St. Mary's, Nenagh return to Tullamore to defend the All-Ireland Colleges Junior title which they won for the first time last season.

Camogie was introduced to St. Mary's fifteen years ago. Under the guidance of Joe Doran and Ger Dullea, the School captured their first Munster title in 1981 when they proved successful in the Intermediate B Grade. St. Mary's progressed to take their first Munster Colleges Championship title in 1991.

The School has produced many fine exponents of the game including Mary O'Brien, Anne Gleeson, Clare Madden, Orla Hogan and Ciara Burns. The present teams contain some fine young players who will keep up the tradition.

St. Brigid's, Callan adopted camogie as the main competitive sport in the School since its foundation in 1949. In the interim, the School has experienced highs and lows on the

St. Brigid's contested the All-Ireland Colleges Senior final in 1975 but lost out to Presentation, Athenry in extra time. 1990 proved to be a most successful year when the School won the All-Ireland Colleges Junior Championship. Many players who played in

that final will be in action again today.

St. Brigid's has contributed greatly to Kilkenny's success over the years. Among its past pupils are Ann Carroll, Olive O'Neill, Ann and Angela Downey, Breda Holmes, Deirdre Malone and Breda Cahill. The Millea sisters, Sinead and Tracy, who will feature in this afternoon's final, have already won All-Ireland Senior medals with Kilkenny.

St. Mary's Grammer Sch., Magherafelt affiliated to Ulster Schools Camogie League in 1968. They contested numerous senior and junior Ulster finals from 1970 onwards but, unfortunately, were always on the losing end.

The present squad have been the first School team to win an Ulster title. In 1989, they won a First Year title. They added the Under 14 title in 1991 and this year they were

successful in the Ulster Junior Championship.

St. Raphael's Loughrea are the most successful school in the history of the All-Ireland Colleges Championship. Since 1984, they have won four junior and seven All-Ireland

In that period they produced many excellent players including Deirdre Costello, Brid Stratford, Imelda Hobbins, Triona Dolphin, Emer Hardiman and Imelda Maher. A number of today's team are destined to follow in their footsteps.

Great work has been put into teaching the game by Cyril Farrell. The School's record reflects his outstanding ability to bring players to such a high standard season after

"It has been the case that we have played a lot better outside Connaught than inside in recent years, so we are hoping for the same this time", admitted St. Raphael's coach-trainer, Cyril Farrell, the man who master-minded the Galway hurling renaissance during the eighties when they won two senior All-Irelands.

"We know we are up against it, but equally, the girls know they are on the verge of achieving something great, and they are ready to give it all in pursuit of victory", assured St. Brigid's coach, Angela Fitzgerald, who was part of the backroom team when the Callan outfit won their first junior camogie

All-Ireland two years ago. On the way to that junior victory, Brigid's beat St. Ra-phael's in the semi-final, a point that wasn't lost on Mr. Farrell. As ever, he played down the chances of his side, and suggested that after seven wins they were "nearing the end of the good crop of players".

Flying fit

No matter what way anyone looks at it, the achievements of Raphael's have been magnificent. The school only has in the region of 400 pupils, with the boys/girls numbers split roughly 50-50. The camogie run of victories coincided with the arrival of Mr. Farrell, and, and anyone who knows the man, will tell you any outfit he sends out will be flying fit and determined in the extreme.

SUPER CLAIRE LYNCH'S BRIGID'S

ST. RAPHAEL'S ST. BRIGID'S. .

S PORT CAN be full of contradictions, even amazing at times, and if anyone ever doubted that, they should have been in Tullamore on Saturday for this mind-boggling All-Ireland colleges senior camogie final.

St. Brigid's college, Callan, entered the fray as outsiders against the dominant force in this grade for the past seven, now eight years, St. Raphael's (Loughrea). The challengers played well, even very well at intervals, but they ended up being soundly beaten.

One witnessed it all unfold on a bright, crisp Spring afternoon, but even bearing in mind that Raphael's were an exceptional team, the dividing margin at the finish was a total contradiction of the comparative worth of the combatants and made a mockery of the spirited efforts of the losers.

this high class final remaining, the difference was seven points, and Raphael's were being forced back into a defensive mode. Margaret Comerford and Janet Sweeney were to the fore in a dogged Brigid's assault that was pounding hard in a bid to break down a packed Raphael's defence.

But just as the losers bid looked like getting up a full head of steam, Raphael's burst up the field and delivered a crucial body blow. The brilliant Claire Lynch crossed from the right, and the strong running Anne Hardiman came rushing through from midfield With less than 12 minutes of to drive the ball low into the

difference at 4-7 to 2-3, and from there to the finish the pressure free winners were never going to be caught.

Total first half masters but managing to score only three points while sending out no fewer than twelve wides, All-Ireland colleges' junior champions, St. Mary's were rather fortunate to emerge with a second opportunity to hold on to their title in a nail-biting conclusion to a pulsating camogie decider in O'Connor Park, Tullamore on Saturday. replied.

In a game that saw fortunes ebb and flow, Nenagh took a three point lead into the closing two minutes only to be stunned when a free from Magherafelt top scorer, Kathy McDonnell, deceived the up-tonow highly efficient defence for the levelling goal and as the game moved into injury time, it was sheet desperation on the part of the Nenagh defence that prevented the Derry girls from notching a winning score.

No wonder that when the final whistle sounded, the Nenagh side showed greater signs of relief than their opponents. Whereas they should have put their opponents away from the opportunities gleaned in the first half, they were in the end, decidedly lucky to be still there with a chance of retaining their title.

And they can thank in the main, splendid defender Suzanne Kelly and 'supersub' Ciara Burns for that happy state of affairs. Suzanne showed herself to be an outstanding central defender and several times rescued her side with telling clearances. Ciara was introduced eight minutes into the second half when the sides were level at 1-3 each and most of the pressure was now coming from the Ulster champions. Out for most of the season following complications that set in after an operation for the removal of her anpendix, Ciara made her presence felt when she moved in to full forward and having pointed a free she bored holes in the Magherafelt defence by scything her way through for a great goal 7 minutes from time, and then adding a point just before Magherafelt's leveller.

SLOW STARTERS

Throughout the campaign to date Nenagh have been slow starters and this was again emphasised on Saturday. They had wind advantage in the first half but early pressure yielded nothing. and it was also noticable that free-

taking was not to be St. Mary's forte in the final. Two well taken frees by Kathy McDonnell at the other end, however showed how it should be done and these eased Magherafelt into a lead after 10 minutes. Nenagh's first score came in the 12th, a Marie Ryan point and she added another from 30 at the end of fifteen minutes.

A couple of goal chances were fluffed by the Nenagh attack and both Ciara Gaynor and Marie Ryan tried their hand at frees without success. Magherafelt edged ahead once more only for Marie Ryan to point a 30 three minutes before the break leaving it 0-3 each.

Nenagh got the tonic they needed less than a minute into the second half and ironically for all the pressure they had exerted in the first half, the game's first goal came almost by accident. A good centre from Marie Ryan was saved by the Derry keeper, but Nenagh captain Madeline Hayes was standing at the end of the goalline and the ball rebounded from her legs, dribbling past the Magherafelt line. It was a score that rattled Magherafelt and shortly afterwards the up-to-now reliable Kathy McDonnell blazed a close in free wide. Gradually though their confidence returned and in the 7th minute of the half after Nenagh keeper Susan Kenneally had saved well from Janette McCann, Eimear Burton was in to lash the rebound home. The sides were level again.

Ciara Burns made her appearance in the 8th minute and while her early contributions clearly showed her lack of match practice and fitness, the move to full forward was one that would pay off handsomely. Magherafelt went into a two point lead, again thanks to Kathy McDonnell's accurate free taking. Ciara Burns responded with a point from a free and her great goal in the 18th minute saw the Nenagh momentum increase again, although the challengers were exerting intense

pressure. When Ciara Burns put three points between the sides from play, as time was running out, the champions looked safe. Then came that midfield free for Kathy which Magherafelt McDonnell directed goalwards, the flight of the ball eluding the best endeavours of the St. Mary's defence as it dropped into the net.

STUNNED

Nenagh were stunned. It seemed they had done just about enough to survive with their title intact and when the final whistle sounded, it was Magherafelt who were knocking hard for that match winning score.

The chief lesson to be learned from the outing from a Nenagh viewpoint, is that chances such as those presented, especially in the first half cannot be treated in the manner in which they were treated on Saturday. Had the result gone against them, the blame would certainly have rested with the attack. Indeed but for the arrival on the scene of Ciara Burns, it is extremely unlikely that Nenagh would have lived to fight another

Little blame however to the defence so expertly marshalled by Suzanne Kelly who received great support from Sheila Kyne, Deirdre Kirby and Sinead Kelly. Ciara Gaynor missed a number of scoreable frees but gave it everything and was unfortunate to be on the receiving end of a number of accidential blows in the first half, which militated against her all round performance. Up to Ciara Burns' introduction, the most promising moves in attack were coming from Maria Ryan with Sarah Madden also doing well but this sector, overall lack the 'killer' instinct when it came to finishing off the opportunities provided.

Legend has it that hurling can be traced back to the princely figure of Setanta. But what of camogie - what golden-haired Amazonian princess back in the mists of the Celtic past can be said to be its founder?

I shall continue to believe in such a princess, even if the scholars tell us that camogie can claim no such figure as its titular head.

And even if camogie never had a princess, it deserves one. Indeed, the modern game has had its share of bright stars (golden-haired and otherwise), each in her own way a princess of the green sward.

Tumbling

The names come tumbling fast - from Kitty Buckley to Kathleen Mills to Una O'Connor to Betty Sugrue to Liz Garvan to Marion McCarthy to Angela Downey.

And I venture to suggest that if camogic wasn't the poor relation within the GAA's family of games, these names would be better emblazoned on our nation's sports pages.

Unlike hurling and football, camogie rarely gets the media attention it deserves, even on big match occasions.



YEARS

wenty years ago, a diminutive fifteen year old made her All-Ireland debut wearing number twelve in the Kilkenny colours. While that day belonged to Cork and Liz Garvan, the newcomer from Ballyragget scored 1-2 and displayed the talent which was to make her camogie's top player of the following decades.

Angela Downey played in eleven more All-Ireland Senior Finals. In each one, she left the stamp of her greatness. Eleven victories resulted bringing Kilkenny to third spot behind Dublin and hot on the heels of Cork in the all-time All-Ireland table.

Daughter of All-Ireland hurler, Shem Downey, Angela took naturally to the game. Even in her early days, she displayed exceptional ball control and wristwork. Her rare ability to score, even when no scoring chance seemed on, marked her out as a players of special talent.

Angela's value to her team is exceptional. Her colleagues expect her to make and take the winning scores. Even if a game is not going well, they believe that she will come to the rescue. In a way, they leave the responsibility for winning on her shoulders and carry on with their own game.

While sprinting through the Athenry defence early in extra time, Angela's knee broke down forcing her to retire from the match. Without her inspirational leadership, Callan collapsed



for the third time as captain of an All-Ireland winning Kilkenny side.

Angela enrolled in Maynooth University at a time when it was a struggle to field a camogie team. The thought of Maynooth making an impact on the Ashbourne Cup was not entertained. Egged on by Angela's remarkable will-to-win, Maynooth made it to the final and, of course, Angela was selected for the Combined Universities.

The St. Paul's Club was founded in 1963 in Kilkenny City and attracted a multi-talented group of players who were to be the bases of the county's success in the years to come. Anne Carroll, Liz Beary, Helena O'Neill, Bridie McGarry and Mary Fennelly were team-mates of Angela at St. Paul's.

St. Paul's, monopolised the Kilkenny senior championship and set their sights on better things. The Club won the first of its eight All-Ireland Club Championships in 1968 and became one of the best known clubs in the country.

Angela's achievements in the colours of Kilkenny are well documented. Her rich array of skills played a major part in Kilkenny's magnificent record in Leinster and at All-Ireland level.

An all-round athlete, she left the rest of the country trailing in Gradam Tailte, Camogie's Superstars Competition. Such is her dedication to getting and keeping herself in top form that she would undoubtedly have worn an Irish singlet had she chosen an international sport.

In 1987, Angela was honoured with a Texaco Award, the highest honour to which a camogie player can attain. She joined Dublin's Una O'Connor and Antrim's Sue Cashman as the only recipients in the game's history.

No matter what the future holds for Angela, she has indelibly written her name in the annals if camogie. She has thrilled lovers of skilful play with a succession of great performances over the years. In recent years, she has turned her hand to coaching and spent many hours passing on her skills to the young players of Kilkenny.

CAMOGUE ST. RAPHAEL'S CONTINUE REMARKABLE RUN

THE embargo on metallic banding of camogie sticks has been a bone of contention for many years. Those in favour of the ban saw the attaching of strips of tin to a stick as a dangerous and unnecessary practice. They felt that girls should not be made vulnerable to the increased risk of cuts.

However, in hurling areas, tin on sticks was seen as part and parcel of life and girls occasionally turned up for matches with a brother's stick. The high cost of the sticks, the poor quality of most of what is available and the difficulty in purchasing a stick which is not already banded lead to a change of mind by many who were previously opposed to dispensing with the ban.

1992 Congress in Monaghan saw the old rule deleted by a three to one majority. Players must have the metallic banding covered with adhesive tape to the referee's satisfaction.

The Rules Committee which presented a comprehensive document to Congress sought to permit a player to carry the ball in her hand for four steps. They considered that a fourth step was necessary to break from a tackle and find room to strike the ball. While the majority went along with this idea in midfield play, they considered that it would present too great an advantage to an attacking player within the 15 metre line and so the motion failed to gain a two-thirds majority.

Many a referee has been urged from the crowd to play "the advantage rule". But no such rule has ever existed in the camogie rule book. Cork tabled a motion giving a referee the discretion to allow play to continue in the event of a breach of rule where in her opinion a better advantage would be offered to the offended team. This motion drew good support but failed by six votes to reach the necessary two-thirds majority.

Dublin put forward a novel idea of rolling in the ball between the opposing number seven players after a score in under-11 competitions. Sometimes a puck-out is no advantage at this age level as many players are as yet unable to strike the ball from the hand. The concept was not put to the test as the motion was not in order.

Kildare sought to follow the hurling rule by banning scores from the hand. Speaker after speaker spoke of the need for goals to make the game attractive. The meeting was not prepared to eliminate this means of scoring and the skill involved.

Four years ago Kilkenny proposed a fifteen aside game to be played on a full-sized G.A.A. pitch. On that occasion, the idea faltered because of a fault in tabling the motions. This year they re-introduced the idea in the form of a test series. The 1993 and 1994 National Leagues and Inter-provincial competitions will be played under the new format.

Many delegates had reservations as to whether the increased team numbers on the big pitch would be a good thing for the game. At O'Connor Park, Tullamore last month, St. Raphael's made short work of St. Brigid's, Callan, the 1990 Colleges junior champions, to win their eighth consecutive All-Ireland Colleges senior crown. In the process, they displayed delightful skills. Pamela Nevin, Deirdre Hardiman, Olivia Broderick and Dympna Maher were a treat to watch.

But a star among stars was undoubtedly the flame-haired Claire Lynch who scored 4-5. Some of her scores were out of the top bracket. Her exceptional ball control and wristwork made it all look so easy. The record of St. Raphael's is a tribute to the outstanding coaching ability of their teacher, Cyril Farrell. Let us hope that the fruit of his labours will soon be reflected in success by the Galway senior team.

THE dismay on the faces of the Wexford senior camogie players after they had lost the All-Ireland league final was painful toosee, and it was not there because they had been robbed or even unlucky. They were dismayed because the promise and vitality they had showed against the same Cork team earlier in the league was almost totally missing. As one spectator put it after the game. they were not really at the races, and ran a very poor second to Cork in a two horse

Wexford had surprised Cork in their last meeting, and as predicted, they were determined not to be caught predicted, napping the second time. In the first game, Wexford took an early lead and the game settled into a fast and furious encounter, each side foraging and fighting for every single score. It was a game which could have been a showprece for Camogie given the potential of the teo teams, and the high standard of the game they had played earlier in the season, but in the end it was probably the opposite, damaging Camogie's image in Wexford When they last met in Cork, no one was booked, no one was sent off and no one was injured. Today, possibly due to poor control by the referce, who did not stamp his authority on the game until it was too late, in excess of half a dozen players were booked, one was sent off and there were numerous avoidable injuries.

Liz. Towler, the Cork player sent off was unfortunate as there were other incidents of a much more serious nature, involving players from Wexford and Cork, which went went unpunished.

By half time, Cork had built up a 2-10 to 0-6 lead, and looked the in total control. Catherine Murphy had kept Wexford in the game, inspiring her team, but Sandy Fitzgibbon, the Cork captain had been simply brilliant, while Collette O'Mahoney and Fiona O'Driscoll up front had carved paths through the Wexford



So maybe the veteran label is not unfair she is certainly one of the most experienced players in the current Wexford line-up.

She has also been handed the honour of captaining the side in their bid to snatch the O'Duffy Cup on Sunday.

There was no other obvious candidate for the job who could match her consistent top class performances for the county. Powerful striking and intelligent reading of the game make her the most outstanding player of the current Model generation.

On the local scene, Catherine lines out with Rathnure, but dare you call her a Rathnure woman - she most definitely is not. She is a Cloughbawn loyalist and though the Clonroche club has new been absorbed into the neighbouring parish, she remains proud of her roots.

It was in a green, Cloughbawn gansey that she first drew attention to her skills, and not only as a camogic player. It is part of local legend that she was on the under 14 football and hurling teams that last won the double at that grade for the male club.

The legend is true, and there are many hurling followers who consider that she is still good enough to mix it with the lads.

In fact, the Rathnure set-up is such that the eamogic squad see little enough of their male contemporaries. In the splendid club training grounds there is space enough to have a separate pitch for the women's game as well as two hurling pitches.

The amalgamation with Rathnure has brought Catherine into contact with Toddy O'Connor, head guru with the club, and also one of the county mentors.

It is clear that he is a powerful influence on her and all the others who come under his charge. After all, Teddy knows what it is like to win All-Ireland medals, so when he talks they listen.

It will need something similar if the girls from Leeside are to be dispatched on Sunday. The National League final early in the Summer at Bellefield showed the Cork girls at their best as they handed out a beating to Wexford in Wexford's back yard.

'We won't win in Croke Park unless we give one hundred and ten per cent,' suggests captain Murphy who tasted defeat at Croker two years ago against Kilkenny. 'We are capable of winning but it requires a special effort from everyone.

Still, she has plenty of faith in her team and their ability to work together to meet the challenge. They are all friends as well as playmates. The days of the 'clique' are gone, with a healthy spread of players in the squad from a range of clubs in all grades.

In Catherine herself they have an example of commitment which is very impressive in its single-minded devotion to the cause. Along the way she has jettisoned her interest in football and resisted the temptation to dabble in any other sports.

'I have become a video freak,' she laughs, referring to the innumerable Saturday nights when she has sat in at home while friends are out enjoying themselves. She also reckons that she has lost two stone since the last All-Ireland appearance a couple of years ago.
