

Tipperary 4-9 Kilkenny 1-3

A FIVE-STAR performance from midfielder Ciara Burns, daughter of former Tipperary star, Mick Burns, was a key factor in Tipp's victory over holders Kilkenny in the All-Ireland Minor Camogle final at Holycross yesterday.

Apart from scoring 1-6 of her side's tally, Burns worked like a beaver to keep here colleagues going and in the second-half, in particular, as Kilkenny fought with great spirit to get back into the game with the wind at their backs, she was an inspiration with her fine striking and her ability to carry the ball from defence.

Tipperary had the wind behind them in the firsthalf and got an ideal start with a Marie Ryan goal after six minutes. Ciara Burns added a second in the 21st minute as Tipp went on to lead 2-5 to 0-1 at the interval.

Margaret Kavanagh raised Kilkenny's hopes with a 12th minute goal in the second-half, but great defending by Tipperary prevented them from adding to their tally and when Marie Ryan got through for her second goal for Tipp in the 21st minute, to open a 3-8 to 1-3 lead, Tipp were the champions.

Mandy Quigley's goal five minutes later was just the icing on the cake.

### -KILKENNY TAKE ON TIPP IN MINOR CAMOGIE FINAL-

### Cats set to throw down gauntlet

ON Sunday next the All Ireland minor camogie champions, Kilkenny, throw down the gauntlet to Tipperary in the All Ireland minor camogie championship final at Thurles. This will be the third time for those two counties to meet in an All Ireland final at this grade in the last four years.

Kilkenny won the Corn Tailteann for the first time in 1988 and retained it in 1989 by defeating Tipperary. In 1990 Tipperary turned the tables and took their first minor title. The sides met again in the All Ireland semi-final last year when Kilkenny advanced to defeat Galway in the final. This is sure to be a close affair, as both All Ireland semi-finals ended in draws.

In the replays, Kilkenny recorded a 9-5 to 1-2 victory over Antrim, while Tipperary had a 7-9 to 4-3 win over Galway. Kilkenny will be fielding five of last year's victorious squad, Michelle Fennelly, cousin of the famous Fennelly brothers, Niamh Phelan, Sinead Costello, captain, Margaret Kavanagh, Catriona Carey, sisters to county hurlers, Martin and DJ, all have played a major role in their team's victory to date.

Tipperary are captained by Ciara Byrne, the only eligible member of the victorious All Ireland team of 1990. Chiara is daughter of Mick, former Tipperary hurler.

Kilkenny were figuring in their fifth consecutive All-Ireland final at this level and having suffered only one defeat in that sequence went into Sunday's final in a very confident mood. However, against a very competitive Tipperary side

they were never allowed settle, as the home county dictated play from start to finish and would not have been flattered to win by a bigger margin.

All round Tipperary were the better balanced side and in addition, they had that bit of extra individual flair which was inspirational to colleagues. Ciara Burns, daughter of former Tipperary defender Mick Burns of Nenagh, personified this flair and both as an attacker taking scores, and falling back to midfield to defend against the breeze in the second half, she produced an exceptional performance an exceptional perfor-

She was not alone, however, and the work-rate of Catherine Bourke, Joanne Horgan, Aileen Delaney and Mandy Quigley was also a key factor in Tipperary's success.

Tipperary stamped their authority on the game from the start. Backed by the breeze they pounded the Kilkenny goal but six min-utes elapsed before Marie Ryan gave Tipperary the boost they needed, a goal, her shot being allowed into the net by the Kilkenny goalkeeper who thought it was going wide.

The score may have been fortunate but there was nothing lucky about Tip-perary's second goal of the

half scored by Ciara Burns from a delivery by Theresa Brophy. With Catherine Bourke doing tremendous work in midfield and Joanne Horgan shining in defence, Tipperary were well in control and were not flattered to lead 2-5 to 0-1 at the interval.

Indeed the lead should have been greater but an excellent Kathleen Ryan in the Kilkenny goal twice denied Ciara Gaynor goals and a Ciara Burns shot went screaming past the post with goal written all over it.

Kilkenny needed to step up thier game in the second half and this they did but Tipperary now showed their ability to defend and in the first minute Michelle Bulfin, the Tipperay goalie saved well from Margaret Kavanagh. Kilkenny kept pushing forward but there was no way through until the 12th minute when Margaret Kavanagh netted for Kilkenny after Michelle Bulfin had saved her first effort at goal only for the ball to rebound kindly into the path of the Kilkenny girl.

Trailing 1-3 to 2-8 one felt that if Kilkenny were to win their supreme effort had to come at this stage. However, it was as the Tipperary girls who rose magnificently to the challenge. Mandy Quigley fired in a powerful



K ILKENNY'S seven year reign as All-Ireland senior camogic champions was Ireland senior camogie champions was finally brought to an end by Cork, in Ballinlough on Sunday.

Although the defeat may have surprised many, the players and mentors knew that this year, more than ever, Kilkenny were really facing an uphill struggle.

Cork had already beaten them twice during the National League and Kilkenny's preparations had been severely hampered by a number of factors. The fears gained credence during the game when balls which would normally have been controlled with ease were fumbled.

However, for the opening quarter Kilkenny were on top. They were unable to translate this dominance into scores. With the not inconsiderable benefit of hindsight, it was during this period that the match was lost as many chances of scores were

Unfortunately, by the time Angela Downey was introduced, Cork had gradually settled and the number of scoring chances had diminished. Instead of deservedly being ahead, Kilkenny turned over at half-time trailing by 0-

Despite Kilkenny's best efforts, and the introduction of Kilkenny's second substitute (Claire Jones) Cork, who stage were playing the strong breeze, maintained this two point margin until 10 minutes from time when Kilkenny goaled.

Hopes dashed

The hopes of Kilkenny supporters were cruelly da-

shed almost before that begun to rise. Cork replied in kind from the puck-out. This goal demoralised Kilkenny, and many felt afterwards that if only Cork could have been denied for a few minutes longer, then the outcome might have been different.

Cork scored another point, and then fate intervened again. As Kilkenny struggled to get the equaliser, Cork were awarded a 15m free. Against all logic, the free-taker opted to go for a goal, and the ball ended up in the net.

Many variables contributed to Kilkenny's defeat. The fact that Angela Downey had insufficient time to recover after the birth of her baby; injury to Claire Jones; the restricted preparations. But Kilkenny could still have snatched victory had the chances been converted into scores. Ultimately, the better side on the day won.

The team, although obviously disappointed, accepted defeat with the same dignity and graciousness as epted victory on so many occasions. In a fitting and appropriate gesture, the defeated champions were applauded off the pitch by both sets of supporters.

Unfortunately for any successful team, the news of their defeat will invariably travel



further than the news of their victories ever did. But, maybe in the future, their victories will be more widely appreciated.

The one consolation from a Kilkenny point of view is that, on the basis of this display, not even the oldest players on the team need consider retirement. Everyone on the team gave their all.

The fact that they did not succeed, is attributable to outside factors rather than to the deficiency on the part of the players, or management. In a year when most factors mitigated against them, the team came within two scores of the best team Cork could produce. It will surely be possible next year to reclaim the titicl.

The end of an era? Not really, merely the end of a glorious run of success, and a temporary setback for a magnificent team.

CORK and Limerick brought the National League titles to Munster. Is this a true indication of where the strength of the game lies? Will the All-Ireland trophies follow to the southern province.

Counties which make the early running in a season often run out of steam by the time the championship comes around. Kilkenny are, of course, an obvious exception to this rule. But for many, the exertions of winning the League title leaves little in reserve for the knockout competition.

This has already proved to be the case with Limerick. Under the guidance of noted hurling coach, Phil Bennis, Limerick made an excellent start to the season and coasted their way to the final of the National Junior League. Fired by their re-action to the clash of fixtures with the Munster Hurling final, the Limerick girls reached great heights to send the reigning All-Ireland Junior champions, Down reeling.

Limerick came crashing back to earth when they met a well prepared Tipperary side in the Munster Junior Championship final. Disappointed at losing the last two All-Ireland Junior titles, Tipperary have a winning look about them this season. The younger members of the team, Sinead Nealon, Jovita Delaney, Deirdre Hughes, Orla Hoganand Helen O'Leary are developing into fine exponents of the game and are in no mood to let the All-Ireland title slip by this time.

Cork looked a team of stars in the National Senior League final against Wexford. Watching the game, it was difficult to believe that Wexford had deservedly taken both points when the sides met earlier in the competition.

For the first time since 1970, Cork commenced the season without the familiar figure of Marion McCarthy. In a glorious career, she delighted fans with her brilliant stickwork and versatility. Honoured with a B&I Award, her huge collection of trophies includes eight All-Ireland senior, twenty Munster senior championships and three Gael-Linn. She is now leaving it to young brother, Sean, the Cork hurling midfielder, to keep the family flag flying.

It is obvious that All-Ireland champions, Kilkenny do not treat the National League seriously nowadays. In an hour against Cork in the League, a disinterested Kilkenny side put six points on the board. A week later, they ran up 6-18 against Dublin in the Leinster Senior Championship. Cork beware. Tipperary proved to be worthy winners of the 1992 All-Ireland Minor Championship. They overcame Clare, Limerick, Cork, Galway and Kilkenny to record their second success in this championship. The only hiccup was provided by Galway who held the new champions to a draw but Tipperary pulled away to win by five goals in the

Captain Ciara Burns won her second All-Ireland medal of the season. She had earlier starred for St. Mary's, Nenagh in the All-Ireland Junior Colleges series. Tipperary fielded many newcomers this season. Of these Joanne Horgan, Mandy Cosgrove and Teresa Brophy caught the eye. This success reflects the excellent work which is being put into the game at underage level throughout the county.

The grading of the senior counties in the opening round of the Senior Championship to facilitate the new Intermediate Championship proved accurate. The top four Kilkenny, Cork, Wexford and Galway came through with something to spare leaving Clare, Antrim, Dublin and Kildare to join the 1991 All-Ireland Junior Champions in the inaugural Intermediate Championship.

The margin of defeat suffered by Clare and Antrim against Kilkenny and Cork respectively were substantial. Hopefully, they will find their own level in the new competition. A win for either would be a great fillip for their players and officials. However, at this stage it looks as if Dublin, leaders in the Senior Championship for so long, may emerge from the new grouping.

### Laois camogie has lost its Bloom

ONE of only two adult camogie clubs in County Laois has been decimated by a three-year ban and a £400 fine after abusing a referee in the Leinster Club champi-

Laois champions, Slieve Bloom were fined and banned from the Leinster championships at a threehour meeting of the Leinster Camogie Council in Mullingar two

The club had received warning of a £200 fine after the first drawn

came after the second game to which the gardai were called to protect the referee.

He umpired both matches on August 23 and 30 between the club and Avoca, Co Wicklow, which Avoca won eventually 2-6 to 1-6.

In his match reports he alleged verbal and physical abuse by club mentors and supporters.

Amongst these was an allegation that he was forced to break a red traffic light after being blocked by angry fans leaving the second game in Portlaoise.

He claims he was then followed

and blocked on a back road by three other vehicles forcing him to stop and lock himself inside his car after they tried to take his keys.

The heavy punishment may now see the end of the club, which fields one senior (junior standard) and two underage teams.

"Both myself and the club treasurer are also players," said an obviously distraught suspended club Chairwoman Tessie Fogarty.

"Apart from missing playing, without officers who will help raise the fine, we have no money as it is," she said.

"In no way do we condone the actions of our supporters," Fogarty added. "But how can you possibly control all your fans, especially if you are playing in the match your-

"I don't know yet if we will bother appealing," she said of the club's right to appeal to the Central Camogie Council.

In the meantime a club official may be in further hot water. He has been individually called to attend the next Leinster Council meeting in early October.

"In no way is this incident a reflection on Laois camogie or indeed the members of this club," a Leinster spokeman said. "These were the actions of a minority, but we feel that this type of behaviour cannot be condoned."

### Gardai called to protect junior camogie referee

THE Gardai were called to O'Moore Park, Portlaoise, at the close of Sunday evening's Leinster Junior Camogie Interclub game in which Avoca Wicklow defeated Slieve Bloom, Laois, by 2-6 to 1-6.

Following the game, Slieve Bloom supporters took exception to some of the decisions by the Wexford referee. They attempted to encroach on the pitch, from which the referee had to be escorted. The doors leading to the dressingrooms at the rear of the stand were locked and the official remained in his room until the gardai arrived. The tyres on his car were also interfered with.

When the teams met the weekend before last at Avoca the game ended in a draw. Initially Slieve Bloom travelled to Avoca, but the game was not played because of the absence of the appointed referee.

THE Cork players were in determined mood as they went through their paces, under the watchful eye of trainer Joe McGrath, at Ballinlough the other night, and they are really intent on bringing the O'Duffy Cup back to Leeside.

As half forward Liz O'Neill said "This is the one we want to win. We have been unlucky in the last two year's when Kilkenny beat us in the semi-final and the final. Now that they are out of the way, we are determined to beat Wexford".

With McGrath dictating the play, one could see the hunger among the players in training. Every ball was fought for with great vigour during a practice match.

Following the game, completed in near darkness, McGrath put his charges through a very vigorous short sprint session. Although the girls were undoubtedly tired, they never complained and, watched by the selection committee of Mariam Higgins, Marie Mackey and Marion Sweeney, they took to their task with gusto.

"I have worked the girls as hard as any men's team I have trained and they have never complained", said Joe McGrath. "I am proud of each and every one of them".

"In 1990 I was with the girls for three month. We met Kilkenny here and we were really gunning for them. We were two goals ahead with seven minutes to go but two stupid goals went in and we lost by a point. However, I thought the girls made great progress in that three month. "Last year, I was with them for eight months. We did some weight training in the Winter to build up a bit of stamina and then conentrated on speed training, stamina training, and hurling. Our target was to capture the National League and then go on to win an All-Ireland. We won the League and got to the All-Ireland final. We had the chances to win it but did not take them.

"This year, we worked over a similar period of time and our target was to retain the National League and get to an All-Ireland final. We knew that we would have to get past Kilkenny, if we were lucky enough to get through the preliminary stage, in the semi-final. We have done that, so every target we have set has been accomplished", stated McGrath.

"This year we have the best selectors I have had the pleasure of working with in the past three years. All the girls I have worked with have been very good, but, collectively, I would have to say that these three are as experienced and as good selectors as one could wish for. They have played the game and they know exactly what is needed in the forwards.

"I hope that the great promise the girls have shown this year will be fulfilled by winning this All-Ireland. They have the skill, the physical fitness and the teamwork to do it, and their attitute is as good as I have ever seen."

# Cork must not start nervously

THE headline on the "Cork Examiner" on June 14 last, after Cork had defeated Wexford in the National League final in Enniscorthy, read "Cork retain title in a canter" but it will be far from a canter at Croke Park on Sunday when the Leesiders oppose the Wexford girls in the All-Ireland senior camogie final.

Twelve months ago Cork travelled to Croke Park with quite a deal of confidence to face Kilkenny, who were seeking their seventh All-Ireland title in a row, but in the decider nothing went right for the Cork side and they were beaten 3-8 to 0-10.

Cork had beaten the "Cats" in the League decider previously but they found, to their cost, that the championship is a totally different competition and a more determined Kilkenny outfit put paid to their aspirations.

There is no doubt that Kilkenny deserved their win on the day as they were the better side while Cork never played to their full potential and with quite a few players off form were always fighting a losing battle.

There is no doubt that Cork have the talent to go one better this time as they proved in recent games that they are quite a good side. They overcame their "bogey" side Kilkenny 2-11 to 1-8 in a thrill packed semi-final at Ballinlough last month and if they can reproduce that form on Sunday they should take the title. Although they beat Wexford in the League final, 2-17 to 0-11, they must remember that the Slaneysiders had beaten they earlier in the competition in Killeagh.

Wexford got off to a dream start in that game, scoring four goals in the opening 14 minutes which left the home side struggling afterwards. Cork made a determined effort to get back into it in the second-half, when they played much better, but they found goalkeeper Terry Butler in brilliant form and had to give best in the end, 1-9 to 4-8.

For the League final Cork made a number of changes, bringing back a few players who were on the injured list. This seemed to settle the team and in a very physical game, in which six players were booked and one put off, Cork retained their title.

At the moment Cork have no injury worries and will be able to field their strongest side. However, they would not want to make a nervous start, as they did 12 months ago, if they are to win.

Wexford are no strangers to Croke Park as they failed to Kilkenny in the final in 1990 and they will be hoping to make amends. They have some top class players in their captain, Catherine Murphy, Ann Reddy, Geraldine Codd and Paula Rankin, and will also be in determined mood and will not give up the fight too easily.

It has the makings of a great final.



WHEN referee Jane Beatty blew the final whistle at the finish of the All-Ireland Senior Championship semi-final at Ballinlough last month, the Cork players could not contain the relief and joy. At last they had broken Kilkenny's stranglehold on the O'Duffy Cup. Roll on September 27, they were ready for all-comers.

In 1975, Cork came to Croke Park with the tag of strong pre-match favourites. The majority of their team had made up Cork's four in-a-row winning outfit of 1970-73. But what a reception they received from a spirited Wexford side. With captain Brigid Doyle in devastating form, Wexford swept a tame Cork team aside.

This seasons's form has been topsyturvy. Cork met Wexford in the National League at Killeagh with a fine win over Kilkenny already under their belt. Another Cork win was expected but before they had time to settle down they were sent reeling by a string of Wexford goals and did not recover.

The National League final at Enniscorthy provided a second meeting. This time, Cork could do no wrong and picked off excellent scores from all angles. Real form must lie somewhere in between these displays.

While Cork have introduced newcomers in Kathleen Costine, Fiona O' Driscoll, Denise Cronin and Irene O'Keeffe, they are the more experienced outfit. However, only captain, Sandie Fitzgibbon remains from the 1983 All-Ireland winning side.

Sandie is in great form this season as her display on Anne Downey in the semi-final proved. Breda Kenny has settled in extremely well at full-back. Therese O'Callaghan, Colette O'Mahony, Paula Goggins, Kathleen Costine and Fiona O'Driscoll are capable of rising to the occasion.

Wexford, too, have their stars, Catherine Murphy is a commanding figure at centre-back. Tina Fitzhenry, Anne Reddy, Jean O'Leary, Ann-Marie O'Connor and Geraldine Codd have the ability to make this an intriguing final.

Will it be third time lucky for Tipperary in the All-Ireland Junior Championship Final? Disappointed at the final hurdle in the past two seasons, they face a young Galway side with confidence.

The Connacht champions dispatched Armagh in the semi-final with something to spare. Despite their tender years, they are a very skilful bunch. Many of them have experience of the big occasion with St. Raphael's and Mullagh. It will be a game well worth watching.

### The woman behind the women

THERE was no announcement that Elsie Cody was retiring. It had long reached that time in her career when every game might be her last, but nobody really believed it would be. Nobody could imagine a Wexford camogie team without her. There had always been a comeback, somebody to twist her arm. Self renewal never seemed to be a problem. Here today, here tomorrow.


Elsie thought she'd never retire. "I always thought I'd die the day I retired." She finished her last match telling herself that maybe there was another season left, but deep down she knew there wasn't. She spent the winter suppressing every urge to come not even going to watch her club play league games for fear of being coaxed to tog off. Twenty years in a Wexford jersey had not prepared her for the end.

Then they asked her to be the coach; salvation. A new beginning, "I don't know if I would have held out. I probably would have been coaxed to come back with the club. Being involved with the county meant that I couldn't do both."

In a woman's game she took on a man's job. All of Wexford's closest rivals are coached by men. The coach she succeeded was a man. Not since the 70s have any All Ireland champions been coached by a woman. It was just the way things had evolved. In camogie's new era of more professional preparation the job had been given to men. Players stopped playing and left the game behind them.

'It's a problem in the game that there's is a real lack of players going back into coaching or administration. The problem with women is that if they do have families it's the fellas who will always bring the young ones to matches, and women find it very hard to get back and involved. Of the Wexford team of the late 70s that played in a couple of All Irelands only about three or four are still

involved now. That's an awful waste. I really all has to do with the family se up. Somebody has to mind the kids, and normally it's the woman.

"More than that, it also goes back to the time when players were kids. If on of their matches clashed with one of their brother's matches it was more likely that the family would go to th boys match. That's changing but only slowly. I know in my own club a lot o camogie players are married to hurler and some of them would nearly miss league match to go and watch the mer playing."

There is no glamour in her position The coach has to see that the team i transported to matches, has to bool pitches for training, has to mind the gear. There was talk that she would have to wash it as well, but here she drew the line. One night a week in February be came three sessions at the height of the season. From her home in Kilkenny nonof their training venues are less than 46 miles away. Nobody indulges themselves in fanciful speculation about mileage rates, because there is none. Cody wor ries about the team and allows it to annoy her because her commitment is just as whole now as it was when she pulled on the shirt herself.

It's 20 years since she played in her first final. Sixteen years since she wor her only medal. Two years since she held Angela Downey in Croke Park until a few minutes from the end. All those years and now back in Croke Park again. Who

could want it to end?.

### STING OF LEAGUE FINAL DEFEAT WILL MOTIVATE THE WEXFORD GIRLS

WHAT was that French saw about "le difference"? Whatever it was, the womenfolk of Wexford should be profoundly grateful for "le difference," and even inserting a "toujours" in there somewhere. For, while they have been enjoying, in the past quarter century or so, the upper hand on Cork in intercounty and club championship finals, their menfolk have been most grievously tyrannised by the Leesiders.

It would be too easy to forget the advancés made by Galway since Cyril Farrell's St Raphael's began to monopolise colleges' championships, and thence to belittle Wexford's three point victory in the semi-final by comparison with Cork's very large margin over Galway, a year since. But the fact is that Galway will win a Championship in this decade.

Clearly, today's game will be heavily influenced by the events of that turbulent League final, won handily enough in the end by Cork, earlier in the season; and by the lessons — and grudges — drawn by each side from it. Refereeing will, therefore, be absolutely of the essence today.

And, sadly, the presages do not encourage optimism. and that's no reflection on today's ref in particular. The simple fact is that, over the past two years or so, we've been witnessing a movement - concerted or otherwise - to turn camogie into a non-contact sport; something it was never intended to be, and something for which the rules do not provide. The phenomenon seems to emanate - or ooze - from that distraught puritanism which saw a whole club suspended, three years ago. for publishing pen pictures drawn in dizzy, innocuous smut.

If the refereeing does conform with this fetishistic trend, it will militate against Wexford, the physically stronger side, and the side more inclined to interpose the body between the ball and the challenger.

Cork have come a long way since the days, towards the end of the '80s, when their selectors could just about remember the correct number of players to pick; but couldn't, for the life of them, remember where to put them. But, for all the freshness of the renaissance against Kilkenny, glaring

defects of organisation were apparent: most notably a uniform drifting of forwards outfield, thus allowing a profusion of ball, hard won at midfield and half back, to trickle wide or into the 'keeper's hand.

They are sprightly throughout the field, though Linda Mellerick is not now the scintillating player she was on her All Ireland final debut day, when she played Kilkenny more or less by herself. The acquisition of Breda Kenny probably compensates, and Sandy Fitzgibbon is having an exceptional season, even for her.

The great traditional Wexford names Tina Fitzhenry, Stella Synnott, Catherine Murphy and their chums were surely stung by that League final; certainly badly enough to significantly reduce the four goal margin, probably badly enough to overturn it against a Cork team which may not be adequately inoculated against its county's endemic complacency.

At their third attempt, Tipp's first team should surely collect the junior crown at the expense of Galway's second team.

### Cork poised to break Leinster monopoly-

WEXFORD and Cork face each other in the All-Ireland Senior Camogie championship final at Croke Park on Sunday, with the latter carrying the favourites' mantle.

For the past seven years it was a Leinster county who were favourites to take the title, and Kilkenny achieved the magnificent seven.

This year it was Cork that stopped Kilkenny in their tracks at the semi-final stages.

Wexford and Cork have met in All-Ireland senior finals on three occasions. In 1968, Wexford took their first title, defeating the Leesiders 4-2 to 2-5; in '71 they met again, and Cork took the title 4-6 to 1-2.

When they clashed in '75, the Slaneysiders came out on top 4-3 to 1-2.

The sides have met twice this year in the National Senior League: the Leinster county first had a convincing 4-7 to 1-9 victory, but when they met in the league final, Wexford were completely outclassed, losing 2-17 to 0-11.



Tiobráid Årann and Loch Garman contested the first Senior National League Final in 1977, with Tiobraid Årann winning its first ever All-Ireland title. Tiobraid Årann reached six Senior Championship finals.

An Ghaillimh became Connacht Champions by overcoming Roscomáin, and then defeated Ardmhacha in the semi-final. Five of the team won All-Ireland Club Championship medals with Mullagh in 1991.

Only one other team has contested three consecutive Junior finals. Corcaigh accomplished this on two occasions, 1978 to 1980, and 1982 to 1984. If this constitutes a pattern, no team has lost three-in-a-row or, indeed, won three-in-a-row.

### Cork superiority ensures comfortable and impressive win

ONE week on, Clonliffe Road was eerily quiet before yesterday's All-Ireland senior camogie final between Cork and Wexford. Some optimistic hawkers were taking advantage of the last opportunity of the year to sell some colours, but there were none of last Sunday's noisy crowds or mercenary ticket touts. This, however, is not to detract from what went on inside Croke Park. Cork and Wexford served up an entertaining, and at times, highly skilled final that deserved a larger crowd.

It was Cork's superior skills that gave them a winning margin of 11 points, 1-20 to 2-6. That margin is an accurate reflection of Cork's superiority, as is their total of 21 scores over the hour as opposed to Wexford's eight.

The performances of three Cork players provided the backbone of their success. 







She was the class player of the final, Tipps target woman from the very start, and her name is bound to send a shiver up the collective spine of the Galway defence, whenever they see it in the future. Long before now she had accomplished herself, but Sundays performance really embellished her career as a top class forward, and the Tipp selectors must take a bow for playing their trump card in switching her to full forward at the start in a swap of positions with Jovita Delaney, who also did well. Aside of her 3-3 scoring achievement, Hughes, from the Toomevara Club, was involved in almost every score of the huge margin, and when you consider that she had a goal disallowed and narrowly missed scoring another, it is easy to put her role into perspective.

It is only fitting also to specially acknowledge the part played by seventeen year old Sinead Nealon from Burgrass, daughter of former Tipperary hurling great Donie. Apart from her general play she was largely unerring in her free taking demonstrating a coolness that that belied her tender years, and she took the major scoring honours

after Tipp dictated the game as they pleased.

#### Lucky breaks

If they experienced cruel fate last year Tipp certainly had a sizeable dollop of luck

Ailish Delaney had made a first class save from Teresa Fallon minutes before the interval, an incident that was crucial to Tipps hopes at a delicate stage, and once Hughes followed up on the resumption with a piledriver that gave Collette Callaghy no chance she had ignited the Tipperary victory flame. #### Floodgates open

The issue was still wide open, however, turning over for the second half but Hughes goal opened the floodgates, and when Joan Tobin dispossessed a defender to score Tipps third goal in the third minute, she left the scoreline 4-7 to 1-5. The rest is history. Tipp took full control in almost every sector of the field, with sub Ann Gleeson hitting their fifth goal five minutes from the end.

The honour of scoring goal number six fell to another sub Helen O'Leary right on the call of time, and shortly after Catriona Finnegan had put a somewhat better complexion on the scoresheet with a Galway goal. The latter stages were a mere formality as Tipp could afford to rest players, and, as already stawed, their substitutes certainly took full advantage of their opportunities.
