

Cork camogie captain Rena Buckley admits her decision to step down from the ladies football panel was due to work and study commitments.

The dual star has played football for Cork since 2003 and camogie since 2004. Running a physiotherapy business as well as studying for a master's degree in UCD meant she struggled to play both codes this season. She didn't feature in the national league and announced at the weekend that her focus would be on camogie.

"I didn't have any extra time, I was caught with work and study and things like that. There wasn't enough time in the day," said Buckley.

"During the league, there's a lot of travel time for matches and I couldn't give up my weekends."

Inniscarra's county camogie title last year saw Buckley installed as skipper and that role also influenced her decision. "I'm the camogie captain and for this year, I'll stick with that as I haven't been with the footballers. I'll review it again at the end of the year.

"I can't speak highly enough of [Cork ladies football manager] Ephie Fitzgerald. I phoned him in early January and I told him that I was studying until May 12, and in fairness, he phoned me on May 12. I appreciated that and he gave me time again after that."

Buckley was speaking at the launch of the second year of New Ireland Assurance's sponsorship of the Cork team.

The Rebels begin their All-Ireland championship campaign against Tipperary on Saturday. They go into the game after losses in the league final to Kilkenny and the Munster final against Limerick. Buckley isn't concerned about a hangover, though.

"We got to the league final and we lost it, we got to the Munster final and we lost it, we realise that we're a little bit off the mark but we realise as well that we're not too far away. We'll just have to put in a little block of training, there's a new championship starting so that brings a freshness. Hopefully, we've learned from the last two competitions and we can bring that experience into the championship."

Camogie club is a growing success

After a few years sabbatical, Cobh GAA Club resurrected its camogie club in 2008.

Spurred on by the efforts of Mairéad Kearney and Colm Damery the club caters to the hurling needs of girls across Cobh.

From small acorns grows mighty oaks — the camogie club started out with 25 girls training each Saturday morning in year one with numbers growing to 45 in 2009 with the club entering teams in the U11 and U13 East Cork leagues, as well as the U12 County league.

Things progressed quickly in Cobh and in only its third year in existence the camogie club had managed to take in over 80 juvenile players with teams entered in competitions from U11 up to U14.

In 2010 a big effort was made to re-establish the adult camogie in Cobh. This has proven very successful and the junior team is now thriving.

There are many coaches involved with the training of various teams each week and thanks to all the hard work put in by coaches and administrators through the years the club has continued to grow and now has over 180 members. The club now has teams ranging from U8 all the way to Junior.

way to Junior.

The Cul Camp summer camp is run annually for all members. As with all GAA Clubs in the area the club's colours are hugely important to all involved and club gear can be bought from the club shop located in the top GAA pitch. The club appreciates the expense that parents are often put through to get everything so the club offers spare helmets to borrow for training when girls are starting off.

While success on the pitch is not the primary goal for the camogie club wins have been plentiful. In 2011 the U16 team captured the first trophy for the club when they won the County League. In the same year the U14 team got to the final of the Felle competition. In 2012 the same girls were unlucky not to take the minor Championship title losing by a narrow margin in the final.

The Junior team claimed the County League in 2012 to round off a fantastic year. In 2013 the club had a number of teams reaching finals including Minor Championship and U13 Imokilly. Many club girls were also involved in the school team finals last year including the St Mary's Sciath na Scoil final and the St Aloysius Munster and County finals

The junior team won the County Summer Cup in 2013 against old rivals Charleville 2-6 to 1-7 and backed it up in 2014 by retaining the Summer League Cup following a replay against Na Piarsaigh.

have players who'll shine for 10 minutes and then disappear.
When you want someone to pull a

game out of the fire, they aren't there, and I'm questioning why. Why would players sacrifice so

much and then take a casual approach into a game?

I don't feel that enough players are taking responsibility for their performances.

There's something missing, and it's from within:

The panel went back training earlier this year and there appeared to be a spring in their step in the first quarter of the year. But were we fooling

It's all well and good looking hungry against the likes of Dublin and Waterford — the challenge isn't there. But once the heat is turned up, the questions are asked.

I remember a few years ago giving out about the same thing. Cork turned it around. They can do it again.

I played for many years with Stephanie, Paula, and Liz and just one season with Jenny.

Paula and Liz were as tough as you'll get, primarily lining out as cornerbacks. Liz was a flyer.

They were part of the team when we won our first All-Ireland in 1992 after a gap of nine years.

66The standard of senior inter-county camogie is poor. PR endeavours to mask that but it's the truth.

Stephanie Dunlea arrived on the scene around 1995, if I recall correctly, and while she possibly lived at times in her sister Lynn's shadow, she was a really tremendous player in her own right.

As a player she was tough and intelligent.

We played together at club level with Glen Rovers and I have great memories of that time

I've watched Jenny O'Leary over the years, more so than sitting in the same dressing rooms as her, but how could you not admire her great speed and

When Jenny went on a run, jigging this way and that, the ball seemed to stick to her hurley.

Clubs set to get funds this week



THE first tranche of Government funding will be issued to Camogie and Ladies Gaelic Football Intercounty teams in the coming weeks which will reach €428,000 in total in 2017.

With the 2017 All-Ireland Championships in both codes set to get underway in the coming weeks, this funding will support intercounty Camogie and Ladies Football panels and players in their preparation throughout the year.

This follows the announcement, in June 2016, by the Minister of State for Tourism and Sport, Patrick O'Donovan TD, of a two-year agreement, commencing in 2017, to provide support for intercounty Camogie and Ladies Football players. This process will provide funding of €500,000 in 2017 and 2018, through Sport Ireland, to support programmes included in a joint proposal by the Camogie Association, the LGFA and the WGPA.

The funding has been released after a consultation process with all Camogie and Ladies Football intercounty teams. As part of this process, workshops were held which were attended by County Board Chairpersons/Secretaries, Team Managers and Player Representatives across both Camogie

and Ladies Football.

The financial support is aimed towards programmes such as injury prevention and medical cover; maximising player and team performance, and access to training facilities. The applications received for this funding focused on areas such as Physiotherapy, Strength and Conditioning, Nutritional Advice, Sports Psychology, Performance Analysis, Player Recovery, Medical Cover, Specialised Coaching and Gym/Training Facilities.

Speaking at the announcement, Minister for Transport, Tourism and Sport Shane Ross said: "This two-year programme of financial support shows the appreciation of the Government for what our Intercounty Ladies Football and Camogie players do for our sporting landscape. Every year, we see many thrilling and competitive contests."

Their sporting achievements and the enjoyment that they bring to so many throughout the length and breadth of Ireland deserves to be recognised. I wish all concerned with Ladies Football and Camogie continued success in the years ahead."

Patrick O'Donovan said: "I was delighted to announce this funding programme last June as I believe that it
shows the commitment of the Government to the promotion of our national
Gaelic Games. Ladies Football and Camogie form such an important part of
Irish culture and heritage and the
players and clubs are the cornerstone
of communities around the country.
The schemes which will be funded by
the grants allocated today are so important to the continued development
of women's sport in Ireland."

It's a large sum of money but there'll be a large pull on it too and when the cake is sliced I hope the net value of it per county is clearly felt.

In February, Thompson appeared on *The Late Late Show* special Valen-tine's Day edition, but in hindsight she would have preferred a different type

"If I could take it back, I probably would, and go on a separate night," she said. "The night itself was definitely the wrong situation for me.

The pressure is all on Cork. They're expected to win.

If they don't it would be a major shock. And if they do, unless it's by a strong margin, there won't be too much excitement. Cork will go into the game still minus the injured Julia White and Pamela Mackey. After league experimenting it is expected that Gemma O'Connor will return to her usual centre-back position with Ashling Thompson at midfield.

Eimear O'Sullivan and Chloe Sigerson will flank Gemma and will have the task of marking Tipperary's top forwards, Orla O'Dwyer and Nicole Walsh. Roisin Howard is another that'll take a lot of minding while Ereena Fryday is a runner and typically causes damage at midfield.

It is up front where Cork have

yet to consistently deliver. They should net a couple of goals against Tipperary. Not to do so would be a concern.

Fast delivery on a pitch that typically slows the pace of a game is crucial. Amy O'Connor and Katrina Mackey have tremendous speed. That is an asset that must be capitalised. To slow down play and allow them to be crowded will suit the home side.

If Tipperary play a sweeper, and there is every reason to believe they will, then Cork must start punishing teams for that and start striking long distance points at every opportunity.

Aoife Murray has been keeping goal for the Cork camogie team for 16 years, and has seen considerable improvements in the sport at large, but the lack of women actively supporting female teams and sports continues to be a bugbear Aoife Murray has been living and working in Dublin for the last six years and has recently begun working with former Dublin corner-back Niall Corcoran in one-to-one sessions at Kilmacud Crokes. Cork begin their Liberty Insurance All-Ireland campaign today away to Tipperary.

Q: Cork lost to Kilkenny in last year's All-Ireland final, and again in the 2017 league decider, so how disappointing was that?

A: A lot of people have said that we must have been disappointed with the league, but I actually left it in a very positive mood. I thought we had a great league. We had something like 70% possession in the final, but we didn't convert it. That's a positive. We had more scores than Kilkenny, but then the other side is how we didn't win it. So we have been working on that the last few weeks.

Q: Kilkenny play with lots of bodies behind the ball, how difficult is that to counter?

A: They started that last year. We set up a system like it a few years back and won two All-Irelands with it. There is a little bit of that gone into their game. It works for them and they have a huge amount of players behind the ball, but we went one-on-one against them to an extent and it is something people didn't expect from us. We conceded two goals and lost by three points. As much as it hurts a Cork person to say it, you've got to give them credit. They are deserving winners of everything they have won. We are all going to be chasing them.

Q: Is it a healthy rivalry or a bitter one?


A: When you have two teams in finals a rivalry will always develop and maybe it is through colleges as well. The likes of UCC playing Waterford IT and UL and so on, so often. It is a rivalry. For me it will never match the rivalry I came on to against Tipperary in 2002 and up to '06 or '07. They were the days when you could go hell for leather on the pitch and then for a drink afterwards. Whereas now everything is a bit more heightened with social media and everything.

Q: Losing the Munster final to Limerick recently wasn't what Cork needed either

A: It was probably a kick in the arse. We played for 10 out of 65 minutes and we could have won that game so there is a positive and a negative again. We played the most enjoyable 10 minutes I think I've had, but then we lost the workrate and that was the most disappointing thing about the league in that we didn't do the jersey or Cork justice. People in Cork will always be proud of a Cork team that gives 100 percent. You always want trophies, but true followers of sport in Cork just want you to have a bit of pride in the jersey. That's true for the hurlers, footballers and ladies footballers.

Q: is the strength and depth improving in camogie?

A: Yes, it has improved. When I started out it



was Cork and Tipp. Like, it was Cork and Tipp in the Munster final, in the league final and then in the All-Ireland final, That's completely changed. It's improved because we have guys with good experience who have come in and treated us like men. Sometimes, as a woman, it's not easy having guys shouting at you if you haven't been used to that. It has taken girls a few years to come around to it, but they have come in and treated us like men and we can see that now with all the managements: a lot of ex-hurlers and footballers coming in and seeing us as a stepping stone, as grounds for experience. Some of the guys who came in the year we lost the final to Wexford came in to us afterwards and said: 'that was some experience coming in to Croke Park'. The coverage is improving too and it will again when women start to support women in sport.

Q: That's huge, isn't it? There's no shortage of women at men's games

A: And they are the first ones who will call themselves feminists, you know? They will be all about running up Patrick's Hill burning your sports bra. They are the ones that will not come down to Páirc Ui Rinn or CIT to follow us or support us. I don't know what the answer is. Maybe it's still not cool enough. I know plenty of women who will take the Monday off if the hurlers or footballers are playing the Sunday so they can go to Rearden's. There would be a lot of money if you did have the answer, but we can see it in our open days. I used to be allergic to them, but now I love them because my nieces and nephews come. It's great to see not only young girls coming, but young boys.

Q: Cork and Limerick played the last two Munster finals at Kilmallock and Charleville but shouldn't it be straightforward to play more camogie games alongside men's fixtures at bigger venues and in front of bigger

A: We struggle to get pitches and I can't give out about Charleville, who very kindly gave us their grounds, but at the same time, two of our girls barely got in the gate that day. They were injured. A 17-year old wouldn't get questioned as much going into a pub. There was a bit of a hoo-ha about it and the girls just finally barged in. The following day Cork were playing Tipp in the hurling in Semple Stadium and we were playing in Charleville at three o'clock the day before.

Q: That situation is a no-brainer, surely?

A: It is a pity... I'm not a big fan of playing before men's games. Look, I play senior camogie, I'm 33 years of age and I would see myself
— because it is how I was brought up by my
parents — to be equal to all my brothers. And
to think I'm a senior player on a second-hand
bill to a hurling match... But maybe I have to
swallow my own principles to make sure camogie progresses as well.

Are Tipp ready to ignite?

nother weekend, another classic pairing of Munster teams. The All-Ireland camogie championship throws in today, with Tipp v Cork in The Ragg. Thurles as one of four opening fixtures. Maybe it's the goodnatured friction that arises from being a Tipp woman living in Cork, but this clash intrigues me. We can only hope for the same end-to-end thrills the hurlers provided three weeks ago in the first round of the Munster Championship, though we could do without the WhatsApp scandals and rampant rumours swirling around the Tipp camp afterwards

Lads and their drama, am I

Though they only edged out Tipp by a point in their league encounter back in March, Cork will be strong favourites going into the match. They'll be smarting from a surprise Munster final loss to Limerick last month and will want to set down a marker. However, there is a quiet confidence about Tipp this year; a sense the squad, which has been there or thereabouts for the last few years, is ready to step beyond being merely a team with potential. Though they took a while to find their form in the league, they finished strong, beating Dublin and Wexford.

Three of their key players are featured on a striking Tipp FM billboard that popped up in towns around the county. Captain Mary Ryan is a versatile, stylish hurler with a habit of catching ball over the heads of much taller opponents, while Cáit Devane and Nicole Walsh are clever, aggressive forwards with killer instincts in front of goal. All three will have to perform to their peak if Tipp are to edge out Cork

While there's a sense of something about to ignite in Tipp, there's also no getting away from the cold hard stats: Tipp's last All-Ireland win was in 2004 and Cork's was in 2015. Cork have a winning habit and an absolute belief in themselves, an invaluable trait in any team, one which Kilkenny have only recently begun to threaten. Cork's dominance is perhaps best symbolised by their captain, Inniscarra's Rena Buckley, who has won six camogie All-Irelands and four All Stars – not to speak of her football achievements. (The die-hard hurling fan in me was pleased that she chose camogie over

football this year, in what must have been an agonising if necessary decision.)
Orla Cotter, another important leader, will most likely be returning from injury



hungrier than ever, while Gemma O'Connor's commanding presence is augmented by her ability to effortlessly plant a ball over the bar from the halfway line.

If you're new to camogie and a little confused at how things work on this side of the pitch, let me break it down for you. Similar to the proposed revamp of the hurling championship, the camogie All-Ireland series is played on a round robin basis. There are two groups of five teams, and

you have to play everyone. In this year's draw, Clare, Dublin, Galway, Kilkenny and Waterford make up Group 1, while Group 2 consists of Cork, Offaly, Limerick, Tipperary and Wexford. The winners of each group go straight through to the semifinals, second and third in each group are seeded into the quarter-finals. (The provincial championships, it should be noted, are completely separate from the All-Ireland series.)

This year's championship looks to be wide open. While last year's finalists, Kilkenny and Cork, are obvious favourites to top their respective groups, all the other counties will fancy their chances at a quarter-final slot. Wexford, who won a threein-a-row not so long ago (2010 to 2012), are perhaps a power on the wane. However, the depth of

However, the depth of experience on their team can't be underestimated. Kate Kelly, now in her mid-30s, is a fine striker of the ball and one of my favourite players, even as she was breaking Tipp hearts with a winning injury-time free in last year's quarter-final. Galway, whose last title was in 2013, can never be written off either. They looked in flying form in 2016, bowing out in the year's best game: a semi-final thriller against Kilkenny that finished 3-15 to 1-19 after extra time.

Limerick will be buzzing

after winning their first ever senior provincial title last month, beating Cork 1-13 to 0-14 – although perhaps it'll be of concern to them that 11 points of their tally came from captain and lethal free-taker Niamh Mulcahy. They face another young up and coming team in Offaly at the Gaelic Grounds today, in what promises to be a cracker – although one would imagine that the bounce of the Munster title should propel

Limerick to victory. Champions Kilkenny, of course, remain the team to beat. Their fitness, decisiveness, and aggression on the ball in last year's championship gave them the necessary edge to overcome Cork and win an All-Ireland for the first time in 22 years; that they retained their league title this year shows mettle and a hunger to retain the O'Duffy Cup as well. Anne Dalton and Denise Gaule are team linchpins at centre back and half forward respectively. while their inspirational manager, Ann Downey, is the first bona-fide camogie star of the modern age to turn mentor. Kilkenny face Waterford today at Walsh Park and should win comfort-

All in all, it promises to be an exciting summer for camogie fans. It was announced in the last week that for the first time, all knockout games in the senior championship will be broadcast live on RTE. That's five matches: two quarter-finals (August 19) and a final (September 10). My delight at this news is tempered by frustration it took until 2017 to make camogie accessible to a ready-made, GAA-mad television audience.

Still, when you consider that last year was the first time that even the semi-finals were broadcast, it's rapid progress. Long may it continue to expand and thrive.

Going from strength to strength

Liam Egan's name probably wasn't the first on the lips when the Kilkenny camogie side's new backroom operation was being dubbed the 'Dream'Team' 18 months ago.

Most casual onlookers would have zeroed in on the fact that the legendary Ann Downey was assuming the role of senior manager. There was the presence of Conor Phelan and Paddy Mullally as selectors, too.

Beyond that, there was Ann's sister, Angela Downey Browne and Breda Holmes, one of the sport's greatest ever players, booked in to lend a hand. It was a 'who's who' management pool and one that promised better days after the surprise resignation of Fintan Deegan.

Egan had a good reputation around the county for a body of fitness and conditioning work that included a stint training the John Lockes club in Callan, but he has proven to be something of a key secret weapon in the county side's transformation from nearly-nevers to reigning All-Ireland and league champions.

Beaten in All-Ireland finals in '09, '13 and '14, the feeling was that they needed to abandon the 15-on-15 approach in favour of a more modern strategy. They didn't adopt a sweeper but they do lean heavily on back-tracking midfielders and half-forwards who can break on the counter at speed.

That's where Egan comes

"We had never actually done any sort of strength and conditioning ever before that," captain Anna Farrell explains. "It wasn't something we thought about. We did running, of course, and stuff like that in the winter but never the S&C that we did last year.

"He'd put you through your paces. We never realised the power you could get from some of the things that Liam was showing us. Simple drills that you can do yourself but just tweaking it a little hit to try and maximise your own power."

here from Kilkenny's point of view is that it normally takes a few years for the real benefits of these S&C programmes to kick in. And that's a frightening proposition for the rest of the country as they try to catch the Cat's tails.

Like all the best champions, they have evolved since their coronation.

Farrell talks about how the capture of last year's title lifted the weight of those earlier three decider defeats off the shoulders of those players who had featured in some or all of them. They feel looser now and the high of last September has heightened the appetite rather than sated it.

Three or four players have made the step up from last year's intermediate side that, like their senior counterparts, saw off Cork in the All-Ireland final and the standalone Leinster Championship has recently been added to their league title.

The bid to retain their All-Ireland crown begins in Waish

"The shackles are kind of off now because of the pressure in trying to win one the last few years," says Farrell. "Once we've won one, players are just more confident and enjoying themselves even more. It doesn't effect the standard at training. It probably drives you on even more."

Buckley: Cork are not too far away

THERE'S still a thesis to be submitted, but the 5am Friday starts are thankfully a thing of the past for Rena Buckley as she focuses on helping Cork win the All-Ireland camogie title.

The Rebels, beaten finalists against Kilkenny last year, begin their campaign with a clash against Tipperary this weekend. Buckley is the captain this year and that was a factor in her choosing camogie over football for this year.

Running a full-time physiotherapy practice in Macroom, as well as undertaking a Master's degree in the discipline in UCD – necessitating a weekly trip to Dublin on a Friday – wasn't compatible with playing both codes (see panel), though things have calmed slightly now.

Cork face four group games between now and July 22nd, against Tipp, Limerick, Wexford and Offaly. The top side in each of the two groups goes straight to the All-Ireland semifinals, with two quarter-final ties featuring second and third in the groups.

'When it's not knockout championship, it's definitely a different style of competition,' Ruekley says

'Obviously, you're going out to try to win every game, but there is a safety-net, if you lose a game you're not out.

'I suppose it allows you to develop a pattern of play, rhythm and habits, but obviously everyone else has that chance too so it's fair game for everyone.

'There's a bigger opportunity to learn as you go along in the championship in a league-type structure, definitely.'

As well as last year's All-Ireland final loss to Kilkenny, Cork fell to the Cats in this year's league decider and then were defeated against Limerick in the Munster final three weeks ago.

Buckley is naturally disappointed, but not despondent.

'We got to the league final and we lost it, we got to the Munster final and we lost it, we realise that we're a little bit off the mark but we realise as well that we're not too far away,' she says.


'There's a new championship starting so that brings a new freshness. Hopefully we've learned from the last two competitions and we can bring that experience into the championship.'

Cork's second group game in the All-Ireland is a repeat meeting with Limerick. The Munster win was the Shannonsiders' first title but Buckley isn't taking it for granted that the natural order will be restored when they clash again.

You can put whatever slant you want on it, really, she says.

'At the end of the day, it was a match in Charleville and Limerick beat us by two points.

'You can take any angle you want, if we lose to Limerick by two points in the All-Ireland we'll be very disappointed, the

same as we were after the Munster final.

'They were fully deserving of their win, we'll have to look at it and learn from it.'

When Inniscarra won the county senior championship in 2010, Buckley was honoured with the Cork captaincy the following year and the same is the case after last year's county title win.

There are a few extra duties to be carried out, but, as a member of the panel since 2004, seniority falls naturally on her shoulders.

'It's a great honour,' she says.
'There are extra little jobs,
making sure that everyone is
happy or that you liaise with the
management if anything needs
to be sorted.

'The duties aren't written down or anything but you would be conscious of them. Now, as you go into the more senior stage of your career, you're kind of fulfilling those roles anyway. 'I suppose that means there isn't a whole lot of difference from last year.'

2016 defeated All-Ireland finalists Cork have been drawn in Group 2 of this year's senior championship alongside Wexford, Tipperary, Offaly and Limerick.

Is it the achievements, the silverware, the numbers of members, the dedication of the players, the numbers of kids or the standard of volunteerism?

Well in short, it is all of the above and a whole pile more.

The success or lack of success of sporting clubs in Ireland tends to be judged on a host of different criteria however for the purposes of the next five minutes lets judge GAA clubs on their ability to produce stars.

Well if that is the only criteria used you would be hard pressed to look past Clough-duv Camogie Club as one of the most successful GAA clubs in the land.

Set up in the early 80s, Cloughduv Camogie Club can boast an unbelievable amount of national honours garnered by its greatest players.

Since the formation of the club there has been fantastic intercounty representation from the club at all grades with players representing Cork at U16, Minor, Junior, Intermediate and Senior

That list of players donning the red and white is a credit to both the players and the club that nurtured them and all are celebrated as if they were the

Of course there is a tenden-cy to look at the likes of Briege Corkery when looking for famous players however there are so many more stars of the game that have come through the Cloughduv Camogie

Corkery herself has man-aged a record breaking number of All Ireland Titles between football and camogie with the latter bagging her six All Ireland Medals.

This hugely impressive tally is the same number as what another legend of the game Joanne O'Callaghan, has managed to accumulate in her trophy cabinet.

Una O'Donoghue and Stephanie Dunlea are another pair with serious intercounty credentials as the pair have man-aged a total of 10 All Ireland

Titles between them. Dunlea's six medals make her one of the most decorated camogie players in the land while O'Donoghue could hardly be considered a flop with four All Ireland medals

under her pillow. Another Dunlea, Lynn, is also one with a quartet of All Irelands to her name after some sensational performances for the county.

Last but most certainly not least is Aoife Murray - with an unbelievable seven All Ireland medals. Murray is one of the greatest camogie goalkeepers of all time.

After retiring early the star came back to the cause in 2016. Legends all.

Cloghduv has been on top for

Family connections are at the heart of success for a club who have given a lot back to their county, writes DIARMUID **SHEEHAN**

MANY GAA clubs up and down the country can trace their roots back to the 1800s when the organisation first showed signs of life.

Other clubs sprung later from the in-terest that was generated locally by the games that people were seeing while many more clubs morphed out of strife between different factions within the early trend setters.

The origins of camogie clubs tends to have come from a different place. Many of the early men's clubs were

established as a symbol of Irish iden-tity while camogie and ladies football more often than not came about when Irish women stood up and said, if the men can do it, so can we.

Equality and fairness was and always is at the heart of the ladies games however this in no way should give the impression that the girls aren't every bit as competitive as the boys - they most certainly are.

One such club that sprung up ap-proximately 100 years after the organisation found its voice was Cloughduv

On the 17th December 1982, Cloughduv Camogie Club was founded in Barry Murphy's, Coolmakee

The trailblazers on the faithful day attendance were Mary O'Sullivan, Geraldine Lynch, Brigid O'Sullivan, Garry O'Sullivan, Catherine Ken-neally, Mary Cooper, Kay O'Leary, Denis O'Carroll, John Barry - Murphy and Ann Barry-Murphy.

It was straight into action for the fledgling club with a Junior "B" Cham-pionship fixture against Fr Mathew's on the cards and while the defeat was tough to take it wouldn't keep them down for long as the girls rallied and came back in

1963 stronger and more determined. That will to win manifested itself in a drive all the way to the county final where the new club saw off Fr O'Neills in some style.

That historic first county championship winning side included Brid Walsh, MaryWalsh, Patty Lynch, Geraldine Lynch, Bernie McSweeney, Brigid O'Sullivan, Catherine Ken-neally, Nora Shorten, Helen Dwyer, Colette O'Connell, Una Leahy, Ellen O'Reilly, Anne Murphy and Anne Barry Murphy.

Through the 1980s All Ireland minor glory visited Cloughduv Camogie Club Walsh in 1984 and 1985 brought home medals playing for their county.

Right up to the end of the decade, the ladies in green and gold did their parish and club proud.

Firstly competing for the Kelleher Trophy in the 1984 tournament they were defeated by Ballinora however in 1986 they defeated Aghabullogue and Ballincollig before facing Douglas in the semi-final of junior A.

This last four clash went to a replay before Cloughduv finally saw off their opponents to book their second county

final in their short existence.

Cloughduv went into this one full of confidence however on the day it would be a very well respected and talented Killeagh side that would take the spoils.

The club finished off the decade with a brilliant triumph over Castlemartyr in the Junior "A" County Final which was their most important success to that point.

This meant that the club would head into the 90s as a genuine force in Cork club camogie circles.

The club were subsequently upgraded to the ranks of intermediate where the opposition was always likely to be stiffer however that prospect didn't seem to trouble the Muskerry girls as they won through to the final of the 1991 County Championship

where they faced up to Brian Dillons.

This game, played in Ballincollig would see all the hard work for just short of a decade come to fruition as the Cloughduv girls put in a memorable and ultimately successful effort

The club also had success at the younger age group of U18 that year when the club's representatives deeated Newcestown by (8-7 to 1-2) in their County final.

It was an amazing year for the club as they looked to the future with great

enth isiasm. More wins followed but it was to be after the turn of the cent ary when the major successes would be achieved.

Cloughduy, now a senior club, battled hard and successfully in the senior championship to make their

The early days saw Leahy in 1983 and Walsh in 1984 and 85 taking all Ireland minor titles but in the naughties the main intercounty achievements were secured by local players.

Una O'Donoghue captained the Cork senior team that defeated Tipperary in the 2002 All-Ireland final becoming the third hurler from Kilmurry parish to captain Cork to an All Ireland victory after the famous Dinny Barry Murphy and Kate Dunlea).

Also included were club comrades, Stephanie Dunlea and Joanne O'Callaghan with Aoife Murray substitute

The Cork team that defeated Tipperary in the 2005 All-Ireland final also included a host of Cloughduv ladies with Stephanie Dunlea, Una O'Donoghue, Aoife Murray, one Breige Corkery and Joanne O'Callaghan all lining out for this historic side.

Cloughduy also had significant in-

fluence on the line in 05 with its very own John Cronin managing this victorious team.

Cronin's sterling contribution as manager of the victorious Cork team was recognised at the Carnegie All Star Awards function in City West Hotel, Dublin when Joe McDonagh former GAA president and Miriam O'Callaghan, President Cumann Camogaiochta na nGael presented him with the prestigious "Manager of the Year" award.

The contributions made by players and backroom teams at Cloughduy GAA club to Cork camogie as a whole cannot be understated.

Of course names like Corkery will always grab the headlines however as Briege herself would admit the club is far more than one player, one manager or even one team.

The ethos at Coughduv has always been one of inclusion.

The local girls still come to the club in their droves, looking to emulate the greats of the game while all the time making their own piece of history.

Cloughduv Camogie Club is a poster child for what can be achieved.

The club started small, developed. grew and achieved at its own pace and now can go toe to toe with the bigger sides in the county.

Cloughduy's members should be really proud of what they have achieved and with the same levels of commitment and drive over the next 20 years who knows just what can be achieved in the Green and Gold.

For now, success on the pitch is only as important as what the club can achieve off it so the quest to increase numbers is and will continue for many years to come.



Following an incredible 21 years of unbroken service to the Wexford serior team, the 37-year old has decided to call it a day. She won four All-Ireland Serior medals, and has been honoured with a remarkable nine All-Stars awards.

"It was a tough decision, or course," she said. "You think you will go on forever. You don't want it to end. I knew in my heart last year that could be it. All good things must come to an end.

"I told the girls on the team at the end of April that I wouldn't be coming back, so they have known for a while. I was hoping to slip away quietly, but this week people have been asking if I am going to play. Eve had huge support from the players, my club, my family and my husband."

Kate was instrumental in helping the Staneysiders bridge a 32-year gap to win the O'Duffy Cup in 2007. They went on to complete three-in-a-row between 2010-2012, Among the many honours won by the St fbar's/Shelmatiers club player during a gittering career, are three National Leagues titles. Kate, who is treasurer of the Women's Geelic Players Association, will continue to play club Carnogle.

Wexford begin their 2017 Liberty Insurance All-Ireland Senior Championship campaign with a home fixture against Offally on Saturday June 24th.

The Kilkenny side used home advantage to progress past the group stage, before beating Monaleen and Na Fianna in the knockout stages.

They led Co Clare outfit Six-milebridge 0-6 to 0-1 at halftime, before three goals sealed the deal in a 3-11 to 0-1 victory at Nowlan Park.

A good weekend for Kilkenny, as James Stephens joined the winners in 22 competitions in hurling and 14 competitions in camogie, winning the Divi-sion 1 shield, Dicksboro also wrapped up a memotable weekend, winning the Division 2 camogie crown.

The competition, which sees U14 teams from around the country compete for national titles, was this year held across Wexford, Carlow, and Kilkenny, with over 8,000 players taking part.

In the camogie section,

Cork side Sarsfields won the Division 1 Cup title for the second consecutive year in a groundbreaking achievement by the girls in blue.

Wins against St Martin's, Glynn-Barntown, and Annacarty saw Sars once again reach the knockout stages, beating Lucan Sarsfields in the quarter-finals before winning out in a tough encounter against Clare's Scariff in the penultimate stage, 2-6 to 2-

Co Tipperary's Knockavilla awaited the reigning champions in the final, but with the wind the side captained by Saoirse Desmond took control early, Edie Twomey's two goals in the opening period handing Sars a handsome 2-9 to 0-1 lead at the break. With eight of the panel re-

turning from last year's win, the Glanmire side showed plenty of experience, with Olivia McAllen (0-6), Cliona Lynch (0-3, 2f), Katelyn Sheehan (0-3) and Orlaith Mullans (0-1) adding to Twomey's two goals for a 2-13 to 1-2 victory.

rish female sports stars have a nice line in firstname recognition. Sonia, of course, is the original and most iconic. Since then we've had other heroines: Katie, Derval, Stephanie, and Annalise. Women's Gaelic games, however, seems to be lacking in mononymous per-

Except for Briege. Everybody knows Briege.

Along with teammate and fellow dual star Rena Buckley, Briege Corkery is the most decorated GAA player of all time. She has 17 senior All-Ireland medals (11 in football, six in camogie) and between the two codes, she's amassed 16 All Stars. However, she hasn't featured for either the camogie players or the footballers so far this year. Cork football manager Ephie Fitzgerald recently confirmed that it's unlikely Corkery will play inter-county football this season; it remains to be seen if, like Buckley, she'll commit to the camogie for 2017.

Today, Cork play Limerick in the second round of the camogie championship, a chance to avenge their defeat in the Munster camogie final five weeks ago. Will Corkery make an appearance? Will management keep her in reserve until the latter stages of the championship, then spring her? Or will Cork's fixtures keep rolling by over the weeks and months, sans Briege?

If the latter is the case, neither the camogie or ladies football championships will be the same without her. She's a phenomenal player, one that any team would love to have in their arsenal. Her athleticism, bravery, and sheer work-rate are hard to match. She can play pretty much anywhere, as likely to block a shot in the full back line as to pop up un-expectedly for a goal herself. She travels. She regularly pulls off the paradoxical feat of showing up all over the field without ever being caught out

> I encountered her on the pitch a few times in the early 2000s, playing on various underage intercounty teams. Even then, her drive, focus, and confidence on the ball were so total that I assumed she



was a couple of years older and wiser than me; it turns out she's younger by a couple of months.

Corkery has a reputation for being both a joker and a maverick, a formidable athlete who does things her own way - even against conventional wisdom. A farmer in her day job, she thinks no-thing of milking 400 cows the morning of a match. Mary White's excellent 2015 book Relentless recounts a moment early on in Eamonn Ryan's tenure as football manager where he told the players that while he wasn't going to impose a drinking ban, he expected them to mind themselves. According to legend, Briege Corkery stood up and said: "I have a pint bottle before every match and I intend on still having it." To Ryan's credit, he didn't sanction her. If Corkery could perform so consistently with the pint bottle as part of her routine, why change it?

A testament to her towering influence: In 2010, the only year in recent memory that the Cork ladies football team failed to capture the All-Ireland title, Corkery was taking a year out, travelling in New Zealand. Dublin won that year, beating Tyrone in the final. When Cork look back on their stunning string of titles since 2005, they must wonder if that blip could have been averted by Corkery's pres-

ence. Her ability to turn a game on its head is exceptional. One of my favourite ever goals in camogie is Cork-ery's in the 2015 All-Ireland final against Galway. Ten minutes from the end, she cleanly robbed the ball 40 yards from the Galway goal and arrowed into the space that opened up in front of her, before finishing low into the corner of the net. It was a goal remarkable for both its opportunism and composure, and it sealed the win for Cork

here's a bite to Corkery too, a certain flintiness that keeps her motivated. When the influential Eamonn Ryan stepped down as football manager in 2016, there was talk about whether the team would be able to maintain its incredible consistency without him. Legendary Mayo footballer Cora Staunton said in an interview that the change would be "unsettling for Cork for the first while but with the calibre of player they have and a winning mentality, you could never write them off"

To me, Staunton's comments seemed fairly measured and respectful, but Corkery saved this quote on her phone and made sure all her teammates knew about their perceived vulnerability in other camps. It might be hard for most people to see how someone could draw fiery motivation from this nuanced statement - but then, most people don't have 17 All-Ireland medals.

No one could blame Corkery for taking a step back at this stage - she's been going with both inter-county teams since 2004, in a two-track career that must amount to hundreds of games at the top level. There's a lot of miles on the clock, not to mention her club duties with Cloughduv in camogie and St Val's in foot-

On top of all this, she's had to advocate for player welfare. particularly in the case of dual stars. For years, herself, Buckley, Meabh Cahalane, and others have had to grapple with fixture clashes between the camogie and football championships.

The situation came to a head on a Sunday in July 2015, when they were caught between a camogie fixture at 2pm at Páirc Úí Rinn, and a Munster football final at 6pm in Mallow. "All we want is a day between the two games, Corkery said at the time. This simple request couldn't be accommodated. The two games went ahead, with Cork uncharacteristically but understandably flat in the football; they lost by nine points to

That such an unfair situation would ever happen to a male dual star is unthinkable; the GAA would never allow it. Women's Gaelic games, however, are governed by a complicated system of associations - the Munster championship is overseen by the Munster Ladies Gaelic Football Association, which is separate from the Ladies Gaelic Football Association, which in turn is separate from the Camogie Association. If ever there was an argument to amalgamate the women's associations under one umbrella, the wellbeing of players like Briege Corkery is it.

Camogie action

As a result of their performance in the U14A Cork Camogie Feile, Enniskeane, UI4 Camogie Club qualified to represent Cork in the regional Féile competition played in Mallow on Saturday last. This was a tremendous honour for the girls and they all represented their club and county with distinction.

This victory ensured they qualified for the semi-final and so their defeat by Sarsfields in the second game in the group (3-5 to 3-2) was of little conse-

Unfortunately for Enniskeane, a fortuitous goal by Kilkeshin-Bodyke of Clare proved to be the pivotal score in the semi-final with the Clare girls winning on a score of 2-2 to 1-3 in a very high-quality match.

Though disappointed, the girls should be extremely proud, as the club is, of their efforts and they were wished well in their remaining county league and championship matches this season.

Kate Kelly announced her retirement from senior intercounty camogie last week after a career that spanned 20 years. It yielded four All-Irelands and 27 goals and 315 points from 88 Championship appearances. The former Player of the Year opened up on some of the highs and lows of those magnificent two decades.

Parting from her great love

"Someone told me when the time is right to give up you'll know, and that's what I've gone on. It never crossed my mind this winter but you do take it year by year. There's no point saying I'm going to be there for the next 10 years. I'm not!" Kate Kelly, 2015

This is a woman who has wrapped a broken finger in lollipop sticks to play, who even tried to go out in a 7s match with her AC joint in ribbons. She couldn't strike the ball so it was a full-forward, catch-and-handpass job.

She will be at Innovate Wexford Park this afternoon as the Yellowbellies get their Liberty Insurance All-Ireland Camogie Championship under way against Offaly but for the first time since joining up 21 years ago, her role will be as a supporter, to her former teammates and brother John, who is joint manager.

Kelly has been throwing on a Wexford jersey every year since an underage blitz in 1991. Clubmate Emma Carroll sat with her on the bus. Sitting behind them were Claire O'Connor and Michelle O'Leary. Aine Codd was there too. They graduated to become fixtures and leaders on the senior squad, with the next batch of kids calling them The Zimmers.

calling them The Zimmers.

One by one, they all stepped away but Kelly was as constant as oxygen. As reliable too. An All Star in the scheme's inaugural season in 2004. Player of the Year three seasons later. Last November, a campaign that saw her finish top scorer with 5-49 was rewarded with a recordequalling ninth All Star.

She pointed a stunning winner to deny Tipperary in the All-Ireland quarter-final but the semi-final ended in defeat, after extra-time, to Cork. Kelly landed a free from distance early in the supplementary period to give Wexford the lead. It was to be her last ever score of the 27-315 she would accumulate in 88 championship appearances.

"I didn't feel my game changed a whole lot," she says, sitting in the canteen at Waterford IT where she works as IT and card services manager. "More than anything it was the recovery. I found that a bit harder. And last year, motivation to go training. When the games were on, I loved it as much as 10 years ago.

"You think about it a lot more too when you're older. You think about whether it might be your last game. You get a little more emotional, a little more worked up about it. You have to learn to manage your nerves a bit more.

"In saying that, I always enjoyed it so once you get out on the pitch, and you're over that first few minutes, as (former manager) JJ (Doyle) used always say, 'Express yourself'. When you're out there and into it, I don't think you think of anything else."

It is telling that she had tried to slip away quietly. Kelly informed the players a month ago and wanted to leave it at that but she underestimated her status. The queries were coming thick and fast and so a statement was issued. What happened next took her completely by surprise.

"I was very overwhelmed by the reaction, which was quite touching, to be honest. I didn't expect it by any manner or means. It was mixed emotions, people congratulating you and also commiserating. They don't know really what to say and I didn't know what they should say either!"

didn't know what they should say either!"

She had never been one for taking stock and seems to have been completely surprised that anyone would care that she was calling it a day.

"Maybe in five or 10 years' time we'll sit back and realise what we achieved when we did but at the minute it just feels part of what we're doing, trying to achieve again," she said in an interview two years ago. Now?

"Maybe I just didn't like to get carried away with myself. I just played. If you get carried away with what people are thinking or saying about you, that you're this and that, it only adds more pressure if you're going out the next day to live up to something. So it's easier maybe to block it out."

In truth, she is being asked to explain something she never thought about. It was simple.

She just played.

eggie Doyle won All-Irelands with Wexford alongside her sister Mary in 1968 and 1969. Seán Kelly was likeminded in that he lived for Gaelic games. They fell in love, married, settled down in

Screen and had nine children. Kate recalls a simple but idyllic lifestyle Kate Kelly in action for Wexford. Kelly's family fostered her love of GAA. 'Growing up, wherever we went... if we went to the beach, we brought our hurls'



around the farm and they all played. Even now, there is only one of the lads that doesn't tog out anymore. The eldest, Denis, is 42 ("he won't give up!") and coming off a brilliant year with the juniors. The youngest, Joe, is 27 now and scored 2-7 when the Shels won their first county senior championship in 2014. Mag played with Wexford too.

"My dad was fanatical and my mother won two All-Irelands with Wexford. And

"My dad was fanatical and my mother won two All-Irelands with Wexford. And we always played in the yard. There was the gate and a pillar across where we made two goals. We were just constantly going to matches. If we couldn't all fit in my father's car the rest went with my aunt, who lived down the road and had two sons, so that was packed too.

"Growing up, wherever we went... if we went to the beach, we brought our hurls. Even if you went walking across the field, you always brought your hurley with you — you might need it to knock down some-

— you might need it to knock down something to walk through!

"This time of year, silage season, when all the lads would be in and after they got their dinner, we'd go out for a big puckaround in the yard. It used to be crazy,"

Peggie has filled every role in administration between county board and club committee, and is currently secretary of the GAA club. She has also served as selector and manager at various levels and was involved in the establishment of the camo-

"She hurled with the likes of Oylegate and married into the Shels and has been involved in every way. I'd say she's done every role. She was chair for years, over us as a team and my father was over us. That was their hobby. That was what they lived for. I don't ever remember doing anything else. We never did any other hobbies.

Maybe there were too much of us and it

was easier to bring us to the hurling field!"
When she got the call-up to the senior
panel, Wexford were coming off three AllIreland final losses in the previous five
seasons and the team was breaking up.
Meanwhile, that same year, the hurlers
had everyone dancing on the crossroads.

"We used to go to all the games into Wexford Park or Croke Park. And when you got old enough to travel yourself you were working out whether to go on the train with friends. We're having the banter about it now that the buzz is back around the hurlers. We may get the old crew back together. Four or five in one car, four or five in the next car. There's a whole generation in Wexford that's missed that.

"I remember '96 with my aunt in the car after the All-Ireland, out through the sunroof the whole way home. It was crazy! You look at my niece and nephews. They haven't seen that. But at least they got it on the women's side."

It took a while. Kelly and her compadres were coming off winning an All-Ireland U16 title in 1995 and with not much experience left around them, endured some awful days. The 43-point hammering (7-24 to 0-2) at the hands of Cork in Oylegate on July 3, 1999 was a low point but it didn't sour them.

"You don't think about it. You were just delighted to be playing with Wexford. Maybe I had an optimistic outlook and thought we were gonna win every time. I was never fazed by it. I do remember one year, my mother coming home saying they were thinking of pulling out the senior county team and just having a junior and she went crazy, saying there were people wanting to be over the team and players wanting to play. I suppose there was a few years that it wavered a bit. I don't know what it was. Maybe it was the '95 team, so much of my clubmates there as well. Maybe we just enjoyed the banter of it. It was good craic.

"We went off to Dundalk or Derry one year to play and were staying overnight. We went to the cinema and someone said "The bus is on fire". We didn't believe it but when we ran out the bus was on fire! Some great memories. We were hanging out with our best friends, having some laugh."

great memories. We were hanging out with our best friends, having some laugh."

In 2000, another Wexford team reached an All-Ireland U16 decider and as Mary Leacy and co emerged, so did hope. Leacy was joined later on by her younger sister Una, who would become Kelly's regular bus buddy. It was fitting, given that the Leacys' mother Margaret was a teammate of the Doyle siblings in the late '60s.

They got to a league final in 2004 and another three years later. Cork beat them by a point second time around but rivalries were resumed shortly after in the championship and Kelly hit six points as Wexford prevailed by 10 in Ballincollig. When the teams met again four months later, in the All-Ireland final at Croke Park, Una Leacy plundered two goals and Kelly three points to cement the O'Duffy Cup's residence in the Model County for the first time since 1975.

"The semi-final day to me was a great day. Just getting to the final. And the four weeks that came after that... it was like we were floating around on air. I don't think it fazed any of us. And when you look back on our performance against Cork, everyone went out and tore into it, hooked and blocked. They were going for three-in-row and it was our first day in Croke Park.

"All the supporters came out onto the pitch... I remember trying to make my way up through the crowd and I was nearly getting knocked out, people turning around saying 'Who's this one pushing?' and then seeing it was me. It was brilliant."

They were completely taken aback by

the homecoming.

"My mother kept saying to me 'You know Kate, I don't think you realise this is going to be big when you get to Wexford' and I was 'What are ya on about? There'll probably be about 10 people.

"We came into Wexford and they made

"We came into Wexford and they made us get off the bus and walk over the border. The TV cameras were there. I was like 'Yeah, yeah. Done. Whatever.' So we got into Gorey, we went under the bridge and around the corner and there were people on the sides. We were going mad on the bus saying 'For God's sake, there's a few people after coming out, would you not let us off the bus to get out to them?"

"We went around the corner and the whole street was packed. We couldn't believe it."

They were unable to get over the line the next couple of years and we wondered if they were one-hit wonders.

"I think after 32 years, it was our dream come true. I remember still bouncing around on cloud nine the following April or May. We went on our team holiday in





farch and when we came back, people were still wanting us to bring the cup to laces. Maybe unbeknownst to ourselves were still living in the past."

They were utterly dominant from 2010 2012, completing a rare three-in-a-row. "There were so many leaders that could tep up to the mark. You weren't relying n one person. It could have been anyone. nd winning builds confidence, It just is a ifferent mentality. You can understand hy Kilkenny (hurlers) kept winning. You on't see yourself being beaten.

Others are sated by one though

"I think we were so disappointed in 2008 and 2009 that we weren't going to get caught again after 2010. Everyone was as focused when they went back. In 2007, it was everything that it should have been. It was magical but it was 32 years built into celebrating. It wasn't that we didn't try the years after, maybe we were trying too hard. But we were lucky we got the opportunity again in 2010."

Kelly was a gifted footballer too, every bit as good as with a hurley in her hand. She won two All-Irelands with the Shels and played in another with Wexford just Retiring is tough for Kate Kelly. etirement didn't come easy, not least be-cause she doesn't feel diminished physi-cally or in terms of ability. Her last cam-paign confirmed as much. She has just turned 37 though and got married two years ago to Shels man, Chris Gordon.

"I just felt it was time to call it a day ... wanting to do other things, give it a year or two with the club, seeing how they go through the process. Be more relaxed about it, not be so focused on nutrition and fitness. And I suppose maybe working in Waterford didn't help. Maybe if I was at home and had a little bit extra time in the evenings... it was a culmination of a few things but I probably just felt it was time.

So much has changed in 21 years, when mobiles were homes and there was no social media. Training meant laps and backs and forwards. Now it's gym work, DEXA scans, nutrition, recovery. She embraced it all — anything to get better — but it takes over your life. "I never really saw it like that. Maybe I wanted to see what was on the other side before I had family.

Kelly has 14 nephews and nieces. More grandchildren for Seán and Peggie would be nice, "I'd like to have kids. We'll see what happens.

She is treasurer of the WGPA and believes giant strides are being made in terms of the treatment of players and the profile of camogie and ladies football. Meanwhile, she coaches the club U18s and will always be involved. She has known nothing else. What will she miss?

PACY Cork attacker Array O'Connor has conceded that Kükenny hold the whip hand in Camogle right now, after winning the last two League titles and holding the position of firm favourities to retain their Liberty Insurance All-Ireland Senior crown also.

Having known pretty much nothing only success since joining the Cork Senior squad just after her Leaving Cert, and enjoyed her fair share of it before that too in both Camogle and soccer. O'Connor has had a bit of adjusting to do.

The Rebels went into last year's All-ireland Final with the carrot of securing a third consecutive Championship dangling but they were completely outperformed by their traditional rivals.

They returned this year emboldened, determined to be better and skated through the group stages and Semi-Final of the League.

Once more however, they were unable to escape the Klikenny shackles in a decider, conceding a goal before they knew the match had even begun and never really landing a blow.

Even when they got things right they were unable to make an imprint. Such as when O'Connor cut back onto her left in the second half and had a shot that was destined for the net sensationally blocked by Catherine Foley. It was that sort of day, it's been that sort of time.

Losing the Munister Final to today's opponents Limerick did little to improve the mood but a win over last year's quarter-finalists. Tipperary in the opening round of the All-Ireland Championship got the show back on the road.

"I suppose the League Final didn't go our way really" agrees O'Connor.

"Klikenny are outstanding to be quite honest with you. They've huge strength in depth at the moment. They've a huge panel and their second team would probably be as good as our first team. They're good all, over the pitch and can bring on any one of their panel to do a job for them, which is a huge bonus for them. At the moment, I can't see anyone beating them."

It seems a strange admission, but O'Connor puts it down to realism. That is not to be mistaken with defeatism however. That is not her way.

Having played in a European Championships semi-final at U19 level with the Republic of Ireland – she is on a soccer scholarship at UCC, where she studies pharmacy – and gamered two Ali-helands already despite just turning 21, the St. Vincent's clubwoman has high standards.

Yet she goes as far as to place Galway alongside Kilkenny on the top pedestal, both above Cork right now. The target, she says, is to reach the knockout stages and take it from there.

She may be young but one suspects that O'Connor is not lacking in cuteness.

"Galway seem to be going under the radar too with not many people talking about them. They're a superteam and just as good as Kilkerny if you ask me. Those two are definitely the top two in the country at the morners.

Murray content with Cork's reversal of fortune

Manager Paudie Murray sounded an understandably positive note after Cork turned around their Munster final defeat to Limerick in definitive fashion with a 1-27 to 0-11 victory in their Liberty Insurance All-Ireland Senior Camogie Championship Group 2 clash at Páirc Ui Rinn.

Murray had been critical after his charges had failed to reach expected levels both in the provincial decider and the preceding National League final that they lost to Kilkenny.

The St Finbarr's clubman instructed captain Rena Buckley to play with the wind in the first half when she won the toss, having experienced facing the elements in the initial period in their opening round win over Tipperary.

They cut loose and led by 0-17 to 0-5 at the interval, with Amy O'Connor's pace causing a lot of problems, while Orla Cotter was unerring from placed balls and Katrina Mackey and Orla Cronin were also dangerous.

"It was job done, another game out of the way," was Murray's summation on RedFM. "The group stage is really about getting results and we've two from two. Wexford next week and if we win that, I think it means we're qualified and that's key.

"You look at the Munster final and first of all you look at the referee that day. I think he gave over 40 frees, a stoppage every 38 seconds. They got 1-13, 11 of that from frees and that tells its own story. Today was a different day, the ball was moved a lot quicker and I thought at times we played some very good hurling.

"We played heads-up hurling all over the pitch. We know that Limerick really won't be one of the superpowers. There will be stiffer tests ahead but at the end of the day, it was a good performance and I'm happy with it. "We have been training very well. I suppose I get frustrated sometimes that we're not delivering on the pitch on match day but

we're starting to put things together now. We're that bit behind Kilkenny the whole time so it's important we use all these games to get better."

Limerick were unable to make any inroads with the wind behind them and again, were overly reliant on Niamh Mulcahy, who ended with

seven points. In contrast, Cork had an impressive spread of scorers as Cotter finished with 0-11 while Mackey, who passed a late fitness test, booted home a late goal to register 1-5. O'Connor and Cronin added four each on a very satisfying day for the Leesiders.

In the group's other game,

Wexford overcame the challenge of Offaly by 1-19 to 0-15. Kate Kelly brought a 21-season run of Championship camogie to an end when announcing her retirement last week but the Model County outfit showed that they still have plenty of firepower against a team that displayed lots of character in the second half and will still hold aspirations of reaching the last six.

Chloe Foxe, Una Leacy, Linda Bolger, and Joanne Dillon were much too hot to handle for the visitors, and Foxe had 1-2 inside four minutes to help Wexford establish a six-point lead.

It was 1-12 to 0-4 at the break but Offaly were much improved in the second half as Arlene Watkins, Orlagh Kirwan, and Ann Marie Guinan cut the deficit but Leacy tagged on four points to bring her tally to seven and Dillon finished with four, while Mary Leacy and Ciara Storey excelled in defence to hold off the charging Faithful girls.

Dressing rooms and a club house are being built and have an estimated opening date of mid-July.

Camogie has been played in Cork since 1905 and 65 clubs are now registered in the

They have membership of in excess of 10,000 and for Cork Camogie to have a home of its own is a huge achievement, and testament to the huge voluntary efforts of camogie personnel down through the years.

Since the facility opened, teams have been changing in Portakabins, and while they are invaluable, they are not suitable for the needs of the growing numbers of players

using the facility.

At the moment, the board have to allow three hours between games to ensure teams can get changed and ready.

Croke Park won't allow Senior National League games to be played at the best playing surface in Ireland, because the facilities don't meet their requirements.

The building of dressing rooms will alleviate this problem and will ensure more high-profile games can be played on what is a superb pitch.

The board's golf classic, next Friday, is at Muskerry Golf Club, Cork, and is an 18hole three-person team event open to males and females or mixed stableford. There is a separate competition for teams with golfers without official handicaps - (H/Cap limited to gents = 18, ladies =

Tee times are available from 8am to 5pm, excluding 12,30pm to 1,30pm, which is reserved for members. The cost per team is €200 and this will include a meal.

The board are also seeking sponsorship for tee boxes, at €50, so, if individuals or companies cannot enter a team, they may consider helping the board by sponsoring a tee.



Murray: Cork need to match the top two

THERE'S a lot done but more to do - that's the message from Cork camogie manager Paudie Murray after the county's lat-

The Rebels laid down a serious marker in the Liberty Insurance Senior Camogie Championship at Páirc Uí Rinn last Saturday afternoon when they trounced Wexford by 18 points in this Group 2 game.

This was Cork's third groupstage win in a row, following good results against Tipperary and Limerick, and it pushed them to within touching distance of the semi-finals.

Murray's happy with what he has seen so far as last year's defeated All-Ireland finalists gear up for a championship assault again this year but he stresses that Cork have some way to go to compete with Kilkenny and Galway.

'We measure ourselves against the top two - that's the standard that we need to compare ourselves against,' Murray told The Southern Star.

'We did a lot of good things against Wexford and we've

looked at the video of the game and examined the stats we've had back and they've shown that there is a lot of stuff there that we need to improve on to be at the level of Kilkenny and

'That's key this season - the need to get to their level.

'Our ball retention in the second half was poor, our distribution to the forward line could have been a lot better than it was, our work-rate wasn't as good as it could have been so there are areas that will con-

'We have to measure ourselves against the top two. Granted we are doing a lot of good things, there are positives, however we still have a fair bit to go. What we are playing at the moment will not beat the

top two."

We have tightened up but you also have to take into account the opposition so far,' Murray pointed out.

'Limerick depend an awful lot

on Niamh Mulcahy and Wexford depend a lot on Una Leacy so when you come up against Kilkenny and all the forward talent they have then you're going to be in a lot harder match. It's the same when you go in against Galway who are strong

'Certainly, for 20 to 25 minutes against Wexford, our intensity, our work-rate, our movement of the ball was as good as anything - but we need to do that for 60 minutes to compete with the bigger two.

in attack.

'We are starting to put it together, whether we can put it together enough to beat the top two remains to be seen.

'We have roughly four weeks before a semi-final, likely to be against either Kilkenny or Galway, so we have that time to get it together."

Cork are well in control of Group 2 and face their last game away to Offaly on July 15th. Only a massive turnaround will deny the Rebels top spot as they have a scoring difference of +46 compared to Offaly (-6) and Wexford (-11) who are the only teams that can oust

them from top spot. The top team in both groups go into the semi-finals, while the second and third place teams meet in quarter-finals. The likelihood is that Cork will encounter the loser of this weekend's Group 1 heavyweight tie between champions Kilkenny and Galway in the last four - that's what Murray is priming his team for, the real test to see where Cork stand

this season.



A month rarely goes by that the pair on't spend a weekend in Claire's native ashel. Of the couple, it will be Damien who will watch on as if he were pucking every ball. "I would always have the real calm ap-proach," smiles Claire. "Damien would get excited watching American football. And the elbows — oh, I'll be black and blue from him constantly elbowing me during

Damien doesn't argue — "I'm the worst spectator of a hurling match ever. I think I am hurling the match and I'd be shoving and pushing into Claire the whole way

bered for most. How he wrestled away Maloney, a marker to whom he was giving several inches and pounds. And that strike past Cummins, the closest thing to a dropshot without being one.

"It's something people remind me about every day. If I'm selling a car or with people from Tipperary they often bring up the goal I scored against Hugh Maloney. I remember very well. A friend of mine might send me a YouTube clip of it to me. I got a ball from Ger Farragher and the next thing I slipped. The slip ended up being an advantage. I remember swinging and the ball being so low to the ground that it was like a golf stroke. It was a goal we badly

needed. Ger Farragher then put a ball over the bar from a free in his own half-back line and we were on our way." Of the five times Hayes faced Tipperary in championship it was the only time he came away victorious. Of course, it meant

more to him than others. In Portumna, they are the Night's Watch, the bridge over the Shannon The Wall. Not that he wasn't adverse to crossing it from time to time. His good buddy John Muldoon, future Connacht captain, and himself studied and played rugby in Nenagh where Hayes

was a nifty scrum-half.
"We were friendly with a family in Nenagh, the Burkes. They originated from Portumna and I was playing rugby in the school with John and Ivan Muldoon and Ivan is now doing the coaching over in Nenagh. I went over there and won an U18 All-Ireland medal in '99 and I scored two tries in the final. I'd say that was nearly my last game of rugby because I was hurling and John started to concentrate on

rugby."
There was little rivalry with Lorrha, eight kilometres down the N65. "We didn't have much of one with them. Growing up, all we knew was Ken Hogan. Now it's 'the Bonner' (Patrick Maher). Bonner is only living a couple of miles from us and I never see him. Even though I'd be a big fan of his, and his brother has a business beside Portumna, we have no dealings

But Portumna's proximity with Tipperary was a dig the likes of their bitter rivals Loughrea liked to throw at them.

"Tipperary men" was the insult. "Sometimes it was said. It was never said to me directly but one lad seemingly said to one of ours one time, 'Ye are only a shower of Tipperary lads!' My friend said back to him, 'We're from Portumna, like'. It was said during a match but it wasn't said often.

Nobody could appreciate the rivalry with Tipperary more than Portumna folk like Hayes. Defeats to them obviously lingered longer than others, even those in the league. "We also played them in a (2008) league final in the Gaelic Grounds. That was a game we should have won. The one thing I always remember is that they allowed you to hurl. Now, they would be hurling too but you could do it against

"I love the way Tipp hurl when they hurl at full-pelt. I love the way their forwards move and I love the intelligence of the McGraths, Pádraic Maher at the back, Bubbles and Seamie Callanan. But that's only when they're hurling at full-flight. Like all teams, they can be terrible. But it's like watching Dublin and Kerry footballers, when they're at their best anybody would sit down and watch them."

His last appearance in a Galway Jersey came as a substitute in the 2014 qualifier when Tipperary outscored them 2-10 to 0-1 in the final 20 minutes. Brought on in the closing stages, he knew it was the end for him, telling his marker Michael Cahill as much as they swapped jerseys at the final whistle, his as dry as it came out of the

I gave everything for Galway, put my life on hold... if I could do it all over again I would do exactly the same

A Celtic Cross never adorned his man-telpiece but he can live with that knowing what he gave in his attempt to win one. Still, his memory has a way of toying with him. "I played in four finals and we definitely should have won two of them. It's disappointing because I trained so hard and put in so much effort. I'm honoured to have won three All-Stars but it would have finished everything to have won an All-Ireland medal and put it up there with my

All-Ireland clubs.
"I gave everything for Galway, put my life on hold. I used to train on Christmas morning, swim inside in the Shannon Oaks Hotel and if I could do it all over again I would do exactly the same. I had great times and great memories. I gave Galway as much as I gave Portumna. No-body can ever say I only hurled well for Portumna or Galway or that I was only a club or a county man. I gave it absolutely everything. If Galway do it, I'll be delight ed. I would love to have won one but it doesn't define you as a man or anything. went on three All-Stars trips, Claire and went over to San Fran one year and had a brilliant time. We had the All-Stars event The Friday night, I won my award and on the Saturday Claire won hers, literally a free weekend in CityWest. We have great

memories Would I change any of that? Not one

Camogie finally goes prime time

or the first time ever this afternoon, the All-Ireland camogic quarter-finals will be broadcast live on RTE.

The double-header is at Semple Stadium, with Dublin facing Wexford at 5pm followed by Galway against Tipperary at 7pm.

Last year's finalists, Kilkenny and Cork, await the winners in the semi-finals on August 19.

Wexford and Galway will be favourites, having come second in their respective groups and both being relatively recent All-Ireland winners Wexford in 2012, Galway in


Wexford beat Tipp, Offaly, and Limerick in arguably the stronger of the two groups, but won't be happy with their 18-point defeat to Cork in the third round. Having lost lynchpin Kate Kelly to retirement in June, the Leacys — Mary at centre back and Una at corner forward - are among their most steadying, experienced players, but newcomers Chloe Fox and Joanna Dillon are also shining in the

Galway, meanwhile, beat all comers in Group 1 but for champions Kilkenny, with Orlaith McGrath (daughter of Hopper) providing crisp firepower up front. They'll be hoping to strike the first blow in this weekend's double-

Dublin will be underdogs against Wexford, but David Herity's team will take heart from victories over Clare and Waterford in the group stages, and by the fact that as recently as this year's league they enjoyed a five-point victory over Wexford.

Twenty-year-old goalkeeper Faye McCarthy has scored an incredible 1-15 in the championship so far; her deadly accurate long-range frees should keep Dublin within touching distance at the very least.

Tipp, meanwhile, made it to the quarters by the skin of their teeth, advancing on a single point in score difference. Their victory over Offaly two

games, with Cait Devane and Orlagh O'Dwyer particularly effective up front.

Unconventional though their route to the quarter-finals was, Tipp are on home turf and will be throwing everything they have at Galway.

If you can, go to Thurles. It's to be a sunny evening; you'll get two must-win matches for the price of one; and best of all, U18s get in free. Having sald that, I couldn't be happier that the games will be televised (did I mention that it's for the first time ever?).

For years, camogie fans have looked enviously at the LGFA and their excellent, comprehensive coverage on

TG4 and wondered: Why not us? Last year was the first time that even the semi-finals were televised live. To go from one game broadcast to five in the space of two years is a huge jump in terms of visibility, and I'm delighted for these elite players who are all too used to playing to bare stands.

This weekend, they'll have an audience.

Small things demonstrate the gulf between being an inter-county hurler and an inter-county camogie player. A recent exchange on The Sunday Game after the brief camogie segment demonstrates this. Jackie Tyrell, who has emerged as a smart and incisive pundit since hanging up his boots, made an off-hand comment that the Kilkenny camogie team would have been watching the weekend's action closely with a view to their own fixture the following weekend. But the

match wasn't televised; the three minutes shown on The Sunday Game was likely the only insight the Kilkenny players were going to get

TV coverage is an indelible part of elite sport now. It's almost unimaginable for a hurler to go out to play a team without having watched them perform or having access to in-depth analysis. But for camogie players, trying to get a sense of how their opposition plays is a mixum-gatherum of word-of-mouth, local radio, and the diligent live-tweeting of games by county PROs. Bare-bones coverage - or none at all - is just the norm.

Maybe it's a blessing in a way. There are certainly fewer angry tweets in the women's codes

Controversial incidents generally aren't slowed down and analysed frame by frame. Former Cork ladies' football manager Eamonn Ryan

remarked that there was a lot less pressure on his female charges. If they went out and lost a league final or a Munster final, there was no media outcry or talking down of the players. Very often, this allowed them to rebound from the odd defeat; the lack of scrutiny might even have been a factor in their extraordinary streak of 11 All-Irelands in 12 years.

Lack of coverage can mean lack of pressure, but it can also be interpreted as lack of encouragement. That's one extraordinary statistic that emerged from a recent campaign by Lidl to highlight its sponsorship of the LGFA. According to its research, one out of every two teenage girls drops out of team sport; girls are three times more likely to drop out of sports than boys; and seven out of ten girls report 'lack of encouragement' as one of their main reasons

When the research also highlights the fact that girls who play a team sport are four times more likely to be confident in their bodies and 80% more likely to have a positive mental outlook, the value of encouraging girls to play sport is clear. When you consider the pressures on young people in general, and teenage girls in particular, we can't continue to allow young female players to slip through the cracks.

Broadcasting games is one way of counteracting this. In fairness to The Sunday Game, they've been making a good effort to seed in women analysts alongside the lads of late, with Wexford's Mags D'Arcy (taking a year out from goalkeeping duty) and Galway's Anne Marie Hayes especially impressive. It's nice to see something other than a lineup of suits in studio. This afternoon's coverage will feature no suits at all, with Joanne Cantwell joined in studio by Galway's Aisling Connolly, Cork's Anna Geary, Kilkenny's Elaine Aylward, and Tipp's Jill Horan. Not only will young women get to watch sports heroes of their gender on TV, they'll get to see an all-female panel of experts debate the finer points of the games. I'd call that a win-win.

Foxe hoping to keep Wexford ahead of the pack

Chloe Foxe is in the vanguard of the new breed of Wexford player, joined by the likes of Joanne Dillon, Amy Cardiff and Sarah O'Connor, with Nicole Fortune inheriting the goalkeeper's role. They have flourished this year but face their biggest test when taking on Dublin in the first of this evening's televised quarter-finals' double-header at Semple Stadium.

Foxe was given a taste of the action as a Leaving Cert student last year but has created a huge impression this

term. The St Martin's sharpshooter was just 10 when the Yellowbellies took over Croke Park a decade ago. Sharing a dressing room with so many legends could have been daunting but Foxe kept her mouth shut and her ears open.

"Players like Kate Kelly would have been one of my true inspirations growing up says Foxe. "Just playing alongside her last year was so surreal. Just looking at her... the desire to go and fight for every ball as if it was her last is really something I've tried to bring to my game.

"I remember last year in the

quarter-final against Tipp, it was slipping away so easily and to see that ball go over the bar in the dying seconds was just an incredible moment."

Kelly's injury-time winner, after Wexford had trailed by eight, was the last in a lengthy list of heroic feats over 20 years in the purple and gold but her contribution continues, as she drifts around the younger crew on match day. 'She's been there in the dressing room as a voice for the likes of me and Joanne and Sarah and Amy. She's someone who gives you a lot of inspiration.

"Before the match she's just telling you to focus on what you have to do. I remember the last day against Offaly, we got a great start and were going really well. We came in at half time and she said to me Look, ye had a good first half but that's over now, you may do the exact same in the second half."

The entire family is immersed in sport. Foxe's father Ger was a selector with Jason Ryan when Wexford reached the All-Ireland Senior Football semi-final in 2008. Her brother of the same name hurled for the county while all

her siblings play at some level.

Foxe herself has lined out for Wexford at underage level in ladies football and soccer, but camogie always held sway. Her influence was never more obvious than against Tipperary at Innovate Wex-ford Park on July 15.

The computer science student at UCD damaged her hamstring against Cork and after missing too much training, was held in reserve against the Premier County. The visitors scored two quick goals to draw level in the second half, which was the signal for Foxe's introduction. She

quickly scored a goal and a point to put her team in command once more, her finishing tally of 1-2 being the ultimate margin of victory.

"After I had an injury, the lads chose not to start me and I was completely understanding that as I missed training And I was pleased for the girls that got to come in because everyone is going so hard in training.

"I saw it as an opportunity. I said 'I'm not sitting on the bench for another summer so I better do something when I get in." The rest is history. With more to be written.

Rebels haven't been tested yet

Cork have eased into the All-Ireland camogie semi-finals without a proper test

WE'RE moving towards the yourself up for it. business end of the All-Ireland senior camogie championship and Cork are safely in the semifinals, as are reigning champions Kilkenny - the question now is who will join them?

This weekend the two quarter-finals take place - Dublin v Wexford and Galway v Tipp - and after that we'll be left with four teams to battle it out for the

Cork have done all they need to do to get this far, winning all four games in group two of the championship to comfortably progress to the last four - but a concern is that they haven't been tested yet.

Cork beat Tipperary (1-16 to 1-7) in their opening championship game, and then went on to resoundingly defeat (1-27 to 0-11) Munster champions Limerick, the side that beat them in that Munster final.

Wexford was the next encounter, a side Cork are all so familiar with from past epic battles, but Wexford appeared to be a weakened team, especially with the retirement of their highly influential forward Kate Kelly. Cork looked strong with a great team performance that saw them working for each other and finding players in a better position for a pass. Orla Cotter took some impressive scores from distance as did the young Orla Cronin, and goalkeeper Aoife Murray's familiar sprint up the field for a penalty rocked the net and the game ended on a score line of 3-18 to 0-9, a win that all but guaranteed Cork a place in the last four.

Cork's last group game was probably their toughest, winning 1-13 to 0-11 against a determined Offaly side, and afterwards manager Paudie Murray admitted that there was plenty

'I'm happy with the win - but the negative would be that we never really brought our level of intensity or work-rate to today's game to compare with the first three games,' the Rebel boss said. 'In defence of the girls, we had qualified, so today's result was irrelevant in one way so 'twas hard to get

'We've really got to up it to have a chance in the semi-final because certainly today's display will not do. So there's a lot of work to do.'

This Cork team has yet to be tested in this senior championship, having won all four games with relative ease. The next few weeks of preparation for their semi-final opponents will be crucial. Training will be intensified and practice games against challenging opponents need to be organised as other teams in the championship have had to fight very hard for their qualifying place so they will be battle

In order for Kilkenny to secure their semi-final spot by the mathematical workings of points and game permutations, they had to ensure they finished their final game with a highscoring win against Dublin after battling a drawn result with Clare earlier in the championship. They have a number of injured players this year, most notably their solid back Edwina Keane who tore her cruciate ligament earlier this season. They topped their group with three wins and one draw and will be watching carefully this Saturday to see who progresses through the quarter-finals.

It has been an unusual and exciting championship so far. There have been fantastic displays of skill, like Dublin goalkeeper Faye McCarthy's consistent ability to take frees and score from long range, and there have been players who have shot onto the radar for their individual performances, like Limerick's Niamh Mulcahy. Cork rock Gemma O'Connor has thrilled many with her powerful solo runs and scores from the midfield area.

There have been many examples of camogie at its best during the summer but the excitement of this championship so far is mainly built on uncertainty; uncertainty of who was going to progress to the quarter-final stages.

It was certainly not clear-cut or in any way predictable.

While Kilkenny played their

last round-robin game knowing the incentive of a semi-final place was up for grabs, all other teams bar the already qualified Cork and knocked-out Waterford side had an opportunity to reach the quarter-finals, if permutations worked in their counties favour.

All remaining seven counties of Limerick, Clare, Tipperary, Wexford, Offaly, Galway and Dublin had a chance to qualify, and these last-gasp pressurised efforts will stand to them as they now face their opponents in Semple Stadium in Thurles this Saturday.

GALWAY saved the business end of the title race for their best performance of the year as they made light work of the Tipperary threat in Thurles to secure a 12th consecutive All-Ireland senior camogie semi-final appearance.

An Ailish O'Reilly goal three minutes after the restart ended any hopes the home side had of creating a comeback following the Tribeswomen jumping into a commanding 0-10 to 0-0 lead.

This wasn't a champagne Galway display but rather a calculated dismantling of their opponents. Mark Dunne's team attacked from the off and it took. Tipperary 20 minutes to open their account. Even though Brian Boyle's charges did reduce arrears to six, another Galway scoring burst after the break ended any doubts about the outcome of this contest.

The Premier County only scrapped into the knock out series on scoring difference. But with results over the last two years suggesting they were much better (they only lost to Galway by three points in 2016), they were expected to rattle the favourites.

However, that upset came in the opening game in the Thurles double header as Dublin beat Wexford 1-16 to 0-12 to reach the penultimate stage for the first time in 27 years. And very early in the second game, it was inevitable the 'shock' wouldn't be repeated.

Dunne pulled some rabbits out of the hat, including handing Siobhan McGrath her first championship start. And within 20 seconds, Niamh McGrath sent play into her sister's corner and the young Sarsfields forward tormented Julieanne Bourke before finding Orlaith McGrath who opened the scoring.

Four years ago, Galway concluded a subdued group campaign before opening up against Tipperary in the quarter-finals. O'Reilly was the star that day announcing her arrival on the national scene and she starred again with two frees by the fifth minute.

Galway led 0-3 to 0-0 but 60 seconds later, a great team effort delivered one of the game's

best points. Roisin Black and Sarah Dervan combined in midfield, Ann Marie Starr contributed in the middle before sending partner Niamh Kilkenny though for Galway's fourth point.

Kilkenny turned provider for Maria Cooney on eight minutes before Niamh McGrath made it six not long after. Another Cooney effort continued Galway's control before Orlaith Mc-Grath picked out Kilkenny for the 0-8 to 0-0 advantage.

Admittedly, Galway's consistent tallying slowed and they only added four points before the break. Tipperary finally came to terms with their opponents dropping players back to reduce the supply and gradually played their way back into contention.

Ciardha Maher, Cait Devane, Mairead Teehan and Orla O'Dwyer all hit the target as they trailed 0-12 to 0-5 at half-time. O'Reilly and Siobhan McGrath got two each for Galway while Sarah Healy also producing one important save. But Tipperary had the slight wind that would go against them after the break.

O'Dwyer got Tipperary's next leaving six between them but their interest in this quarter-final was finished by the 38th minute. Starr found Niamh McGrath for Galway's response but the inevitable major settled the tie.

Cahalane is struggling for a while with a form of tendinitis in her Achilles tendon and isn't 100% right. Cork haven't had a clear injury free run all year.

Julia White continues to be protected in that when she's on the pitch she's superb but suffers extreme tightness around the Achilles area and management have to be careful with her. There is every chance due to this that Cork will keep her as an impact sub rather than starting. While that may be disappointing for Julia, what an impact sub to have.

Physically Cork are a stronger team than Galway. And they have speed with it. Down the middle you have Gemma O'Connor, Ashling Thompson, and Hannah Loo-ney alongside Orla Cotter, Laura Treacy, Pam Mackey and Niamh McCarthy.

Siobhan McGrath has come onto the Galway panel this year at left corner forward and has done well, albeit she is slight in stature and won't have it too easy on whoever takes her up and I'm assuming Laura Treacy will be given the task.

Libby Coppinger and Ashling Thomp-son should hold the centre-field positions but the same fixtures problem that has plauged the game before has arisen, with the ladies' footballers and camogie clash tomorrow. Even if Libby doesn't start with the footballers and plays a second half role, she then faces a 165km journey from Mullingar to the Gaelic Grounds.

Cork have options on the bench, they are playing more direct and they should be hungry to get back into an All-Ireland final. If the game is tight heading down the straight Cork typically finish strong and Galway tend to fade.

If Cork take a healthy lead I also don't expect Galway to have the composure and belief to pull them back. Cork to win.

Today's All-Ireland camogie semi-finals will both be televised live by RTE with impressive figures recorded for the quarter-finals which were broadcast by the station earlier this month. Dublin's win over Wexford attracted an audience of 102,000 while the Galway-Tipperary match had 92,000 viewers.

Q: Where are you based at the moment?

A: I'm training to be a solicitor with William Fry in Dublin. It's hard to keep it all going. I go home every Tuesday during the Championship for training. Most weeks we train on a Friday so I get down for that as well, and anything we do on a Saturday and Sunday. Your week is so routine. You get to Dublin on Sunday night, get ready for the gym session after work on a Monday or a Wednesday, get all the gear packed for Tuesday, go down and up again, then down again on Friday. You're living out of a sultcase nearly. They're really understanding in work, they're all about the work-life balance. It's not that big a sacrifice anyway. There's a lot of people worse off and it's great to be able to play.

Q: What are your earliest memories?
A: It wasn't necessarily just camogie. We'd go to all Mam's hockey matches when we were younger. She gave up international hockey when she had us but she used to play for Greenfields in Galway and would bring us along. Dad was playing with Sarsfields until around 2002 and Mam used to be working so we used always be down at Sarsfields training

Q: Did you know they were high achievers?

been with us ever since.

A: Not really. You don't pay much heed to it. They'd be very modest. You'd just know from people talking around the club that people would have a lot of respect for them. They'd never blow their own trumpet, our ours either!


Q: What were the games like at home?
A: We had small matches out the back. Me and Clodagh against Siobhán and Orlaith. Siobhán would be a bit small but Dad would be playing as well. We were always outside. Dad was over us as soon as I was around eight, with the Sarsfields U10s team and he's

Q: Winning that first county senior title with your sisters and Dad, and then getting all the way to the All-Ireland final in March must have been fantastic.

A: That was the best day ever in my camogle career, to win a first county championship with the club. I was the eldest on the team and it's the same group of girls. From that group at U10, we went up and won everything. With another group of stronger players beneath us, we eventually won the senior final. We have such a strong club now built up from nothing. They're going for their fifth U16 in a row this year and we did three-in-a-row minor last year, so the future is bright.

Q: You are the eldest of six girls. Clara and Laois are still very young at 11 and 9 but you were joined by Clodagh and Orlaith when Galway won the U16 All-Ireland in 2009, and again four years later when annexing the senior title. Slobhán joined up during the summer and made her first start in the quarter-final against Tipperary. What's that like?

A: You don't really know any different. Three of us are so close in age, we've always played together. It's nice to be playing with your sisters. They know where you are, they know how you play. It's more natural, And Siobhán coming in this year, it's just the same.



Q: Were ye worried about Slobhán starting her first game so young? Were ye ready to step in if she got a dig?

A: Of all of us, Siobhán does not need any protection whatsoever! She'd be stronger than me to be totally honest. She's so cool, calm and collected, she doesn't lose the head at all. Nothing fazes her and she's well able to look after herself. She has a good attitude too, a great workrate.

Q: What's the atmosphere like in the county?

A: It's been very sad the last week or two with Tony Keady's passing. That has dampened the hype about. He was such a character. Dad and himself would have gone way back. They were the same age and they played with each other right through vocational schools until they retired with Galway. There would have been great rivalry too as Killimordaly are our next door neighbours.

Tony had a great interest in camogie. He was at our quarter-final and travelled up from there to Dublin for the hurling semi-final. He was so proud of his daughter Shannon making the Galway U16 team this year. Your heart would go out to them.

The hurlers have taken the pressure off us a bit but in Galway, the hurling and camogle community is so united. Even in my own club, all the senior hurlers go to our matches. In our county final there were two and a half thousand there and the same for the replay. There's great support for camogle.

Q: Former teammate Molly Dunne retired last year and has moved straight into coaching, with her brother Mark taking over as manager and former Galway and Dublin hurler Niall Corcoran coming in as well. What's it like with Molly taking that new role?

A: She's a brilliant trainer. She motivates you brilliantly. You'd really have respect for her as a woman who has done it all. She'll be a future manager definitely. There's no shortcuts when Molly is around. And despite being teammates in the past, you wouldn't cut corners. There are boundaries there. She's a selector now.

Q: What about Cork?

A: We did well against Tipperary but we're under no illusions that Cork are a complete, utter, and total different kettle of fish. They're so dominant in the past couple of years. They've been in nearly every final in league and championship. The system they play is so tough with the sweeper and the running game breaking out of defence. But we're going well and hopefully we do ourselves justice. Hopefully we'll hit the ground running. There's been too many games where we've underperformed at the start and faltered on the big occasion, haven't done ourselves justice with the calibre of players we have. If we give a performance, we'll see how it goes.

Q: Have ye talked about tendency to underperform on the big stage? A: We have talked about it and tried to

A: We have talked about it and tried to address it. We just have to try and get harder, more aggressive and not let the bigger teams dominate us. It seems to be that we can beat them up along but not when it matters on the big day. There's a good vibe now though and it all depends on the day. We'll give it everything we have.

Cork and Galway could be a game for the ages

THE meeting of Cork and Galway on Saturday night in the Liberty Insurance All-Ireland Senior Camogie Championship semi-final at 7pm in the Gaelic Grounds is a mouth-watering prospect.

The teams are meeting for the first time since the 2015 decider when Cork upset the odds, having been beaten by Galway twice prior to that in the National League final and the group stages of the Champion-

Cork returned to the All-Ireland final last year but found Kilkenny too strong and it is worth recording that Galway only fell to the Stripeywomen after injury-time in the semi-final.

However, having finally given long-touted minor star Siobhán McGrath her head, they have even more speed in attack and will look to cash in on the offensive threat that is also provided by McGrath's sisters Orlaith and Niamh, Maria Cooney and Ailish O'Reilly.

Cork, of course, are renowned for their ability to smother opposition attacks, the likes of Pamela Mackey, Laura Treacy, and captain Rena Buckley among the stickiest of defenders in the game. In ad-

dition, All-Ireland-winning skipper Ashling Thompson has been a central figure in the game-plan with her athleticism enabling her to sweep up deep in her own half while also forcing turnovers around the field and getting forward for a score or two. Gemma O'Connor, Aoife Murray, and Orla Cotter are just some other who provide plenty of experience while Niamh McCarthy represents the new breed.

Galway have a similar profile in that regard, as apart from Siobhán McGrath, Róisín Black is a new-comer who has appeared to the manor born in defence. At the other end of the experience spectrum, Sarah Dervan's return from injury adds steel to that division, Lorraine Ryan was captain when they won the All-Ireland in 2013 and Niamh Kilkenny remains an absolute joy to watch.

This could be a game for the ages.

The story of the improving fortunes of Dublin camogie is multi-layered but is rooted in vision and the installation of improved structures.

The seniors' appearance in a first Liberty Insurance All-Ireland Senior Championship semi-final since 1990 at the Gaelic Grounds today (5.15pm) is just the latest signal of the graph's upward spiral, with the second string already booked into the Premier Junior final at Croke Park on September 10.

Even more significantly, the Minors and U16s reached the last four of their campaigns, suggesting that there is a conveyor belt of talent coming through to ensure depth, particularly with many of the All-Ireland U16-winning team of 2012 – the Dubs' first win at that grade in 30 years – now graduating.

Nothing works unless the right people are put in place however and David Herity has been lauded deservedly for his role in taking the Seniors to the peet level

the next level.

He would be the first to say that he is building on the work of his predecessor Shane O'Brien however. O'Brien brought about a change in culture, establishing a high-performance environment that included bringing Herity into the fold last year.

The Cuala man removed the excuses for non-performance and players responded to being treated as serious athletes by becoming ones.

"He changed everything up completely" says Dublin's leading scorer, Aisling Maher. "It became a much more pro-

fessional set-up. It was a change to players' lifestyle. It wasn't just going down and training a few nights a week and trying to put in the effort and commitment for a couple of hours each night at training. "He very much changed players' attitude to try and act like an athlete. You're watching what you're eating, you're

getting your own training in, you're starting to think about games in the right way, the visualisation side of it is brought in, a proper backroom team is put in place, players are being looked after with proper sets of gear.

"There's someone looking

"There's someone looking after admin, someone looking after S & C, someone else doing hurling drills, having physios at training. All those little things make a big difference and allow players to feel that the whole set-up overall is worth putting the time and effort into it."

Results improved, ambition was raised and when O'Brien stepped away after two years, Herity took on the mantle. The five-time All-Ireland winner with Kilkenny had already had a significant impact and Maher is effusive in her praise of the former goalkeeper.

"David's been fantastic. He has had the experience himself at the very top level and he knows what it takes. He knows the difference between winning an All-Ireland and losing it, how small the margins are.

"To have a manager who can understand every aspect of the game, that players are amateurs and have jobs and everything outside of it but at the same time, (that the game) monopolises a massive amount of your life so inevitably there's a huge emotional attachment that goes with it. It's everything for a good chunk of the year to everybody playing at this level.

"He understands the level of professionalism you need to bring and how much work is involved in it. He's willing to give us everything he can to push us over the line. That kind of experience, from the

drills and the hurling side, right up to the lifestyle side of it, having someone who understands what that is, how it affects every player differently, everything you need to get everything out of the team, is a huge advantage to us."

Maher, who turns 22 in November, is facing into her final year of medicinal chemistry at Trinity College. Combining her studies with her Camogie commitments can be testing at times but the articulate St Vincent's markswoman, who has been part of the Senior squad for five years, insists it is all about finding the right blend.

"I did an internship for the first six weeks of the summer so I was between Crumlin Hospital and Temple Street for the start of the Championship. The hours in a hospital are very difficult so it's tricky to balance that kind of stuff. You're on your feet all day, it's long hours and then getting to training and trying to be in a good mental and physical shape, eat properly, rested as much as possible and be able to put in a good session for the evening.

"It's the same thing during the year. Dublin's pre-season started in November. Vincent's have been lucky to have successful seasons in the last few years, and would have gotten to the Leinster final, which is the middle of November.

"So it's always busy, it's always a balancing thing but when you're playing sport at this level, you have to be good at balancing things or it's not possible otherwise. You have to get used to it and you have to know when enough is enough and you need to miss a training session to recover and maybe make up for it in your own time.

"People are slow to give recognition to Dublin so as far as we're concerned, we used that as motivation. Kilkenny will be another step up again. What we did the last day won't be good enough but we don't plan on performing at that same level. We'll be looking at what we can do to bring out our best performance against Kilkenny and push on another level."

ORK withstood a frantic last-quarter rally from Galway to return to the Liberty Insurance All-Ireland senior camogie final for the fourth consecutive season.

Last year's runners-up looked to be cruising when points from Katrina Mackey and Hannah Looney within two minutes of the resumption pushed them eight clear. Astonishingly, however, they went 28 minutes without a score and only managed one further point as Galway, driven forward by Aoife Donohue, edged back into proceedings.

Cork lost Gemma O'Connor to an ankle injury in the 46th minute and three minutes later, Galway's powerful sub Niamh Hanniffy hit a goal to reduce the

margin to three.

Donohue slotted a free nine minutes from the end of regulation time and Galway were making all of the running but Cork defended magnificently, Rena Buckley, Chloe Sigerson and Ashling Thompson ensuring that the Tribeswomen would not find another goal.

A Top 4 spot is not a bad way to finish the season but though disappointed the word coming from the players walking off the Gaelic Grounds in Limerick was "we know where we have to aim for now". Kilkenny had the edge on Dublin from the moment Denise Gaule goaled a penalty in the first minute after Miriam Walsh was upended in the box. As outsiders Dublin could have done with a start like that with the breeze at their backs in the opening half. As it was Kilkenny would never be headed or levelled. It was an important score, the result of a brilliant passing movement.

But a further 62 minutes would be played before Kilkenny would find the net again - a score that was a little unfair on the challenge put up by a fiercely determined Dublin.

Miriam Twomey was again employed as sweeper and while this was successful from the point of view of curtailing the goal threat of the Cats, the loss of a forward at the other end meant that Dublin never threatened a goal. On top of that the "loose" player Ann Dalton has been around the block and her positional sense and use of the ball won her the player of the match. Her contribution was significant.

Dublin's backs - each and everyone of them - were outstanding. But upfront the attack could not make the desired impact despite their best efforts. No surprise that all of Dublin's four second half substitutions were at that end of the field.

One of the most important progressions of the year has been Dublin's ability to take a knock and recover. After Kilkenny's early goal, Dublin came roaring back and Siobhan Kehoe emerged from a ruck with the sliothar in her paw. The ball sailed over the black spot in the 5 th minute and Dublin were off the mark. Three minutes later Aisling Maher was on target from her first free. The scores lifted Dublin's hearts on and off the field and the Dublin roar was heard as time and again the Dublin backs hunted down Kilkenny attacks. Eve O'Brien and her corner backs Aine Woods and Grainne Quinn were growing in stature. In front of them the half-back line of Hannah Hegarty, Aisling Carolan and Eva-Marie Elliott were just as good. Eimear McCarthy was soldiering well in the middle third.

Murray frustrated by inconsistencies



PAUDIE MURRAY has repeatedly criticised camogie referees during his tenure as Cork manager.

Is he, always right? Probably not.

But it is the one area that does tend to frustrate many followers of the game far more often than it should. I believe that the current rules prevent us from truly flourishing as a national sport but that isn't what frustrates those involved.

What infuriates is the lack of consistency in applying those rules. One day you can't so much as rub off a

On another you can challenge high and aggressively.

Paudie spoke about his concerns ahead of the All-Ireland final on RedFm last Saturday, "We don't know whether it'll be camogie or hurling rules that the referee will apply on

"It's the one thing that frustrates me the whole time. We are playing camo-gie, there are camogie rules, if they don't apply them then scrap them and let's play hurling.

"It's the lack of an understanding of what's point to be let go. Last year's

what's going to be let go. Last year's physicality caught us, no doubt about

"The high tackle is worrying me. Last week (semi-final between Kilkenny and Dublin) another incident hap-

"To me as a manager you coach your players to the rules and then different rules apply. It changes to make it a more attractive spectacle for TV but come out and tell us what it will be.

"Owen Elliot officiated the league final. I wasn't happy with his display in that final, I told him that.

"I like Owen. We get on well.

"I like Owen. We get on well.
"But both goals shouldn't have been given. There were eight or nine steps taken for both and the way he applied the advantage rule was crazy."

Owen from Antrim will be the man in the middle for the final. There are often refereeing decisions as a manager that you feel aggrieved with. that's across every code and on a given day some go with you and others don't.

You can't account for incidents where a referee allows players overcarry to such an extent. That is outside your control but much of everything ise should be inside your control unless the referee is ridiculous alto-

Cork and Kilkenny set to renew bitter rivalry

You don't have to be an avid camogie follower to know of the growing friction between Cork and Kilkenny.

The country got a proper first glimpse of it when Cork's Hannah Looney and Kilkenny's Collette Dormer pushed one another during the prematch handshake before last

year's All-Ireland final. Cork's Gemma O'Connor was also dismissed seven minutes from time for a second yellow card offence.

Kilkenny ended the Rebels' three-in-a-row bid and Ann Downey's side further strengthened their status as the game's outstanding force when defeating Cork in the league final back in April.

That game produced another headline-grabbing inci-dent as the Cork players conducted their warm-down on the field while Kilkenny captain Meighan Farrell accepted

the league cup.

Downey took a phone call from KCLR the following morning and didn't dodge the issue when it was raised, "It just doesn't happen, to be honest with you," said the Kilkenny boss.

"We can't control what the Cork people will do. You wouldn't want to see it happening too often. We just hope that our own team would always show respect to the op-

Her Cork counterpart, Paudie Murray, chose not to respond to these comments, but did remark after last month's All-Ireland semi-final win over Galway that Sunday's game "won't be one for the spectators, Kilkenny play 10 behind the ball and we'll have to do an awful lot better if we're to have any chance".

Downey didn't take kindly to Murray's description of their style of play, insisting last week, "we don't tell our girls to get behind the ball".

"Paudie is entitled to his own opinion but we'll just concentrate on our game and that's certainly not the game we'll be playing."

Murray believes the rivalry between the counties is im-

portant for the promotion of the game, even if he's not overly impressed with how he has been portrayed in foster-

ing this relationship. "I see headlines where I said x, y, and z. If I give Kilkenny a compliment, people say I'm playing mind games. If I play them down, people say I'm a sore loser. I'm probably in a no-win situation," says Mur-

ray.
"I think the media are looking to create rivalry because it hasn't been there for a long time. Maybe, you might point the finger at me and say I've helped it along the way.

"Maybe, camogie was getting boring. I remember going to camogie matches when the Cork-Tipperary rivalry of the early noughties was there and it was good for the game. This is good for the game, too. I enjoy that rivalry. I think it important for camogie. Kilkenny enjoy rivalry as well. It is in their blood."

Kilkenny won last year's decider 1-13 to 1-9, with Murray claiming Cork's preparation was a long way from the level at which it should have been.

"What annoyed me most last year wasn't Kilkenny, but ourselves. There were things we should have controlled better. That is really what bugged me on the train journey home and leading up to Christmas. We could have handled ourselves better. I don't think we prepared well last year. People were taking short cuts. We fattened on our success. There was no extra bit being done outside of training. We went to Dublin more concentrating on the three in a row than beating Kilkenny.'

Are they in a better place 12 months on? "Physically and mentally, yes. You could see that against Galway. We didn't blow up under the pressure Galway applied in the last 10 minutes. We would have last year. We always pride our-selves on being mentally strong. The semi-final against Galway proved to everyone involved we have that back again. We'll need buckets of that against Kilkenny.

There's also more depth to this Cork panel—Chloe Siger-son and Niamh McCarthy have both come into the starting team this season, "Someone made a point coming home from the semi-final that if Gemma O'Connor had been injured in a game this time last year, she would have been told to go up to corner-forward and stand there because we were so short of players. This year, we were able to bring in three or four subs. We owe it to Gemma and to the Cork people to deliver a performance this weekend.

Chaoimh's aiming to level the playing field

Cork intermediate camogie captain Niamh Ní Chaoimh will be in action on Sunday in an All-Ireland final against Meath. MARY WHITE talks to her about teaching, playing sport in school, and the positive influence her parents had on her sporting career

N Sunday, Glounthaune's Niamh Ni Chaoimh will lead Cork out onto Croke Park, and in the stand her parents Ann and Denis will be just as nervous as they proudly watch their youngest child.

They've been here before, however, as Niamh captained the Rebels in last year's Intermediate Camogie All-Ireland final, only to lose to Kilkenny. This year, hopes are high that Cork's Intermediate team can redeem themselves, but it'll be a tall order against Meath.

order against Meath.

Ni Chaoimh plays camogie with Killeagh and football with Erins Own, and incredibly has a senior All-Ireland medal haul that equates to four in football and one in camogie.

As a child, weekends were spent pucking the sliothar or kicking football about in the back garden with her older brothers Shane and Mark—now living in Australia and New Zealand respectively—and from there Niamh progressed to camogie with Erins Own under the guidance of a lady called Hilda Keohane.

But, it was her parents' incredible support as she grew up that gave Niamh such a great outlook on life, and in particular in her

gave Niamh such a great outlook on life, and in particular in her career as a primary school teacher at Gaelscoil Uí Riordáin in

"My parents' input was huge," she says. "They've been an unbelievable support to me.

"Mom wouldn't be too sporty, but she got into it for me. Growing up she was the one driving us down to Dunmanway on a Saturday morning for football trials at 9am, then driving us

back up for a camogie match in Mitchelstown. Then dad would follow on to watch the game, and they were just fantastic. "We're a very close family. With the lads away it's been myself, mom and dad, and we can't forget the dog (Charlie the Jack Russell)! But, I can't stress how important their involve-

"Dad played hurling and football for Mayfield and Erins Own, and he's now stuck in Erins Own for the last few years. He's always on the sideline, encouraging people on . He's very positive and that was great to have growing up.

"They've set a massive example for me. Even with my teaching career, you can see that all the parents just want to keep their kids on the straight and narrow and for them to do their best, and as a teacher that's what you want as well

Having attended secondary school in Colaiste na Piarsaigh in Glanmire, Niamh was known as Niamh Ni Chaoimh and the Irish name followed her to college, so eventually she decided to

make it her official name on her passport.

They don't speak Irish at home in Glounthaune, but given her work, Niamh converses daily, while she'll also speaks Irish with her college friends.

But, as preparations continue for Sunday's All-Ireland final showdown against Meath in Croke Park, Muinteoir Ní Chaiomh is just another teacher. Along with two other members of staff, she coached the school camogie team to the Sciath na Scoil finals this year, and Niamh sees first hand just want sport can do for children developing at that age.


The most important thing I think it teaches them is social skills. Obviously, there's huge benefits to them being outside, in the fresh air, exercising, but learning social skills is just as unportant.

"When I got involved coaching the camogie team, you could see the girls growing in confidence every day. They started getting to finals, and that's not the be all and end all because they lost one and they won one, but it taught them how to succeed and it also taught them how to take a defeat, and that makes you resilient.

They were so engrossed in it and they were chatting among themselves about the games and training, and they were all really good friends looking out for one another and that's fantastic to watch.

"It also teaches them discipline, not only to be dedicated because of their teammates, but to have respect for themselves, the other players, and their coaches.

"It also teaches them about time management, because you

know if you're playing, you're going to have to commit to training, and you know you have to be on time because others are dependent on you.'

But what about pushy parents?

"I haven't had to deal with pushy parents. 99% of the time there's no problem. Parents want the best for their child, and you want the best for the child, so communication is the keylike anything in life.

"If a child is ever struggling with anything, you speak to the parents, and the parents will know. They want to help the child, and you want to help the child, so you'll all work together.

"But, as I say, you can definitely see how playing a sport is so good for them, and I know that myself having parents who were involved in what I did, but who even if they didn't have the time, showed an interest, and that's hugely important."

When Niamh wasn't training with Erins Own in football, or with Killeagh or the Cork intermediate camogie team, she was completing a two-year Masters in Education, for which she will soon find out the results.

"It wasn't easy, but having learned to juggle two different codes, and a career, taking on a Masters was just something to

"It was all about being organised. That was the most important thing. The night before I'd have all my meals and my gear ready because you could be gone from 8am in the morning to 8pm at night.

"But, if you're interested in it, you'll do it. I managed my time and that's what you need to do. But, it's the same with everything, if you have the interest and you want to do it, you'll make

Niamh will lead her teammates out onto the turf of Croke Park on Sunday, with the game being broadcast live on RTE2's The Sunday Game at 2pm.

In Australia her brother Shane will tune in, and in New Zealand her brother Mark will do the same.

To say she's gutted is an understatement.

T've been very lucky over my career with regards injuries and then this happens in the All-Ireland semi-final, Gemma O'Connor said. "It wasn't as if I was running and

tore something, it was just a freak

"Two players fell and one ran into the side of my leg and I heard a small

pop in my knee.
"Sometimes when that happens they say that it doesn't necessarily mean it's something serious, but for me it

"That weekend, I was staying in Limerick after the game as I was going to a wedding in the Aran Islands the following day.

"That Saturday night by myself, I had an awful night. I was devastated.

"I didn't get to sleep until about 3am and I was up at eight. I didn't know whether to go back to Cork or not.

"I was ok to drive as it was okay to press down and up but it was left to right, my knee movement, that was

"I got onto a friend of mine who said that there was a very good clinic in Galway where they'd do the MRI and give you the results straight away.
"So, I went up and they did it there

and then. It's a grade two tear on my medial ligament and I suppose playing at that high level really, being able to try and come back and perform is the

"It's very uncomfortable running in a straight line and I can't turn on it so I'm out for the final,

'In the morning, it's difficult to even

get down the stairs.

"When it happened, I played on for about five or ten minutes to see if I could run it off but I had no power in my knee so I was putting myself in

"It's a disaster, the semi-final of an All-Ireland. I just couldn't believe it. And this year I suppose during the last few years, after my mam (passed away), I was going back in April, nearly May and my mind was all over

Camogie always Orla's first love

Orla Cronin plays in her fourth All-Ireland senior final in four years this Sunday. KIERAN McCARTHY caught up with the Enniskeane star before the big game

IT was always camogie, always,' Orla Cronin says, days out from her fourth senior Allreland final on the bounce.

For a player who knows nothng but All-Ireland finals in her our years on the Cork senior oanel, she also knows nothing out camogie.

It was her number one love rom day one.

Gaelic football didn't get a ook in, apart from a bit of Scioth na Scol and, she thinks, primary school trials at one point.

'There was never a choice to be made,' the Knockaneady, Enniskeane woman smiled.

'It was always camogie.

'I didn't have as much love for football as I do for the small ball. 'I just stuck to the one and it's

On Sunday she'll tog out n the Cork half-forward line against Kilkenny in the Liberty nsurance senior camogie final at Croke Park, at 4pm. This will oe her fourth senior final in four seasons, winning titles in 2014 and '15 before the three-in-aow bid was derailed by Kilk-

enny last September. Called into the Cork senior panel after completing her Leaving Cert in Bandon Grammar in 2014, Orla is now 22 years old and well used to the oig occasion. She's rarely fazed, her journey through the ranks

has stood to her.

'When I was growing up the camogie club in Enniskeane wasn't as big, so myself and one of my best friends from home, Sinead (Dermot Curtin's daughter), we started playing hurling with the boys in St Mary's when we were U10 and U12. That was the norm at the time, the girls would train away with the boys,"

she explained. 'There was some U10 and U12 training with Enniskeane Camogie Club in Dunmanway because it also takes girls in from Dunmanway and Castletownkenneigh. Dermot used to bring us over to the training there so that's where it started

with Enniskeane.

'It got more competitive at U12, we were competing in a West Cork competition against the likes of Kilbrittain, and it

went from there. 'There was no rule when I was 14 to say, for example, that you had to be 16 to play with the junior team so myself, Sinead

A YEAR ago, Rena Buckley was part of a Cork camogie side aiming to achieve a three in a row only to be undone by Kilkenny.

Twelve months later and the two counties are once again opposing each other on the sport's showpiece day. Having inspired Inniscarra to county championship glory last year, Buckley is the Cork captain this year and she admits that the build-up to this final is different to the 2016 edition.

'The shoe is on the other foot now, there's a definite change in dynamic,' she says.

'Since the final last year, we played Kilkenny in the league final this year and they had a nice cushion again. We're definitely more aware of the fact that they're an excellent team.

'Last year, we were going in as champions, there was talk of a three in a row. I wouldn't say we were on our high horse, but this year it is definitely different.'

Adding to the feeling of Cork being the challengers is the fact that Kilkenny also beat the Rebels in the national league final. That more recent defeat holds no particular regrets for Buckley, though.

'They are a very good team,' she says


'The initial reaction would have been, "We didn't play well at all," but on reflection, they were very good.'

You miss being involved with the team and the buzz, particularly at this time of year. You mightn't miss the trips to Donegal in the league but I used to love the knockout games at the end of the championship.

'When you're playing less games, you're definitely more tuned in for the bigger games.

On the other side, I definitely had a great base of fitness last year. With football, you have to be hopping fit. Look, it is what it is.

Having topped their group in the round-robin stage of the All-Ireland championship, Cork faced Galway in the semi-finals

with the Tribeswomen coming off a quarter-final win over Tip-

Victory was achieved, but it wasn't easy.

'We had a five-week gap, that's a long time to be training,' Buckley says.

'You're trying to peak at the right time and the big difference between intercounty and club is that you can't get challenge games.

'It is trickier, and ever since I've been playing with Cork, Galway have had a good team. They'll be disappointed not to have got something out of it and I'm just delighted that we did.'

All told, Sunday will be Bucky's 22nd time to play in Croke Park. She doesn't have a particular routine in the lead-up to the big games, but she does make sure that she is well rested.

'The week of a big game, I'd make sure I was in bed early, whereas when you're 19 and 20 you stay up!' she laughs.

'I'd know a lot more about nutrition now too. As you learn new things, it'd be silly not to implement them for the sake of routine."

We should be so proud of our two senior stars who have shone brightly with Rebels

UST as I was finishing up my nter-county camogie career, Irla Cronin's was taking off.

Three years ago I decided to retire from senior inter-county ramogie, it was the right time to go, we had won the 2014 All-reland and I knew myself that I was over - but West Cork's amogie following had no eason to fear that our region rouldn't be represented on the sig stage.

Two words: Orla Cronin.

We had one season together, hat 2014 campaign, and as ny career finished up, she was reading into her second senior nter-county campaign and an adventure that now sees her contest her fourth All-Ireland senior final in four seasons this Sunday; an incredible record.

Orla has been joined in the Cork senior team by Libby Coppinger of St Colum's and while I never played or trained with her, all the reports I've had back have been glowing; another West Cork sportswoman with calent to burn.

Dual star Libby was in the headlines ahead of the All-Ireland camogic semi-final against Galway a few weeks ago when both the Cork camogic team and ladies' footballers were fixed to play on the same day. That's a situation I had hoped we would never see again. It's not good enough and both organisations need to ensure it doesn't happen again. Our players deserve better.

Libby lined out for Paudie Murray's camogie team and played her role in a win that sees Cork back in the All-Ireland final and ready to make amends for last year's loss to the same opposition, Kilkenny.

It's great for West Cork camogie to have two great ambassadors in Orla and Libby, both have enjoyed impressive campaigns and both have contributed to Cork's success this season. I'm going to have a look at both, starting with Orla Cronin, Enniskeane camogie's pride and joy.

She is having one of the best playing years of her life this season. Incredibly skilful, I always remember her being a wristy camogie player when striking a ball. Orla has shown in championship games this year – against Limerick, Wexford, Tipperary and Galway – that she knows where the posts are as she has weighed in with an impressive ten points in this championship run.

Orla can score with ease from distance and also from difficult angles but also is a very creative and influential play-maker, setting up the likes of Orla Cotter and Amy O'Connor to launch attacks.

Owning the centre forward spot on the Cork team Orla looks stronger and fitter than ever and possesses that grit and determination a player in that pivotal position needs. She will be up against the likes of Ann Dalton, Kilkenny's flawless centre back and playmaker in the final - but I have no doubt that Orla will spoil her game and won't allow Ann to make those surging runs forward or carry out those long and accurate clearances from the back that have become a trademark of her game.

From travelling with Orla to trainings and games in the past - our collection point was at Kevin O'Leary's garage in Bandon - she comes across as a smart, cool and calm character, who always has a smile on her face. Her relaxed attitude will stand to her on the biggest day of the camogie calendar and she will possess no fear. She is a reliable forward who can ably field a high ball coming into Kilkenny's defence and she has all the skills to be a big figure in Sunday's final.

Now, onto Libby Coppinger from Kealkil - this girl amazes

me and inspires me with her incredible commitment to both codes in Cork this year. It's a 170km round trip for training, and she's with the camogie team and the footballers. It just highlights her determination. Both Cork camps are lucky to have a player of Libby's attitude and ability.

Many players who are just a stone's throw away from their training grounds will still admit that the constant rush and run to training can often be tiresome and demanding. But here we have a girl who has to pack her gear, ensure she's eating right, train, study, drive and mentally prepare herself for a journey that will probably take her over two hours every night. Not everyone is made of that committed mettle, but Libby is.

What she brings to the Cork set-up this year is an insatiable work-rate. I've heard someone say recently that she is like Briege Corkery because she never stops and she never gives up.

I compared Briege to a Duracell bunny in the past, and perhaps Libby is the latest model. She possesses great energy in the midfield area and makes her presence felt.

Libby has been given the role of man-marking in the past and has succeeded in making it tough on her opponents. The physicality she has gained through football has added an aggressive and solid dimension to the centre of the field and alongside Aisling Thompson, they are a formidable force.

Libby never shies away from a tackle and will need to bring an endless amount of work-rate if Gemma O'Connor (injured in the semi-final win), as we all fear, is definitely out for the final. It looks like that centre back position will be filled by another and the demands on the midfield area will be at a premium.

Both Orla and Libby will fly the West Cork flag in Croke Park on Sunday and they'll do our region proud, and hopefully we'll be celebrating Cork senior and intermediate success - both teams are capable of bringing All-Ireland titles back her to Cork.

cider in which Kilkenny put paid to Cork's three-in-a-row bid with a four-point victory, and of the National League Division 1 Final, which went the Noresiders' way too. There were just three points separating them at Semple Stadium but just as in September, the sense was that the victors were more comfortable than the margin suggested.

Add the fact that they are now one step from a fourth consecutive national title, a 'Double-Double' and there is no doubt that Ann Downey's side have established themselves firmly as the undisputed number one outlit of the game.

That will rankle with Cork, not least because they have failed to sparkle in those last two major clashes, due to a combination of Kilkenny's quality and their own under-performance. Being accustomed to a place on the top step of the podium, they will want it back.

Neither side pulled up trees in their Semi-Finals. A portion of this can be accredited to the longer lay-offs (five weeks for Cork, four for Kilkenny) compared to facing teams buoyed by quarter-final triumphs a fortnight previously but it would be wrong to minimise the efforts of the players and managements of both Dublin and Galway in terms of performance and tactical application.

Kilkenny did not have it all their own way in the group phase, needing a point from 2016 Player of the Year Denise Gaule to escape with a share of the spoils against Clare in Nowlan Park on July 1.

As has been customary under a management set-up that has always learned lessons from mild setbacks, and a roster that has applied them well, they came out the next week and were full value for a five-point win over Galway in Athenry that helped cement their direct progress to the last four.

They got off to a perfect start against Dublin with a goal from a penalty by Gaule two minutes in, but were still only five points clear by the time substitute Jenny Clifford sent a rocket to the Dublin net in injury time, having struggled with the high intensity and physicality of the Metropolitans, and the direct running of the likes of Siobhán Kehoe

The Stripeywomen's much vaunted attack spluttered and there were only glimpses of the counter-attacking game from deep that has yielded such dividends.

Many of those will be smarting from quiet outings last time out and it is reasonable to expect a response.

Whereas the Cats ground it out in the second half in their semi-final. The teams play similar styles, attempting to cut off space in their own halves and to create it in the opposition's. harnessing the speed at their disposal to fashion scoring opportunities.

What measures might be taken to neutralise the opposition strengths will be intriguing. We cannot wait.





Rebels out to skin the Cats

NEXT Sunday will see Cork's senior carnogie stars taking to the Croke Park turf for their fourth All Ireland Final in a row looking to win back the O'Duffy Cup from holders Kilkenny.

The repeat of last year's show-piece game, which saw the Cats take the title for the first time in 22 years, will afford the Rebels the chance to exact helty revenge on the side that broke Leeside hearts this time last year.

After seeing off perennial challengers Galway in the semi-final Cork will go into this one full of the joys of life, but they will be well aware of how difficult it is to depose reigning champions when they make it back to the final showdown.

Cork are led on the pitch this time out by the legend that is Rena Buckley who is going in search of what would be another record for All Ireland medals won. Buckley's

attributes on the pitch will be vital if Cork are to win back the crown however her off field presence will be every bit as influential as she and the management team look to keep focus and calm among the younger members of the squad.

Manager Paudie Murray will also play a major role in the preparations before Sunday's throw in while also playing his part as the game progresses through the inevitable twists and turns.

Cork are going to be without some stars from previous years however the loss of centre back Germa O'Connor to a knee ligament injury during the semi final win could be the biggest of them all.

O'Connor was having another brilliant year and was looking to be a shoo-in to contest for her 10th senior camogle All Ireland medal, but unfortunately that won't happen this time around.

Kilkenny are looking to make it four severely punished on Sunday as Kilkenny major titles in two years as they aim to have plenty fire power up front which will

Ann Downey's side beat Dublin by eight points in the semi-final 2-11 to 0-09 without ever really dominating so there is little doubt that this side have another gear or two to go to.

keep adding to their tally from the first to the final minute.


Cork's defensive pack will also need to be on song if they are not to be over run but this weekend the middle third will be crucial.

Cup tour showed importance of camogie to the county

As someone who has been there and done that you might think there's nothing Ann Downey hasn't seen in the camogie world before.

However, the acclaim her all-conquering senior camogie team got from the county after last year's final was something else!

They hadn't had that reaction before," she said of the players who brought a camogie senior All-Ireland title home last September. "The Cup tour was still going around to clubs and schools after Christmas we had to put a stop to it to concentrate on the new

"The respect the players got from everyone, no matter where they went, was something else. They realised how much camogie meant to the people of Kilkenny. It was equally as important as hurling - I think it softened the blow of Kilkenny losing the hurling the week before."

Getting their hands on the silverware and ending a 22-year wait for success was a just reward for the effort the team put in. For Downey, now in her second stint as senior manager, a professional approach has paid off.

"I can only compare from the time I was with the team before," she said, speaking at the media night in Nowlan Park ahead of this year's All-Ireland final.

They were very young,

but the team certainly has matured. Our whole set-up has become so professional, from having Dr Mark O'Brien with us - we never had a doctor with the team before to physical trainer Liam Egan and Dr Fergus Heffernan.

"He really instilled a belief in the girls that they were good enough to win," she added. "He told them that so often that they began to believe in it and look forward to the big day rather than fear

It's not just behind the scenes that Kilkenny camogie has undergone a change. The alterations are mirrored by onfield actions.

PROFESSIONAL

"The game have become so much more professional," the manager said. "When we were playing we used to go into Delaney's for chips on our way home after training and sometimes the training would be so hard you wouldn't be able for the chips!

Now, the game is totally professional. Noreen Roche, who is the dietitian with the senior hurling team, has been great with the girls.

They really listen to her while we might be telling them things when they hear it from a professional they take it in. The players are all caught up in maintaining a good regime, even in the off-season."

"When the players see what goes on in hurling and professional sports that manifests itself into the

camogie world," offered selector Conor Phelan. "If they want to stay at the top they have to do all the strength and conditioning work, as well as working on diet and nutrition."

The hard work continues in the fight for places. Success has bred a competitive attitude into the team.

"There competition for places in the panel," Downey said. "We have 36 players in our panel. Four are injured they are still part of the panel, still part of whole set-up on matchdays."

Keeping the injured players involved is a huge gesture, one that ensures the panel's bond remains intact. **GREAT PLAYERS**

In fairness the girls who are there are all great camogie players," she said. "Their careers aren't going to end just because they are out for a

"It's devastating for any player to get an injury, worse still if they were to be cast aside. We find that the girls are happy to be involved, to be there to help out on the day. It makes the injury a little easier to cope with."

Having the players close by was also valuable from a medical point of view.

"Three of those players had cruciate injuries," said Dr Mark O'Brien. "You're talking eight to nine months from operation to return to play.

"What we found this year that after the injury occurred we were able to get the injury dealt with and surgery lined up fluidly.

These players benefitted hugely from prehab-which is before they had surgery - so they get the physio done through the team set-up, have their surgery and then their rehab, which is done under the team supervision.

"That must surely speed up the recovery as well as helping to build up morale," he added. "We would be expecting those three players to be back for the beginning of next year."

While next year may be out of reach for the injured players, the rest of the panel are gearing up for a crunch

game against their old foe.

"Cork are a great team who have set the standard for so many years that you'd hope you can raise your game to their level," the manager said. They had been going for three in a row last year so they will be looking for revenge this time.

MAN! Quilty calls for strong support to cheer Cats on

It's hard to believe but after waiting so long for a senior All-Ireland camogie medal, it took a few days before Michelle Quilty fully appreciated she finally had

"After waiting so long it was a surreal feeling," said Quilty, who captained the Cats to the O'Duffy Cup last year. "You wake up the morning after the final and even though you've won you still don't fully believe it.

"It doesn't really kick in for a week or so, when you're at home and it hits you that 'yeah, we've won the All-Ireland'. It was a great feeling to have."

Now, the Mullinavat player wants to get that winning sensation all over again. Yes, there was time to celebrate ending the 22-year wait, but the desire to get back to the training ground was a key reason behind Kilkenny's successful return to this Sunday's decider in Croker.

"There are all the duties and commitments that come with winning, but after that it was a case of draw a line under the celebrations and start preparing for the 2017 championship," she said. "It was a clean slate; we all knew that the cup wouldn't just be handed to us, that we had to work hard if we wanted to win it again. Once we came back as a group everyone was so focused on the year

While Quilty prefers to keep a low profile her long career at senior level, not to mention captaining the All-Ireland champions last year, has raised her status in the game. However, she was quick to point out that this isn't a sole role.

"I'm probably one of the older players on the team now, although I wouldn't like to admit it," she said with a laugh. "I have a fair few years behind me, but the players who have been there over the years have brought a new level to the game in Kilkenny. The strength behind this team is unreal.

We have a number of leaders on the team," she added. "They are different; there are the more vocal ones who do the talking, while you have others who go out and spur people on through how they play the game.

T've been there for a number of years and have that bit of experience. I prefer to stay calm and go about my business, but it's good to be there to offer advice or encouragement to the younger members of the panel.

"That can be helpful, especially around final time. People can get nervous before big games but the pitch has the same four white lines, it's still 15on 15you might be playing in a bigger stadium but you have to block that out and play your normal game."

Camogie is enjoying a new lease of life in Kilkenny, helped by the success the

senior side has enjoyed of late. That has brought the game to a new level - the media night for the All-Ireland in Nowlan Park proved that.

It has also been helped along by a performance-related deal with Glanbia, similar to the one enjoyed by the hurlers. as well as the ticket deal offered for both the under-21 and camogie All-Ireland finals. For the players, it's been a boost.

"The professionalism has increased and there's greater awareness around the game now," she said. "The deal that the County Boards are doing at present, bringing the sports together to sell the joint ticket for the hurling and camogie finals, is something that wouldn't have been done before. The profile and awareness of the game is greater than ever."

A greater profile for the game could only be good for players, Quilty reckoned.

The more spectators and support we have for the final the better it will be," she said. "Often there are times in games when you need that support to drive you on."

It seemed that camogie fought for recognition for so long, but that's changed in recent years.

"That's come with the awareness that surrounds the game today," she said. "Having the semi-finals live on television was a good way to bring the championship to people who may not have gone to games."

The bigger crowds have witnessed some top class performances from the Cats, something the team has appreciated.

Our championship game against Clare was held here in Nowlan Park before the senior hurlers played Limerick," she recalled. *Come the second half there was a bigger crowd but even from the start there was a lot of interest in the game to see what we were all about.

"Winning the All-Ireland last year has brought more attention for the team, while the hosting of double-headers by the Camogie Association has helped to drive things on."

Now for the 2017 All-Ireland final and a meeting with Cork, a team Kilkenny know inside-out!

"We've played them so many times that you'd know all the individual players by now," she said, "Cork are a formidable side; the amount of All-Irelands they won and titles they've put back-to-back takes great strength in depth in a panel, which is something they've showcased over the last number of years.

Their ability to win an All-Ireland and then keep that hunger and drive going the following year takes some doing. They are a strong side; Paudie Murray will have them all ready to go for the final.

"They'll be a strong test," she added. "It'll take everything we have to beat
