
CAMOGIE GLORY?

The holders seldom tooked like retaining their title as UCG made use of a strong wind to run up a 3-3 to 1-4 haltime lead.



COLLEGES CAMOGIE:

An all-Tipp Munster Final

Camogie's equivalent to the famed Harty Cup final takes place in Kilcoleman on Saturday when for the first time ever two Tipperary schools compete in the provincial colleges senior final. St.

FEB. 1994 Mary's, Nenagh line out against Scoil Mhuire, Cashel and this happy state of affairs for Tipp camogie reflects magnificently on the state of the game in the Premier county.

Nenagh's emergence to the big time was inevitable, following the great runs of their junior squads in recent years. Indeed on Saturday week, the juniors line out against Charleville in the Munster final ... at the same venue .. and this will be the fourth successive provincial final for the juniors victories in '91 and '92 having led them on to All-Ireland success on each occasion.

The fruits of these successes are now showing themselves in senior grade as Sr. Mary's have made it to the senior final for the very first time.

Semi-final exits have been their lot in '92 and '93 and interestingly the champions of those years, St. Patrick's Cork and Charleville came to be victims of the Nenagh side in this year's all-conquering rising to the challenge magnificently and recording a 4-7 to 0-6 victory.

Most of the Nenagh side have vast experience in the Tipperary jersey and the Nenagh nursery has played a major role in providing players that have earned Tipp two recent All-Ireland minor titles. One of the team, Suzanne Kelly was chosen as Tipperary camogic player of the year, a great achievement for one so young.

More good news for Nenagh is the fact that Ciara Burns, who has been out of the game for two years with a serious knee injury, is back in training. An extremely talented player, Ciara would grace any camogie pitch with distinction, as indeed she has done both with St. Mary's and with the Tipp minors, winning All-Ireland medals with each and having the distinction of captaining the Tipp minor side to national success.

It is likely that Ciara will start Saturday's final but should her services be required, she will, no doubt answer the call with accomplishment, as she did two years ago in Tullamore when returning again to action after an injury in the drawn All-Ireland final against Maghera, Derry. It was her introduction that enabled St. Mary's earn a second chance, a chance that was gratefully availed of in the replay.

Saturday's final was to have been played in MacDonagh Park, but moves to the Burgess pitch because of the Tipp v Galway NHL game on Sunday week.

IT'S an all-Tipperary final to the Munster College Senior camogie championship at the GAA Field, Nenagh this afternoon (2.30) when the local St. Mary's take on Scoil Mhuire, Cashel.

St Mary's have enjoyed a deal of success in recent years at Junior level, winning a number of Munster and All-Ireland titles, but the Senior crown has cluded them.

Cashel are back in the Senior final after a lapse of four years. They have been in-volved in camogie since the early 70's and in that time have won four Munster and two All-Ireland titles. To reach the final Cashel had to overcome Fethard and Templemore and have a good blend of skill and strength. They will be relying on the likes of team captain Madeline Bulfin, Ann Barry, Patricia Fitz-gerald and Carol Moloney to see them through against St. Mary's who will be the favourites.

It has been a memorable year for St. Mary's as they will also be involved in the Munster Junior final, against Charleville, next Satur-day (Feb. 12).

The Senior side will be contesting their first final at this grade but they have a wealth of talent, mainly composed of the back to back winning All-Ireland junior sides of 1991 and 1992.

At the beginning of the competiton Nenagh found themselves in the toughest half of the draw as they had to face last year's Munster champions, Charleville, and the previous year's title holders St. Pat-rick's, Cork. Having beaten Scarriff in the opening round, they then faced Charleville and beat the beat the holder's 6-5 to 1-5. In the Munster semi-final they had a 4-7 to 0-6 win over St. Patrick's.

Nenagh are a very talented team with most of the side having inter-county experience at Minor, Junior and Intermediate. Susan Kenneally and Ciara Gaynor were on last year's Tipperary's All-Ireland winning minor side while Suzanne Kelly, Marie Ryan, Noelle Kennedy and Aine Hogan have Intermediate experience with the county.

Nenagh have the talent to take their first senior title but Cashel will make them fight all the way.

St. Mary's emphatic grip on Munster title

St. Mary's, Nenagh 5-9; Scoil Mhuire, Cashel 1-0

The status of St. Mary's, Nenagh in the annals of Munster colleges camogie was well and truly signified at Kilcoleman on Saturday afternoon, when in the first ever all-Tipperary provincial final, they came out clear-cut winners over Scoil Mhuire, Cashel.

It was all too easy for the Nenagh girls, once they settled down and while it took them ten minutes to notch a score, such was the dominence they exerted in the opening minutes, that it was only a matter of time before the floodgates opened.

Always playing with confidence, St. Mary's displayed a greater sense of urgency throughout and their skill and scoring knowSIXTEEN WIDES

It may be a cause for worry in the St. Mary's camp as they prepare for the All-Ireland semi final against the Leinster champions on Marth 12th., that they shot no less than sixteen wides in the fifty minutes. It is also a clear indication of how superior Nenagh were, and while the winning of their fist ever title in the grade is

sounded, both from players and supporters, showed how coveted the provincial senior title is.

OUT OF DEPTH

While Cashel tried hard, they were out of their depth and seldom did they launch an attack. Their only score came seven minuts before the break and it was something of a scrambled goal from Michelle Bulfin, when St. Mary's keeper Susan Kenneally failed to clear away the ball from around the muddy goalmouth.

It was a tribute to both sides that the game should have been played with such determination in conditions that were hardly suitable for classic camogie. The Kilcoleman authorities came to the rescue of the St. Mary's team....who had home venue....in the unavailability of McDonagh Park, because of next Sunday's N.H.L. game between Tipp and Galway, and everything was as smooth as to be expected from the park committee.

It is also to the credit of both teams and indeed to referee Bernie O'Dea that there should have been only three frees in the entire to St. Mary's, Noelle Kennedy pointing. Cashel were awarded another just befor the end.

Though it was a cake-walk for Nenagh, nevertheless the marvellous potential in this side could not be mistaken. Playing plenty of free-flowing hurling, their striking was invariably relieving and showed the result of those hours of practice under the guidance of Ger Dullea and Geraldine Bourke.

The backs were never seriously threatened but showed their style when called upon. Similarly at mid field, there was strength and quality in abundance and of course the attack lead their opponents a merry dance with some excellent scores.

THREE SUBS

Realising the game was wellover long before the final whistle sounded the St. Mary's mentors introduced three substitutes in the final quarter. A very satisfied Sarah Madden left the field having notched three goals to be replaced by Grainne Shanahan. There was a great cheer when Ciara Burns trotted on some miutes later, to get her first feel of

how left the luckless Cashel girls floundering. It was 3-3 to 1-0 at half time and there had been nothing to suggest in that first half, that Cashel would raise their game sufficiently to cause a rampant Nenagh side any serious problems.

More than adequate in all sectors. St. Mary's were especially lethal in attack with Sarah Madden, Aine Hogan and team captain Noelle Kennedy continually causing headaches to a beleaguered Cashel defence. The supply of ball fothcoming from the mid field area was always plentiful, from none more so than Alison Lawlor who gave a brilliant display of striking and with Niamh Bonar and Ciara Gaynor provided an impregnable area that in turn left the defence with little to worry about.

Camogie World By: P.J. FULHAM

n the Camogie scene this week we focus on Clare. Camogie was founded in Clare by Michael Hennessy of Clooney, the then Secretary of the G.A.A. Board to mark the Golden jubilee of the G.A.A. in 1934. There were eight clubs affiliated. Sean O'Grady, Creesheen, then T.D. for Clare presented a Cup for the League competition.

Clooney became the first county champions in 1934 and continued to dominate the Championship throughout the '30s and '40s. They also held the O'Grady Cup until 1945.

and '40s. They also held the O'Grady Cup until 1945.

Clare played their first inter-county match against Kerry in the Munster Championship at Ennis in 1934, with victory going to the Kingdom. Defeat was their lot the following year when they played Cork after which they withdrew from inter-county competition until the '40s.

Clare won their only Munster Senior Championship title in 1944 when they defeated Tipperary on a score of 3-1 to 3-0. Chris Markham of Clooney was the outstanding player on that memorable occasion and was responsible for all her county's scores, with the winning point coming from a thirty yard free with virtually the last puck of the game. Dublin proved too strong in the All-Ireland semi-final.

After 1945 there was a constant stream of immigration among Camogie girls which stripped clubs of many of their finest players with the result that camogie barely existed.

1958 saw the revival of the game in the Banner County when an enthusiastic group of delegates from eight clubs gathered at Ennistymon in a bid to organise and re-establish camogie.

Kilfenora dominated the competitions for the next decade, until Eire Og of Ennis came on the scene and won the first of their twelve Championships in 1968. In

the meantime the county team were giving a good account of themselves, with many promising displays in both League and Championship. In 1974 they secured their first Munster Junior title when they defeated Limerick by one point. They ousted Galway in the All-Ireland semi-final and went on to win their first All-Ireland Junior title at the expense of Dublin on a score of 3-2 to 3-0.

Seven years later in 1981 Clare won their second All-Ireland Junior title by defeating Antrim 3-2 to 0-7 in the final. After their initial success in 1974 they were graded Senior

After their initial success in 1974 they were graded Senior and took part in the Senior League ad Championship. After drawing with Wexford in the opening round of the Championship they went under in the re-play. Wexford went on to win the All-Ireland.

In 1986 Clare won their third All-Ireland Junior title when they recorded a 1-13 to 3-4 victory over Kildare. They won the All-Ireland Intermediate Championship last year by defeating Dublin on a score of 1-8 to 1-5.

Sixmilebridge were the dominant club of the '80s when they won their first Senior title in 1983, after which they went on to win eight county Championships in a row and one Munster title

Wolfe Tones, Shannon won their first Championship in 1978. In all they have five titles to their credit and are the current champions.

The County Board runs sixteen competitions from Under 12 to Senior to cater for the needs of its twenty two affiliated

clubs. At inter-county level they field in Minor, Junior and Intermediate as well as Feile na nGael and other competitions.

On the Colleges scene Shannon Comprehensive won the All-Ireland Senior title by defeating St. Raphael's, Loughrea in the final in 1982. Ennis Vocational College won four All-Ireland titles in a row in the '80s. Much work is being done at primary and post primary schools level where coaching and competitions are organised. Kitty McNicholas was the leading light behind the success of schools camogie which she started in 1974 and which now boosts twenty eight primary and eight secondary schools.

Kitty is County Board Chairperson, also delegate to Munster and Congress. She is a prominent referee having had charge of the 1987 All-Ireland Junior final between Armagh and Kildare and All-Ireland Colleges finals in Senior and Junior. She is Chairperson of the National referees committee. Kitty played at centre field on Clare's winning team in 1974 and her daughter Maire captained the victorious 1986 team.

Behind Clare's success in recent years is a band of hard working officials, who have giving their time willingly to the organisation and promotion of camogie. They include County Secretary Bridie Hehir, Vera Hennessy, Maura Sheedy and

Liz O'Sullivan.

Fr. Michael McNamara of Shannon has given an enormous contribution at club and county level over the past two decades. Kevin Twomey has also been instrumental in training county teams and together with Fr. Michael tasted success with the 1986 All-Ireland Junior team and last year's All-Ireland Intermediate victory. This success will boost the Banner County's moral and should be a force to reckon with in future.

In the Munster Senior Colleges final played at Kilcolman, Nenagh recently, St. Mary's, Nenagh had a

Rita Moran, former All-Ireland medal winner with Antrim has brought them on significantly in the last few years. They drew with St. Mary's, Nenagh in the All-Ireland Junior Colleges final two years ago and narrowly lost out in the replay. It is possible that those two schools with practically the same teams could meet in the Senior final this year.

In Leinster the Senior is at a semi-final stage. The pairings are Loreto, Kilkenny v St. Brigid's, Callan, the holders, and Mercy, Enniscorthy v Borris V.S. In Junior Mercy, Enniscorthy, are through to the final, while Loreto, Kilkenny and Beaufort, Dublin meet in the semi-final.

his week we take a look at our national game in Louth. In the very early years of the Association Camogie was played at various venues throughout 'The Wee County'. The first County team was affiliated in 1928 and has been active ever since. When Leinster defeated Connacht in the 1928 Tailteann game final there were two girls from Darver club on the Leinster team: Nan Boyle and Rose Quigley.

In the 1932 Tailteann games the Louth team were selected en bloc to represent Ireland against Great Britain in a camogic match played along with a football match Ireland v America. The Louth girls had a very easy victory on a score of 4-5 to 0-0. In the Inter-provincial final that year Leinster defeated Connacht 7-1 to 1-9. Nan Boyle was again on the team and a very promising young player from Darver Kathleen Hanratty was also selected and scored 4-1 of Leinster's total.

They won the Leinster Senior Championship in 1934 by defeating Dublin, Kilkenny and Meath in the final 7-3 to 5-1. They went on to beat Galway in the All-Ireland semi-final 2-3 to 2-1 and lost to Cork in the final 4-3 to 1-4. Leinster Senior champions again in 1936 after defeating Dublin, 5-4 to 4-1 and in the All-Ireland final in Croke Park on a score of 6-4 to 3-3 1939 again brought success at Leinster level accounting for Meath 8-2 to 4-1 but were knocked out by old rivals Cork in the All-Ireland semi-final. The next year they retained the Leinster Championship title with 7-6 to 2-2 win over Kildare in the final. The All-Ireland semi-final played at Darver again saw the girls from the 'Wee County' play second fiddle to 'The Leesiders', the score 4-3 to 1-5.

They were re-graded Junior in 1962 and won the Leinster Junior Championship, qualified for the Intermediate final and lost out to Wexford 3-4 to 2-2. In 1964 they met the same fate against the same opponents. Kilkerly won the Leinster Junior club Championship in 1977 defeating Dunboyne, Meath 3-2 to 1-2. The following year St. Anne's kept the Leinster Club Championship title in Louth when they overcame the Kildare champions Cappagh in the final 6-4 to 2-0.

Leinster Junior champions again in 1980 and defeated by Tyrone in the All-Ireland semi-final. In 1981 they reached the National Junior league final, and were defeated by Cavan in a re-play by 0-2.

1982 was their year of glory after accounting for Laois, Wicklow and Carlow they secured Leinster honours by defeating Kildare in the final 1-10 to 2-4. They overcame Galway in the All-Ireland semi-final by two points, and faced Cork in the final in Croke Park. It was a thrilling match with Louth winning its very first All-Ireland title by the minimum score 1-7 to 1-6.

The man with his shoulder to the wheel over the years is Peter Hoey, who has given a lifetime of service to camogie, as an Administrator and trainer. Three years ago he stood down after spending twenty years in the Chair. For ten of those years he was joined by his daughter, Bernadette as Secretary. His hard work and dedication was rewarded when he was elected Chairman of Leinster Council. Peter is currently on the Management Committee of Central Council and County P.R.O.



CAMOGIE COMMENT

Outgoing President can look back on her term of office with pride

Camogie President, Bridin Ui Mhaolagain will step down following three eventful years at the forthcoming Congress in Howth. Elected in Blarney in 1991, Bridin enjoyed her term of office. A sociable character, she particularly relished meeting new faces all over the country.

A native of Antrim, she lived in Dublin for a long time. Best known for her Third Level and U.C.D. connections, the former President of the C.C.I.A., took leave of absence from her teaching job to devote herself full-time to the role of President. Not surprisingly, she clocked up considerable mileage in attending meetings, matches and functions.

Bridin presided over the introduction of the Intermediate Championship, the new Rule Book and the fifteen aside experiment. She used her office to collect sizeable funds for the Goal charity and to encourage the use of the Irish language where possible.

As one former U.C.D. Ashbourne
Cup player completes her presidency,
another takes office. Kathleen Henry of
Derry was recently elected as Uachtaran
of the All-Ireland Post Primary Schools
Council. Kathleen captained Derry to
win their first All-Ireland title in 1969
and returned to Croke Park in 1978 as
coach to enjoy another Derry success.

Annual Congress will elect a new President of the Camogie Association. At the time of writing, there are two hats in the ring. Belle O'Loughlin (Down), who ran a close second to Bridin in Blarney, will contest the position with Phyllis Breslin (Dublin). Both have chaired their provincial council and refereed All-Ireland finals.

As usual, the announcement of the 1994 Open Draw put the focus on the 1994 championship. Champions, Cork received a bye in the opening round. Arch rivals, Kilkenny are based in the

same half of the draw. While Clare should benefit from their success in the Intermediate Championship, it is unlikely that they will trouble Kilkenny unduly.

While Cork recorded victories over Kilkenny in the past two years, they would be foolish to believe that they hold the upper hand. A last minute goal to which Kilkenny had no time to reply was all that stood between winning and losing in 1993. Kilkenny will be ever so keen to reverse that decision. A showdown at Ballinlough will be a crowd puller.

On their performance in last season's final, Galway should account for Kildare in the opening round. Dublin and Wexford clash in a first round game. Both sides will be anxious to improve on their 1993 championship performances.

1994 will be a vital year for Galway. They contested All-Ireland senior, junior, minor and club finals last season. Their skilful senior side will have learned from their Croke Park experience and must feel that the clusive O'Duffy Cup is within their grasp.

Sponsorship will be a live issue at Congress. It is obvious that the views of sponsorship within the Camogie Association have altered considerably since its introduction was first muted some years ago.

There was a definite reluctance to display sponsor's name and logo on playing gear and, consequently, camogic lost out where other sports reaped. The size allotted to the sponsor's message on camogic jerseys was so small that it could not be read from some yards away, never mind by a spectator in the stand. As a result, camogic was unable to take up profitable offers from willing sponsors.

The outlook has changed. Clubs and counties are aware of what is available to them in return for wearing lettering and logo of a readable size. The mood is right for measurable change on this issue.

In the senior decider, St. Mary's, Nenagh, who will be seeking their first title in this grade, take on Maghera from Derry (3.15) while Charleville, looking for their third Junior crown, will be opposed by Magherafelt, Co. Derry (2.00).

It will Nenagh's most important match since the game started in the school in the early eighties. The majority of the panel are were members of the successful 1991 and 1992 back to back winning All-Ireland junior side.

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#### TODAY'S FINALISTS

ST. MARY'S, NENAGH

St. Mary's affiliated to Munster Colleges for the first time in 1977/78. The game progressed in the School under the guidance of Joe Doran and present coach Ger Dullea. Nenagh won their first provincial title in 1981 when they were successful in the Intermediate Grade.

Nenagh made a breakthrough in 1991 when they captured the Munster and All-Ireland Junior Championship titles. They retained these titles in 1992 and added the All-Ireland Colleges Sevens.

St. Mary's, won their first provincial senior title this season with a side which includes seven All-Ireland minor medal-holders.

ST. PATRICK'S, MAGHERA

St. Patrick's have been one of the most prominent Ulster schools in recent times. Coached by Ann Kelly, they have won 5 Ulster Colleges senior championships and 5 Ulster Colleges junior championships since 1980. St. Patrick's, who recorded Ulster senior and junior championships doubles in 1987, 1990 and 1991, have won the full range of Ulster titles.

Maghera contested the All-Ireland Colleges junior finals of 1989 and 1990. Four of today's team have experience of the big day and will be hoping to make this occasion a successful one.

ST. MARY'S, CHARLEVILLE

St. Mary's have a very impressive record since camogie was introduced to the School in 1984. In addition to numerous Cork Colleges titles, St. Mary's have won 14 Munster Colleges titles - 3 senior, 4 junior, 4 seven aside and 3 First Year.

St. Mary's have five All-Ireland Colleges titles to their credit. In 1986 they collected their first All-Ireland Colleges junior championship title and retained their crown in 1987. St. Mary's enjoyed success in the All-Ireland Sevens in 1987, 1988 and 1993. Their coach, Vincent Harrington is Cathaoirleach of Munster Colleges Council.

ST. MARY'S, MAGHERAFELT

St. Mary's affiliated to Ulster Colleges in 1968. They contested a number of junior and senior Ulster finals from 1970 onwards. The first Ulster title came to the School in 1989 when the First Year side won out. They added the U14 title in 1991. In 1992, St. Mary's won the Ulster Junior Championship and contested the All-Ireland Final taking St. Mary's, Nenagh, to a replay.

In 1993, St. Mary's recorded an Ulster Colleges senior and junior championship double and reached the final of the All-Ireland Sevens. St. Mary's made it a hat-trick of Ulster junior titles when they won again this season.

## Kennedy stars in Nenagh triumph

A GLORIOUS chapter in the sporting annals of St Mary's CMS Nenagh was penned by the school's senior camogie stars in the splendid sunshine of Tullamore on Saturday.

Returning to the venue where they collected their first junior title two years ago, the Nenagh ladies made it a successful inaugural appearance in the senior decider, and in superb style.

It was Toomevara girl and captain Noelle Kennedy who led by example as she pointed her side in the right direction with a virtuoso performance which saw her account for all bar two points of her side's tally.

The half forward was in unerring form as she punished her opponents' indiscretions time and time again in a copy-book free taking display. And apart from her seven pointed frees, plus one from play, the Nenagh school's very own Captain Fantastic also gave her side the perfect start when she goaled after just six minutes — a vital score with Nenagh facing into the strong breeze in the opening period.

However, it was by no means a one-woman show by Nenagh. To the contrary; this was a victory borne from a steadfast and sturdy team performance in which every member contributed decisively to the success. From 'keeper Susan Kenacally to full forward Cira Burns, it was one marvellous galvanised effort as Nenagh worked tirelessly to ward off the threat of their opponents.

That noted, there was, nevertheless, some splendid individuality within the Nenagh ranks and apart from Kennedy, midfielder Cira Gaynor, daughter of former Tipperary great Len, had the true mark of quality as she became very much the fulcrum around which all else rotated.

Both Alison Lawlor and Niamh Boner worked hard in the midfield area as well, while in a defence which was not stretched to the limits at any stage, Suzanne Kelly was rock like at centre back and Marie Ryan, too, showed well.

Kennedy, of course, was the heroine up front but Aine Hogan, especially in the second half as she surged forward on solos time and time again; Sarah Madden and Cira Burns all worked themselves to a near standstill.

#### **FAVOURITES**

Having won the junior in '91 and '92, Nenagh were favorites going into this tie and, true to form, they justified this rating as they dominated their plucky, though outclassed, rivals for by far the greater portion of this game.

Maghera's best spell was in the opening five minutes as they pressed forward with the assistance of the fresh breeze but Nenagh would soon come to grips with the conditions and were settled by that goal from Noelle Kennedy after six minutes.

Whether or not Kennedy was shooting for goal is debatable, but what did seem a speculative shot was misjudged by the Maghera 'keeper and sailed into the back of the net from thirty yards.

It took Maghera some thirteen minutes before they finally got out of the scoring starting stalls, with Anna O'Loughlin, their impressive midfielder, pointing from a long range free.

It was Nenagh, though, who were creating the openings and by the twenty fourth minute of the half Noelle Kennedy had pointed them into a 1-4 to 0-1 lead after four successful frees.

Maghera, however, were not going to yield without a fight and singled that intention a minute into injury time when Karen McGrath goaled and thus the score - 1-4 to 1-1 - remained until the break, the whistle for which didn't sound, curiously enough, until the thirty first minute even though there were no injuries or hold ups in the half

However, it was all academic as the omens were certainly favouring Nenagh at this stage and Kennedy continued to punish her opponents misdemeanors, stretching the lead to six points - 1-7 to 1-1 - within just five minutes of the restart.

Anna O'Loughlin slotted over her second pointed free in the eight minute but this, ultimately, proved their last offering on the scoring charts.

From here on it was all traffic as Nenagh foraged forward almost incessantly but they failed to reap reward for their superiority in the remaining fifteen minutes or so, Kennedy, again, though Sarah Madden and Cira Gaynor managed to add to the tally, the latter's fifteenth minute point being a particular gem.

## Questions will be answered as St Patrick's hold Ulster hopes

#### Camogie Colleges' Final

HOW do you beat a team which includes seven All-Ireland minor medalists from last year? How do you defeat a team which was four goals down after 15 minutes of their semi-final and still won?

These are the questions which this week are occupying St Patrick-'s Maghera and St Mary's Nenagh coaches as they prepare for tomorrow's All-Ireland Senior Colleges final in Tullamore (3.15).

St Patrick's are only the seventh Ulster college to reach the All-Ireland senior final. Only one -Sacred Heart, Newry - has succeeded in lifting Corn Sceilg in the 25 years of the competition.

That victory came in 1971, in the third final, when Anne Rooney led the Newry cailini to victory over Presentation Mountmellick 3-2 to 2-2 in a replay. Sacred Heart had already lost the 1970 final to Presentation Kilkenny.

St Louis Kilkeel had two unsuccessful outings in 1972 and 74 – again against Presentation teams from Oranmore and Athenry.

Loreto Coleraine, with Sarah Quinn in outstanding form at centre-back, lost the 1978 decider by a point to Athenry.

The 1980s were barren years for Ulster with only St Patrick's Keady reaching the final in 1989. But they lost 5-9 to 2-10 in the highest scoring final to date against St Raphael's Loughrea, who went on to record eight titles in a row ending in 1992.

Appearing in the Junior final of 1989, and again losing to St Raphael's, were St Patrick's Maghera. Two of that side, Margaret McAtamney and Clare Scullin, will line out for Maghera on Saturday, with the former leading the team from full-back.

An intriguing aspect about this final is that a new name will embellish the trophy as a result. Neither the Ulster nor the Munster champions have been in a Senior decider – although Nenagh have already won two All-Ireland Junior titles, while Maghera's lot has been losing two Junior finals.

Will it be third time lucky for the South Derry school? Coach Anne Kelly is quietly optimistic.

"Obviously the manner of our semi-final victory gives anyone who saw it a lot of encouragement. The girls showed them that they are prepared to give everything for a victory.

"We have found it very difficult to get match practice in the intervening five weeks" explains the Bailinascreen club member.

"The weather has been terrible, but I think that a heavy pitch may suit us in Tullamore. We have won our two biggest games - the Ulster final and the All-Ireland semi - in heavy conditions against opponents who could possibly have
