Good times roll as Limerick claim

Limerick's Junior team won what they hope to be the second of three All-Ireland Camogie titles in 2014 with a 2-8 to 1-6 victory over Carlow in Moneygall on Sunday.

They added the Junior A title to the Minor title won in May and now look forward to the Intermediate Final in Croke Park on September 14. Captain Noreen Barry lifted the Nancy Murray Cup to the cheers of the sizeable Limerick support completing a League and Championship double for the Junior team.

The game was played in wet and blustery conditions and Carlow played with the benefit of the breeze and a slight slope on the pitch in first half and opened the scoring with a point from an Eleanor Treacy free. Caitrin De Bhál replied with a free for Limerick to level the score.

Marian Doyle then scored the half's only point from play to give Carlow the lead. Limerick's prolific goal scorer Sarah Collins had a shot saved by Mary Coady in the Carlow goal and Lisa Scanlon converted the resultant 45 to level the score again on the quarter hour mark.

The remainder of the half looked like remaining scoreless as Limerick goalie Laura O'Neill denied Ciara Quirke three times as Carlow looked to capitalize on the wind advantage. Instead it was Limerick who went in at half time ahead after Lisa Scanlon converted a free just before the

Limerick had looked more settled as the half progressed

as the introduction of Rosemarie Rea on 20 minutes was having an impact.

Kristy Carroll came in at the break to add more physicality to the Limerick attack and added to their momentum as Limerick blitzed Carlow in the first 10 minutes of the second half. Lisa Scanlon converted a free and a 45 to open a three point lead inside 5 minutes.

Sarah Collins was also having an impact with her trade mark strong runs on goal. Having been denied again by the Carlow keeper she got off the mark with Limerick's first point from play on five minutes then in the next minute after breaking through from the right played the ball across to the waiting Brid Hannon who put the ball in the net to open a seven-point cap.

Carlow though are a quality side and with Ciara Mullins and Tara Wilson impressive in midfield were not going to go out without a fight. Tara Wilson converted a free and Ciara Mullins scored a super point from play to close the gap to five.

Lisa Scanlon and Ciara Quirke exchanged frees until on 25 minutes Sarah Collins finally got her reward and her 14th goal of the season to leave the score Limerick 2-7 Carlow 0-5 with five minutes to go. Donna Mulcahy added a point from play as the game reached its conclusion.

However at the end of normal time Marguerite Mc-Carthy was sent off for a second yellow card and from the resulting free Ciara Quirke squeezed the ball into the corner of the net. Ciara also added a point from a free with the last action of the game but it was too late and Limerick

were crowned All-Ireland Junior A champions to the jubilation of players, management and supporters.

Lisa Scanlon was deservedly awarded player of the match however it must have been a close call as a case could be made for any number of Limerick players notably goalkeeper Laura O'Neill. Noreen Barry accepted the Nancy Murray Cup on behalf of the Treaty girls and along with Donna Mulcahy and Sarah Collins led the crowd in a rousing rendition of "Limerick You're A Lady".

The celebrations continued into the evening with a meal for players and management at sponsors the Woodland House Hotel and then on for a homecoming in captain Noreen Barry's home parish of Killeedy.

This team will re-assemble and continue to train with their Intermediate colleagues over the next three weeks as they prepare for another All-Ireland final this time in Croke Park and look to complete the job and bring home a third All-Ireland Camogie ti-

tle to Limerick in 2014.

Well done also to the U-10 teams from Ballybrown and Treaty Gaels who took part in the mini-games at half-time.

Tipp's young cubs claim All-Ireland

Tipperary under 16 camogie squad lifted the hearts of followers everywhere when they clinched victory over Galway on Sunday last in the All-Ireland Final which was held in The Gaelic Grounds

This was their second consecutive All Ireland victory over Galway who just couldn't get to grips with the Tipperary storm force that hit them so hard. Like Tipperary, Galway came through their campaign with a clear sheet and on paper, this game was prized to have nothing between them at the end of the hour. However, the girls from the Premier county turned proceedings into a one sided affair which in all fairness, Tipperary richly deserved.

Galway had three points on the scoreboard in the opening six minutes as they tore into an early attack with the aid of the breeze. However, this was to be their only three scores in the opening half as Tipperary took control with Sinead Buckley, winning possession, taking the game by the scruff

of the neck and racing through she fired over to give Tipp the opening point in the seventh minute. Within two minutes, corner forward Sinead Meagher found the Galway net giving their custodian Sarah Healy no chance. Meagher had great support in the build up from Buckley, Keely Lenihan, Caoimhe Condon and Grace O'Brien. With a one point lead after nine minutes, Tipperary went on to build on that chance through Chloe Kirwan, O'Brien and Buckley. Galway heads began to drop as their efforts were forced off course by the Tipperary rearguard with Captain Karen Kennedy gathering in the centre back and driving back to the forwards. Full forward Grace O'Brien's superb accuracy from both play and free taking which was to earn her the well deserved player of the match, was a major support to Tipp's success as she over four points without reply. The match ended as a contest when Sinead Meagher struck for her second goal in added injury time and just before the break to leave Tipperary with a 2.9 to 0.3 lead.

Again it was Galway who started the brighter going into the last half with Taragh Moloney sending two free's over, but O'Brien was nipping on heels as she kept the Tipp scoreboard ticking over and wiped out the Galway attack. Galway tried everything, positional changes and introducing from the bench, but Tipperary fired on winning most of the exchanges throughout the pitch and leaving Galway with too much of a mountain to climb with time ebbing away. O'Brien and Moloney traded points and Galway attacked again with Carrie Dolan finding sub Leanne Freaney who split the uprights. As time was slipping away, Galway needed a goal so Moloney raced in making a great effort to get through and she fired hard at Tipp custodian Caoimhe Bourke who made it all look so simple as she took control and sent back out field and Galway lost their chance once again like so many other occasions now gone from their grasp. Galway did see off two further Tipp attacks but Chloe Kirwan broke in through their back line to gather her second point with seven minutes to go. A Carrie Dolan goal in the 56th minute gave Galway some consolation but it was Tipperary who finished the stronger when Sinead Meagher struck for her hat trick of goals in the last minute of normal time as Tipperary were merely simply the best on the day and that last goal brought great celebrations when the final whistle sounded and tears from Galway who just didn't turn up on the day.

Forwards need to up ante for Cork to win

this Saturday could be a different type of game from the
one which saw the sides
finish at 1-9 apiece in Semple
Stadium last weekend.

Some may feel that Cork lost their chance but I certainly don't believe that is the case. Cork were the better team first time around, there is no reason to believe they can't be again.

Wexford's typical style of play where they attempt to pull out half-back lines came a cropper as Eimear O'Sullivan, Gemma O'Connor and Pamela Mackey held firm inside their own 45, protecting their inside line.

Wexford also deployed a sweeper. There is every chance that Wexford will now change this tactic and play player on player or have just one of

their half-forwards and midfielders fall back and retain that sweeper role.

Player-for-player marking would certainly open up the play. Cork would need to match Wexford's physicality, one on one.

Wexford's build-up to their additional-time goal started around the 45 metre line. They shouldn't have been allowed to run the ball through the way they did.

Cork will hope to get more of a return from their midfield partnership of Aisling Thompson and Rena Buckley. Considering Rena was feeling ill for a couple of days and only lined out at the last minute, her performance was admirable. Both midfielders came more into the game in

the second half and it made a difference

Wexford will feel that they'll hardly go another day without Katrina Parrock and Kate Kelly scoring or Ursula Jacob scoring just a point from play. That may be so, but even if they do manage half a dozen points or so between them, that shouldn't worry Cork.

They had plenty of scoring chances themselves which they didn't avail of.

What was great to see was Cork's inner belief. Three points up at the break, Wexford brought the margin down to a point entering the final quarter. Jennifer O'Leary and Orla Cotter stretched it to three again.

It was back and forth point for point right up to the 61st minute as Cork responded every time Wexford pulled a score back.

That late goal was a sickener; against the run of play. Una Leacy, only back training three weeks after a knee injury, made a huge impact, scoring 1-1.

She may well be kept in reserve again as a super impact sub but you

may be sure that she will figure, at the latest by half time.

Wexford scored just 1-5 from play, Cork 1-7. The scoring will be higher from both sides this time around.

With little separating the sides, every opportunity must be capitalised upon.

Wexford hadn't played a competitive game since July 19 and last week's replay is sure to have brought them back up to match intensity. Cork were out that bit later on August 10 against Offaly, but that game never reached the intensity or combativeness of last weekend therefore expect Cork to have also benefited.

The Rebels more than made up for their early championship defeat to the Slaneysiders and Wexford will need to up their game if they are to beat Cork.

They will do this but there's a lot more in Cork too, who need to get more from their attacking six. Should this section fire on the cylinders they are capable of, Cork should get back to Croke Park to face Kilkenny in two weeks.


Finishing strongly, the Glen girls held on to book their semi-final spot.

Cork girls deserve an All-Ireland shot

I DON'T think I've ever been so anxious before a game that I wasn't directly involved with than I was last Saturday when Cork took on Wexford in Semple Stadium.

I know the huge effort that's gone into this team. Every inter-county management team puts in incredible hours away from the pitch in determining how best to prepare their team, but in all my years involved with Cork camogie I doubt many have burned the midnight oil like Paudie Murray, Matthew Twomey, Brian Barry and the rest of the backroom team have done this season.

The sacrifices are immense.

I stand over the fact that I have criticised the commitment of some of this squad in the past, but the work has been put in of late and I'm willing this group to win the All-Ireland like never before.

They deserve it. Cork camogie needs it.

There are just a couple of obstacles in their way; Wexford and Kilkenny. By 3.45pm today we could be in the All-Ireland final facing the Cats and the prospect of preparing for that is exciting to say the least.

Inviting luck, I've my hotel on speed dial!

Wexford were firm favourites before last weekend. They have won four of the last seven titles with 12 of the players that figured last weekend playing a part the day they claimed their last title two years ago.

I don't think they are such favourites today. This game is 50/50.

I DON'T think I've ever been so anxious before a game that I wasn't directly they will win.

Yet if Cork produce the same performance they did last weekend they will win.

It's 2009 since Cork last lifted the O'Duffy Cup. You would have to go back as far as the 80s to find such a gap in senior titles coming here; a lapse of eight years from 1984 to 1991. From 1992 to 2009 the longest period that Cork went without a title was three years. Hopefully four is as far as it goes this time around.

Cork remain second in the roll of honour list with 24 titles. Dublin lead the way with 26 after dominating three decades; 40s, 50s and 60s. Kilkenny hold 12, Wexford seven, Antrim six, Tipp five and Galway

Last year was a strange one for

Wexford. JJ Doyle stood down after a hugely successful period, only to return on the eve of the championship after the departure of his replacement Martin Lynch.

A number of key players were unavailable too and it was only their stubbornness that got them to the semi-final.

They are a different proposition this year. Helena Jacob has taken over the reins, having been part of the aforementioned All-Ireland winning squads and has also been in charge for many of WIT's recent Ashbourne Cup successes.

Una Leacy is amongst those who have returned to the fold, coming on at half time last Saturday and scoring 1-1.

Wexford won by six points when the teams met in group I but the perils of reading too much into round-robin games when you reach the knockouts stages is well documented.

Holding Wexford to just 1-5 from play was a magnificent feat last weekend. You'd have taken that before the game and expect to win it. But such was the tension, tightness and importance of the game it was a dogged affair; every ball vigorously fought for.

It was a game Cork should have won and won comfortably enough. But just that final bit of decision making cost them up front.

Having said that, Wexford's defence are excellent. Deirdre Codd, Noleen Lambert, Karen Atkinson in the full-back line are as tough a full-back line as you'll meet in the championship and Mary Leacy at centre back is formidable on her day.

Angela Walsh kept her from playing her typical influential role and with Leacy tamed, Cork did split the Wexford defence, Deirdre Codd their saviour on more than one occasion.

Cork should stick to their game plan and let Wexford worry about how they'll counteract that.

My only concern is that Walsh Park is a tighter pitch than Thurles; we need to utilise every inch.

I'm not surprised Galway didn't advance to the final. Having said that they got closer to Kilkenny than I thought they would. I'm taking out of the eight-point winning margin the two blunders Susan Earner let in, leaving just two points between the sides.


They were embarrassing to say the least for any goalkeeper. You might forgive one, but two in a game of that magnitude was a nightmare.

CORK OUGHT to have been sickened by their failure to put Wexford away in the drawn encounter a week earlier, but they got their tactics spot on in Walsh Park, Waterford, on Saturday last as a totally dominant second-half display saw them cruise into an Alf-Ireland final clash with Kilkenny on September 14 with ten points to spare.

It was dispiriting to watch as the Leesiders ripped their rivals apart after leading by the minimum at the break (1-5 to 0-7), with Wexford beaten all ends up as their bid to reach the sport's biggest occasion was clinically dismantled.

The statistics from that second period say it all: Wexford managed just one point, from interval substitute Lisa Bolger, in the 54th minute, plus one wide from a late Ursula Jacob free. All that netminder Aoile Murray had to deal with otherwise were two point-scoring attempts from Jacob and Jackie Quigley that fell short, but hats off to Cork for perfecting a gameplan which had also served them well in Thurles but didn't give them the victory they deserved on that occasion.

They stuck to their guns despite the disappointment of being held, with centre-back Gemma O'Connor playing the loose sweeper's role while the excellent Aisling Thompson dropped back from midfield and proceeded to play a blinder. Indeed, while full-forward Briege Corkery collected the player of the match award, my own choice would have been Thompson for putting so much thought into every ball she won.

I can't recall one pass going astray, with Cork repeatedly mopping up possession in their own halfbacks and then driving forward impressively, drawing the next Wexford player and invariably picking out the best-placed colleague with a pass. It was copybook stuff, and it was just a pity that it had to pay off against Wexford.

They knew that Una Leacy - who started on this occasion - posed the biggest threat due to her uncanny ability to grab scores even off scraps. She had managed 1-1 in such circumstances seven days earlier, but this time around all routes to goal were well and truly cut off as she was usually surrounded by three Cork defenders.

That begs the obvious question; what were the other two Wexford forwards who must have been unmarked doing? But the sad reality is that the Slaneysiders didn't play a team game for long spells, particularly up front where the general formation seemed to be all over the place. While Cork stuck rigidly to their seven-strong defence augmented by Thompson, often times they only had two forwards to deal with as Wexford had a lot of bodies in the middle third but still struggled to get on the ball and make use of it.

Una Leacy was one of three substitutes retained along with Brid Gordon and Fiona Rochford, with Siona Nolan, Fiona Kavanagh and Lisa Bolger dropping down to the bench while Cork were unchanged.

Wexford captain Kate Kelly won the toss and utilised the breeze, with Ursula Jacob firing the first of six Wexford wides from an early 65-metre free before another placed ball from further out by Kelly was gathered and cleared by Pamela Mackey.

It was a better-standard game than the draw in my view, not that it will serve as any consolation. And Briege Corkery showed she was up for the challenge in the second minute when she cut in from the left wing and fed Angela Walsh who in turn handpassed to Orla Cotter for the opening point.

Jacob earned a free which she converted for the leveller before a Kate Kelly handpass set up Shelley Kehoe - now positioned at right half-back - for the lead score in the fourth minute. Soon after Wexford had reached the same tally from the first-half of the drawn game as Kehoe and Katrina Parrock combined before Ursula Jacob split the posts from play (0-3 to 0-1).

Jacob and Julia White swapped wides before Katriona Mackey pulled back a Cork point, and she exacted an even better reward in the 15th minute. A Jennifer O'Leary delivery broke off Noeleen Lambert's stick into the path of the corner-forward who bore down on goal before firing past Mags D'Arcy and

repeating her feat from the drawn tie (1-2 to 0-3).

Cork would never lose that lead, with Orla Cotter tapping over a free before Mackey had genuine claims for a penalty turned down when she was held up in the square by Mags D'Arcy after a poorty-struck Briege Corkery point attempt dropped short.

Katrina Parrock and Fiona Rochford switched corners and Jackie Quigley struck a wide before the menacing Corkery was fouled after Mackey initially caught a Cotter delivery, with the latter on target again from the placed ball (1-4 to 0-3).

Parrock pulled back a point from a Shelley Kehoe pass but then saw three further efforts come to nothing in quick succession, with one hitting the post before being cleared while two more were sent wide.

Briege Corkery's tactic of roaming outlield to get on the ball and then running at the defence continued to cause trouble, and another foul on the full-forward was punished by Orla Cotter once more (1-5 to 0-4).

However, the added time at the end of the half proved very productive for Wexford as they pulled back three points to leave them somewhat fortunate to be so close at the break given the general trend of

Una Leacy earned a '45 despite having three markers to handle which Ursula Jacob converted before on Kate Kelly. We were moving into the 34th minute when Mary Leacy dropped in a free and Katrina Parrock handpassed to Una on her left, but her rapid-fire shot flew over the bar.

It was the closest Wexford came to threatening a goal all through, and it was followed by a Brid Gordon point from an Ursula Jacob pass although Lisa Bolger was already poised to replace the Blackwater player.

Wexford resumed with Kate Kelly partnering Josie Dwyer at midfield but they struggled to match Cork in all aspects of the game throughout the field. The physicality of the Munster side saw them win most of the 50-50 battles, and they also topped the overall free count (23-13, and 14-6 in the second-half) as frustration set in.

it did take Cork until the last quarter to pull away though, with a mere three points struck in the opening 15 minutes on the re-start. Jennifer O'Leary hit the first after Deirdre Codd came under pressure from a long Gernma O'Connor free and Julia White handpassed outfield.

A Briege Corkery handpass picked out Orla Cotter for a good effort from distance, with Cork also hitting

their three second-half wides (from a mere four in all) around that period before Katrina Parrock was booked for a foul on Katriona Mackey and Aoife Murray came out of her goal to convert the free from 75 metres (1-8 to 0-7).

Rebelettes are on course to end camogie drought

CORK remain on course for a first All-Ireland senior camogie title since 2009 as they swept aside Wexford with a stunning second-half display in this semifinal replay in Walsh Park, Waterford on Saturday.

They join Kilkenny, the side they defeated to lift the O'Duffy Cup five years ago, in the September showdown with a display of defensive tenacity and long range point-taking that left Wexford with no answer on a disappointing day for Helena Jacob's side.

Una Leacy, the saviour for Wexford in the drawn game, was one of three changes to the Model County's starting line-up from the previous week, and their new look forward line was in fine form early on as they raced into a 0-3 to 0-1 lead after five min-

A brace from Ursula Jacob either side of a Shelley Kehoe point put the 2012 champions two points clear after Orla Cotter's opening score for Cork. and the signs were ominous for the Leesiders as Wexford pinned them in their own half.

The Leinster side were unable to drive home their advantage in that first quarter though and despite playing against a stiff breeze, Cork weathered the Wexford storm, slowly growing into the game as it progressed.

Their pace up f trouble Wexford and a point from Katriona Mackey in the 13th minute was followed just a minute later by a stunning goal from the corner forward as she pounced on Jennifer O'Leary's pass and slammed the ball beyond the reach of Mags D'Arcy in the Wexford goal.

Three Cotter frees against a



solitary Wexford reply from the hard-working Katrina Parrock gave Cork what looked like a commanding four-point lead going into the break, but three quick-fire Wexford points in injury time suddenly gave the game a different complexion

Jacob, Leacy and Brid Gordon reeled off a trio of points to leave just a solitary point, 1-5 0-7, between the teams heading into the second half, hinting at another closely fought finish.

The expected tussle never transpired though as Cork completely dominated the final half hour, sweeping over seven unanswered points before Wexford raised their sole white flag of the half with six minutes remaining.

Julia White, Cotter, set up by the outstanding Briege Corkery, goalkeeper Aoife Murray from long range with a massive free, and Cotter again stretched the lead to five points with ten minutes of normal time remaining as wexford's forwards simply failed

Corkery, Jennifer O'Leary and Mackey all added to the lead as Cork broke for home with the winning post in sight, and even when Lisa Bolger hammered over Wexford's first point of the half, Cork never panicked and finished the game on the front

Having first won county senior medals with divisional side Imokilly, Cathy was part of the Killeagh side which went all the way to the All-Ireland club title after winning the Cork championship in 1979 — the only Cork side to win an All-Ireland apart from Glen Rovers before Milford's consecutive wins in 2013 and '14.

IN lots of counties Paudie Murray's record as manager of the senior camogie team would be considered an extremely successful one.

Now in his-third year at the helm, Cork — under his watch — have won the Munster title, national league titles, but the big one has escaped him so far.

"Obviously we are delighted to be back in the final and two months ago we would have settled for that. Things weren't going as well as we wanted so we are delighted the players turned it around and we are there now.

the massive task ahead of us and we know that many will consider them massive favourites to win.

"I think they have averaged 22 points per game in the championship, which is phenomenal scoring. But to me it's not a surprise they are so successful as they have won five minor titles in the last eight years or

"As well as that, WIT won the Ashbourne Cup for three years in-a-row and it would have been made up of a lot of these Kilkenny players. So obviously they are red-hot favourites for a reason.

"Looking back to the final two years ago it was a new experience for a lot of us on the sideline and it was something I wouldn't have been used to, along with a few others.

"I think our emphasis in the league was on seeing if we could get a few players to come through and give more a bit of experience of competitive games.

"We have managed to do this and it was really from the Munster championship on that we took things really seriously.

"We have a lot of players that have come of age, the likes of Laura Tracey, the Mackey twins (Pamela and Katriona) and Julia White have come into their own.

"It seems that now some of the younger players are coming through and that is only good for Cork camogie. It has made competition for places on the starting line-up tight and we have 29 on the panel and I think any one of them can do a job for us.

"The replay against Wexford will have done the panel a world of good,

but I would like if we had another week ahead of the final and that's not from the training side of things.

"It just helps from an organisational point of view and two weeks is just crazy from that perspective.

"Look you're not going to do a lot of things training wise at this stage, it's all about getting their heads right and ensuring any little niggly injuries are sorted ahead of the day.

"But we are where we, and where all sides, wanted to be at the start of the year. We know the challenge we face, we know it's going to be difficult and you know the only thing to do is to meet it head-on.

TO process an All-Ireland semi-final is a hard enough task, especially when you come within seconds of getting it right only for Wexford to snatch a late equaliser.

But what about your club facing a dreaded relegation championship battle on the same day? Now that's demanding!

This was the scenario which faced Cork camogie selector Brian Barry as Cork drew with Wexford in Thurles, and a few hours later Killeagh battled it out with Courcey Rovers to hold onto their senior hurling status in Riverstown. "I suppose really it was, in funny way, a blessing that both games were the same day," reflects Brian. "I had to focus on the camogle game first and that probably kept me occupied and then when that was over I had to switch off and regain my thoughts." Brian explains it would have been heartbreaking if Killeagh had been relegated.

"To be senior 13 years and then have your status snatched away would be heartbreaking. We had a fairly good year to be fair and were unlucky to find ourselves in a relegation battle. Injuries and retirements took their toll, but we just had to knuckle down." After the game in Thurles, Brian spoke briefly as they regained their composure after Wexford grabbed a late equaliser. "By nature I am not a nervous person, but I suppose I was a little disappointed that we had not got a result in Thurles after the way we played. I knew we were good enough to finish the job next time out and I suppose really the hurling game was going to be a similar story only the stakes were higher.

"We had a second chance in Thurles, but I knew we had to do the business in Riverstown, full concentration needed." Brian, better known by his nickname 'Blondie', came to be involved in camogie by accident. He struck up a friendship with Paudie Murray through business.

*Paudie was organising my mortgage. We would spend five minutes talking mortgages and 55 talking hurling. Paudie took over the camogie job in 2012 and asked me get involved. We had never worked together but I said I would give it a go and enjoyed it." At the start of this year Brian stepped down as a selector due with work and family commitments, but he was eventually coaxed back by Paudie. "I was involved with Killeagh hurlers as sean Crowley had asked me to come on board. Paudie came back to me after a while. He got Matthew Twomey, who does the hurling coaching with myself, and Teddy Donovan, who does the goalkeeping coaching. "I eventually said yes and thrilled I did."

Brian has superb back-up in his wile Susan, and they've two small boys Ciarán (3) and Eoin who is just 18 months old. He works with Classic Drinks in Little Island and is also proprietor of Kennedy's Bar in Killeagh. "A typical day would be very full on. Without the support I get from Susan it just would not be possible. She knows I just love the hurling and really that was why is decided, with her full blessing, to say yes to Paudie."

Stats the way for insight on Cork displays

Niall will have it all figured out on All-Ireland final day

HOW many times have we all heard winning managers and captains thank their backroom team post All-Ireland victories?

We acknowledge the sentiment but does the general public truly appreciate just how many hours are put in or the massive role those behind the scenes play in sport at the highest

Niall Collins from Dunmanway is the Cork team's stats man.

A first cousin of Paudie Murray they have always been close so last January when Paudie asked Niall to get involved he didn't hesitate.

He had done a little bit of stats before with Doheny's GAA club but nothing like on the scale he is doing now. He recalls how it all came

"Performance analysis is probably what the technical term for it is. How I got into it really is that my day job is in IT, I'm a very analytic person," he explained.

"Maths was always something that I loved doing when in school and my passion is GAA so when you combine them both, it's great.

"It's very interesting. I love working with the girls. To be able to work with the elite is not something everyone can say and in Cork these are the elite performers in their code, so the opportunity to work with them in whatever role is a priv-

"'When Paudie asked me about the statistician role I did some research. I spoke to several in the same role with inter-county teams around the country on the software packages they are using.

"I spoke to the Dublin senior footballers, I spoke to people in Cork,

Mayo, Kerry, Donegal and I just did a lot of research. At the end I drew up a short-list of the main packages and Performance Sports was the one that won out because it was the one that was economical, financially it worked with our budget.

"We probably went over a bit on that but what we got from it was just far superior to the others, it's one I would highly-recommend.

"For ourselves who wanted to study how things were going, where things are, from video analysis, the KPIs (Key Performance Indicators) during games and the post-game analysis, this ticks all the boxes

From speaking with Paudie and watching Cork's performances, there is no doubt that he has raised the bar with his team this year and that having the stats at hand to study has been a huge contributing factor.

how does it work? "During the game I've an iPad in front of me and I tag particular events during the game; shots on goal, frees, etc. So the information at this stage is only what I'm entering into the

"You have to have certain KPI's during games. I'm in

contact with Paudie through the earpiece. So if your KPI was that you were to have 10 shots on goal in the first 10 minutes, or monitoring the free count, I'm tracking that."

But surely that's very difficult? How can you track every player and

"Well, what you have is in-game analysis and post-game analysis. In-game wouldn't be as detailed but the post-game analysis is when you sync with the video.

"At that point you break it down into far more minute detail. I sync the game against the application and go into far greater in-depth player analysis; times on the ball, hooking, blocking, passing etc. and that's broken down by player and all the girls can log in to an online platform at any time and watch any game so far this year and view their own game, scores, frees, stats, etc."

This work takes hours. Paudie mentioned to me that after the victory over Wexford on the Sat-

urday, he got Niall's analysis of that game at 2am Sunday "No one realises the work

hours. It's five hours post-match but a lot of work is also done during the week when

we're analysing.

"I sit down with Paudie some nights for hours. It's constant, It's incredible the amount of work he's put into it.

"I don't think there is any inter-county manager on this planet, no matter what code he's doing has put so much work and passion into it so it would be great if he was successful.

"It's great to be involved with an inter-county team and a successful team and the backroom team; the guys are excellent.

"They're all appreciative of what I do and very appreciative of each other. Every team is as strong as its weakest link.

"Of course, we'll be judged on Sunday. During the year when things weren't going so well I suppose there may have been a mental challenge but we always had the confidence, knew we had the ability.

"To be able to show a team that their performance wasn't as bad as it may seem after a defeat is very be-

"After our group defeat to Wexford I said to Paudie and the selectors, that if you took 10 minutes out of that game, we played well.

"When I showed them the numbers after the game, we had more possession, more shots on goal. It's just that we didn't use our possession well and we got burned in the first 10 minutes.

"That was used as the foundation for moving on."

Those nights of burning the midnight oil will hopefully be all worth in on Sunday afternoon; when Paudie will no doubt, in his post-match interview, pay tribute to his highly-committed backroom

All through the All-Ireland campaign the focus has been on 'standing out from the crowd' by focusing on the players' lives and stories, by seeing them in a new light through imaginative photography and then backing this up with ticketing packages that makes it easier and more affordable to attend games."

To have two more Fennellys captaining two women's teams in All-Ireland finals - on the same day - is another mark of the family's massive service to Kilkenny's history





Seniors set for Sunday's epic battle

The Kilkenny senior camogie team will be hoping to bridge a 20-year gap when they take on Cork in the All-Ireland final on Sunday.

The Cats, who last won the O'Duffy Cup in 1994, will take on the Rebelettes in a rematch of the 2009 final when the sides meet in the big clash at Croke Park (throw-in 4pm).

Kilkenny have been in impressive form all year. They won the league in April and have suffered only one defeat all season, losing to Wexford in the Leinster final. They regrouped and powered through the All-Ireland championship campaign, rattling off 16-78 on their way to the final.

Kilkenny began their All-Ireland campaign against Offaly in Nowlan Park, easily beating the Faithful County side by 5-16 to 0-8 points. In their second game, against Tipperary, the Premier County frustrated the Cats for periods, but Kilkenny took hold of the clash in the second half and ran out 2-21 to 0-7 winners.

The third game saw Kilkenny travel to Ennis to take on Clare, a game which was always going to be a difficult assignment. In a tough contest, in which Kilkenny played the second half with 14 players, they fought off a late Clare surge to record their third win on a 1-13 to 0-12 scoreline.



In the final round Kilkenny entertained Derry, knowing that a victory would ensure their qualification for the All-Ireland semi-finals. With such a high prize at stake Kilkenny showed no mercy, running out 4-16 to 1-5 winners against the Ulster girls, setting up a semi-final date with Galway, a replay of last year's All-Ireland.

Although Kilkenny convincingly led by 2-5 to 1-3 at half-time the second half was a different story. Galway came right back at Kilkenny, cutting the gap to a point.

Showing their steel the Cats soaked up everything Galway threw at them Kilkenny took, responding well as they recorded a 4-12 to 3-7 result that earned them a final beth against Cork, who needed a replay to beat Wexford in the other semi-final.

Cork will bring impressive form to Sunday's final. They were solid in their All-Ireland campaign, losing just one game to Wexford. Forwards Orla Cotter and Katriona Mackey are capable of

causing the Kilkenny defence difficulty, while the Cats will also have to be mindful of the danger that dual player Briege Corkery brings to the fold.

However, the Kilkenny fullback line of Mairead Power, Kate McDonald and Jacqui Frisby will relish the challenge. They were miserly in the group stages, conceding just one goal on the way to the semi-finals.

Cork will also need to be wary of Kilkenny's forwards Denise Gaule, Aisling Dunphy, Aine Connery, Michelle Quilty, Katie Power and Shelly Farrell, all of whom can take advantage of any lapses in Cork's defence.

Positive attitude brought Aylward & Co back to final

Losing an All-Ireland camogie final was hurtful, but not performing on the big stage brought more for Kilkenny's Elaine Aylward.

Having raced their way into the 2013 decider, the Cats were left distraught when their charge stalled against Galway in Croke Park last September.

"Looking back on last year's final we didn't perform near the best of our capabilities and that was the most disappointing thing about it," she said. "To be beaten in an All-Ireland final is obviously disappointing but to not perform in one is even worse.

"There was a lot of regret there that we didn't play to our full potential," she added. "Whether that would have been good enough to beat Galway on the day, who knows, but it would have been nice to be that bit closer to see."

Kilkenny seem to have harnessed that regret, turning it into a positive run that saw them take an unbeaten path through the All-Ireland championship.

"This year we said we would take it one game at a time, whether it be the league or the round robin in the championship," she said. "The championship was week

on week so we had a few days to get back in and focus on the next team.

"Last year's regret, and the bit of hurt that was there helped us along, but we wouldn't be here now without taking it week by week."

Taking a measured, cautious route also paid off when Kilkenny came up against the reigning champions in the semi-final. The idea of unfinished business from last year was discarded.

"It would have been said in the time nearer the game and in the run up to training but avenging the 2013 final defeat wasn't the main motivating factor," she said. "2013 is over and done with and no-one can change the result of that.

"It was all about 2014 as far

as we were concerned; Galway were the next step.

"Luckily the focus was good and we got the result."

Consigning previous defeats to the memory banks is a little easier when a team is looking forward to another final, but Kilkenny have adopted a positive mantra all year.

"It was easier, but in another sense 2013 was done with," she said. "We had our analysis done on last year so you don't look back because if you do you'll end up back there."

The new campaign wasn't without its challenges, for players or management, but Kilkenny have come shining through on two fronts.

"Last year's journey was probably new to everyone, management included," she said. "Managing two teams is a big ordeal-getting a group of 40 girls to two All-Ireland finals is no mean achievement."

Sharing the managers has seen a bond develop between the senior and intermediate teams.

"We would have trained a good bit together at the start of the year. The day they beat Kildare in Carlow (the intermediate All-Ireland semi-final) a number of senior girls would have been involved. It was the same when we beat Galway.

"On the day we were all fighting for the one cause, Kilkenny camogie," she said. "We are all in it together.

"It was great to be coming back to training last week and to have the 40 girls there. To have both teams going the full distance is a bonus."

In a year of steps Cork will provide the biggest one on Sunday, but the Cats are ready.

"Cork are a good skilful camogie team," finished Aylward. "We know exactly what to expect."

Two teams can deliver, says Dillon

The 2013 campaign was a new experience for Kilkenny camogie, but joint manager Graham Dillon is adamant everyone has learned from the process.

"I think the attitude of the girls was always good, but they've upped it a level this year," he said. "Their performances in training and in games have become more ruthless.

"They've learned how to put teams away. When they've gotten the lead they haven't looked over their shoulder they've just kept going."

While the intermediates have a fresh challenge in the shape of their final, Dillon is happy with how the seniors have bounced back from last year's loss to Galway.

"Galway weren't going to give up their title easily - they battled hard and worked away in this year's semi-final.

"It looked like the tide was starting to turn but the girls have got more belief in themselves and their ability," he said. "They now know what they're capable of and I just hope that it comes through on Sunday because it's what they deserve at this stage."

Standing in their way will be a Cork side who will be just as hungry as the Cats.

"Cork were really impressive when beating Wexford in the semi-final replay," he said. "They are physical, athletic and skilful and it will probably be a different game to Galway, there will be more hurling involved. It's going to be a tough battle."

With the intermediates first into action on Sunday against Limerick, Dillon admitted that it was a good time for Kilkenny camogie. The panels have gelled well all year, spurring each other on when needed.

The sides have definitely influenced each other along the way," he said. "There's no special treatment; there's nothing the seniors get that the intermediates don't. I think they appreciate that. They're fully focused on winning their own championship and then getting up into the stand and roaring the senior girls on. Hopefully we can bring the two trophies home, but it won't be easy.

"Limerick are on the intermediate scene a long time," he added. "They are a well-established team and we'll be going back there to just try play as much hurling as possible.

"With the seniors it's going to be just like the hurling at the weekend it's going to be impossible to call. Hopefully we come out on the right side of it!"

Connery committed to Cats' cause

That resolution was never more tested than when the Cats faced Galway in the All-Ireland semi-final.



"It's been a few years since we have won and I feel there is massive support all around the county for us. It was great to see the crowds at Castle Road when we had our open training session last week.

"Hopefully, they will travel to Dublin to support us on Sunday and we can give them something to cheer about come full-time," concluded

"I have never thought about raising the professional bar, all I've ever wanted is to have no regrets. I grew up with the joke that you put the slow and less talented one in goal and I guess I wanted to put that perception on its head. I remember Kevin telling me what Ger Cunningham was like and then Donal Og. I picked up a few things from Kevin on that front about how serious they were and how hard they trained. It almost gave me a confidence to demand more from myself and those that trained me." How does Aoife prepare on a weekly basis?

"As I've got older my week has changed. A few years ago I'd be out hurling every night but now I tend to mind myself a bit more. The week of a match I like to get two training sessions in. I've started to swim this year and it's helped me recover from my back injury so I do a bit of that. I am lucky that work is busy so I don't have a lot of down time to think during the day. Mentally I've done a bit of work previously with sports physiology so I've learned a huge amount from that."

Work is in Dublin for Aoife.

"I've been in Dublin five out of the past 10 summers, went up for two years after college and now this is my third consecutive year back up there. Right now I can't see myself moving back to Cork. I am employed by JLL and they have been a great support. I guess it's hard for Cork people to understand why someone would move away from Cork but I am very happy living in Dublin. It does take a lot of effort and commitment but when you've the honour of representing your club, family and loved ones by putting on the Rebel jersey it's very much worth it.

Cats heroine bounces back thanks to her 'bionic legs'

Two torn cruciates and two lost finals still can't take the spring out of McDonald's step

TRENDY café hidden away in the posh Dublin southside suburb of Goatstown provided a welcome refuge for Kate
McDonald this week, four days before the All-Ireland final.

She has just started her HDip, teaching maths and geography at nearby Jesus and Mary College (formerly Our Lady's Grove), so this leafy Dublin enclave, where she's heard an Irish rugby legend is living, is all very new to her.

Her students don't even know that she's playing in Sunday's senior final against Cork but she has been delighted to discover that the school already has a junior camogie team.

She'd be delighted to help out when she gets a spare minute and, in time, the school will discover they've gained a useful sporting all-rounder.

In her youth, McDonald (23) and her doubles partner Laura Butler were the top-ranked underage badminton duo in Leinster.

She also won All-Ireland schools volleyball titles with Our Lady's Callan alongside Kilkenny teammates Denise Gaule, Jacqui Frisby and Mairead Power, as well as camogie's equivalent.

FAMINE

For Kilkenny to finally break their surprising 20-year senior famine on Sunday would be massive, especially for a 23-year-old defender who has already endured not one but two torn cruciate knee ligament injuries.

Women are even more prone, physiologically, to cruciate injury than men. McDonald actually did her first when she was still just 17 and in fifth year in school.

It happened in a league final against Galway in 2008 and, just two years later, her other knee went "in a challenge match for Kilkenny against boys.
Ballyragget's U-16s or minors, I think.

"I knew exactly what it was when it happened the second time. It felt like my kneecap moved out to the side and the knee hinged the wrong way," she recalls.

Four years on, the Thomastown defender makes little of her double cruciate nightmare, insisting "I've been lucky, I've a friend that's done three. There's hardly a team in the country without someone who has torn their cruciate.

"I knew I had recovered from one so I could also recover from two. The way I look at it now I have bionic legs," she laughs.

"The big issue coming back is the mental factor, not just building up your leg again but getting it into your head that your

leg is alright.

"There comes a time where you need to stop thinking about it every turn you take. That's the hardest part, believing and trusting that you're OK, but it just gradually fades from your mind."

After the second one herself and best buddy Leann Fennelly (Kilkenny's senior captain) spent the summer of 2011 in Boston, playing a bit of football and working in a petrol station where "they'd come in to talk to you, just for the sake of talking to the Irish".

After dabbling in accountancy last year, she has landed her "dream job", saying "teaching is all I ever wanted to do".

She was only 14 when she won her first All-Ireland title and, three years later, captained Kilkenny's three-in-a-row All-Ireland U-16s, a team that also won multiple minor titles and formed the platform for their current senior renaissance.

The only piece missing in her sporting jigsaw so far is a senior All-Ireland.

Cork have always been the arch-nemesis for herself and her club team in Thomastown, where Shelly Farrell's parents, Helen and Martin, are pivotal figures. It was Douglas who beat them in a Community Games final and, a year later, in the Division One Feile final and, a third time, in the Feile semi-finals.

It was Cork who also beat Kilkenny in the 2009 All-Ireland, when McDonald was only 18 and an unused sub.

That one passed a bit over her head but the pain of last year's final loss to Galway has lingered long and hard.

"They say Croke Park can be a lonely place. It is when you're losing," she muses. "We only lost by five points but in the last few minutes of it you could feel it slipping away and then you started hearing the voices (from the crowd). It's funny the things you remember, and what plays on your mind after."

Returning to start another campaign, after losing an All-Ireland final, is the worst ever she says.

"I've been thinking lately of all the work that's been done, the winter work, the dark nights in the 'skins' with muddy hurls.

"You think, 'Lord God, why do we go through all of this?' but then you get to this stage and you think, 'We're nearly there, it might all be worth it!"

Anna Geared up for decider

ATCHING up with Anna
Geary, Cork's captain at the
team's press night last week
we reflected on Cork's last
visit to Croke Park in 2012
and their semi-final defeat to Kilkenny
last season. I see evidence of a greater
hunger this year in the squad; the bar
has been raised; maybe feeding off the
pain of the last two years? Is there a
new found intent in the side?

"Yeah, I think, looking at it from a purely statistical point of view, we haven't won an All-Ireland since 2009 and really, last year we lost to Kilkenny through our own fault. People can say what they want, that Kilkenny stepped it up, but we had that game and we threw it away and a great deal of it was probably complacency on our part.

"I'm a firm believer in showing respect to your opposition, you have to. If you don't respect the team and respect that they are capable of beating you then you are never going to be able to go in and play them and raise your own bar. And I don't think we did that and we paid the price. Losing by a point; I've lost a lot of games in my career but it was one of the worst games I've ever lost because we were capable of winning it, even playing badly we still could have come out with a win and it just goes to show.

"We couldn't have prepared any better. The first 20 minutes we started fine but it was just one of those days when things started to go wrong, they continued to go wrong and none of us were able to pull it back.

"This year you know what, we started at a slower pace. In 2012 and 2013 we won the league and it really got us nowhere. It's great to win the league and it's great to have a cup and all that but no one remembers the league champions. This year we're more consistent in that we're constantly building.

"Our league campaign was very up and

down and our semi-final loss to Clare was a testament to how we actually were going, I think it was quite accurate. "It's not just about your physical preparation, it has to be about your mental strength as well and I think this year more than any other year we've shown that.

"When Wexford came at us in the replay at half-time we led by a point and they had the momentum because they had got the previous three scores.

"A different day we would have come out and let them get on top again but I think the resilience that we showed for the last 30-plus minutes of that game it's been a long time since I've felt that sheer raw hunger from a team. Now that we're there, if we lose to Kilkenny no one is going to say 'wasn't it great to beat Wexford'.

"It's like Kilkenny last year beating us the way they did. No one remembered it because they did not do themselves justice against Galway. They know that, they'll be out to amend it. But the last time we were in Croke Park in 2012 we didn't go to the level that we can go to so we've both got our own thing to rectify. I don't think either team has an extra motivation going in to the final.

"For them they don't have All-Ireland medals, a lot of us do and we know what it's like to win so we want to feel it again. It's been a long time since any of us felt that. So now that we've got the chance, who's to say that Cork will be in another All-Ireland final. We just don't know. "So we want to make sure it counts this

What about the build-up; will she enjoy it? "I love it, the bigger the game the more I seem to get out of it. I'm never going to be one of these girls that's going to rise to the challenge of a league group game.

"The bigger the game the better I seem to play because when you've no safety net sometimes, that's what you want, when you know there's no second chance. I love feeling nervous before a game, it's almost like my body is telling me that it's getting ready for something. "I would also look on nerves and being a bit anxious as a really good sign because it shows you're gradually getting into the zone." Consistency with management is important in my view. With Paudie at the helm for the last three years you can feel that coming through.

Anna agrees, "Yeah you look

Anna agrees, "Yeah you look back at '12 and '13 and for him he's probably able to analyse what he felt agreed with the players.

"I mean you can use a strategy for one group of players and it can work a treat, your next 15 players might not be able to respond to it at all whereas the majority of this group has been together a while so he's able to look at what works for this group of girls and what doesn't work.

"That is crucial because when you get to know your players; it's a team sport but to get the best out of your team you have to get the best out of your individuals." What would it mean to you to Anna to walk up the steps of the Hogan Stand? "You know what, when someone asks me, even from the outset, what is it you want to accomplish as Cork captain, I've never said 'to win an All-Ireland'.

"I said 'to walk my team out to Croke Park'. Walking the steps is the cherry. To lead them there, to experience Croke Park with them and knowing that I'm leading out these girls... now there are 15 leaders in our team and I'm lucky in that I've got so much experience everywhere that I don't always have to be the one to raise the team, I've got girls that are willing to take it on and that's huge for me and in a team."



Key Players for Laois

However facing them is a Down team with plenty of stars of their own, none more

decade's worth of experience in handling the pressure of big games is the X-factor which Cork carry into Sunday's All-Ireland final, according to manager Paudie Murray.

The likes of Joanne O'Callaghan and Gemma O'Connor will take the field for their 10th camogic decider, while dual stars Rena Buckley and Briege Corkery with play in their 16th and 17th finals between now and the end of September. So while Cork may be aiming for a first title in five years, there remains a well of positive experiences which Kilkenny, without a title in 20 years, can't match.

The Cats do enter as favourites to break that duck but Murray believes the weight of expectation will rest heavily on their shoulders. "Having lost an All-Ireland last year and being red-hot favourites can't be easy for them. It has to be difficult and there must be a lot of pressure on them," Murray said.

them," Murray said.

"This year I don't think anyone expects us to win. I was coming off the pitch in Waterford last week after beating Wexford and people were saying; 'Sure ye have your day out anyway.' A lot of people think we are just going up for the day, but we're going up to win."

Sunday will equally be a revenge mission for the ladies in red, who lost out to Kilkenny in last year's semi-final. They had entered in good form but left having conceded two poor goals and on the wrong end of a one-point difference.

It was a loss which hit Cork hard and the turnaround was not easy.

"This year has been difficult for a number of reasons. We've a lot of girls that are working or in college outside the county, so we found it very difficult to get them together early on. "The main thing about the League

"The main thing about the League was that we blooded a few younger girls and hoped we would get one or two out of that, which I think we have. And it was the Munster Championship that things really started to kick on from.

"It's obviously going to be very hard but I think they've reacted very well and their displays in the last three or

four games have shown that as well."
They learned a lot from a group stage loss to Wexford which Murray described as a "learning curve".

"Defensively we had to change things around. Our scoring in front of goal wasn't as good as what it should have been, our puckouts weren't as good... but when we looked at it in the video afterwards, a lot of our play was quite good and we were actually a lot better than what we thought."

Thus, despite their experience, the Leesiders have been a work in progress this year and playing a quarter-final against Offaly gave them more time to develop. They got an additional game at the semi-final stage too, having drawn with Wexford, and Murray is keen to see that as a positive. "Certainly our displays will give the girls massive confidence, there's no doubt about that."

It is a confidence which will be needed against a Kilkenny side averaging over 25 points per game.

"It's pretty phenomenal in camogie terms," says Murray, "but I don't think we're going to do anything different in our own plans. It's 15 against 15. It's a case of win your own battle and you go from there."

Cats ace Fennelly aiming to avenge 2013 defeat and add to medal haul

Leann Fennelly has been asked the question before, but still doesn't have an answer. Finding out exactly how many All-Ireland medals her famous family actually possesses is something she will one day get around to.

In fairness, it would be a waste of time adding them all up just now because there could be a significant increase by the time this month is out.

On Sunday, she will captain the Kilkenny seniors in the All-Ireland camogie final against Cork. Before it, her cousin, Mags, will captain the intermediate team in their quest for a first title since 2008. After all of that, they will turn their attentions to the senior hurling final replay between Kilkenny and Tipperary as Michael and Colin Fennelly are family too. The Cats duo are Mags' brothers.

All of them are the children of Kilkenny greats who have bulging trophy cupboards themselves so you can see why Leann never bothered

getting her abacus out.

"Between all the uncles and everything, well, I actually wouldn't be able to give you an exact figure for medals — but a good lot! I have three minor and an U-16: It's not so bad, we were delighted to win each of them. The senior medal now would obviously be great."

Mags is saying the same on the inter-

mediate front and the remarkable possibility exists that Kilkenny could win back-to-back All-Ireland finals on Sunday afternoon.

Of course, the very opposite could just as easily occur and they could both leave empty-handed, a little like the feeling the Fennelly brothers experienced last weekend when the MacCarthy Cup was whipped from their grasp by resurgent Tipperary.

their grasp by resurgent Tipperary.
"It was a huge occasion for them," said Leann. "I know they've both been around a few years but it was still an All-Ireland final against Tipp. There

was definitely a few nerves.

"I've been delighted for Michael, he's had his injuries but he's been a great addition to the team again. He's so big and strong. I'd say Brian Cody is delighted to have him back fully fit. He did make a difference in the Limerick game and played his part the last day so hopefully they can do the business again in the replay."

As kids, the Fennelly cousins often trooped to Croke Park en masse to watch their fathers. Leann is a daughter of Liam, the All-Ireland winning captain of 1992.

"There's no real pressure there or anything," she maintained. "I suppose it's just nice whenever anyone hears the name and recognises it. It's always the first question you get, 'which one is your father then?'

"We were just talking about it


recently, the memories of us all going up to Croke Park. We'd park in the local school and it would be tea and sandwiches in the car. They were great days. I don't know how old I was, probably seven or eight. I'd love to go back to having tea and sandwiches before games!"

These days, her pre-match intake is far more scientific, full of proteins and slow releasing energy foods. There is a huge title on the line and the memory of coming up just short in last year's decider against Galway, losing by two, fuels her ambition.

"We just didn't perform as well as we would have hoped to," she said. "So we were disappointed. Personally, and as a team, we didn't perform. Galway were really ready for us. They had their tactics and it worked for them on the day. It was a low-scoring game but hopefully we can rectify that this year.

"But, look, we know what Cork can do. Number one, they have a great bunch of players. Especially the dual players who seem like they are around forever but are actually only 26 or 27. They've won a lot and I suppose that's made it easier for them to keep coming back, year in, year out,

"A lot of our team would have been playing together a long time also, since we were U-14 really. There's a good bunch of us who have known each other for a good few years so it would be great to achieve this together now."

Briege Corkery, along with her Cork colleague Rena Buckley, is on the verge of claiming the highest All-Ireland medal count in GAA history, not that she thinks about such things. There might be life left in the dual star so - and there's certainly plenty of life in this one.

he's not counting. Or if she ever was, she's lost count.

Ask Briege Corkery where she reckons she stands in the roll of honour of All-Ireland medals and she "thinks" herself and Rena Buckley are on the same as Mary O'Connor before them

at about the 13 mark. But she's "not sure"

"I don't like comparing myself to other people," she says after dashing in from another training session, "I am who I

As it turns out, she's slightly off. The bar is currently raised at 12. Angela and Ann Downey each won a dozen senior All-Ireland medals in camogie and, being from Kilkenny, none in football, O'Connor won seven in camogie, and being from Cork, another five in football. But now that triumvirate could well be overtaken this month by a certain duo.

Tomorrow in Croke Park Corkery and Rena Buckley could win their fifth senior camogie title with Cork, and a fortnight later, a staggering ninth with the ladies

footballers.

It evokes that famous line the late Sid Waddell excitably proclaimed as Eric Bristow closed down on yet another world

darts championship.
"When Alexander The Great of
Macedonia was 33 he cried salt tears
because he had no more worlds to conquer Bristow's only 27!"

Not least because Corkery and Buckley

are still only 27.

O'Connor, herself, can only watch in awe at how much more they can still win and how vital they've been in those previous wins; Corkery has being Player of the Year in both football and camogie, winning nine All Stars between the two codes.

"I think it's a phenomenon," says O'Connor, now a director for camogie development. "I use that word sparingly but very deliberately in this instance because, in terms of women's sport in this country, Briege Corkery is simply a phenomenon. To train and play at the level of intensity she has for so long.

"She hasn't just won things with Cork; she's been instrumental in Cork winning those All-Irelands. When those games were in the balance she was the one that took them by the scruff of the neck. Last year she helped her club win their first county. She wouldn't be a noted scorer but she kicked the winning point against my own club in the final because that's what Briege Corkery does, win games for her

"And with all the underage talent coming through in both camogie and football in Cork I can see herself and Rena winning a lot more. I know in female sport players retire that bit earlier but they're such athletes they'll be the ones who'll decide how long more they'll play for."

So what's Corkery's secret?

It might be in something that could seem a bit of a paradox but makes absolute sense. In the words of O'Connor, "Briege is always happy", off the field and on it. And yet in the words of another old legendary teammate, Juliet Murphy, "Briege is never

Past glories and medals are right away parked to the point she literally can't keep count of them; trying to land the next couple is where the thrill is. But it is a thrill. Playing camogie and football for Cork is something she just loves, something that makes her happy. So, no, you won't hear from her that being a dual player is some kind of grind or ordeal. But she understands why it can sometimes be

like that for male dual players.

She and Buckley haven't had to contend with their names and dual status dragged up on The Sunday Game any time Cork lose as poor Aidan Walsh had to numerous times this summer. But the fact she and Buckley have been able to combine the two so well for so long she feels is proof that it can work for the likes of Walsh too.

"I think you can play both," says Corkery, "Without a doubt. It's not that different, what we're doing and what they are; ultimately we're playing at the top level too in our games. I'd just wish people would give them a small bit of a break. As in, don't be making such a big deal out of

"I think the biggest issue in being a male dual player is that the media make such a big issue of them being dual players. When I saw Aidan Walsh coming off in the hurling (All-Ireland semi-final) I felt so sorry for him.

"Because you knew what was coming. 'Ah, you can't do both.' But it just takes time to adapt to being able to manage both. Rena and myself have been doing this since we were 14.

"If Aidan Walsh were to do both again next year he'd be better able to cope. People need to chill on the men, the likes of Aidan, (Damien) Cahalane and (Eoin) Cadogan. Just let them do it." How does she? "I just get up the next day

and play it. That's kind of it.

You must be good to rest so? Know when to sit out a training session or step out of one? "Should I say 'Yeah'?" she chuckles. "But no!"

More often than not it's left to Eamonn Ryan and Paudie Murray to pull the reins, such is her reluctance to be seen to be avoiding the work.

The night we meet up she's just after coming from football training, although she only popped her head in there. The previous night and the following night, camogie. Even last night she again drove the 40 minutes down from Macroom into The Farm to look out for the footballers whom she captains this year. "I just like to keep myself occupied," he says. "I'm not used to sitting at home and if I sat there I'd only be thinking of the training.

Ask any teammate about Corkery and they'll say she's a lifeforce and a livewire. Last winter her and teammate Brid Stack headed to the States for 10 days, spending four in San Diego and six in Vegas; Corkery survived and word is Vegas did too, just about.

O'Connor remembers after one of the All-Ireland wins, the side retreated to Quinn's and some friends of Corkery's were wearing a t-shirt that was both a nod to her occupation and personality. 'Briege Corkery: stonemason by day, stone mad by

Juliet Murphy will second that. "Briege trains hard and she plays hard. She'll be the first one dancing on the bar without ever falling off the bar. She's just got such energy. She never misses training but more often than not she'll be flying in there on two wheels coming from work. She's just always on the go."

She does occasionally relax. After training she'll put on the telly, and will particularly enjoy The Inbetweeners and Orange Is The New Black. She has a boyfriend, Diarmuid. But she won't lie. With Diarmuid running a farm, some of their dates can be helping milk the cows together. When you have as much on as she does, a passive life isn't really an option.

It's probably down to how she was reared. She grew up on her parents' farm, the second-youngest of 10 children. That meant "a lot of great fights," she smiles, and a love for the outdoors. "Mum would try to get me to do housework when I was younger and I'd sneak out the yard." Her first summer jobs were really working on that farmyard and it's something she's ended up returning to now that she no longer works as a stonemason by day after work dried up in that sector; the day job now is as an assistant to a veterinary agency in Macroom.

Sport was another outdoor passion. In football her club is St Val's from Aghinagh, while she's always hurled with Cloughduv, just as her mother did. She's been playing with Cork adult senior teams since she was 16, coming on a sub in the 2003 camogie senior final defeat to Tipperary. Two years later Cork would reverse that result, with Corkery starting at wing forward. A couple of weeks later she would win a football All-Ireland at wing back. Just like Teddy McCarthy, she had done the double, and would go on to do another three before the decade was out.

Things have changed since then. In 2010 she took the year out to travel Down Under with her boyfriend Diarmuid and in her absence the ladies footballers

would suffer a shock quarter-final exit to Tyrone, their only defeat in the last 10 years in the All-Ireland series. Since her return they've returned to winning every All-Ireland going but in the camogie

Cork are still waiting for their first title since 2009. Comparisons between the two setups have been unavoidable, not least to Cork-

'You'll always be comparing, to be fair. We've been very up and down in the camogie since 2009. We've been good enough but we just haven't pulled it together. At times people would be missing training which is something that never happens in the football. There have definitely been years in the camogie where you could feel things haven't been right. I'm sure in the future that will happen in the football too and there'll be quiet years in it but for now we're always conscious of on top milk it for all its worth because it

does not last forever.

This year she feels better about the camogie. The turning point for her was a visit to Spike Island, best known for being the station of a prison. It was there the Cork camogie team paid some penance too and were all the better for it. "We put down a really hard day there. It was soaking wet, absolutely lashing, and the army really put us through our paces. We'd be carrying dead weight, with blindfolds on and next thing you'd just hear a scream and someone had been fired into the water. Afterwards the army lads pointed out our deficiencies. Some people didn't respect other people. Our communication needed to be better. It all came to the fore and since then there's been a huge difference. I think girls just tuned in a bit more, started taking it more serious. We've become closer, better at communicating, better friends really. Everyone is training so hard we're really looking forward to Sunday and to performing and not having regrets like we had two years ago in the final. We just had a very bad mental attitude going up there. If you gave it 100% and lost it's some consolation it but we were only operating at 60%.

Even the footballers have had their little wobbles and have required some interventions. Early last summer they were twice beaten by Kerry in Munster. Things picked up slightly when Julief Murphy returned but they needed Murphy's leadership off the field to fully get back on track. She asked each player to write about each player and what words came to mind when they thought of them. That simple exercise completely changed the mood.

It just lifted all of us. In hindsight we had become too hard on each other, cranky even. We just needed to remember that we could play football, it was all in our head, it was all about attitude. I know I sometimes would doubt myself if I was working hard enough, but when I saw that sheet it gave me huge confidence, that people still had confidence in me."

Juliet Murphy is astonished to think Corkery ever doubted herself. They never doubted it. Alongside her name were a range of compliments: Inspirational. Courageous. Determined. Fearless. Murphy could have kept on and on.

"There will never be anyone like Briege Corkery in football again. That combination of athleticism, determination and I've never seen a more fearless player. She's not afraid of any opponent or going into any challenge or of hurting herself in training or in a game. In the 2009 final she went into a tackle and landed head over heels trying to stop herself from falling, got up and played on. Afterwards in the celebrations she said her ribs were feeling a bit sore. It turned out she'd fractured one yet she'd played on. I have no doubt with her ability to get up and down the field that if she'd dedicated herself to being a middle-distance runner she'd have run for Ireland in the Olympics. She can lift the team by making a block or carrying the ball to relieve the team or win a kickout just when we need it."

Corkery herself rates herself as a much better footballer than a hurier, which is

what Eamonn says which is when you're

why if she had a preference it would be for the big ball. "I don't really rate myself as a camogie player," she softly laughs. "I seem to spend most of my time on the ground. I love camogie as well but if I was to pick one it would be football because I feel I have more to

Mary O'Connor though would dispute that perception. Corkery hasn't been a four-time All Star and All-Ireland winner and Player of the Year in the small ball by accident.

"You have to realise about Briege that not only is she humble but she is a fantastic camogie player. You just don't know where she'll pop up. She might be lining out at wing forward but she'll be back in the halfback line looking for a pass, Her real strength is her ability to get on the ball and take people on, draw two or three players and then see and play the pass. She might only score a couple of points but you can be sure she'll be fouled another four or five times for another four or five. You hear a lot about decision-making in GAA now. Well Briege Corkery is probably the best decision- maker in camogie and football there is."

Earlier in the year though she had to make some decisions and there were some decisions made about her, all which ended up working out for the best. While in January she returned to the footballers she would take until March to resume with the camogie. A few months in though she found herself dropped for the first time in 10 years for the league semi-final against Clare.

"At the start of the year we were just all over the place but the big turning point for me was when Paudie dropped me that time. I felt 'God, why is he dropping me?' I was absolutely gutted. So I called one of the selectors wondering, 'Am I not good enough anymore? What do I need to do to get back on the team?' And in fairness he said, 'Look, let's just improve your hurling, there's plenty of time to get it right, we'll get there.' And looking back it was the right decision. It was like a kick up the arse for me.

It's been what's really drove me on this year

satisfied.

And so, since then, herself and Buckley, the two dual players, will meet up a couple of mornings a week in the ball alley in Cloughduv before work and get in some practise there. It's brought on their hurling. The day in Spike Island has brought on the team's sense of mission and spirit. She likes how things are shaping up ahead of tomorrow. Thinks this year they're more focused.

And then after that? Why, she'll focus our something else. As she says about any of other wins, it's "YAY! WE WON! Forget about it, drive on "

All-Ireland title would cap Rebel Rose's perfect year

THAT clever photo depicting the All-Ireland camogic captains flying through the air like 'Wonder Women' this week was surely designed with Anna Geary in mind.

Like anyone reared on a farm, the 26-year-old is a gifted multitasker and the perfect, bubbly poster-girl for the YOLO (you only live once) generation.

Last month she was Cork's representative in the Rose of Tralee, juggling all that involved with her marketing job for Dell while also leading Cork back to their first Liberty Insurance All-Ireland senior camogic final since 2012.

Kerry's annual pageant wasn't the first time Geary had crossed from sport into popular culture.

Her Bikram Yoga routine in RTE's excellent 'Skin the Game' documentary about elite GAA players last year was a YouTube sensation.

Others were more interested in her on-field skills and how hard she trains on and off the pitch.

Her haul of All-Ireland medals to date is 20, between school (St Mary's Charleville), college, county and club, and her most recent was won with Milford in this year's club finals.

And while she has personally been in the limelight recently it really is all about the collective for Geary (pictured), whether on the pitch, TV screen or stage.

DOCUMENTARY

Part of the reason she did the TV documentary was "because I was very conscious that I was representing women in sport as well, not just camogie. It was an opportunity for people to see we are on a par with men in terms of commitment."

She viewed the Rose of Tralee as a similar opportunity and actually likens it to the GAA.

"Both are totally steeped in Irish heritage and are about representing and being proud about where you come from."

With her 'marketing' cap on she loved the fact that every time the 'Cork Rose' was mentioned a reference to camogie automatically followed.

"People were filling my head and being sceptical about it, like "isn't it a big fake? Were there any of them you didn't get on with?"" she reveals.

To her it was simply 12 exhilarating days shared with like-minded women from across the globe whom she describes as "ambitious, friendly, articulate and approachable."

T IS hard to believe it is 20 years since
Kilkenny last won the O'Duffy Cup. In those
days the Cats were regular visitors to Croke
Park and were almost certain victors. They
have been back five times since. More
recently, in 2009 when they lost out to today's
opposition and twelve months ago the challenge
was Galway.

It will be a different Kilkenny this afternoon -



a Black and Amber with every confidence in their ability to succeed. Lots of underage success has come their way, but the breakthrough at adult level has yet to happen. Is there one more big performance in them?

What they will have learned in defeat is critical. This stadium is intimidating and has derailed many a good player. Mental preparation is so important. Graham Dillon and Niall Williams will have kept them away from all the hype. From what we have seen, Kilkenny are set. Their championship and league form suggests we can expect a massive display from them.

Ann Dalton is a phenomenal player. Denise Gaule, Shelly Farrell and Katie Power move quickly and easily, just as they did against champions Galway in the semi-final. Despite a battling western outfit, the Leinster side were too good and in reversing last season's result they sent out a message. Kilkenny has serious talent in that forward line.

So too has Cork - Orla Cotter, Katriona Mackey, Jenny O'Leary and Briege Corkery have pace to burn. They were in superb form two weeks ago in Walsh Park and if they can bring this sharpness with them today, be prepared for one hell of a tussle.

Fifteen versus 15 (no sweepers), this has all the ingredients of a fantastic shoot-out. The Rebels were involved in one of the most unforgettable finals in 2012 – a six-goal thriller, eventually going Wexford's way. It is credit to Paudie Murray they are back once more. Currently the Red and White have twice as many All Ireland senior titles as the Cats (24/12).

What we do know is Kilkenny are Irish Daily Star League champions, and how they have matured. However, these Cork women have pockets full of medals and what's more they appear to be hitting their peak, just at the right time.

The manner in which the Cats bounced back from the 2013 loss cannot be underestimated too. Everyone knows you have to get back on the horse at some stage but to do so right away says a lot about their character. What else would you expect from a Fennelly led team?

Equally, Leeside skipper Anna Geary, who comes from Milford, leads by example. Anna, Ashling Thompson and Maria Walsh have already climbed those Hogan Stand steps to collect All Ireland senior club honours. So, should it come down to experience?

It most definitely will, but it will also boil down to desire. Both counties are at their pinnacle now and this should bring the very best out in each other. Kilkenny conceded only one goal in four championship round-robin matches, but they let in three against Galway. That is a slight concern.

Still, Kilkenny are an accomplished side.





"I left here last year absolutely gutted," said Mulcahy, yesterday's player of the match after scoring 0-7, including three great efforts from play in the second half.


"We put in so much work last year and to come back here now and to win, it's brilliant. We had a junior team also this year and there was a real panel ethos that has really paid off.



Graham Dillon felt the final margin was a touch unfair to his side: "I'd feel that even though there were six points in the end, I don't think it was a six-point match.






It was a miserable day for





Valiantly, Kilkenny upped their game when they saw that all they had to do was to get a goal to pull them through.


While I wanted Kilkenny to wir, I wouldn't begrudge the gallant Cork women their hardwon and well-deserved victory.

It's time the GAA accorded full parity of esteem to the camogie women: I suggest that their All-Ireland final be held on the same day as the mighty hurling event.




KILKENNY V LIMERICK

Will Limerick make up for last year's final heartbreak?

IMERICK were heartbroken after losing last season's final to Galway by just two points. Standing in the bowels of Croke Park, manager Joe Quaid vowed that this squad of players would return, having learned from the experience.

A Division 1 League campaign was probably even more invaluable though in



terms of being prepared for the championship. While consolidation was the target, Limerick were in fact on the brink of making the semi-finals, which would have been an incredible achievement.

They sailed through the group stages of the championship, winning their games over Kildare, Antrim, Galway and Tipperary by an aggregate of 76 points - that's an average 18-point winning

Waterford shaved 17 points off that in a fiercely-fought semi-final but Limerick showed that they have the intestinal fortitude to go with their flare.

Niamh Mulcahy is the key player for Limerick, from play and placed balls, while minor star, Caoimhe Costello and long-serving Aoife Sheehan now operating in the forwards to good effect on her return to the fold - offer vital support.

Kilkenny also emerged from their group involving Waterford, Cork. Meath and Wexford with a 100% record. They only had a point to spare over the Rebels but were impressive in dispensing of Waterford by six.

They were never really tested in the semi-final against Kildare, although they led by five points when Catherine Foley made amends for conceding a penalty by saving it. From there, they eased clear



to win by 12 points.

Orla Hanrick, Mags Fennelly and Lydia Fitzpatrick are just some of the threats to Limerick's ambitions of returning to the senior ranks, having won this title last in 2007, when the aforementioned Sheehan was captain.

For their part, Kilkenny will be trying to win their first Intermediate Championship since 2008.







Can Laois claim their first title?


OWN were the inaugural winners of this championship in 1968 but the most recent of their two subsequent victories arrived in 1991. Since then, they have lost three finals including the 2011 and 2012.


Laois have never won this title, with last term's final appearance their first. While they competed well in the first half, Kildare's big guns opened up in the second, but the experience has served them well and they have looked strong this year.

The competitiveness of this grade was illustrated in the round-robin stages. These two teams crossed swords in Rathdowney on July 13th and after one of the most exciting games you'd ever hope to see, the hosts prevailed by the minimum (3-12 to 1-17).

Laois had lost their opening game to Dublin though and yet Down turned in a scintillating performance the week after losing to Laois by trouncing the Dubs by 24 points.

It was a Laois-Dublin rematch in the semi-final and this was a much closer affair. Laois showed their composure after conceding two goals in the first seven minutes of the second half to fall three points down. They held the Metropolitans





scoreless for the remainder of the game.

Sarah Anne Fitzgerald scored a goal and 10 points overall and with Niamh Dollard also finding the Dublin net, Laois cemented their final berth with eight points to spare.

Down had to work much harder than many expected in their semi-final against Roscommon. They had 18 points to spare earlier in the campaign but trailed by two after 20 minutes in the penultimate round. A late purple patch saw them go in at the break leading by a goal and they ground it out in the second half to win by seven in the end.

Fionnuala Carr, Catherine McGourty and Niamh Mallon are just some of the key players in the Mourne outfit, who were only denied the Division 2 league title by a late Cork charge at the beginning of May.

Even in that campaign, very little separated Down and Laois, with the Ulster girls carving out a 2-7 to 2-4 win on that occasion. While the scoring is likely to be more prolific this time around, it would be a huge surprise if it deviated from previous clashes in terms of the final margin of victory and defeat.



AN hour after the final whistle in Croke Park the Limerick players were still celebrating on the Cusack Stand sidelines and in no rush to leave the scene of their triumph.

KILKENNY

The outpouring of emotion as captain Fiona Hickey lifted the Jack McGrath Cup on the steps of the Hogan Stand told the story.

Just twelve months previous the scenes were very different as Limerick suffered final heartbreak against Gal-

But this time round there was no denying Limerick.

The win for the Joe Quaid managed side ensures that Limerick win promotion to the senior championship next season.

Limerick have never won the senior camogie championship and this was their third success in the second tier competition with previous wins in 1996 and 2007.

Both those previous wins came outside of Croke Park, but Limerick have tasted championship success in Croke Park on two previous occasions - the junior camogie championship wins of 1977 and 1995.

Indeed just like last Sunday, the win over 1995 came twelve months after Limerick have lost the decider the previous year.

Last Sunday's thrilling final win, brought an end to a remarkable year for Limerick camogie.

2014 has seen Limerick return to the top division in the league, while silverware was won in a first ever minor A championship and the juniors won both league and championship honours.

Indeed 11 of the Limerick panel of 30 were part of that successful minor panel, which beat Cork in their final.

Limerick, who beat Kildare, Antrim, Galway, Tipperary and Waterford enroute to Croke Park, went into this final as favourites and led 1-5 to 0-6 at half time after playing into the wind.

It was Kilkenny captain Mags Fennelly that had the

opening score of the game but two Niamh Mulcahy frees had Limerick settled and ahead by the fifth minute.

Aoife Sheehan had a brief glimpse of goal but the chance was smothered by the

Kilkenny defence.

Mulcahy had a third free to increase the Limerick lead before Mary O'Callaghan had the first Shannonside point from play in the 14th minute for a 0-4 to 0-2 advantage.

With usual attackers Niamh Mulcahy and Caoimhe Costello playing and domi-nating midfield and the half back trio of Katie Campbell, Sarah Carey and Claire Mulcahy on top Limerick were beginning to dominate.

Mulcahy's fourth free maintained the lead before the crucial score of the half came in the 19th minute.

Costello and Mairead Fitzgerald created the opening up the left wing and when the ball was crossed into the goalmouth Deborah Murphy kept her composure to crash the ball to the Hill 16 net for a 1-5 to 0-3 lead.

Murphy had an outstanding first half when given a free role across the half forward line to deny Kilkenny momentum when backed by the wind.

But that was it for Limerick in the half and they were to go the next 11-minutes without a score. Bit by bit Kilkenny's found their feet and had the last three scores of the first half, all frees, after going through their own barspell. That left it 1-5 to 0-6 to Limerick at half time.

It was a half that saw Limerick hit four wides and Kilkenny just one.

On the resumption Kilkenny looked to reduce the deficit and had three points from play in the opening 10-minutes.

The Limerick reply came

from minor star Caoimhe Costello. Twice she was at the end of moves to split the posts into the Davin End Stand.

Those early scores left it 1-7 to 0-9 with 20-minutes to play.

It was now Limerick showed all the experience of last year. The substitutions introduced made impacts while the switch of Niamh Mulcahy to the half forward line made her an instantly a more dangerous attacking threat.

The next three scores came the way of Limerick and the attack was now brimming with confidence as Mulcahy, and Rebecca Delce increased the lead to four points entering the final quarter.

The first of Mulcahy's three second half points from play was a wonderful team effort with Murphy playing a superb cross-field ball before Sinead McNamara popped a short pass to Mulcahy.

The run of scores from Limerick came despite hitting 10-wides over the course of the game. But it was a final quarter that Limerick dominated and Kilkenny were to score just once in the final 20-minutes. An Orla Hanrick free in the 47th minute of the game merely interrupted the Limerick flow.

Player of the Match Niamh Mulcahy had her third point of the half to stretch the lead in the 50th minute and then

another of the minor stars Delee registered her second to seal the win.



Captain gets lost in emotion of victory

FIONA Hickey became just the third ever Limerick camogie captain to lift All-Limerick honours in Croke Park.

And, the Granagh-Ballingarry defender can't remember the historic moment!

Hickey follows in the footsteps of Carrie Clancy (1977) and Helen Clifford (1995), who captained Limerick to junior championship wins in GAA Headquarters.

But Hickey admits that accepting that Jack Mc-Grath Cup from Aileen Lawlor, President of the Camogie Association, is a blur!

"I don't really remember it to be honest, it's all a blur - I had Aileen Lawlor in my ear telling me what to do and I needed that," recalled the Limerick captain outside the victorious dressing room beneath the Cusack Stand.

"Thank god we came out the right side. It's disbelief because I never thought I would be here," he said with a broad smile.

"That was unbelievable. With about two or three minutes to go and we were five points up I was very emotional and I remember being very emotional last year with two or three minutes to go but it was just a totally different emotion - it was pure confidence and relief this year whereas last year it was 'this isn't happening'. Two polar opposites."

She continued: "I think there was a patch when we scored three points in a row and I was nearly getting emotional thinking about it but Kilkenny came back to score three points and I was brought back down to earth fairly lively! It was such a good feeling knowing that we were five points up and not much could have gone wrong at that stage - goals can happen but they didn't and we kept driving on."

What about lifting the

winning trophy?

"Ididn't think about it beforehand and I didn't even
think about it at the time.
We had it in our hands last
Thursday at the captains day
and I was looking at it and I
just knew it would be mine.
We have such potential and
Limerick camogie is back
where it should be back up
senior and I just know that

the girls will drive it on next year and that they will compete at senior level," said a determined Hickey.

He added: "This is after capping off a perfect year for Limerick camogie."

Hickey felt that the 2013 final loss proved a valuable learning experience.

"We learned from last year's mistakes - the preparation was so different, everything rolled off to a tee. Coming up the night before was brilliant and thanks so much to Tommy Moran for that - we all nearly had sleep in our eyes getting off the bus last year."

At half time Limerick were two point sup, but Hickey said that it was a content interval dressing room.

"We knew this year not to panic - we just said who wants it more and we knew we wanted it more and we showed that in the second half. We just said we won the first half, lets go out and win the second half. There was no panicking, I thought we were a bit panicky last year," she recalled.

"After winning the toss, things were going well and we were delighted to be play to play into the wind in the first half. That made a huge difference because we didn't get that last year," outlined the Limerick captain.

Mulcahy: 'To win an All-Ireland in Croke Park is why you play camogie'

LIMERICK camogie star Niamh Mulcahy has revealed that a half-time pact inspired their All-Ireland victory.

The Player of the Match Mulcahy said the disappointment of losing the final last season was a key motivation.

"Last year the big thing was that everyone came off the field with regrets and we came in today (at half-time) knowing that we had more in us and we made a promise at half time that no one was leaving with regrets," outlined Mulcahy, one of three Ahane sisters in the team in Croke Park.

"I don't think when you play sport there is no worst feeling than losing and losing in Croke Park was absolutely gutting. Subconsciously there was an element that the fear of failing was driving us on - we weren't coming off the field without winning," she said.

"To get the win is absolutely brilliant - the minute the final whistle went there was a
moment of sheer relief. After
losing last year, it took a few
seconds to realise what we had
achieved. We had set out at the
start of the year to win this and
then to hear that final whistle
and to know that it has actually happens it turns to relation, happiness, joy."

She added: "To win an All Ireland in Croke Park is why you play camogie - it is your dream from when you are young. To finally achieve this is unbelievable for everyone in Limerick camogie - not just this panel of players".

Mulcahy scored seven points in the 1-12 to 0-10 final win over Kilkenny, but felt the first half goal was crucial.

"The goal was badly needed because they had been picking off points from play and we hadn't really got into a roll-the goal came at a crucial stage because if we hadn't got that and they tagged on a point or two we could have gone in at half time having to chase the game and maybe an element of panic could have set in. Being two points up was a bonus because we knew ourselves that we hadn't played well," she said.

While Mulcahy is a survivor from the 2007 All-Ireland win, there are rising stars aplenty in this Limerick side.

Adare's Caoimhe Costello was one of three minors in the starting team in Croke Park. But her thoughts were with the panels' older members.

Thank god they finally got the All-Ireland medal that they richly deserve-they have soldiered without any reward for the last 10-15 years and this is for those girls. Us minors are coming in when Limerick camogie is going brilliant and we were on a high from last year even though we lost - we have never experienced having to come back year after year to do the hard work and get no reward. Those girls deserve huge credit and they are the leaders all over the field," outlined Costello,

"It's been a magic year for Limerick - it's not every year we win a minor, a junior and this. This is what dreams are made of and why we play. The feeling inside in that dressing room is something to savour and something I will never forget as long as I play camogie and I amonly 18 years and there are plenty years left in me but I don't think anything will top this," said the Adare teenager.

"Ithink the hurt of last year helped lots. Last year it was Croke Park, oh my god.... but this year it was a case of Croke Park is another field and we are going up to play a match and we have to get a result and nothing else mattered. It was tough out there because the field is a lot bigger than Adare or Mick Neville Park but Croke Park is where we wanted to be. I think no matter where the game was on we were going to come with a performance."



The story of any team is the struggle to keep it together, it's where you go on the bad days, what happens in the times when it all seems as if it is going to fall apart. Half an hour in a room with the Cork camogie team I wanted to see how the story came

They say about the bad media coverage of women's sports that you can't force people to be interested. True. Grand girls playing great games all the time isn't interesting. But if you tell the stories people will get inter-ested anyway. How could anybody not sit in a room with these people and not wonder just what sort of story ties all these characters together. You have Anna Geary, a Rose of Tralee contestant, and Ashling Thompson, whose tattoos tell the story of what's in her head on bad days and Briege Corkery a stonemason by trade and possessor of more All-Ireland medals than a lot of counties have and Jenny O'Leary, who travels from Monaghan for training, and Orla Cotter, who stands over frees like a foal with a bad leg but still converts them beautifully There's a story in every single one of them in the room. You couldn't think about them as a group and not want to see how it will end for them.

I enjoyed the day. At one point in the stand I complained loudly about the refereeing. A woman in front of me turned around and calmly said that she was part of the CCC which had appointed him. A man with an English accent sitting behind me exploded with emotion at one stage. A woman in front of me who must have been at least 80 turned and gave him a death stare which shut him up straight away.

I found myself remembering my childhood and wondering why I was surprised to be enjoying myself. On my mother's side my aunties, Marie and Kathleen, both played for Cork and won All-Ireland medals. Marie was a full-back and was picked on the Camogie Team of the Century. She won a four in-a-row in the early seventies with the county. Kathleen was a goalie and won three All-Irelands.

I used to hear camogie stories from my grandmother as I was growing up. I couldn't get those days out of my head last Sunday, especially my grandmother Joanne Costine, a woman who wouldn't have been slow to express herself at matches. That trait has been lost in the family since.

As kids if we were in nanny Costine's house we'd hear camogie stories and the walls were covered in pictures of camogic players and statuettes of camogie players. In my grandmother Cusack's (Frances Ring) house it was pictures of hurlers, especially the Ringer himself. I always remember one pencil drawn picture of Ring marching with the Cork team before the '54 final I think it was. I loved that picture.

My father's family and my mother's family both lived on a terrace of small houses Eleven children in my father's family, 14 in my mother's family next door, 15 in the O' Shea's house a few yards further. No shortage for endless games of hurling. It is remembered in each family that often Marte was a dominant figure in any of thos

It was a disappointing day for Kilkenny camogie with the senior and intermediate teams losing their respective All-Ireland finals.

A late rally by Kilkenny in the senior game made for an exciting finish but that was all in vain when Cork went on to score a second goal. Kilkenny played well in the opening half when aided by the breeze. Cork opted to play with seven defenders and at times it could have been eight.

An early Katie Power point gave Kilkenny the best possible start and for much of the half the play focused on the Cork goal. Kilkenny's problem was that too many long deliveries ended up being cleared. The Noresiders were dominating and their scoring rate should have been greater.

An alert Michelle Quilty gave Kilkenny a great boost midway through the half when she goaled following a save by Cork goalie Aoife Murray. The Mullinavat player also had another effort on goal which was saved.

Although Kilkenny followed Quilty's goal with a couple of points from Denise Gaule, Cork was making good use of limited possession at the other end. A five point margin was not a big lead heading into the second half. Immediately on the restart Cork reverted to a standard formation.

More importantly, they played to a much higher tempo. They slowly eroded the Kilkenny lead and when Jenny O'Leary scored their first goal the pressure was on.

The Noresiders struggled to respond with their defence under constant pressure. In contrast, every Cork defender started to dominate her immediate opponent. The result was that Kilkenny got few opportunities for scores.

Withtwominutes ing three points separated the teams. Cork was on top. Kilkenny battled bravely for a goal that would draw the game. They almost got one but were penalised and a free out resulted.

Kilkenny could legitimately argue that it should have been a free in as Aoife Neary was fouled as she attempted to

palm the ball to the net. Losing the senior final two years ina-row is a big disappointment but the talent is definitely there to win the O'Duffy Cup.

Kilkenny needs to learn from both defeats. The side is generally small in stature so there is little point playing high balls into the attack. It worked only occasionally on Sunday.

It was noticeable in the second half that Cork adopted a running game to great effect. Their ability to quickly switch play from one side of the field to the other made it testing for the opposition. Miriam Walsh made a big impression when introduced and I was surprised she was not brought on earlier.

Kilkenny also looked far more threatening when Katie Power and Denise Gaule switched positions in the second half. In hindsight that move might have been made

Experience is a huge asset in an All-Ireland final. When questions were asked of Cork in the second half it was principally the players with many Celtic Crosses who came up trumps. Next year may seem a long way away for the Kilkenny players but the 2015 League and championship will arrive quickly. The future should be viewed positively by all the players.

Kilkenny also came out second best in the second game against Limerick in the litermediate All-Ireland. This was Limerick's first team and they were looking to avenge a narrow two-point loss to Galway last year.

There was little between the sides in the opening half with Limerick holding a narrow 1-5 to 0-6 interval lead. The closeness of the play continued but all changed when the Shannonsiders took controi.

The star was centre-forward Niamh Mulcahy. The Ahane player scored some wonderful points from play and frees. Mulcahy, whose grand-uncle was the legendary Mick Mackey, was the Player of the Match award, an honour she also secured the last time Limerick won this final in 2007.

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headed in for the half-time break at Croke Park last Sunday, Cork appeared in trouble.

They trailed 1-6 to 0-4 to a vibrant Kilkenny side that hadn't lost all season, and it would have been more but for a wonderful reflex save in the early stages by Aoife Murray. It wasn't insurmountable, especially with the wind to come, but with the Cats squeezing the middle third and Cork disjointed up front, they were going to have to hurl up a storm to prevail. Yet the players were reasonably confident as they sat in the bowels of GAA headquarters.

The hard yards had been put in since the depths of winter. Four hurling sessions a week with coach Mattie Twomey, including significant tactical work. The stats and video feedback from Niall Collins, the access to sports psychology, Teddy Donovan's input as goalkeeping coach, and Brian Barry's handle on the logistics, meant this was the best organised camogie management structure Cork ever had.

The pressure of delivering on Jones Road might have been an issue, and certainly Cork had failed to adhere to their gameplan. Once they adjusted they were unstoppable in that second half. Jenny O'Leary's goal ignited the revival, and even if Kilkenny might have been had a late penalty, Angela Walsh raised a second green flag at the finish to frank Cork's second half-dominance and

a 12-point turnaround. On the journey home last Monday, team Geary took a call from Kilkenny icon DJ Carey. Obviously he'd been in Croker to cheer on his own county, but he felt Cork's closing 30 minutes was one of the most impressive he'd ever seen. High praise indeed. Just two years ago the Rebels lost a classic to Wexford, before a harrowing semi-final defeat by

Kilkenny last season. Eleven of the 2012 All-Ireland side started on Sunday, but the shape of the team was different. Geary had moved from centre-forward to number three, Rena Buckley full-back out to midfield, and Briege Corkery the wing instead of full-forward. Prolific goalscorer Sile Burns retired but Katrina Mackey blossomed, with a return of 4-18 from play in seven games. 

Camogie chiefs will use hurling to grow fan base

amogie chiefs will look at playing more and more games alongside hurling championship fixtures in the coming years to build the profile of the sport.

Officials are 'reasonably happy' with the 12,476 attendance for Sunday's All-Ireland triple-header at Croke Park, though it fell well short of the predicted 15,000.

Despite those figures there appears little appetite to take the games out of GAA headquarters to a smaller venue or returning to the policy of playing alongside the U21 finals.

Instead, camogie bosses believe increasing the profile will attract new fans and grow attendances

Camogie ard stiúrthóir Joan O'Flynn said: "Playing the three finals in Croke Park elevates the status of the senior, intermediate and junior championships. Take Limerick as an example. They won the intermediate final on Sunday and their manager Joe Quaid said it was the first time in over 40 years he had seen a Limerick player collect an All-Ireland trophy in the Hogan Stand. That was facilitated only by the triple-header arrangement. Giving the opportunity to as many players as possible to realise their All-Ireland dream in Croke Park is of standout importance.

That said, bringing camogie to the widest audience possible is also very important to the association. When there are opportunities for doubleheaders [with hurling] during the year we take them. The National League senior camogie and hurling decider in Thurles this year was such an example; along with the Alf-Ireland senior camogie semi-final with the U21 hurling semi-finals in August also

That is something we want to build on. Increasing the number of carnogie double-headers with provincial hurling championship games or All-Ireland

hurling qualifiers are also other options we will look at, but we are at a very early stage right now.

In terms of the crowd at Croke Park, she said: "We were reasonably happy with the attendance. 15,000 was our benchmark and we would have liked to have gone to that and beyond. But the hurling and camogie communities are one and the same, so perhaps the fact that Kilkenny and Limerick were both a week earlier in the senior and minor hurling deciders impacted on us. And of course you have various other factors at play."

Cork's All-Ireland senior final victory over Kilkenny attracted an average audience of 221,500 viewers to RTE on Sunday which equated to a share of 27% of the available audience.



Cork's perfect mix of bravery and warriors is the real story



SIX points the worse for wear it looked incredibly bleak for the Rebels as they emerged from the tunnel for the second half of Sunday's All-Ireland senior camogic final.

They were being beaten by a better, sharper side, doing everything in its power to bury the demons of losing the previous year's All-Ireland final to Gal-

Kilkenny were unbeaten in 2014, had the league title in their trophy cabinet and were favourites to secure a first All-Ireland title since 1994.

Cork had won more than its share of All-Ireland titles in that interim but none since 2009 and for players like Jenny O'Leary, Aoife Murray, Joanne O'Callaghan and Gemma O'Connor that hunger to secure one more proved the driving force for an immense second-half turn around.

Cork had managed just four points in the opening 30 minutes, Orla Cotter and Julia White raising white flags before player of the match Eimear O'Sullivan split the posts with a stunning long-range effort to provide the only bright point for Cork outside of two brilliant Aoife Murray saves.

There were some home truths that needed to be told at half-time as Cork players were asked if they wanted to remember their day in Croke Park as the day they watched Kilkenny win an All-Ireland title.

They were also asked if at the final whistle they were still losing by six points would they be satisfied with their lot. The answer, of course, was an unequivocal no and the Cork team that emerged from the tunnel was a team prepared to die on its sword.

Despite this new resolve it was still Kilkenny who hit the first score of the second half but then the wheel began to turn for Cork.

Three unanswered points from Katriona Mackey, Orla Cotter and Jenny O'Leary had helped Cork to claw back the deficit to just three points with eight minutes played of the second half.

The brave running of Breige Corkery also bore fruit and it was a two-point game when Jenny O'Leary raced through the Kilkenny defence to smash home Cork's first goal of the game.

There were questions marks about the number of steps taken by O'Leary but camogie is intended to be a noncontact sport and the punishment taken by O'Leary as she went past three of the Kilkenny defence cannot be dismissed.

O'Leary's goal settled the Rebels but the game was by no means decided.

Kilkenny, immensely dangerous in their attack, were just a point behind but a plethora of wides from the Cats would prove costly.

Breige Corkery provided breathing room with a point, Orla Cotter stretched the lead to three and then it was a case of backs to the wall as Cork defended their precious lead.

Kilkenny will feel aggrieved for not having been given a stonewall penalty with time nearly up.

The Cork defence used all manner of knacks to ensure the ball stayed out of the net and not all of them legal but sometimes you have to ride your luck and deal with the consequences later.

For Cork on this occasion there were no consequences but there was evidence, a brilliant photograph of goalkeeper Aoife Murray with arms wrapped around Aoife Neary proving Kilkenny's call was warranted.

The legitimacy of the call mattered little to Cork as Angela Walsh closed the game out with a well-worked goal deep in injury time to ensure the tables had been firmly turned, Cork the victors by six points at the final whistle.

In the aftermath of the game enough wasn't made of the hard work by Cork in the second half.

Present camogie players commentating on the game skipped over Cork's second half haul of 2-8 to focus instead on Kilkenny's shortcomings.

This did both teams an injustice. Kilkenny didn't play badly in this year's All-Ireland final, it was that Cork were just better, better mentally and better physically.

Cork were the perfect mix of bravery and composure in a second half that needed warriors and to dismiss that powerful cocktail is to miss the story.

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

Aislinn Connolly, Galway camogie player, felt that the broadcasters could do more, referring to the two minutes camogie gets on The Sunday Game at the very end of the show. Jacqui agreed saying that we would all love more, her producer would like more.

Rob also spoke about the draw for

businesses looking in as Jacqui presented him with the question - what's attractive for them in sponsoring women's events? He made some valid points, once being that it is much cheaper.

It is possible to get coverage at a national and international level, such as the women's rugby team, for an awful lot less money than it is for a men's sport. That window is going to close a little bit he feels.


