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



Tipperary reach All-Ireland semi-final by "Skin of a Cat"


TIPPERARY 3-8

TIPPERARY reached their sixth consecutive Foras Na nGaeilge All-Ireland Senior Championship semi-final by the narrowest of margins in Callan on Saturday evening last when they defeated Kilkenny by 3-8 to 2-10.

Tipperary playing with a strong wind had registered two points in the opening three minutes from Claire Grogan (free) and Emily Hayden, but Kilkenny eased into a more settling rhythm and their hunger for victory was apparent as they banged home 1-3 without a reply from Tipperary the goal coming in the 14th minute from super forward Cathriona Carey, sister of senior hurling star D.J. Kilkenny could have gone further ahead in the 16th minute but for a superb save by Jovita Delaney from their full forward Marie O'Connor. However this save had the desired effect and gave the Tipp girls a lift, they set siege on the Kilkenny defense and a Jill Horan wonderful point in the 19th minute was followed by a Deirdre Hughes trademark in the Kilkenny net from a pass from Emily Hayden. Eimear McDonnell three minutes later had a classic goal after a flowing move involving Noelle Kennedy, Deirdre Hughes and Jill Horan, and this score put Tipperary back in the lead. Two more points in the 23rd and 24th minute from Noelle Kennedy and Deirdre Hughes stretched Tipperary's lead further; Sinead Millea decreased the Kilkenny deficit with a pointed free in the 29th minute. However it was Tipperary who finished the stronger with Eimear McDonnell pointing in the 30th minute and once again Jill Horan found the space in a tight Kilkenny defense line and managed to hand pass to the net on the stroke of half time, Tipperary going into the break leading by 3-6 to 1-

Playing with a strong wind in the second half Kilkenny got off to a dream start when Marie O'Connor igniting the side in the opening minute with a superb goal. Tipperary replied three minutes later with a point from Eimear McDonnell, ironically this was to be Tipperary last score until injury time while Kilkenny exerted

New pitch for Inniscarra camogie team

ONE hundred years after the first official camogie game was played in Ireland. history was made in camogie circles when Miriam Ui Cheallacháin, Uachtarán Cumann Camógaíochta na nGael, officially opened Páire Camógaíochta Inis Cartha in Ballyanly.

The opening took place last Sunday and the ceremony was managed by Paudie Palmer. A measure of the significance and importance of the occasion was the fact that fourteen speakers took to the podium to mark the occasion.

The sun shone down on Inniscarra as Con Hayes, chairman of Inniscarra camogie regaled the large attendance by telling them that the camogie pitch was in many ways the last piece of the jigsaw in the Ballyanly complex.

He added that while he has played all the other sports present in the complex he has yet to play camogie. The demand for pitches has become very acute in the past few years and it was felt that there was a need to provide a facility for women, he

There were many well-known faces at the opening. These included Cllr Tomás Ryan deputising for the Mayor of Cork County, former president of the European Parliament, Pat Cox, Chairperson of Cork Camogie Board Marian McCarthy, President of the Cork Camogie Board, Sheila Golden, Secretary of the Munster Camogie Board Rose Malone, and Frank McCarthy representing Muskerry and Cork County

This was the culmination of an extraordinary feat for the Inniscarra Club in this historic centenary year of camogie as this is the first pitch in the county and the third in the country to be dedicated solely to the playing of camogie.

Camogie has been played in Inniscarra since the early 1940s but it was not until that the club was formed and a great debt is owed to the people that along the way have guided the club to eight county titles and two Feile na nGael titles.

On and off the field, Inniscarra people have made a great contribution to the game of camogie, Mary O'Callaghan RIP was National President, Sheila

Golden is a former County Chairperson and is currently the County President. Con Hayes and Tim Buckley were officers of the Juvenile County Board.

One of the clubs most famous players is Irene O'Keeffe who won five Senior All-Ireland medals with Cork, and was also voted player of the final on two occasions.

Another Senior All-Ireland medalist Ger Casey was voted player of the final in a Junior All Ireland Final

Marie O'Connell, Criona Harte, Trish Murphy, Leona Nolan, Margaret McCarthy, Treasa McCarthy and Rena Buckley have also won All-Ireland Medals, while Margaret N. O'Sullivan, Nicola Buckley, Evelyn Movnihan, Catherine Moynihan, Catherine O'Leary, Elizabeth Hayes and Eadaoin O'Mahony Munster

Imokilly have not trained as a unit to date. They have regrouped for matches and that is about the extent of their preparations.


This must be a worry. No matter how talented a team are as individuals they must be able to play as one.

Five points on-the-trot meant that only three now separated the sides.



IT'S all happening in Ballyanly at the

Last Sunday Miriam Ul Cheallacháin, Uachtarán Cumann Camogaíochta na nGael, officially opened Inniscarra's camogie pitch.

Inniscarra are the only club in Cork and indeed only the third in the country to own their own pitch, dedicated to camogie only. It is a magnificent achievement. in April 2002 an EGM gave the go-ahead for a committee raise the necessary funds to buy their own grounds.

Massive fundraising quickly got underway beginning with a grand draw held between May and November.

A race night was held and generous grants were received from the Scally Family Foundation, owners of Super Valu. Blamey, Cork County Council and The National Lottery.

Local businesses from surrounding parishes also contributed generously. Within a short period of time the land was bought. But that's what it was, just land. She was a leader, an advisor and at times a peace maker. I can't recall a single incident where Fiona

> She'd take a step back and assess a situation. wouldn't jump in all fired up like some of us. Yet when it came to driving her team on with passion and emotion she had it in abundance.

Asked if it was a tough decision to retire when she still and if she had any re-

grets her reply was: "It was the most difficult decision of my sporting career and probably my

She doesn't have any regrets yet.

She attended Cork's quarter-final against Wexford last weekend and as she watched the team go through their warm-up she did feel a little pang as she knew exactly how they felt and what would be going through her mind if she was with them.

"I'll miss the feeling I used to

get when the game was in the melting pot. The thousand thoughts going through your mind, the knife-edge feeling.

As we spoke I could feel the nostalgia building up in both of us. I could associate with every emo-

What Fiona got most from the game was 'the friends up and down the country. I also loved the funny incidents that occurred, the dressing room banter, the characters you meet and the pre match talks.' Fiona has been teaching in Colaiste Choilm, Ballincollig for five years.

The school was recently voted the most sporting school in Ireland. A tremendous achievement! Fiona helped in no small way to that success. She has given so much to coaching and camogie outside of playing that it is little wonder she now feels the need for a little R&R.

She has decided to take a 12 month career break from both teaching and coaching. A rest she thoroughly deserves. Travel and catching up with friends are high on her agenda.

We could have talked for hours but eventually decided it was time to go. I gave the final few words to Fiona

"The greatest influence was my family. I want to thank them wholeheartedly. I want to thank my club mates, the people of my parish and the coaches.





Here, their opponents will be Carraigdhoun, who are also looking to win their first ever senior county title and the side can boast many Cork senior and junior players among their ranks.

But this will not daunt the Milford girls, captained by Lelia Long, as the majority of their twenty-five strong panel have represented Cork at various levels and Emer Watson, Anna Geary, Regina Curtin and Elaine O'Riordan, are presently

TED SHEEHAN has been at the helm of Milford for the past four years and has brought them through two years at senior B level to senior A last year, writes LINDA MELLERICK.

He finds the step-up to senior status immense.

"Physically senior A is very demanding. We played three tough games last year and physically we couldn't maintain it," he said.

"We lost the semi-final to Fr O'Neill's and while we've learned a lot in the past year we are still a very young team with many of the girls aged between 15 and 19.

"You really don't have full body strength at that age."

Only four of the present squad weren't eligible for U18 last year.

ELEVEN goals, the lead changing hands continuously, a sending-off, a first county title for divisional side Carrigdhoun and, overall, a thrilling O'Leary Brothers Builders Cork County Senior Camogie Championship final at Pairc Ui Rinn.

Milford settled quickly with an Emer Watson pointed 45 and that was extended when Anna Geary's long-range free was deflected to the net. Catriona Kelly opened Carrigdhoun's account with a pointed free but with Emer Watson pointing on the double, Milford kept the advantage.

Carrig girls make camogie history

HISTORY was made in Páirc Uí Rinn last Friday when the Carrigdhoun camogie team not only captured their first senior county camogie title, but became the very first Carrigdhoun team in any grade to capture a senior county title.

Hopes were high going into the final following victories over Bishopstown, UCC, Barrs and Imokilly.

However, they were up against a Milford side who intended to etch their name on the Punch trophy for the first time and to continue their remarkable run in county championship campaigns.

Carrigdhoun started badly and found themselves 1-1 to nil down within five minutes, five points down soon after and the signs were not looking good at all for the divisional side at

However, the game exploded into a scoring frenzy 20 minutes into the first half, with six goals in nine minutes, commencing with two goals from Carrig's Sarah O'Donovan inside a minute to give her side the lead, soon to be cancelled out by a Milford goal.

A minute later, Carrigdhoun restored the lead with another goal to lead by a point and added another two points to leave it three between them.

Milford struck back with 1-2 to restore their lead, only for another goal by Carrigdhoun get them back in the lead again. That was soon overturned to a point advantage for Milford at half-time following two quick points.

The half-time score was Carrigdhoun 43, Milford 3-7.

A Milford point early in the second half took their advantage back to two points, but then Carrigdhoun hit another purple patch, scoring 1-4 without replay to turn the tide in their favour.

It was a lead the divisional side never relinquished, always maintaining a slender point or two advantage.

At one stage it rose to five points, only for Milford to come back with another goal as they pressed for scores.

Perhaps the turning point in the game was the sending off of one of the Milford players halfway through the second half, but if anything, it spurred the club side on even more in their endeavours.

They tried their very best to pick up scores, but found the Carrigdhoun backline in top

In the end, it was a relieved Carrigdhoun squad at the sounding of the final whistle in a game where the lead changed hands eight times and where it was, literally, a puck of a ball between them.

The girls defeated Milford by just three - 6-11 to 5-11 - in an epic decider, re-

garded as one of the finest games of camogie in many years, a classic final which had the large crowd on tenterhooks throughout.

The O'Leary Brothers Senior County Camogie trophy was presented to captain Caitriona Kelly by Marie McCarthy, Chairperson Cork County Board, while the captain was also honoured as the player of the match for her outstanding contribution to the game which brought out the very best from both sets of players.

It also proved to be a double celebration for Carrigdhoun player Mairead Holland, who was also celebrating her 21st birthday - what a party she had afterwards!

A delighted Tom Kiely said afterwards that he still "couldn't believe that Carrigdhoun had won the senior county title."

He was full of praise for players and mentors who gave their all for the team during the championship campaign.

"We were very fortunate that throughout the championship we had no injury worries with the team bonding together as a unit the further we got into the competition."

He regarded the game as a "classic" and "one of the best finals ever seen."

This is the biggest threat to Milford side, who are destined to reign supreme in the Cork Championship for years to come but only if they can hold their team together for a few years.


I remember overhearing their coach giving a pep talk during half time against Inniscarra, and he talked about how they had all grown up together and how well they know each other.



Leeside's golden trophy era

WITH the modern game of camogie receiving far more media attention than ever I decided this week to take a step back in time and remind readers of the great players who went before.

It is very difficult to pick and choose so I decided on a particular era, the 70s, a magnificent decade of camogie success for Cork.

My information is taken from Mary Moran's excellent read Cork's Camogie

Jack Dempsey, a Youghal man who had hurled with Blackrock and Cork was asked to take over the training of the Cork senior team in 1970.

He instilled confidence and team work into his charges. What a difference he made! Twenty nine years after Kitty Buckley had last held the O'Duffy Cup Cork were crowned All-Ireland champions.

Tears of joy were shed from players, officials and supporters. The team had many stars none more so that Liz Garvan, Peggy Dorgan, Marie Costine, Pat Moloney and captain Anne Commerford.

Liz Garvan was named as the National-Player-of-the-Year.

Cork reached the All-Ireland final again in 1971 after a torrid first round game against Tipperary which resulted in both teams receiving a 12 month suspended sentence.

Galway proved no match for Cork in the semi-final and Cork moved on to an All-Ireland show down with Wexford.

Rosie Hennessy had an excellent game for the Rebels and along with newcomers Mary Whelton, Marion McCarthy and Nuala Guilly, Cork won for the second-year-in-a-row winning 4-6 to 1-2.

Three-in-a-row beckoned in 1972 and Cork duly obliged. Mary Moran took over as coach from Jack Demsey. Mel Cummins, Cork's outstanding goalkeeper decided to call it a day and Deirdre Sutton of Glen Rovers took over the number one spot.

Marion Sweeney, a strong and energetic player, filled in at centre forward. Defeating Tipperary and then Antrim

in the semi-final Cork faced Kilkenny in Croke Park.

On view that day for the first time were many of the players who were to dominate the game in the coming decades. Fifteen-year-old Angela Downey. Bridle Martin and Teresa O'Neill were appearing in their first All-Ireland final for the cats.

The Cork defence was magnificent. Deirdre Sutton played with extreme confidence. Hannah Dineen, Marie Costine and Mary Whelton blo the supply up front but found it difficult titles in 10 years. to make much headway against a light, tenacious Kilkenny defence.

The 16th of September 1973 was a memorable day in the history of Cork camogie. Antrim and Cork provided the most exciting and emotional final in

Brilliant striking, lighting pace, an abundance of thrills and a rip roaring finish rank this game among the best finals ever played.

The game opened at a terrific pace. Cork lead at the interval by three points. Antrim then leveled. Long passages of play enthralled the crowd. With six minutes remaining the sides were level again.

A crashing goal from Anne Phelan and a point from Marion McCarthy dented Antrim's hopes. They never gave up and won three 30-yard frees.

Mairead McAtamney goaled with the second but uncharacteristically drove the first and third attempt wide. The Cork defence was superb and they held out for the narrowest of victories.

Cork had achieved the remarkable four-in-a-row for the first time.

1974 brought a halt to Corks reign. They drew with Kilkenny in the All-Ireland final only to lose the replay.

They gained revenge in '75 defeating the Cats in the semi-final. Cork were hot favourites to win their fifth title in six years but Wexford created a huge upset and took the title.

The rebels did not reach Croke Park in '6 or '77 losing out to Kilkenny and Wexford respectively.

Tom Nott took over as team trainer the following year.

Marion McCarthy who had played outfield with Cork since 1971 reverted back to goal. Pat Moloney moved from midfield to attack. The moves proved a huge success.

er, forcing referee Martina Kennedy to abandon the game 15 minutes from time because "she couldn't be responsible for the safety of the players"

Earlier the board had met with club officials and 31 of the 42 players involved and decided the clubs had a

During the second half of the match most of the 30 players became in-volved in the brawl. Players were punched and kicked but it is not known if any were struck with hur-

County PRO, Suzanne Pearson said at the time that "the referee had no option but to abandon the game for her own safety and that of players and

Now, in the aftermath of the brawl, which made national headlines, both Kiltegan and Annacurra camogie clubs have been expelled from the Camogie With the Kiltegan Club having five separate teams — from under-10 up to senior - up to 90 members are affected, with similar repercussions for the Annacurra club members.

None of the members can join another camogie club which effectively puts an end to their camogie careers.

A member of the Kiltegan club said: "I don't think that an eight-year-old should be punished for something that an adult has done. It's had a very bad

effect on us and we're still in shock. We need a bit of time to get our heads around what happened and we need time to decide what to do."

While the clubs are awaiting official confirmation of their blanket ban, neither Pearson or Chairperson Winnie O'Hanlon were prepared to com-

Tributes have poured in for Sighle McAnulty (88), pictured, who died on Wednesday after a two-year battle with ill health.

Described by friends and colleagues as "a pillar" of the GAA in the Mournes and beyond, she is perhaps best known for her definitive book on the history of Down GAA. O Shiol go Blath (From Seed to Flower).

Her involvement in both camogie and gaelic football began at the age of nine, when she became secretary of the Betsy Grey camogie club in her native Warrenpoint.

In recent years, Miss McAnulty was made a life president of the Camogle Association of Ireland (CAI) to recognise her unique contribution to the sport,

Sheila Wallace, general secretary of the association, praised her "distinguished service".



"Sighle's vision and idealism, her love of Gaelic games and Irish culture permeated and en-riched Cumann

Camogaiochta na nGael," she said.

As an administrator Miss McAnulty served as CAI president from 1949 to 1953, and as the association's high secretary from 1953 to 1975.

She served on many boards and in 1975 was the only woman appointed to the Irish government's sports advisory body.

Miss McAnulty's love for football also lasted her entire life, and she attended her 80th alllreland final last year.

Despite her recent ill health, she still managed to go to see her beloved Down play Cavan in the Ulster Championship twice this year.

"She was an inspiration, an amazing woman and we all will miss her very badly," her nephew Fergal McCormack said.

"Sighle was years ahead of her

time. She was a real career woman who in the 1940s and 1950s was chairing meetings in London and Brussels and dealing with multi-national companies.

"While my aunt never married or had children, she was absolutely devoted to her nephews and nieces."

Born in Warrenpoint in 1916, Miss McAnulty left to pursue a high-powered career in Dublin, only returning to the Co Down town to retire 20 years ago.

Mr McCormack said that even in retirement, she was always "on the go".

In 1978, she decided to go back to college and completed a degree at Queen's University. Colleague and friend Bell

Colleague and friend Bell O'Loughlin, herself a former president of the CAI, said she had been a dedicated promoter of GAA and Irish culture.

"Sighle had an amazing memory – she could remember the scores of matches played 40 or 50 years ago. She will be sorely missed," she said.

Sighle McAnulty – an appreciation

WHILE Camogle Pitch was on holiday, the death occurred of Sighle McAnulty, only the second honorary President of Cumann Camogalochta na nGael and its longest serving administrator.

Sighle gave 80 years of service to camogle, starting off at the tender age of nine when she became secretary of the Betsy Gray club in Warrenpoint.

Later on she held the same office on the Down County Board, and in the 1940s became Cathaoirleach of the Ulster Camoge Council at a time when Ulster counties (particularly Antrim) were regular participants in the All-Ireland senior final. However, when Sighle assumed the position of Camogie President in 1949, there was much strife within the Association. The major success of her Presidency was the ending of those divisions and the delegates at the 1952 Congress recognised this by electing her to serve an unprecedented fourth year in the office.

When she stepped down, she became Ardrunal from 1953 to 1975 a period that saw vast changes in the Association. She Gamogie Pitch

also served in many offices including President of Cumann na mBunscoil and Cathaoirleach of the Central Administration Committee which provided a training programme for officers.

Sighle was also a successful businesswoman at a time when women in general didn't have such a high professional profile.

During the early 1970s she was one of only two women appointed to Cosac, the then Government established Council for Sport and in 1975 the only woman to sit on the Government Sports Advisory Council.

Aware of her profile in Down GAA fields, I first encountered Sighle on a personal level, when I served as Ardrunai of the Camogle Association in the early 1980s and she was the member of the Management Committee appointed to oversee my work. Despite my inexperience and the differences in our ages, Signle was never patronising, always encouraging and remarkably in tune with the ideas and interests of young people. She was always on hand to offer encouragement, share ideas and give constructive criticism when it was needed. She had a sharp mind, even during her last few months when her body was quite frail and she still managed to attend the Camogie Centenary celebrations. enlightening the conversation with her recall formation of the Association. Her love of Gaelic Games and Irish culture, her vision and idealism, her capacity to listen and her ability to respect and trust youth enriched Cumann Camogaiochta na nGael and all who knew her. 

Finbarr's stamp of approval

ORKMAN Finbarr
O'Connor's great passion
for painting has brought
him from teaching maths to being
the artist commissioned by An
Post to create the recently
launched Centenary of Cumann
Camógaíochta na nGael's stamps
and the Summer Olympic Games
stamps.

Two 48c stamps, with artwork by Finbarr, show two camogie players in the original kits and two players in modern kits with the logo and O'Duffy Cup in the background.

The players are drawn from Cork, Antrim, Dublin and Kilkenny. (Cork have won the O'Duffy Cup 20 times since the

first camogie All Ireland took place in 1932.)

Two other stamps commemorate the return the Olympic Games to its homeplace, Athens. Also designed by Finbarr, the 60c stamp depicts an athlete in the pose of the ancient games and the 48c stamp depicts a modern javelin thrower.

Finbarr, who grew up in the Lough area of Cork and who now lives in Blackrock, started drawing and painting at a young age. "Art is more than a job for me

"Art is more than a job for me
it's something I have to do and
wildlife art is my passion," he
said.

Finbarr taught maths for three years after gaining his BA from UCC before doing a course in illustration at Falmouth College of Art in Cornwall, England.

He had a great interest in nature and wanted to 'pursue something in realistic art if possible, with a particular view to nature and wildlife' and so he chose the natural history section in the course.

A self employed illustrator, Finbarr has had a very successful career. He was commissioned by An Post in 1998 to do the Endangered Animals set of stamps. An Post followed up by asking him to do several more stamp issues.

These included the Extinct Animals, Europa Parks and Reserves, Football Team of the Millennium, Water Resources and the Battle of Kinsale commemorative sets. Last year Finbarr worked on the St Patrick's Day 2003 stamps.

"The An Post commissions have been the most visible of my work," said Finbarr.

He is challenged and yet rewarded by the research and final production of these miniature art

Finbarr has illustrated two books by Soinbhe Lally which were published by Poolbeg. These were Ancient Legends of Ireland and Favourite Irish Fairy Tales. He has illustrated book covers

He has illustrated book covers for Oxford University Press, Cambridge University Press, O'Brien Press, Poolbeg, Hamlyn and many others. Although he is cutting back on

Although he is cutting back on his commercial work, he is keeping his connections open with An Post for possible future stamp commissions. He is also working part-time at Little Island sorting office, which allows more time for his wildlife painting.

With Finbarr's deep desire to

With Finbarr's deep desire to paint wildlife he has found there is a worldwide market for wildlife paintings. He is starting a series of paintings of "big cats" using acrylics, oils and watercolours.

It was 1904 when the first public camogie match took place in Dublin. Shortly afterwards Cumann Camógaíochta na nGael was formed to provide a Gaelic Games outlet for the women of Ireland.

Four Cork players were named on the Camogie Team of the Century. They were Marie Constine O'Donovan, Sandie Fitzgibbon, Linda Mellerick and Pat Moloney Lenihan. Cork players are featured on the Centenary of Cumann Camógaíochta na nGael's calendar of special events. The February group of photographs shows UCC players celebrating their victory over UCD in the final of the 2003 Ashbourne Cup.





Losing semi is a bitter pill

AN ALL-IRELAND semifinal is often the most frustrating of games to play in.

A full year's training behind you, one hour away from an All-Ireland final; and yet should you lose you have nothing.

You have nothing if you lose the final either, and the pain of losing that is far greater than the pain of losing a semi-final — but you're there, and on the day it's 50/50.

Nothing more or nothing less. Over the next four weeks or so, all the experts will try to predict this year's All-Ireland hurling winner.

Everything will be taken into consideration — individuals, teamwork, hunger, work rate, defences, forwards, midfields, etc.

But at the end of the day, it is whoever performs best and makes the most of their limited chances over the 70 minutes.

At this level very little separates teams. What factors a team may lack is often made up for with some other attribute.

Cork and Galway meet today in the All-Ireland Senior Camogie semi-final. The game is live on RTÉ from Ipm.

By the time you read this we will



hopefully be through to the final for the third year in a row.

I expect we will once we don't take our opponents for granted.

Tipperary and Wexford play in the other semi, again shown live after the Cork game, and while Wexford should give a good account of themselves I expect the All-Ireland Champions to pull away and reach their sixth final in a

Tipp must be tired at this stage and I wonder if the same hunger is in them. Even if it's not evident today, the red jersey will certainly bring it out in them.

Tipp are by no means an old team but to me actual age is not the issue when it comes to deciding whether a player is past it or not.

It has more to do with the length of time a player has been playing at the top level and the demands placed upon them.

Reaching finals year after year means continuous training year after year with little or no break.

Some players are finished by 29

or 30. Just tired and completely burnt out.

Many a laugh I had this summer and last, listening to analysts discuss players. When a player in their 30s plays poorly they're considered finished, an embarrassment, hasn't got the legs, etc.

Two weeks later they'll come out and play a blinder, their county will win and all of a sudden 'You can't beat experience'!!

I'm absolutely thrilled that Cork are through to the hurling final as are all Cork followers I'm sure.

I hope that the senior camogie team will also make it to the final and we have double success.

Our junior team are already there thanks to their impressive win over Wexford last Saturday.

Without doubt, with the hurlers out on the 12th and the camogie players out on the 19th it is going to affect the crowd travelling to the girls' final.

It is an expensive day out and to expect families to make the journey two weeks in a row is asking a lot.

But many will not get tickets for the hurling final and I would ask all those who don't to consider making the journey the following week and support the girls.

Believe me, all the camogie play-

ers will be at the hurling final urging the guys on, and they deserve the same encouragement and loyalty in their quest for All-Ireland glory also.

With both semi-finals being shown live today, I hope they provide us with good games. Last year's semis were a whitewash.

This is fine when a hurling game goes that way, like last Sunday, but with only the All-Ireland camogie final being televised up to now and the general public seeing very little of the sport, it is important that while trying to raise the awareness and image of the game what they do see is worth watching.





years, many of a Wexford persuasion marvelled in the Premier County's evolution from underdog to top-dog, while our own charges figured merely in a token capacity in the big chase.

Now though, Wexford are back fighting fit, and seeking a slice of the championship pie. And thanks to the sterling efforts of the players together with the management team of Aidan Breen, Aldan Moran, plus highly respected trainer Kevin Murphy, the purpleand-gold once more have realistic aspirations in that regard. When considering the impressive stature of Wexford's stock during the lean years between 1995 and 2003 inclusive, it is astonishing to record the fact that the county has remained absent from camogle's centre-stage since the 1994 All-Ireland final setback against Kilkenny.

But in 1995, a significant milestone in the Wexford game was achieved, when the under-16s forged the county's first-ever outright success in the All-Ireland minor championship with victory way out West over Galway at Loughrea - thanks to the expert tutelage of Bernie Higgins (Rathnure), Tina Farrell (Oylegate-Glenbrien), Rose Breen (Monageer-Boolavogue), and Carmel Maguire (Enniscorthy). That breakthrough provided plenty of room for optimism - and frustration too - as the Wexford seniors sadly found themselves languishing in the also-rans category since their last taste of the high life back in '94. During that period they won just six of 16 All-Ireland championship games. The all-conquering minors of '95 have provided the nucleus for the current resurgence in the top-flight, including Wexford's Camogle Ambassador for the Centenary Year, Aine Codd, who had the honour of captaining those history-makers, alongside Claire O'Connor, Rose-Marie

Breen, Kate Kelly (the Ambassador for

O'Leary, and Michelle

Hearne, who has since turned from goalkeeper to much feared

There too was Esme Murphy, a phenomenal underage talent of the time, who had even lined-out in the senior All-Ireland a year earlier. She accounted for 1-9 in the minors' 2-9 to 1-7 win over Galway, with Kate Kelly scoring the other goal. Unfortunately injury has since robbed Wexford, and the game in general, of Esme's influence - but not her valued support, even as she is now scoring big time as Commercial Manager for League of Ireland Premier division soccer entity. Dublin City.

Aside from the minors of '95, Wexford's present-day senior combination is littered with many other high-achievers whose taste for the good-times was acquired on the underage fields, between Oulart-The Ballagh's magnificent haul of Premier division titles in the All-Ireland Felle na nGael, and Colaiste Bride's on the All-Ireland Schools 'A'

championship front.




Tipperary Through To Sixth All-Ireland Final - But Only Just


