

Camogie tradition is being revived at St Als

Cork senior hurler will help coach school

HE honour of being the first Cork school to take a Senior All-Ireland colleges title, back in 1976, and to hold jointly the honour of winning six Munster Senior Colleges titles rests with that famous camogie nursery in Sharman Crawford Street that has put a legion of camogie greats both on and off the playing fields through its hallowed halls.

I can well remember wating anxiously for that famous bell to ring and let us out on the field behind the tennis court where so many players learned the game.

Having fallen on lean times on the playing fields with the emergence of such forces as Charleville, Clonakilty and Nenagh to mention but a few. it's indeed heart warming to report a resurgence in camogie within St Als, a school famous for its camogie tradition.

Seven pupils already have worn the Cork jersey on the inter-county stage with Orla McCarthy being the holder of an All-Ireland minor medal from last year and Treasa McCarthy, Eadoine O McCarthy, Eadoine O Mahony, Joanne Cullinane, Catherine Holland, Rena Buckley and Liz Hayes having lined out with the county minor and colleges sides this

Cork senior hurler Kevin Murray visited the school and did the honours in presenting the junior team with their medals, expressing his delight to see the game progressing in the school.

Kevin has agreed to be in-volved with the coaching of the St Als teams next term, a huge bonus for a progressive outfit determined to once again reach the heights. The school also competed in

The side also reached the semi-final of the Sally Ann Shanahan Memorial competi-

Two teams were also entered in the first year championship and while not reaching the closing stages of the competitions, they did gain experience which will stand to them in the future.

Overall it was a great year's camogie and coach Ger Butler was happy with the progress made and is optimistic for the future of camogie in the hallowed halls of a school where, hopefully, the game will once again prosper.

Kildare's camogs now have little more on their mind than enjoying the warm summer sun, while the rest of the GAA championship season builds to boiling point. Because of the different system used in camogie, which dictates that the majority of leagues and junior championships are completed by early summer, Kildare's season is over. Not for them the

prestige of a packed Croke Park. Claiming membership of the Kildare camogie team that has just lost a junior league final may not be the most fashionable of pursuits. You will not be paraded in front of cheering masses for bringing pride and esteem to the locality; leave that to Ted and Ruby and Papillon. The girls who play don't do so for exposure; love of the game is the lowest common denominator. The Lilywhite ladies can now

aturday May 20th will long remain etched in the memories of Cork camogie enthusiasts as the historic day that the county teams won both the senior and junior National League finals in O'Connor Park, Tullamore. It was a first ever for the junior side, while the seniors edged their way to the top of the roll of honours with 10 titles and a record six-in-a-row

Cork and Kildare provided the opposition in the opening decider. Seven Treacy sisters were creating their own bit of history in bidding to bring Corn de Burca back home - a feat achieved by the Lily Whites in '86, '89 and '90. Melanie Treacy, who captains the side this year, is a link with their last win at the beginning of the '90s. Cork, though, were in devastating form, and two goals before the break from Ciara Healy and Rachel Moloney helped the Leesiders to a 2-3 to 0-3 interval lead.

Nine further points, with Healy emerging top scorer on 1-8, to just one from the losers, resulted in a commanding victory for the Rebel County (2-12 to 0-4), and a memorable day for captain, Ruth Cahalan, A Galway native. Ruth, who won an Ashbourne medal with UCC a few months back, had to put the celebrations on hold to complete her hDip in Education exams the following Monday.

Ruth, along with Ciara Healy, Emer Dillon, Rachel Moloney and Ger Casey were also members of the senior panel who faced up to the All Ireland Champions, Tipperary in

the second decider. In a repeat of last year's league final, the Tipp girls were anxious to rid themselves of memories of a day when everything went against them. They started in tremendous fashion and playing with the strong wind looked very impressive. Four points from Noelle Kennedy, two from Caitriona Hennessy and the opening score from Emer McDonnell had Cork in big trouble. Fiona O'Driscoll was a trifle lucky when her free dropped under Jovita Delaney's crossbar, and Deirdre Hughes showing flashes of her best with a cracking shot that beat Cora Keohane.

Time ran out, though, on the All Ireland champions, despite referee John Pender playing five minutes of added time. For Cork's Linda Mellerick, that whistle was sweet music to her ears. "Yeah, we were in serious trouble at half-time. We knew it would take a hell of an effort. The Great **Indoors**

lay hurling indoors!? Wouldn't the space available in most halls be too limited, and what about the damage to wooden floors and walls? The answer was simplicity itself - promote the sport among the very young, confine the play to ground hurling and make the bas of the camán out of plastic. It is a great way of introducing our ancient game, especially in areas with little hurling tradition, and is also a skillful and enjoyable game in its own right. At this young age, too, boys and girls can play together without any

These considerations were very much in mind a few years ago when Cumann na mBunscoil organised the sport in the primary schools of Dublin and Cork. In the capital the Cumann's Development Officer, Tom Fitzpatrick, is a big supporter of indoor hurling, and he has seen the number of kids involved double each year since its inception. This year's League involved over 1200 children from almost 30 schools.

League organiser Gerard O'Connor feels that indoor hurling is the best way to introduce very young children to the game where the emphasis would be on participation and enjoyment. Much planning went into the project with prior visits to the schools and the organisation of Festival days. On these occasions up to 150 children from a particular school would be brought to a large indoor facility such as the National Basketball Arena in Tallaght. There games were played in a relaxed, funfilled atmosphere between classmates. Sometime later competitions were organised in ten regional venues with semi-finals and final brought back to the Arena.

In 1996 Sciath na Scol in Cork decided to start a similar indoor hurling competition among the City schools. Liam Mhac an Mhoit and his fellow organisers attracted an entry of 88



2000

teams, a figure that has increased every year since. For many of the games the magnificent facilities at Cork IT were made available, and the finals were played at the Neptune Stadium.

The game is gradually spreading out from the two main Urban areas and it is hoped eventually to have the game played in most areas of the country and draw up a set of rules that will apply at national level. A number of second level schools have started to play the game and their transition years are being trained as coaches with a view to helping with the training of young children at their nearest primary school.

At the moment the rules are being deliberately kept flexible to cater for the different numbers involved and the various facilities available. Interest is kept high by having the games short (6-7 mins, per half), but with continuous action as the ball is played off the side and back walls as in ice hockey. In fact, several other aspects of that game are incorporated including sin bins, portable goalposts and unlimited substitution (but no punch-ups!).

An exciting prospect opening up is the possibility of relations with the game of Sale (floor) Bandy. This Scandinavian game can trace its roots back to the hurling introduced to settlements in Iceland by Irish monks. It is one of the fastest growing sports in Sweden, Noway and Finland. The game has spread to Britain, Canada and the US, and the International Bandy Association is anxious to make contact with our Irish game. World Championships are held each year - the next is in Sweden in May 2001. The Dublin schools have built up relations and exchanged visits with their shinty counterparts in Scotland. As a result of these contacts the Shinty Association is now promoting their own indoor game. The Bandy connection may be an opportunity to spread their wings even further afield.

Information on indoor hurling in your area can be got from Cumann na mBunscol, c/o your GAA County Board. The indoor hurling season runs from November to March and this year, Tom Fitzpatrick tells me, most counties have a full programme devised.

IHE London GAA story used to be one of cultural displacement, an odd tournament, shortage of pitches and an annual appearance in the All-Ireland Championship. The same can be said for

The tradition of the game in the city is as old as emigration itself. Camogic was revived in London in the mid '80s and the last match prior to this was recorded in 1957.

Winger

With the formation . The London Irish camogie club in 1985 and Newham and Croydon Gaels a year later, a county board was set up in 1986 to look after the clubs. It was in the winter of 1987 that a motion seeking entry into the All-Ireland Club

hampionship was passed. This motion was subsequently sanctioned et annual congress in Monaghan in the following months. In 1988 they played their first match at inter-county championship level - entertaining Kildare in conjunction with the London Irish festival.

London held the Lily Whites to three points. Unlike their male counterparts, they do not participate in the league.

But, inevitably, since then defeat has become almost an acceptable part of their Gaelle games with the chance of delivering victory as slim as ever.

In general hurling, football and camogic are struggling in the most populous 'county' of the GAA Board. Gone are the days when emigration from this country was at its peak, and the majority of young people came together abroad to promote the game and hang on to their Irish culture.

That well has dried up, and if they are to

prosper they will have to develop the games themselves at under-age level.

The GAA has a new chairman, Larry O'Leary, who hurls with the Cuchulainn club. Mary MacArthur is the camogic

chairperson - formerly from Kildare but exiled since 1965.

Relations are very strong between both codes, which according to Mary is vital to the survival of their games. But, it will take more than good rapport to come to terms with the turbulence that can often develop when trying to run an organisation.

Ruislip is home to Gaelic players in London. It has one pitch to cater for all needs, but initiatives are under way to develop the grounds. There is a crowd capacity of 4,000, but if land owned by the board at New Eltham is rezoned for development, the game will have a good chance to grow.

London camogie is in a no-win situation. Mary MacArthur agrees that it is near impossible to keep a team together: "We would love to play in the National League, but cost is a big issue," she says.

Happy

"Originally, Connaught were happy to adopt us into their province. However, it is currently on the agenda and will be raised at special congress in October," she added.

It would appear that money is the big problem when it comes to deciding whether

or not to play in the league. Saturday, July 29 is a red-letter day. Cork travel to Ruislip to defend their All-Ireland Junior Championship title. They will be met by an enthusiastic and committed team who will take heart from the arrival of the All-Ireland champions.

Grace McMullan's flame red hair made her an instantly recognisable player when she first played for Antrim inter-county under-age teams in the mid-eighties. There was never any doubt even then that she was destined for a high profile in the game, as Grace showed some beautiful and "Grace"ful touches.

She had watched her sister Mary, barely 17, star at wing-back for Antrim in 1979, as the Saffrons lifted the last of their 6 Senior All-Ireland titles in Croke Park and was inspired

A glittering under-age career however seemed to grind to a halt as the Saffrons fell away at Senior level and Grace entered the Antrim Senior team as they annually experienced crushing defeats in the first round of the championship.

However she played a leading role as her club, Loughgiel Shamrocks, put together 3 successive County championships (1989-91) and then shot 2-6 as they collected the first of their two Ulster club titles in 1993 with a 5-7 to 1-6 victory over Bellaghy.

At UUJ she was an integral part of the back-to-back victories in the Ashbourne Cup (1992-93), the first earning her acclaim as the first - and only - camogie star to win the Ulster GAA Writers' monthly award. A third title followed in 1997, a year in which the talented forward was to pick up a host of medals - National Junior League, Maguire Cup, Ulster Senior Championship, All-Ireland Junior Championship and Ulster Club Championship with Loughgiel.

The All Ireland final, in which sister Mary became the first player to win a Junior medal after a Senior, was an emotion charged affair coming just 6 days after the death of their father. Her 3-3 from play in Croke Park, therefore, was all the more noteworthy. Later that year the GAA Writers selected her as Camogie Personality of the Year.

Based in Dublin until recently, Grace opted out of the county scene last year, but has just returned to the Antrim team in their bid to climb back into the Senior championship by lifting the All-Ireland Intermediate.







he camogie winner takes it all

N EVERY game there is a winner and a loser. Over a season there will ultimately

be only one winner, but many losers. This is particularly so, not so much in hurling any more with the back-door system, but it is the case still in camogic, as the championship is a knockout competition The Premiership in England is awarded to

the team that accumulates the most points in an entire season. A similar system exists for both English and Irish rugby (the latter have introduced play-offs in the final rounds), for Irish soccer, for Formula One - the story

With this system several teams can be equal on points and consequently there are fewer losers

The emphasis of the team's performance is on consistency and not just peaking for a series of knockout games.

There are some negative effects on a championship that is based on the knockout

Firstly, there is increased pressure on players and mentors to succeed at all costs.

Secondly, there are more losing teams because they cannot be equal on points in a

And, thirdly if knocked out early in a championship campaign, a team may get to play only one match. This lack of exposure to top class competition reduces their opportunity to learn from experience.

With this state of affairs it is not surprising that teams find it difficult to break out of a

This philosophy could be applied to Limerick who bowed out of the All-Ireland

Camogie Championship last weekend falling by 14 points to Galway.

The contrasting mood between the Shannonsiders and the Cork camp was, as expected, unbelievable.

Limerick's reaction to losing was almost to find proof that it hadn't happened. But it did, and that game will not go out of their heads for a long time. They were in with a shout at half time, but lost their way as Galway put their foot to the pedal.

Manager Brother Philip Ryan watched helplessly – despite the players hurling away – but they were already sitting on the bus

It's an awful anti-climax after all the effort that is put in. Going out in the first round is generally regarded as more devastating than exiting at the final hurdle. You have to socialise with the opposition, maybe buy them a pint while pretending it is not the end of the world, while all the time you couldn't have an emptier feeling.

Over near the east coast, Cork on the other hand were eestatic, after their victory over arch-rivals Kilkenny - this time the Cats didn't get to taste the cream. An emotional release from the demon of unfulfilled expectations - the ghost of Parnell Park eventually drowned by the Nore. Nowlan Park has been kind to Cork folk. The Dublin team was also caught in traffic and disembarked from their coach just seven minutes before the 4 o'clock official start time.


As it turned out, they had plenty of time to warm up in the fine sunshine and, for a few nervous minutes after the belated commencement, it looked as though they would make a match of it.



Féiling Great

THIS SUMMER THE FÉILE
NA NGAEL U14 COMPETITION CAME TO ULSTER
FOR THE FIRST TIME. MICK
DUNNE REPORTS ON A
WONDERFUL FESTIVAL
WHICH CELEBRATED
GAELIC GAMES, IRISH CULTURE AND ULSTER PRIDE

Picture the scene in Northern Ireland just a few days ahead of the dreaded marching season: a monster parade peacefully wends its way down one of Belfast's major thoroughfares, stepping-out to the music of several bands and proudly displaying their colourful banners. There's not an armoured car or Land Rover in sight; no police or military presence needed to corral hundreds of adults and their children lining the pavements along the route. And, marvellous to observe, there are no angry voices raised in violent protest. Surely a unique experience enriched by the light-heartedness and enjoyment of the occasion - and there hadn't been too many of those down the Andersonstown Road over the past three decades

Contrasting with the image of anarchy created by so many stormy northern parades in the past 30 years, this was a happy, joyous occasion because we were here to acknowledge the climax of Féile na nGael, the juvenile festival of hurling, camogie and handball, coming to their city after a previous day of intense competitions throughout the whole province of Ulster. The atmosphere on that bright and sunny afternoon at the end of June was one of the warmest northern welcome for teams of under-14s, and their accompanying adults. from every county in Ireland as well London and Warwickshire. The message was unmistakable: we're so glad you're here!

Feile na nGael was inaugurated three decades ago in Tipperary by the former president of the GAA, Seamus O Riain. He and the Tipp county secretary, Tommy Barrett, wished to bring young hurlers under 14 years together from all over Ireland to a festival "to learn and demonstrate the skills and arts of the ancient game". Camogie competition was added in 1974 and handball included from 1983, (Football in latter years has had its own separate Féile na nÔg.)

From the outset Feile na nGael was so successful that others counties sought to

stage it after the initial two years in Tipp and, over the years, it has moved around the country with each of the strong hurling counties taking it in turn, while Laois and Olfaly combined to run it jointly in 1988 and '89. It is fair to say that the movement launched by the two Tipperary officials has long since exceeded their early expectations and it is now the largest competition organised under the aegis of the GAA although, sadly, one of the least publicised proportionate to its range and size.

county winners start converging on host clubs, which arrange for the visiting players to be housed in their locality and then stage three rounds of matches on the Friday. Generally speaking all of this has, over the years, become relatively easy to organise thanks to the expertise and professionalism of Pat Guthrie, the long-time secretary of the national steering committee without whose input the tournament would not have endured for 30 years. Over time he has devised a smooth-running operation in which he leads the local committee in each host area. The 30th Féile, however, presented a very different proposition when it was decided that a province, not one or even two counties, would host the festival.

tee, says: "Our decision meant it was taking place in all nine counties, but in spite of the problems presented Féile na nGael 2000 was a dramatic success". Pat Guthrie declares: "Féile reached its full potential in Ulster with the 30th staging of the event. It was seen as a great reward for the outstanding work done in the promotion of hurling by the Ulster Hurling Committee and other individuals in the more difficult times in the province. The fact that all teams travelled to Ulster and fully participated in the games and took part in the parade on the Saturday was another tangible recognition of the trojan work done by the Ulster hurling enthusiasts.

"Oh, yes it was successful. It brought a bit of pride to the hurling people in Ulster who all along the line have been the poor relations. It proved that you didn't have to be one of the very, very big, or very strong areas of hurling to do something like this. We think it's going to be a big help in the future for smaller counties, not just in Ulster. We can see a time when two or three counties will get together in Connacht or lesser known parts for hurling in Leinster, and do the same thing. Everybody here seemed to get a great sense of enjoyment out of it and they felt they had now done something because our teams have been going south for the last 30 years and they've never had a chance to pay back the hospitality they got in other counties. It was a great chance for them to do that."

Paddy Mac Flynn complimented the clubs: "Their support was a big factor. It became evident from the meeting held in Belfast to launch Féile, when all the clubs

Hundreds of spectators came out to greet, and cheer, the massive parade of 3,500 people, comprising 3,198 young players from the 128 teams plus their chaperoning adults and 20 bands, and there was a joyous reaction and a hearty welcome from those onlookers. In the midst of what was for so long a troubled area this was an emotional occasion as Pat Guthrie reveals: "I have several reports from Belfast telling me that many men and women were seen weeping as the parade made its way from the St. Paul's pitch on the Shaw's Road to Casement Park. The parade meant more to the people on Andersonstown Road and to the Gaels of Ulster than to those who witnessed any one of the other 29 parades. held in the Republic".

"Three years ago we started looking for Féile," says John O'Reilly, a former Armagh county chairman who is vice-chairman of the provincial council and acted as chairman of the Ulster Féile Executive. "We never looked for it until we reached the stage where we thought that peace was beginning to come to the province because we wouldn't dream of asking anybody to come earlier. But we thought it would be a big fillip if we did get peace."

So it must have been more difficult than usual to organise a festival that took in all nine counties? "It was, in one perspective, a daunting prospect because of the amount of country we had to cover, but again that gave me a larger number of people to

from the province were represented, that a high level of commitment and enthusiasm existed at club level."

The Dungannon Eoghan Ruadh club is one of those very experienced in travelling to take part in Féile as club official Kieran McHugh points out. "We first went south in 1972 when a pick of Tyrone went to Emly in Tipp. The club won Division 4 in Wexford in '84 when we beat Adamstown of Wexford and we reached two other finals. Most of those boys would be the people who are now responsible for most of the hurling teams that are in Tyrone. Most of those from Dungannon and Carrickmore are all in administrative roles or are coaching with their clubs today. So we were delighted to be one of the clubs chosen to host a team. Ballinamore from Leitrim, and play a part in it. We have found down the years that the team that goes to Féile stays together: there is a great bonding among the lads. guys make great friendships for life."

In a sense it was fitting that Féile na nGael and the Gaelic games people of Ulster should come together in this millennium year. They have had such acutely contrasting fortunes over the past three decades: an era of increasing, resounding success for one, a period of the most distressing and tragic times for the other. Apart altogether from the playing of hurling, camogie and handball, it was gratifying and most enlightening to see the deeply grateful reaction of the Ulster folk to the

LONDON FALLING

DECREASING PLAYER NUMBERS AND INCREASING COSTS PUT LONDON CAMOGIE IN A NO-WIN SITUATION



n the last Saturday of July, the London campgie team pull out all the stops to entertain Cork, the reigning All Ireland junior champions, in the quarter-final of this season's All Ireland series.

The tradition of the game in the city is as old as emigration itself. Carnogie was revived in London in the mid '80s, the last match prior to this was recorded in 1957. With the formation of the London Irish carnogie club in 1985, Newham and Croydon Gaels a year later, a County Board was set up in 1986 to look after the clubs that were in existence.

It was in the winter of 1987 that a motion seeking entry into the All Ireland Club championship was passed. This motion was subsequently sanctioned at Annual Congress in Monaghan in the following months. In 1988 they played their first match at intercounty championship level - entertaining Kildare in conjunction with the London/Irish festival. London held the Lily Whites to three points. Unlike their male counterparts, they do not participate in the League.

Eleven clubs, made up of six senior sides and five junior, go to make up the London team - Tara, Brothers Pearse, Celts, Croydon, Erin go Brath, Fr Murphys, Green Isle, Islington Irish, London Irish, Sarsfields and Shamrocks.

But, inevitably, defeat has become almost an acceptable part of their Gaelic games with the chance of delivering victory as slim as ever. In general hurling, football and camogie are struggling. Gone are the days when emigration from this country was at its peak, and the majority of young people came together abroad to promote the game and hang on to their Irish culture. With the Celtic Tiger this well has now dried up, and if games are to prosper other measures will have to be taken for them to

The GAA have a new chairman, Larry O'Leary who hurls with the Cuchulainn club. Mary MacArthur is the camogie chairperson - formerly from Kildare but exiled since 1965. Relations are very strong between both codes, which according to Mary is vital to the survival of their games.

But, it will take more than good rapport to come to terms with the turbulence that can often develop when trying to run an organization. Ruislip is home to gaelic players in London. It has one pitch to cater for all needs, but initiatives are under way to develop the grounds. There is a crowd capacity of 4,000.

London camogie is in a no-win situation. Mary MacArthur agrees that it is near impossible to keep a team together: "We would love to play in the National League, but cost is a big issue," she says. "Originally, Connacht were happy to adopt us into their province. However, it is currently on the agenda and will be raised at Special Congress in October", she added.

It would appear that money is the big problem when it comes to deciding whether or not to play in the league. More games are needed for London to make their presence felt in official competition. In New York, John Kerry O'Donnell was one man who played a big part to strengthen the game. London camogie needs people of his kind to help them compete, travel and entertain in the world of sport.

Saturday July 29th is a red-letter day. Cork travel to Ruislip to defend their All Ireland title. They will be met by an enthusiastic and committed team who will take heart from the coming to town of the All Ireland champions.

Meanwhile, another milestone was reached in Ballyholland recently with the launch of this year's sponsorship of the All Ireland senior championship. The occasion also kickstarted the campaign with holders Tipperary having a comfortable victory over Down.

Foras na Gaeilge, formally known as Bord na Gaeilge, are continuing their association with the All Ireland championship. This organization is a 32 county-based body promoting the Irish language.

Present at the launch were Lorcan MacGabhann of Foras Na Gaeilge, President of the Camogie Association Pat Rafferty, Treasurer Jo Golden and National PRO Maire Ui Scolai. It was also unique, in so far as three former presidents - Belle O'Loughlin, Mary Lynch and Bridin Ui Mhaolagain - were there to join in the celebrations in County Down.
