AS the O'Duffy Cup makes its way back to Leeside today for the 23rd time, the Cork camogie team can look back on a job well done.

Going into the game as hot favourites was never an easy task - if they won then it was a case of they were going to win anyway, but if they lost there would have been little sympathy for them around the country.

But showing just why they have been in the last eight finals in a row, this team battled from start to finish against a Kilkenny side who gave it their all and couldn't be faulted for ef-

Physically Kilkenny tried to outmuscle Cork, which was probably their first mistake. You simply don't outmuscle players like Gemma O'Connor, Mary O'Connor, Catriona Foley and Jenny Duffy. When the need was greatest they stood up to the challenge of their opponents and such was the masterful defensive display by Cork, they limited Kilkenny to just two points in the second half, neither of which came from play.

To say the Cork defence was magnificent yesterday is somewhat of an understatement. From start to finish they hurled as if their very lives depended on it. Foley, at full-back kept the threat of star Kilkenny forward, Denise Gaule, at bay all afternoon. Such was her dominance you hardly knew Gaule was on the pitch in the

Kilkenny moved her to the corner to try and get some room but there she was up against Rena Buckley and, like Foley, she had no intention of letting her anywhere near goal.

In the other corner Joanne O'Callaghan was also in top form and between them they restricted the Kilkenny full-forward line to only one point from play for the entire game, a return any back three would take.

Behind them is, without doubt, the best camogie keeper playing at the moment. Having conceded a soft goal in last year's final, Aoife Murray was determined she wasn't going to be beaten this year and made a number

were outstanding today and we covered for each other throughout the game. To win another All-Ireland is unbelievable and we all treasure them every time we win as it could be your last. We can relax now and celebrate for a while before we have to get back to club games," said Joanne.

Just as the full-back line were to the fore, the half-back line were also immense and went one better than their counterparts by keeping their opponents scoreless for the game.

In centre-back Mary O'Connor Cork have an inspirational figure who reads the game superbly and clears up a huge amount of breaking ball.

Teak tough she takes the knocks and just gets up and gets on with it and to watch her must make those around her raise their game a level.

Sara Hayes didn't put a foot wrong all day and on the other wing Jenny Duffy was outstanding, particularly in the second half. Kilkenny moved centre-forward Katie Power out on Duffy from the start of the game and were hoping to use her height advantage to get the better of Duffy. Power did start well and made one or two catches early on, but once Duffy settled there was always going to be one winner of that clash. By the second half Power had moved and Duffy, starting her first final, showed that the number five jersey is in safe hands for some time to come.

Looking back it was a top-class performance from the Cork defence and only two of Kilkenny's points came from play for the entire game.

Midfield was an area that many felt would be where the game would be won and lost with Anne Dalton and Collette Dormer two powerful players for Kilkenay.

But they were up against Briege Corkery and Oria Cotter, who never play second fiddle to anyone. Cotter broke more than her share of ball around midfield and with Corkery and Gemma O'Connor picking it up, was instrumental in setting up many of the Cork at-

Contrast the Cork forward line, who had six scorers compared to Kilkenny's three, with Aoife Neary got all bar two of their points. In fairness to Kilkenny they didn't make it easy for Cork to score and they had to use all their experience to break down a resolute defence

Kilkenny played with a seventh defender to try and thwart the Cork attack and it took the champions some time to settle and find a way through. With 16 minutes

gone, Kilkenny were in front by a point, but two minutes later Gemma O'Connor equalised and Cork then hit three more, without reply, as they put their opponents under pressure up front.

By half-time, Cork were three points up and it was going to take something special for Kilkenny to emerge as winners. Early points from Rachel Moloney, Eimear O'Sullivan and O'Connor soon had Cork in a commanding lead and like many games they played this year, they finished much the stronger side. Anytime Kilkenny threatened to come back at them the defence stood strong and set up the platform for the forwards to put Cork even further ahead.

With 15 minutes to play Cork were in front by double scores and the game was effectively over as a

contest and when they added three more points late on it laid down a marker that they have no intention of giving up the O'Duffy Cup easily and it's going to take a special side to beat them.

No doubt the thoughts of many will be turning to three in a row, something Cork have only managed once before. They have won two many times, but it seems to be a stumbling block to make it three. This panel have the talent, ability and desire to do so and it also takes a little luck and with that bit of luck they are capable of putting that ghost to rest next year.

But for now the O'Duffy Cup is safely back in Cork and no doubt there will be massive celebrations as it makes it way from Kent Stations to the Mall tonight at 8pm and then on to Douglas GAA club.

Jenny's close friend Emer O'Farrell was also over the moon with the win.


O'Farrell's scored a number of goals on the way to the final but didn't manage to get one on the day.

It was a masterful display and they restricted Kilkenny to just two points from play for the entire game, which tells its own story.

Up front centre-forward Gemma O'Connor led the attack as she encouraged all those around her and led by example, scoring three mag-


But the Cork forward line just didn't slot over the scores all afternoon, they too defended when they had to and made it difficult for Kilkenny to clear their lines.

On the rare occasion that Kilkenny did break through they found Aoife Murray adding to her reputation as the best camogie keeper in the country at the moment and on two occasions when they had one on ones with her Aoife came out on top.

O'Flynn: Rebel rule not a problem

CAMOGIE president Joan O'Flynn has rejected suggestions that Cork's dominance in the code is having a negative impact on the sport.

The Rebels contested their eighth consecutive decider against Kilkenny on Sunday, winning five All-Ireland senior titles since 2002. However O'Flynn is adamant the championship remains busely competitive.

remains hugely competitive.

She explained: "We have had different finalists in the last four years — Kilkenny, Galway, Wexford and Tinnerary."

Tipperary.

"So, there you have genuine contenders, which illustrate the increasing strength in depth in standards across the counties. Dublin, Clare and Limerick have come up from the junior ranks to senior, and the future is promising for Clare, having reached the 2008 and 2009 minor finals while Limerick won the All Ireland minor B title.

"Offaly's achievement in winning the junior final makes them good enough to compete at intermediate level, while the defeated finalists Waterford are making great strides. They took part in the Munster senior championship this year losing to Cork by a point — albeit the champions were minus a few of their better known names.

"Nonetheless, this will tell them if they continue to work hard, it will pay rich dividends."

O'Flynn added: "The high standards are broadening across a wider number of counties.

"Look at Kerry and Na Brideoga (Mayo), who won Féile titles during the summer.

"It is only a matter of time before this progress is rewarded at adult level. "Roscommon won the Nancy Murray Cup for the first time, and O'Donovan Rossa from Antrim took their inaugural All-Ireland senior club title last November. Cavan won the Junior Blitz which indicates great days are ahead for them.

"The September showdown in Croke Park is the showcase of camogie. The speed and athleticism of the games are displayed, and another skill that featured on Sunday was aerial dominance and brilliant fielding."

Camogie introduced a new innovation at this year's final with winning captain Amanda O'Regan receiving her All-Ireland medal on the steps of the Hogan Stand.

HERE IS a debate ongoing in GAA circles whether under-age games should be based on competition or participation.

Recent innovations in games development have stressed the importance of participation rather than the winning of competitions. Thus the Go Games model has become a feature of many under-age units of the GAA.



In some units of Cumann na mBunscol there has been a move towards participation rather than competition. For example, in Wicklow, the everpopular Corn na Milaoise, an indoor football competition for pupils in rang a tri and rang a ceathair, is now a non-competitive event.

In the recently-launched GAA Strategic Plan there is an emphasis on participation rather than the competitive element of our games. If this comes to pass it will mean that all units of Cumann na mBunscol will have to look at their events and redesign some of them.

The ever-popular INTO/GAA Mini Sevens series of games at regional and national level are noncompetitive. This is something that Games Development in Croke Park wants to examine, but in the meantime, the selection process in most counties still seems to be based on competition.

At present most counties use a competition to select the school that goes on to represent the

county at regional level. Even though there is a sliding scale of age limits that allows older pupils from smaller schools to participate, the pattern in many counties seems to be that it is the same few schools that reach the regional festivals and ultimately have a pupil play in Croke Park on big match days.

Dublin, with the largest number of school children in the country, uses the participation model to select children for Croke Park. Basically each school sends two representatives to a selection day in the Phoenix Park where children are assessed on their skills and in non-competitive matches.



In this way they seem to be able to spread the epresentation fairly equally acros with no schools dominating. Is this the way other counties should go?

TO SAY that the last 12 months have been a disaster zone for Waterford teams in All-Ireland finals would be a contender for understatement of the year – and I'm afraid that trend didn't show any signs of turning at Croke Park on Sunday last as Waterford went down to Offaly in the county's first ever appearance in the All-Ireland junior camogie final.

Last September it was the county's senior team in the All-Ireland final, then on St. Patrick's Day last it was De La Salle in the All-Ireland club final and on Sunday last the camogie team made it three hugely disappointing appearances for Waterford teams on All-Ireland final day in Croke Park this past year.

Much like their senior hurling counterparts, the Waterford camogic team too had to go through the pain of four All-Ireland semi-final

defeats before they finally made it to the Promised Land and qualified for an All-Ireland decider.

Having beaten Offaly well when they met earlier this year in the group stages of the championship, Waterford came into this game confident of a big performance but alas on the day it didn't happen for them and there's no doubt that the occasion got to them - especially in the first-half. On top of that Offaly's appearance in last year's final, where they were only denied by a last minute goal, definitely stood to them and they coped much better with the more familiar surroundings of All-Ireland final day.

Waterford came into the game showing one change in personnel from the side that defeated Laois in the semi-final, with Aine Breathnach coming in for Jenny Simpson.

It was Offaly who got away to the better start and registered two early points, through Arlene Watkins and an Elaine Darmody free before Waterford got off the mark in the fourth minute through Aine Lyng. The excellent Michelle Davis made it three to one for the Faithful county before Offaly were awarded a penalty on five minutes after Siobhan Flannery was pulled down in the square.

Despite lining out at corner-forward, Patricia

Jackman, came back to stand in goal for the penalty and it was a good move as she made an excellent double save to deny Elaine Darmody the game's opening goal.

OFFALY DOMINANT

Karen Kelly, now operating at centre-forward, got Waterford's second white flag on the quarter of an hour mark before the game swung further in Offaly's favour when they struck for the game's opening goal just before the 20 minute mark.

The ever dangerous Elaine Darmody came out from her full-forward position to collect the ball 30 yards out before setting off for goal and despite the best intentions of Sally O'Grady and Aisling O'Brien, she still

managed to palm the sliothar to the Waterford net to give her side a 1-5 to 0-2 advantage.

Karen Kelly stemmed the tide with a Waterford point from a free before Offaly really took over and stamped their authority on this game with five points in six minutes, four of them coming from the stick of Elaine Darmody (with two of those from play).

Despite being now very much under the cosh and having to play second fiddle to a very lively and talented Faithful side, Waterford did get the final score of the opening half when Patricia Jackman finished off a great run with a fine point. This left the Deise girls facing a mightily steep second-half mountain to climb as they

trailed at the interval by 1-11 to 0-4.

Waterford very nearly got the perfect start to the second period when Karen Kelly, inside the first minute, burst through only to be denied by an excellent save by Offaly goalkeeper, Audrey Kennedy.

Aine Lyng opened their second-half tally soon after before the goal they so badly needed arrived after five minutes. A storming solorun by Nicola Morrissey set up the chance before she hand passed inside to Patricia Jackman who billowed the net. This was the lifeline that Waterford so badly needed.

BIG IMPROVEMENT

Further points from Aine Lyng and Karen Kelly frees had the deficit down to six with twelve minutes remaining, when disaster struck for Waterford.

Up to this point they had been well on top in the second-half all over the field and they looked as though they could open up the Offaly defence and get the goals they needed to really get themselves back into this game and maybe, just maybe pull off one of the greatest comebacks ever seen in Croke Park.

But any hopes of that happening were dashed when Offaly struck for two goals in as many minutes against the run of play.

The first goal was made by Michelle Davis who did all the hard-work before her effort at goal was thwarted by a hook, but the ball spilled free into the path of corner-forward Siobhan Flannery and she made no mistake from close range.

Less than ninety seconds later the game really was over as a contest when Offaly struck for goal number three. This time it was a one woman effort. Arlene Watkins picked it up forty yards from goal on the right and just took off. Then, after a brilliant run, she finished brilliantly to the top corner for a brilliant individual goal.

DOWN BUT NOT OUT

From here there was no way back for Waterford and the dream of a first All-Ireland junior camogie crown was gone.

But in fairness to the Waterford team, they never threw in the towel or let their heads drop and but for the excellence of the Offaly goalkeeper they could have found themselves much closer. They did get a second goal, with just over three minutes remaining, when Aine Lyng found the net, before Nicola Morrissey rounded off the scoring late on.

Alas it wasn't to be but no criticism can be leveled at the team or the management for their whole hearted approach to the game – on the day it just wasn't to be their day.

We mustn't forget that 12 months ago Offaly lost the final to Clare and came back a year later to lift the title – if Offaly can do it then there's no reason why Waterford can't do the same.

Here's to 2010 girls.

Two goals in two minutes for Offaly, against the run of play, restored their lead to 12 and from there on in it was curtains for Waterford. A double knock-out blow delivered by Offaly. The other crucial spell that really put Offaly in the driving seat was a six minute spell midway through the first-half when the Faithful struck for five unanswered points.

ENTERTAINMENT VALUE


The second-half was a much better and more enjoyable game as Waterford put the first-half nerves behind them to really show the crowd what they are made of. But then those two goals killed the game as a contest but none of this will bother Offaly who swept to a first All-Ireland title at this grade.

REF WATCH

Didn't really have much to do which is testament to two very sporting teams, there wasn't a dirty stroke in the game which meant that the referee had a very easy day at the office. Unlike his counterpart in the previous Sunday's All-Ireland senior hurling final, the penalty decision was right but far less important in the overall scheme of this game.

WHAT'S NEXT?

Well twelve months ago Offaly felt the devastation that Waterford are feeling this week after they lost out to Clare. But after a while they regrouped and reformed, determined to bounce back and go one better in 2009 and they did. Now Waterford must do the same and make sure that next September they erase memories of last Sunday with a glorious All-Ireland triumph and finally win this county's overdue first All-Ireland junior title. 



The five phases are as follows:

through fun games. Mental: Develop confidence in executing basic skills.

Personal: Experience enjoyment and fun.

Lifestyle: Play at home. It must be noted that not all players will smoothly assimilate all phases of the pathway in a perfect manner. Many will develop different capacities at different rates.

Camogie introduced a new innovation at this year's final with winning Captain Amanda O'Regan being presented with her All Ireland medal on the Hogan steps. O'Flynn thought this worked very well, and she said the Camogie Association would definitely consider continuing with the idea.

Another big interest for the O'Neill family is rowing.



Kilkenny did not put it up to Cork when it mattered

ANOTHER senior intercounty camogie down and season All-Ireland another safely tucked away.

What of last weekend's final? Yes, it was a poor game. It wasn't what the game needed but from a Cork point of view they'll care little.

I'm sure Tipp would have loved to have won a poor All-Ireland hurling final instead of losing a thriller. I spoke about the referee beforehand and unfortunately my fears rung true. We had seven frees inside the opening six minutes and 29 throughout the game. In a 60-minute game you possibly have about 55 minutes of actual playing time, sometimes more, sometimes less. Taking 55 minutes as an approximate that's a free every 1.9 minutes. That type of statistic would kill any game.

I was disappointed with Kilkenny's play last Sunday and believe that they have a lot of work to do yet.

It wasn't due to an incredible performance by Cork either. Cork always looked as if they were doing just enough and had more in the tank if required. They were

never going to lose. I mentioned beforehand how Kilkenny pack their last line of defence and how this is a waste of time if players are picking off points 50 and 60 metres out. At one point

midway through the second half I looked towards Kilkenny's defence. There was a player standing all alone in front of the fullback, admiring the play out the field. What good she was doing there with Kilkenny chasing the game is a mystery to me. Gemma O'Connor, Emer O'Sullivan and Katrina Mackey when introduced all picked off scores from in and around the halfforward line. I felt Kilkenny's play in that sense

was pretty negative. A positive Kilkenny will take from the day was goalkeeper Aoife Murray receiving the RTE Player of the Match award. They should also take the inspiring play of Catriona Foley as another plus with Rena Buckley not far behind as they tested the Cork defence.

But two points from play is woeful in an All-Ireland final. Ann Dalton had a great first half. She faded somewhat in the second. Katie Power also had a good 30 minutes but it's hard to sustain that over the hour.

I didn't get to see the majority of The Sunday Game but tuned in just in time to see the 'Championship team of 2009' being announced. I rarely get into too much debate on these selections as they are a panel's view only and I'm quite sure if five panels were asked to select

their team that all five would differ in some way.

However I have to comment on Tipperary's Claire Grogan's inclusion. I'm a huge fan of Claire's and if I was picking a 'Team of the Decade' she would most certainly be on it. THERE were great scenes of celebration in Croke Park on Sunday last when Offaly captured the All-Ireland Junior Camogie title for the first time with a sensational victory over a Waterford side who had no answers.

It was an exceptionally professional and clinical performance by Offaly as they took control of the game from an early stage, made their superiority count on the scoreboard once they got over a somewhat nervous opening quarter and snuffed all life out of Waterford by the closing ten minutes.

It was a remarkably comfortable win by Offaly who suffered a heart breaking defeat to Clare in last year's All-Ireland final when they fell to a dramatic last gasp goal.

That defeat instilled a fiery determination to bounce back into the Offaly girls and they achieved their ambitions with style and substance.

Their 3-14 to 2-8 win was also a remarkable turn around as Offaly had suffered a humiliating fourteen point defeat by Waterford in the first round of the championship in Kinnatty earlier in the summer. At the time Offaly had not got the trauma of the previous September's All-Ireland final defeat out of their system but the Waterford defeat and the manner of it proved to be a season defining experience.

It told Offaly that they had no God given right to return to Croke Park on All-Ireland final day but more importantly, they knuckled down after this and qualified for the All-Ireland semi-final with wins over Dublin and Down.

It is difficult to explain the difference between a fourteen point defeat in July and a nine point victory on Sunday but the All-Ireland final was a more accurate reflection of the difference between the teams -Offaly had easily defeated Waterford in the All-Ireland semi-final last year and that coupled with the comprehensive nature of Sunday's win suggests that the defeat earlier this year was a mere blip, one of those freak results that can crop up from time to time.

In hindsight, it was probably the best thing that happened Offaly - It meant that there was absolutely no room for complacency and it was a fiercely determined Offaly team that took to the Croke Park field.

Offaly hit the ground running and by half time, captain Marion Crean had one hand on the cup as her charges led by 1-11 to 0-4.

Even when Waterford scored a quick fire goal and a point at the start of the second half to cut the deficit to six points, Offaly didn't panic - They kept their composure, kept trying to do the right thing and

a magnificent Offaly defence and with the winning post in sight, there was no stopping the Faithful women. Goals from Siobhan Flannery and Arlene Watkins finally put the game out of Waterford's reach and in the last ten minutes, Offaly were able to relax and sayour the whole atmosphere.

Waterford's second goal from Aine Lyng four minutes from time wasn't even a consolation score and this was as one sided a final as you are likely to witness all year.

Every Offaly player played their part in this victory but like any game, there were some players who put their head above others. Audrey Kennedy displayed calm nerves and steady hands in goals and one late save from Karen Kelly was right out of the top drawer.

Lorraine Keena, Michaela Morkan, who did well to contain Waterford's best player, Aine Lyng, and Sheila Sullivan were on song in a no nonsense defence. In years to come, Offaly's forwards may get a lot of the credit for this win as they scored a fine 3-14 but special praise must go to the defence. As a unit they were superb, they tackled fairly and tenaciously and built the foundations that provided the platform for the forwards to pull the trigger.

Arlene Watkins and Marion

Crean controlled midfield and up front, Elaine Darmody produced a player of the match performance at full forward. She scored the first half goal that really put Offaly on the road to victory and was a constant thorn in Waterford's side. It was particularly apt that Darmody had such a productive afternoon as she was full back when Clare got their winning goal in last year's All-Ireland final but on Sunday, her scoring exploits were instrumental in the win.

Darmody was magnificent but the supporting cast also played starring roles with Tina Hannon, Michelle Davis, Siobhan Flannery and Karen Nugent all making a scoring contribution and playing really well in general play.

Special mention has to be made of Michelle Davis. At 37, she is the 'mammy' of this Offaly team and has given years of unstinting service to Offaly camogie, many of them when Offaly were struggling to make their mark. Sunday was a richly deserved reward for her and it was very fitting that she played a heroic role in Offaly's wish. Davis fired over three points, set up the match

Elaine Darmody penalty was saved on the Waterford line and for a few minutes, it looked like being one of those days.

Offaly did register points from Arlene Watkins, Elaine Darmody (Free) and Michelle Davis (Two) to lead by 0-4 to 0-2 after fifteen minutes. The amount of possession they had warranted a much bigger lead and this was a concern but at the same time, Offaly were so superior throughout the field that it was difficult to envisage them not winning, even at that early stage.

In the second quarter, however, Offaly put daylight between the teams. Tina Hannon fired over a point and then Elaine Darmody strode through the heart of the Waterford defence to score a very good goal, managing to flick the ball to the net even when losing her balance.

A Karen Kelly free kept Waterford in the hunt but Offaly then upped the ante by several notches. A great spell of attacking play yielded points from Elaine Darmody (Four, three frees), Siobhan Flannery with a powerful shot that could have been a goal, and Tina Hannon as Offaly pulled clear. A Patricia Jackman point left Waterford trailing by 1-11 to 0-4 at half time and up to their necks in trouble.

There had to be some resistance in Waterford and to their credit, they did throw caution to the wind early in the second half. An Aine Lyng point was followed by a Patricia Jackman goal to cut the deficit to six points.

Another couple of scores might have really tested Offaly but instead they displayed ice cool nerves with Michelle Davis firing over a hugely important point in the 5th minute. While Waterford got two more frees in the next few minutes, Elaine Darmody floated over a lovely point for Offaly. Ahead by 1-13 to 1-7 with fourteen minutes left, there was no way Offaly were going to let it slip this time.

Michelle Davis did the donkey work to set up Siobhan Flannery for a very clinical goal in the 18th minute. Arlene Watkins added a magnificently taken goal in the 19th minute and in the last ten minutes, Offaly were able to saunter home. Their final point came from the stick of Karen Nugent and while Waterford got in for a late goal and a point, this was very much a case of shutting the door after the horse had bolted.





It would be even tougher if you spent hours in the car in an effort to make training night after night, with not a cent claimed in expenses.



All present were hugely impressed by the manner in which the whole evening was organised and they will now return to their clubs to get the process under way.

Delegates were informed that the garda vetting process will be handled in the most confidential manner and those who undergo this process will complete a Garda Vetting Application form.

This will be put in a sealed envelope marked "Garda Vetting" and given to their club's children's officer.

The club's children's officer will forward the batch of completed application forms unopened to the county board's children's officer.

It's been a fabulous season for the management crew - Stephen Hoary, Gretta Byrne and Andy Molloy, a trio who had nothing but


praise for the dedicated squad. Niamh Humphreys is the captain and also a tidy defender.

In fact, she's a phenomenon. Just look at her achievements in

the accompanying factfile and you'll get the picture.

What more needs to be said about someone who's won 12 All-Ireland senior medals in camogie and ladies football, seven and five, respectively?

The 2007 camogie final defeat by Wexford was one of those rare afternoons of disappointment and

frustration.

But O'Connor still had the prospect of the football final to come against Mayo, Cork's fiercest rivals, and strong hopes of another successful conclusion to the intercounty season

The Killeagh native, however, didn't make it, as she explained.

"It was the Wednesday night after the camogie final, when I was training with the footballers.

"We were having a practice game and as I came down from challenging for a ball I hyper-extended my knee on falling.

"At the time the doctor thought my cruciate was gone and I had lateral collateral damage, too, the ligament torn off the bone.

"He said he couldn't operate on the cruciate until the other injury healed and that I'd never play intercounty again."

Mary O'Connor captured her 12th All-Ireland medal this year but her journey to greatness has not been without its ups and downs due to a serious injury scare

Given that O'Connor had already a bucketful of honours and had nothing to prove to anyone it would have come as little surprise if she called it a day.

"I've always said I want to retire on my own terms so that made me more determined than ever to get

"I put my head down and just worked and worked to return to

"I went to the pool in the Quality Hotel in Youghal twice a day for

six months, jogging up and down. "I went back for another scan after about four months and while there was still 80% bruising, the surgeon admitted he had a mis-

take. That was the news she had waited to hear and her rehabilitation resumed with even greater urgency - if that was possible

with more remarkable results. The question was which all of her All-Ireland medals she would keep should the choice bere to be

"I'd have either of the 2008 medals (the camogie win over Galway in a very tight contest), but the sweetest of all was the football final win over Monaghan.

"I scored two points and contributed to a brilliant team perform-

"After what had happened the previous year I didn't think I'd get the opportunity again.

"Captaining Cork five-in-a-row this season was very special, but this wouldn't have happened if I didn't get my act together in 2007.

The second youngest in a family of six brothers and two sisters, sport was always at the centre of home life.

And Killeagh's strong hurling and camogie tradition made it easy enough for her to fall into it as well.

"I was always out in the garden either kicking a football or playing hurling. It was here I first heard the expression 'if you can't stand the heat get out of the kitchen'.

"There was no real access to soccer or basketball growing up in the 1980s. You either played GAA or

nothing at all." Little surprise then that her chosen career path should be sport

"I studied leisure and recreation in college before taking up the position of GAA Development Officer at Limerick IT for four years.

I remember we had literally nothing there, no pitch or anything, before the college began upgrading its facilities.

"We won Trench Cups and reached the Fitzgibbon Cup semi-final one year, but got hammered by Waterford IT.

"A short time later LIT dominated hurling.

"After that I was coaching in the primary schools in East Cork for four years.

"Then I was the Regional Development Officer for camogie, covering Munster and south Leinster before the current job came up after about 18 months.

"I'm director of camogie development. There are seven regional development officers around the



Mary O'Connor, with her sons John and Kevin who played in the East Cork Junior Football final for Glenbower Rovers on the same day her daughter, also Mary, played for Cork against Kilkenny in the All-Ireland senior final.

"I make out work programmes for them as well as looking at club structures, player development, schools of excellence, academies, up-skilling coaches and adminis-

"A lot of our work is in developing camogie in places like Mayo, Kerry, Monaghan and Donegal. while also trying to consolidate what we have in the traditional counties, Cork, Tipperary and Clare, for example.

"There's a fierce amount of driving involved. From now until February I could be away four nights of the week every week.

"It actually slots in nicely with my playing career, because once May comes all the clubs are active, playing games etc, and my travelling is reduced.

"Because I'm dealing with volunteers most of my work is at night and during the winter.

"Then during the summer, I'm getting ready to organise next, winter's programmes.

"I really love my job. I'm in it now two-and-a-half years."

The question doing the rounds is O'Connor's intentions for next season, not that it requires answering one way or the other just now.

Especially as the dual sensation is hardly eligible for free travel, so there's plenty of time to weigh up the pros and cons.

"For me at the start of every season it is the challenge of getting there and the challenge of keeping country and I'm supervising them. your place that keeps me going

"Once January comes around I'm thinking 'I'm going to have another go at this'.

"I'm going to get myself up, do all the disciplined things, make the hard choices. There's almost a sadistic enjoyment to be had out of it.

"I love a challenge and I enjoy the training and the friendship among both squads.

"I love seeing if I still have the ability to keep my place as I look over my shoulder at all the great players chasing me.

"I love seeing if I can still get up to the high standards of fitness and skill levels required to play for

"I know the minute I stop enjoying it I will give up.

"There will come a day, when I won't be good enough, quick enough or strong enough and I'll have to cope with that, too.

"If it was only about the All-Ireland medals, I would have retired a long time ago.

"For me it's all about the enjoyment, the camaraderie, the friends. "Indeed I've friends for life now after playing with Cork in both sports.

"Four doubles in five years is something special and great for women's sport.

"It will come to that eventually, but at the moment I'm not even thinking about it."

The influence of football coach Eamon Ryan cannot be stressed enough, not only in O'Connor's success story, but the astonishing rise in Cork's footballing stock generally.

"He's such a fantastic coach that even to go training is a learning experience.

You take so much from a session that it would be very hard to walk away from that aspect.

"The quality of the training sessions with Eamonn is very high. He's a brilliant coach."

Which leads nicely on to life after playing, a possible Cork coach in either code down the line?

"When I was younger I would have fancied it all right, but now I wouldn't say so because of the job

"Managing is far more difficult than being a player, because you have to take everybody's feelings into consideration.

"I might get involved at underage at club level."

It's not easy to switch off completely from sport, but O'Connor is still able to unwind in the company of familiar faces.

"I've 16 nieces and nephews and I try to see them as often as I

"I like my own space, too, going for walks and listening to music.

"I have fantastic friends involved in camogie and fantastic friends who have no interest in the sports whatsoever and couldn't care whether I've a dozen All-Ireland medals or none.

"There's a lot of understanding there from my family as well.

"We're very much familyoriented and they all live within five or six miles of the home

"Ann excommunicated herself to Fr O'Neill's all right, but we will forgive here for that.



HAVING tasted the heartbreak of losing out in a county final to Carrigdhoun in 2005, Milford captain Elaine O'Riordan is determined not to experience the same feelings at 5pm on Sunday.

"Losing to Carrigdhoun was awful and I will never forget the feeling.

"The average age of the team was around 17 and it was a wonderful for us we were in the senior final.

"But we were a bit in awe of the whole thing and sure we thought we would be in it every year. It has taken us four years to get back and this time out, hopefully we will be in the winning dressing room."

While she is eagerly looking forward to appearing in her second county final more importantly she deems it a huge honour to be leading out Milford on Sunday as captain.

"When the selectors told me I was captain I was honoured to be chosen. So many of the other girls could have been picked it is a huge honour to lead my club.

"We have a great group of players. Some of us have been together since primary school and if we could win on Sunday it would be a dream come true."

It has always been Elaine's ambition to win a senior county championship medal. She is the holder of underage honours form U12 to senior B championship — the one medal she wants is a senior county.

"I just want one so badly.

"Some of their players have five or six medals. I think maybe Sandie Fitzgibbon has even nine or 10.

"Then I look at a club like Fr O'Neill's and they tried so hard and they eventually won it. It was the great that players like Fiona O'Driscoll, Mags Finn and Colette O'Mahony (the Barrs) battled for years to get a county medal and finally got one. I suppose that would give us heart to keep trying."

The start of the season brought new coaching staff and a new buzz to the Milford camp and they have gone from strength to strength:

"This year Maurice O'Sullivan came on board as trainer and he has been great, Ann Watson and Ellen Ann Geary are selectors with him and he has brought freshness to everything.

"He brought in the younger players such as Niamh O'Brien and Orlaith O'Mahony, who are only 16 and Louise O'Flynn who is still 15 and these girls are not afraid to get stuck in.

O'Riordan is mindful of the huge role she and the more experienced players on the panel play.

"I suppose we are the older ones and we are a lot more wary and a bit fearful of losing having been there before but the younger ones are great they all stepped up to the mark and slotted in playing senior easily."

It is hard to imagine that Elaine is still a student given that she seems to be playing camogie a long time and this year she makes a return home to Cork to study quantity surveying in CIT having finished construction studies in LIT.

"I am really looking forward to the year ahead in CIT and it will be great to play Ashbourne Cup. I have never played it as LIT only played in the Meagher Cup, so hopefully that will keep me playing camogie in the winter."

Elaine started out in Milford National School under the guidance of current senior selector Ann Watson and Sheila Thompson, whose daughter lines out with the team on Sunday.

"Ann and Sheila did huge work in the school and myself, Lisa Healy, Marie Watson and Anna Geary were all in the same class and we have been playing together ever since."

Progression to play with the club saw Elaine annex many underage honours, but leading Milford to the Cork Féile na nGael title in 1999 was special. "We won the Cork Féile and represented the county but we lost out to Oulart-The-Ballagh from Wexford and they have gone on to win a few Wexford and Leinster club titles so maybe our turn will come on Sunday."

Having led St Mary's, Charleville to capture an All-Ireland seven-a-side title, Elaine is the holder of six All-Ireland senior colleges All-Ireland medals with St Mary's.

"Vincent Harrington, Ann Marie O'Keeffe and Ger Donovan were great at school for the work they put in."

Elaine has huge respect for their opponents St Catherine's and is not surprised to see them in the final.

"They are a club who have made huge strides and at underage level.

"They have produced some great players they were very impressive in the semi on Monday against the Barrs."

With both clubs battling to creating history, Elaine was being cautious when asked for a prediction.

"I don't think there is a raging favourite here and I think it will come down to who really wants it most.

On thing is sure, Elaine O Riordan will be doing everything in her power from her usual role in the heart of the Milford defence to drive her players forward, as she has done all year.

"We had to be at our best to beat Courcey Rovers with five points to spare and we were lucky to grab a draw first day out against the Barrs.

"We are under no illusions about Milford. We know they're a very good side."

Coming from a club and an area steeped in Gaelic games tradition, Marie is very mindful of the huge honour it is for St Catherine's to be in a camogie county senior championship final.

A lot of credit must go to the young coach, who during a busy season, has fitted in playing intercounty hurling at intermediate level with Cork as well as club hurling with Ballyhea and sometimes clashes must have been inevitable.

"Sometimes it was not easy to fit in everything but we took it week by week and once I had the schedules I was able to work around them. The camogie board set out the fixture calendar for the club championship games early in the year and it was a great guide, there was a lot of co-operation from the club as well as some weeks I would have to change a training session, but it all worked out well."

Maurice is very appreciative of the help form Milford officials Ann Watson and Ellen Ann Gary, who are selectors with him. "Both Ann Watson and Ellen Ann Geary are great and we work well together and they have huge experience at this level."

Looking ahead to Sunday's final, Maurice is mindful of the strength of the opposition.

"It took a replay to separate St Catherine's and St Finbarr's and in both games St Catherine's looked impressive. Like us they have put in a massive effort and will leave no stone unturned."

Maurice was introduced to the game by his father Mossie, while his recently deceased grandfather Mossie O'Sullivan played at junior level with Cork.

"My grandfather passed away recently and he was involved in the game and I was reared with hurling, and having attended CIT, where I studied Recreation and Leisure, it was there got into the coaching end of things."

Among the people in CIT that Maurice would have played with and been coached by were Cork senior coaches Frank Flannery and Keith Ricken and both come in for huge praise.

"Frank did a superb job with the Cork senior camogie team this year, while Keith is doing tremendous work in the GAA coaching and they would have been a great help to me while in CIT."

Despite his young age, he found it easy to take command and get the show on the road. "I suppose Milford down through the years have been one of the strongest underage camogie clubs and they have won an awful lot.

"They have always been a good senior club side. This year the older players especially are really focused on the county championship.

"A lot of the older players have taken on responsibility and the younger ones have stepped up to the mark and every one of them has put in huge effort."

As the clock ticks towards Sunday, Maurice has plenty of time to put the final touches to his plans.

"At present I find myself unemployed so there is plenty of time for camogie training and hopefully once the final is over I'll be able to hunt around and pick something up."

He is hoping that Sunday will round off a superb year on and off the playing fields for him.

"I suppose winning the All-Ireland was a great thrill and to have a medal is something special, but now it would be great if my contribution as a trainer can help in some small way to help Milford achieve their dream."

One gets the impression that, win or lose on Sunday, we will be hearing a lot more from Maurice O'Sullivan as his total dedication and professionalism to camogie and hurling is plain to be seen.

St Catherine's and Milford vie for title fixtures

Club history

SINCE the competition's inception in 1932, a total of 18 clubs have had their names engraved as holders of the most prestigious camogie title.

Fourteen clubs, three divisions, one university and one school have garnered the honour of being crowned Cork Senior County cham-

Tomorrow St Catherine's and Milford aim to make it a historic first as they contest the final.

In 1932 a group of school girls took the Science Cup for the first time, when the pupils from St Aloysius became the inaugural winners.

1933 saw Nora Kelleher carry the trophy in triumph as Muskerry took their first title and they had to wait until 2007 before Catriona Foley followed in her footsteps.

Kitty Cotter led Mayfield to their crown in 1935 and in 1936 there were new champions as UCC led by Lil Kirby defeated Hillside.

Lee Hosiery were led by Mary Valley to the first of their successes in 1937, again in 1938 new champions climbed the victory rostrum as Old Aloysian's Past pupils were crowned champions. Captained by Renee Fitzgerald, the club would go on and add 14 more titles to their collection.

1947 heralded success for another divisional side when Imokilly defeated Lee Hosiery, Imokilly in later years added a further five titles.

Mary Delea led Blackrock to glory in 1948 when the Rockies proved to strong for the champions Imokilly as they brought the first of two titles to the famous club.

1950 was Glen Rovers' year as Siobhán O'Brien led her side to victory over Blackrock, Glen went on to add a further 21 titles and lead the roll of honour with the most titles to their credit.

We had to wait until 1969 before another new name was added to the roll of honour and it was again past pupils who were creating their own bit of history when Mary Crowley led the South Pres girls to title number one, in later year's two more titles were added.

Again a big gap until 1977 when Mid Cork were to the fore with the emergence of Eire Og as champions the hoodoo that had followed them a 72-year-gap in 2007 before last year

led by Marion McCarthy (nee Reck). The Ovens girls have added to their achievements on three further

occasions. East Cork was to the fore as Breda Landers led Killeagh to their first success in 1980 four more titles fol-

A big gap between 1980 and 1997 before new champions emerged when Eithne Duggan led Bishopstown to the first of their four county championship successes.

In less than two years we again had new champions when Stephanie Dunlea held the trophy aloft for the girls from Cloughduv - they retained the title the following year.

In 2003 Fr O'Neill's finally broke

when Fiona O'Driscoll carried the Punch Shoe Care Trophy in triumph to Ballymacoda, after O'Neill's defeated Inniscarra. The following year divisional side Carrigdhoun took their first title led by Ballygarvan's Catriona Kelly. Cloughduv were back the following year as Inniscarra again suffered heartbreak.

Twenty-one years of trying came to an end for Colette O'Mahony in 2006 as her beloved Blues finally took the title, with Lynda O'Connell receiving the trophy from her fellow club member and Barrs selectors county board chairperson Marian McCarthy. Gerald McCarthy was Barrs boss that season.

Divisional side Muskerry bridged

Douglas took their first crown spearheaded by the youthful Julia White and the Mackey twins Pamela and Katriona, as proud captain Amanda O'Regan became the first Douglas woman to lift the trophy.

Experienced campaigner Elaine O' Riordan leads Milford while Faith Noonan captains St Catherines. Both are players who have given so much to their respective clubs and they will be hoping to make it to the history books of their own club by becoming the first player to captain a winning senior county championship sides.

Whether the Punch Trophy winds it way to North Cork or East Cork tonight be assured it will receive a huge welcome, the first one is always so special.

Before forming the club the Milford girls won All-Ireland Community Games in 1996 and 1997 and numerous Sciath na Scoil competitions, coached by Sheila Thompson N.T. and Ann Watson. The club caters for all age groups of girls in the parish and is a great source of recreation for our youth.

The club has won every county title from under 12 to Senior B as well as reaching the Feile Na nGael finals in 1999 and 2007 and the All-Ireland semi-final in 2000.



"It's great to win a championship at any level. I am just so proud that today is St Catherine's day.


Whe victory is a tribute to the many people who have worked with all of these players down through the years without their hard work we would not be here today."

What trait do you least like in yourself? I tend to be impulsive and can act without thinking


Do you pray?

Oulart out to rock Cashel

AFTER FIVE years of heartbreak they finally delivered Leinster glory, and Oulart-The Ballagh's camogie force are out to make it another first by getting through to the All-Ireland Club championship decider when they host Cashel in Sunday's penultimate round showdown (2.30p.m.).

The Tipperary women, who won the national crown in 2007, captured their sixth Munster title and fourth within the space of five years - on Sunday week last when scoring a thumping 4-20 to 0-12 win over St. Catherine's of Cork. So, while they certainly boast an advantage in terms of experience, Cashel face a big ask when coming into Oulart's own territory for what promises to be a humdinger.

While October's 3-14 to 1-6 win over Freshford of Kilkenny yielded Oulart's first Leinster title, they are anything but strangers to glory, meaning that they'll be in absolutely no awe of a high-achieving Cashel team which numbers such Tipperary aces as Claire Grogan, Una Dwyer and Philly Fogarty.

Indeed, much of this Oulart crew were involved as the club annexed the



five-in-a-row of All-Ireland Féile under-14 premier crowns between 1998 and 2002, with many of those players having also steered Colaiste Bride of Enniscorthy to All-Ireland Colleges senior and junior honour. Then came the big club breakthrough when they finally won the county senior championship in 2003, and added the next four for good measure.

"But losing to Rathnure last year was a wake-up team captain Mary Leacy says, reflecting on their county final defeat to

their keenest rivals. "We just seemed to think that we'd win the county championship every year, so what happened last year was probably the best thing ever."

It certainly means they have a greater appreciation of their opportunities. 'We sat down last February, and the three selectors (Brendan O'Connor, Anne Kirwan, and Mary's mother Margaret) said what they expected of us. They set down a strict policy of discipline, and everyone of us has stuck to that.

Training has been brilliant, and the commitment has really been upped a few levels," the inspirational centre-back says, before pointing out: "That's how we're getting the success now."

While Oulart took a while to get their chops around the challenge of winning Leinster, as they continually bit the dust against Freshford, Mary does highlight that: "Much of the more experienced players on the team right now are only 23 years of age, so it's still quite a

young team. It's just beca a matter of us gaining experience, and last year's loss to Rathnure really rnide us want to achieve the breakthrough all the more this time round."

They decided to make a few promises to themselves earlier this year. The first was to win back the county silverware. The second was to win Leinsur. The third is to win the All-Ireland. "We actually played Cashel in Cashel two years ago in a challenge, and we did well against them. So we've nothing to fear," Mary suggests. "The only issue is that it's been five weeks since the Leinster final whereas Cashel have only just won Munster, and it has been hard for us to keep everything going.

"But we've had challenge matches, won the league title (for the eight year running), and we've had a few weeks of very hard training, and I really believe that if we play like we did in the Leinster final that we'll have a good chance of making

ST. IBAR'S were the last Wexford side to make camogie's All-Ireland Club senior championship final, when they lost out to Pearses of Galway out west in Ballinasloe (2-13 to 1-5).

In total, Wexford has contested the final ten times, winning six, with Buffers Alley prevailing on five occasions, to sit joint-second with the Pearses behind eight-time winners St. Paul's of Kilkenny.

The competition was start-

ed in 1964, and Buffers Alley was the first Wexford side to contest the final, losing to Ballyagran of Limerick by 1-3 to 0-1 in 1978. They made amends the following year, with a 2-6 to 1-2 win over Athenry. While the 'Alley succumbed to Killeagh (Cork) in the 1980 decider (4-2 to 1-7), they won the next four finals on the trot, gaining immediate revenge against Killeagh (2-6 to 1-4) before beating Athenry (3-2 to 0-2), St. Mary's of Galway (3-7 to 0-6) and then Kil-

leagh once again (2-4 to 1-4). Rathnure broke through to the final in 1992, only to suffer against Glen Rovers of Cork (1-9 to 0-2). But the black-and-amber returned in '95 to make amends, with a 4-9 to 1-5 win away to Toomevara of Tipperary

Tipp didn't make the Club decider igain until 1972, when Thurles Sarsfields lost to Austin Stacks of Dublin

(no, not the Kerry version) by 5-4 to 2-

It was 1995 before the Premier County champions again made this particu-lar final, with Toomevara coming off second-best on that occasion at home to our own Rathnure (4-9 to 1-5).

Cashel made the final in 2001, only to lose out to Pearses of Galway (2-8 to 0-13). They atoned in 2007 at the expense of another Galway outfit, this time Athenry, when scoring a 1-18 to 0-9 vic-

Hopefully their efforts to add another crown will be ended on Sunday by the current Wexford and Leinster standard-bearers.

ILKENNY'S hurlers may well have snatched the headlines in another riproaring year for Brian Cody's men, but what a year it has been for Kilkenny camogie too.

Their senior team reached the All-Ireland final and their minor team

completed the four-in-a-row. The success continued at colleges level, where St Brigid's, Callan annexed the All-Ireland Senior 'A' title and Loreto, Kilkenny won the AllIreland Junior 'A' title.

All this must bode well for the future of the game in Kilkenny, while some of the other counties look on in awe at their success

And it's certainly fair to say that a big portion of this success comes from schools, clubs and underage county teams working together.

The benefits of this approach can also be seen in other counties.

At colleges 'B' grade, for instance, there is a great success story emanating from Blackwater CS, Lismore and rising into the Waterford county sides.

In 2008, the Lismore side entered

the 'B' competition for the first timeand went on to win the All-Ireland title, beating Colaiste Mhic Naosa Garran Tower from Antrim in the semi-final and Sacred Heart, Tullamore in the final.

Some of this success duly rubbed off on the Waterford junior team. helping them to reach the All-Ireland final, where they lost out to Offaly. The resurgence in Waterford camegie was emphasised more recently when the St Anne's club won the Munster junior title.

Blackwater will now be looking forward with great anticipation to a first tilt at the 'A' title.

A lot of the credit for this success must go to Denis Ring, Fintan O'Connor and all the other coaches involved in Waterford at school, club

and county level. So, where will the various titles go this time round.

Will St Brigid's or Loreto continue the Kilkenny domination or will Christ the King, Cork come to the

Or will some new schools' power emerge and surprise everybody? It is harder to predict the eventual

winners of the 'B' and 'C' grades. Colaiste Choilm, Cork, will be looking to collect the Senior 'B' title to add to their Senior 'C' success of four years ago?

St Dominic's, Cabra will be hell bent on going one better than their All-Ireland Junior 'B' title bid of three years ago when they lost to Coachford

CC from Cork? Will St Paul's from Kilrea, in Derry, make up for the disappointment of losing the All-Ireland Junior 'C' final last year and win the Senior 'C' title

next March? Wherever the Ali-Ireland Colleges titles rest at the end of March 2010, let's hope one and all enjoy their Camogie and may the best teams win at all levels
