

In 1990 they won the title, failed to Mullagh in the semi-final in 1991 after returning from a trip to America, but bounced back to regain their title last year. They will be hoping to make it two in-a-row when the oppose the Galway girls, who are the only side to beat the in a championship game in the last

The Glen, who have a very strong panel, including five of the team that helped Cork to their second Senior All-Ireland title in-a-row this year,

have won all their games by wide margins. In goal will be Mairead O'Leary, who has been showing very consistent form. In front of her will be Mary Ring, one of the great full-backs, and her long puck-outs have been a feature of the campaign. Deirdre McCarthy, at right half-back, played very well in Glen's victory over Lisdowney and will not leave the side down while Sandie Fitzgibbon will be at centre-back. Sandie had one of her best games ever when marking Angela Downey in the semifinal and that was after returning from a bout of flu. When the chips are down Sandie never plays badly and the Glen will be relying on her to get the ball up to the free scoring forwards.

On the left is club captain Diane Deane. A very solid defender, she can be relied upon to when

the going gets tough.

Midfield will probably consist of Denise
Cronin, Therese O'Callaghan and Patricia Murphy and this is a very strong sector. Denise received an ankle injury in the Interprovinicial championship game against Leinster in Clane, Co Kildare last Sunday but is expected to be fully fit. Therese O'Callaghan is the only real worry. She played with a hip injury in the semi-final and it has not fully responded to treatment. She did not train during the week but the Cork star told me she is "determined to play"

Patricia Murphy is a very determined player and will be in the thick of things around midfield. She had an outstanding game in the semi-final and a repeat of that performance will make it hard for the

Mullagh players.

Glen's strongest sector is their half-forward line which is made up of Linda Mellerick, Lyn Dunlea and Ger McCarthy and they are a real scoring machine. Linda Mellerick is great when running at defences to set up scores for her colleague while Lyn Dunlea's accuracy from frees and her all round ability has made her one of the most feared forwards in the game. This will be the first time Lyn has contested a final with the Glen and she will be hoping to add to her All-Ireland medal collection.

Ger McCarthy, one of the most experienced players on the side, has won every honour the game has to offer. She can get scores from either side of

the field and is a very hard to mark.

Clare McCarthy will probably be at full-forward. Although slowed down because of a serious knee injury, if she gets the ball in her hand she will be hard to stop.

What of the opposition? They won the title in 1991 and they have a strong panel composed mainly of players who have figured on the Galway senior and Junior sides this year. Galway have not enjoyed the best of luck this year, reaching the All-Ireland finals in Senior, Junior and Minor grades and losing all three. So, they will be hoping to make up for these disappointments.

Sheila Coen, Pamela Nevin and Imelda Hobbins figured in the Senior Galway side beaten by Cork while the Hardiman sisters, Deirdre and Emer, who were on the Galway Junior team are also in the panel. Add to this Brigid Fahy, a senior panelist, Cora Curley and Madge Kennedy, who were subs on the Junior team, and one can see that

they will not be easily beaten. The Glen team will leave Blackpool at 4pm today and stay overnight in Athlone before travelling on to Ballinasloe.

1993 became the third year in a row for a Fanaithe an Ghleanna player to captain her County Senior team. Like Sandie, Linda Mellerick brought Corn Ua Dubhthaigh back to Coreaigh.

Cinderalla Sport ...?

LEGEND has it that hurling can be traced back to the princely figure of Setanta. But what of camogie - what golden-haired Amazonian princess back in the mists of the Celtic past can be said to be its founder?

I shall continue to believe in such a princess, even if the scholars tell us that camogie can claim no such figure as its titular head.

And even if camogie never had a princess, it deserves one. Indeed, the modern game has had its share of bright stars (golden-haired and otherwise), each in her own way a princess of the green sward.

The names come tumbling fast - from Kitty Buckley to Kathleen Mills to Una O'Connor to Betty Sugrue to Liz Garvan to Marion McCarthy to Angela Downey.

And I venture to suggest that if camogie wasn't the poor relation within the GAA's family of games, these names would be better emblazoned on our nation's sports pages.

Why it remains something of a Cinderella sport under-recognised, under-promoted, under-sold, under-appreciated - is something of a puzzle. Unlike hurling and football, camogie rarely gets the media attention it deserves, even on big match occasions.

Yet its practitioners, its supporters and all those officials, trainers, coaches, selectors, number when taken together in excess of the population of a city such as Waterford.

There is scope here for many things by way of promotion, by way of making the sport more accessible, by way of proper recognition for its best and brightest stars.

The effort, the level of dedication, the commitment shown at club level is often on a par with anything seen in the areas of hurling or football. And the skills displayed are equally impressive

the skills displayed are equally impressive.

I asked Joan Clancy (now Morley), who played with Old Aloysians and Cork, why camogie has such a low profile. 'I suppose it's partly because people in the media never gave it the attention other sports got, she said. 'And maybe we didn't push it ourselves either, not as much as we should have done'.

This is also the view of Anne Delaney (now O'Donovan), who played with the Glen from 1972 to 1990. 'We could all be doing more for the game, because the sacrifices that are made, the time and effort that's put in by the girls is just as great as in other sports'.

To say they are deserving of more support at a number of levels is to state the obvious. But if it's that obvious, then why isn't it happening? A degree of apathy, certainly. I wonder what kind of a result you would get, for instance, if you took a poll of all the sports editors in the country and asked them to list camogie on a scale of one to ten?

I suspect it wouldn't even get on to some lists. Sponsorship is one area where I feel camogie doesn't get the breaks it deserves. Maybe there is a selling job to be done here by the people who organise and run the sport.

No less a person than President Mary Robinson has remarked on this when she spoke at the 1991

Bank of Ireland GAA All-Stars Awards in Dublin. She said she was disappointed that the contribution of women to Gaelic sports was not acknowledged at that banquet.

'I hope it will not be too long before this whole area is given the attention that it merits, that the role of women in Gaelic sports is properly recognised, and that their activities are more vigorously publicised and promoted,' said the President.

The Camogie Association was founded in 1904between now and its 90th anniversary in 1994 perhaps a campaign can be organised to give the sport a new profile.

For starters, such a campaign would have the blessing and support of President Robinson. And that can't do any harm.

THIS is the year of the 'double-double' - a landmark year for camogie in Cork

Two All-Ireland titles were recaptured, and in impressive style. Cork defeated Galway at Croke Park in September by 3-15 to 2-8 to retain the O'Duffy Cup.

And last weekend in Ballinasloe, Glen Rovers wiped out Mullagh (winning by 6-12 to 0-2) to hold on to their All-Ireland Club Championship title. This dual achievement adds another chapter to the glorious history of camogie in Cork.

Long one of the great camogie counties, Cork's position at the pinnacle in the 1990s has been graphically underlined by the 'double-double'.

For the captain of the Cork team, Linda Mellerick,

Fantastoc Moment

That moment when I received the cup in Croke Park is something I'll never forget. It was fantastic,' she says. It is a word she also uses in relation to her team-mates, not just her four Glen colleagues, but

She was critical of the absence of the Lord Mayor, and described the city's welcome as a 'damp squib. Today, the 21-year-old forward doesn't have any regrets about her remarks.

Left Down

'I said at the time that if Cork had won the All-Ireland hurling final there would be at least 20,000 out on the streets. The media coverage was very good, but the turnout did not happen. We were very disappointed at the time. 'And I still feel very strongly that we were left down by the public. I think we deserved better'

Linda, who joined Glen Rovers in 1988, admits that when she was at school she was 'crackers' about soccer. 'I used to play with the boys all the time'. But the switch to camogie was the best thing that ever happened to her.

And if she has strong views about the public perception of camogie, she also has strong views about the game itself. 'I think we should be using the full playing field, not the shortened version as at present. 'I also believe we should use 15 players as in hurling, instead of 12 as we do at the moment'.

Getting Better

As for the public's perception of camogie, she admits the game has got a higher profile in the last few years. 'We're getting better media coverage, but camogie as a game still doesn't sell itself.

'People who come to watch, especially men, are often surprised at the level of skill on display'. A much better and wider appreciation would make her very happy. 'We give a lot - we don't get the rewards or the appreciation we deserve, though I'll admit things are moving'.

But helping to retain those two All-Ireland titles for Cork and the Glen would provide the greatest happiness. 'All the girls are going to take a good, long rest now, but after Christmas, we'll be winding up again for the 1994 season'.

Treble-Treble

So will it be three-in-a-row for Cork and the Glen? 'I'd love to see it happen', she laughs. 'Maybe this time next year we'll be talking about a treble-treble!"

CAMOGIE at senior level is thriving in Cork at the moment, thanks in no small way to Glen Rovers who were instrumental in bringing two All-Irelands to the County for the second year in succession this vear.

They captured their first All-Ireland Club title in 1986 under the captaincy of Mary Ring when they defeated Club specialist's St Paul's of Kilkenny in the decider.

They were back in 1990, with Therese O'Callaghan at the helm to regain their title. Mary Ring was again captain in 1992 while Diane Deane accepted the trophy from Uactafan Cumann Carnogáiochta na nGael, Břidin Úi Mhaolagain last Sunday.

IT would appear that the phenomenal success of the Glen Rovers Camogie Club was having a detrimental effect on the future of the other senior clubs in the county, if the tone of the annual Cork county convention held, at Pairc Uf Chaoimh yesterday, is any indication.

During the course of a lengthly debate on a Sarsfields motion, many of the senior clubs voiced the opinion that the strength of the All-Ireland champions was making it extremely difficult for them to maintain the interest of their

The Sarsfields motion sought to set up an "A" and "B" senior championship for the coming year and it received huge support. In proposing the motion, Marie Kearney said the strength of the Glen was making it impossible for other clubs to maintain an interest.

There is no motivation for clubs who draw them in the championship to train. They (the Glen) are just too strong for the rest of us", she said.

Mrs. Goggins the Na Piarsaigh delegate, said that this year's county final was just a glorified exhibition match and was degrading for the losing team. I left their All-Ireland semi-final game against Lisdowney simply because it was too one-sided, he added.



Armagh Secure First Junior All-Ireland

The Junior final was the curtain raiser between Armagh, the National Junior • League champions and Galway and was a • pulsating affair. For Galway it was a dream • come true to be contesting two All-Ireland . finals on the same day. For the second time in the history of the All-Ireland Junior

Championship, inaugurated in 1968, the final ended in a draw. On the other occasion in 1989 Galway were also involved, but lost the replay to Kildare.



Cork And Tipperary Retain Their Titles Firsts For Armagh And Clare A Cause Of Great Celebration

II-Ireland Senior Camogie Championship final day in Croke Park was one with a difference. It was the first final staged without a supporter in the Cusack Stand, as demolition had started. Cork and Galway were taking part in the 62nd senior All-Ireland final. The only previous meeting of these two counties took place, at a time of international upheaval in 1939 and '40. Both finals were played in Croke Park with Cork taking its fourth and fifth titles. Galway share with Dublin the distinction of contesting the first two All-Ireland finals in 1932 and

Cork, the holders, were appearing in their 29th All-Ireland decider. They are next to Dublin on the honours list, having won on fifteen occasions. Galway have contested eight All-Ireland senior finals, but have never won the O'Duffy Cup. It was 31 years since their last appearance.

The Leesiders, having lost the inaugural 15-a-side National League final to old rivals Kilkenny, faced them again in the championship semi-final in Nowlan Park, and after a thrilling encounter. Cork emerged winners by the narrowest of margins 5-10 to 2-18. Galway had three points to spare over Wexford in their semi-final outing in Ballinasloe on a scoreline of 5-7 to 2-13.

Team Performance

In the final Cork overcame the youth and enthusiasm of Galway with an impressive performance and a winning margin of ten points. After a closely contested first half the Leesiders led by two points at the break, 1-7 to 1-5. On the turnover the Champions seemed to find form and were soon in top gear with particularly strong contributions from goalie Kathleen Costine, Lynn Dunlea, Colette O'Mahoney and the industrious Captain Linda Mellerick. who afterwards was presented with the player of the match award. Final score: Cork 3-15 - Galway 2-8.





'Stop verbal abuse of referees'

"THE failure of team officials to 'nip in the bud' abusive language towards referees is one area that we will have to get to grips with if our games are to prosper", said Bernie O'Dea in her chairman's address to the Munster Camogie Convention held at the Imperial Hotel, Cork yesterday, writes Brendan Larkin.

The problem is at club level where unfortunately it appears to be accepted as normal, and when these players are chosen on their county teams, they continue to be abusive toward referees.

"Team mentors and trainers will have to take responsibility and stop this practice.' We are losing very good referees because of the abuse, and we at Munster Council are not going to tolerate this type of behaviour and lack of discipline amongst young players.

"I would appeal to referees to put the rules of our association into practice and send these people to the line for the duration of the game. If the people in charge are not willing to take action, then maybe by banning the players for the remainder of the game will make them (the players) think twice before they attempt it again", she said. The chairman also referred to the image of camogie. "Counties are continuing to imporve this vital area of our association. It is very evident when you see girls and mentors in the uniformed dress, and I hope this improvement will continue.

"Sponsorship is a big financial boost to all counties and clubs, but I would appeal to you all to keep, the logos within the regulations specified", she said.

Many items were discussed at what was a lively convention. Among them were the encouraging of the promotion of camogie in Kerry, and greater recognition for the grass-roots of the game, namely the women who have to organise house and home before giving commitments to training, playing and administration.

There was only one change in the officers. PRO Orla Flynn (Waterford) did not seek re-election and her place was taken by Marie Kearney from Cork. The full list of officers for '94 is as follows:
