

Star O'Brien leads **Charleville girls into All-Ireland decider**

St. Mary's, Charleville St. Raphael's College, Loughrea

MUNSTER champions St. Mary's, Charleville, due in large measure to Eileen O'Brien, won through to the All-Ireland Colleges senior camogie final after overcoming St. Raphael's College at Kilconiron,

Co. Galway, yesterday. There was high drama before the scheduled 3.00pm throw-in, when after an inspection it was decided that the original pitch was in an unplayable condition and posts were moved across to another field

at the venue. The victors, the defending All-Ireland Champions, aided by the breeze, established a 0-3 to 0-0 lead by the tenth minute, thanks to points from Eileen O'Brien (2)

and Angela Sheehy. St. Mary's kept up the pressure and had three more points between the 11th and 17th minutes through Sheehy, Caoimbe Har-rington and O'Brien.

The Charleville side had their seventh point without reply after minutes, scored by Sinead O'Callaghan.

St. Raphael's had their first point three minutes later through Claire Ann Spellman.

The last point of the half went to O'Callaghan, leaving the Char-leville girls with a healthy 0-8 to 0-1 half-time advantage.

Both sides swapped points fol-lowing the interval, through O'Brien and St. Raphael's best performer, Colette Nevin, in the open-

ing minutes of the second-half. St. Raphael's were then thrown a lifeline coming up to the midway point of the second half when Nevin had the Loughrea side's first goal of the match to make the scores 0-10 to 1-2.

However, St. Mary's struck back 11 minutes from the end with a goal by Jordana Dolan.

But St. Raphael's had not given up yet. Nevin had a point two minutes later, which was followed

quickly afterwards by a second goal for St. Raphael's, this time through Laura Burns, which left just a four-point difference between the rival colleges.

Then, however, Loughrea's hopes of a thrilling comeback were finally dashed by the Charleville


O'Brien had two final points for St. Mary's to close out the game, although Nevin popped up again to have the final say for the Galway students with a point to secure their passage into the final.

Leading GAA player Sandra 'Sandie' Fitzgibbon, like DJ Carey, has decided on inter-county retirement. Diarmuid O'Flynn examines why the contrast between the two could not be more stark

UST A FEW weeks ago, the GAA world was shattered with the announcement of the retirement of DJ Carey. There was uproar, and understandably so - it was a massive national news story. The retirement, still in his prime, of one of hurling's leading lights. In the last few weeks also, another leading GAA player decided on in-ter-county retirement. And the contrast between the two could hardly be more

Sandra "Sandie" Fitzgibbon has won four senior All-Ireland club, six Munster club, and 10 senior county club medals with Glen Rovers; at inter-county level with Cork, she has six All-Ireland medals at senior, three at minor, one at schools, with in her own words, "seven National Leagues, playing eight" camogie.

Additionally, she represented Ireland at Basketball for six years; won "three or four" National Cups with three runners—up medals, and four National Leagues. Finally, for good measure, she also has a national soccer medal — played with Cork Rangers, won a Grattan Cup medal with them — "like a National League thing." A magnificent record, comparable almost with that other great Glen dual star, Christy Ring, and certainly comparable with that of DJ. And yet a record practically ignored. Ringey is an instantly-recognised household GAA name - Sandie? It

really is unjust. More than unjust.

Like a lot of great sporting careers,
Sandy Fitzgibbon began playing camogie
almost by accident: "I started hurling at
nine — my sister, Cecilia, was supposed to be minding me, but she was playing with the Glen, and used to bring me with her to training, and I'd puck around at the side." a star is born. She took to it straight away — "I did actually — I was an awful tomboy, used to play everything — base-ball, rounders on the streets — it kind of all combined then. I started playing with the U-14's when I was about 11, and I'm playing ever since!" Her progress was rapid at 14, she played her first Senior I game with the Glen. However, though the Glen have been a dominant force in club camogie for a long time now, that was not the case in 1978, and Sandie waited a long time for Senior success - until 1982 in

In that year, aged 18, and having already won three-in-a-row minor All-Irelands, she broke through onto the senior side, and duly went on to capture her first senior Al-l-Ireland medal. Another followed in 1983, and Sandie must have felt this was going to be an annual event. It wasn't — after 83 the inter-county well ran dry, and stayed dry for a decade. It wasn't all bleak, however - in the meantime, the Glen started winning senior counties again, and Sandie had also turned her hand to basketball, winning championships galore with Blar-

ney, and later, Tralee. In 1986, her talent was recognised by the national selectors, and she went on to win 51 caps for Ireland, over a period of six years. Her basketball position was point--guard - the play-maker, the one who calls the shots. And that's Sandie alright in camogie, it was centre-back, the pivotal

HERE IS MUCH talk of the demands on amateur athletes these days - Sandie gave me a glimpse of how hectic her sporting life could be then: "Twice, I had to drive up to Mayo to play Ballina on a Saturday, then up to Donegal to play the following night, then across the North to play the camogie All-Ireland semi-final, then down to Dublin to fly off to the States on the Monday morning for a week to play for Ireland in basketball; back then on the following Wednesday, play the All-Ireland camogie club final on the Sunday." Twice! And won both All-Irelands!

The playing side was just one aspect;

you didn't get to reach the levels of compe-tition at either camogie or basketball on which Sandie was operating, without training. A lot of training: "For camogie, we trained with our clubs Monday and Wednesday, then with Cork Tuesday and Thursday, and we nearly always had a weekend game then with either club or county." That was just camogie — sometimes december on how well the club was times, depending on how well the club was doing, the camogie season went well into the basketball season. Bearing in mind that at this stage, the camogie would be in the semi-final and final stages, fairly frantic. Not that Sandie is complaining — she enjoyed it all: "I did. I just enjoyed playing the game — it's very skilful, very fast. I just love playing the game. I'm very competitive — I like to win, I like to play well. If we lose but play well, I think it takes some of the edge of the losing. I eajoy learning — even still today, playing. I'm learning. You can never master it all. I also enjoy training, especially with the hall. I'm not too keen on just running, but when you use the ball, I feel you do a lot more anyway, you wouldn't complain as much! But running and sprinting without a hurley the semi-final and final stages, fairly franrunning and sprinting without a hurley—
I don't like that very much, and I don't
think any hurler does!" None that I know of anyway.

So, now Sandie Fitzgibbon is calling 8 a day. Retired from international basketball



since 1992, she is now quitting the representative scene entirely. Though she'll continue to play club camogie and basketball—"Kind of weaning myself off it!" This retirement is going to mark a big change in her life. Why now? Still in top shape at 33 (34 this month), why retire? "Physically yes, I could play away, but it's just the commitment to training. Mentally, I just don't have the drive anymore." Are you just saying that?—"I'm not no—at training last year, sometimes I just felt like walking off and going home. Just got to me—I didn't want to be there." Was it the pain? Boredom? Bought the T-shirt? "I don't know, I don't know—it was my mind just telling me I'd had enough, like." The right time to retire. "I'm looking forward to the break"

she says.

The pity of course is that most sports people in this country — even GAA people — will barely be aware of that break. The only reason I'm aware of it is that I was coerced into going to a camogie game in New York many years ago, and was confounded by the standard. And confounded is the word — I went with a preconceived notion, a notion that annoys the hell out of Sandie: "Sure they're only women — that attitude, "Sure they're only women — that attitude, "Sure they're only women — that attitude it's usually from men who never saw a game, bothers me. It really bothers me. Those kind of stupid comments — they annoy me..." Patronising — and I hate it my-

self. But I honestly, stupidly, never imagined women could play hurling to the same skill levels as men. Any man. They can, and of course they can. Camogie is a game much more about the skills than its male equivalent, which has more emphasis on the physical side. Having made her point though, Sandie added — "Mind you, we have a great men following in the Glen, and the Glen Hurling Club has given us great support."

ANDIE IS NOT that happy about the support from her own gender either — "They'll go along with their boyfriends or brothers or whatever, and watch a woman's game." It's the sex appeal, of course, but you can't mention that in the GAA. In fact, it's a dangerous topic generally, in this modern but backward PC world. I suggested that if men had any idea how skilful camogie was, then they would surely support it. And the sex appeal would just as surely follow. Quid quo pro.

Sandie has a very definite idea on how this could be done: "I'd like to see the Camogie Council get a PRO, to promote the

game. A full-time PRO — and not someone from within camogie. Someone from the outside, who comes in and learns about the game, with a fresh approach. That's what we need — someone to promote the game, full-time." Athletes, no matter what the sport, love recognition. It's a major part of sport, love recognition. It's a major part of competitive sport — do great deeds, get the appreciation. That appreciation of greatness is even more precious when it comes from your peers — for camogie players, hurling is a peer sport. Ask any camogie player to name the top hurlers — I guarantee you, they can reel them off. Reverse the question — the hurlers won't have a clue. I select Sandie who was the greatest asked Sandie who was the greatest camogie player she saw — without an instant's hesitation, she answered:- "Angela Downey. If she hadn't retired, she would still have Kilkenny winning Ali-Ireiands. Was she that good? "Did you ever see her playing? She was a great player - she could turn a game in a matter of minutes. We played her club, St Paul's, in an All-Ireland final once. We were up by 11 points with about 10 minutes to go — they won by 5 points, because of her. She was the apex." Even I've heard of Angela Downey — but, apart from a few minutes on TV, I never saw her play. Wouldn't recognise her if she gave me a kick in the shins. Which she should,

The Recognition and rewards that the

modern hurler is getting is only right, and Sandie has no problem with it.

UT SHE DOES wish some of the same for camogie, and for women's sport in general: "The hurlers, the U-21's and so on - they get to go on paid holidays, with spending money, expenses, and all that, where the girls don't. And that annoys me, more so now than when I was younger. And the longer I'm at it, the worse I'm getting." Because it's unjust. But the material rewards are only secondary: "I wasn't in it for that — I was in it for the enjoyment, and that's why I stuck it so long. But it would be nice to get more recognition, from the public, from television, from the papers. The skill levels are going up, fitness levels are going up, numbers going up. It would be nice now, to see more of the game on television."

The three most successful international athletes we have at the moment are Michelle Smith, Sonia O'Sullivan and Caitriona McKiernan. Time for our camogie and female football stars to join them. Way sone the time.

But, for Sandie Fitzgibbon, it's too late.

Much too late. What a shame.

Ashbourne Cup

A Much Sought After Trophy

The Ashbourne Cup, now 83 years old and showing signs of wear and tear after years of ecstatic celebrations, was presented by Edwin Gibson, Lord Ashbourne, Attorney General "for the purpose of encouraging the Irish game and Intervarsity social life among the Ladies of the N.U.I. Colleges. It received the sincere disapproval of the authorities!"

The Ashbourne Cup is the most sought after trophy on the Camogie circuit almost equal to the All-Ireland Corn Ua Dubhthaigh!

College students spend countless hours, days and even nights in lights training, playing, fund raising, meetings, sponsorship seeking and often praying in preparation for this prestigious championship. The social sacrifice incurred is sensational and stupendous!

The Cup itself is a magnificent four handled silver trophy but what makes it of special historical and sentimental value is that the name of each player who ever won an Ashbourne Cup medal is inscribed

there on! An incredible piece of camogie history of immense value!

The names of many famous players appear on the now eleven tier teak base—there were only six tiers in my years. Each tier contains eight years of names of winners.

The medals too are unusual—made of silver in the shape of a camogie stick on which the provincial crests are mounted. The design has changed from time to time down through the years but as distinct from other medals it's a brooch! These are proudly worn on special camogie occasions.

Only the brave would call an Ashbourne or Purcell Cup winning team. Each College has a wealth of Inter-County players. Host College, W.I.T., has Sinead Nealon, an All-Ireland junior medal winner with Tipperary. Her Dad, Donie, has a Fitzgibbon Cup medal with U.C.D. for 1958 and is now, of course, Munster Council Secretary.

Bridget Mullally, of Glenmore Club, is a strong senior inter-county player with her native Kilkenny. Esme Murphy is an international Hockey player, who also plays with Wexford county very successfully-a formidable line-out.

University of Limerick has one Ashbourne success to its credit and with experienced Dublin inter-county stars such as Paula Carroll and Fiona Corcoran and some strong Cork players on board, the famous Cup might return to the Shannonside once more.

Queen's University, Belfast, have taken part in the Ashbourne series since 1934 and year after year display great grit and splendid spirit. I was proud to be present in Galway in 1991 when they proudly won the Ashbourne for the first time under the dedicated coach and manager Bernie McNally.

Antrim, always a strong camogie county, won the All-Ireland Junior championship last year and Queen's have several of that team included in the current panel.

Elaine Dowds, of the famous "Cuchulainn" in Dunloy, Bronagh O'Neill, Deirdre club in Belfast, and Brid McCorry, winners of Purcell '97 hope for Ashbourne honours this year.

Incidentally, Brid, although quite deaf

after meningitis, also plays intervarsity handball for Queen's and hopes to represent Irish Colleges at the USA Collegiates in San Francisco.

University of Ulster, Jordanstown, are the current proud holders of the trophy. Last year's win was their third success.

They have a fair share of Antrim champions—Catriona Higgins will be going for her fourth Ashbourne with U.U.J. Edel Mason, of Down, Geraldine Connolly and Maureen Barry, of Antrim, and Armagh's Geraldine Haughy will also be difficult to hold in their quests for another medal each.

MAGNIFICENT TROPHY

In the 'Seventies, the late, great Agnes Purcell, winner of three Ashbournes in the 'Thirties with U.C.D. and a former Uachtaran of Cumann Camogaiochta na nGael, presented a magnificent Cup for Third Level, now University Colleges. This championship was run on the same format as the Ashbourne and attracted entries from Colleges throughout the thirty two counties.

At present twenty-five Colleges vie for the highest accolade—the Ashbourne

now the First Division and Purcell as the Second Division, regardless of University status.

Mary Immaculate College, Limerick, host the Purcell Cup won in 1997 by Queen's. Mary I won C.C.I.A. League Division II in 1997 and will aim for the Purcell Cup this year.

Hosting the Ashbourne for the first time ever, Waterford Institute of Technology, having won the Shield, have launched this Ashbourne under the stewardship and guidance and direction of super-organiser Sheila O'Donohoe, Commerce Graduate of U.C.D. and now lecturing in W.I.T.

Sheila is the proud possessor of three Ashbournes from the successful U.C.D. teams of the 'Eighties. She spends countless hours training and preparing W.I.T. camogie team—already very successful in the past—in the hope of emulating the W.I.T. hurlers in the Fitzgibbon Cup in 1992 and 1995.

Sheila is a former President of the C.C.I.A., the Governing body of Third Level Colleges, and it is refreshing to see former players involved in administration at such a high level.

Current Uachtaran, Fiona O'Driscoll, multi-talented All-Ireland senior camogie player with Cork, Ashbourne with U.L., All-Ireland junior football medal with Cork, O'Connor Cup Inter-Varsity football medal with U.L., Player of the Year award—no end to her playing talent and now a successful administrator!

Vice-President Catriona Higgins, of Antrim, has three Ashbourne medals and captained U.U.J. to victory in 1997. She crowned her year with an All-Ireland junior medal with Antrim.

Runai of this Governing Body— C.C.I.A. Comhairle Camogaiochta na hInstidiuidi—Camillus King, Lecturer in Athlone R.T.C., alas will not have the honour of winning an Ashbourne or Purcell medal, but trains the College team and keeps Ireland informed with C.C.I.A. NEWS.

U.C.D. have won the Ashbourne more often than any other College—35 occasions in all! However, there has been a dearth of medals in this College since 1988. It is hoped that this situation will be rectified this year.

Mary Coady, the U.C.D. captain, from St. Mullin's Club. Carlow, has every possible juvenile award—including Player of the Year for 1996. She is following in the footsteps of her father, Patsy, who played senior hurling for Carlow.

Mary is a champion Gaelic footballer

as well and was also selected on the Combined Universities team in 1997.

Treacy twins, Naomi and Ruth, who sadly lost their father at Christmas, are both Agricultural students at U.C.D. and are senior inter-county players with Kildare. They are also talented footballers and Naomi captains the U.C.D. Gaelic football club.

The twins are a formidable pair and will cause havoc wherever they are chosen to play.

Marie Brady, from the Lacken club, is a Cavan county player and an industrious U.C.D. club member. She is extremely versatile, strong and determined and could be instrumental in bringing the Ashbourne Cup back to Dublin.

U.C.D. have gained two valuable medal holders from U.C.C., Claire Murphy and Joanne Gaynor, who will be real assets to the Dubs.

Typical of College camogie or any College sport—you gain some and you loose some. Unfortunately for U.C.D. fortune is with U.C.C. as All-Ireland medal holder Eithne Duggan, former captain with U.C.D., has registered with U.C.C. for a post graduate course.

All-Ireland athlete Maeve Corcoran

Dedicated trainer for three years, Gerard Brady, of Mullahoran club in Cavan, nephew of Phil "Gunner" Brady, who won three All-Ireland senior football medals including one in New York in 1947, and brother of World Handball Champion, Paul, has done trojan work work with U.C.D. He is the proud holder of three county championship hurling medals and also plays football and handball

According to reliable sources U.C.D. have the distinction of achieving the almost impossible in 1918—they won the three most coveted Gaelic trophies, the Ashbourne, Sigerson and Fitzgibbon Cups in the same year! Handball was not established at the University at the time.

Forty years later U.C.D. again completed the treble. Such prominent personalities as Munster Council Runai, Donie Nealon, and Michael O'Kennedy T.D., of Tipperary, won Fitzgibbon Cup medals that year. Former Ulster Cathaoirleach Jim McDonnell (Cavan), Dr. Felix McKnight (Armagh), Paudie Sheehy and Jerome O'Shea (Kerry)—father of Rugby star, Conor, collected Sigerson Cup medals.

Mary McKnight (Down), sister of

from Tipperary, daughter of Sean, minor All-Ireland champion, and Eileen, county and provincial camogic player, has stamina and skills necessary to compete in typical Ashbourne conditions.

U.C.D. is blessed in having Aine, daughter of famous Kit Codd—nee Kehoe—winner of three All-Ireland senior camogie medals. Aine is also related to Tom, Dempsey—with that super pedigree look out for her! Felix and John, Susan Smith (Cavan), Eithne Neville (Limerick), Nuala Murney (Dublin) and yours truly won Ashbourne medals.

1988—forty years on—could U.C.D. be so lucky? Next issue will reveal all! Many dreams will be realised—many hopes dashed, many friendships forged and many ambitions shattered.

That's Ashbourne—Ashbourne forever—and there's no antidote!

IT HAS been a very actionpacked year for camogie in Co. Wexford, with a feast

of top-quality games taking place both at inter-county and club level.

The Wexford Senior team beat Limerick at home in Enniscorthy in the quarter-final of the All-Ireland championship, but unfortunately they went down to a very strong Cork side in the next round. Hopes were high before the game as Wexford had played a draw with Cork in the league.

The Co. Seniors lost the Leinster final to Kilkenny in a brilliant game of camogie on a scoreline of 1-9 to 1-7.

Our Co. Juniors had a very good league run, winning every match until the semi-final stages when we had to travel to Ballycran to play a very strong Down team. Our girls gave a very good display of camogie and acquitted themselves well in defeat.

The championship saw us pitted away to Carlow and we lost out in a game which I felt we should have won. However, with the wealth of talent we have at our disposal, I can see no reason why a Junior title shouldn't come to Wexford in 1998.

Leinster introduced an Under-18 championship this year, and Wexford were the proud winners, beating Kilkenny in the final. This team had won the Minor All-Ireland title in 1995.

Our Under-16 team lost their Leinster title to Dublin after a great run of four successes in a row. Likewise our Under-14 side were defeated after five years as champions, but I hope that the coming year will see us back on top in Leinster again.

Our club scene is looking very good, with four new clubs registered which brings the overall total to 24. Hopefully a few more will get involved in 1998.

Camogie rule changes passed

CAMOGIE CONGRESS, held over the weekend in Wexford

Town, passed motions which will have a big impact on the game in the year beginning 1999.

The motion put forward by Connacht Council was; for the year beginning 1999, all games under the auspices of Ard Combairle, Provincial Councils and hairle, Provincial Councils and County Boards be run as a test series on a 15-a-side basis.

This means the games will be played on full hurling pitches and the rules governing the pitch sides will be altered ac-cordingly. The motion received

Underdog tag suits Colaiste Bride as they go in search of All-Ireland glory

CHAMPIONS of Leinster and conquerors of Ulster, the Colaiste Bride senior camogie team has never been better prepared. Yet they still head for Tullamore on Saturday as underdogs for the All-Ireland crown when they take on Charleville of Cork.

The Munster girls are gunning for their third title in a row and the match at the weekend will be their sixth successive final. Their Enniscorthy rivals are under no illusions as to the magnitude of the task against such battle hardened opposition.

Coach Elva Moriarty headed a spying mission to the semi-final where they saw Charleville beat Loughrea of Galway with some superb

catching by a big, fast team. They were also given a glimpse of Cork's wonder kid Eileen O'Brien who is going to require close attention in

Tullamore. 'We are going into this as outsiders, stre Charleville will be very, very confident. Their players have all been through the pressures of a final numerous times. Still, if we hurl as we have all season, we could still do very well."

While there may be clear favourites, no-one should be writing off the chances of Colaiste Bride. Ms. Moriarty has been able to call her squad together three times a week during the season and the players have responded with enthusiasm.

She has a nucleus of readymade talent at her disposal, honed by senior clubs such as Rathnure, Monageer and Ou-*lart. It also helps that the school has its own pitch, right beside the classrooms, not to mention the superb facilities of the sports hall on

The reigning champs are not the only ones with big match experience either, of

Colaiste Bride captain Michelle O'Leary and defender Claire O'Connor both featured strongly on the Rathnure side which won the All-Ireland club title a couple of seasons ago.

The pair feature on the cur-Wexford junior side which is enjoying an unbeaten run in the National League at the moment. Others from Colaiste Bride in Noel Ryan's panel include the Holohan twins, Bernie and Elaine,

Helena Jacob lined out recently for the county senior team in a league game. Indeed, school captain Michelle O'Leary reckons that practically all of the first choice twelve have played county camogie together at some level

On the other hand, they have never before reached an All-Ireland final together as a team. Indeed, the school has never attained such dizzy heights since camogie was first introduced during the 1960s by Sister Mary Critchley, though they won their first junior title in 1971 and first senior in 1972.

The current crop bridged a gap of over two decades when they captured the provincial title after a battle royal with Loreto Kilkenny.

This was followed by a confidence boosting success in the semi over St. Patrick's of Maghera in Derry, with Jenny Codd hitting the net twice as they won by a margin of 14

Much of the credit must go to coach Elva Moriarty whose sporting background is not in Gaelic games at all, but rather in the demanding world of

Asked what her strong points are, her camogie squad immediately identified her ability to organise.

Being organised means more than having an impressive clip-board. It means more than making sure that Charleville have been watched. It also means arranging for top phsio Pat Whitney to be available at training sessions in St. Patrick's Park.

The team have also had a session with hurler Tom Dempsey who briefed the girls on psychology of preparation for big games. As a result of Tom's session with them, they have adopted the song 'One Moment in Time' as their anthem, to be played all the way to Tullamore on Saturday.

Current Wexford hurling manager Rory Kinsella has come across the Charleville college many times over recent seasons in his job as a teacher at the F.C.J. in Buncl-

His impression is that St. Mary's has a great tradition in the sport, with top quality clubs feeding into the school from outside the town.

In fact, they sound just like Colaiste Bride who will be looking to match them every step of the way on Saturday.

There is certainly no lack of tradition in the Enniscorthy line up either.

"On Sunday we have to get even more scores. We have the skill to do so. Now it's just a matter of performing to our potential. That shouldn't be a problem seeing as we have the will-to-win," Jenny

Colaiste Bride full-forward Siobhan Gahan hopes that she and her fellow forwards can indeed manufacture scores by the ton at O'Connor Park on Sunday, while Maire Dempsey just hopes that "we play to our best".



Eileen O'Brien chipped in with a brace of points and a Claire Walsh point gave St Mary's an interval lead of 1-6 to 1-2.


Charleville really turned

FULL SIZED PITCHES AND 15 PLAYERS FROM 1999 ONWARDS

he Annual Camogie Congress was recently held in Wexford and great credit must go to the organising committee for doing a fine job.

Uachtaran Cumann Camogaiochta na nGael Fileas Ni Bhreaslain in her address said the Association is proud of its 94 years in existence. It is the largest sporting organisation for women in Ireland. Camogie has a a lot to celebrate as it approaches it's Centenary. She spoke of her first year in office and highlighted various events that took place throughout the country. She was loud in her praise for all players who are the heart of the Association and also gave a lot of credit to her fellow officers.

An Runai Sile De Bhailis presented a very comprehensive report which induced a lot of discussion. (Extracts will be published at a later date)

Congress decided on a motion tabled by the Connacht Council: That for the 1999 season all competitions will be played on the full size GAA pitch with 15 players aside. This method was tried out six years ago at Inter-County level with the junior and senior league but, as all counties were not participating at the time a full evaluation could not be made.

This time the test series takes in all competitions ran under the auspices of Central Council, Provincial Councils and County Boards and could bring major changes to the Association as it approaches its Centenary.

It also decided on a Wexford motion that the All-Ireland senior championship semi-finals be played at the same neutral venue on the same day. This new development

seems to be a good idea.

On foot of a Down motion Ardcomhairle are to set up a working committee to examine the structure of all competitions. The working party's membership should consist of at least one representative from each competition and should report back with recommendations Ardcomhairle from which motions can be submitted to Annual Congress in 1999.

Ceol Caint agus Damhsa, the Association talent competition which has been lacking in interest for some time is to be discontinued at All Ireland level.

Trinity College Dublin won their first ever Purcell Shield competition at the annual event hosted by Mary Immaculate College, Limerick.

In the final they came up against the holders Tralee IT who were considered by many to be favourites. Even after a good win over Maynooth on the previous day, Trinity were not regarded as real contenders for the title. Trinity settled very quickly and within minutes had their first score on the board, a point from Trish Doyle.

The first fifteen minutes were completely dominated by Trinity with a goal from Mona O'Neill and points from Marie Richardson, Siobhan Comny and Trish Doyle. At this stage Tralee began to come into the game and scored a point leaving the half time score Trinity 1-4 Tralee 0-1.

In the second half, Tralee started the better of the two teams and put the Trinity defence under severe pressure. However, Tralee could not break through for a score. Niamh O'Mahoney, the captain at centre back was controlling the defence and Trinity managed to weather the storm. Trinity got themselves back in the game and scored a further 1-2 without a reply from Tralee. Final score: Trinity 1-6 Tralee 0-1.

In this context, the rulings of the recent Camogie Congress which was held in Wexford go a little way towards rectifying the underplayed (no pun intended) status of camogie,

The introduction of a 15-a-side rule for those games played under the auspices of Ard Combairle, Provincial Councils and County Boards from the year 1999, means that camogic matches can then be played on full hurling pitches

If this measure leads to camogle

and hurling finals being played on the same day at the same venue it could mean enormous exposure for the game, and attract the interest of financial sponsors.

The televising of All-Ireland Camogie and Women's Gaelle Football in the last year and the Camogie Congress' increase in the size of logo that can be displayed on a camogie jersey from 100 sq. cms. to 200 sq. cms. should also get the change-purses jingling.

There is still much revision necessary on behalf of the attitudes of the GAA, but these at least are baby-steps; if not quite giant leaps

And it is remarkable - truly remarkable. Consider her on-field achievements, and then add the fact that she's taking eight

honours in her Leaving Cert.

She's very good, very bright and all that. She's doing eight honours in her Leaving Cert this year, and with good prospects. Se she's good all-round, both academically and physically. I don't know what she's going to do, but she'll get what she wants anyway. That's one thing.'

That's one thing alright - this is one very single-minded individual. And one very tal-

Sinead O'Callaghan's leaning towards tamu steeped in it: "I was always interested in hurling. The first All-Ireland final I was ever at was in 1986, and it's always a big weekend in our house. But we always followed the hurling, and that's where my interest started.

T that time, there was no camogie in Charleville, and Sinead had no club of her own. But that was about to change: "I didn't start playing organised camogie til I came here, when I was 13. One of my best friends – Angela Sheehy – was from Ballyagran, where they had a strong club. She asked me to go with had a strong club. She asked me to go with them and I did. I've been with them since, and I don't think I'd ever leave.

And there, she came under the influence of Ger MacNamara. Under the guidance of these three people, Sinead O'Callaghan steadily progressed, to the point where she is now one of the finest prospects in the new generation of camogie stars.

Camogie, however, is different to its male equivalent in that after finishing secondary school, there are far fewer outlets for the

girls. There isn't a lot of senior competigirls. "There isn't a lot of senior competi-tion in Limerick - there are only three sen-ior teams, and it's a bit of a joke really. If we get beaten in the first round of the championship in May, that's it for the year at club level. In Cork, there are a lot of clubs, and even if you get knocked out in the championship, you still have the the championship, you still have the League, and there's also the inter-divisional competitions.

So it will survive in Cork alright. But there's nothing like that in Limerick - lose in May, and that's it for the year.

In hurling, the boys are respected, looked up to by their peers, with hurling seen as an expression of their manliness. What is it like for a camogie player? Is it difficult to maintain the interest, the sacrifice?

"Well, it is different for the hurlers in the way they're treated. I know girls who were very good at camogie, would be playing county, but they have no lift to go to train-ing. The hurlers are picked up and fed and given expenses and all that sort of thing. In camogie, you get nothing out of it but the satisfaction of playing. I'm not complaining

about that - it's just the way it is."

But isn't this lack of interest, lack of support, more the fault of women than of men? There is a barrier between hurling and

camogie, and it's not the GAA's fault. It's on the part of women too - they have to do it for themselves. Even in the school here, you wouldn't really think we were in an All-Ireland final this week - there's no great atmosphere.

"I don't know how many supporters we'll have from the school for the final. But you do need support. Women - even the girls here - talk about women in sport, and how

they're not fairly treated, but they don't even go to support their own. You can even see it at the camogic All-Ireland finals – a lot of the support is from men. And it's the same at club level."

Though not sure how to effect a quantum change in the attitude to women's sport -

change in the attitude to women's sport –
from both men and women – Sinead does
have a few ideas: "There are no All-Stars
in camogie, and I think there should be.

"It would help to promote the game as
well as recognising the 12 best players
every year – the All-Stars is always a big
night, gets a lot of publicity. Then, the fact
that they're showing the All-Ireland finals
live this year should help to promote the
game as well."

Regardless of the attitude to camogie,
Sinead O'Callaghan is staying with it:
"Yeah I am. I'm doing the Leaving this
year, and hope to go to UCC, doing Business Information Systems. That's the only
College I want to go to."

Yes. I could do Languages in Dublin, but res. Toolid do Languages in Dubini, but it's too far away for training. And there's no camogie up there anyway, really." Any Scholarship offer? "I've just finished filling in the forms ac-tually, just sent them off." Such dedication will surely be rewarded.

Already, in a school which has produced umpteen inter-county stars (in the Limerick Senior side of last year, 10 of the 12 were St. Mary's past pupils), Sinead O'Callaghan has made her mark.

tough, hard, but with great skill, great

girl, and you only have to tell her some-thing once. A very heady player, with the kind of hurling instinct that you just can't teach.

"But she's also a tremendously hard worker - she'd work all day for you, run all day. She's made the centre-forward position her own here, very much the leader of the team. She's captain this year now.'
Will they miss her?

"Oh you would - you'd have to miss that kind of quality."

From next September, UCC will have the benefit of all that quality. Oh I know the Exams - the exams - are not even done yet. But on the impression I got during our brief meeting in St. Mary's, in the impression given by Vincent Harrington, this is one girl who surely knows what she wants, and surely knows the sacrifices required to get it. And just as surely, will make those sacrifices.

Mary Moran recalls the glittering career of one of Camogie's all-time great players SANDY FITZGIBBON

Il Ireland Senior Champions, Cork face the new season without their star player of the past decade, Sandie Fitzgibbon. Sandie has worn the red and white with great distinction for twenty years. She was the first player to win three All-Ireland Minor medals. And also captained the successful minors in 1980 the same season that she won an All-Ireland Colleges Senior medal with North Presentation,

Sandie collected six All-Ireland Senior medals and was winning captain in 1992. A key figure with Glen Rovers as they captured four All-Ireland Club Championship titles she has been honoured with the National Irish Player of the Year Award on two occasions, 1992 and

Needless to say, Sandie's shoes will be extremely hard to fill. Her great attractive style of play has given great enjoyment to those who sit and watch. Her name has been added to the list of Camogie's All-Time Greats.

The 1998 season got off to an exciting start with a keenly contested Ashbourne Cup series in Waterford. Ulster sides have been very prominent in the Nineties but the balance of power swung to Munster this season. University of Limerick, U.U.C. and Waterford Institute of Technology reached the last four.

In a nail-biting final, U.C.C. hung on by a single point to secure their twenty-seventh Ashbourne Cup title. The standard of the final can be gauged by the number of All-Ireland medal-holders on both sides. The winners had Cora Keohane and Eithne Duggan, All-Ireland Senior medal-holders with

Cork, Therese Brophy, who was a member of Tipperary's Intermediate Championship winning side and Muireann Harrington, All-Ireland Senior Collages medal-holder with Charleville in their ranks.

Opponents looked to Michelle Fennelly and Bridget Mullally, All-Ireland Senior medal-holders with Kilkenny, Leinster interprovincial Esme Murphy and Tipperary's Sinead Nealon. It was the ability of the U.C.C defence to curtail the dangerous WIT forwards that decided the issue.



SILE DE BHAILIS' COMPREHENSIVE REPORT

🕇 ile De Bhailis, Ardrunai Cumann Camogaiochta na nGael gave a very comprehensive report to Annual Congress recently. The following are some extracts:

In reviewing the past year, we may take heart from progress made in many areas, both on and off the field, and we may be disappointed in seeing the lack of progress in other areas. There are many opportunities for our Association to expand and develop and there are, undoubtedly, many challenges and obstacles in our way. That Cumann Camogaiochta na nGael can thrive on challenge is evident from almost a century of continuous growth. Generations of our members faced enormous changes in different eras since our association was founded. The players are at the centre of our organisation and, once again through their skills, dedication and months of training, they gave us many memorable matches.

It is evident from reports from Comhairlí na gColaistí continue to make progress. The establishment of the Gaelic Games Club in several Third Level Colleges augurs well for the future, as does the appointment of Gaelic Games Development Officers, some of whom are camogie players. Comhairle na n-larbhunscoileanna faces the challenge of catering for increased numbers with the inclusion of Na Gairmscoileanna in its competitions. Apart from Na Gairmscoileanna, there is an overall increase in the number of Colleges playing at this level. It is a very welcome development that two schools are now playing in Leitrim and that Indoor Camogie is becoming very popular.

Indoor Camogie is now being organised on a competitive basis during the winter months in several counties and is becoming very popular. We are indebted to An Rannog Turasoireachta agus Spoirt for funding sets of equipment for the clubs. Finance was made available under the special equipment Grant Scheme. This is separate to the Grant-Aid Scheme and covers special equipment only. Gabhtar fior-bhuiochas leis An Rannog Spoirt ina leith.

The coming year will bring a new development which will focus attention on strengthening our association as we face a new century and our own centenary. There will, undoubtedly, be major initiatives and, perhaps many changes required if we want to expand and develop and maintain our status as a leading organisation in sport for women and girls.

In the meantime there are certain practical measures which could be taken in order to be both better prepared for major development initiatives and to simply improve in some areas.

Each unit could implement at least some of the following:

* set up its own Development Committee

* set up a centenary committee to prepare for 2004

* write its history
