THE EIGHTIES

EACH decade observes change, transformation and innovation, The Eighties were no exception. Perhaps the most noticeable change occurred in the leadership of the Camogie Association.

For several decades, the Association has been served by people of the utmost dedication. Within a few years, a new set of faces replaced the long-standing officers on Ard Chomhairle. Sheila McAnulty, Ard Runai since 1952, retired from the post when the idea of a full-time secretary was mooted.

She was followed into retirement by Lily Spence, who had served as treasurer for many years. In 1981, the Camogie Association lost the great Sean O'Duffy, who had given a lifetime of devoted service to the game. Two years later, he was joined in heaven by another truly outstanding official, Agnes Purcell.

The stability which the Association enjoyed for many years disappeared. It did not help that the Association had three full-time secretaries in as many years. Jo Golden, Seamus McAleenan and Anne Sheehy filled the new post for short periods. This lack of continuity ended when Sheila Wallace decided to make a career of the position.

On the playing fields, Cork started

the decade in sensational fashion. Their county teams swept the boards winning All-Ireland senior, junior and minor titles. Killeagh won the Club Championship and North Presentation carried off the All-Ireland Colleges senior titles.

Instead of Cork consolidating their position, their feats seemed to awaken Kilkenny from their slumber. These two counties shared the honours in the senior grade with Kilkenny taking the larger share. The names of Angela Downey, Ann Downey, Bridie McGarry, Liz Neary, Clare Cronin, Pat Moloney, Cathy Landers and Marion McCarthy will be remembered for many a year.

Honours were more evenly distributed in the junior grade. Cork, Galway, Kildare, Clare and Louth had their moments of glory. Miriam Malone, Vivienne Kelly, Clare Jones, Maura McNicholas, Irene O'Leary and Bernie Farrelly hit the headlines. Cork produced great minors in the early part of the decade and Kilkenny did likewise in the closing years. Deirdre Costello was the most talked about colleges player as St. Raphaels, Loughrea created record after record.

Kilkenny proposed to make significant alterations to the game

itself. They experimented with fifteen aside on a full sized hurling pitch. However, Congress did not go along with their proposed changes. The playing pitch was widened and the duration of inter-county matches extended.

Limerick re-vamped the rules of the C.C.D. But the competition failed to progress and remains a very poor second to Scor. Much time was taken up by the controversial topics of insurance and membership fees. Derry, Limerick and Tipperary reverted to the junior ranks.

A new crest for the Association was designed. It forms the centrepiece on most of the medals now presented. A second Coaching Book was published. The Isle of Man Tournament became established and London returned to the championship.

In her secretary's report to the 1980 Congress, Joe Golden strongly urged the counties to write their history. She aimed at having a camogie library/museum set up in time for the G.A.A. Centenary in 1984. However, little progress was achieved. The task takes on a new significance in the Nineties. This job must be completed in good time for our own Centenary in 2004.

Kilkenny seek former glories

PRESENTATION, Kilkenny make a welcome return to the All-Ireland Colleges scene on Saturday when they face St. Raphaels, Loughrea in the semi-final of the senior championship.

Pres. Kilkenny won the championship in 1969 and 1970 with a team which included Liz Neary, Helena O'Neill, Carmel Doyle and Teresa O'Neill all of whom became outstanding senior players with Kilkenny.

Pres. Kilkenny have produced fine players in the meantime but never enough to make up a winning com-bination. The recent bination. The recent upsurge of underage camogie in Kilkenny which resulted in two All-Ireland Minor titles has provided an abundance of good players for the colleges teams.

Pres. can call on six players from the winning Kilkenny panel. Siobhan Holden, Orla Ryall, Gillian Dillon, Siobhan Dermody, Patricia Treacy and Siobhan Dooley will need to be at the peak of their form to dethrone St. Raphaels.

St. Raphaels have ruled the roost in colleges camogie since 1985 winning senior and junior titles at ease. But like all champions they will no go on forever. Four key players, Triona Dolphin, Imelda Mahar, Bridget Fahy and Aide.. Murphy from their 198 team, have finished

The remaining eight have been strengthened by



players moving up from their winning junior side. St. Raphaels can still put a very formidable team on the field which includes Imelda Maher, the Keanes and the Hardimans,

St. Patricks, Maghera won their third Ulster Colleges senior title in four years last Saturday when they overcame Loreto, Letterkenny in atrocious conditions. On Saturday, they play host to the Munster champions, Scoil Mhuire,

It was difficult to assess the merits of Maghera on their Ulster final form as the rain lashed pitch ruled out good camogie. Hopefully, conditions will have improved dramatically to allow Roisin McCluskey, Mary McGrellis and Helen Mulholland show what they are capable of.

Scoil Mhuire, Cashel ran St. Raphaels to five points in last year's semi-final. With practically the same team available they hope to do better this season. They impressed against Midleton in the Munster final

Last year Cork travelled to Down and were de-feated, so no doubt the Leesiders will be very anxious to reserve that

The selectors have made a number of changes from the side which fielded against Limerick in November. Margaret Aherne from Fr. O'Neills and the Dunlea sisters, Jackie and Stephanie from Cloughduy, come into the side for the first time. Jackie is named at right corner-back, Lynn takes over at right corner-for-ward in place of the unavailable Fiona O'Driscoll, while Margaret Aherne comes in at midfield.

Maria O'Brien from Inniscarra stands between the posts, Evelyn Healy will be at full-back with Una O'Connor filling the left corner-back position. Scoil Mhuire, Cashel:

Though the game of camogie has been played for many years in Scoil Mhuire, Cashel, it was only in the 1970's that the School hit the national headlines. Full credit for this revival and promotion of camogie in the School must go to Mr. Willie Prendergast, Sr. Máirín McGrath and Sr. Mary Brennan. All three have long departed from Scoil Mhuire and are dearly missed.

From humble beginnings around 1973 success came quick and fast with the winning of the all-Ireland Junior title in 1975. By 1979 the School had won two junior and two senior all-Ireland titles with many great games against Athenry along the way.

Scoil Mhuire returned to their former glory in 1989 when they won both Munster senior and junior titles. Today's final is all the more interesting as it was Loughrea that defeated Scoil Mhuire in last year's semi-final. The present panel of Schoil Mhuire players enjoy the game of camogie very much and win or lose today they will continue to play bringing honour to the town beside the Rock.

St. Raphaels, Loughrea:

Much of the credit for making St. Raphaels a great camogie nursery goes to Sister Catherine who worked so hard in the early years to establish the game on a sound footing within the School. The Clubs in the catchment area of the School concentrate heavily on underage players. As a result excellent material presents itself in First Year.

St. Raphaels captured a Connacht double in 1982 and two years later they brought off the All-Ireland Junior crown. In 1985 St. Raphaels set out on a remarkable run in the All-Ireland Senior Championship. They have extended their winning sequence to five titles and stand to stretch it to

St. Raphaels are renowned for producing players with a very high level of ball skills. The know-how of hurling coach, Cyril Farrell is invaluable in bringing the best out of the players and guiding them to victory.

St. Brigids, Callan:

Camogie in St. Brigids goes back a long way. The first school team was established in the late 50's and the school won the Leinster Colleges title in 1961, 1962 and 1964.

The mid-seventies saw another upsurge with the School reaching the All-Ireland Colleges Senior final in 1975.

St. Brigids won the Leinster Senior B competition in 1988 and reached the Senior A final this year.

Many of the school players have gone on to play at inter-county level and the 1989 Kilkenny
Senior team had six past pupils of St. Brigids on its "five in a row" victorious team. The present
junior panel contains daughters of some of the team members of the sixties.

St. Patrick's, Maghera:

Over the past ten years St. Patrick's have come to the fore in colleges camogie in Ulster. Since 1980 they have featured in 15 finals at varying age levels and have won eleven of these. Their first success came in 1980 at junior level but it was in 1987 that they had their greatest success — winning all but one of the main competitions within Ulster ie. Senior, Junior, U14 and Sevens. Since 1985 St. Patrick's have had a team in at least one final per year, but it wasn't until 1989 that they reached their first All-Ireland Final. They lost to Kingpins St. Raphaels Loughrea. 1990 sees a return to that level and with four of last years team still available it is hoped that this years team will taste success.



ONGRESS at Navan was a low key affair. The absence of controversial motions, suggested alterations to playing rules or a presidential election left routine matters to fill the agenda. Monaghan's Mary Lynch chaired the meeting as Uachtaran, Maire Ni Cheallachain was recuperating from major surgery.

The meeting admitted that Gradam Tailte, Camogie's Superstars Competition, had not been the success which was originally envisaged. Apart from Angela Downey, Bernie Farrelly and a few others, well known players did not treat it seriously.

Mini camogie, an adopted form of the game, was voted by Congress to replace Gradam Tailte. Played indoors with covered sticks and a soft ball, the modified game will be viewed as a winter activity. Inter-Club competition five-a-side teams will proceed right up to All-Ireland level.

There was solid support for Wexford's motion to introduce an All-Star Camogie team which will play the All-Ireland Senior Champions annually. However, before giving final approval, ground work such as obtaining a sponsor will have to be undertaken. The meeting stressed that the scheme would have to be properly organised.

Some time ago the G.A.A. sought a meeting with the top officials of Cumann Camogaiochta na nGael with a view to a closer liasion between the two organisations. However, Dublin withdrew their motion regarding a possible affiliation to the G.A.A. It was felt that it was much too soon to put such a motion to

While exploratory meetings have taken place between key officials of both organisations no concrete proposals have been put forward. Discussions will continue and the Camogie Association will view the merits of the proposition in time.

It has been a matter of concern for some time that no junior county has made the breakthrough to the senior ranks for some time. Some junior counties have qualified for entry to the senior championship in the past two decades including Down, Derry, Limerick and Louth. None of them made the grade and all reverted to the

Congress discussed this problem at length and the suggestion of an intermediate grade, which was put forward by the Commission, received an airing. The gap between the top junior sides and the likes of Kilkenny and Cork is huge. Within the junior grade itself there is a disparity of standards. Kildare, Armagh and Limerick are streets ahead of Laois, Fermanagh and

An Intermediate Championship would attract the stronger junior sides and groom them as potential seniors. The removal of the better teams from the junior grade would

give the weaker teams a realistic chance of success.

St. Raphaels, Loughrea stretched their already impressive record to six All-Ireland Colleges Senior Championship titles. The County Galway side looked as skilful, competent and well-organised as any side to emerge from the famous nursery.

however as the real test comes on Sunday.





Kilkenny completed a National League 'double' over great rivals Wexford on Sunday last when the counties met at Bellefield, Enniscorthy for the camogie senior final. However, despite defeat, Wexford's performance drew a great deal of pride and optimism from all who had come to watch and the hot favourite Barrowsiders lived on their nerves for a while before finally





The teams enter the final with different credentials. Cill Chainnigh are the All-Ireland champions and have held the title for the past two years. A hat-trick of titles is very difficult to achieve at minor level where the age limit necessitates a high turnover of players.

Three titles in succession have been won on two occasions by Cork. If Cill Chainnigh succeed today, Orla Ryall and Bridget Mullally will join a select band of Corcaigh players, Sandie Fitzgibbon, Jean Paula Kent and Paula Carey, who hold three All-Ireland medals.

Tiobraid Árann won their first Munster Minor title in 1981 when Jenny English, Triona Bonnar and Breda Kennedy, all future senior players, were in the side. Eight years later, Burgess, Cashel, Moycarkey, Portroe and Toomevara produced a talented crop of young players who won Tiobraid Árann's second Munster title in impressive fashion.

Both teams have very strong connections with colleges camogie. Jovita Delaney, Marita Tobin, Róisin Nash and Neassa O'Dwyer helped Scoil Mhuire, Cashel, to win the All-Ireland Colleges Sevens last April. On the Cill Chainnigh side, Siobhán Holden, Siobhán Dooley and Orla Ryall won Leinster Colleges Senior medals with Clochar na Toirbheirte, Cill Chainnigh.

There is no guarantee that a great minor will make a good senior player. However, one player who has already bridged that gap is Bridget Mullally. She was brought into the Cill Chainnigh senior team for the National League and helped the team to ultimate success.

Tiobráid Árann agus Cill Chainnigh met in the corresponding match at Semple Stadium, Thurles, last August. Play flowed up and down the field in thrilling fashion in the opening half. Cill Chainnigh led by 2-7 to 2-4 at the break.

Cill Chainnigh switched danger girl, Bridget Mullally, to full-forward with devastating effect. She picked off delightful scores from play and placed balls to leave the outcome of the game in no doubt.

Tiobráid Árann have learned from that experience. They retained their Munster crown with more than something to spare. They proved superior to Doire in all departments in the semi-final.

Cill Chainnigh impressed in their Leinster campaign but came under great pressure from An Ghaillimh in the semi-final. The absence of St. Bridget's star, Sinéad Millea, was a severe handicap.

Whether the final whistle will salute Tiobráid Árann's first All-Ireland Championship title or mark Cill Chainnigh's three-in-a-row, the attendance will be treated to a feast of exciting, skilful camogie.



Historic trip to ew York for Cork

camogie players and eight officials will embark on an historic trip to New York on October 9 next. The trip is the result of an invitation extended to the Cork and Kilkenny senior teams by the Young Ireland's Camogie Club of New York as part of their 30th Anniversary celeb-

The Young Ireland's Camogie club was formed in 1960 at Gaelic Park, New York and this progressive club has promoted Irish culture and gaelic games in that city over the past 30 years.

They organised the rst international first camogie match on American soil in 1972 when Thurles Camogie Club played Young Club played Young Ireland's at Gaelic Park with a return game in Golden, Co. Tipperary in

This will not be the first time that Cork camogie players have left their native shores to play the game. As far back as August 1934, Lee Hosiery travelled to play

a London XII in Dagenham and a Tara Selection at Catford.

And in 1973, Old Aloysians and UCC flew to Amsterdam to play exhibition games in Bussom and Leiden. But this is the first time that a Cork team has travelled to America and the party is eagerly looking forward to the trip.

They will fly from Shannon to Kennedy Airport on October 9 and their programme will include games against Kilkenny (a repeat of the 1989 All-Ireland final) and a New York selection.

Financing the tour, which ends on October 24, is no easy task for the fund-raising committee. For months they have been running various schemes to raise the necessary money and now they have produced a commemorate brochure, which they hope will add further to their funds.

The brochure "Cork Camogie Players American Tour 1990" was compiled by National PRO.

Mary Moran, and was launched in the City Hall by former Lord Mayor, Chrissie Aherne, as one of her last official duties.

In the 55 pages of the booklet, Mary has covered an enormous amount of Cork camogie activities and as well as being a totally absorbing read, it has to be a must for anyone interested, vaguely or otherwise, in the game of camogie.

Cork camogie team is New York bound

A CORK camogie team is New York bound later this year for a historical trip where they will play the All-lireland champions and old rivals Kilkenmy and a New York selection in exhibition matchs there.

These will be part of the Young ireland Camogle Clubs 30th

anniversary celebra-

Financing the tour has proved a major burden for the Cork party, and numerous schemes have been undertaken. One of the most ambitious of these is the production of an excellent commerative brochure which is selling at £2 and is available from any of the County Board officers or team players.

The first Cork club formed was a Northside one, which operated from the Blarney Street area and was called Fainne an Lae.

The new club was captained, according to the booklet, by Kate Conlon, an aunt of Bean Ui She, who was a President of the Cork camogie Board. The players wore an olive green skirt, white jersey with turned down collar and olive green tie.

The players practised in a field owned by a Mr Murphy of Gurranabraher.

The Walsh sisters left the club when they went to reside in Blackpool where they formed a new club, Clan na nGael. Ellish, who married Tomas Mac-Curtain, Lord Mayor of Cork, captained the team.

Other clubs were soon formed in other areas and the game grew in strength, as more and more women became involved.

Where colleges camogie was concerned, again it was a Northside based school which was the first to introduce the game. This was St Angela's College, Patricks Hill, which was soon joined by the Ursuline College in Blackrock. Both schools later turned to hockey with great success.

In 1914 the game spread to Drishane Convent, near Millstreet and later that year the first colleges competition was organised in Cork.

Scoil Ite, an Irish speaking school, South

Presentation Convent, Drishane, St Angelas and Blackrock participated.

Lady members of the Gaelic Club in UCC formed a camogie club in 1913 and entered the intervarsity competition two years later, for which the Ashbourne Cup was first presented.

The All-Ireland championship was inaugurated in 1932, but it was not until two years later that Cork entered the arena and won the title in 1934, with Kitty Delea of Muskerry accepting the trophy, as captain of the team which beat Louth in the final

In an eight year period, Cork won the title six times and so it has continued to the present day, with the county always being a force to be reckoned with at all times.

The booklet is well worth the £2 cost and in buying it you help sense the Cork players to New York for a most prestigeous tournament.

TIPP'S HOUR OF GLORY

TIPPERARY participated in the first All-Ireland Championship in 1932 but had to wait almost sixty years to attain their first All-Ireland title. On the last Sunday of July, a talented group of youngsters in blue and gold made a long cherished dream of the county's supporters a reality.

But those supporters had to survive a pulsating finish before Tipperary secured victory. Chasing their third title in as many years, Kilkenny did not surrender easily. In typical fashion, the champions came back with a late flourish and came very close to catching Tipperary.

Tipperary laid the foundations of victory in the opening half. Jovita Delaney was excellent from placed balls and young Ciara Burns worked her way through the Kilkenny defence to score a vital goal.

Kilkenny made little impression against the wind and found themselves ten points in arrears at the break. No Kilkenny team concedes easily in a final. They fought back to within a score of their opponents but were unable to get an equaliser or winner.

Chrissie Kennedy played bravely in the Tipperary goal. The half back life of Roisin Nash, Marita Tobin and Sinead Nealon was the foundation of victory. On the whole, Tipperary played the more attractive camogic but the tendency to overdo picking the ball on the wet sod proved costly at times.

The loss of Sinead Millea, who won the All-Ireland Colleges Junior title almost single-handedly for Callan, was a huge blow to Kilkenny. Bridget Mullally created consternation in the Tipperary camp each time she gained possession and Vanessa Butler's searing runs towards goal signalled danger. But a number of the Kilkenny players did not reach their usual high standard on the day.

Wexford gave their supporters great heart for the future with an excellent display in the National Senior League final against Kilkenny at Belfield. Playing with great spirit and commitment, they matched the champions in all aspects of the game except finish.

Ailish Kavanagh made several top class saves in the Wexford goal. She was covered by an excellent defence in which Tina Fitzhenry, Elsie Cody, Catherine Murphy and Stella Sinnott curtailed the Kilkenny attackers and limited them to a single goal.

Captain, Ann Reddy lead a hardworking midfield which supplied good ball to the forwards. If Wexford can improve their scoring rate, they will be more than a match for any side in the country. Dublin stand between them and a place in the All-Ireland final. If they reproduce the form which they displayed in Belfield, they must qualify for their first final since 1977.





Addicted to the GAA's poor relation

BETTY Joyce freely admits she suffers from an addiction - one which has to be fed every day. In fact she has been getting her fix regularly for the past twenty years without any attempt to rehabilitate herself.

Betty's is not an unusual addiction, she loves a sport, and she has given her body and soul to that sport camogie, since she was ten years old.

She has been involved in all aspects of camogie from playing, to coaching and refereeing, and it has been her abiding passion for that game which has made her continue all these years. With a full time job and a full time hobby she is rarely home at weekends and sometimes leaves her East Cork home for work at 7 30

a.m. and doesn't return until 11 p.m. after training.

"I'm like a drug addict, my enthusiasm for the game has never waned in those twenty years. I love it. There is no way I can describe what I get out of camogie and why I keep going, I just do," says Betty who began her playing career with the local Killeagh Club in East Cork.

A highly successful and respected camogie player and referee at both local and national level she has won practically every award in the game except for the All-Ireland Senior title which has cluded her for years. But after Kilkenny's win against Cork last year, when Betty captained the losing team, she now accepts that it will probably be the one honour she will not receive.

Betty has got a lot of joy from the game of camogie but she has also given a lot. She grew up in Mountunisack, a rural area in East Cork and "despite the best efforts of the headmaster began playing hurling with the boys because there were only two girls in my class."

She used to play herself at home "hitting the sliothar off a wall for hours on end." She began playing competitively at the age of 16 and was on Cork County teams since then. After a devastating injury in 1984 when she was "sidelined" for two years she got involved in training and refereeing and she is still in these despite playing at local and county level.

She thinks it is very important to give commitment to the game, not just to train and win but also to help the younger players and to ensure the continuation of the game.

This is a major fault in camogie in this country, according to Betty. Too many of the players who have been involved in the game are retiring and forgetting all about it, unlike football and hurling where players continue to be involved in the game and like Billy Morgan go on to become coaches.

"A lot of players just play, win, and walk away and they put nothing back into it." Betty has been putting something back practically since she started but she says that women like herself are

difficult to find in the game. "We are probably our own worst enemy in a sense."

She would like to see camogie having a stronger position in the country, but reckons there will have to be a lot of changes before that happens. It is a minority sport and certainly the poor relation within the GAA. She says tht while the organisation is not chauvinistic there could be improvements.

Unlike their male counterparts camogie players do not get paid expenses for attending training and matches. It is the same for camogie referees who are only given a "pittance" for travelling miles to bigger matches. Teams have to practically "beg, borrow and steal" for sponsorship.

She would like to see camogie games played before large football or hurling games to show crowds how good it is to watch a game. The game is in a bit of a rut at the moment and people are unwilling to rock the boat, says Betty.

But at this stage the player who has dedicated her life to camogie feels that maybe she has done everything she can already and will have to make some key decisions over the next few months. "Sometimes I think Betty, you era is gone, your time is over.' I'm not saying that I am going to retire, but I do have some decisions to make."
