CAMOGIE

OR THE fourth consecutive year, the Leinster postprimary schools senior CE tie championship final will be between two Kilkenny schools. This year the four semi-finalists came from Kilkenny. Sunday's showdown is at Nowlan Park.

The match is a repeat of last year's decider between the Loreto Secondary School and St. Brigid's College, Callan. The latter, the reigning champions, retain nine of last year's team. Their opponents have only six of their team.

By virtue of this, Callan are favourites, both teams contain many experienced junior and minir county players. The final is expected to be well contested.

The junior final is between Kilkenny and Wexford sides for the third consecutive year. The Wexford teams have won the last two finals.

The Presentation Convent are hoping to reverse the trend. They face a difficult task, as their opponents have on board eight of the Wexford under-14 team which won last year's championship.

Donie the prou Glen Rover

PPROPRIATELY, the flags over the old Clubhouse in Blackpool were at half-mast. And the coffin, resting before the altar in the Church of the Annuciation, was draped in the colours

In the congregation, great hurling men, some of them with heads streaked with grey, had gathered for

Donie O'Brien never won any county medals, and the final farewell. that was no fault of his because nature from the beginning struck him a cruel blow.

But he was as much a part of Glen Rovers as any of the famed wearers of the green, black and gold.

Every club has its characters, and for the Glen

Donie O'Brien was certainly one of those. During the great years, especially the fifties and sixties, Donie looked after the jerseys and the hurleys

for the teams. The sight of him shuffling along the sideline, clutching a batch of hurleys, was as familiar to the

Blackpool crowd as any of the famous players.

I have heard it said that but for his crippled legs, Donie himself would have made a fine hurler.

He had great arms and powerful wrists, and astonishing ball control. Up in the old Glen Field I watched him on many a

summer's evening as the team trained.

He would stand on the fringes of the action, retrieving stray balls, displaying great stickwork, despite his very limited mobility.

Indeed, as John Martin reminded me as we sat in the Bridge Inn after the removal on Saturday night, Donie trained a succession of Glen camogie teams.

e was a great mentor to and supporter of the camogie girls, and was delighted when the Glen - captained by Christy Ring's daughter, Mary -won the All-Ireland Club Championship last

Donie, who was 70, lived with his nephew, Joe Coker, at 37 Kileen's Place, Farranree, and never lost his interest in or enthusiasm for the Glen.

The club, in a way, was his life. And he was always there, through good times and bad.

He lived through the best of times with the Glen. and the demise of the senior team over the past decade must have broken his heart.

He saw the great sides, and savoured the famous

He talked once to me about the days of the sidecars and the crowds with the cup outside Molly Howe's pub. I can remember as a youngster rushing away from

"The Park" to be out in Thomas Davis Street before the sidecars arrived. They would arrive in a noisy caravan, hurleys and Glen jerseys held aloft. And Donie was always there,

one of the stories I like best is the one about the time Jack Lynch - who was then on his way to becoming a Minister - called to the old clubhouse in Bird's Quay.

This was a simple, single-storey house, one of a row that stood more or less where Antrim Flats are now located.

Jack parked the car outside Molly Howe's pub, put his head inside the door, and then strolled around the corner to the club.

Donie was inside, sitting behind a row of six or seven chairs which had been arranged in a semi-circle with their backs to a blazing fire.

Draped over the backs of the chairs were six or seven Glen jerseys which had just been washed.

Jack came in sat down beside Donie, lit his pipe,

and for over a hour the two of them chatted, taking their turns to turn the jerseys until the entire set was dry.


onic held all the Glen players of that era in high regard - while reserving a special for Christy Ring and Jerry O'Sullivan.

In his eyes these two symbolised better than anyone all that was special about the Glen - the indomitable spirit, the fierce competitiveness, the refusal at all times to settle for second best.

He knew Ring had no peer, and that we would

see his likes again.

Like the rest of us, he watched Ring with awe, knowing in his heart's core that the day was never lost as long as Ringey was around.

I caught a dimpse of Donie on that March day in 1979, when Christy was busied in the soil of his native

Tears were streaking his face as Jack Lynch spoke to the hushed crowd - and what a crowd - of Ring's

Six years later, in August 1985, he cried again when Jerry O'Sullivan died.

And the years would fall away as his remaiscences.

There is another story told about the time Donie and the jerseys were late for an important game. Club chairman Tom O'Reilly was beside bassed as the minutes ticked away, and still no sign of Donie or the bag.

Finally, a red-faced Donie peshed in the door a dressing-room only to be immediately guided and throttled by the enraged chairman.

fingers tightening around Doese's throit.

'UP THE BLUES'

Betty Mohally, R.I.P.

VERY appropriately, the above sentiments were among the last of the great 'Barrs stalwart Betty Mohally.

St. Finbarrs Hurling and Football Club lost a great friend and supporter recently on the death of Betty, president of both the camogie and ladies' sections.

Betty was, unquestionably, one of the greatest Barrs people of all time. She died in her 80's and, from the age of reason, every one of those years were crammed with fervour and ambition for the fortunes of her beloved "Blues". The club is 116 years old and Betty stuck with it through thick and thin for more than half its entire history. Her younger, middle and latter years were completely dedicated to the "Blues". She stood by the club and was always pillar of loyalty and legience. She shone like a bescon through those lean years when it was unfashionable to be a 'Barrs person, and, when success semed like a distant dream.

When, eventually, the club did strike a purple patch in the 70's/80's, she was always gracious about its success and remained magnanimous in victory. Having suffered disappointment herself for so long, she sympathised fully, and was always very sporting towards all opposition.

BRACKEN FAMILY

Sure, it's no wonder that she was such a fanatical "Trueblue" when one remembers that she was born a "Bracken". The Bracken family is, of course, associated with the founding of the club. Her fanaticism was well and truly enshrined in the "Barrs" tradition when she married Billy Mohally (R.I.P.), himself a great southsider and "Barrsman".

In her latter years her bones became brittle and she often suffered a broken arm of leg. However, these things did not deter this great-hearted lady. She could be seen at club matches and occasions, on crutches, being helped along by members of her most devoted family.

Around this time she also became very prominent in the club affairs when she held various officerships. She was a founder member and chairperson of the ladles' section for some years. She could be seen on the one hand working in the kitchen providing meals for the various sections, and, on the other hand, sitting at the place of honour at the club's annual dinner.

A most deserving tribute was paid to her when, as she began to tire a little from front line activity, both the ladies and camogie sections elected her as their president — an office which she cherished proudly and filled with graciousness right up to the time of her death.

"HAPPY"

She will surely be remembered mostly for her comment after her club had won the "double" — the senior hurling and football county finals — in 1980 when she delcared: "Now I can die happy!"

Perhaps, the most fitting tribute of all was the final one at her funeral. Her coffin was draped with the club flag, and Betty would have been so proud of the way that her hearse was flanked by a guard of honour drawn from the girls of the camogie section along with her colleagues of the ladies' section - the first lady member ever to receive such honours. The entire club followed Betty to her final resting place in St. Finbarr's Cemetery --- only a puck of a sliotar away from the club grounds from where her spirit will forever be at one with the Barrs of the future.

I have no doubt but that Betty is now being welcomed into Heaven by her great Barrs friends whom she helped and encouraged in this life, and, who have gone before her, and, that she is now safe in the Arms of Jesus

CAMOGIE COLUMN

WITH MARY MORAN

THE 1993 Open Draw is almost a carbon copy of last season's competition for All-Ireland Senior Champions Cork. The same obstacles in the form of Antrim and Kilkenny lie in their path to the final but the venues are reversed.

Cork made the long trek to Cushendall where they made light work of a weak Antrim side. It would be a major surprise if Antrim were to oust the reigning champions at a Cork venue.

Kilkenny, who surrendered their title following a superb seven year run, travel to Kildare for what should be a comfortable first round assignment for them. Kildare collected points early in the senior league last season but were out of their depth against Cork in the National League semi-final.

Should these matchs go as expected, the way would be clear for another Cork v. Kilkenny showdown. However, Cork would have to face their old rivals at Nowlan Park on this occasion. This could prove to be the game of

the championship. A huge crowd would turn up to see if 1992 was a mere lapse in Kilkenny's winning streak or the start of a decline in the great side. Cork waited so long for the breakthrough and worked so hard to become champions that they will want more than one title before stepping down.

Galway, Dublin and Wexford feature in the other side of the draw. Wexford will be keen to wipe out the memory of a season which promised much but finished in disappointment. The potential to be champions is there.

Galway have excelled in colleges, minor and junior grades but have not quite put it together at senior level. The All-Ireland Intermediate Championship victory will have boosted Dublin's confidence but they may not be ready to lift the senior title just yet. Before the championship comes around, the fifteen aside pilot scheme for the National League will have been introduced. This departure from the regular twelve-a-side game will give the counties an opportunity to experiment and to try out fringe players before the championship.

Ulster Colleges Council celebrate their Golden Jubilee this season. Ulster were first to organise championships at provincial level. St. Louis, Ballymena, St. Dominic's, Belfast and Dominican, Portstewart were to the fore in the early years.

ST. MARY'S, CHARLEVILLE have a very impressive record since camogie was introduced to the School in 1984, less than ten years ago. As well as numerous Cork Colleges titles, they have won a total of eleven Munster Colleges titles - 3 senior, 3 junior, 3 7-a-side and 2 First Year.

St. Mary have four All-Ireland Colleges titles to their credit. In 1986, they collected their first All-Ireland junior title at the expense of today's opponents F.C.J. Bunclody. In the following season, they retained their junior title and added the All-Ireland 7-a-side trophy. The All-Ireland 7-a-side cup remained in Charleville in 1988. Therefore, today's teams have proud tradition to follow. Much of the credit for this success must go to the untiring work and dedication of Sr. Margaret and Vincent Harrington.

Several past pupils have worn the green and white of Limerick with distinction. Frances Broderick and Helen Cagney won Gael-Linn medals with Munster.

ST. BRIGID'S, CALLAN can trace their links with camogie to the foundation of the School in 1949. Camogie has been the main sport in the School ever since. St. Brigid's contested their first All-Ireland Colleges Senior final in 1975 but lost out to Presentation, Athenry in extra time. 1990 was a year to remember for Callan. They won the All-Ireland Colleges junior title in style. The majority of that side will challenge for senior honours today.

The School has contributed greatly to Kilkenny's success over the years. Among its past pupils are Ann Carroll, Olive O'Neill, Angela Downey, Ann Downey, Breda Holmes, Deirdre Malone and Breda Cahill. They hope to become the sixth school to win both All-Ireland Colleges senior and junior titles. Their coach, Noelle O'Driscoll has won All-Ireland Senior medals with both Cork and Kilkenny.

F.C.J. BUNCLODY has long tradition of involvement in Colleges Camogie, guided in the initial years by Lily Ralph. The School has dominated camogie in Co. Wexford from the early eighties. The F.C.J.'s have consistently won the honour of representing the county in Senior, Junior and Minor provincial competitions. Four Minor Leinster titles, five Junior titles and five Leinster Senior A titles in a row were won during this period.

The School has produced some fine inter-county players like Stella Sinnott, Jackie Codd, Paula Rankin and Anne Marie O'Connor. The strength of Camogie in the School is reflected in the fact that at least one Leinster title has been won every year for the last ten years.

Defeats in four All-Ireland finals and five All-Ireland semi-finals have not diminished their resolve to win their first All-Ireland Camogie title. P.E. teachers, Rory Kinsella and Caitriona Caulfield have been successfully coaching school teams since their arrival in 1981.

Bridin Ui Mhaolagain

n the Camogie scene this week we focus attention on the President of the Association Bridin Ui Mhaolagain. Bridin is entering her final year of a three year stint. A daughter of Seamus Dobbyn - who played hurling for Antrim and was Chairman of Ulster G.A.A. Council -Bridin learned the skills and rules of camogie from both her parents. Her mother Brid McCamphill played camogie for Dunloy, Co. Antrim. Bridin also played for Dunloy and won several Senior Championship medals with the Antrim club.

At St. Louis Convent, Monaghan, she captained the school team in the interschool Championship. On leaving school, Bridin joined the C.I.E. club in Dublin where she won Senior Championship and League honours.

In 1956 she transferred to U.C.D. and in 1958 captained the successful Ashbourne and combined Universities teams. During the following years she won 'five in a row' Ashboume medals.

Bridin married Aidan Mulligan, himself a life-long follower of camogie. They both became camogie coaches in 1973 and coached for several years in their respective schools.

Our sister Gaelic sport, handball, absorbed her energy in the years that followed. As a keep-fit exercise she found it invaluable and realised soon that handball was a sport for all, at all ages. She became President of Comhairle Liathroid Laimhe na mBan and held that position on and off for ten eventful years. She was instrumental in the introduction of Ladies' Handball at International level.

Her experience in administration lead to her election as President of C.C.I.A., Comhaitle Chamogaíochta na nInstitiuidí um Ard Oideachas, following in the footsteps of her friend, mentor and confidant, the late and former President Agnes Purcell. C.C.I.A. administers the game of camogie at third level colleges. Twenty colleges participate in highly competitive tournaments. The main competitions are the Ashbourne Cup - the oldest of all in the history of Camogie, the Purcell Cup and the League competitions. Bridin hopes to see much greater involvement in the promotion of camogie at all third level colleges.

Teaching in Ballymun Comprehensive School, Bridin emphasises the importance of sport in character development. She would like to see schools and clubs organise a Camogie Day to raise funds for charitable projects at home and

While a C.C.I.A. Representative on Central Council for five years, Bridin became a member of the administration committee. She took part in National Seminars throughout the country. She emphasises the importance of good guidance in administrative skills at all

At Congress 1991, held in Cork, Bridin was elected Uachtaran of Cumann Camogaiochta na nGael, the largest sporting body for ladies, that boosts 60,000 members. This honour is the pinnacle of her sporting ambition and she is aware of the status and great privilege of this high

A native Irish speaker, Bridin would like to promote a greater appreciation of our language and culture among the members of

seek and attain for the Association, membership of Oireachtas na Gaeilge, the premier Irish cultural festival.

The development of camogie at schools level is the lifeblood of the Association. Resources in the form of helmets, now mandatory for underage players, camogie sticks and promotional material are constantly needed at school levels. Bridin's ambition, in this area, is to have Bilingual posters available to promote the use of Irish - so dear to her heart. The enthusiasm, standard of skills and spirit of competition amongst the young players, as was evident at Feile na nGael, is a credit to their trainers, teachers and mentors.

Bridin is always aware of the importance of the image of our National sport on and off the pitch. She constantly reminds young players of this important aspect of our game.

Coaching, training in all areas of the game, and especially refereeing, are of paramount importance to the success of

all matches and it would be desirable to have these areas standardised throughout the country. Great efforts are constantly being made to achieve this aim. Coaching, training, refereeing and administration courses are an ongoing feature of the Camogie Association. The results of these are evident in the high standard and excellent displays of skills

The tragedy of emigration has left it's mark throughout the camogie population but thankfully, "it's an ill wind that blows no good", for the Association has now a vibrant international dimension: camogie is now being played in London, Birmingham and as far away as North America and Australia. These clubs are affiliated to Central Council and have contributed greatly.

The development of Camogie is largely dependent on Government rants but, to fulfil our responsibilities successfully and maintain the highest standards in all aspects of the game, sponsorship is urgently needed to supplement the grant. Bridin will endeavour to obtain an increase in the grant and encourage sponsorship.

Indeed, it would be a challenging thesis for any student to assemble a complete volume of the contributions of families in any one county! But wherever and whenever such lists are compiled, the Colemans from Ballyglunin, Tuam, Co Galway, will be very much to the fore.

There are four in focus: Joe, Mattie, Michael, and Ann, the pretty one.

Joe devotes his time and energy to Abbeyknockmoy Club, of which he is Chairman, and Manager of their senior hurling team. He did service in both codes with his native county, but his greatest love was always hurling. With Mattie and Michael, he assisted Abbeyknockmoy win the



Galway senior hurling title in 1988, a year that was, arguably, the best that western hurling men have known. Joe continues to be the driving force in an area passionately devoted to the skills of the caman.

Mattie was a regular on the Galway senior football team from 1979 to 1987. He qualified for that status on winning All-Ireland minor honours in '76 and went on to accumulate five Connaught championships, a National league title ('82) and an All-Ireland runner-up medal (v Dublin, '83).Last year he was the star of the Monivea-Abbeyknockmoy team which won the Galway senior football championship for the first time, and is one of the select few

to have collected senior football and junior hurling medals with one club in Co. Galway.

Michael has devoted his career almost exclusively to hurling, and from his earliest years at St Jarlath's College, through the completion of his studies at UCG, he was obviously bound for glory. It is exceedingly difficult in our limited space to enumerate all of the sporting achievements of the Economics Graduate who is now an Executive with the A.C.C. in Galway.

Back in '83 he won All-Ireland Under-21 honours playing at centre forward (marking Nicholas English, no less). Two years later All-Ireland Intermediate honours followed, and that memorable year of '88 saw him add the county, All-Ireland Senior, and Railway Cup medals to his collection. That latter trophy came a third time in '91. Between times there was a National League medal and All-Ireland runner-up trophy (both '89). There were countless accolades for this most consistent of players, but the two he treasures most are his Allstar awards of '89 and '90.

Ann Coleman, of course, learned the skills of the caman side by side with her brothers. She is the holder of two All-Ireland camogie medals. The first of these she won in 1988 when Galway won the National Junior crown and last year she was one of the stars of the Glen Rovers (Cork) team that beat Rathnure (Wexford) in the All-Ireland Senior Club decider.

CAMOGIE CONGRESS 1993

Extracts from Síle De Bhailis, Ardrúnaí, Cumann Camógaíocht na nGael, report to Congress 1993. The opening paragraph of Stair na Camógaíochta reminds us of the idealism with which Cumann Camógaíochta na nGael was founded in 1904.

GAELSPORT CAMOGIE REPORT

"Camógaíochta was born in 1904 of a spirit of national resurgence and an awakening of the women of Ireland to a realisation of their destiny in the shaping of a Gaelic nation... giving formal expression to centuries of tradition in the realm of Irish games and pastimes."

The short history of our Association is itself an expression of enduring idealism, commitment, unity of purpose despite divergence of opinion, development and expansion through difficult times. If we are to continue the game of Camôgaiocht itself, treat its development as a priority, respect the tules of the Association, and realise that the general good is far more important than the perceived gain to any individual or unit.

1992 saw a swing in favour of Güige Mumhan with eight of the nine All-freland titles going to that province. The one exception was the inaugural Intermediate title going to Ath Cliath. Coreaigh emerged as the leading county with three titles to its credit, followed by Tiobraid Arann with two, and Luimneach with one. This success was reflected in the success of Güige Mumhan in both the senior and junior Gael Linn.

Goiste Londain reports continued progress in face of difficulties similar to those in other counties. The difficulties of this Goiste are compounded by the inadequacy of regular inter-county competition. In spite of this, the standard

of both its county team and its Club Champions, Tara, was extremely high. With sufficient competition at this level, our London teams could well grace Croke Park on All-Ireland finals day.

An Oige: Camógaíocht, under the guidance of C.C.L.A. continues to develop in third-level Colleges with an increase in the number of affiliated Colleges and a levelling of overall standards. A welcome development is the number of students opting for theses on Camógaíocht as part of appropriate degree courses. Of even more importance to the future of the game is the number of students of Physical Education who are activeby involved in Camógaíocht.

Despite meetings with the Sports Department in R.T.E. months prior to the All Ireland finals, despite agreement of the type of coverage which would be appropriate, and despite further communication, we were not accorded coverage on the Sunday night for the first time in years. Subsequent apologies from RTE did not lesson the disappointment. It is expected that the situation will improve in 1995.

The referees uniform was in use at the All-Ireland finals. It was worn with distinction by Maire Ui Pholaird, Portlairge, and Aine Derham, Ath Cliath. It is hoped that, in time, each club will have at least one as club property, and that individual referees will also be interested in having the official uniform.

The name of Una Ui Phuirséil is synonymous with the development of Camógaíocht at almost every level of the Association. Ardcomhairle felt it was fitting that the Intermediate Cup be named in her honour.

The work of Sub-Committees is set out in detail in their reports, but your attention is drawn to certain aspects which will require your whole-hearted support and commitment

The referees Committee will ask for definite progress in the are of establishing Referees Committees, where such has not already been done, at the various levels. It will also ask you to facilitate its work through sending your referees to its planned seminars and courses.

The Coaching Committee report refers to the important role which will be played by the National Coaching and Training Centre in the future development of coaching in general. Since the report was compiled, the director and the head of Coach Education in N.C.T.C. met Milire Ni Mhóráin and myself with a view to ascertaining our future coaching needs and the way in which they could assist our Association.

The administration Committee outlines its plans for the future. Again it is hoped that there will be a positive response from the various units. You may feel that the workload of officers militates against attendance at seminars and courses, but the theme running through those courses include proposals on lightening and spreading that very workload.

All of us at the various levels would be enabled to turn the necessary attention to planning and development if the Association as a whole renewed its commitment to the ideals and aims enshrined in our Constitution. Our purpose is to promote our own Irish game and to hand it on to the next generation, all too often promotion and development are impeded and side-tracked through losing sight of the central issue, the game itself. Ours is a voluntary-run organisation based on goodwill, commitment, and love of camogic. Should such be eroded, we will be diverted from our main objective that of the promotion of Camógaíocht.


