

After living apart for four years, the couple decided to travel to Australia together for a year. "It was the best year of our lives," said Lynn



# A History of Camogie in County Tipperary

he centenary of An Cumann Camógaiochta, the Camogie Association, will be celebrated next year. Perhaps camogie was a bit late coming into existence, over twenty years after the formation of the G.A.A., but it reflected society's attitude to women participating in sport. Women's participation in the Olympics didn't begin until 1908, when they could enter archery competitions. Four years later they were allowed into one swimming event, the hundred metres free style, and not until 1928 at Amsterdam were they allowed into athletics events. It could, therefore, be said that the women of the Gaelic League were revolutionaries, when they sent young ladies chasing a ball around a field with sticks in their hands.

Camogie was an extension of Gaelie League activities. The Keating Branch of the Gaelic League in Dublin had excellent hurling and football teams. The female members of the league were great supporters of the men's teams. In the year 1903 some of the members of the branch thought it a good idea to have some sporting activity for the girls. Camogie was the result, a form of hurling for women. The gaelie scholar, Tadgh O Donoghue, suggested camóguidheacht for the proposed new game, and Dublin All-Ireland footballer, Seamus O Braonáin, later Director of Radio Eireann, drew up a code of rules based on hurling, but modified to suit female play-

The first public game of camogic to be played was at a Gaelic League Aeridheacht at Navan on July 17, 1904. The teams were from the Keating Branch of the Gaelic league, and another side that played under the name, Cuchullains. Two thousand people attended. The report in the local paper gave the game banner headlines. The final score was Keatings I-0 Cuchullains 0-0.

#### FIRST GAME AT NENAGH

The game of camogic was introduced to Tipperary in 1906, when two Dublin clubs, Keatings and Ard Craobh, played an exhibition match in conjunction with a hurling tournament at Nenagh. The visit was probably intended to encourage camogie at local level. Keatings defeated Ard Craobh by 1-1 to 0-0 on August 12. A report on the match had this comment: 'It was, however, the opinion of many prominent Gaels that the existing rules are not suitable for the ladies, and it was suggested that some slight changes could be made to safeguard the fair camogs from their own sexual inexperience.

The revision should provide against raising the hurley above the elbow.

This alteration would not only enable the ladies to field better, but would be a safeguard against accidents."

The first inter-county game of camogie was played between Dublin and Louth in July 1912. In the following year Kilkenny traveled to Cork to challenge the home side. However, almost twenty years were to elapse before an intercounty championship got under way.

#### FIRST COUNTY BOARD

The game of camogie in Tipperary was organised for the first time in 1932 and Dan Breen, the War of Independence hero, played an

important part in the organization. He returned from the U.S. early in 1932, and addressed the County Convention at Thurles. He spoke of the strength of the games in New York, and also about the game of camogie there. Soon afterwards it was announced that a camogic county board was about to be formed in the county, and that a camogie championship was to be organised. The medals for the championship were donated by Breen, and the championship came to be known as the 'Breen Medals'. In fact some of his political opponents claimed his presentation of medals for purely for political purposes!

## THE FIRST COUNTY TEAM

The first team to represent Tipperary in camogic played in the Tailteann Games in 1932. Trial teams were chosen and the match was played at Golden.

Afterwards a selection committee appointed by the county board selected the best fifteen to represent the county in the Tailteann Games against Connacht at Croke Park on July 3. After the game the teams were entertained to tea in the City Hall, Cashel and were afterwards taken to see the places of historic interest in and around the City of the Kings. At night they were the guests of the Cashel and Golden camogie clubs at a dance held in the City Hall.

The team selected was as follows: Misses Maureen Flanagan, Molly Minogue (capt.), Peg Young. Toomevara, P. Gorman, M. O'Brien, Cashel, Meany. O'Connell, Clonmel, M. Ryan, J. Hackett, Ardmayle, M. Witherow, S. Moroney, The Blues, Thurles, B. Lanigan, The Mitchels, Thurles, M. Collins. Templemore, Ciss Daly, Roscrea. The team, representing Munster, were beaten, 3-4 to 2-0, by Connacht at Croke Park on July 3. S. Moroney scored the two goals for Tipperary. # A history of Camogie continued

#### THE FIRST COUNTY **CAMOGIE FINAL 1932**

The first county camogie final Boherlahan Coolmoyne attracted great interest. It was a pity it had to be played so deep in the winter, on January 15, 1933. The venue was the Sportsfield, Thurles and admission was 6d, with the stand as much more. The referee was Sean O Riain, Roscrea, the chairman of the board. An advertisement, 15cm x 10cm appeared in the Tipperary Star and it included the information that a Ceilidhe Mhor would take place the same night in the Confraternity Hall, Thurles, where dancing would last from 8 pm to 3 am, during which Dan Breen, T.D. would present the medals. What the players, mentors and supporters were to do between the end of the match, 3.45pm, and the commencement of the dance wasn't explained. Transport was rather primitive in those days.

The day was fine but cold and a large crowd attended. The ball was thrown in by the chairman of the G.A.A. county board, Rev. J. J. Meagher. The play was even enough but the report states that the Boherlahan forwards missed many chances, while their backs didn't hold their positions. Coolmoyne were ahead at the interval by 2-0 to nil. Early in the second half Coolmoyne scored a third goal and when it appeared that Boherlahan were losing heart their feelings were relieved a little when Josie Walsh scored a great goal from a free. However, it was to be their only score. Coolmoyne had another point to give them a comfortable margin of victory by

#### PREJUDICE AGAINST WOMEN IN SPORT

The girls who started playing the game of camogie in 1903 and 1904, had to overcome a lot of prejudice against women in sport. It was behind closed doors to some extent that the girls got their first lessons from the men, and had their first practices in Drumcondra Park. A place they had to themselves. So great was the bias at the time that the girls going to practise carried their sticks hidden under coats, or made up into neat brown paper parcels. They soon got tired of the enclosed space and went along to the Phoenix Park, where the game soon caught on

#### CAMOGIE IN NEW YORK EARLY THIRTIES

In a preview of the All-Ireland camogie final of 1953 there is an appreciation of the work of Sean O'Duffy, the Mayo man who devoted his lifetime to the organisation of camogie. It relates how O'Duffy found himself in New York in 1930, a member of the Tailteann Council. 'Seeing a match billed for Innisfail Park, between Offaly and Cork, Sean made straight for the grounds. Immediately he entered he was greeted by that grand old Tipperary gael, the now almost legendary 'Wedger' Meagher of Toomevara.

Need I say that the national Organiser of Camogie had the honour of refereeing the game. . . . While in the United States he met many famous Tipperary exiles, all of whom helped to make Ireland's game for women more widely

While the players from Tipperary, Cork, Clare and Galway who are competing on Sunday have put in months of training and preparation, do you ever think about those behind the scenes who work to ensure that Cumann Camogaiochta and all it entails runs efficiently? Do you know who they are? Do you know who the President of Cumann Camogaiochta is? or who is Ard Stiurthoir? Are you aware that the association will celebrate its'centenary in 2004? The camogie association has a membership of approximately 100,000,the largest female sporting organisation in Ireland.

While both the Camogic Association and the Ladies Gaelic Football Association are working with the GAA towards greater integration, they run their own business. Galway are involved in the camogie and hurling, apart from that, camogic and hurling usually attract spectators from the same catchment areas. Back to the women at the helm of camogie. The current president, Miriam O'Callaghan from Offaly came into office at the last congress. She also served as president of the colleges council for four years putting a lot of effort and emphasis on developing the game at that level. Miriam was one of a six- person committee that produced the develpoment report for camogie in the new millennium.

The Ard Stuirtheoir of Cumann Camogaiochta is Dubliner Sile Wallace, based in Croke Park. Sile, like her counterpart Liam Mulvihill in the GAA, is responsible for the overall management of the association. Her brief is wide and demanding. The buck stops with Sile. She is the axis from which the camogie branches out to every club. Definitely not a nine to five job. Apart from her own demanding schedule Sile has to fit in with the availability of the vol-untary sector of the association in terms of meetings and availability. She is actively involved in leading the association in the integration programme with ladies football and the GAA. Sile took up her present role in 1986 and has initiated and implemented many new ideas. She has seen the membership grow to its' present impressive number. Particularly busy right now with the all Ireland finals approaching, a normal day includes, meetings with RTE, the Stadium Manager and staff, dealing with the competing counties and finalising arrangements for the

New kid on the block is Sinead O'Connor, sponsorship and financial manager. This is an exciting appointment to meet the needs of a changing association. Former Kilkenny and UCD star, Jo Golden held the position of treasurer for a number of years in a voluntary capacity. She did a very competent job. 

# The Future is Orange

n the early '90's, Armagh were considered one of the top Camogie counties in Ireland. Junior and Intermediate All-Ireland Championship successes, along with National League titles, and much Ulster glory put them in a position to challenge the kingpins from Cork and Kilkenny. The pundits predicted success. Then something happened. The Orchard County went from one extreme to another. From All-Ireland Champions they failed to field...

Something had to be done...step forward Maggie McKee.

After a successful inter-county career as Armagh's 'last line of defence' the inevitable retirement came around for the Derrynoose stalwart. A spell as an inter-county coach compounded a problem area that had been generally ignored by many of the Ulster Counties. The gap in skill levels in underage, and the 16-18 age group, was glaring.

"It was then that I realised the work that had to be done. Now that my playing days were over, I felt I could contribute, but the work had to start in the area of most neglect - the kids. I had spoken to coaching colleagues in other counties who had realised long before me that a huge problem existed."

In 2002, Maggie McKee became the new Chairperson of the Armagh

Board and with her team in place a new dawn has emerged. As Maggie sees it the future will be bright and will be orange. "I often said as a player that one day I would Chair Armagh. It has always been an ambition, but as a player I never looked beyond my own needs and didn't look at the big picture. I now realise we need to work in many areas to have a successful and healthy future and what worked a generation ago does not apply. Times have changed and as an association we need to change with them."

Maggie has played Camogie all her life and next to her husband of twenty-five years, Paddy and her five children, it is her life. She laughs as she describes the perfect partnership. "Twenty- five years of passing each other in the hallway seems to have worked for us! To be honest Paddy is my anchor. Everywhere I went whether to play for club or County, Paddy has been there one hundred percent. I would never have been able to give the time if Paddy did not support me."

Originally from Middletown Co. Armagh, the young Maggie Connolly moved to Keady and played for St. Patrick's Youth Club until getting married at 18. "The only time away from the pitch was in 1979 when my first son Pat was born. The other four children followed like steps on stairs," said Maggie

A late calling to the County ranks came in 1990 at the age of 31. She went on to play in Croke Park in 1993, guarding the net for a draw against a highly fancied Galway side. Today's Armagh Senior Manager, Ursula McGivern, also played a key role. The replay in Breffni Park erupted in celebrations never before witnessed in Ulster. Armagh City was brought to a standstill as an open sided lorry paraded the heroes through packed streets. Unbelievable scenes that Maggie would love to return to.


"We lost by a few points in this year's semi-final of the Junior All-Ireland Championship and the girls were gutted, but we did beat Antrim in the Ulster Senior Championship and look forward to the final. I think Armagh have finally turned a corner. We had so much success but others on the outside looking in knew it was not sustainable. Why did we fail to field for two years in a row after 1993 and Intermediate success in "94...? Well many reasons, but no development at underage and a closed shop at the top eventually left the county stagnating. The important thing is that we learn and move on.

As a County Board we are looking at all the aspects of running our sport. Funding is a major problem, but it should never be used as an excuse to do nothing. We have started to run our sport as a business. I think we are the only Camogie county to design and merchandise our uniform. We have a number of business outlets selling our kit and it has proved very successful for all concerned.

We also have a blueprint in place for the schools and intend to create Camogie Development Officer posts in this vital area. Primary and post-primary is where the Board needs to concentrate its efforts. It's too late at twelve, it just doesn't come naturally and we'll end up with the same old bad habits. The clubs in Armagh are fully behind what we are trying to do We pick the brains of other visionaries in other.

The important area of promotion is in the hands of our PRO. Elleen Canavan, she is a real star. We have a steady flow of information in the papers which is very important in terms of selling the sport and of course our sponsors especially Mone Fuels who have been our county sponsors for the last two years."

Once again, the 'feel good' factor is returning to Armagh Camogie. With development plans in the pipeline and people of the calibre of Maggie at the helm, the future does indeed look orange!

ary O'Connor knows no bounds. She has been playing inter-county football and camogie with the Rebel County for the past ten years and still wants more. Little wonder too that the 26-year-old is employed as the East Cork Juvenile Coaching Development Officer and just loves everything about sport. However, as with all dual players there are problems. Seven is not enough days in any one week and Sundays should come round more often.

"I was captain of the ladies football team this year and it was a real sickener when both the Camogie and Football League Finals clashed. As if that was not bad enough it happened again when the dates were announced for the first round of the Championships. I was being made to choose all the time, which I think is very unfair."

More unreasonable it would seem was that Mary played in the Camogie final - it was a titanic struggle to overcome Tipperary - opting not to travel to Ennis to play Roscommon and then later that day learning not only had she missed out on captaining Cork to a Division Two football win, but that she was also overlooked as a player when the medals were being dished out. "That was a big gripe with me. Okay I did not expect to get a medal over a player, but steps should have been taken so that the situation should never have arisen in the first place. Both

knew the predicament - definitely Ladies
Football did - but there was no budge. Cork
tried but the Munster Ladies Football Council
would not change the game. I think there are
enough Saturdays and Sundays in the year
and both organisations should come together
prior to the season and jointly pencil in their
dates. The way it is at the moment does not
give me any chance to play.

I give my allegiance to Camogie simply because there is better commitment from the players here in Cork. I joined the senior county panel in 1996 and these were good times. We won the All-Ireland the following two years. Growing up it was always my number one and I genuinely prefer it. But I have the energy for both. It does not bother me to stay in on a Saturday night."

Not withstanding that the role of the double star is massively dwindling, the Donoughmore footballer still maintains that there should be a niche for girls if they wish to partake in both games.

"There are six girls presently on the Cork Camogie panel who are equally as good at football and I feel it is unfair to make them select one sport at such a young age when they have the talent for the two. It is not fair on the mentors either from both sides - some days they have players and others they don't. If these girls are made choose it would probably be Camogie and that is a big loss to football in the county."

I made the point that like the GAA, where both hurling and football are operated under separate management, it would be difficult for both Camogie and Ladies Football associations to find enough dates to fulfil their fixture list. Thus the lads have to decide on one or the other.

"Point taken and I do realise that it is difficult with the increased amount of matches. Maybe it could start at club level - it must be possible to cater for both. For the sake of the counties and the clubs something has to be done. It should certainly be open for discussion.

There are more players than me. My colleague Briege Corkery, Meadhbh Nash from Limerick and Noelle Cummins in Clare are all in similar situations. I am asking the powers that be to come together - maybe start with the Provincial Councils and progress to Central Council level.

I love all that is good about Gaelic. I love training, making new friends and meeting the gang. We travel all over the country and I think it is so important for young girls to be involved in the GAA - be it Camogie or Ladies Football. All I am asking for is to have the choice to participate in both."

ARIE COSTINE is one of a family of 14, seven sisters and seven brothers. But she is also one of a hundred greats, and was recently recognised as one of the hundred greatest sports heroes of Cork.

The Cloyne woman is the holder of eight Cork Senior championship medals. She captained Cloyne to win the Cork Intermediate Camogie Championship of 1973 when her six sisters also played in the same team.

That occasion is one that stands out in my memory, and indeed all our memories," says Marie.

"Another would be the Junior County Final against Eire-Og when hundreds of spectators were leaving the stands with 10 minutes to go, when hey presto, I scored one goal and Ber scored two goals within three minutes.

"Mine have been put at the back of the presses," jokes Bunny, mother of the famous

It is well known in sporting

Marie Costine ranks as one of the most accomplished full backs ever to grace the game of camogie. She read the game intelli-gently and positioned herself ideally to gain possession or put in a telling tackle. Tall, strong and very mobile, she had superb ball control that enabled her to get out of the most difficult situations.

"All those skills came from playing with my brothers and sisters, says Marie, "And, of course, from all the other kids as well, who lived in the terrace when I was growing

up."
Marie was also privileged
to be trained by the King of
the sliother, Christy Ring.
"He was brilliant," says

"He used to get us to strike the sliother from various distances and land in a bucket

which he kept moving.
"I used to practice that for hours by myself.

"Christy always sent me in-to goal and at first his shots were very tame, but when they gathered momentum, they went past me like bullets. Christy always advised me that wrist work was vital and I tried always to take his advice."

"He'd come over to me, when he was no more than a toddler and I got him to aim the ball at the bucket, just like Christy Ring taught

Marie says her dedication for the game was definitely motivated by her mother and

They encouraged us to play sport from an early age, and all of us, whether it be camogie, football, tennis or volleyball, have excelled through the years as a result.

"I remember when Mam couldn't get a spin to one of our matches, she'd hire a car," says Marie.

"The present players are a lot fitter, but to me the attendances at games have not improved that much from my

"All the young people of today want to do is watch television and play on their computers and I think a lot of outdoor sports are suffer-ing in a big way," says Marie.

Marie retired at the age of 40 after giving 20 years of

playing service at the top. "I enjoyed every minute of it. Camogie gave me friends, a social life, many happy memories and many achieve-ments to be proud of."

THE MARATHON EXPERIENCE

T WAS the Jazz weekend in Cork and we were leaving for Dublin with a plastic bag of fruit and bottles of water. We had dodged the obvious questions and feeling good about ourselves. This was a lifelong dream. I had always wanted to run a marathon. A full marathon. Not a 5k, 10k or even half marathon. The full monty.

Eight months previously in the gym where else? — I suggested as much to my friend, Geraldine Barry, a fitness trainer. We agreed to give it a go. Hours of great long runs were going to prepare us for our first marathon experience on the October Bank Holiday Monday. Or that was the theory

Holiday Monday. Or that was the theory. In training, the longest haul was 18 miles. Castlemartyr to Cork was our first long-distance run — up to then I regarded this place as nothing more than an East Cork GAA venue, now it will haunt me as the ghost town that propelled me into marathon frenzy.

We planked six bottles of water on the way down — our first lesson was a harsh one as we only found three on the way back. Nine males of hallucinating and our marriage was

Most people told us that 20 miles would be adequate training as the Dublin marathon was one of the flattest and easiest routes to negotiate. True, it is horizontal, but it is still 26.2 miles. I will never forget the last fifth of a mile because when your feet bleed and you have blisters like quail eggs, this is extra yardage you can do without. In fact, I will never forget the 6.2 miles — a torture chamber must hold more appeal.

We booked into the Mespil Hotel on Baggott Bridge and arrived on Sunday at noon—we were greeted by marathon mania. It seemed like the entire 8,000 athletes had booked into the same hotel. Big lanky men in black Lycra numbers staring at the two novices dressed for Temple Bar hastened our exit to the RDS for registration where we listened intently to various speakers including Catherina McKiernan about her wins in the Berlin, London and Amsterdam marathons.

The best of all was Brendan O'Shea, who as a veteran of over 100 marathons told us we could drink alcohol after the race — two beer shandies would, in fact, be good for us. You will grab at anything in the darkest

We also learned of the seven deadly marathon stages — ritual, shock, denial, isolation, despair, euphoria, and the seventh is a repeat of all of the above. This made us giddy and think of Brad Pitt, but it was all too real, as we would learn.


Sunday evening turned into Pasta Party Night. Every restaurant around Ballsbridge had buckets of the stuff — we were willing participants, sans vino. This was the one time we would have loved a tipple, but seeing as we had come this far we decided another day wouldn't kill us. As events unfolded, it nearly did.

The race starting time was 9am, which meant an alarm call at 5.15am to get some breakfast — plenty of brown bread, over-ripe bananas and coffee. I added a few Lemsips as the night was spent coping with the early stages of flu. Nevertheless, my anxiety pushed thoughts of a runny nose, streaming eyes and cough to the back of my mind. Ger did not get much sleep because of my spluttering — like a true friend she never heard a gasp!

Our next alarming moment was at 7am.

Our next alarming moment was at 7am. We had to be at the start line in Nassau Street at 8am. We got nervous as the goodwill texts arrived — for me it was a bit like the eve of an All-Ireland camogic final except this time I was on my own. Little things like pinning numbers to our vests became difficult — the fingers were beginning to shake.

The fover of the hotel gave us a sample of the start line — strong odours of deep heat and guys swinging arms and legs in all directions. It was a beautiful sunny morning but freezing cold. We were so cocky we jogged up Baggot Street hyped with enthusiasm. Along the way we encountered a man who had run every race since the start — all 24.



Lots of Americans, costumes of all sorts, grannies and even participants in knee-high wellies provided the fun element — many others were running for a cause, with pictures of loved ones who passed away from debilitating diseases.

After handing in our outer garments to the baggage area we decide to join the long queues for the portable loos. Bad mistake — the eastern type hole was awash with steaming piles of pong. Ger is fairly traumatised. Her empty-reaching almost gets me going.

Her empty-reaching almost gets me going.
On our way to Trinity College we spot the
Kenyans doing cartwheels around Frederick
Street. They smile as we stare. After watching
their warm-up, we run away to hide.

Our start position is calculated on our estimated finishing time. We move along with the other hopefuls to the 4-5 hours spot. The banter is mighty and the support unreal. A quick hug and we are off.

E head up O'Connell Street and down the North Circular Road. It is great fun with lots of supporters on the footpaths shouting either for us, or at us (there are some sadistic people out there, y'know). We joke with our fellow-athletes — even cod ourselves this is not so bad. We pass the zoo in the Phoenix Park and at the ten-mile mark the clock reads 1.43.02. Every three miles there is water. We sip but it appears that oth-

ers must be gulping as people are pissing all

over the shop.

We pass Inchicore and the South Circular Road. We are still in good form after 15-miles. Children helpfully (teasingly?) hand us jelly babies and barley sugar sweets. These instant bursts of energy are most welcome. Onlookers shout support as our faces begin to grimace. Power Aids (nutrition packs) are available but we tried them before and found them nauseating. We would do this un-aided — entirely from our own reserves!

Terenure now. On to Rathgar where I lived in my Civil Service days. It looks so different now. Then again all I can see is the road coming up to meet me. My body is protesting. Seriously. Each mile is posted on a big red cardboard square. People are opting out all over the place, stretching against walls and some just sitting on the pavement refusing to go another inch.

Ger and I lose each other. The loneliness is unbearable because at this stage most of the chat is drained from our exhausted bodies. 'You are doing great. Keep it up.'

Words of encouragement are being dangled in front of us. I am hallucinating about nice things. A man shouts 'you only have 10k to go.' Since when was 10k regarded as merely. I dart towards him for a swig out of the water bottle in his sports coat pocket. He is relieved I did not hit him.

My feet are blistering and I notice blood seeping through my white runners. The back Therese O'Callaghan clutches her last bottle of water as she struggles to complete the last stretch of the Dublin City marathon.

of my left knee is swelling at the rate of knots. For the first time, thoughts of stopping wash over me.

I think back to early morning training stints on stretches of the Mallow and Ballincollig roads, and my burning ambition that is to run a marathon. I look for Ger — still can't find her. Of the seven stages, I am definitely at despair. I start playing mind games. Instead of searching for the 21-mile mark I count backwards — only five more to go. I am hurting big time. On passing the Radisson Hotel, I wonder have they a Jacuzzi.

I see a sign for UCD and remember someone mentioning that gatting this for would

I see a sign for UCD and remember someone mentioning that getting this far would thrill him. Not me, though the thought does lift me. I know my way around here so we must be almost there. Shit. Diversion down Nutley Lane and Merrion Road. There is one last hill. Whoever said that the crowd bring you home need their head examined!

They are cheering, but I'm oblivious. Next time — I tell myself — I will drive around here. I am negotiating my third 'wall', desperate to grasp inspiration from someone, something, somewhere. At 24 miles my throat is raw from the cold air. I clutch my last bottle of water and bring it with me. Something to squeeze as I fight this battle. I frantically look for the 25-mile mark. It seems like an eternity as I trudge along Grand Canal Street. I go around Westland Row and on to Pearse Street, then I see the red mark high up on a pole in the distance. 'Only one more,' I whisper to my weary limbs.

Oh, there is a God. I somehow missed the

Oh, there is a God. I somehow missed the 25-mile spot and this is 26. I get an unbelievable burst of energy as the adrenalin begins to pump. Hoards of well-wishers line the streets and suddenly my legs take over and I begin to gallop. I sprint to the finishing line and the feeling is indescribable.

Four hours and 24 minutes of mind boggling slog. Twenty-six miles of battering and

I am presented with my medal and T-shirt as I collapse on a nearby timber crate. My legs are seizing. My ribs are sore and my lips are blue.

Ger and I are re-united. We are too wasted to talk. We shuffle back to the hotel and take turns to soak in endless baths. We lie on our beds with our legs walking up the wall. Nothing soothes the pain. I cannot even stretch my muscles. Every tendon and ligament has gone into distress. So have I.

T IS about 5pm and we feel we should be celebrating. Three drinks later we help each other (not in a drunken state) back to the safety of our room. My coughing and sneezing re-emerges and the rest of the night is spent in various uncompromising positions. Tuesday morning arrives and rigor mortis comes calling. At funeral pace, we head for Cork. We stop to get some water but neither can get out of the car.

All day Wednesday and Thursday my body is fractured. By Friday and after many visits to the steam room and sauna, little by little it is beginning to thaw out. It is now though that the flu really kicks in.

Was it worth it? Without a doubt.
Would I do it again? I might but I never
thought I would do one. Maybe I should be
happy with that.



#### **Damien Duff**

For the second year running, the 24-year-old Dubliner wins the award for soccer after a series of outstanding individual performances for his new club, Chelsea, and the Republic of Ireland. Although Duff was forced to play in a variety of positions for the Republic, he never failed to make an impact in the Euro 2004 qualifying games.

His individual goal against Russia in September guaranteed that the Republic's interest in the competition would go down to the final qualifying game while his form since joining Chelsea for £17 million in the summer has been one of the main contributory factors to the team's successful run in the Premiership and Champions



#### Peter Canavan

Peter Canavan had long been regarded as one of the greatest Gaelic footballers never to have won an All-Ireland medal. However, the 32-year-old finally laid that ghost to rest when he captained Tyrone to their first All-Ireland victory in September. For a player who won his first All-Ireland title with the Tyrone Vocational Schools team in 1988, it took 15 years of perseverance and huge disappointments before getting his hands on a coveted medal.

An ever-present in the Tyrone senior team since 1990, Canavan scored an amazing Il points but still figured on the losing team when his county went down to Dublin in the 1995 All-Ireland final. This season he again showed that, at his best, there is simply no forward in the country who can match him. In the eight games that Tyrone played in the championship, he scored 1-47, making him the top scorer in the country by some



### **Darren Clarke**

The Northern Ireland player wins another Texaco award for his consistency throughout the 2003 season which saw him finish second in the European Order of Merit table with winnings in excess of 62.2 million. Although Clarke confessed that he was disappointed with some of his own performances throughout the year, he became only the second player, after Tiger Woods, to win more than one world golf championship event when he captured the NEC Invitational at Akron in Ohio in

In 2000, Clarke won the Accenture Matchplay championship, beating David Duval and Woods on his way to the title. His victory in Ohio was a little more comfortable, coming home four shots ahead of Jonathan Kaye to lift the first prize of



### **II** Delaney

The 21-year-old Fenians Johnstown player proved himself to be the outstanding defender in hurling as Kilkenny completed back-to-back All-Ireland and National League victories. Delaney, who only joined the senior Kilkenny squad in 2002, was a dominant figure in the Kilkenny rearguard throughout the summer as he produced a string of spectacular performances at left-half back.

In the four games Kilkenny played in the championship, Delaney's opponents managed just a single point from play with all four being replaced before the end of the games. He kept Dublin's Tomás McGrane and Wexford's Rory McCarthy scoreless in the Leinster semi-final and final, followed that with another inspirational display against Tipperary's Mark O'Leary and then repeated the effort in the final against Cork's Ben O'Connor, who managed one point from play before being substituted.



### **Ken Doherty**

Ken Doherty brought snooker comebacks to a new level when he captivated the Crucible Theatre in Sheffield and the watching TV millions with a series of outstanding performances during the World Championship in May. The Dublin player appeared to be on his way out of the tournament in his second-round tie against Graeme Dott but fought back to win through to the semi-finals 13-12, having trailed 7-2 at

That comeback was surpassed in the semi-final when Doherty recovered from a 15-9 deficit to reach the final 16-15 against Paul Hunter.

Drained by the effort, Doherty made a disastrous start to the final against Mark Williams and trailed 10-2 after the first day. But in an enthralling final day, Doherty recovered to level the match at 12-12 before finally succumbing 18-16 to the world number one.



### Paul O'Connell

In a year dominated by the Rugby World Cup, the 24-year-old Munster forward proved himself to be one of the best second row international players to emerge in recent seasons. O'Connell made his debut for Ireland against Wales in 2002, and marked that occasion by scoring a try. His subsequent progress with Munster and Ireland was interrupted by injury and he only returned to the national side when he came on as a replacement against England in the Grand Slam decider in March at Lansdowne Road.

A huge asset for Munster, the 17st Ard Scoil Ris past pupil travelled to the World Cup with a growing reputation. However, his performances in all five games for Ireland were world class and he capped a great tournament with an outstanding display in Ireland's pool game against the reigning world champions Australia.



## **Dermot Weld**

Group One victories in three different countries this year confirmed Dermot Weld's reputation as one of the world's top trainers. Vinnie Roe became the first horse to win three Irish St Legers in a row and Dimitrova won the Flower Bowl Handicap at New York's Belmont Park. However, the highlight for the 55-year-old Weld came in May with Refuse To Bend's victory in the 2000 Guineas at Newmarket. That was Weld's first success in an English classic for 22 years since Blue Wind won the Epsom

At home it was another big year for the Curragh-based trainer although the Galway festival, where he is traditionally dominant, didn't live up to expectations. But it did see the racecourse debut of Grey Swallow, who won by 10 lengths and subsequently won his only other Group Three start to put himself top of the classic betting for 2004.



## Gillian O'Sullivan

Gillian O'Sullivan became only the third Irish athlete to win a medal at the World Championships when she took silver in the 20 kilometre walk in Paris in August.

Following in the footsteps of Eamonn Coghlan and Sonia O'Sullivan, the 27-year-old walker from Farranfore in Kerry delivered on years of promise by coming home in second place behind Russian Yelena Nikolayeva, the most successful woman walker of all time who has won numerous world and Olympic titles.

O'Sullivan took up walking at 13 when she competed in the Community Games and has progressed through all ranks of the sport to reach the stage where she is now rated one of the best walkers in the world and Ireland's best hope of a medal at next Olympic Games



# Sam Lynch and Gearoid Towey

The Irish lightweight double scull pairing, who came together as a partnership only this year, captured a bronze medal at the World Championships in Milan in August. It was Ireland's first medal in an Olympic class event at the World Championships since single sculler Seán Drea took silver in 1975. Six weeks earlier Lynch and Towey had only lost out by 11 hundredths of a second when they finished fourth in the World Cup regatta in Lucerne.

Building on that performance they went to Milan where they showed remarkable reserves of strength and self-belief to finish third behind world champions Italy and Olympic champions Poland. Their performance in Milan guaranteed them a place at next summer's Athens Olympics where they will be among the favourites for the double sculls title.



## Eimear McDonnell

The 22-year-old UCC graduate was Tipperary's outstanding player in their march towards another All-Ireland camogie title. Having helped UCC to win the Ashbourne Cup in the early part of the year, McDonnell then turned her attentions to the intercounty scene. Displaying power, accuracy and deft touches throughout Tipperary's campaign, McDonnell capped a wonderful year with a towering display in the 2-ll to 1-ll victory over arch rivals Cork in the All-Ireland final.

As well as creating and scoring a vital goal for Tipperary shortly before half-time. the Camogie Player of the Year, also contributed four points of Tipperary's 2-11 total. Her performance earned her the Player of the Match award.



## COUNTY TIPPERARY CAMOGIE HISTORY

The County Tipperary Camogie History, written by Martin Bourke and Seamus J. King, will be formally launched at Templemore Arms on Wednesday December 3rd at 8.p.m.

As well there is a chapter of club profiles, the history of the game in primary and secondary schools, the names to camogie players who won hurling championships, ballads relating to the game in the county, and an obituary

The authors are confident the book is a comprehensive record of the game of camogie in County Tipperary and are delighted to publish it at this point of time, after the county senior team's outstanding success this year. It is appropriate that such a book should appear in time for 2004, the centenary year of Cumann Camógaiochta na

The association is due, with the women's football association Cumann Peile na mBan, to amalgamate under the umbrella of Croke Park and the president referred to this, saying that "the next milestone will be the successful integration of the three organisations".

Seán Kelly, GAA President, also referred to this process in his speech: "We in the GAA are delighted to be associated with you, our sister organisation in this historic year. Of course the recent pilot scheme aimed at establishing the best framework for complete integration.

"It is our intention to move forward in a confident and ambitious manner as a united body with the combined membership, skills, expertise and resources of the three associations at our disposal."

Among the milestones of the camogie association's first century picked out by O'Callaghan were the institution of a university competition, the Ashbourne Cup, in 1914, the export of the game to the United States in the 1930s, the appointment of the first full-time officers in the 1970s, the recent expansion of teams from 13 to 15 players and the appointment of a full-time sponsorship and finance manager, Sinéad O'Connor.

In his speech the minister paid tribute to the association: "I am sure that those pioneers who organised the first public game of

camogie in Páirc Tailteann between Craobh A'Cheithnnigh and Cuchullains in 1904 would be delighted with the way camogie has grown to become one of the most popular and widely played female sports in Ireland with approximately 84,000 players.

"I would like to pay tribute to those pioneers for introducing a wonderful sport to the multitudes of Irish women who have graced the fields and stadiums of Ireland throughout the last 100 years."

He concluded by thanking the association's president for her invitation and wishing "you all every success in celebrating your first 100 years. Here's to the next 100".

The minister praised the appointment of a team of ambassadors, including one from each county, whose function it will be to promote the game.

Next year's centenary events include: the staging in February of the Ashbourne Cup in UCD, the first university to field a camogie team and later that month the announcement of the Team of the Century; in March a camogie exhibition will be mounted in the GAA Museum, a history will be launched and a set of centenary stamps will be issued by An Post.

June's Féile na nGael finals will be held in Navan, where the first camogie match took place in

Next year's All-Ireland finals take place on September 19th and the following month the association will participate, with the assistance of a €25,000 grant from Croke Park, in the GAA's International Rules events by playing against shinty players from Scotland – an exchange that has only hitherto taken place at club level – and organising a tournament with clubs from overseas.

A documentary on the game will be broadcast by RTE and the centenary year logo designed by Mark Dignam was unveiled.

Finally, the camogie All Stars for this year were announced. Sponsored by the Lynch Hotels Group, the awards were formally presented at an awards dinner last night in one of the sponsor's hotels, The Green Isle in Dublin.

Not surprisingly All-Ireland champions Tipperary lead the way with seven players, followed by finalists Cork with four.

Limerick have a strong presence with three at the end of a year that saw them reach the All-Ireland semi-final - although there is no representation for the other defeated semi-finalists Galway.

Intermediate champions Antrim complete the team with centrefielder Jane Adams gaining the only place to go outside of Munster.

# Munster players dominate camogie's new star scheme

CAMOGIE'S first ever All-Star team was announced yesterday and it was dominated by seven of Tipperary's All-Ireland senior title winning side.

Cork are represented by four players, while Limerick have three, and Antrim one, while noticeably the team features not one player from Leinster or Connacht.

The All-Stars scheme is the latest step in camogie's marked modernisation in recent years and the inaugural team announcement yesterday was also made in conjunction with the launch of the association's centenary year celebrations for the coming season,

As the scheme is sponsored by Lynch Hotels, the players are named the '2003 Lynchpins'.

The historic first selection clearly demonstrates just how much the balance of power in camogie has swung towards Munster in recent years.

No fewer than 14 of the 15 players honoured come from the southern province, with All-Ireland champions Tipperary, as expected, getting the lion's share with seven representatives.

Tipperary goalkeeper Jovita Delaney, defenders Una O'Dwyer, Ciara Gaynor and Therese Brophy were all picked, as well as teammates Claire Grogan, Eimear McDonnell and Deirdre Hughes.

Four of the Cork side who were beaten in the All-Ireland senior final — Stephanie Dunlea, Mary O'Connor, Emer Dillon and Fiona O'Driscoll — were also honoured for their heroics during the year.

Rose Collins, Vera Sheehan and Elleen O'Brien of Limerick also were named in the team.

But perhaps most thrilled of all to be picked was Antrim midfielder Jane

However, the GAA has noticeably donated £100,000 in grants, £25,000 of it to go directly to the hosting of an international camogie tournament.

And GAA President Sean Kelly promised them every support yesterday, saying that the strengthening of the camogie association would in turn help strengthen the GAA.

"I hope every club, county board and province in the country will honour this special occasion in every way possible," he said.

Camogie president Miriam O'Callaghan said their association has "made a significant statement in its very formation and right throughout its history has impacted on the life of Irish women and Gaelic games and continues to be a ground-breaking organisation with vision and courage."

But in the minutes that followed, Tipp became increasingly potent up front and it needed a great save by goalkeeper Casey to deny player of the match Eimear McDonnell.





# Story of camogie shines in women's sport

for the sport of camogie.

July 17 next will be the 100th anniversary of the sports first official game - played in Navan, County Meath.

The game was one of the attractions at a Gaelic League festival that was being held in the town at the time.

The teams were comprised of members of the Gaelic League. One team was made up entirely of members of the Keating Branch of the Gaelic League in Dublin.

This team was called Keatings. The other side was known as Cuchullains. The records show that Keatings won the game by one goal to nil

In her book, "Cork's Camogle Story" Mary Moran, points out that the sport of Camogie was well ahead of it's time in promoting the participation of women in

She tells us that women did not compete in the Olympic Games until 1908.

Even then, they were only allowed compete at the "rather sedate sport of Archery." The 100 metres freestyle swim was added in 1912 and it was not until 1928 that women were allowed to compete in athletics.

The first recorded games of Camogie to be played in Cork took place in 1905. The first team was formed in the Blarney Street area and was known as Fainne an

Later, two of their members, the Walsh sisters, left to live in Blackpool. They joined a branch of the Gaelic League based in Pine Street and through this branch they formed Cork's second club. This club was called Clan na nGael.

Clan na nGael's first captain was Eilis Walsh. She later mar-

THIS year is a special year ried Cork's future Lord Mayor, Tomás MacCurtain.

Camogie grew from these beginnings into the organisation it

I met the Camogie Board's PRO Mary Newman-McCarthy at the weekend and she tells me that there are several events planned to celebrate the centenary.

The first big event is a Gala Formal Dinner at the City West Hotel, in Dublin to coincide with their Annual Congress on February 28th next. I believe that tickets are still available for this and anybody interested in attending should contact their local camogie club or the county camogie board for details.

On April 10 next, each camogle club in Cork is promoting an open day. The day will be known as Lá na gClub, Each club will hold a variety of events including long puck competitions, athletics events, mini-tournaments etc.

These events will be open to all not just the club members and their families.

In an effort to promote their events throughout the year and to increase the profile of the Camogie Association, each county has appointed two ambassadors.

Former All-Ireland winning captain, Linda Mellerick is the Cork County Senior Ambassador and last year's All-Ireland Minor winning captain, Anna Geary from Millford is the Schools and Colleges Ambassador.

One of the more interesting projects of the year is the selection of a 'Team of the Century'.

Whatever team is picked, you can be sure there will be controversy. The selectors are glad that the number of players on a team was increased from 12 to 15 some years ago. At least three more opinions can now be satisfied.

judge the ability of the players of the first 70 or 80 years of camogie but I have a few nominations.

The goalkeeper position must He between Peggy Hogg who won four All-Irelands with Cork in the 1930s and Marion McCarthy who won eight All-Irelands in the 1970s and 80s.

The Downey twins from Kilkenny should also make the team. In fact, Angela Downey was as good a hurler as any player on the current Kilkenny senior hurling team.

Four other players from Leinster who should make the team are Kathleen Mills and Una O'Connor from Dublin, Elsie Walsh from Wexford and Bridie Martin from Kilkenny.

Kathleen Mills is the holder of 15 senior All-Ireland Camogie medals and Una O'Connor has 13. I doubt if anyone would object to their selection. Elsie Walsh is better known these days as Mrs Brian Cody but she was probably a better player than Brian himself.

Bridie Martin's feats were a little overshadowed by Angela and Anne Downey but she would run them a close third for the best Kilkenny player of all time.

Other Cork players who should be 'dead certs' are Sandie Fitzgibbon and Linda Mellerick of Glen Rovers, Pat Moloney of Killeagh and Marie Costine of Cloyne.

While Noreen Duggan (Blackrock) arguably the best player never to win an All-Ireland medal, Hannah Dineen (South Pres.), Liz Garvan (Old Als), Mary O'Leary (Watergrasshill), Fiona O'Driscoll (Fr O'Neills) and Anna Crotty (Glen Rovers) could also make the team.

Finally, if I was to suggest a Club of the Century, it must be Glen Rovers. (Not because they are my own club or because both my mother, Shiela Cahill and my wife, Anne Delaney both captained the club to senior county titles - I wanted to get that in).

All that is co-incidental. I propose the Glen because since 1950, they have 22 senior county titles and four All-Ireland Club titles.

Even more remarkably, they have won the senior county title seven times in a row twice.

To be county champions seven times in a row once is brilliant. To do it twice has to be divine.



# Cumann Camogaiochta celebrates centenary

A year of festivities is planned to celebrate the centenary of Cumann Camogaiochta na nGael in 2004. We caught up with national camogie PRO Maire Ui Scolai to discuss the special events that will mark one hundred years of camogie.

aire Ui Scolai commences her fourth year as national camogie PRO in March 2004. By then, Cumann Camogaiochta na nGael's centenary celebrations will be

in full swing. The former Dublin camogie board PRO is delighted by the progress the game has made over these past few years and points out that - appropriately, given the year that's in it - camogic has never been in a healthier state than it is now.

"Since live coverage of the All-Ireland finals began in the latenineties, camogie has made a huge impact. A lot of people have realised that the girls can play, as well as the lads, Another significant breakthrough arrived in 1999, when camogie was changed to 15-a-side on a full-sized pitch. Since then, we've never looked back.

Around this same time, the rules of the game were tweaked slightly, to accommodate 15 players and a bigger pitch and the combination of all these changes have been to the drastic betterment of the game at national and local levels.

Cumann Camogaiochta na nGael is the oldest female sporting movement in Ireland, with 84,000 members. And 2004 is going to be the game's biggest year yet!

At present, there are only six counties (Kerry, Longford, Leitrim, Sligo, Mayo and Donegal) without structured County Boards, but the powers-that-be are working hard to change this. With club games already taking place in the two counties, Donegal and Mayo are at a more advanced stage than the other four, but soon there will be County Board structures up and running in all 32 counties.

Indeed, the game already has a strong international dimension as well, with a presence abroad in the States, Scotland, England and Dubai. One of the events planned to mark camogie's centenary is an international tournament and a grant of 25,000 euro has been received from the GAA to help organise this (as well as an additional 75,000 to fund the 100 year celebrations).

Work on these centenary celebrations began last November and the camogie association's Centenary Year plans were officially unveiled in Croke Park on Tuesday November 25th 2003.

The national PRO continues: "We realised a couple of years ago that this was going to be a huge occasion for camogie, so we set up a Centenary Committee. We were very fortunate with the committee, as we managed to enlist five young players with an average age of only 27.1

The committee comprises Therese O'Callaghan, an All-Ireland medallist with Cork (chairperson); Germaine Noonan, an All-Ireland winner with Dublin; Eithne Duggan, who also won an All-Ireland with Cork: Olivia Forde, winner of an All-Ireland medal with Galway; and Jayne Monaghan from Armagh.

The task facing this energetic, vibrant and youthful committee was to draw up a calendar of events, which would then be submitted to Central Council. Says Maire Ui Scolai: "They proved an extremely polished and professional committee. They came up with an itinerary of events for the year, with something taking place each month at national level as well as a host of activities at provincial. county, schools (primary and secondary) and club levels.

The main starting point of the celebrations is Cumann Camogaiochta na nGael's Annual Congress, which commences in the Citywest Hotel on Friday February 27th and then runs all day Saturday, concluding with a banquet, which is a black-tie affair,

At this special function, the Camogie Team of the Century will be announced. Congress will then take place during the day the following day.

The organising committee is hopeful that every county will be represented at the banquet, with at least two tables each. Tickets for this once-off event cost 70 euro per person and are available to the general public as well as those affiliated to the game. Information can be obtained by emailing the camogie office - info@camogie.ie or by ringing 01 8364619.

Needless to say, the possible make-up of the Team of the Century is generating a lot of interest and sparking much debate. One thing that's for sure is that the players named will be immortalised as 15 of the greatest Irish female sports stars ever, "It promises to be a great night," Maire enthuses. "A number of special guests will appear and all the players on the centenary team will either be present or have a family representative in attendance.

Already this month, the 2004 Ashbourne Cup got the centenary celebrations off to a swinging start. The Ashbourne Cup is the oldest competition in camogie and the third-level colleges tournament took place over the weekend of February 13th-15th inclusive.

A gaelic sports re-union banquet was held in Croke Park on the Friday night. This was effectively a get-together of players who have played in the Ashbourne Cup over the years, or who were involved in colleges gaelic games in general (including football and

This year's Ashbourne Cup was hosted by UCD, with the semifinals taking place on the Saturday and the final itself on Sunday February 15th.

Other events organised by camogie's Centenary Committee include a camogic exhibition in the GAA Museum and the launch of a booklet entitled 'Camogie's History'. Meanwhile, An Post has also agreed to mark the occasion with two specially commissioned postage stamps in late summer, which will attain worldwide recognition for the ladies code.

Also, the third-level colleges are holding a special Centenary Sevens competition, which is being hosted by Carlow IT on April

# County Glory Finally Dawns for Gallant Fr O'Neills

I's been another successful year for Cork Camogie, without doubt the highlight being the retention of the All Ireland minor crown and the recording of a minor three-in-a-row. The Senior National league also came Leeside and another championship final appearance shows the game continues to prosper both at local and national level.

As well as Ashbourne Cup success for UCC, two Munster titles found their way to Cork with Coachford College and St Mary's Charleville also taking All- Ireland honours.

There was a first and long-awaited Senior County Championship success for Fr O Neills, while Kilbrittan /Timoleague. St Catherines and Rockban took county titles at adult level. Under age championship success came to Milford, Clonakilty and Grenagh, while a host of clubs enjoyed league success. Douglas took the Cork Feile Na Gael title for the second year in a row, while Niamh Dilworth from the Inniscarra club took the Cork Skills title.

Off the field of play there was also plenty of activities, as the year began with a new county chairperson taking over the reigns as Sile Golden retired and was duly elected to the position of Hon President for a five-year term. Marion Mc Carthy from the St Finbarr's club, who had served as vice chairman for 15 years, was elected to the chair, while Mary Bugler took over as vice chairman and so the wheels were set in motion for another hectic year in Cork camogie with the number of clubs growing

These were but a few of the stories to hit the headlines through a busy 2003.

### All Ireland Senior

Following the success of 2002, hopes were high for the new year as former inter county star Sandie Fitzgibbon joined Pa Finn and Kathleen Healy on the senior selection committee. The trio set about their business joined by Jim McCarthy who continued the training duties. Linda Mellerick and Eithne Duggan, both of whom gave such outstanding service to Cork camogie, retired and the back-room team introduced several new faces to their panel.

Cork again entered two teams in the national league. The senior side advanced comfortably to the semi final where they recorded a compherehensive victory over Dublin to set up another meeting with Tipperary in the league Final at Pairc Ui Rinn on May 20th. The fare served up on the day was classic, despite the earliness of the season with Cork giving a superb dis-

play to regain the title they had lost a year earlier.

Now the scene was set for another championship season and certainly on the basis of league displays, hopes were high for the retention of the O'Duffy Cup.

In a effort to improve standards at senior level, Central Council announced a new format to the championship with the competition to be played on a league basis of two sections, with the two top teams in each to emerge to contest the semi finals. Despite the change, Cork experienced little difficulties in a group that included Galway, Antrim and Kilkenny and qualified comfortably for the semi final where, remarkably, they met the runners up from their own group, Galway.

In a game that did little to enhance the reputation of camogie, Cork totally over powered the westerners while Tipperary eventually brushed aside the challenge posed by a tenacious Limerick side that had made great progress in the season.

And so the scene was set for a repeat of the 2002 clash: would Cork again work the oracle or could Tipperary regroup and find the winning formula under the leadership of new coach Ramie Ryan?

Cork's preparation went smoothly in the lead-up to the big day with sponsors Colour Catcher again easing the financial burdens of an All Ireland appearance. On the training ground, the panel went through their paces with determination. However on the day, the game never lived up to it pre-match expectations as Cork relinquished their crown to a very determined Tipperary side.

Despite the disappointment, Cork are already looking ahead to centenary year and have already named a successor to coach Pa Finn who having completed a three-year term retired from the post. Sars man John Considine has been handed the task of guiding the side's fortunes as they go in quest of Cork's 21st title.

### Inter County

At Intermediate grade, Cork took the Munster title with a victory over Limerick, but in the open draw had to give way to Tipperary at semi final stage. Failure to take the many chances that came their way saw Cork lose out by the narrowest of margins to a side that went on to contest the final where Antrim took ultimate honours.

Losing out to Galway in their opening game of the league was to prove costly with the Cork Juniors losing out on qualification for the play-off stages. This, however, failed to deter the team that prepared very well and faced into the Munster championship confidently, eventually reaching the final. In an exciting contest, Cork had to relinquish their crown to a Clare side that had successfully regraded from senior to junior status. Failure to perform and lack of leadership on the field of play cost the side dearly and so ended the year on a disappointing note.

The minor team defeated Waterford and Tipperary to retain the Munster title with ease before brushing aside the challenge posed by Kilkenny in the semi final to set up a repeat of the previous year's final with Galway.


A close opening half saw the champions lead by the minimum at the interval but it was in the second half that Cork showed their class. Totally dominating all over the field, they retained their title with confidence superbly led by inspirational captain Anna Geary who was also named as "player of the match".

### Home Front

On the senior scene, a new era dawned as Fiona O Driscoll led Fr O'Neills to their first Senior County championship title.

Champions Cloughduv, aiming for three in a row, failed to survive their opening round test against the students of UCC and so the race was thrown wide open. St Finbarr's were many peoples favourites, given their disposal of the students in round two but Inniscarra were having none of that as they edged out the 'Barrs in a thrilling semi final to make it to the final for the first time. In the second semi final Fr O Neills had to call on all their resources to hold off the challenge of championship debutants Milford and so the stage was set.

Paire Ui Chaoimh was the venue as two totally committed teams served up an exciting final. Fiona O Driscoll was the

Already several of their charges have gone on to greater success, amongst them to name but a few Emer Dillon, Jemma O Connor Jenny O Leary, Rachel Moloney and Briege Corkery, Cork camogic is indeed grateful for the wonderful work of these people. heroine, grabbing vital scores as the Ballymacoda side put the torment of losing four finals behind them to finally mount the victory rostrum. The evergreen Mag's Finn and Mary Kenefick who have given so much to the Fr O Neill's club finally had got that elusive county medal and certainly the performance given by both of them truly justified their success.

Up front, O Neills had many stars but one stood tall above the rest and there were no dissenting voices when Fiona O Driscoll was named as "Player of the Match" sponsored by Gerald Mc Carthy trophies.

In Senior B there was huge rejoicing in Kilbritan Timoleague as John Considine guided their fortunes to take their first crown. An exciting final where their ability to score points was vital saw them record a 3-4 to 3-0 victory over Aghbullogue. There were many fine displays in their campaign no more so that from lion hearted Miriam Deasy, Sadie Mc Carthy, Val O' Keeffe and Marion Murphy.

In the Junior A grade, St Catherines lived up to their tag of pre-championship favourites to take the title for the first time. Captain Esther Power, Denise Twomey, Helen Lane and, Noreen Mulcahy were very much to the fore as the Conna side defeated Valley Rovers in a thrilling final. Three months later the sides again met in the league final and again a thrilling contest saw St Catherines hold out to make it a double, despite a brave challenge from Valley Rovers.

It was a new look Junior B championship in 2003, confined as it was to clubs with only a Junior B team participating in the grade; any club with a second team played in a Junior B plate competition. While many clubs enjoyed the experience, others missed the challenge and buzz associated with championship fervour.

There was plenty of surprises throughout with Tracton knocking out a strong Ballyhea side to book their place in the final against Rockban (who defeated Youghal). Led superbly by Catriona Foley and Sile Burns, Rockban under the guidance of former Cork and Barrs hurler Denis Burns took their first adult championship trophy and for people such as Mary Walsh and Kay Conway, the win was a most deserved one.

Earlier in the season, Rockban laid the foundations for success taking the Junior B League title for 2002 with a victory over Ballyhea. At the time of going to print, Delany's and Brian Dillon's had to meet again to decide the destination of the league title for 2003, while in the 13-a-side Junior B Championship, Cobh and Buttervant contested the final.

### **Under Age**

The ever-growing interest in camogie at under age level was again very evident with the juvenile committee under the chairmanship of Pat O Riordan organising competitions for the Under12 to 16 age groups.

The under 12 grade was divided into three grades A, B and C. A close A final went to a replay before Douglas retained their title as they defeated Ballygarvan with good performances from Moira and Aileen O Donovan. Valley Rovers emerged victorious in the B section with a victory over Glen Rovers thanks in the main to Mary Ann Hawks, as they held off a late Glen rally before emerging victorious. Eire Og proved way too strong for opponents as they coasted to honours in the C grade with a win over neighbours Ballinora. Here Clare Meaney, Ciara O Connor and Aoife Scally shone for the Mid Cork side.

In the 12-a -side Under 12 competition, Kildorrey defeated Ballinascarty to be crowned champions. Competition at Under14 level again proved very strong in all grades. Douglas who had captured the Cork Feile Na Gael crown retained the under 14A league defeating Buttervant in the final thanks to skilful play from captain Hilary O Connor, Rachel O Sullivan and Niamh O Donovan. Eire Óg and Blackrock contested the under 14 B league final with the Ovens girls emerging victorious.

Just three points separated Clonakilty and Valley Rovers as the Clon girls took the club's first major camogie trophy in the Under 14 C competition, while in the 12-a-side, Dungourney recorded a victory over Grenagh.

Milford continued their success at 16 A level as they took the championship for a fifth year in a row but they had to depend on an injury time goal from Anna Geary to do so as they came from behind to break the hearts of Ballygarvan.

In the league, a new name was carved on the trophy when Douglas defeated Ballygarvan in an exciting final. Here Douglas had great performances from Emma Heffernan, and Jenny O Donovan. In the C Championship final Clonakilty had two points to spare as they held of the challenge of neighbours Ballinascarty. The B Final has as yet to be completed with competiton at semi final stages at the time of going to print.

In an all-mid Cork Under16 B league final, Aghabullogue had four points to spare over Eire Og as they took the honours. Newtownshandrum having regraded to C proved much too strong as they strolled to the league title with a final victory over Sliabh Rua.

Just two points decided the destination of the under-16 12- a-side championship crown with Granagh holding off the challenge of Tracton. Kildorrey continued their impressive season as they had three points to spare over Barryroe to be crowned league champions in the same grade.

### Third Level

UCC hosted the 2003 Ashbourne Cup, which was again a wonderful weekend of college camogie as the home team retained its crown. Rachel Moloney, Ger Casey, Sarah Hayes, Ciara Healy, Una O'Donoghue, Joanne O'Callaghan and Criona Harte were joined by Tipperary's Emer McDonnell and Una O'Dwyer and Kilkenny's Lizzie Lyng as UCC captured their 32nd Ashbourne title.

### Sciath Na Scol

As always, Sciath na Scol provided us with plenty of camogie action and as the Sciath celebrated 100 years of competition, congratulations are extended to the many people who have ensured great success down through the years. Our gratitude is again extended to the unsung heroes, the teachers and parents, without whom the competitions would not be possible.

In the C1, St. Columbas, Douglas, took the honurs at the expense of Scoil Oilibeir Dublin Hill. The honours in the C2 final went to Cloghroe who defeated Scoil Eoin Innishannon; Ballinora took C3 honours defeating St Patrick's, while Farran defeat Maria Assumpta Ballyphehane to take the C4 title.

The DC 1 title came to Carrignavar who were victorious over Kilcredan. DC 2 was won by Berrings while the DC 3 crown was annexed by Ballyheda with a win over Clonpriest. D C 4 saw Gael Scoil Mahon get the measure of Glenville.

### **Centenary Year**

The game continues to flourish in the county and as we bid goodbye to the year 2003, thoughts are already looking to 2004 and Camogie Centenary Year which will no doubt be celebrated throughout the length and breadth of the county.

It's a tribute to the many people who have helped kept camogle alive, some who have gone to their eternal reward but the legacy has been left behind. To mention but a few names such as Mary Moran, Rose Malone, Mary Nott, Kay Dunne, Maire Ni Ceallachain, Lil O Grady, Lil O Sullivan, Carmel Desmond, Ide Bean Ui She, Siobhan O Sullivan, Nora Newman and Sile Golden spring to mind all who helped in no small way to fashion the game in Cork as it is today.

Let's hope as we face into a new milestone for camogie the torch will continued to be carried by future generations of Cork camogie personnel.

# Minor Man...Major Success

ive All-Ireland minor titles, two senior county championships and a host of minor provincial honours are all listed on the Curriculum Vitae of a gentleman who has without doubt been one of the most successful under-age coaches Cork camogle has produced.

John Cronin first came on the intercounty camogie scene after his club Cloughduv won the county minor championship title in 1997. Among the players on that Cloughduv side were Una O Donoghue, Aoife Murray, Joanne O Callaghan and Sinead Buckley, all of whom would go on to win further honours in the red and white of Cork at later stages in their career.

Without doubt the win by Cloughduv helped in no small way to bring the talents of many girls to the fore but more importantly it helped Cork camogie to discover someone who has turned out to be a valuable asset to the game.

The club nominated John to the post of selector for the 1998 season and while reluctant at first he soon got into the swing of things as he joined the late Tadie Roche from Aghabullogue and his fellow club person Kathleen Healy in the bid to bring Cork's it first minor All Ireland crown since 1985.

The selectors worked tirelessly scouring the county for talent and under the guiding influence of John Cronin as coach they assembled a panel that retained the Munster title in a blistering final against Tipperary.

All-Ireland champions Galway stood between Cork and a place in the final on a day when the excellence of Rosarie Holland, Emer Dillon and Sarah Hayes helped Cork defeat the champions by two points.

Derry had defeated Kilkenny to book their place in the final where the Cork girls showing too much skill and craft recorded a compherehensive victory and so bridged a 13 year gap.

The victory was repeated the following year with Cork defeating Galway in a final where just one point separated the sides before Niamh Bowles stepped up to receive the Tailteain Trophy from President Phyllis Breslin.

Cork set out to make it three in a row in

Millennium year but got a rude awakening, losing out to Tipperary in the Munster final, a defeat that certainly upset the team coach. After that game I interviewed John for local radio and he gave me his views: "We should never has lost out to Tipperary, we allowed them get ahead of us and we were chasing the game, at the finish we almost clawed it back but it's sickening to lose out on a chance of three in a row."

While many would have walked away, Convention unanimously re-elected John Cronin to the position of selector and he set about his task of restoring pride in the Cork minor side with fellow selector's John Quinn and Ann Watson.

There followed a remarkable journey that has seen a three-ina-row of All-Ireland minor titles brought to the county a feat last achieved only once from 1983 to 1985.


Away from the county scene John still finds time to be actively involved with his beloved Cloughduv, a club where he himself wore the jersey with pride.

The holder of county championship honours at Minor, Junior and Intermediate grades he was unlucky to break his hand in the senior county hurling championship of 1974, however it did not dampen his enthusiasm for the game he has served loyally.

These days while not involved on the training or committee side of the hurling club, he can still be seen on big match days collecting gates or helping the club host such events.

In 2000 Una O Donoghue led the club to it first senior county championship title when they defeated Fr O Neills 12 months later Stephanie Dunlea repeated that feat and very much to the fore in those two success stories was one John Cronin who in the words of Kathleen Healy, " is the life and soul of Cloughduv camogie Club: without him we would have no club. He is trainer, selector and mentor to every team from under age to adult that goes out to represent our club."

Without doubt much of the work under-

taken by the busy camogic coach would not be possible without the backing of a very loyal and understanding family network and here again John Cronin made a very wise choice as wife Norma (née Creedon) needs no introduction to Gaelic games followers, coming as she does from a family steeped in tradition with the Macroom club.

Daughter Ciara is the holder of two county senior championship medals, while Aoife is actively involved also on the playing side.

As Cork set out to create another piece of unique history as they go in quest of four-in-a-row, you can be certain that John Cronin coach extraordinaire will leave no stone unturned in his efforts to do just that.

Cork Camogie is fortunate that this genial man from Cloughduv is at the helm of a very important team in our county, because the minors of to-day are the seniors of to-morrow, and you know what they say 'success breeds success,' Roll on the Minor C'ship of 2004.

# Coachford Girls 'lap up' Title

he secondary school teams of Cork dominated the 16 post primary camogie competitions at provincial level with a whopping 12 titles brought back to the Rebel County.

In Munster competitions, Charleville, Coachford, Bandon, Clonakilty, Loreto Youghal, Christ the King and Glanmire were victorious. But for one Muskerry school, the season was an historic one: Coachford College won its first ever All Ireland title by virtue of a one point margin over Presentation, Athenry in the Senior B decider, shown by RTE.

St. Mary's, Charleville retained the All-Ireland Junior A title and added to their impressive total by defeating Loreto, Fermoy in the Sevens final. Vince Harrington has been coaching successful Charleville teams for the past two decades, where his enthusiasm and craft has helped position St. Mary's at the top of the Colleges Camogie ladder.

Cork Colleges Chairman John Joe Breen (Nagle Rice) has been instrumental in the drive to increase the number of Cork schools participating in the 13 county competitions. Colaiste Daibhéid, St. Angela's, Ballincollig CS, Colaiste Mhuire Buttevant, Mannix College. Coláiste Mhuire Cobh, Dunmanway, North Pres and Coláiste An Phiarsaig have joined the ranks in recent years with Ollie Troy (Carrigaline), Evelyn Quinlivan (Coláiste Choilm), Ger Donovan (Charleville), Angela Sheehan (Glanmire) and Riobárd Lotty (Coachford) officers of the board.

In 1999, James Hurley (RIP) from St. Als initiated the Cork Colleges under 14 development squad, which involves specialist training over five months from Level One coaching tutors, culminating with the All Ireland blitz hosted annually by Cork. 2003 saw Galway retain the title with Cork gaining revenge by winning the corresponding Limerick tournament at Rathkeale. Denise Cronin (Ballincollig), Deirdre Twomey (Fermoy), Aine Moynihan (Christ the King), Sarah Coleman (Glanmire) and Brid Twomey (Coachford) proved to be stars in the making in games against Clare, Waterford, Kilkenny, Tipperary, Galway, Wexford and Dublin.

Charleville dominated the Cork Colleges A grade competitions with victories over Coachford, Fermoy, Bandon and Christ the King in the senior, sevens, junior, Second and First Year competitions respectively.

Coachford added to the Munster senior. A league title by defeating Bandon in the senior B with Midleton narrowly account-

ing for Rena Buckley's St. Als at Intermediate A.

Briege Corkery inspired Macroom when they overwhelmed Buttevant in the Intermediate B final, whilst Carberry side Bandon derailed rivals Clonakilty in the Junior B grade. Kinsale ousted Midleton at Junior C level but Cork under-14 coach Ollie Troy (originally from Waterford) was delighted with his Second Year charges from Carrigaline when they eventually beat Fiona O'Driscoll's Coláiste Choilm by a point after extra time.

Glanmire and Ballincollig took the First Year B Championship and Blitz trophies.

The creation of a new webpage http://welcome.to/camogie, the introduction of five new competitions for beginner schools coupled with a streamlined grading system have all improved the status of camogie as a first choice sport for many schoolgirls.

In her post-All Ireland victory interview, Joan Twomey, captain of the Coachford panel, personified the role sport has played in the development of the students' character. When asked what contributed to her team's success, she stated; "31 training sessions, three team meetings, sponsorship to pay for the sliotars and hurleys, 15 competitive matches, a strong panel but, above all else, not one lap done in any training session!"
