Cork v. Kilkenny final promises to be a classic

THREE months ago, a delighted bunch of Cork players trouped off the field at Ballinlough. They had scored a well deserved seven point win over Kilkenny in the final of the National Senior League. The supporters on the bank assured one another that the championship was there for the taking.

But as the weeks went by word filtered through that Kilkenny were regrouping their forces for a spirited defence of their All-Ireland title. Breda Holmes returned to the panel. Under the watchful eye of Tom Ryan, an arduous training programme was embarked upon.

In the semi-final against Wexford, the signs were clear that Kilkenny were in no mood to relinquish their All-Ireland title. Captain Angela Downey drove her players relentlessly and they responded with an exhibition of the skill, teamwork and confidence which has marked this team in recent years.

A spectacular seven-in-a-row is now within Kilkenny's grasp. Marie Fitzpatrick is playing as well as she ever has in the Kilkenny goal. Biddy O'Sullivan and Deirdre Malone continue to shine in defence.

Against Wexford, Ann Downey took complete control in midfield, Youngsters Una Murphy, Jillian Dillon and Bridget Mullally improve with every game. The ability of the Kilkenny attack to move up a gear when the need arises poses huge problems for any opponents.

Aiming to captain her third All-Ireland winning side, Angela Downey maintains her extraordinary will to win. Her half-time exhortation to her players at the semi-final in Belfield left nobody within earshot in any doubt as to what she expected from her side in the second half.

Cork won their championship games against Dublin and Galway by fifteen and twelve points respectively. In both games, they won possession easily but had difficulty in converting it into scores.

This was particularly true in the Galway tie. Time and again, Cork players shot wide when in good positions and under no real pressure. They

appeared to be going through the motions as if their appetite for the game had been satisfied by long hours on the training ground.

It is widely held that if any team will lower Kilkenny's colours, it will be Cork. They came within a whisker of achieving their goal in the semi-final in Cork last year. The National League win was vital to Cork's self-belief.

Led by Therese O'Callaghan who captained Glen Rovers to win the All-Ireland Club Championship, Cork have outstanding performers in their team. Liz Dunphy, Paula Goggins and Breda Kenny defend resolutely. Sandie Fitzgibbon, Colette O'Mahony, Ger McCarthy and Linda Mellerick can be match-winners on their day. Jean Paula Kent and Irene O'Keeffe were promoted from the junior side this season and have increased the options.

Cork and Kilkenny have produced classic exhibitions of camogie. The 1991 All-Ireland Senior final on 22nd September should be no exception. For excitement, skill and commitment, it will be an occasion not to be missed.

Down bridge a gap of fifteen years when they line out in the All-Ireland Junior final against Tipperary. Champions in 1968 and 1976, Down will display great spirit and tenacity in their play.

Defeated by Kildare in last year's decider, Tipperary have bounced back. They showed their prowess in attack by recording 5-12 against Dublin in the semi-final and will try very hard to bring home the Cup on this occasion.

Marion seeking ninth medal

MARION McCARTHY (Eire Og): Holder of eight All-Ireland medals (four in goal), a record for a Cork player. A B@I Award winner in 1980, she captained Cork to win the 1986 National League title, one of three league medals she possesses. She has 20 Munster Senior Championship, three Gael Linn and five County senior medals, with South Pres and Eire Og, a county Senior League medal as well as numerous other trophies. In fact, the only honour that has eluded her is an All-Ireland Club medal. She first played for Cork in 1970, so what better way to celebrate twenty one years on the team than with another All-Ireland medal.

LIZ DUNPHY (Sarsfields): Captained her club to their first ever Senior County title in 1989 and was captain of the Cork team beaten in the semifinal last year by Kilkenny. Liz first came to prominence when helping St. Patricks to win the All-Ireland Colleges title in 1981. She won All-Ireland Junior and Gael Linn Junior medals in 1983 and hold three National League medals. A reliable, skilful defender.

TOM HIGGINS compiled the pen pictures of the Cork camogie team. They take on Kilkenny in the All-Ireland final at Croke Park on Sunday.

LIZ TOWLER (Bishopstown): A very speedy defender, she won an All-Ireland minor medal in 1983 and helped Bishopstown to win the County Intermediate championship in 1989. She is also the holder of County Junior and Feile na Gael medals with her club. She was drafted onto the Cork senior panel for the American trip last year and gets her big chance on Sunday.

BREDA KENNY (Sarsfields): A
physiotherapist by profession, she won a minor AllIreland with Galway and a Junior Gael Linn medal
as well as three Ashbourne Cup medals with UCD.
When she came to Cork she joined Sarsfields and
has been one of the stars of the Cork team in the
past two seasons. A very solid defender, she is
Chairperson of the Sarsfields club.

PAULA GOGGINS (Na Piarsaigh): Paula showed great promise as a teenager and won an All-Ireland minor medal in 1979 and helped North Pres. to win the All-Ireland Colleges title in 1980. She

added a Junior All-Ireland medal to her collection in 1984 and has been on the senior panel since then.

COLETTE O'MAHONY (St. Finbarr's): She commenced her inter-county career in 1982 at the age of 14 by winning a Munster minor medal. The following two years she won Munster and All-Ireland Minor medals, captaining the side in 1983. She joined the senior panel in 1986 and has two National League medals as well as Gael Linn junior medals and Munster medals in all grades. She is also a well-known referee.

THERESE O'CALLAGHAN (Glen Rovers):
Therese will be trying to create her own bit of
history on Sunday. Having captained Glen Rovers to
win last year's All-Ireland Club title and Cork to win
the National League this year, she will be hoping to
bring off the big treble by taking the All-Ireland
trophy. She holds a National League, four Senior
County championship and two All-Ireland Club
Championship medals.

SANDY FITZGIBBON (Glen Rovers): The first player to win three All-Ireland minor medals, Sandy has never played a bad game for the county. She captained Cork to win one of their three National League titles and holds five Senior County medals. Sandy is one of three player on the side to have All-Ireland medals, having played on the winning sides of 1982 and 1983. An international basketball player, she has been capped 33 times for Ireland and was the successful captain when Blarney won last year's ICS Cup.

LINDA MELLERICK (Glen Rovers): Started her callingie Career with Brian Dillons before moving to the Glen. Won an All-Ireland minor medal in 1983 and a Junior All-Ireland medal the following year. Has two Senior County medals as well as an All-Ireland Senior Club Medal. A dangerous forward, capable ogf getting scores from any angle.

GER McCARTHY (Glen Rovers): The third member of the side with All-Irealnd medals, won in 1982 and 1983. She has been her club's top scorer for in the past few years and is very accurate from frees. Has five County senior medals, three National league medals, two minor All-Ireland titles in 1978 and 1979, when she captained the side, as well as an All-Ireland Junior medals in 1980.

LIZ O'NEILL (Bishopstown): Liz is a great player to take on a defence and this year won her

first All-Ireland title when Cork beat Kilkenny in the League final. She has won medals in all grades with Bishopstown and was captain of their successful Intermediate team in 1989. She collected a Munster Minor medal in 1982, a Munster Junior medal in 1987 and was on the Munster panel that won the Gael Linn Cup.

IRENE O'LEARY (Na Piarsaigh): Irene has been on the Cork panel since 1985. She captained Cork to win the 1984 All-Ireland Junior title. She won a National League medal 1986 and another this year. Played a major role in taking North Pres. to the All-Ireland Colleges final in 1984. She holds Munster medals at Senior, Junior, Under 18 and minor levels as well as a Cork Under 18 medal with her club.

SUBSTITUTES

BRID WALSH (St Finbarrs): Came onto the senior panel in 1989 as reserve goalkeeper. Holder of two All-Ireland minor medals, in 1984 and 1985. She won a Gael-Linn junior medal in 1987 and has three minor and under 18 Munster medals as well as one Munster Senior medal.

JEAN PAULA KENT (Na Piarsaigh): A very nippy player, she was on this year's National League winning team. She has two Minor All-Ireland medals, in 1983 and 1984.

IRENE O'KEEFFE (Inniscarra): Also on this year's National League winning side, she has come into prominence with her club in the past few years.

MAGS FINN (Fr. O'Neill's): Was on this year's National League winning side and played against Kilkenny in the 1989 All-Ireland final. Has been on the Cork panel for the past few years. -(Pic: Dan Linehan

Cork girls know what it takes

JUDGING by the way they were preparing under the watchful eye of Joe McGrath at Pairc Ui Chaoimh the other night, the Cork senior camogie team are really determined to halt Kilkenny's march next Sunday, when the Noresiders will be bidding for their eighth All-Ireland title in-a-row.

As full-back Liz Duphy said: "This is the one we want to win".

The girls had a 30 minute limber-up before the panel got involved in a full scale match. Every ball was fought for with great vigour and, with McGrath dictating the play, one could sense the hunger in this Cork team.

Following the game, and with the light fading, McGrath put the girls through a vigorous short sprints routine and, although they were undoubedly tired, the entire panel took to their task with gusto.

Of the panel of 21, only Ger McCarthy did not take part in the session. She has a muscle strain and is getting daily physiotherapy treatment. However, she is confident she will be fit for the final. She played for her club, Glen Rovers, the previous Sunday against Shannon in the Munster Club championship and was replaced, as a precautionary measure, after five minutes of the second-half when the Glen were in a winning position.

"I have worked the girls as hard as any intercounty men's team I have trained and they have never complained", said McGrath. "I am proud of every one of panel".

"We started the build-up at the end of last year and during the Winter trained in the gym in Mayfield. Early this year, in preparation for the league and championship games, we moved to the all-weather pitch at the Mayfield Community School under lights.

"An example of their enthusiasm was one night when we turned up for training it was beginning to snow. A men's team, who had gone to train in Harlequins on the all-weather pitch, called off their session but the girls would not hear of it. I was hoping that they would call it off but they decided to go ahead despite the cold. This is real determination", added McGrath.

"In this year's League final the girls were really hyped up, because we had been beaten by Kilkenny so often in recent years. But, having worked hard and trained hard, they got their reward on the day.

"We have a few niggling injuries, but, hopefully, these will have cleared up before Sunday. An All-Ireland final is always a 50-50 game but we are really determined to come out on top next Sunday. If we can get the skill right, and the attitude right, the girls will die in the Cork colours and will do the county proud on the day", promised McGrath.

Kilkenny make changes

KILKENNY show four changes from the side which beat Wexford in last year's decider for Sunday's showdown with Cork.

Gone are Brid McGarry and Ann Whelan, who have retired. Breda Cahill, who is injured, and Claire Jones.

However, the champions have able substitutes and, although they will be outsiders on Sunday following two defeats by Cork in the League, they still feel that they can retain their title.

County Secretary Breda Ryan said. "The loss of these experienced players is a blow to us but we are very determined. We have trained hard in Nowlan Park and in Danesfort and on the day it is a 50-50 game with twelve against twelve. We can match Cork for skill, but whichever team shows the most determination on the day will come out on top. I hope it will be us.

"We have only one injury worry, Breda Mullally, who has a pulled muscle.

Compared to the side which was beaten by Cork in the League final at Ballinlough in June the team shows a number of changes, positional and otherwise. "We have Breda Holmes back will be a great boost to us", said Breda Ryan.

Marie Fitzpatrick is again in goal while Biddy O'Sullivan occupies the full-back position. Una Murphy, who was at centrefield in the league decider, moves to right half-back to replace Bridget Barnaville. Deirdre Malone again occupies the centre half back position with Frances Rothwell on the left. Marina Downey, who got the winning goal in last year's semi-final, is in the centre of the field with Ann Downey, who will be seeking her seventh All-Ireland medal, while Gillian Dillon comes in

to replace Una Murphy.

Sinead Millea, who was the star of this year's Kilkenny minor All-Ireland success, is preferred to Noreen Tierney, who played in the league decider, in the half forward line and she will be supported by Bridget Mulally and ace goal scorer Angela Downey, who is also seeking her seventh senior medal. The full-forward line sees the return of Breda Holmes and she will prove quite a handful for Liz Dunphy.

The subs are Noreen Tierney, Noelle O'Driscoll, Bridget Barnaville and Tracy Millea.

Therese going for <u>another</u> Glen first

THE word is around that they're secretly planning a huge party in the Glen for September 22 next and there'll be no shortage of talent about!

On that day, dare we say it, the Cork County Senior Hurling Championship could be winding it's way through the Northside for the second year in-arow and Therese O'Callaghan could be on her way back from Croke Park with the All-Ireland Senior Camogie Championship Cup.

If Cork manage to overcome the strong Kilkenny challenge, Burnfort, Mourneabbey girl Therese will be the first Glen Captain to have brought back the County and All-Ireland to Blackpool in the same year. And in the words of long-serving camogic official, County Board President and Glen Chairperson, Nora Newman, 'I can leave the scene a happy woman, having witnessed the Glen win every honour that is possible'

Cork, who beat the seemingly invincible Kilkenny side in the League final here in Cork on June 30 last, are pulling out all the stops this year. Trainer Joe McGrath and the girls have put in a Trainer Joe McGrath and the girls have put in a tremendous effort, begining their build-up as far back as last Christmas. They began indoor training at Kevin Kehilly's studio, then moved to the outdoor pitch in Mayfield before going outdoors in March. 'We're going all out this year', said a very dedicated Therese, whose brother plays with Clyda Rovers in the junior grade, while sister Noreen plays badminton with the Buttevant club. 'It's going to be very difficult, we have a lot of respect for the passes.

very difficult, we have a lot of respect for them and we'll have to play out of our skins but as we showed in the league final win, they're not invincible', she said.

Not Worried

The fact that Kilkenny have won the past six All-Irelands in a row doesn't bother the farmers' daughter, who was first introduced to the Glen in 1983 by Ted Owens, a teacher at the time in Mallow, but who is now doing tremendous work in Castletownbere.

'I started off in 1983 playing junior but moved up to senior the following season. Since then I have won 2 All-Ireland Club medals with the Glen in '86 and last year, captaining the side, and have won county medals in '83, '86, '87, '90, and '91 as well as captaining the Glen side that won the All-Ireland 7-a-side against Buffer Ally last year.

Honour

Being Captain of Cork is a tremendous honour. and I'm thankful to my club for that. There's a tremendous commitment and dedication this year, so my job as captain is made that little bit easier'.

Playing dead centre of midfield since her senior championship debut in 1989 (there are three midfielders in camogie) she's loud in her praise for trainer Joe McGrath who 'been with us from the very start. He's got great time for everyone in the squad and puts in a tremendous amount of time and effort'.

Disappointed

They are a bit disappointed about the clash with the County Hurling Final though, after all they'll be losing a lot of much-needed support but sinn a bhfuil.

The camogie girls are weel used to that by now.

Asked if she had any other interest outside camogie, the reply was no, haven't any time, she said. 'It's a full-time commitment with Cork and the Glen. Any other interests?. 'Better leave that out' came the reply.

SINEAD MILLEA, a daughter of former county hurler Joe, will be bidding to make history when she lines out with Kilkenny against Cork in the All-Ireland senior camogic final at Croke Park on Sunday, writes GERRY McCARTHY.

Kilkenny are holders of the O'Duffy Cup. They are seeking their seventh successive title, and if they triumph Sinead would become the first player to win All-Ireland minor and senior medals in the same season.

Only 12 months ago one of her team-mates, Bridget Mullally, was ever-so-narrowly foiled of a similar honour. She was on the minor team that lost by a point to Tipperary and some weeks later helped the seniors to a final victory over Wexford. Interestingly, Sinead Millea holds three All-Ireland minor medals. She collected the first in

Interestingly, Sinead Millea holds three All-Ireland minor medals. She collected the first in 1988, added the second in 1989, when she scored 6-7 in the final, missed last year's decider because of illness and recently completed the hattrick when she notched 2-4 of Kilkenny's 4-12 total against

Galway.

Sinead's feat enabled her to equal a record, held
by Sandie Fitzgibbon — who will be in the Cork
colours on Sunday — of capturing three national
awards at under-18 level.

Pa Dillon was one of his team-mates on that occasion and he, too, has a daughter, Gillian, wearing the Black and Amber on Sunday.

The famous Downey twins, Angela and Ann, remain vital cogs in the Kilkenny machine. They, too, are daughters of a former All-Ireland winning hurler, Shem, who gained his Celtic Cross at Cork's expense in 1947.

Kilkenny have won the O'Duffy Cup ten times and, remarkably, the Downeys were on every one of those successful teams. Indeed, only Dubliners Kay Mills (15) and Una O'Connor (13) hold more All-Ireland senior medals.

Marion McCarthy, Cork's goalkeeper, is another much-bemedalled player. She has helped her county to eight All-Ireland senior titles and is a sister of Sean McCarthy, one of the Cork hurlers, who captured the Liam McCarthy Cup last year.

Noelle O'Driscoll, one of the champions' substitutes, is an All-Ireland senior medal-winner with her native Cork and adopted Kilkenny while Cork defender Breda Kenny has won junior honours with her native Galway.

He also filled the No.3 position in the 1973 final defeat by Limerick and was full-forward when Cork beat Kilkenny in 1966.

Kilkenny Seek More Records In Camogie All-Ireland Fina

Next Sunday's eagerly awaited clash between Kilkenny and Cork will be the 60th All-Ireland Senior Camogie Final. Kilkenny, now the undisputed kingpins of the game, were nowhere to be seen for two-thirds of that period. But once the girls who so proudly wear the blackand-amber, made the breakthrough in 1974, there was no looking back. Kilkenny contested, and won, nine more All-Ireland Finals to leap-frog over Wexford and Antrim into third place on the roll of honour.

The spread of camogle in the schools was a major factor in Kilkenny's rise to fame. Camogle nurseries like Callan, Castlecomer, Thomastown and, of course, Pres. Kilkenny, converted natural talent into fine exponents of

On leaving school many of these joined the St. Paul's Club which made the county senior title their own and lifted the All-Ireland club crown on many occasions also. The club spirit was carried by the players into the county team. There is a tremendous will-to-win in the Kilkenny camp. One would imagine that this would have diminished as the successful years went by but once championship time comes around again the focus is set on the task in hand and nothing is allowed to distract attention.

The great driving-force behind the team is Angela Downey who will captain the side for the third time in an All-Ireland Final. She is extremely competitive and insists that all members of her team adopt the same attitude. Opponents Cork won the last of their 14 All-Irelands in 1983. Only Marion McCarthy, Sandie Fitzgibbon and Ger McCarthy are holders of All-Ireland senior medals. There is a strong air of optimism in the Cork camp and they have a nice combination of youth and experience.

Cork are heartened by the results achieved since their last outing in Croke Park. At Ballinlough last season they were ever so close to dethroning the champions in their All-Ireland semi-final. They registered a morale-boosting victory over Kilkenny in America.

The win by Glen Rovers, who have four players on the team, in the final of the All-Ireland club championship and the success of the Cork-dominated Munster side in the Gael-Linn Interprovincial series all boost confidence. Cork knuckled down to training early this season and when the teams met in the opening round of he national league, Cork had a runaway win. However a number of the Kilkenny regulars did not line out.

Kilkenny pulled themselves together and coaxed the slow starters back into the panel. They qualified for the national league Final where they came face-to-face with

There are changes on the Kilkenny team too. Anna Whelan, Clare Jones and Bridie McQarry have left the intercounty scene. Stars of the All-Ireland winning minor team of 1988, Bridget Mullally, Jillian Dillon, Una Murphy and Sinead Millea have been promoted.

Cork and Kilkenny have thrilled Croke Park crowds with exhilarating camogie. Boosted by their wins in the national league final, Cork are ready to make an all-out challenge.

The curtain-raiser promises to be a particularly interesting game when Down play Tipperary in the Junior Final. Tipp ran out of time against Kildare in last year's final. Ten points down with eight minutes to play, they put in a storming finish and whittled the gap to four points before the clock, and Kildare, beat them.

They have now fought their way through a tough Munster championship and a semi-final against Dublin to

earn a second try. Since returning to the Junior grade they have captured the Ulster title three times since 1987. Playing a fast brand of ground camogie they surprised Galway in the semi-final and travel to Croke Park full of confidence. Now, almost to the day, twelve months later the blue and gold are back in Croke Park on Sunday next for another stab at the title. Down provide the opposition in a game that starts at 1.45 p.m.



On its annual day out at headquarters, just how healthy is the game of camogie?

Camogie takes turn to play in the spotlight

THIS is the one week in the year when Camogie leaves the darkness, but escapes only to the shade. The huff and hype which surrounded Croke Park all summer has gone and on the far side is the final of the All Ireland Camogie championship.

Today Kilkenny meet Cork, the greatest champions of the modern game against their greatest rivals, but Croke Park will not be hooting with a full house as it was on two other Sundays this month, rather it will murmur to a modest gathering of no more than about 5,000.

Yet the gaunt countenance of today's final is not representative of the rosy cheeked well being of the game. Never have more players - 60,000 - played the game, in more clubs than ever before. Thirty-one counties are now affiliated to the camogie board, and if every county doesn't field a team every year, never more than a handful fail to do so.

Still, though, the game leads a twilight existence, wrestling with the shade. As the top teams have come to prepare themselves with greater degrees of professionalism, sponsors have been courted, but only in small bands and into small commitments.

The playing population too stands always under threat. The migration of players from rural places to Dublin or beyond thwarts camogie clubs more than it does their GAA counterparts, hamstrung by the lack of funds to ferry players back for matches. Marriage and motherhood too are drains which perenially strike. And if the number of clubs have mushomed in most counties in the last

substance have traditionally been located in the traditional hurling areas, but even this is not a guarantee of stability. Today a county of Tipperary's size and hurling pedigree will only contest the junior final. Tipp, though, have endured camogie's wider problems in the last decade.

In 1984 they contested the senior final, losing to Dublin, but that year nine of that team emigrated. The Tipp camogic board could not place its top players in employment like many other major GAA boards could have. Since then two of those players have returned, but both married and only playing club camogie.

In the last seven years Tipp have regrouped and harvested a crop of good youngsters, taking the minor title two years ago and contesting their second junior final in succession today.

But today, too, is a big day in Tipperary club hurling. The camogie team will draw a good crowd with them to Croke Park, but it would have been a far better one without local counter attractions. Camogie in Tipp, as everywhere else, lives a lot because of the GAA and a little in spite of it.

In Tipp the GAA bought the camogie board a pitch five miles outside Thurles, and the camogic board can buy it from the GAA within 30 years for the £16,000 that it cost. All around the country camogie clubs use GAA pitches and are identified with GAA clubs, but they remain outside the association. In this, though, there is a

change afoot. A motion was passed at Camogie's Congress two years ago to open discussions with the GAA about affiliation and since then the met sporadically. There

The triumph of camogie's existence is in places where it doesn't live under hurling's canopy. Camogie exists in places you would not expect it.

In Fermanagh the game has roller coasted since the '60s. There has been a club in every parish at some time, but never all at the one time. Some years there may be as many as ten clubs, but this year there are only six, and maybe a playing population of 150.

Fermanagh camogie has had

fielded a county team in the late '60s, Fermanagh has paddled in shallow waters.

It is five years since they won a match when they beat Offaly in the National Junior League. In the late '60s they reached an Ulster junior semi-final, when they lost to Down, but these have been their days on the high ground.

They struggle to find a trainer, says their secretary Maire O'Neill, but their county board is strong, and vigilant against any signs of extinction.

see a winning team. But we go out and play for the sake of camogic." A world away in Cork their team has been preparing this week for the senior final. It is less diffi-

The Cork team began indoor training in a gym back in February and did some outdoor work on Friday nights at nine o'clock. This year the team has trained three nights a week during the championship, when before they met no more than twice. Training has begun at six o'clock in recent weeks and continued until dark.

Last year, for the first time, a Cork team went to a leading hotel in the week of a match, like the hurlers and footballers do, and this week they have been treated to two leading hotels by their sponsors. These things are symptoms of the change which has overtaken the

Their experience of Croke Park on final day will be no different from any other year. There will be the same echoes in the stand. Camogie's greatest failure has been their inability to sell their biggest game to their own.

"It would piss you off," says Angela Downey, "I'd be in favour of playing the games before some big hurling match, but I know I'd be shot down if I said that. All you'll see at the camogie final today will be friends and relations and schoolkids who get into the stand for 20p."

THIS is the third meeting of Cork and Kilkenny this year and we are scarcely closer to knowing what might happen today.


Cork won both of those previous meetings. A handsome win early in the league in Kilkenny when the home team treated the league with the customary disdain of All Ireland champions; and again in early summer in the league final when it was too close to the championship to treat any game so lightly.

Those games may have given Cork enough fodder to feed their self belief, but this Kilkenny team seems to believe they can beat Cork at will, and have enough evidence to prove it. Last year in the semi-final only one bizarre goal, one brilliant one and another late one floated their two points win, and that when Cork had outplayed them for a good two thirds of proceedings.

Cork set to defy the magnificent seven

A SINGLE All-Ireland title was little compensation to some Cork folk when their minor footballers brought home the Markham Cup last week.

But tomorrow a Cork team have a real chance of pulling off a rather special coup as they endeavour to topple the doyens of modern camogie, Kilkenny, who are chasing their seventh consecutive title.

On early season form, the Leesiders have looked to have a special bite this year. Fuelled by their brilliant All-Ireland club-winning quartet from Glen Rovers — Therese O'Callaghan, Sandie Fitzgibbon, Lindy Mellerick and Ger McCarthy — they thrashed the All-Ireland champions by 14 points in their first league game last autumn.

They followed up with revenge for their '89 All-Ireland final defeat by beating the Noresiders 2-13 to 2-6 in the National League final on June 30, although Kilkenny were admittedly without Marina Downey and Breda Holmes.

But as the victims of the Down and Meath footballers well know, league form counts for little come the championship.

Kilkenny, back at full strength after a relaxed league regime, are now firing on all cylinders and easily dispensed with Antrim and Wexford in the earlier championship rounds.

Since last September

Cork, coached by current Waterford manager Joe McGrath, have had an excellent season and will be keen to capitalise on their greater average age to take revenge for losing three consecutive All-Ireland Finals to Kilkenny from 1987-'89.

Cork had impressive victories over Dublin and Galway en route and this game is sure to swing on the battle between their midfielders Colette O'Mahony, Therese O'Callaghan and basketball International Sandie Fitzgibbon and Kilkenny's Marina and Ann Downey and Jillian Dillon.

The Junior final between Tipperary and Down has particular significance for one Cashel family as midfielder Triona Bonnar may enable them to bring a fourth All-Ireland medal into the cache.

KILKENNY will be bidding to make it seven in-arow when they take on Cork in the All-Ireland camogle final at Croke Park tomorrow. However, having beaten the Noresiders in the League final at the end of June, the Rebel county are in confident mood.

The last time the sides met in the decider was in 1989 when Kilkenny came out on top by 3-10 to 2-6. They also met in last year's semi-final, when Cork were unlucky to go under by two points - 3-5 to 4-4.

When it boils down to it league form means nothing when it comes to the championship. Everyone is aware of Kilkenny's ability and they won't give up the O'Duffy Cup without a fight.

"All the Cork players have the right mental attitude and are really determined to rectify the situation. No one would begrudge them an All-Ireland medal", said Rose.

"Trainer Joe McGrath has really instilled the will to win into the side and that have reciprocated by training hard for him. They won't be found wanting tomorrow. We seem to bring out the best in Kilkenny, and they in us, so it is going to be a 50-50 game. Let's hope it will be Cork who will regain the title and deprieve Kilkenny of their seven in a row", added Rose.

A player on each side will be endeavouring to make their own little bit of history tomorrow.

Cork's Therese O'Callaghan will be seeking to land a rare treble by leading her side to victory. Last year she was captain of her club, Glen Rovers, when they won the All-Ireland Club championship and was nominated to captain the county team who won the National League title at the end of June.

On the Kilkenny side is Sinead Millea, a daughter of Joe Millea who played top of the right for the Cats when they beat Cork in the 1969 All-Ireland. If her side retains the O'Duffy Cup she will become the first player to win an All-Ireland senior and minor medal in the same year. Incidentally, she joins Cork star Sandy Fitzgibbon as the only player to win three All-Ireland minor medals.

Cork are seeking their fifteenth title tomorrow while Kilkenny will be looking for their eleventh. The Downey sisters, Ann and Angela, hold the rare honour of having figured in all Kilkenny's previous winning sides. Only Kathleen Mills (15) and Una O'Connor (13) have more medals than the Kilkenny sisters.

There is a world of difference between difference League and championship play, but that success still suggests Cork are on the right track.

believe _ that Kilkenny had reached the end of a era after the League final set-back, but the All Ireland champions have emphasised, in the meantime, that they are not ready yet to easily relinquish their grip on the crown.

There was much to admire in their six points semi final win over Wexford, who were run-ners-up for last year's National title. Ann Downey had an outstanding game at midfield, scoring eight points. That spar-kling form and the tremendous experience of ten All Ireland senior medal wins indicates that Downey will prove a big threat to Cork.

Kilkenny's defence, with Marie Fitzpatrick in goal, plus the experience of Deirdre Malone and Frances Rothwell, is unlikely to give much away. Angela Downey remains one of the best match winners in attack match winners in attack and she has good all-round support in this division.

Nor is it easy to overlook Kilkenny's great experience, and the clever and combined play they have developed over the years. These are other vital assets as they face up to what is sure to prove a very strong challenge from a fine Cork side.

With the likelihood of Ann Downey proving the most influential figure in the vital midfield area, Kilkenny look to have the allround power to nar-rowly keep their great winning run intact after an entertaining match.

Kilkenny to prevail

HIRTEEN months ago, Cork's HIRTEEN months ago, Cork's mentors gifted victory to an ill-prepared Kilkenny side in the All-Ireland camogie semi-final, writes Kevin Cashman. As folk drifted away from Ballinlough, expectation was almost unanimous that — granted a minuscule increment of selectorial sense a Cork dynasty would be inaugurated in 1991, and might prove as longaeval as its mighty predecessor.

Three months later, Glen Rovers obliterated St. Pauls in the All-Ireland club final: expectation hardened into inevitability. Now, ten months and a League victory onward, inevitability has dissolved back into misgiving.

Central players, Therese O'Callaghan, Sandy Fitzgibbon and Liz Dunphy are doing their bits. But a meagre brace of goals in each qualifying game, against such disjointed resistance as that of Dublin and Galway, presages even fewer today. And point taking has been on the minus side of competent.

Thrust and hunger made Linda Mellerick Cork's principal defier of Kilkenny in her first final. If she can rediscover those properties, she may become the leader Cork very much need up front.

In every recent Championship match against Kilkenny, Marion McCarthy conceded a soft goal or two. She was absent for the League - and Cork won it. Today she's back. A once great goalkeeper, having lost much of her agility, is clearly no longer great, nor even adequate. Seems that modicum of selectorial sense was not granted.

Quite unquestionably the old zest and zoom were missing in Kilkenny, and St. Pauls, right through 1990. They got by on an extravagance of experience and instinct, and even more luck. Now, those inestimable properties, zest and zoom, are said to be flooding back and training proceeding like that of Desert Orchid for a Boxing Day at Kempton.

This year's Kilkenny minor team overflowed with startling, almost frightening, skill. The velvet touch of a Keher, the svelte carriage of a Morrissey, bloomed in four or five of them and budded in the rest. The influence of Angela Downey was not difficult to perceive.

Sublime of the lot, Sinead Millea, lines out beside her preceptor today. No player can know what an All-Ireland debut occasion will do to or for her or him — but having a few dozen Alf-Ireland medals on hand to guide and protect can be a wonderful antidote to doubt and inhibition. If this youngster gets motoring . . . !

One question is whether Kill have promoted sufficient young blood - or, rather, young legs. Another is whether Cork have the sagacity, on pitch and line, to direct and maximise their ambition and appetite and outfield mobility.

The answer to both is probably "no". And that's where Kilkenny's sagacity and Cork's goalkeeping may very well become decisive. As oft-times before.







own made their first All-Ireland appearance in 1948 when they contested the senior final against Dublin. Despite the best efforts of Anna Kerr, Peg Dooey, Jean McGrath, Anna Hollywood and Angela Denvir, Dublin won the day.

When the All-Ireland Junior Championship was introduced in 1968, Down saw their opportunity and prepared well. They captured the Ulster title and overcame Wexford 3-2 to 2-1 in the semi-final.

Moira Caldwell led Down onto Croke Park. Patricia Crangle, Carmel Reid, Eileen Coultier, Barbara Sands, Roisin McCann and Eucharia Turley showed excellent form in defeating Cork 2-3 to 1-1 to become the first holders of the New Ireland Cup.

Down were first off the mark once more when an All-Ireland Minor Championship was inaugurated. Susal Lively captured a great side which included Christina Roney, Sheila McCartan, Rita Neeson and Cathy O'Hare. Susan carried the new Corn Tailteann back to Down.

Down returned to Croke Park in 1975 in the Junior Final but found Dublin's ability to take goals too much to cope with. They learned from the experience. Marion McGarvey led the 1976 side which played a thrilling game to edge out Wexford by 3-4 to 3-3. Eileen

Hamill, Stephanie Kelly, Elizabeth Gibson, Anne Rooney, Kathleen Rice and Lil Kane were very much part of victory.

They tried their luck in the Senior Open Draw from 1977-1986 but found no joy. Since returning to the junior grade in 1987 they have recorded three Ulster victories. A brand of fast ground camogic has earned Down a place in the final. The county has a good record in finals and the present squad of players are very keen to bridge the fifteen year gap.

Time ran out for a gallant Tipperary team in Croke Park last September. They whittled Kildare's lead to ten points down to four in the closing minutes. However, like Down in 1975-76, they have analysed their performance and underlined the lessons to be learned from the experience.

After many decades of competing, Tipperary made their All-Ireland breakthrough in 1990 when a fine minor side captured Corn Tailteann. The attention to underage camogie in the county has certainly paid off. Ten of today's panel are eligible to play at under eighteen level. Tipperary will certainly be a force for many years to come.

In the Munster Championship, Tipperary played a hectic game with Cork before advancing by two points. In the final, they turned the tables on newly crowned National Junior League champions, Limerick.

Although Tipperary ran up an impressive score of 5-12 in the All-Ireland semi-final against Dublin, they had to come from ten points behind and won by only two points in a thrilling game.

1932-1991 . . . An 60ú Cluiche Ceanais

R AN ócáid stairiúil seo, agus an that Máire Gill was also Uachtarán of the seascadú Cluiche Ceannais de Chraobhchomórtas na Sinsear druidte linn, ní mór dúinn féachaint siar ar na blianta atá imithe tharainn agus imreoirí agus riarthóirí áirithe a thabhairt chun chuimhne.

In these enlightened times, it is difficult for the modern player to visualise an era in which the active involvement of women in sport was frowned on, if not forbidden. Imagine a scene in the early 1900's when girls wrapped their camogie sticks in brown paper to hide from public view and had to practice their game in obscure places where they would not be seen. That the game survived initially, and then flourished, is a tribute to the women themselves and to the men of vision who supported and encouraged them.

Úna Ui Phuirseil, a former Luimneach player, won an All-Ireland medal with Ath Cliath in 1938. She, too, was to grace the office of Uachtarán from 1976 to 1979. Una made a tremendous contribution to the game at all levels including second and third-level Colleges.

As the game developed, the contests between Ath Cliath agus Corcaigh became truly remarkable and produced players who were to become legendary.

The Camogie uniform changed somewhat over those years as hem-lines crept up and coloured sashes replaced white belts.

1942 saw the first drawn Final between Ath Cliath agus Corcaigh, with Ath Cliath winning the replay, 4-1 to 2-2. This was also the first Final to be broadcast.

Aontroim a bhi chun tosaigh oi 1945 -1947. Nancy Murray and Lily Spence, who won All-Ireland medals during those years, also served as Uachtaráin, Lily from 1956 to 1959, and Nancy from 1973 to 1976.

An Dun contested its only Senior Final in 1948. One of its team, Peg Dooey, had won All-Ireland medals with Aontroim in each of the preceeding three years.

Some months later, one of its former players, Sighle Nic an Ultaigh, became Uachtaran. Siighle subsequently held the office of Ardránai from 1953 to 1975 and guided the Association through a period of development and expansion.

Bhi Ath CLiath do-sháraithe, nach mor, idir 1948 agus 1967. During this time Ath Cliath won eighteen titles, defeated only by Aontroim in 1956 and 1967. Kay Mills, who won her first All-Ireland medal with Ath Cliath in 1941, won her record fifteenth in 1961. Kay was a member of the C.I.E. Club which created history in representing Ath Cliath in the 1948 final and in winning Corn Ua Dubhthaigh.

There were many other exceptional players of this era and it would be impossible to do justice to all those who delighted Camogie followers during those years. Beidh cuimhne ortha uilig go deo againn.

1968 heralded the beginning of a new era when Cill Chainnigh inflicted its first defeat in the Leinster Championship in thirty-six years on Ath Cliath. Loch Garman subsequently defeated Cill Chainnigh in the Leinster Final, won its first All-Ireland title and retained it in

Corcaigh took the next four titles, the 1973 Championship being played on the Open Draw system. The last seventeen titles have been shared by Ath Cliath,

The winds of change continued to blow during the 1970's. Cill Chainnigh set a trend in 1972 when they swapped the gym-frocks for the modern playing uniform. The top crossbar, which had made point-scoring an art in itself, was now gone, and, as a retult, there tended to be higher scores in Finals. Cill Chainnigh, in their last six finals, have registered sixty-nine points.

Kilkenny's seventh heaven

First-half goals put paid to Cork's hopes

KILKENNY 3-8 CORK 0-10

HAVING beaten Kilkenny twice in the League campaign this year, Cork had high hopes of relieving Kilkenny of their All-Ireland senior camogie crown. But their aspirations came unstuck at Croke Park yesterday when the National League champions were beaten by a very determined and better balanced black and amber side, who were recording their seventh success in a row.

Apart from the opening 15 minutes, when Cork played against the strong wind, the Leesiders never got to grips with the game. Too many of their better players were very off form and once Kilkenny went ahead in the 18th minute Cork were always fighting a losing battle.

The Leesiders got off to a good start when Irene O'Leary pointed within a minute from a pass by Liz O'Neill and although Ann Downey levelled after two and a half minutes Cork had the next two scorers from a Colette O'Mahony free and and Irene O'Leary after six minutes.

At this point Cork must have felt happy as they were playing well in the middle of the field and their backs were policing the Kilkenny forwards quite well. But once Kilkenny settled down, they began to gain a grip at midfield and were level 0-5 each in the 17th minute.

TURNING POINT

Then came the turning point of the game as Kilkenny had two goals in the space of three minutes which knocked the heart out of Cork.

A sideline cut by Ann Downey was caught by Brid Holmes, who turned quickly to give Marion McCarthy no chance from close range and when the Cork backs failed to clear in the 21st minute Gillian Dillon pounced to shoot home from close range.

Kilkenny continued to press but poor shooting and a hard tackling Cork defence stood firm with Ann Downey and Colette O'Mahony swapping points in the closing stages of the half to leave it 2-6 to 0-6 to Kilkenny at the interval.

With such a strong wind, two goals did not look that big a lead and Cork came out in the second-half in a determined mood. However they were giving little scope by a very solid Kilkenny defence in which Biddy O'Sullivan, at full back and Deirdre Malone were outstanding.

Then in the 35th minute Cork were rocked back on their heels when Ann Downey placed Gillian Dillon for a goal and with a nine point advantage the game looked over as a contest as the Kilkenny defence began to tighten up.

The Cork forwards were being well held and with Marina Downey and Ann Downey controlling midfield the they were given little possession. However, what possession they did get they tried to turn into goals rather than points and missed many good opportunities.

Cork's best chance came in the 25th minute when Ger McCarthy found Therese O'Callaghan free on the edge of the square but her weak effort trickled wide.

At the finish it was Kilkenny who were the stronger and although the Cork backs played reasonably well it was the forwards and midfield that really let them down.

KILKENNY remain queenpins of the camogie world. Yesterday at Croke Park they once again underlined their dominance of this code when capturing the O'Duffy Cup for the seventh successive time and the eleventh in all.







The Cats have seven lives

I should have been in Croke Park by 1.45 yesterday but couldn't resist watching a slice of this country's national game

It is neither hurling nor football but a game that existed long before organised sport; it is called politics

And of course I had to listen to the duel between my old colleague and my co-eval Charlie Haughey

Such confrontations usually yield little; the man in the dock — whether he be Charlie or some other leading politician - usually resorts to a language called Dailspeak.

Yesterday's little joust was rather different; The Boss came near to ordinary language - if only for a few scattered moments

And so it was worth my while to remain for the

confrontation.

I am rather amused when — as happens so often people suggest that Charlie's age is a factor that must be considered in the context of the leadership.

Perhaps the most salient aspect of his performance

yesterday was his mental agility.

He is far more articulate now than he was in his

alleged prime.

I am not a member of his fan club - and that's pure true - but I was forced to admire his mental agility yesterday

While all this was going on, Down and Tipperary

were producing a thriller in Croke Park.

My scouts told me all about it - and they raved about Down's full-forward, Veronica McRiabhaigh.

She was pointed out to me; she is a fair-haired sturdy little girl who looked supremely happy as she watched The Senior Final.

It was hardly surprising — she had been the especial heroine of a famous victory.

There was a high swirling wind in Croke Park yesterday — it blew towards The Railway end.

Establish lead

And it helped Down to establish a lead of 2-8 to 0-6

by half-time.

If you are familiar with camogie, you will know that such a lead is very hard to pull back, no matter how strong the wind.

Tipperary were undaunted, their right-side midfielder Triona Bonnar, sent over a stream of points

And Tipperary put in a late brace of goals and went ahead by 2-13 to 2-12. And then little Veronica struck her second goal —

and helped Down to a great double. The stadium was still seething with red and black

when I got there about a quarter past three. The afternoon was dark and cold but the good people from under The Mournes were on the proverbial roll.

Their presence swelled the crowd so much that it was the biggest I have ever seen at a camogie final.

As has happened on several occasions, the game on the undercard proved to be the better.

It was well known in camogie circles - not to mention triangles and rectangles - that Cork were determined to emerge from their desert.

For six long years they have watched Kilkenny monopolise The All-Ireland.

My scouts told me that they had been in training since October and had been under the tutelage of a professional coach since February

It was an impressive load of homework — and a few shrewd judges told me that Cork were certainties Cork had beaten Kilkenny in The League Final; the six times champions appeared to have been vulnerable; the omens were good.

And the girls in red-and-white began with a flourish. Irene O'Leary hit a flying point after 30 seconds.

Kilkenny had gone down to Cork twice already this season. That wasn't going to matter. The Cats wanted seven on the trot! TheCork girls got off to a flying start, scoring within the first half-minute. Then Angela Downey struck back for Kilkenny with the equaliser.

Kilkenny looked somewhat perplexed in midfield. Cork looked rudderless.

Still it was tit-for-tat in the early stages with both teams equal half-way through the first half.

Then Kilkenny took control, turning on the power and the pressure. Ann Downey, sister of the Kilkenny Captain, landed a neat side-line puck into Breda Holmes who promptly turned it in the Cork net.

Cork had barely time to recover the shock when Kilkenny scored a second goal. This time courtesy of Gillian Dillon. In the second half, Gillian was again the tormentor, putting Cork on the rack with a second goal. After that, there was no way back for the Leesiders.

The two teams hit an enormous number of wides between them. The wet, slippery conditions meant skill went out the window from early on , and both sides had to struggle to impress. Cork must later have rued the chances they missed - especially three fluffed opportunities at goal. However, their play was generally too halting and overexact to take advantage of some weak Kilkenny marking.


