielded in the Roinn C camogie championship this year, and it carried off the title. Marie was the team trainer.

From the time she was four years old
— so she was told — her father,
Michael who, incidentally, played a lot
of his club hurling with GraigueBallycallan although not from the area,
always helped and encouraged her to
play camogie. There was nothing but
help and assistance forthcoming from
the people of the Piltown club and
parish.

"A lot of people have given me help down the years, including Kilkenny trainer Tom Ryan", she said. "I hope I can continue to do well, for these people, and for myself also".

T WAS an occasion when the Boss was away and the team did play, and really well at that, and landed an all-Ireland senior title.

That great servant of Gaelic games, George Leahy was the Boss concerned. St. Paul's was the team involved. And the competition was the club all-Ireland senior camogie final.

Duty as trainer-coach with the Offaly senior hurling team meant George had to travel to Croke Park. His charges there performed well, and beat Dublin by 2-8 to 0-6 in the National League.

Part of him was elsewhere, in Ballyragget with St. Paul's. The camogic team did the Boss proud, and reversed the result of the previous year's final against Glen Rovers (Cork) and won by 1-4 to 0-5 against the same opposition.

This was St. Paul's first win in 11 years in the championship, and their sixth in all — 1968, 1969, 1970-71, 1974-75, 1976-77 and now '87.

The final was no dazzling affair. Rain and high winds dictated otherwise. There wasn't the same atmosphere as at the decider the previous year when 3,000 supporters turned up in Cork. It was tough going, for both teams.

At half-time Glen Rovers led by 0-2 to 0-1. Six minutes into the second half St. Paul's turned the match in their favour. Angela Downey sent in a free that broke near the goal. Alert Paul's captain, Breda Holmes, gathered and palmed the only goal of the match. That was vital. The score put Paul's 1-2 to 0-2 ahead.

TENSE FINISH

Two minutes later Ann Downey threw over a point for the Noresiders, but the visitors' hit back for points from Val Fitzpatrick (2), one of Cork's stars in the all-Ireland inter-county senior final. The teams swopped a score each after that, and the finish was really tense.

The St. Paul's defence, with county captain Bridie McGarry a commanding figure, held together and the Leesiders had to go home without the trophy they came with.

Glen Rovers didn't surrender easily. They were tough and uncompromising. They wanted to prove the previous year's win was no fluke, and Angela Downey's early departure then from the Kilkenny team didn't really matter. St. Paul's were just happy to take the honours this time. Talk of things past did not bother them.

Overall it was a great club championship for the Kilkenny girls. They walked through the opposition until they got to the final. First they saw off Crumlin (Dublin) and then Buffers Alley (Wexford) in the provincial final. That was followed by a win over Glenamaddy (Galway).

Those wins put their slender — just one point — county final victory over Shamrocks into perspective. Yes, the standard on the Kilkenny club scene is very good. Team selectors Mary Fennelly, Carmel Savage and Mary McCorry didn't realise it at the time, but when St. Paul's won out in Kilkenny they had beaten the best they were going to come up against.

St. Paul's had six of the Kilkenny all-Ireland winning team to call upon, and, only to be expected, they formed the back-bone of the side. But top members of a great supporting cast were Marie Lawlor and Helen Holmes.

URING an unbeaten National League run, that ended with the county taking the title for the fifth time, the ladies had to be adaptable. And they gave no better example of their ability and willingness to change their plan of action than in the final win over Dublin.

In an earlier round the teams had played a close, hard and uncompromising game at Leopardstown. The Dubs were beaten, but only just, by 2-4 (10) to 1-6 (9). The result was always in doubt there, because there was never a lot between the teams. At half-time they had been level at 2-0 (K) to 1-3.

So when all the sorting out was done and the pair met again in the National League final the issue was wide open, going on earlier events. That was the clue. . . . open. Kilkenny kept play in the final open and moved the ball quickly. They didn't get involved in any 'uncompromising' stuff, and they walked away with the title on a 4-8 to 1-5 scoreline.

On their home territory, the Noresiders were just too good for lacklustre opponents. The Dubs missed a few likely chances during the opening half, but the winners made good their escape and took over afterwards.

At the break the winners showed 1-4 to 0-3 in front, and the A.I.B. trophy beckoned. Only to be expected, Angela Downey scored the goal, and a beauty it was too.

FINISHED

Into the second moiety Jo Dunne picked off a point for the winners, and then that other half of the dynamic twin partnership, Anne Downey goaled from a free. The Dubs were finished after that. They hadn't the heart to come back, and anyway, their opponents were in such high spirits they weren't given half-a-chance to get anything going.

The winners had many stars that afternoon, but none shone brighter than Deirdre Malone, whose never say die spirit epitomised the team's willing spirit. She ran herself to a stand-still, Other class performers were Angela and Ann Downey, Clare Jones and Biddy O'Sullivan.

Other teams beaten during the course of the League were Wexford,



Cork and Galway in the semi-final. The eventual champions used the competition to build a team for the championship, and when they found themselves in with a chance of outright victory they went for it.

Rita Wemyss, who late became a key figure in the defence during the championship regularly operated in attack during the League. By the time the all-Ireland series had finished, she had established herself as one of the best backs in the country.

Wexford caused a few problems in the opening round, but still never got in front. At half-time they trailed by 0-2 to 1-2, and were held to just one score after the change around.

The next match against Cork was just too easy, and the Leesiders were beaten by 11 points, which was a big surprise. Angela Downey bagged her biggest haul of the competition here, and finished with 2-7 to her credit.

The first Dublin match was followed by the semi-final against Galway. The Westerners gave it everything they had, but they lacked the experience and neat stick work of their opponents. Still, Kilkenny were not as impressive as they might have been.

The showdown was something of a revenge mission for Kilkenny. The previous year when league champions, they were stripped of their crown by the Dubs. On this occasion the locals got it exactly right against confident opponents. They didn't know it at the time, but another League/Championship double was on the way.

Three stand with greats of hurling

HE MOST recent success was Kilkenny's seventh in the all-Ireland open draw senior camogie championship.

Three players have achieved what only five Kilkenny hurlers have done in over 100 years of Gaelic games. The ladies won seven all-Ireland medals on the field of play. Remarkable, bearing in mind the first senior camogie win was in 1974.

The long servers and winners were Angela Downey-Browne, Bridie McGarry (nee Martin) and Liz Neary.

The hurlers who have done the same are Dick Doyle, Dick Walsh, Sim Walton, Jack Rochford and Frank Cummins.

Anne Downey also collected a 7th all-Ireland medal this season. She won one as a sub in 1974.

Frank Cummins has eight all-Ireland medals in all. He gained one as a sub in 1967.

Former Kilkenny goalkeeper, Noel Skehan, won nine all-Ireland medals overall. He gained six as a player, and three as a sub.

Kilkenny won the National League and Championship double in 1985, and this year's was the second double.

But Kilkenny are still a long way behind in the roll of honour. Dublin lead the lot with 26 all-Ireland victories, followed by Cork (14) and Kilkenny (7).

The best run of all-Ireland wins was the 10-in-a-row recorded by Dublin between 1957 and '66. They also put eight wins together between 1948 and '55. It could have been 19 straight wins for them, but Antrim won the final of

Consequently, by camogie standards, the three-in-a-row is far from unusual.

Cork did it first between 1934 and '36 and again between 1939 and '41, before graduating to a four-in-a-row in

Between 1942 and '44 Dublin did their first three-in-a-row, and later they put 8 and then 10 wins together.

In 1976 and '77 Kilkenny put wins back-to-back, but this time they got the treble up. The county won the titles in:

Angela led the way

S IF anyone really needed telling, Angela Downey-Browne was the top scorer in the all-Ireland championship.

In the three games, she slammed home a massive 5-14, an incredible score by any standards.

In the final, Angela was in direct opposition to a girl called Mary Ring, daughter of the late, great Cork hurler, Christy Ring.

By a strange twist of fate, Shem Downey, Angela's father, and Christy Ring played on each other in the senior all-Ireland hurling final of 1946.

That year Kilkenny had a problem with the centre-back position, and in each match, had a different man in the number 6 shirt. For the all-Ireland, Shem Downey was entrusted with the task, and facing him was the mighty man from Cloyne.

Shem caught the attention of the Kilkenny selectors while playing with the county juniors in the all-Ireland semi-final of 1946 against Limerick. Instantly he was promoted to the senior side.

Forty-one years later, a Downey and Ring clashed again in an all-Ireland final. How about that?

The county's overall tally was an impressive 14 goals and 30 points.
