Goal-hungry Loreto power their way to first camogie title

We were led to believe that they were new to the sport and still finding their way in the world of post-primary schools' camogie. However, going on what we saw in Cashel last Saturday, it looked liked Loreto Secondary School, Fermoy, had invented the game. Making light of the incessant drizzle and slippery conditions, underfoot Loreto dominated this game from start to finish, and with the goals flowing freely (7 in total), they were never troubled by Scoil Mhuire, Ballinasloe, who battled away till the end.

The scores came early and often for Loreto - their supporters were barely in their seats, when midfielder and captain. Marie O'Neill had the ball in the net, courtesy of a long range free. The inspirational number 9 was at it again a couple of minutes later when she finished to the net, after Ballinasloe failed to clear their lines. Highly rated forward Denise Twomey, also got off the mark quickly, and struck over a nice point after 5 minutes. The diminutive St Catherine's player was a thorn in the side of the Ballinasloe defence all afternoon, and followed up her early point with a well-taken goal. On the points front, Scoil Mhuire were holding their own, and succeeded in raising 4 white flags during the first half. However, goals proved illusive, unless that

is, you were wearing a

Loreto jersey. Marie O'Neill was on the goal trail again midway through the first half, bursting past defenders and rifling past the opposition's keeper. Trisha Carroll, who plays her club camogie with Castlelyons was a constant threat in front of goal, and hit the net twice during the first 30 minutes. The first was a scrambled effort after good work by Ciara O'Driscoll and the second a neat ground stroke that gave the goalie no chance. Noreen O'Farrell, who surprisingly, didn't get on the score-sheet, was busy making scores for others, and can be well pleased with her efforts over the hour.

The six forwards all performed up to scratch with Orla Cotter, turning in another polished display. Showing no ill effects from her early season injury, the St Catherine's player always had the beating of her opponent, and by the time she was called ashore towards the end, Loreto were home and hosed (Aileen Hogan was her able replacement). Waterford girl, Mairead Finn, who plays with the Ballyduff club may be better known for her footballing skills, however she too, looked very comfortable throughout and did her fair share of defending as well as attacking.

When réiteoir, Rose Kelleher blew her whistle for half time, the electronic scoreboard read Loreto 5-05 to Ballinasloe's 04 points. In their heart of hearts, the Westerners probably knew, that even at this early stage, the game was lost.

During the interval,

Loreto players had a composed look about them, and following a team talk by coach Ger Holland, who counselled against over confidence, they took to the pitch again. Goalkeeper McCormack (Kilworth) who had a quiet first 30 minutes, was called into action early in the second half, and had to be very alert to keep out a goalbound effort. Michelle, who partnered Marie O'Neill at midfield covered a lot of ground during the hour, and having given her all, was replaced by her Watergrasshill clubmate Elaine O'Leary late on in the game. The other Loreto sub used was Ciara Lynch - corner back Laura Cronin making way for the Kilworth girl, who was understandably delighted to be part of the occasion. Indeed, Loreto had plenty of quality substitutes and no doubt the likes of Aoife Gardiner, Sarah Russell, O'Brien. O'Brien, Deirdre Twomey, Orla Neville and Deirdre Mulcahy will all get their chance in the not too distant future.

Ballinasloe did manage to pull back 2 goals, but by then the game was over as a

All-Ireland camogie double for Cork schools

AFTER winning the All Ireland senior camogie title the previous week, St Mary's Charleville went in search of a double on Saturday last at wet and windy Leahy Park, Cashel, when the junior side faced Enniscorthy.

This was a tremendous game with the issue in doubt right to the end.

The Charleville girls started well with an early goal by Emer Watson.

Colaiste Bride then had a point from Brona Furlong and by the 20th minute Charleville, with a goal by Elaine O'Riordan, edged seven points clear, 2-

Enniscorty then goaled in the closing minutes through Ann Murphy to makie it 2-4 to 1-5 at the break.

On the restart Louise Codd pointed a '45' for Enniscorty. St Mary's never panicked and inspite a lot of pressure from the Enniscorthy side it was Emer Watson who came to the rescue with two brilliant goals in quick succession that opened up a ten-point lead by the end of the third quarter 4-7 to 1-6.

Louise Codd then struck for two goals in the 48th and 50th minutes. Deirdre Codd with a 53rd minute point cut the lead to a solitary point. Enniscorthy forced level with 5 min-utes remaining Louise Codd gave Colaiste Bride the lead with only three

minutes remaining. However the experience of the Charleville girls told when it mattered most. Sinead McAuliffe pointed a free followed by the lead from Emer Watson. In injury time Sinead McAuliffe had point another ensured victory by a very narrow two-point margin.

After the game Mary Moran President Camogie Board presented the cup to the winning captain Emer Watson.

Daughter of John Dunlea, Canovee footballer and Cloughduv hurler, and Whitechurch mother, who played and won co and All Ireland honours with Glen Rovers, Lynn has had a rather chequered career in top class camogle. Her youthful talent was spotted and rewarded on being selected to the Cork senior team in 1990, but that new look Cork side were beaten by Kilkenny in the All Ireland semi final, which took place in Blalinclough where the

Leinster champions won by a goal. She retired from senior hurling, however, she made a dramatic comeback three years later when she and

her sister, Stephanie joined Glen Rovers, with whom she showed her power as one of the leading players. Accordingly she was selected for the Cork senior panel, and introduced to the team as a sub, I think against Kilkenny in the All Ireland semi final at a period of the game, when Cork were struggling with two points down, and time ticking away. Lynn Dunlea though surrounded by Kilkenny backs skilfully side stepped each of her swarming opponents whom she stunned beyond belief on scoring a goal. Cork supporters went wild when the ball crossed the goal line, and she was hailed a hero.

In the interim, Lynn Dunlea has accumulated a bag of medals won in every grade of the game.

The Dunlea sisters returned to Cloughduv, and helped the side in the championships, all the way to the senior county in 1997 final against Bishopstown in 1999, which Cloughduv lost to the defending champions, in Cloughduvs first senior final.



CONGRESSWOMEN

The decisions taken at Congress 2002 have huge implications for the future of camogie in many different ways.



or the first time in the history of the Camogie Association, a full-time treasurer at national level will be appointed. Delegates at the Clarenbridge venue for the annual Congress gave unanimous agreement to this important proposal, and it was decided that the incumbent treasurer to Golden would continue in office until she is replaced by a full-time appointee.

The position of treasurer has been a topic of debate for some time. With the overall development of the association, the workload has increased to such an extent that it has become virtually impossible for a person working on a voluntary basis to deal with it. It is envisaged that the job will become even more demanding in future years, so there was always a fear that this could militate against attracting and retaining anyone of their own free will. As well as dealing with the normal financial transactions of a national organization, it is imperative that a greater amount of time should be given to areas such as sponsorship, advertising and fund-raising. Furthermore, with the implementation of a Strategic Plan, the various sub-committees will require major development funding and effective distribution of such funds. So it was a timely appointment indeed.

Considering too that the Association will be celebrating its centenary in 2004, it is desirable that added impetus be given to the drive for sponsorship and funding over the next couple of months and that the momentum be maintained thereafter. Guest speaker at the conference, Joe McDonagh, is Priomhfheidhmeannach of Foras na Gaeilge, encapsulated the anticipated success of this milestone venture: "Carnogie has made an unique contribution to the women of Ireland, it has enriched Irish society through its sport and should celebrate fittingly its centenary." As regards the proposed Strategic Alliance with the GAA, the former President announced, "it is my dream that Carnogie and the GAA would have a future together."

An tUasal McDonagh also paid special tribute to one of camogie leading lights, 86-year-old Sighle Nic An Ultaigh of Down. The Mourne County lady, who is Honorary Life President of the Association, was one of the large attendance at Congress. He described her as "someone who has never seen any barners," and "the driving force behind so many different developments. In my estimation she is an outstanding person who has contributed greatly to both the GAA and Camogie."

Meanwhile, the process of rapid change affecting the Camogie Association is very apparent with the introduction of the Anti-Doping Code for the coming season. This programme will come into being during the All-Ireland Senior Championship and will apply only to intercounty senior team members over the age of 18.

Elsewhere, Central Council has been to the forefront in the area of coaching and games development, by compiling its first official coaching video, with some of the country's top players lending their support. Launching the video at Congress, Noel Treacy, Junior Minister of State for Science and Technology, spoke of how the video would bring camogie up to the same level as hurling, football and ladies football. It will also secure the future of the game by ensuring that future players are shown the proper skills of camogie. This video is available country-wide through county boards and also from Croke Park, at a cost of €30.

A motion from the Offaly County Board received the thumbs-up with the introduction of an All-Ireland Junior Club Championship in the near future. It is hoped that thenew competition will be implemented in next year's championship, but before this is carried out the Games Fixtures Committee will investigate how best it will be organized. Whether it should run in tandem with the existing senior club championship will be one aspect for debate, but before any decision will be made the Games Fixtures Committee will report back to Central Council with their recommendations.


National Secretary, Sile Wallace - whose official title has changed to Ard-Stiürthöir (Director-General) - delighted the audience with the news that the proposed merger with the GAA is set to progress. Very shortly, Croke Park officials will send out an interim questionnaire to all! the clubs in the country to see their current involvement with their local GAA clubs. It can then be determined what is happening at grassroots level. Before a concrete decision will be made, it is proposed to hold a Special Congress to deal with the matter.

The Wicklow County Board will host Congress 2003. 0



Hall of Fame for Deirdre Sutton

LMOST 20 years after hanging up her boots, for-mer Cork, Munster and Glen Rovers camogie great Deirdre Sutton found herself back in the limelight being honoured with the Jury's Hotel Hall of Fame award at a banquet on Sunday last.

One of the county's greatest goalkeepers, Deirdre enjoyed a career that spanned over 30 years, winning every honour in a game she graced with skill and class. Deirdre, although now retired from camogie, is treasurer of the camogie section in Glen Rovers while her sons Niall and Eoin Coleman are active member of Glen Rovers and St Nick's.

A pupil at St Vincent's school it was here that the young Deirdre Sutton learned her camogie and was a member of the team that took the Cork Schools Championship in 1960. In 1961 she made her inter county debut in goal against Limer-ick. It was to be the beginning of a wonderful Inter county career.

The holder of three All Ireland senior medals, Deirdre captained the

Cork Junior side in their quest for honours in 1971, and despite a stunning display from their captain the side lost out to Dublin. However, there was joy later in the evening as the seniors defeated Wexford to retain the O'Duffy. By now Deirdre Sutton had rejoined the senior panel as substitute goalkeeper and in 1972 was back between the posts as the Rebels successfully retained their crown, defeating Kilkenny. Deirdre remained at No1, playing her last game for Cork in 1976.

Amongst the many honours on the inter county scene was the Gaelic star award won in 1963 for her performances of that year. In the same season Beamish and Crawford also honoured Deirdre Sutton in the list of Cork Sports Stars

She won the first of her senior

county championship medals with Glen Rovers in 1962 and was a member of the side that captured a record breaking seven in a row of county titles from 1962 to 1968.

Amongst her club colleagues were the legendary Anna Crotty and Peg-gy Dorgan, players who were to also serve with Deirdre on the Cork se-

Although the seventies were lean years for the Glen Deirdre Sutton remained faithfully guarding the goal. When the club took the decision to regrade to Intermediate the experienced Deirdre was again to the fore as they began a resurgence that in four year saw the Intermediate title annexed in 1974.

The club decided to go back and participate in senior grade and hard work with the younger players saw

Glen back on the glory trail and it was a source of tremendous pride to Deirdre when the county title was recaptured in 1983.

Glen Rovers Camogie Club chairperson Nora Newman said: "Without doubt Deirdre is somebody who has been, and still is, one

of Glen Rovers' finest."

Summing up her feelings at being chosen as the first camogie player to be named in the Hall of Fame Deirdre told me "When first I got the call I thought somebody was playing a joke on me, it's a tremendous honour after all the

"Sadly at the end of the day it is the players who lose out," she said.





Tipperary aims to become the fourth county side to achieve the four-in-a-row, but a handful of other challengers are convinced that this is their year. It all adds to up to a very exciting Foras na Gaeilge All-Ireland Senior Camogie Championship.


Now that Galway have come up with the winning formula, one wonders are they plotting yet another coup?

After delivering an assured performance throughout the entire National League, they followed it through capturing their second national title a few weeks ago. The last occasion the county won the league they came back two years later to win their first All-Ireland senior championship. This season, they will be hoping that a short four months might see them double up with both trophies in the one year.

They have the ability - there is no doubt about that. On paper they have all the names, but that counts for nought when it comes to performance. They will need little reminding of their sudden death twelve months ago against Kilkenny in the semi-final. The big question is have they learned from it?

Their good run so far would suggest yes. Mike Kennedy and his daughter Colette Walsh are amongst the new backroom team. Most of the old reliables are still there on the starting fifteen - Louise Curry, captain Martina Haverty, Pam Nevin, Olivia Forde, Tracey Laheen, Martina Harkin and Sharon Glynn, which augurs well for the camp. New blood, which is also very important, is there with the likes of Aislinn Connolly, Lourda Kavanagh, Sandra Tannion and Orla Kilkenny. Denise Gilligan, who orchestrated Cork's downfall in 1996, is also back in the fold. A very healthy combination but they will rue the impending loss of Therese Maher - one of the strongest forwards in the game - she will be gone for the summer months. However, on the positive side, they are hopeful that Aine Hillary might return from her sojourn just in time for the championship. These players would be hard to replace, but if Galway are serious about bringing O'Duffy west they have enough aces in the pack, it will be a case of wanting it more than the

Limerick are still smarting from their great win over Cork in the league semi-final. It is a long time since Cork failed to register a score in the first 30 minutes of a match - the green and white will long savour this day. Will it carry them through when the sides meet in the opening round of the Foras na Gaeilge championship next month? Unlikely... But I say that lightly. Limerick will



benefit hugely, particularly in confidence, from their win over the Leesiders. John Leacy has done a lot to instill this belief within the team and for one, Meadhbh Nash, showed that she is ready to rub shoulders with the best after her brilliant display in the league final.

For the first time in eight years they did not contest the league final, and for the first time in a few years they suffered defeats to Wexford, Galway and Limerick. They have all their regulars this season and with Fiona O'Driscoll set to rejoin the panel, one wonders will they get it right in time for July. Manager, Pa Finn has to plan without Lynn Dunlea who has called it a day, but with many of the UCC team that won the Ashbourne Cup on his side, the Cork boss will have plenty of ammunition to fire with.

Kilkenny are like their hurlers - you can never write them off. Ann Downey has put together quite a formidable outfit. Miriam Holland is back between the posts flanked by captain Esther Kennedy. Gillian Maher, one of the county's greatest servants is back donning the black and amber alongside Mairead Costello, Edel Maher, Lizzie Lyng, Marina Downey and Brigid Mullaly. Youngsters Aoife Neary and Marie O'Connor are carrying on the great tradition and are blending well in the forward line with the experienced Sinéad Millea. They are physically very strong and will be anxious for another trip to Croke Park to atone for last September's mis-match with Tipperary.

The Premier County are going for four-in-a-row this summer. They were magnificent throughout last year's championship - the only trouble is they have to live up to their reputation if they are to remain on top. Michael Cleary has clearly shown that he is capable of outpacing all his rivals. He has moulded this team into a totally dominant force and once again all comers would need play to the peak of their potential to theaten their supremacy. However, if Clare do not participate and if they did need it, one wonders from where their back-door opposition would come.

Meanwhile the one certainty this year - and there are not too many - is that this senior championship is wide open. Any of the top four teams in the country (Tipperary, Galway, Kilkenny and Cork) are all in with a great shout of winning this one.

It is a hard one to call, but Galway would be a good outside bet.



Championships for all

The summer of 2002 may not be everyone's dream of sundrenched beaches and ice-cream but from the 30th of June until the 15th of September the senior intercounty stars of this country will not really care about the weather as they pour all their camogie skills and energy into the Foras na Gaeilge Senior All-Ireland championship series, writes Maire i Scolai.

Back in early June a very enjoyable evening was had in Pairc an Chrocaigh when numerous intercounty stars, managers and camogie personnel including Uachtaran Padhraichin Ni Raifeartaigh gathered with members of Foras na Gaeilge including the Chief Executive of Foras na Gaeilge Joe McDonagh who recalled a famous day back in 1980 when the MacCarthy Cup went west and the one and only Joe sang the West's Awake with great gusto. Back in '95 the then Bord na Gaeilge came on board to become the first sponsors of the senior All-Ireland championship series. Since then many changes have taken place both within the game and from a media view point. Undoubtedly the live televising of the All-Ireland Final is possibly the item most people mention nowadays and it certainly has brought far more people around to see how skillful a game it is. It has also made people realise just how much effort the females of this country put into trying to capture the elusive O'Duffy Cup.

Foras na Gaeilge grew from Bord na Gaeilge and just like Cumann Camogaiochta na nGael is an all-island body catering for people of all thirty two counties. It is very gratifying to see so many people nowadays becoming interested in the Irish language and even a growing percentage of media personnel are now very happy to transact camogic buisness through the medium of Irish. On the night Uachtaran Padhraichin Ni Raifeartaigh spoke of both organisations having the same ideals, and how both were very much to the fore back at the beginning of last century when the Irish

language movement was very much undergoing a renaissance and rebarth. At the same time the females of the country were beginning to take to the sports fields and in 1904 Cumann Camogaiochta na nGael was founded and now almost one hundred years later it is almost 85,000 strong and growing.

Back in '99 a talented Tipperary All-Ireland medal hoder Michael Cleary came to the fore with Tipperary and what a fairy tale story since then. Badly beaten in the League final of that same year in their home pitch of Semple Stadium, it was enough to send them running for cover, but no they choose to come out and tell the country they were better than that. Since then many counties are probably asking what is their secret of success? Dublin, who have a very proud tradition of winning 26 senior All-Ireland titles, but alas have not inscribed their name on the O'Duffy Cup since '84, will take on the mighty Sliabh na mBan girls in the first round of the championship in Tipperary. It may well be a match that will bring memories of the '84 All-Ireland back for people as it was the Dubs who toppled Tipperary on that occassion. However, as we all know the game has changed so much since then. Speaking recently to Michael Cleary, he will not be taking the visit of Dublin lightly at all.

"Teams are now gradually improving and the competition is increasingly sharper all the time which is great for the game," admitted Cleary. Looking back at the National League one can see exactly what the Tipp manager is saying as some of the counties who for some years reached the latter stages of the competition. Dublin for instance reached the semi-final against Galway for the first time in over ten years. The Dubs were very much there until just before halftime when Sharon Glynn sent Galway slightly ahead at the break with a fine goal. The extra experience of Galway began to shine through in the second half and one could see how Galway's Sharon Glynn and star of the '96 All-Ireland victory, Denise Gilligan are combining very well and I feel they may yet prove a threat to various backlines this sammer. However, the experience the Dubs derived from that game will stand to them in their outing against Tipperary. They will travel to Tipp in the knowledge that they were without a number of key players that day and having played a number of challenge matches since they should not lack match

fitness on the day. Whoever loses at least have the consolation that they have the back door, but neither manager will be thinking of that route as yet.

Another very interesting encounter will surely be that of the Cork

v Limerick clash in Cork. Again, Limerick were another surprise package team of the League and were over the moon when not only did they beat Cork in the semi-final but they managed to keep them scoreless in the first half. Like the Dubs, this experience will stand to Limerick, but I feel that Cork will still have too much wealth and experience for them in the opening round. Limerick will certanly not be going down to just make up the numbers on this occassion

Last year's All-Ireland finalists Kilkenny will take on last year's Intermediate All-Ireland champions Antrim in Kilkenny. The former Kilkenny player Ann Downey, now the team's manager, seems to be getting Kilkenny into shape and with Antrim not having a great year the Cats will possibly take the winnings on the day. The other first round tie will see Wexford and Galway in action in Wexford and that is one encounter that I feel should have people on the edges of their seats until the end. Wexford, I feel will relish the idea of taking the National League champions Galway on and with the former All-Ireland hurler Martin Storey lending a hand to training the girls will be very motivated. Down are the other county who will face the winners of Kilkenny or Antrim on August 3. The Foras

na Gaeilge qualifying rounds will take place on July 13th or 14th and 21st with the semi-finals going ahead on August 17th. It should be a long and happy summer for all concerned.

While a lot of emphasis lies with the senior championship let's not forget the Intermediate, Junior and Minor A & B championships. Offaly, who graced Croke Park for the very first time last season are gaining experience all the time and having recently won the Division 2 National League for the very first time, will make a bold bid to revisit headquarters next September. At the time of going to press not all the provincial championships are over and it is rather difficult to predict who might come out of the other provinces. Up North, Armagh who were looking well in the League may be contenders to come out of the province but Derry will will not make life easy for them. Down Munster way, Cork may well have an upper hand on Tipperary who having won the All-Ireland last season have had to put together a new team for this season and they may lack the experience to go far this seson. Roscommon have threatened in the last couple of years, and having players the calibre of Lizzie Glennon their time must surely must not be too far away.

With more schools now playing camogie the Minor grade is always a very exciting one to follow and in the latter number of years the introduction of the 'B' grade has increased the number of counties who are getting their name on an All-Ireland trophy early on in their lives. With the success Offaly are having at adult level it is no wonder the younger generation are now also finding their feat having recently won the Leinster Minor B' title. Munster will see both Minor A & B defending champions, Cork and Limerick respectfully take on the Ulster champions. It is worth noting that perhaps part of Limerick's success may well be attributed to that great nursery school, St.Mary's of Charleville. Galway have often produced many very good minor teams over the years and with young teams like Mullagh and Davitts putting out good strong teams in Tournaments like the Pan Celtic we might see the West advancing this season. The championship season would not be complete without the club championship which will culminate with the final on November 3rd. What a season, surely something for everyone interested in camogie. So, go on and follow your county or club to All-Ireland glory.

BUILDING UP FOR CENTENARY YEAR

B ack in 1904, Gaelic Games for the women of this country were not much in the air, but gradually mua na hEireann began to realise that they had more to offer in the shaping of a Gaelic destiny. It is down to the efforts of those women then that in the year 2004 we will proudly celebrate our centenary and what a birthday party is planned

Twenty years prior to 1904, the men folk had brought Cumann Luthchleas Gael on to the scene and gradually they began to bring the females to matches, and the fair sex were soon seen taking their rightful place in third level colleges and the civil service and many more places of note.

The time had finally arrived for the women folk of Ireland to have their own Gaelic Games and 1904 was the year. When one looks back at the fantastic record that Dublin have of winning 26 senior All-Ireland titles it comes as no major surprise that the game had it's origins in the capital.

The well known Keating Branch of the Gaelic Leagure had excellent hurling and football teams and it is here that much of the foundation of camogic was laid. In 1903, Maire Ni Chinneide, a Royal University graduate, Sean O'Cellaigh ("Sceilg"), who later became Minister for Education in the second Dail and Tadhg O'Donoghue ("Torna") drew up the name "Camoguidheacht" for the proposed new

A set of rules were then drawn up by Seamus O'Braonain, who played football for Dublin and then went on to become Director of Radio Eireann.

Many stories are told of those early days, such as the women folk hiding their hurls underneath the long skirts as they began to

have practise matches in places like Drumcondra Park and the Phoenix Park. Gradually, more women began to get involved and clubs were seemingly shooting up in various parts of the country.

However, the year 1904 dawned and camogic was put on the map down in the County Meath. While Meath may not rate very high on the camogic circles these days, back in 1904 the Meath Agricultural Society Grounds was the place to be. The popular Gaelic League Aeridheacht had among it's many attractions that day the first ever public Camogic match. That pitch is now the well known Pairc Tailteann. The game that day was played between two Dublin clubs, Cuchullains and Keatings who went to win 1-0 to 0-0.

Since those early days much progress has followed and in modern times the live television coverage of the game has done wonders for the game.

Many rule changes have taken place over the years, but perhaps the most significant of all was the introduction of the lifteen aside game which seems to have attracted a wider audience and according to many sources made the game more attractive.

The further introduction of last season's 'back door system' has added further bite to the championship and gives fans all over further chances to see their county stars in action.

CHALLENGE

While many changes have taken place it is probably fair to say that the organisation is possibly looking at the biggest challenge of all as we look to become a part of our sister organisation, the GAA. This would surely be welcomed by the enthusiastic committee who are working very hard to make the

year 2004 a year to recall for ever.

It is expected that most county boards and clubs will rise to the occassion and celebrate the event in an appropriate way for their county/club.

However, at National level, there are many ways to highlight the year, and to this end six very enthusiastic people got together last season and set themselves the task of putting together a number of ideas.

Very often, when people are asked to sit on committees the response is never too loud, but the following people not only said yes immediately but their professional handling of the situation to date is something else.

The committee is probably unique also in that they are all either past or present intercounty players and wait for it, they hold no less than twenty senior All-Ireland medals between them.

Headed by former Cork Player, Therese O'Callaghan, together with her fellow present county player Eithne Duggan, they hold six senior All-Ireland titles between them. Olivia Broderick, was on Galway's historic All-Ireland side of '96 and recently added a second National League title to her collection.

Also on the team is Germaine Noonan of Dublin, who was on Dublin's last All-Ireland winning side of '84. Jane Monaghan, daughter of present Ulster Chairman Tom Monaghan played for her native Armagh and is the holder of an Ashbourne medal.

Ann Downey, better known as one of the Kilkenny Downey twins is also a part of this committee and holds a whopping twelve senior All-Ireland medals among many other awards.

So, what ideas did this industrious committe arrive with?

Their objective is to give members of Cumann Camogaiochta na nGael a sense of the past and to motivate them into further promoting our game and objectives in the future.

They felt it was of most importance to involve all aspects of the Association and initially they sent questionaires to all clubs and County Boards throughout the country.

It is expected that Navan will play an important role particulary in the opening proceedings, although nothing has been confirmed as yet. It is expected that the major event of the year off the playing field may well be the Centenary Banquet which would be expected to attract a large attendance. An exhibition in Paic An Chrocaigh is also expected to attract a large audience of all ages.

This is one area that the public can presently play a large role by sending in items of information, both written and pictorially to this writer at :106, Beechwood Lawn, Dunlaoghaire, Co.Dublin, or e-mailed to: maier@gofree.indigo.ie. People are asked not to send original material and to have items well documented, and if they are teams, to have them named in the formation of L-R. The above mentioned ideas are only a flavour of the ideas that the committee came up with and may give rlubs an idea as to how to go about celebrating the one hundreth birthday.

Sponsorship is a major part of the year's proceedings, and this is an aspect that is very much being tackled at the moment, because the year is expected to involve a lot of major costs. However, the exposure for possible sponsors seems very good, as already many people are very aware of 2004.

Former Uachtaran of the GAA Joe Mc Donagh has often made references to the centenary and has referred to the unique contribution that Cumann Cumogaiochta na nGael have already made " in the promotion of Gaelic Games for the women of this country". His successor, Sean McCague is equally strong in his thoughts surrounding the centenary.

As time goes by, there will be news bulletins sent out to keep the public up to speed with events. This is one of the best opportunities we have to promote our own game to it's max and it is very much up to all members to work on ideas now.

Recent items of history which will be recorded somewhere down the line will be Offaly's first All-Ireland appearance in Croke Park last September and their recent capturing of their first ever National League Division 2 Final when they beat fellow first time finalists Laois in what was an all Leinster final.

A further highlight of that day was Offaly's captain fantastic Michelle Dayis as she knocked in a total of 2-10 for the Faithful County to take their first ever National title.

With the Foras na Gaeilge senior championship beginning at the end of the month (June), who knows what name will be added to the O'Duffy cup before 2004.

Limerick - to the core

VERA SHEEHAN is Limerick at heart. It affects her outlook on everything - work, camogie and life in general.

She would die for the green and white and has been one of their most prominent players as the county thrashed around in search of a senior title over the past few

Things have come a long way in Limerick in the past six months. John Lacey joined the team as manager earlier this year and all of these factors mitigate to a slight hint of a championship victory:

"John has a very good attitude and his appetite for success is unreal. There is a great buzz in the camp."

There is no denying either that their win over Cork in the league semi-final two months ago turned everything round.

"Limerick had won nothing down through the years and the one regret was that we didn't go on to win the final against

But all this success comes at a price. Vera recently packed in her job in Allertain Sports in Cork in the hope that she will get something nearer home.

"The travel took its toll. My day began with a trip across the county bounds, back home and straight to training. By the time we finished it was very late, it was the same routine the next day."

However, another offering she has had to make this week is of a different nature more enforced and not by choice. It is a player's nightmare when you pick up an injury in the run-up to the most important date in your sporting diary.

"I am troubled by a groin injury and am getting physio daily." The midfielder says that no one gives them a chance again this






