The score sheet at the conclusion of last night's opening game of the Munster Camogie Championships at the Cork Athletic Grounds readily indicate how Cork's skill and experience told so heavily in their favour against Waterford.

Cork's side, most of whose members were on the victorious team against the Combined Universities again blazed very impressively in all sectors, while the forwards really knew the most effective route to the opposing goal.

Yet, what the score sheet tends to hide is that this Waterford side shone much better than the margin suggests, especially for a time in the first half when they managed to set on level terms with their far more experienced opponents. Lack of experience, in fact, is probably the big drawback at the moment of this Waterford team, for some of the players were together for the first time last night, and the team are only competing in these championships for the second year.

The side, however, had some fine individual players, chiefly J. McNamara in the back line, G. Power at midfield and N. McCarthy and E. Browne in the attack. These provided the main strength of their side in their own sectors, but it would have taken highly organised teamwork to have any prospect of matching strides with this Cork combination, which looks really strong in all departments.

The defence had a comparatively quiet evening, and the midfield work was mainly devoted to backing up the attack. Here Misses A. Crotty, N. Duggan and M. Joyce were formidable scoring trio that gave the Waterford defence little respite, where Miss Mooney did a lot of fine work in goal, despite the margin recorded against her side.

Scorers for Cork were A. Crotty (3-0), N. Duggan (2-5), N. Deane and M. Joyce (1-0 each), and for Waterford, A. Browne and T. O'Meara (1-0 each), and N. McGrath (0-1). The half-time score was 3-2 to 2-1.
