GREAT YEAR FOR KILKENNY STAR

Camogie provides one of the outstanding individual success stories in any branch of Irish sport in 1985 as a result of the achievements of Angela Downey. Her record over the season is remarkable by any standard.

After all, it is not often that any player collects every major national award in an annual programme of events. That is the proud distinction that marks out the past campaign as a unique one for the Kilkenny star in camogie.

Angela was an accurate forward in the Kilkenny team that regained the National Senior League title after a break of three years. Later she retained Gradam Tailte, the award for camogie's annual day of sporting competition involving the player of the year from each county.

The Kilkenny star was in tremendous form as she recorded five first places and two seconds to chalk up 64 points, to win the title in handsome fashion, and so became the first to take Gradam Tailte twice.

Later in the year she helped Kilkenny to beat Dublin in the All-Ireland open-draw senior championship final, She had an outstanding second half, and her quality play and good points coring did much to fashion the Kilkenny victory.

Then, for good measure, Angela vas on duty with the Leinster team that won the Gael-Linn Cup for the interprovincial title. So, in one season he won medals for camogie's three pp national competitions - League, championship and inter-provincial and Gradam Tailte to complete a drand slam of national awards and so ecame the first to record this wonrful feat

Miss Downey, then, must undoub-

tedly stand unchallenged as the camogie player of the year.

But if the achievements of the Kilkenny ace dominate the story, it must also be said that the year was particularly rich in top class individual performances, and also provided some historic events on the team front.

Edel Murphy had a good year with Dublin and proved one of the leading score-getters as well.

In Dublin's draw with Kilkenny in the National League final at Parnell Park, and in the replay at Nowlan Park, she scored a combined total of 2-13 — excellent finishing that. Miss Murphy also put up other impressive scoring returns over the season including 1-6 in Dublin's win over Wexford in the Leinster senior final a separate competition from the All-Ireland open-draw championship.

excellent goalkeeping Yvonne Redmond both for the Dublin senior team and with her club side, Crumlin, was another of the bright features.

Crumlin also carved out their own slice of history by winning both the Leinster and the All-Ireland senior club championships for the first time.

Bridie McGarry set the seal on a good season with an excellent game at centre back when leading Kilkenny to their All-Ireland senior final win over Dublin at Croke Park. Another to show up especially well in that game was the Noresiders' wing forward Margaret Farrell, who finished top scorer on the day for both teams with five first class points.

JUNIORS, TOO

The seniors, however, did not capture all of the limelight. Many are inclined to overlook the lower grades of Gaelic Games and so miss or on much that is best in sport.

The junior competitions in camogie provided much to enthuse over in 1985, and also ended with a unique double by Galway. The Western county won both the National League and the All-Ireland championship, and that ranks as the first such double in the grade.

An outstanding star for Galway in those successes was Feirdre Costello, who is undoubtedly a young player to watch. She has already made a big name for herslef in Colleges competitions, and captained St. Raphael's, of Loughrea, to the All-Ireland championships at junior (1984) and senior last March.

On the inter-county front, Deirdre sparkled with Galway, and had a particularly memorable game against Armagh in the All-Ireland final at Croke Park, where she contributed four goals to the team win.

The young Galway star also made her mark in Gradam Tailte, finishing runner-up to Angela Downey. A memorable year, then, over-all for Deirdre Costelloe.

Cork won the minor title, so that Ulster was the only province that failed to earn representation in the All-Ireland championships Roll of Honour.

However, it was Leinster's year in the senior grade, with Kilkenny com-



pleting the League and Championship double, Crumlin winning the national club title, and the Eastern province supreme in the interprovincial championship.

The interprovincial championships, incidentally, brought a change to the playing schedule. Until 1985 the semifinals and finals were seperated by a few weeks, but last October the tests at senior and junior were both played over a single weekend in Cork.

It was generally agreed that the new arrangement was a success. The plan enabled players to see and meet one another socially over the weekend and there can be little doubt that this was beneficial for the game.

No look back on the camogie year would be complete without paying tribute to Aine Sheehy, who retired Secretary of the Camogie Association at the end of the year, to take up another appointment.

During her short spell in the post of are two years she did much valuable work in advancing the cause of the sport. A very courteous lady, she was always very helpful to the media, and she has our thanks for her assistance during her team as secretary, and good wishes for the future.

Kilkenny do double

INETEEN eighty five belongs to Kilkenny and Galway. Other teams had their moments but these counties scooped the major honours and did so in style.

Senior camogic will be remembered for the Dublin-Kilkenny clashes. Locked together on four occasions, Kilkenny came out with the All-Ireland Championship and National League double. Dublin had to be content with the Leinster Championship as a consolation prize.

Kilkenny planned their season better than Dublin and made less mistakes on the sideline. The bold step of placing a junior outfield player in goal proved a master stroke. Marie Fitzpatrick was plucked from the county's insignificant second string where she gave the appearance of being reluctant to exert herself.

Marie had displayed her ball control and skill when winning the Feile Skills Competition in Galway. She took to her new role as if she was made for it. She gave stability to the Kilkenny defence and performed so well that she ousted Yvonne Redmond when the Leinster team was named:

Bridie McGarry took the captain's part seriously and inspired her players with class and confidence. Liz Neary proved once again what a valuable member of the Kilkennysetup she is. Called on to plug holes in defence, give the team the edge at midfield or add scoring power to the attack from time to time, she always obliged. Her four goals in the League Final replay underlines the point.

Angela Downey's appetite for scores and victory remains as keen as ever. Her amazing hall control as she weaves in and out through

opposing defenders at top speed continues to thrill fans. She picked off some glorious scores in helping Kilkenny to the historic double. Her display at Gradam Tailte was

something special.

Margaret Farrell reached new heights in the All-Ireland Final, She twisted and turned in possession to make room for herself to score five points. Some of these were from very difficult angles and were magnificent efforts. Anne Downey fetched and delivered great balls in the Kilkenny defence.

Injuries and holidays upset Dublin's rhythm at vital times. Marion Conroy had an excellent season at full-back and Anna Condon made a successful return to the side. Carmel O'Byrne is maturing into a very valuable player. Captain Edel Murphy, Joan Gormley, Barbara Redmond, Bernie Toner and Yvonne Redmond had their moments.

Galway have been turning out talented young players over the years. This season, however, they put it all together and five All-Ireland titles went West. Cyril Farrell guided St. Raphaels, Loughrea to a great double in colleges camogie, the Galway juniors recorded an All-Ireland and National League double and Mullagh brought home the Feile na nGael premier title.

Deirdre Costello had more than a

hand in three of those victories. She captained St. Raphaels and captured attention at every outing with her skilful play. She combined beautifully with the talented Anne Ryan, Anne Fahy and Deirdre Lawless to form one of the best forward divisions seen at junior level.

The Cork minors gave no indication of being All-Ireland material when they played Clare in the opening game. But they improved beyond all recognition as the campaign progressed. Jean Paula Kent, Brid Kelleher, Ina Leahy, Trace O'Riordan and Brid Walsh helped Cork to their eighth minor title in twelve years.

Crumlin won the Club Championship in such style that invites the question: where have they been up to now? It appears that they found it harder to win the Dublin Championship than the All-Ireland crown. Four Redmond sisters, Anne, Barbara, Yvonne and Aileen, Anna Condon, Bernie Toner, Mary Mernagh and Mary Keane make Crumlin a fine side.

With Clare Cronin adopting a new role of centre-back, U.C.C. captured the eagerly sought Ashbourne Cup. Eire Óg recaptured the Science Cup which last rested in Mid-Cork in 1979 with a merited 3-7 to 1-8 win over Killeagh. Joan Shannon, Marion McCarthy, Noelle O'Driscoll and Anne O'Leary were in sparkling form for the winners

Eire Óg added the Munster Club Championship title. They overcame Sixmilebridge (Clare) by 3-8 to 1-2 and Portroe (Tipperary) by 2-11 to 4-2.

The Cork senior selectors discarded seven of last season's panel as they prepared for the National League campaign. Newcomers introduced to the squad included Irene O'Leary, Linda Mellerick,

Shelley and Mary Spillane. The selectors dropped a bombshell by omitting Sandie Fitzgibbon, who is widely regarded as one of the best midfield players in the country, for the league outing with Dublin.

Dublin exposed holes in the Cork defence and highlighted problems in every sector of the side. Cork completed the league programme and retained their Munster crown without reaching any great heights. An understrength Galway side was disposed of by 3-10 to 1-4 in the opening round of the championship.

Cork were just not sharp enough for Dublin in the semi-final. They did not put in the necessary preparation this year. The county championship dragged on much too late and team trainer, Tom Nott, was deprived of a realistic chance of having his team in shape. Planning and hard work are essential if Cork are to mount a serious challenge for the 1986 All-Ireland title.

For the second year running, Cork had to find a new team for the Munster Junior Championship. Fielding what was actually their fourth string which included seven girls wearing county colours for the first time, Cork failed to Limerick for the want of experience. These girls now know what is required if they wish to pursue an inter-county career.

Pride of Cork this season were, of course, the minors. Aiming for a three-in-a-row with five survivors in their ranks, they only escaped by a whisker after a truly memorable match with Clare in the opening round. Poor defensive play by Tipperary helped Cork to an easy win in the semi-final. Although Cork lead all the way in the Munster final with Limerick, they were never able to draw clear and kept their supporters on tender hooks to the end.



History on the Double from Kilkenny and Galway

1985 will be remembered in a special way by the players of Kilkenny and Galway. Up to now, an All-Ireland Championship and National League double in the same season had proved elusive. History was made by Kilkenny in senior grade and Galway at junior level.

Dublin v Kilkenny clashes dominated the senior scene. Stung by their failure to Dublin in the 1984 championship, Kilkenny planned and prepared diligently for the new season. A new goalkeeper had to be found. Marie Fitzpatrick was plucked from the undistinguished Kilkenny junior side and she responded magnificently.

Kilkenny eased through their section of the National League to meet Dublin in the final. Played at a blistering pace on the finest afternoon of the summer, Kilkenny produced excellent camogie and raced into a three goal lead. A spirited fight back by Dublin levelled the game on the call of time.

Dublin had to find replacements for Yvonne Redmond, Germaine Noonan, Marie Connell and Joan Gormley for the

replay at Nowlan Park. Despite this huge handicap, Dublin were in no mood to concede to Kilkenny. As in the drawn game opposing captains, Bridie McGarry and Edel Murphy inspired their players to great heights. Victory went to Kilkenny but only by four points.

Dublin coasted past Antrim and Down in the opening rounds of the senior champ ionship. The anticipated showdown with Cork only served to highlight the number of rungs which the Rebel County have slipped down the ladder. Many of the girls who won glory in the red and white appear to be approaching the end of their inter-county careers.

Clare provided no opposition to Kilkenny in the championship. But what a fright Kilkenny had to endure before shaking off Wexford in the semi-final. With the score standing at a win, a defeat and a draw apiece, Dublin and Kilkenny entered the arena for their fourth encounter of the season.

A tentative first half was followed by a fine display of skill and opportunism by the National League champions. Mar-

garet Farrell gave a point picking exhibition in what must have been her finest hour in the Kilkenny colours. The artistry of Angela Downey, the cool efficiency of Marie Fitzpatrick, the sweeping play of Biddy O'Sullivan, the leadership of Bridie McGarry and the effective displays of Liz Neary and Anne Downey contributed to Kilkenny's fifth success.

Angela Downey was rarely out of the news. She registered some delightful scores for Kilkenny and Leinster. Her performance in Gradam Tailte was something special. Before the contest was half over, Angela had shown that she was in a class of her own. Her competitive and athletic attributes enabled her to record a very notable second place in the Opel Supergirl contest.

REAL GEMS

There is no doubting Galway's right to the title Junior Team of the Year. Deirdre Costello, Anne Fahy, Anne Ryan and Deirdre Lawless skilfully combined to score 16 goals and twenty eight points in three championship outings. Some of these scores were real gems. The progress of these players in the senior inter-county arena will be followed with interest.

St. Raphael's Secondary School, Loughrea, matches the eleven year old record of another Galway school, Presentation, Athenry, by recording an All-Ireland Colleges double. A hat-trick from Deirdre Costello and excellent play from Brid Stratford, Angela Cooney, Anne Fahy, Fidelma Coyne and Carmel Linnane earned St. Raphaels the senior crown. Imelda Hobbins, Caroline Loughnane, Geraldine Fahy and captain Mary Dolphin figured in both junior and senior victories.

Cork extended their amazing record in the All-Ireland Minor Championship. Eight wins in twelve years is their present score. Captain Paula Carey and Jean Paula Kent equalled Sandi Fitzgibbon's tally of three medals. Brid Kelleher, Ina Leahy, Tracy O'Riordan, Brid Walsh,



Deirdre Costello Shows the Way for the Ladies



Half backs Peter Finnerty, Tony Keady and Tony Kilkenny were the names on most people's lips after Galway's surprise All-Ireland senior hurling semifinal win over Cork last August. No wonder, as all three illuminated the gloom of a dismal day at Croke Park with confident and assured hurling that proved the platform for the Connacht's team's well merited four points win.

Although Galway failed to build on that break-through in the final, in which they lost yet again at that stage to Offaly, the grandeur of the half backs against Cork will be recalled time and again in the future. All three showed up well again in the decider.

Noel Lane was a consistent star all over the season for Galway in the full forward position, and his exciting display against Cork was also one of the season's highlights.

P.J. Molloy produced one of the top goals of the year in the All-Ireland senior final. This Athenry club man, who has hit so many goals and points for the county over the years, got the score seven minutes into the second half when he fielded a lob from Michael McGrath, and sent the ball home from twenty yards. A goal to-savour!

Sylvie Linnane played many good games for Galway in defence, and was also a stalwart in the All-Ireland final loss to Offaly.

JUNIOR TRAIL

Half backs were also to the fore in football for Galway, with the county's junior trio Gerry Daly, Michael Melia and Seamus Glynn a powerhouse as Kerry were beaten in a replay for the All-Ireland "Home" football championship.

Galway went on to beat Warwickshire in the final proper for the county's only national success in the big-ball game.

Stephen Joyce, GAELIC STARS personality of the year award winner for 1984, scored 0-4, and John Purcell hit 1-1, but their efforts were still not enough to prevent Galway losing their senior football provincial crown when they met Roscommon in a semi-final replay at Tuam. But if Galway failed to keep alive their hopes of a fourth Western title in succession, they played their part in providing an exhilerating match and lost by only two points.

HANDBALL JOY

On the handball front Pat Delaney and Eamonn Rabbite made it a joy day at Crinkle back in May.

They turned on the style to beat Tony Ryan and Eamonn Farrell, of Tipperary, for the first All-Ireland 40 x 20 senior doubles title win by a Galway combination.

CAMOGIE'S GREAT YEAR

Deirdre Costello had a busy and successful time as Galway celebrated a great year in camogie. She led St. Raphael's, Loughrea, to the All-Ireland Colleges' senior championship in March, won a National Junior League medal with the county a few months later, and was one of three players to share second place in June in Gradam Tailte, camogie's Super Ser competition, or the sport's day of annual competition at Kilkenny.

That second place rating with two other players was a great feat by a player as young as Deirdre, who was later on duty in the county side that lost the All-

But there was much better fortune for the young Loughrea student in the All-Ireland junior final against Armagh at Croke Park in mid-September. Galway regained the title after a break of six years and Deirdre, of the Sarsfields club played at centre forward.

With Galway hurlers having contested three finals – the Railway Cup as Connacht, the Ford Cup open-draw and the All-Ireland final – a strong case could be made for looking to that side for our choice of the 1985 GAELIC STARS award winner.

But while a number of that team obviously came into the reckoning, as well as members of the junior and senior football teams, the All-Ireland successes in camogie just could not be ignored.

And as the stylish and top-scoring Deirdre Costello was very prominent in all, she just had to be the choice for the nomination. She is the first camogie player from Galway to win this honour.

Angela Downey and Michael Walsh -Superstars

Angela Downey and Michael Walsh were not only two of the outstanding personalities for Kilkenny in Gaelic Sport during 1985 but also two of the most successful and exciting campaigners on the Irish sporting scene in general.

Angela Downey, who has had a very successful career in the national women's game, had a remarkable year by any standard. She won a National League medal in June, and retained the Gradam Tailte, camogie's Super Star title, some weeks later.

Her wonderful competitive spirit, tremendous gifts and energy enabled her to make light of the opposition in the Super Star test, or to be more correct, day of sporting competition involving the player of the year from each county.

The Kilkenny forward scored five firsts, and two second places to earn 64 points and finish the most comfortable of winners. She also became the first to win two Gradam Tailte titles.

Later in the year, Miss Downey was very prominent again as she collected her fifth All-Ireland senior medal following Kilkenny's win over Dublin in the Croke Park final. She had an outstanding game, and her second half performance, which she highlighted with four points, was a major factor in turning the key in the door to Kilkenny's first title since 1981.

A great record over-all, and one that in most years would automatically earn the Kilkenny sharpshooting forward the No. 1 selection for the county. But there was strong opposition elsewhere.

TARGET CONSCIOUS

Kieran Brennan, who has been Kilkenny's ace scorer in recent times, had another successful season in the scoring review. He was particularly target conscious as Kilkenny got their Leinster senior hurling championship bid off to a bright start with a big win over Westmeath at Tullamore in May. Brennan had one of the season's top individual returns by any hurler in that game at 1-9.

Despite his expert finishing, the season was a disappointing one for Kilkenny in hurling, with the chief honours going to the under-21 side.

Michael Dunne, with 2-2, sparkled in a full Leinster final in which Kilkenny proved much too good for Wexford at Croke Park.

Larry Cleere and Tom Lennon in the half back line, and Eamonn Morrissey in attack were the pick of a lack lustre win over Down in the semi-final at Navan. The All-Ireland title eluded the Noresiders in the final at Waterford, where Tipperary won an exciting game by the minimum margin. Morrissey had another good game for Kilkenny.

A TIE

But when it came to deciding on the award winner for Kilkenny it was just impossible to look beyond Angela Downey and Michael Walsh. In any ordinary year either one would have "walked away" with our trophy in view of the wonderful record of achievements.

But 1985 was no ordinary year with Miss Downey and young Michael Walsh setting brilliant standards. It is just impossible to make a choice between them for the Kilkenny trophy, and so the GAELIC STARS selectors decided that two trophies would just have to go to the Noreside this season.

This is historic in its own way because, while two handballers as doubles champions have been honoured in the past this is the first time for two personalities in separate sports to be chosen in one county.

WALSH MAKES HISTORY

Michael Walsh is a young handballer

who is fully living up to the wonderful potential he displayed in juvenile and minor ranks. Not only that he earned for himself a place in the record books when he beat a former champion, Tony Ryan (Tipperary) in the All-Ireland Coca-Cola senior singles final at Croke Park by two straight sets last August.

KILKENNY

Walsh, who was only 19 last May, became the youngest-ever winner of this prestigious senior championship. It was his first final appearance at that grade.

The Kilkenny teenager, in partnership with Eugene Downey, also achieved another first. The Noresiders booked their place in the All-Ireland Coca Cola senior doubles final for the first time, and threw down the gauntlet at Croke Park to the defending champions and also holders of the World title, the Quish brothers, Tom and John, of Limerick.

With a display of high quality handball, the Kilkenny pair exceeded most expectations by sweeping to a clear-cut two games to nil win, and Walsh became the first handballer to win All-Ireland Coca Cola senior singles and doubles medals in the same year.

The doubles final win also gave the youthful Kilkenny man his third All-Ireland championship of the year, as he won the junior singles title at 40 x 20 in May.

Camogie History

Yvonne Redmond Stars in Goal for Club and County

Brian Mullins led Leinster in majestic style from midfield last March to their first Railway Cup football final win in eleven years, but that was to prove one of a few glory days for county followers at national level in Gaelic Games.

John O'Leary, Mick Holden, Pat Canavan, Tommy Conroy, Kieran Duff and Barney Rock all helped as well to make the win over Munster at Croke Park a proud day not only for the East but for Dublin.

A week later, Canavan, Mullins and Conroy were in the St. Vincent's (Dublin) team that lost through a last gasp goal to Castleisland Desmonds (Kerry) in the All-Ireland club senior football final at Tipperary Town.

The inter-county senior football championship also saw Dublin get so far, but no further in terms of titles.

Gerry Hargan, one of the most underestimated full backs in the game, and Barney Rock with his consistent markmanship, were prime movers in a sequence of wins that cleared the way for another crack at Kerry in the Sam Maguire Cup game in September.

A disastrous first half, during which they scored just two points and conceded 1-8, seemed to spell "finish" to Dublin's chances. To their credit, however, they battled back bravely on the change-over, and two goals by Joe McNally had the Dubs only a point in arrears with six minutes remaining.

There was no fairy-tale ending, though. Kerry regained the initiative, and went on for a second successive final win over the Dubs.

TWO NATIONAL FINALS

Dublin contested two national finals in senior camogie. After being held to a draw by Kilkenny at Parnell Park in the National League decider in June, they dout in the replay short four key p' vers due to injuries and holidays, and has lly unexpectedly lost by four points.

The Metropolitans were at full agth when they next met Kilkenny eptember in the final defence of their Ireland open-draw senior title.

But, backed by a strong breeze, Dublin led by just a goal at the interval, and were outplayed in the second half. Germaine Noonan at right back, Una Crowley and GAELIC STARS 1984 award winner Edel Murphy at midfield, and Joan Gormley in attack were outstanding for Dublin as they went down by five points.

HURLING BIG-TIME

John Twomey, Canice Hennebry and Paul Mulhaire were gaints in defence, and Peadar Carton and Maurice Hurley kings in scoring as Dublin beat Westmeath at Mullingar in February for one of the county's most important wins in years. That success brought Dublin back to the big-time by earning them a place in Division I of the 1985-86 National League.

Back to football, and corner forward Kevin Richardson, with a goal in each half, had much to do in steering Dublin to a convincing Leinster junior final win over Louth by fifteen points at Navan. The Dubs did not hit that form next time out when going under at their own Parnell Park to Galway, who went on to win the All-Ireland championship.

A FIRST FOR CRUMLIN

Mary Mernagh at midfield, Anna Condon and county defender Bernie Toner in a forward role exercised major influences for Crumlin as the Dublin club marked their Leinster senior camogie championship final debut with a runaway win over All-Ireland title specialists Buffer's Alley, Wexford, at O'Toole Park in September.

Barbara Redmond also left her stamp on the game with three great goals as the Dubliners made history with as many as 16 points to spare.

Then came a dramatic 24 to 1-5 win over Eire Og, Cork, in Cork, with a last minute goal by Anna Condon, and Crumlin set the seal on a great year with good win over Athenry, of Galway, at O'Toole Park, Dublin.

Ana Condon, Mary Mernagh and Bernie Toner and Yvonne Redmond were others who played good roles in shaping the 4-8 to 3-3 win.

A SECOND FOR CAMOGIE

With Crumlin having brought the only All-Ireland title in a field game to Dublin in 1985, their squad invariably provided some strong challengers for the GAELIC STARS award.

One of the strongest was Yvonne Redmond, who kept a good goal throughout the history-making run. Earlier in the year she played many grand games for the Dublin senior team both in the National League and the All-Ireland open-draw championship.

Dublin reached the finals of both competitions, losing to Kilkenny in a replay for the League title, and to the Noresiders again in the championship. As a result, Yvonne Redmond had many opportunities to sparkle with Dublin.

Add to that her excellence between the posts for Crumlin and you have the reasons why she wins her first GAELIC STARS award, and earns a second successive trophy for camogie for Dublin.

ST. PAUL'S defender, Bridie McGarry, captained the Kilkenny senior camogie team to a unique double of National League and all-Ireland championship this year. In the process she suffered two broken teeth and a broken finger. The latter didn't set properly, for the simple reason she had to go back into action before it was given time to heal properly.

A high price for any woman to pay for medals that no longer contain the amount of gold they once did, you might think. But you won't hear any complaints from this commanding centre-back, or, indeed, any of her dedicated team mates.

You see the camogie ladies in Kilkenny are a durable breed. Hardship is nothing new to them. They have become accustomed to battling against the odds.

"What a lot of people fail to realise is that we enjoy our camogie as much as the men do their hurling", was Bridie's down to earth response to the question why they bother. "You get knocks in the course of any physical contact sport, but they are just part of the game".

Bridie's acceptance of her apparent misfortune is hippical of all the ladies loyalty to came gie duty. For years it was regular for county players Jo Dunne and Ann Holden to thumb into trairing from Stoneyford and Ballyhale

respectively. Ann Whelan did the same from Castlecomer.

Because their game is regarded as a minor one, it attracts little attention and consequently little sponsorship, and the ladies generally supply their own hurleys, boots, socks, indeed everything but the county shirts. And expenses for the use of their own cars are at a minimum.

GIRLS DIDN'T MIND

"We play camogie and we enjoy it. It's not all about what you get out of it", the captain explained. "So many people gave out about the reception we received when we returned to Kilkenny after winning the all-Ireland, but the girls didn't mind how many did or did not turn up. They would have liked to have seen the streets thronged, but it wasn't a terrible let-down when they weren't.".

Despite the trials and tribulations of the game, the former Miss Martin, who hails from Inchbeg, Freshford, is as keen as ever after 13 years of activity at inter-county level. Along the way she has collected five all-Ireland medals (1974, '76, 1977, '81 and 1985) and has gained inter-provincial success with Leinster, not to mention individual honours like the B+I award in 1976. Add in eight Kilkenny senior championships won with St. Paul's, and you get an insight into the massive collection she has amassed.



"This year, compared with any year, I put in much more training and enjoyed the game more", she revealed. "A lot of credit for our success must be given to trainer, Tom Ryan (the former Shamrocks trainer). He joined us in March and

laid down the law. Everything worked out really well, and the squad worked like one big happy family".

And when it came to preparing for big matches and the numbers were not sufficient to make up two teams at training, there were always a few willing hands like Breda Ryan, Carmel Savage, Annette Stapleton and Kathleen Whitehead ready to help

"I have a poor child and he never saw as many matches as he did this year", Bridie joked. "But Benny (her husband) who plays with Dicksboro) has always been helpful and we try to arrange our matches to suit each other".

So son Shane (21 months) is never neglected, even if he has often shared a camogie sideline creche with another child or two while mum has been training or playing.

LUCK WITH US

Obviously dedication was the not so secret weapon of the dynamic Kilkenny Camogie ladies. They flew through the National cague, and then took the all-Ireland by over powering Dublin in the final.

"The luck went with us in the open draw in the all-Ireland series", Bridie explained. "We could have got Dublin or Cork in the first round and the whole thing could have been different. On reflection it was a great year for Kilkenny camogie, and everything worked out well".

Bridie McGarry has come a long way since she first played junior camogie with Thornback, in the days when Patsy Trait and Billy Carroll did a lot of work. Later she played with her parish team of Lisdowney, and then joined St. Paul's, where she received great encouragement from the likes of Shem Downey, Ann Carroll and Jimmy Morrissey, to name but a few.

However, she would like to see the game played more widely in Kilkenny, and particularly in the city.

"In some parishes people are not interested just because it's girls who are involved", Bridie thought. "You could reel off the number of hurling clubs who have no camogie team. St. Paul's is based in the city, but still most of the girls are originally from the country.

GET GIRLS PLAYING

She pointed to Cork, where there is a thriving hurling / camogie relationship within clubs. Likewise in Dublin.

"I don't see any reason why this should not happen in Kilkenny. If young girls could be attracted into the game around 12 or 14 years of age the county could do even better", she declared. "All that would be needed would be a pitch, and transport to games. Perhaps some day". Indeed, perhaps.

KILKENNY AND DUBLIN TO CONTINUE RIVALRY

A stiff opening hurdle in defence of the National Senior League title for Kilkenny . . . a top-class field of 24 counties for the National Junior League . . . the playing of the interprovincial championships for the Gael-Linn Cups at senior and junior over a single week-end once again this year. These are some of the features of a very full programme of events that promise plenty of exciting fare for camogic followers over the coming season.

Kilkerny beat Dublin in a Senior League final replay last June at Kilkenny for their first title in three years. These counties are in the same group of the League for the up-coming competition. Not only that — they have been paired in one of three first round ties on March 2, and the holders will have home advantage.

Antrim, Down and Galway are the other counties in this group, and the odds must be firmly on the winners of the Kilkenny-Dublin clash advancing to the group title, and with it a place in the final proper.

After all, as well as having met in two games last year for the League title, Kilkenny and Dublin were in opposition in the All-Ireland senior final in September. The Noresiders won that clash as well.

Cork, Limerick, Clare, Tipperary and Wexford will compete in the other section of the premier League. Cork did not enjoy much success in the League or championship last season, but they have such a rich pool of promising talent that many will be looking to them to regain lost glory in the coming campaign.

Wexford, however, have solid grounds for optimism. They were only beaten by Kilkenny by a point in a keen All-Ireland semi-final last August at Rathnure, and they could well cause a real shake-up this year.

The first senior programme of the year will feature, in addition to the Kilkenny-Dublin clash, Cork at home to Limerick, and Clare in opposition to Tipperary at a Clare venue. The Senior League final has been fixed for May 18.

The National Junior League will also get under way on March 2. Louth have been regraded junior for this season — they competed in the premier League and also in the senior championship in recent years — and they will be one of two Leinster counties in a group with three Ulster teams.

The Junior League will be run off initially in five separate groups, with all four provinces represented. Dublin, who did not field a junior side last season, return to active fare, and are in a section with Galway, the 1985 champions, Kilkenny, Antrim and Down.

Of the counties that competed last year, only Laois will be absent this time.

Two of the groups winners will play off in a quarter-final tie to clear the way for the semi-finals. The final proper has been fixed for June 8.

ALL-IRELAND

Ten counties will vie for the All-Ireland open-draw senior crown, and Kilkenny and Dublin are in separate halves of the draw.

Both will be well fancied to reach the last four, and Cork should also get through to that stage. The remaining Galway will start out on their campaigns, and Kilkenny will open their defence of the O'Duffy Cup with a visit from Limerick.

The All-Ireland final will be played on September 14 at Croke Park.

Last October a new look was given to the interprovincial championships at senior and junior by playing both competitions over one week-end at Cork, Until then, a space of some weeks separated the semi-finals and finals of each championship.

The new development proved a success, and enabled players to meet socially as never before in camogic competitions. As a result, the format has been retained for 1986, and the competitions will be run off over the weekend of October 11-12.

The venue has yet to be decided on, but the games will definitely be played at a centre in Leinster.

In the All-Ireland minor championship the semi-final pairings will feature the champions of Connacht against Munster, and the Ulster winners against Leinster's best. Those games will be played on July 20, and the decider has been arranged for August 3.

The semi-final in the All-Ireland junior championship are exactly the



It was a double celebration for Kilkenny yesterday in the B + I Line Personality of the Month awards, when Angela Downey was named "Camogie Player of the Year" for 1985 and Michael Walsh received the 1985 "Handballer

Angela Downey won the award in recognition of her outstanding, all-round performances throughout the year, in which she won All-Ireland, National League, interprovincial and Gradam Tailte medals. She now becomes the first tamogie player to win the B + I award on two occasions; having also been honoured in 1977.

Michael Walsh, who has qualified to represent Ireland in the World Championships to be held in British Columbia, Cnada, this year, is now the second Kilkenny player to be honoured and his recognition brings the first family interest into the handball awards over the past eleven years. The previous Kilkenny winner, Billy Burke (1989) is Michael's first cousin.

Outstanding

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In the all-Ireland senior final against the defending champions, Dublin in September, she had a superb second half and emphasised her worth to Kilkenny with

four well taken points. Some weeks later she was outstanding in Leinster's win in the Gael Linn inter provincial championship. And now with her selection as the B+I "camogie player of the year" she has become the first in her sport to win National League, all-Ireland championship, interprovincial championship, Gradam Tailteann medals and the B + I awards in the same year.

Regarded as one of the most accomplished forwards of all time in camogie. She won her first all-Ireland medal with Kilkenny in 1974, which also marked Kilkenny's first win in the championship. This was 'e win pionship. This year's win over Dublin marked her fifth all-Ireland medal.

In 1977 Angela captained Kilkenny to an all-Ireland win. She also holds three National League medals, 1980, 1982 and 1985; inter-provincial championship medals with Leinster in 1978, 1979, 1981, 1983, 1984 and 1985 and with her club, St. Paul's she had won two all-Ireland senior medals in 1975 and 1977.

Michael Walsh

Michael is the second Kil-

kenny player to be honoured in the B + I handball awards. His recognition brings the first family interest into the handball awards over the past 11 years. The previous Kilkenny winner, Billy Burke (1980) is Michael's first

Michael has had a remarkable career since he won his first all-Ireland tital at the age of 10 in 1977. Since then he has collected an astonishing succession of titles, and in addition to his striking successes in Ireland, he has won the U.S. titles in the under-15 16 and 19 categories.

Michael, in fact, is the second player to win all three American under-age cham-pionships. The only other player to achieve this honour is Doug Glatt of Northridge, California. Walsh began last year by winning the all-Ireland junior 40 x 20 singles title and then went on to become the first and also the youngest player to win both Coca Cola titles in the one year. He also, of course, took the U.S. under-19 title.

But perhaps his most significant performance came in the international trials for this year's World championships which will be held in British Columbia in May. It had been generally anticipated that Michael would compete in the under-23 category in the international trials. But his entry for the

under-23 trial was late and he then had no choice but to enter for the open category, which he felt would provide

his good practice for the American under-age cham-

pionship. Michael, however, had a

glorious run in the open trials and went on to beat Tony Ryan (Tipperary) in a thoroughly exciting final.

WHEN anybody with an interest in sport hears a mention of Castleisland, Co. Kerry, the name Geancy immediately comes to mind for that particular family has produced more than its share of notable personalities.

Mary beaney, for instance is one of the country's most distinguished sportswomen and she recently announced her retirement from the international hockey scene, having won 61 caps as Ireland's goalkeeper.

Mary is aged 32 and will continue to play hockey, camogie, ladies' football and badminton at club and county level and can't ever see herself getting away completely from all codes.

Her father, Con, now a hearty 77, won three All-Ireland medals with Kerry in 1930's. He was a national teacher at Currans, a few miles outside Castleisland, where his children also attended school.

Games like camogie, hurling and football were played at the school and Mary became involved in the Castle-island camogie club at an early age. She received her secondary education at the Ursuline Convent, Blackrock, Cork, the famous hockey nursery.

She went to Ursuline Convent, Blackrock in 1965 when Mrs. Joan Dorgan was responsible for the hockey tuition and quickly established her potential as a goal-keeper even if it took some time to become accustomed to wearing the heavy leg pads.

"If you have an eye for a ball, I think it's easy to adjust to any game. Anyway, I have enjoyed hockey tremendously for the past 20 years," she says.

Mary won three Munster championships with the Ursulines at school level and was picked for the senior team in her first year. She later joined the Old Ursulines and hopes to continue playing with them for several years to come

Her camogie allegiance



is with the Cork club, Eire Og, and her best position is full-forward. She has won four county championships and one Munster title with the club. Again, she has no plans to quit club camogie.

At times, she has found it difficult to fit in both hockey and camogie. On one occasion, she gave preference to an international hockey fixture and lost an All-Ireland camogie medal as a result.

The fact that she had to frequently travel long distances influenced her retirement. It was a case of having to go to Dublin almost every second weekend and she had to reach high levels of fitness while training alone.

The 64 miles each way journey to Cork, over the heights of Nadd, is now very much second nature to her. She makes it most weekends, but at least has been relieved of the "real pressure" of inter-

national competition.

Looking back over a career which involved playing on a Triple Crown team, one memory stands out. It is of a famous day in Wembley Stadium in 1984 when Ireland defeated England 1-0 in a Home Countries tie.

Countries tie.

Apart from keeping her goal intact, she had to face an English penalty shot which hit the post. "Til never forget the excitement and the tension of that day," she remarks. "We were on the defensive for most of the time and it was a marvellous victory."

She's reasonably happy with progress around the country in the promotion of camogie and sees prospects for ladies football which, she maintains, is not getting the support it deserves from the GAA.

A member of the Kerry ladies football side which last year won its fourth successive All-Ireland crown, she feels important games should be played at top venues and as curtain-raisers to major hurling and football matches.

"Up to now, they've been sending us to outof-the-way places, even for All-Ireland semifinals," she complains. "If this is to be the approach, nobody will get a chance to see our football and it will never be really accepted. Many girls are extremely skillful, but don't get the audience they ought to

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Her brother Dave, Chairman of the Kerry GAA Board's fixtures committee, might take note. A doctor practising in Castleisland, he won an All-Ireland medal in 1959 and is one of the main architects of Castleisland Desmonds' success in recent years. Dave is also a member of the Munster GAA Council.

Mary is second youngest in a family of six. Sheila is married in Listowel, Dick (a former Kerry minor) is in Chicago, Fr. Niall is a missionary priest in the Sudan and Eileen is a teacher in Dublin.

On the issue of sponsorship, Mary is opposed to paying players, but feels that adequate expenses should be paid.

Working in the family fancy goods store at Main Street, Castle-island, she trains every day. She finds walking to be of benefit and does seven or eight miles almost every night.

Last week, she won her fifth consecutive Kerry badminton title - her tenth in all - and she has also taken up golf in Killarney, where her handicap currently stands at an improving 25.

Mary Geaney's advice to young sportspeople is: "If you want to make it, you must put in the work."

Death of Prominent Clare Sportsman

The death occurred last week-end of former Clare County Council member and one of the best known sportsmen ever in Clare, Mr. Mick Hennessy of Clooney. The late Mr. Hennessy died at Ennis General Hospital following a short illness.

A Fianna Fial member of Clare Co. Council in the 40s and 50s, Mr. Hennessy is best remembered for his many sporting involvements particularly with the GAA and coursing.

Mr. Hennessy who was in his 80th year, was a renowned hurler and administrator with his club Clooney and Clare for several years. In the late twenties he played a major role in reforming the Clooney club and he was a star player and driving force of the team which reached five championship and five cup finals winning one championship and three cup medals.

He was one of the most brillant hurlers ever to represent Clare and it wasn't surprising that he was chosen by the Munster selectors on many occasions and helped them to two Railway cup successes.

He was secretary of the Clare GAA board fr to 1950 during which time he did much to build up a strong organisation in the county. In 1946 he trained the Clare

team which won the national league title and he also had the honour of refereeing two all Ireland finals. In addition he founded the Clare camogie board and many of the now thriving camogie clubs in the county.

In latter years he devoted his time to his first love, the Clooney hurling club and was always ready to offer belp and advice. On Oct. 20 last, exactly three months before his death, he attended the intermediate hurling champ. final between Clooney and St. Josephs.

He was also a keen coursing enthusiast and from his early years was an active member of the Tradaree coursing club committee with whom he filled many positions. He was chairman for many years up to recent times and at the time of his death was the club's vicepresident. He attended and played a major role in the success of the clubs last meeting in December. He was a familiar and popular figure at the national coursing meetings in Conmel and the Irish cup at Clounanna.

He also showed an interest in horse racing and attended both days of the Christmas meeting in Limerick before becoming ill.

In a graveside oration given by Mr. Brendan Vaughan, vice-president of the G.A.A. and a fellow member of the Clooney club, he recalled the outstanding work done by the late Mr. Hennessy for the G.A.A. in the parish and for Clare, "Mick Hennessy's dynamic talents were not confined to the playing fields as be made an equally great impact as secretary of the Clare Co. Board during which time be created what many regard as the golden age of Clare G.A.A." he said.

All-Ireland Final Defeat for Dublin

Captain Edel Murphy reflects on what might have been

Ede Murphy, who has been a consistent star with the Dublin senior camogie team over the past six seasons, appreciates better than most these days the fluctuating for-

In 1984 she gave such a majestic display in Dublin's All-Ireland senior final win over Tipperary that she walked away with the "Player of the Match" award. Last September came the other side of the coin, when she captained the Dubs as they gave a disappointing performance when losing to Kilkenny in the national championship final.

DISAPPOINTMENT

'That defeat ranks as the biggest disappointment of my camogie career, Being Captain made it particularly so, but even more was the fact that we did not play up to our

As a learn we played well below our capabilities", reflected the U.C.D. player when we talked about her career in the game.

Edel can offer no tangible reason as to why Dublin failed to come up to general expectations in their final defence of the All-Ireland

"Going into that game I felt we were in with a good chance, and I for our dia my finger on the reason for our disappointing showing. We certainly were not over trained. It was just one of those things.

"It has been suggested that perhaps some might have been satisfied some might have been satisfied having won an All-Ireland medal in 1984, but that was definitely not my problem.

"The final was a real challenge for us; a chance to confirm the triumph of the previous year. But we just did the previous year. But at all"

The midfield ace, who hit seven classic Points in the 1984 final had some interesting observations on the publin training system. She pointed out that for the past few years the senior and junior county teams have trained together with one selectorial panel of five selectors for both teams and all under the same trainer.

Prior to that we had three selectors for the seniors and three for the juniors, and the teams trained

independently under separate trainers'

Edel left me in no doubt that she would like to see a return to the old system. "There are lots of problems when two teams train together. It is very difficult, for example, to cope with 30 players at a session. There is not much difference between the more experienced juniors and the seniors.

"The younger juniors, however, need individual attention on the basics of the game, and the trainer just has not sufficient time to go to them all, or to come to the seniors at the more advanced level. I don't think this arrangement works out satisfactorily at all".

The skilled Dubliner speaks highly of the county players' great commitment to training. "This is first class. The only real problem is holidays, especially during the summer. The girls now try to arrange their holidays around the matches'

Edel Murphy was born in Clonmel, but she has been living in Dublin with her family since she was six years old. She started playing camogie with Presentation club and Presentation College, Terenure. She won Leinster Colleges' medals with Presentation, including a senior award in 1976.

Inter-county honours came early as well to Edel. She was honoured at minor and captained the side that lost to Cork in the All-Ireland final of 1978 in that grade.

Just over a year or so later she stepped up to the premier ranks, when called in as a substitute against Down in Dublin in a

National League tie. She evidently created a good impression as she was included in the team that met Antrim, then All-Ireland champions, in the next round, and has not looked back since.

Edel's parents have always had a great interest in the game. Her mother is from Cork. Her maiden name was Barry-Murphy, and she played club camogie when living by the Leeside and also made a number of appearances with the county side.

Her father played hurling at schools and club level. Mr. and Mrs. Murphy are also very keen followers of hurling, and a brother of Edel's is on the Dublin senior hurling team panel.

Edel is also a keen hurling follower. "Hurling is my main sporting interest after camogie", she says. "I also go to many football games".

The stylish Dublin midfielder has built up a reputation as one of the best free-takers in camogie. I asked her if she put in much practice time in taking frees: "I used to practice free-taking a lot when I was 14 to 16 as I was not very good at that stage. When I went to U.C.D., I used to practice hours and hours, at times by myself and sometimes with a playing colleague.

'As a result I have become more consistent in free-taking, and I do not spend as much time in practice as earlier in my career. But I still put in regular practice in this regard".

CAREER HIGHLIGHT

I watched Edel Murphy play many games with Dublin, and the one that stands out in my memory is the 1984 All-Ireland final, in which she was superb. To my surprise, however, she did not select that match as the one that gave her most satisfaction.

Instead, she went for the Universities Championships finals of 1920 and 1981 for the Ashbourne Chil "In our 1980 final win ove Queen's, I was very pleased with my performance. I was delighted for the team, as well tremendous effort into that c pionship. U.C.D. had not wor Cup for years before that success

"The second year we play

drew the biggest attendance to any decider in years. That prompted me to ask the Dubliner if she had any suggestions as to how the attendance could be improved at finals. "That is a difficult one. The 1984 final was the first televised live, and that publicity was wonderful for the game. I thought the crowd would have been much greater as a result for the last final, but it was not as big as I had hoped.

"I think part of the problem is that the players themselves do not travel, especially from the country. The players are more interested in playing than in watching matches".

Dublin's 1985 captain would not favour playing the final at any venue other than Croke Park. "I would not like to see that happen. Playing at Croke Park is something special, and it would take from the final if the match was played at another venue. I feel there would also be a much smaller crowd".

Miss Murphy maintains that camogie is deserving of much more publicity in the newspapers than the game receives at present, and would like to see sports journalists becoming more involved in covering the sport.

DIFFICULT OPPONENTS

Of the many players she has matched skills with over the years, Edel Murphy had no hesitation in singling out Bridie Martin, the Kilkenny captain, for special mention.

"I played on her twice in the past year in the two League final clashes. When I was not in direct combat with her I did contribute. When I was in combat, I felt that she had the upperhand.

"Bridie is very clever. She has a very quick sidestep, and I found a lot of difficulty in marking her".

And the player she admires most of all?

"It has to be Angela Downey. She is a class apart. Her speed puts her ahead; not just her speed in running, but the speed with which she does things; speed at which she raises the ball and the manner in which she anticipates play.

"She can also jump two feet off the ground to catch the ball, and is so athletic. I don't think there will ever be a player to come near to her. She is really exceptional".

Last October the interprovincial championship was played over a single week-end in Cork for the first time, rather than the old system of having a break of some weeks between the semi-finals and final.

Edel Murphy feels that this is a step in the right direction. It provides players with the one real occasion in the year to come together from all over the country and to meet and talk. Leiuster retained the title, and Edel captured her fourth medal.

The top scoring Dubliner is a so a strong supporter of the open-raw for the All-Ireland championrhip. She maintains that this arrangement introduced some years ago has brought a new dimension to camogie.

On the Dublin front she feels that there is a case for the introduction of club tournaments during the summer.

"Our club season runs from the winter through to the final in May, and then we have nothing in the finest weather of the year. It might be worthwhile if we had a few tournaments for clubs during the summer. Tournaments are successfully run in some other counties".

Miss Murphy, who won national league medals in 1981 and 1983, has no intention of taking up refereeing, at least not while she is a player.

"Refereeing is very difficult, all the more especially when you are refereeing girls whose style of play you know very well. I feel that there would be a danger for me of anticipating frees as a result".

Finally, I asked the very likeable and courteous midfielder with the scoring touch for her hopes for the future. "To win another All-Ireland medal. I have only one from four final outings. That is the No. I aim. Then, I would very much like to win another county championship medal with U.C.D.".



DOUBLE CELEBRATION FOR KILKENNY

Kilkenny is a county well conditioned to celebrating national successes in hurling, camogie and handball. But a rare richness of talent in two sports resulted in a unique double celebration for success laden Noresiders when Angela Downey, as camogie player of 1985, and Michael Walsh, the top handballer of the past year, were both presented with their B+I Line Awards at a special luncheon in Dublin.

In any year, the achievements of either Angela or Michael during 1985 in their respective sports would have been more than enough to have earned either a ranking as the outstanding personality of Kilkenny in the past season. But 1985 was no ordinary year, as the experienced camogie forward and the bright young man of handbail walked almost step by step in blazing new frontiers. It was, then, very fitting that both were honoured for their record-making performances on the same day.

Angela won All-Ireland senior intercounty, National League, interprovincial and Gradam Tailte medals during the past year. Walsh became the youngest-ever winner of the All-Ireland Coca Cola senior singles crown in handball at 19. He followed on by partnering Eugene Downey to the Coca Cola senior double championship, and so became the first to win singles and doubles medals in the same year.

Towards the end of the season, young Walsh, known throughout handball circles as "Duxie", earned the right to represent Ireland in the World senior open championship in Canada in May, and stay out the year by lifting in impressive style the U.S. under-19 crown.

Angela and her twin sister, Ann, come from one of Kilkenny's most famous sporting families — they are daughters of the legendary All-Ireland hurler Shem Downey — and both have been outstanding members of the Kilkenny senior squad in recent years.

Although the past year was marked by success all the way for Angela she still passes over all the triumphs when selecting her most memorable day in the sport.

"That has to be the All-Ireland senior final win of 1977 over Wexford", Angela told me.

"I captained Kilkenny in that game, and it is a great distinction to lead one's county to an All-Ireland senior championship".

The top scoring Kilkenny player is an experienced All-Ireland campaigner. She won her fifth senior medal last September when she had a superb second half, and emphasised her worth to Kilkenny with four well taken points in a convincing win over Dublin.

She was pleased that the final attracted the biggest attendance at such a game in some years, and when I asked her if she had any views as to how much more could be attracted to the All-Ireland decider, Angela came up with a very novel suggestion.

"I would like to see the match played as a curtain-raiser to the All-Ireland senior hurling final. The atmosphere would be wonderful for the camogie players, and many G.A.A. enthusiasts who have no interest in camogie at present would be introduced to the sport, and could be won over as supporters".

On a personal basis, Angela left me in no doubt that she would dearly like to play before a bumber crowd at Croke Park.

"I would really like to have the experience of playing before the full stands, and to experience the atmosphere that a big crowd creates."

CLEAR MARGIN

Angela gave an extraordinary display of all round-athleticism in retaining her national title in Gradam Tailte last year. She became the first to take the crown twice, winning five firsts and two seconds in the various disciplines to score a total of 64 points. That gave

her victory by a clear margin.

At this early stage of the year she is undecided if she will try to make it a treble of titles this season.

Her main concern right now is the National Senior League, which opens in March, and in which Kilkenny will meet Dublin in the first round.

"We are determined to do well in the League and the championshiop this year. With this in view, Kilkenny started training twice weekly at the end of January.

Angela has a high regard for many players in camogie, but when I suggested she select the defender whom she found most difficult of all to outwit, she decided to field that one in expert fashion.

"I think I must pass all over in favour of Yvonne Redmond, the Dublin goalkeeper. She is outstanding".

In winning the B+I Line award for the second time, the smart-moving and skilled Kilkenny player became the first to collect the trophy more than once. She is looking forward to the coming season with enthusiasm and determination, and it is quite but the cards that she could be the player back again at the end of the season for another trophy.

CAMOGIE REVIEW

Crumlin saw the year out on a high note for Dublin when they made a winning debut in an All-Ireland senior camogie club championship final by beating Athenry, of Galway, by 4-8 to 3-3 at O'Toole Park. The success helped to compensate to a degree for the county team's defeats from Kilkenny in the year's two national senior finals — the National League decider, after a replay, and the All-Ireland senior championship.

Crumlin made history on the double in impressive style. In their first outing in a Leinster senior final they could hardly have been handed a more testing assignment than their meeting with Buffer's Alley (Wexford), the title specialists, who were then in line for a fifth All-Ireland championship in succession. However, as things turned out the defending champions were no match for Crumlin.

Barbara Redmond, who scored three goals, Mary Mernagh at midfield, and Bernie Toner at full forward, were the stars of the home team that powered superbly to the most convincing of wins at 4-7 to 1-0.

The Dubliners had then to journey to Ovens in Cork to take on the Southern champions, the well-fancied Eire Og, of Cork. Crumlin did well to forge out an interval lead of two points, but any thoughts of a good win were quickly dispelled as the home team took control in the second half, and edged ahead by two points.

It appeared as though Eire Og would hold out for a narrow win, as time ticked away, but with about a minute remaining a great all out bid by Crumlin ended with a goal from Anna Condon to give her side a 2-4 to 1-5 victory and a place in the national decider for the first time.

Crumlin again demonstrated their vality to come back in exciting fashion in their show-down with Athenry for the championship proper. They could not make any real impression on the visiting defence in the first quarter, and were rocked by scores from Ather.ry's top player, Una Jordan, who put her side into a good lead with a point and a goal. It was then, however, that Crumlin got their game together, and a point by Mary Mernagh started the climb back. By the half time whistle,

Crumlin had battled back so well that they led by 2-3 to 1-2.

The second half was a keenly contested affair, but the Crumlin forwards fared better than their opposite numbers and eventually got through for the scores to give their team that eight points win and a place in the record books.

Anna Condon with two goals, Aileen Redmond 1-1, Mary Mernagh 0-3, Mary Keane 1-0, Barbara Redmond (0-2), P. Dalton and Cathy Walsh (0-1 each) were the scorers for Crumlin, who thus became the first Dublin club to win this title since Austin Stacks won their second championship in 1973.

The win was a fitting finale to a great season for Crumlin, whose powerful displays in the provincial and national championships did much to advertise the standard of club fare in the county.

It would be easy, in contrast, to dismiss the inter-county season as a disappointing one at senior level, but that would be most unfair to a talented company of players who gave some grand performances on the way to finishing runners-up in the two major competitions of the year.

Edel Murphy had an excellent game in the National League final against Kilkenny at Parnell Park in June, scoring 1-9. But her grand finishing was still only good enough to earn Dublin a draw against a smart-moving Kilkenny side – 2-13 to the Noresiders 4-7.

Unfortunately, Dublin were unable to field at full strength for the replay a few weeks later at Nowlan Park in Kilkenny. Yvonne Redmond, Germaine Noonan, Marie Connell and Joan Gormley were all unavailable because of holiday arrangements.

In the circumstances Dublin aid really well to make a tremendous game of it against the home stars. Perhaps not unexpectedly in view of the changes in their side. Dublin started sluggishly and trailed by 0-4 to 3-6 at the interval. However, they really took the game to Kilkenny in the second half and after twenty minutes had cut their arrears to a goal.

However, although Dublin put plenty of pressure on the home defence after that, Kilkenny held firm, and won out in the end by 4-7 to 3-6. So, while defeat was their lot, Dublin still deserved a great deal of credit for a great effort from a much under-strength side.

Dublin hit back from that setback to win the Leinster senior championship, a competition separate from the All-Ireland open draw series, by beating Wexford in Dublin by 2-9, to 2-5.

In the All-Ireland senior championship proper, Dublin, of course, started in the role of All-Ireland champions. Their toughest assignment in their march to the final was a visit to Cork to meet their old rival in one of the semi-finals. As was only to be expected, the match was a close, interesting affair, marked by some good passages of play, and featured yet again the excellent points scoring of Edel Murphy, captain of the side. She hit eight points, and with Joan Gormley who scored 1-1, did most to pave the way for a 1-10 to 3-1 vic-

Many felt after that game that Dublin would prove capable of taking revenge for their National League final defeat when they faced up to Kilkenny in a show-down for the O'Duffy Cup. However, the defending champions failed to come up to general expectations in the decider.

Dublin played with a strong wind in the first half, and moved quite well as they put the Kilkenny defence under pressure for long spells. However, they just could not get through for many scores and at the break led by just a goal – 1-4 to 0-4.

The second Lalf belonged to Kilkenny. Inspired by Angela Downey, undoubtedly the camogie personality of 1985, they took control dominated the exchanges to such effect that Dublin managed to score just a solitary point in that session. At the end, Kilkenny were the most deserving of champions by 0-13 to 1-5.

Still, there were some impressive individual performances from Dublin players. Yvonne Redmond kept her usual sound goal, and it was due in no small measure to her brilliance that Kilkenny failed to score a single goal. Germaine Noonan, Bernie Toner, both in the half line, and Una Crowley at midfield, set up some excellent chances for the forwards, particularly in the first half. Joan Gormley and Marie Connell were the pick of the scoring division.

Bid to stop 'inter-pros'

ANNUAL Congress of Cumann Camogaiochta na nGael will convene at Mullingar this weekend. Officers and delegates have a tight schedule with a variety of reports and thirty one motions to consider.

Dublin's motion to discontinue the inter-provincial competitions will generate lively debate. The idea of inter-provincial camogic was originally launched as part of the Golden Jubilee celebrations of the Association in 1954. A Leinster selection played their Ulster counterparts in a special exhibition at Navan.

Two years later the annual inter-provincial series for the Gael-Linn Cuo was established. In 1975 the status of the competition was altered from senior to junior grade. The junior displayed good interest in the inter-provincial game and their competition was made permanent. The senior returned to the field in 1978 since when both competitions have run concurrently.

The Gael-Linn competitions have provided a stage
for the highly rated player

Is it to be for the weaker counties of the senior grade? If so, do they plan to run it off because the Open Draw with the winners going into the All-Ireland proper?

CLARE MOTION

The Banner County tables an interesting motion which would introduce promotion and relegation to the National Leagues. While common to other sports, this system has not been tried in camogie. The benefits of good competition are obvious but the cost of long travelling could limit support.

Galway would like to see the two top teams in each zone of the National League go forward to the play-off stages. This would necessitate fitting in additional fixtures into an already crowded schedule.

Westmeath seek to prohibit a junior player from gaining experience in the National Senior League without loss of junior

atatus, Kilkenny request that All-Ireland medal-holders, who remained on the substitutes bench throughout the campaign, be eligible for regrading.

Certain Ulster countles have been reluctant to accept a membership fee since it was first mooted. The existing hule calls for a mere fifty pence annually from adult members. It is disappointing to those who are working hard to promote the game to see motions tabled from Derry and Monaghan to withdraw this meagre income from Ard Chomhairle.

Dublin request that a committee be appointed by the President to examine all aspects of the Association. They wish that the personnel for this committee be drawn from Ard Chomhairle, current players and the G.A.A. However, the president would have a free hand in the choice of names.

GOOD LOOK

An internal commission was set up in 1968 with similar guidelines. Many of their recommendations were subsequently put into practice. Perhaps it is time for a searching good look to be taken at the Association again.

Some years ago the G.A.A. introduced the position of President-elect. Kilkenny suggest that the

Camogie Association should follow suit. It would permit the designated official to obtain a first hand insight into affairs. On the other hand it would entail a four year commitment which some girls might find off-putting.

Kilkenny and Dub.in hold different views as to who should be eligible to enter for Gradam Tailte. Dublin advocate permitting any senior club player to represent her county. On the other hand, Kilkenny seek to revert to the original idea of selecting a member of the county's first twelve.

Ulster request a more central venue for this competition. They also propose that the winner of Gradam Tailte be debarred from entering the competition in the following year.

It is the first time that Congress convenes in Co. Westmeath. This county, revived some years ago, has made great strides. The hard-working P. J. 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Charleville's winning weekend


