MEATH'S second team captured the All-Ireland Junior B camogie title at Cloughjordan on Sunday and a spectacular Lynn Winters goal early in the second-half was the crucial score in a magnificent victory over Kerry that completed a remarkable double for the Royal County as the u-16s also won (see page two).

It was also a double of another kind as Meath also won the Junior B grade in 2009 with what at that stage was the county's first team.

IT'S always quiet in the weeks leading into an All-Ireland final.

# Mills deserves to get great honour

Shefflin. Kay began her playing career with Dublin at the age of 14, winning her first All-Ireland medal in 1942 and her last in 1961. She captained the side in 1959.

She was a player noted for her athleticism, fantastic skill level and was a superb ambassador for camogie. In addition to her All Ireland medals, she won 20 Leinster Championships, six Dublin senior County Championships and four Inter-provincial medals. She was an automatic choice on the 'Camogie Team of the Century' chosen in 2004 and was inducted into the Cuchulainn Hall of Fame. She was also an accomplished soccer player, gymnast and table tennis player.

Her medal collection is currently on display in the GAA museum Croke Park while in 2011 a plaque was unveiled at her place of residence following a joint initiative of the Inchicore/Kilmainham heritage committee, Dublin City Council and the camogie association.

The camogie association and Dub-

lin camogie board, with the permission of George Hill, husband of the late Kay, request all involved in camogie to support the proposal to name the new bridge in her honour, an appropriate tribute to this iconic Dublin sports woman.

I remember having the honour of being the first recipient of the Kay Mills O'Duffy Cup replica in 1997.

George wanted to do something for the association in memory of his wife and donated a substantial amount of money.

The initiative was undertaken that for 10 years the winning captain of the All-Ireland senior champions would receive a sterling silver replica of the All-Ireland cup in Kay's honour.



Between football, camogie and basketball, Kildare star Roisin O'Connell hardly has time to stand still but this week she'll only be thinking about one thing as she prepares to play in Croke Park

## LIFESTYLE CHOICE

At the moment, I have a camogie match on a Monday night, then on a Tuesday night it would be normally football. On Wednesday and Friday you are with the county, I'm supposed to be in Johnstownbridge on Thursday night but I have to take a break somewhere. On Saturday morning, I'm normally over in Johnstown and maybe have a match with the county and on Sunday I'm with the county again. I'm pretty much out every day of the week. In school, I'm training teams there as well. My basketball training with Ballyroan Mavericks is also due to start back this Wednesday but I've told them I can't go near them until we are finished with the All-Ireland.

SPORTING CHILDHOOD

My love of sport started with me going around to matches with Mammy and Daddy, they played squash, table tennis, hurling, football, Mammy played hockey in Laois as well. They kind of had a foot in everything, Daddy had horses as well, so I couldn't escape it really. So I was very well trained as a young one and I really enjoyed, I had it in school too because I was lucky enough to have Michelle Aspell coaching me basketball all the way through primary school so that's what kicked off the love of basketball. I didn't take up camogie until I was in transition year. I would have been tipping around in the back with Daddy or Mammy or Miriam or whoever else was there. When Daddy was refereeing I would be out with him pucking around at half time but I never played competitively until I started playing minor football with the county and that's where I met Clodagh Flanagan and that is how I got to Johnstownbridge.

In school all the way up basketball would have been my number one sport, I was playing football as well they would have been the main ones but

badminton had to go.

I was quite skilful as a young

one so the only thing was the playing around people. I found the hooking and the blocking very daunting for a while and that was what I had to get used to. I had all the skills but I just had to get used to doing it with people around me and to get used to doing it under pressure. I suppose the hand eye co-ordination from the badminton would

I'm very bad for using the foam rollers, I should be using them but normally I'll go to the swimming pool, that's where I do my main recovery session. I'll do my

## NUTRITION

I'm always very conscious of what I am eating. I'd have my usual meal but I'd change it around depending on whether I have a match or training. On a normal day I get up and have porridge and then in break time in school

I'd have my nuts and my fruit but if I am training that night I'd have my big dinner at lunch time and then have a little snack before the session and then eat again after that. I do have a sweet tooth but I do try to watch everything I eat. Because a lot of the matches are at 2pm at the moment, I'd normally have a bowl of porridge on the morning of a game with some mixed nuts in it and

homemade brown bread with scrambled egg.

#### THE FUTURE

When the county finishes we'll probably continue on with the club, the club have big aspirations so hopefully we'll be going until the middle of October and probably a little bit after. Then there is the basketball as well. Once the county finishes we'll probably go to three nights a week with the club so I might get one or two extra nights to myself but it will still be busy.

Next summer I am planning to go travelling because to be honest I think I need a break from the inter-county scene because I am at it for the last couple of years and I just think I am at the stage where I need a break. I would never give it up but I would maybe take a year out, maybe. It's tough going, it's emotionally and psychologically stressful because I'm a PE teacher in school and I'm on my feet all day there training teams during the day and after school. I'm flat out in school and then I go from one busy schedule to whole different life in the evening. I think I'll have to take a rest at some stage next year but it would be only a break for a short time, I might go away for the month of June or something like that. I do plan to do that because you have to get a balance between your work life, your social life and your sporting life and there has probably been times in the past when I haven't got the balance right.

It's not just on the male side of the family where O'Connell's sporting brilliance lies because Róisin's mother was also voted onto the Kildare camogie team of the millennium. Nuala Malone captained Kildare to Leinster success in 1969 and 1981 and the proud mother will be in Croke Park on Sunday to see her daughter follow in her footsteps by running out on the hallowed Croke Park surface.

As Nuala recalls, they were very different times back in 1969.

"It was a different game altogether back then. We had no dressing rooms, we just got changed at the side of the pitch, throw all the clothes in a bundle and get on with. We had no transport back then either. I lived in Allenwood but was playing for Rathcoffey so whoever was the secretary of the club at the time would come and collect me at the bridge in Allenwood. We were all the same back then, nobody had transport. In fact we used to ride bicycles to some of the matches. Transport was lot different back then, there were ten of us in the family, eight lads and two girls and our father was a Bord Na Mona worker. Money was to rear the

"It was just an ordinary game that happened to be in Croke Park, there was no such thing as a fuss or anything like that. You brought two hurls, got your lift to Croke Park and that was it. Kildare played three matches against Louth in Croke Park that day and we were the only ones to win. The hurlers and the footballers played and lost and

then we won our final in the third of the games in the evening. That was 27 July, 1969. It was all the old stand there at the time. It was Croke Park and we were delighted to be at Croke Park but when we won there was no such thing as celebrating, we just came back to Lawlor's Hotel in Naas which was there at the time. That was the only time we got a cup of tea and a sandwich after a game, not like they have nowadays when they get their food after training

and matches. We never got nothing like that."

12 years later, Nuala again captained Kildare to Leinster success although that final wasn't played at Croke Park. There were also O'Connell family links to the 1990 team that lifted an All-Ireland Junior title with Nuala's sister-in-law, Miriam Malone, captaining the team.

Should Kildare emulate the '69 team and lift silverware at Croke Park on Sunday, the celebrations are likely to be a little more raucous than back in those innocent times.

"It's great for the whole lot of them and it's going to be great for us," said Nuala. "Myself and Jack played at Croke Park so it will be great to see Róisin follow in those footsteps. Not that we were pushing her towards that, don't get me wrong, she has done it all herself. We do encourage her but sometimes she thinks that encouragement is giving out to her. Everybody we are talking to on both sides of the family is talking about going now. We'll have to wait until Sunday to see who turns up but it's going to be a great occasion for them."

It's an occasion that Róisín is determined to enjoy but is equally determined to return home with a trophy. The team was in Croke Park last weekend to take a tour of the ground which will hopefully help with any nerves that might kick in.

"We just had a look around," said. Roisin. "We saw the Liam McCarthy Cup and we were in the dressing room that we will be in next week. We weren't allowed on the pitch but when we were looking out we said that if you just focus on the goals and the pitch it's just the same as any pitch.

# Cats can deliver camogie success

Despite Kilkenny's prominence in the hurling world over many decades it was 1970 before the county contested its first All-Ireland camogie final.

That game ended in bitter disappointment following an eleven point loss to Cork. The same county was also to the fore two years later when Kilkenny was again defeated, this time by four points.

Despite those results the gap between the two counties was narrowing. 1974 saw the O'Duffy Cuparrive in Kilkenny for the first time when a team captained by Teresa O'Neill defeated Cork on a score of 3-3 to 1-5.

To date Kilkenny has won twelve All-Ireland titles. This, though, is a long way behind the two leaders, Dublin (26 titles) and Cork (24 titles).

Further titles followed for Kilkenny in 1976 and 1977 but it was the eighties and early nineties which was to herald agolden era for Kilkenny camogie.

Knowledgeable followers of the game will no doubt have differing view as to the greatest camogie team of all time but for certain that Kilkenny

squad which captured nine titles between 1981 and 1994 had incredible talent.

BARREN PERIOD

Many of the players from that period were also involved in the first three title successes. Since 1994 it has been a very barren period for Kilkenny camogicat senior level.

The county has contested four All-Ireland finals since 1994 losing each one. Cork took the honours on two occasions (1995 & 2009) and our neighbours Tipperary were successfulin 1999

and 2001.

Cork was by far the better team in 2009 when defeating Kilkenny by eight points. That de-

feat could yet have a lot of relevance next Sunday.

Kilkenny will now face different opponents in Galway. I have no doubt that the hurt and disappointment the players felt four years ago will be an important motivating factor next Sunday.

It is difficult to fathom why Kilkenny has not won an All-Ireland title since 1994. The standard in other counties certainly improved but in

truth it was also a case of Kilkenny losing its focus both on and off the pitch.

Kilkenny has enjoyed tremendous success at underage level in the past decade. This was not confined to the intercounty scene as Second Level Schools also enjoyed consider-

able successes.

DAY OF DESTINY

It has been a slow and frustrating process at times wondering if the young stars would finally make their mark. Next Sunday is their day of destiny.

In 2009 Cork was still a major force and Kilkenny had a number of inexperienced players in their team. It was a chastening experience for the

players but one that will hopefully stand them in good stead next Sunday.

The lore of the Leinster camogie championship may have lessened but Kilkenny's victory over Wexford some monthsagowas a defining moment. The belief and determination shown by the players since that day has been evident in all their championship outings this year.

A championship victory

over Galway some months ago should not lull Kilkenny into a belief that Sunday's final will be easy. It will be far from it.

be easy. It will be far from it.
Galway has its own motivation after suffering disappointing defeats to Wexford in the 2010 and 2011 All-Ireland Finals. The Westerners' underage policy is also paying dividends and with a number of experienced players in their side they will be formidable opponents.

Kilkenny showed plenty of heart and determination with a stunning victory over Cork in the semi. We witnessed a side growing in maturity and self-belief. Niall Williams and Graham Dillon know many of the players from their involvement with Third Level Colleges and they have worked wonders.

Galway also had an impressive win in their semi against reigning champions Wexford. They will be confident of winning another title to go with their sole success in 1996 against Cork.

Kilkenny has been on a mission since the start of the year. The players' moment of truth is at hand. They have the talent and determination to erase 19 years of disappointment. Go for it!

## FRIDAY PROFILE

HERE has been no public declaration, for that wouldn't be her way. But on Sunday, Therese Maher will play her last game for Galway

It will mark the end of an era and the camogie family in 31 counties will be hoping that the conclusion comes with a fitting exclamation mark. It says it all about Maher as a person and a genuine superstar of the game that Kilkenny folk would understand the sentiment,

The pursuit of that elusive All-Ireland medal has kept the 32-year-old going for exactly half her lifetime.

She has endured through the good, bad and ugly of Galway camogie, being recognised with four All Stars along the way and earning a nickname among her team-mates you're pretty certain she is uncomfortable with - The Queen.

The Athenry clubwoman, who began her career with the Shamrocks in her native Loughrea, is the David Brady of camogie. She has lost seven senior All-Irelands - five for the county and two with Athenry.

Yet it all began so well. A winner of U-16 titles in 1996 and 1997, she probably thought she was in for a medal-laden career. It didn't turn out that way and so, here she still is, railing against the tide, a controlled fury dragging her and the team back for one more year.

### RELEVANCE

Don't be mistaken, though. She hasn't overstayed her welcome. As her form in the semi-final victory over Wexford proved, she is still at the top. Her relevance is not confined to experience and leadership. She remains Galway's best player.

How has that happened? The competitiveness probably comes from being one of 11 children born to Vincent and Mary Maher. Therese was quickly inculcated in the ways of the caman and sliotar by her late

The brothers have won county titles. Two of her sisters, Dympna and Gretta, were members of Galway's sole All-Ireland-winning panel in 1996. Another sister - Imelda - was part of the squad that claimed a first league crown two years previously.

Therese just missed out on the All-Ireland, being brought into the panel in 1997 by Tony Ward, who in a neatly symmetrical quirk of fate, is back in charge and will oversee her final day.

Sharon Glynn, who along with Maher, is considered one of Galway's greatest players, was a well-established national figure by that stage, Glynn first saw Mahier as a 13-year-old and recognised the potential.

She recalls her making her debut as

She had not yet turned 16, was thin and lanky, and her helmet was too big. But she could play and had no fear.

"She was only a child," says Glynn. "But it was evident from day one that she would be a leader. She came on against seasoned campaigners.

The first ball goes into her corner -I can still remember it. She goes down after it. Picks it, takes on the player, takes a bit of timber and just didn't wilt with it at all. You knew she was a special player.

"She learned her trade very quickly and at 21 or 22, she was the backbone of Galway and you were looking up to her at that stage of her life. She always had that leadership quality and is a real team woman.

That year would mark the first All-Ireland loss though. Another would follow 12 months later and it was 10 years before Galway returned to centre stage. Glynn was manager in 2005 and made Maher captain as they won the league. But there were plenty of heavy defeats along the way. They hurt. But losing All-Ireland finals hurt more Maher was captain once again in 2010 and her blank expression and monotone post-match interview

answers is an all too vivid memory. She got married at the end of the year to David Donoghue and the speculation was that she would call it

at HQ the following September, giving an imperious display in her new position at centre-back, having previously done most of her work up front. It still wasn't enough though.

"We often say in Galway, if only we had two more Thereses," jokes Glynn. No 6 is her best position, facing the ball and keeping the whole ship tight.

When she was centre-forward, we were creating more and scoring more. If we could have her at centre-back, midfield and centre-forward, we'd have a few All-Irelands now."

To her immense credit, she rolled the dice for the 2012 campaign, underwent knee surgery following the league, but resumed her centre-back slot for the championship.

Like the hurling, few would have predicted this pairing at the beginning of the year. But none would argue about the merits of Galway and Kilkenny who defeated Wexford and Cork respectively to book their place in the showpiece.

Expect a ferocious tussle at GAA Headquarters tomorrow. It is almost 20 years since either county claimed the O'Duffy Cup which is huge motivation in itself.

Galway have one title (1996), but they should have added more to that solitary success. That they are back after losing the 2008, 2010 and 2011 finals is testament to their character.

The two most recent defeats

Wexford — were heartbreaking. Not many athletes could
survive such torment and
that is why the neutral
supporter won't begrudge
them a victory.

I expect the game to be the old-fashioned 15 on 15 without the sweepers and crowding we saw last weekend. It will be won or lost the orthodox way. Kilkenny will go in as slight favourites, based on the dogged nature of their win over the Rebels plus their unblemished record all year. The westerners have more experience but they will have to ensure past disappointments are left there. They must clear the decks because I do believe there is an All-Ireland in this crop of players.

It is make or break. Tony Ward was the manager 17 years ago and once again he will need all shoulders to the wheel. Key players down the spine of the team — and not for the first time — are Therese Maher, Niamh Kilkenny and Ann Marie

As we all know, sentiment

and sport don't mix. The fact these are novel finalists or Galway have suffered such heartache, won't matter an iota to their opponents who have set this championship alight.

In their first year in charge, Niall Williams and Graham Dillon have transformed an outfit laden with underage and college successes into All-Ireland senior contenders.

Many of them fell to Cork in the 2009 decider but four years on they won't be fazed by the hype and pressure of All-Ireland final day.

They are tenacious. I feel the outcome will hinge on scoring ability and here, Kilkenny hold the upper hand. Watch out for the pacey Katie Power, Denise Gaule and Shelly Farrell. There might be no hurling final for Kilkenny or Galway this September but the women are flying the flags proudly and fittingly, are getting the support to go with it.

In a week when Brian Cody returns for a remarkable 16th season with the Black and Amber, it brings to mind the importance of the people outside the white line.

Games can be won and lost on marginal calls so the role of mentors is massive and they must be prepared to make big decisions. GAA headquarters can be intimidating. So it is crucial that both sides enjoy the occasion and play with the freedom they are accustomed to. The rest will look after itself.

It is also a memorable day for the premier junior and intermediate counties. Galway supporters are doubly involved as they contest the intermediate final also, Ward is guiding them as well, and while it will be a pressure situation, it would be the ideal start to the day if they were to overcome Limerick who have slipped off the radar in recent times. It will be a tall order for their more youthful side and if you are in front of the telly around 2pm look out for sisters Niamh and Judith Mulcahy who are grand-nieces of the late Mick Mackey. "We competed in this competition in 2007, it was then known as Senior B. Ciarán Carey was manager and got us back up, we won the league and championship."

Still, Limerick couldn't cope with the heat of the senior kitchen and following three championship maulings, the decision was once more taken to return to the second tier and there they have remained, reaching the semi-finals in 2010 and 2011

"The reward for winning the league earlier in the year puts us back in Division 1

next year and that will be a huge challenge. The reward if we can get over Galway on Sunday is facing an even stronger Galway team in 2014 and better teams from all over the country.

"In the Munster senior championship semi-final Tipperary only had four points on us. We played really well

and were ahead with 10 minutes to go. Their pace told in the closing stages and they saw it out."

Limerick topped their championship group with three wins out of four, producing a string of fine performances before Meath were comfortably overcome in the semi-final.

"A far cry from last year," asserts Casey, successive defeats to Derry and Waterford ensuring their early exit from the race for the Jack McGrath Cup. "Last year was a disappointment not to get out of the group stages and it took a lot of rebuilding to get where we are now. There was a lot of effort put in over the past 10 months to make this a squad that could compete at the top end of the championship.

"Galway have some recognised names in young Cooney and McGrath, they will be a very hard team to deal with.

"They will want to right the wrongs of last year, but hopefully we'll come out on top."

# Laois on the cusp of historic camogie breakthrough

The Laois Camogie team will be hoping to make history this Sunday when they face Kildare in the Liberty Insurance Premier Junior Camogie Final in Croke Park at 12pm.

Laois have been on the cusp of making the breakthrough to the Intermediate ranks for the last number of years but they have never quite managed to make it over the line.

Despite being more than a match for the other teams in the grade, they suffered several semi-final heartbreaks before finally overcoming that hurdle this year when they dispatched fellow midlanders Westmeath to book their place in Croke Park.

Now they are just an hour away from claiming the much coveted All Ireland title and the equally coveted promotion to the Intermediate ranks.

In their way stands a Kildare team that they are very familiar with given their two previous encounters this year. Kildare came out on top in the Leinster Junior Final in O'Moore Park, thanks largely to 2-8 from pacey full-forward Susie O'Carroll. Laois held a four point lead after half-time but Kildare took control to run out 2-12 to 3-5 winners.

However, as the old adage goes, Laois learned from their mistakes and just two weeks later they turned the tables on their neighbours in the open-

ing round of the All Ireland Championship winning 3-9 to 1-12. The key to that victory was closing down Kildare and limiting their opportunities to run at the Laois defence. Yet while that worked effectively in the relatively tight confines of Naas, Laois are going to have to work even harder in the wide open spaces of Croke Park.

Laois however have a very experienced defence who are more than capable of restricting Kildare's scoring which is anchored by Karen Guddy and four time Ashbourne Cup winner and team captain Sarah Anne Fitzgerald.

Behind the defence is goalkeeper Laura Dunne who despite being small in stature is an absolute giant between the posts and is possibly the best shot stopper in the country, never mind just the Premier Junior grade.

While Laois will have their hands full with a Kildare attack with a dangerous mix of pace and power, the Kildare defence will have plenty of problems of their own trying to limit a Laois forward-line who have scored 17 goals in their six Championship games so far including four in their semi-final win over Westmeath.

Camross' Niamh Dollard has hit a rich vein of goalscoring form of late as she accounted for two of the goals against Westmeath and she had previously scored a hattrick against Roscommon in the final group game. Kildare

however will not have the luxury of just trying to mark one player out of the game as the Laois forward line has plenty of other potential match winners. Sile Burke and Louise Mahony also found the net against Westmeath while Olga Parkinson has twice found the net against Kildare already this year.

Another key battleground will be the midfield sector where Laois manager Mattie Collier has tried a number of players throughout the year. Claire Walsh and Elaine Mahony started in the engine room in the semi-final win over Westmeath and if they are handed the number eight and nine jerseys again, they will be more than capable of

winning the battle and giving Laois a solid attacking platform.

While Laois have every reason to be confident going into the game, they will in no way underestimate their opponents who are one of just two teams to defeat Laois this year. They played a division above Laois in the League and they reached the final where they eventually lost out to Limerick who are in the Intermediate Final this Sunday.

Laois won Division 3 in the League defeating Dublin in the decider and that decision to field a team in the Spring after a two year absence has paid dividends. It meant the team were together from January and they have trained incredibly hard throughout the year with the goal all along being to win the Premier Junior Final.

If Laois can win the final, it will not only bring the instant success and promotion, it will also have a ripple effect which would only be positive for camogie in the county.

It promises to be a great game between near neighbours with very little to chose between the sides.

In the end it could come down to one bounce of a ball, one mistake or one stroke of genius to decide the game.

One thing is for certain, if it comes down to desire, determination and will to win, this determined group of Laois players will more than likely be the ones coming out on top.

Speaking ahead of the game, Sarah Anne explained that while the Ashbourne Cup was special, playing in a final with Laois will be even more memorable.

"It's a big difference. Ashbourne is very special as well but there's a big difference with your county compared to college. There's that much more passion with your county. You're playing with girls you played with all your life. Hopefully we have another great day up in Croke Park."

Sarah Anne was speaking in O'Moore Park at a special event organised by Laois Camogieto promote the All Ireland Final. There was a large crowd of young camoige players in attendance who were excitedly getting the chance to meet and get autographs from the Laois players. Sarah Anne said that excitement was flowing through the team.

"Just excitement really. We'rein new territory now. It's a great build up. It's excitement

and anticipation and we can't really wait to get on the field at this stage."

Laois have been knocking on the door of success at the Premier Junior level for a number of years but while they have come close in the past, they have been unlucky not to make the breakthrough.

"This is long overdue," explained Sarah Anne. "I remember when weused to play Offaly when they were Junior. They used to be great matches but Offaly have made huge steps and they wouldn't be happy unless they were competing in All Ireland semi-finals at Senior level every year. And they field two teams now and their Juniors were playing in an All Ireland Final. We've looked at them and said why couldn't we do that."

While Laois have been challengers in the past but this year they have brought their game to another level. The captain believes she knows what has made the difference.

"I think the big factor was fielding a league team this year. The last two years we didn't field a league team for different reasons but this year every said from early January that we would give it one hell of a lash. We know we have the potential it was just we kept falling short every year. To be honest it was just down to our own efforts. Commitment wasn't the same but this year commitment's been very good. Mattie's been drilling it in since day one so everyone just rolled in behind from January and that's the reason we're going so well this

Not only did Laois compete in Division 3 of the league this year, they went on to win it with a 0-9 to 0-7 win over Dublin in the Final in Cusack Park in Mullingar. Sarah Anne, who was player of the game in the final, is in no doubt how important that victory was for

"It was huge. We said to ourselves we had to win that league. A lot of the teams we were playing in the All Ireland were in Division 2 and we were in Division 3 so we had to get out of that league, simple as. No disrespect to the other teams, we knew we would be able to get out of that league. It was just a matter of performing and trying to find our right 15 on the day. The league helped us great for preparation and that Leinster Final loss to Kildare was great preparation for us because that was games every week for us coming into championship when you really

need them."

Another motivation for the Laoisteam is the way their 2012 campaign ended with a loss to Down in the semi-final. Sarah Anne says that defeat helped focus the team for this year's assault on the title.

"After last year Mattie said in the dressing room that we left it behind us. I think that was the reason he came back this year. He said he knows there is that potential there after leaving it behind us last

"We had all the ball in the second-half (against Down) but we just couldn't score. We really felt going into that game that we had a real good chance to win it and things just did not gowell for us. They didn't score in the second-half and yet we still managed to lose. That one hurt a lot and a lot of people had a long winter thinking about that match, myself included. It was a huge motivating factor ahead of the Westmeath game and there was no way we were going into another dressing room like that after the match against Down last year."

Laois are now just one more win away from winning the All Ireland Premier Junior title. In their way stand Kildare who they have already faced twice this year. Each side has won one apiece so far but while Sarah Anne points to the Leinster Final as the team's first real test, she doesn't think either of the previous games are a guide to what will happen this Sunday.

"The Leinster Final was the first real test we had all year against them. It was a good game to watch and a good game to play in because it ebbed and flowed the whole way through. We went well ahead in the second-half but they just came back and they dominated us. Two weeks later we went up and beat them in the All Ireland stages so it really is all to play for. I think form goes out the window coming into the All Ireland Final. It could be anyone's game. It's who performs on the day."

# Little room for error in



## CAMOGIE

GALWAY and Kilkenny meet for the first time in the All-Ireland camogie decider tomorrow.

Galway are contesting their third senior final in four years, losing the 2010, 2011 deciders to Wexford while Kilkenny return to Croke Park for the first time since 2009.

Remarkably, the sides have never met since the first senior All-Ireland in 1932.

Kilkenny lead the roll of honour between the counties with 12 titles to Galway's one. Galway's only title back in 1996, I regret to say, was at the expense of Cork.

Galway deserved their victory that day.

They should have won many more since but didn't.

Mental toughness is what Galway teams in the past have lacked and I don't believe that has been addressed this season.

If the game goes to the wire one wonders if it'll come back to haunt them.

The 2011 All-Ireland final defeat in particular was a real sickener for them. Galway were looking good for victory as they led 1-8 to 1-5 with 10 minutes remaining.

However, an Ursula Jacob goal helped change the outcome to compound the Westerners to further All-Ireland final misery.

They easily crushed a lethargically disappointing Wexford by nine points in this year's

Galway were never threatened as Wexford failed to score even a solitary point from play. That was expected to be fair; Wexford had only been hanging in all season.

I wouldn't be getting too excited about the



margin of that victory. In fact, Galway may have been better served having to fight to the bitter end for that one.


The famine for Kilkenny has been longer than Galway's. The reason we focus so much on Galway's lack of success is that they have come close so many times whereas Kilkenny have only contested four finals since 1994, their most recent being 2009.

So they too are waiting a long time for success ensuring that whichever team wins, you may be sure the celebrations will be incred-

Kilkenny tipped away nicely all season under the guidance of Niall Williams. Following a period of underachievement, they were winning games again.

The fact that Kilkenny had a much tougher battle in their semi-final could have a bearing and they certainly proved their mettle in the semi-final when it was most required.

It was looking ominous for them early in



the first-half against Cork when they conceded two early goals, as Cork enjoyed a spell of dominance on the scoreboard to lead by 2-8 to 1-9 entering the closing 10 minutes, the game appeared to be out of Kilkenny's reach.

However, they found even greater mental strength to prevail and march into the All-Ire-

Kilkenny's defence was caught on occasion against Cork. In fact had Cork managed to deliver more ball into their inside forward line they could well have been the side walking behind the Artane Boys band tomorrow.

The Cats will have to watch that against Brenda Hanney and Ailish O'Reilly, both of whom started in the corners against Wex-

In the last 10 competitive meetings in league and championship between the two counties since 2008, Kilkenny have a 6-4 record. I don't place too much emphasis on stats like that

In all of Kilkenny's victories, only once has the winning margin been greater than three points, when Kilkenny won by four in the group stages of the championship in 2008.

The trend between Kilkenny and Galway matches in recent years has been very close games. A similar pattern can be expected to-

The key battle will be between Therese Maher and Aisling Dunphy. The latter has revelled in the centre-forward position since starting there in the Leinster final, her work rate vital to Galway's cause.

Therese Maher is Galway's most experienced player and has been a solid and consistent performer for many years. She, in my view, was the Player of the Match in the 2011

Ann Dalton and Niamh Kilkenny is another crucial decider at midfield. Dalton, when on form, is the heartbeat of the Kilkenny team. Niamh Kilkenny is a lethal force when she is given space.

Brenda Hanney could be a real handful for Kilkenny with her aerial threat. However, Jacqui Frisby is a very experienced operator, and has performed well in the Champion-

Frisby completely curtailed the influence of Hanney in the opening round of the championship in Athenry and I think she'll have the better of her again tomorrow.

Galway's defence will be up against it. Before the semi-final Denise Gaule and Shelley Farrell were Kilkenny's main scoring women up front with 5-6 and 4-4 respectively scored. Yet on the day Katie Power and Aoife Neary were superb. Add in Aisling Dunphy and Kilkenny have forward talent in abundance. I don't think Galway have the strength in depth defence wise to cope with Kilkenny's spread.

It's a new era in Kilkenny camogie. Many of these players are heading to Croke Park for the first time. How they handle the occasion will be critical from their point of view. You would expect Galway to be that bit more comfortable. But you never know. So many factors to consider, so little room for error.

Finally a special word of thanks is due to all who attended our games this year. Your support is appreciated and I know you have enjoyed great games and have been entertained throughout the year.



## Will the round-robin result be turned around in today's final?

T IS quite remarkable and rare - if not unique - that the Liberty Insurance All-Ireland senior camogie championship concludes with a game between the same two teams that got it under way 12 weeks previously.

What IS unique is the pairing at this juncture. Kilkenny are in a completely different hemisphere when it comes to titles garnered but they have a fair idea of what Galway have gone through in the past 20 years, having lost four finals since last getting their hands on the O'Duffy Cup in 1994.

Galway scooped their only championship in 1996 but have fallen at the last hurdle on five occasions subsequently ... so both will be ravenously hungry.

The Tribeswomen started the year without

Veronica Curtin and Aislinn Connolly; the former a last link with the history-makers of '96, the latter arguably one of the top two inter-county free-takers in the land along with Wexford's Ursula Jacob.

They still retained the indomitable Therese Maher, who is driven by a desire to conquer her own personal Everest, having endured every single bit of pain suffered by the westerners as someone who just missed out on glory by joining the senior squad in 1997.

Apart from Maher, there is Lorraine Ryan, Brenda Hanney, Niamh Kilkenny and Ann Marie Hayes of those who know what it's like to operate on the biggest stage. Throw in a handful of players who have gained valuable experience in recent years having come through the successful underage ranks. Meanwhile, Ailish O'Reilly has proved a huge addition to the attack from last year's All-Ireland-winning minors and the westerners are a clear force to be reckoned with.

The League was a disappointment, as Galway failed to make the last four and when Kilkenny edged them by two points in that championship opener, it wasn't looking great. The Noresiders' subsequent feats have increased the value of that effort, while there has been incremental improvement since then too for Tony Ward's

It was evident from the outset that this group was the most cutthroat of the two but Galuran accounted for Wexford by two point by a similar margin to Kilkenny and

crucial to their prospects.

They were very impressive in overcoming Clare by two goals and the expected victory over Derry secured a quarter-final against Tipperary, from which they emerged with 16 points to spare.

The fact that Wexford aren't in the final for the first time in four years is ultimately down to Galway, who ground down their old foes in the semi-final. While they were heavily favoured to do so, given the overhaul of the Wexford squad from 12 months previously, the fact that they overcame early nerves and previous psychological torment inflicted by the Model County was significant.

Once Niamh Kilkenny struck for a 23rd minute goal, the result was inevitable and while Galway never opened up completely, they dealt professionally with the Yellowbellies and had nine points in hand at the end.

They have another hoodoo to overcome now in terms of finals but the fact that it is unfamiliar opposition dealing with their own final demons might help.

Kilkenny have taken some time to build on the arrival of a youthful squad for the 2009 decider

but are the form side of the championship.

The League was reasonable, in terms of reaching the semi-final, but they were beaten by five points by Wexford. The spark to their season came when they reversed that result in the Leinster final and Niall Williams' girls haven't looked back since.

They emerged from their group with a 100% record but were then pitted against another side that hadn't dropped a point in the round-robin stages in Cork. The League champions had been


looking good but they had no answer to the magnificence of Katie Power, who scored 1-6 from play as Kilkenny prevailed by the minimum.

Aoife Neary, Shelly Farrell and Ann Dalton also shone, while it is an indication of their strength in depth that captain, Michelle Quilty had to be content with a cameo role. She scored a vital point when introduced as well.

The Cats hurled with magnificent fluidity but also showed a fantastic measure of courage to dig deep when it looked like the game might go against them in the third quarter.

It isn't unusual for a round-robin result to be turned around in the final - Galway know that well from beating Wexford in 2010 and 2011 but losing when it counted. This time though, a repeat verdict, with a similarly narrow margin, might be in the offing.

Verdict: Kilkenny.

Galway get monkey off back with gritty final performance



he wait is over. Yesterday was a very special day for everybody in Galway — they finally got their hands on the O'Duffy Cup - and the McGrath Cup.

After years of heartache they annex two All-Ireland titles in one day. Despite very trying conditions, and it was very tough in Croke Park, the senior team bridged a 17-year gap. It wasn't a great spectacle, there were far too many stoppages, but I hasten to add the safety of players is paramount and every call is at the discretion of the referee.

The Westerners won't mind that it was a lowscoring affair, neither will it matter that it wasn't pretty at times. It is all about getting the result. We had plenty of excitement all year, this was about ensuring the win.

When I heard last week this was likely to be Therese's Maher's final game, I felt there could be something special in Galway. The Athenry woman had been one of the greatest players never to win an All-Ireland senior medal. She burst on the scene the year after they won the All-Ireland in 1996 and has soldiered every year in between. That she was named player of the match is a fitting tribute to arguably one of the finest players ever to grace the game.



Schoolyard stuff

## Maher is finally

Sixth time lucky for legend as Galway land a dream double

AT THE final whistle, Therese Maher simply fell to her knees, threw off her red helmet and touched her head to the soil of hurling's Mecca before her teammates enveloped her in a mound of jubilant maroon.

"Relieved, ecstatic, delighted and just thrilled to finally get over the line and get that elusive medal that I've been trying so hard to get. Today makes up for all those defeats.

"I know it wasn't a classic out there today, but I didn't mind if it was two points to one or five points to two.

"We wanted to win and we needed to win for Galway camogie and to get the double, we're just thrilled."







Laois carried on from their initial win over Kildare by taking care of Down by five points and then an Armagh team that granted Kildare a walkover in the final round. They were made work very hard by Westmeath (3-9 to 1-10) but made light work of a weakened Roscommon to finish top of the group.

That left them with the Lakesiders to contend with in the penultimate round but on this occasion it was a onesided affair, although the Laois defence was clearly discomfited by Denise McGrath, who scored 3-2.

Laois had Louise Mahony, Niamh Dollard and Sile Burke doing the damage at the other end and they will have to be watched if Kildare are to beat them. The All Whites might just have the players to do so, however.

UCH was made of Wexford appearing in both senior and intermediate finals in 2010 and 2011 – and doing the double on the latter occasion – and it is a fantastic achievement for Galway to replicate the first of those feats, regardless of the results.

The Maroons won all three of their Group 2 ties but were very close to being dragged into a play-off, managing to stagger over the line on a 1-11 to 1-10 score against Tipperary, after previously accounting for Meath and Wexford with something to spare.

That set up a semi-final against Waterford, which they won by 1-15 to 1-7. They were always in control, with the groundwork for their advance laid in the opening seven minutes, at the end of which they led by 1-3 to 0-0.

Orlaith McGrath has made the step up from last year's victorious minors and she played a big role, as did Rebecca Hennelly, Aoife Callanan and Dee Burke.

As winners of the Division 2 League, Limerick were the most likely choice for intermediate championship victors but their passage to the final has been far from smooth.

A narrow win over Kilkenny was followed by an easier success against Antrim but the campaign suffered a major setback at the hands of Cork at the beginning of July. With their backs against the wall, they produced a phenomenal effort against the previously unbeaten Waterford, trouncing their fellow Munster side by a whopping 11 points in Killeedy.

That actually saw them top a feverishly-contested group on score difference, with Waterford in second and Cork just a point back in third.

The fright clearly seems to have done them good as they followed the facile win over Waterford with a hard-earned eight-point defeat of Meath.

They led by o-8 to o-2 at half time but the Royals threw everything at the Treatywomen in the second half. Dual star Dymphna O'Brien notched up two goals for Joe Quaid's charges to shake off their dogged opponents.

## A day of woe for the Cats in Croker

Despite a brave effort from Kilkenny in Sunday's All-Ireland senior camogie final in Croke Park there was no disputing the merits of Galway's success.

The Westerners were spurred on by two recent All-Ireland final defeats plus a loss to Kilkenny earlier in the year. The determination to erase those memories was evident. The exchanges were even for the opening five minutes but thereafter Galway gradually began to exert greater influence.

Galway's superiority was not reflected on the scoreboard until Ailish O'Reilly scored the only goal late in the first half. On another day it might have been disallowed for over-carrying.

That goal was the crucial score. Galway's confidence grew and Kilkenny needed a quick response but it did not arrive. The winners clearly spend time reviewing Kilkenny's earlier championship performances because the tactic of tight-marking every Kilkenny player was a match-winner.

Kilkenny players found it hard to get control of the ball and committed far too many unforced errors. Kilkenny's paltry return of four points in the opening half left the side with much to do.

With only four points separating the team at the interval, bridging the gap appeared possible. Matters got no better, though, for Kilkenny in the second half. An overworked defence played excellently all through especially in the second half.

All six defenders battled tenaciously for every ball and held Galway to just four points during the second thirty minutes. Edwina Keane, Elaine Aylward and Jacqui Frisby were particularly impressive.

Ann Dalton worked very hard at midfield after the break but when it came to scoring her shooting let her down. On another day she would have scored a couple

Kilkenny had big problems in attack and despite a couple of early points from Shelly Farrell (one of which might have been a goal) it was an unhappy afternoon for the Kilkenny forwards.

The talk before the game was that it would be the last outing for Galway's Therese Maher. The Athenry player has been at the wrong end of many All-Ireland defeats and this was to be her final game and the last opportunity to win a Celtic Cross.

Maher played brilliantly giving a Player of the Match performance. Time will tell if she retires but if this is to be her last game in the Galway jersey it was a fitting departure for a great player.

She marshalled her team brilliantly from centre half back and constantly broke up Kilkenny attacks.

This, though, was far from a one-player effort from Galway. Throughout the team the players showed an appetite and determination which Kilkenny could not match.

Despite Galway's clear superiority the game was never out of Kilkenny's grasp. A goal was required to get back into the game but Kilkenny rarely threatened Susan Earner's goal.

A notable feature of the game was the number of times the referee had to throw in the ball following what has become known as a 'hurling scrum'. When it came to the physical exchanges Galway held a distinct advantage.

Sadly for Kilkenny the team did not perform as they had hoped. It happens to the best of sides in All-Ireland finals. What is important now is for all involved to reflect on what went wrong and to start out at the beginning of next year determined to atone.

Despite Sunday's disappointment, progress has been made. The players are young enough and good enough to return to Croke Park next year when they can do better.





Ailish O'Reilly stepped on to the Croke Park turf on Sunday free from the baggage weighing heavily on the shoulders of her Galway team-mates.

The 19-year old stood out, not only as the youngest member of this All-Ireland winning outfit, but as the sole individual never to have tasted September defeat in the maroon and white.

While Galway performed their familiar bridesmaids role in the 2010 and '11 deciders, O'Reilly was filling the sitting room cabinet with a bag of underage All-Ireland titles.

Tony Ward drafted the full-forward into the senior set-up last winter and, though lining out alongside Brenda Hanney and Ann-Marie Hayes in their famine ending win — the Killimor pair boasting all most two decades of service between them — one would be forgiven for thinking it was O'Reilly who wore the tag of seasoned campaigner.

The NUIG Arts student delivered the game's sole goal on 27 minutes, but it was the squandered goal opportunity at the end of the first quarter which played on her mind. O'Reilly slipped inside the Kilkenny cover, but instead of shooting for goal, she offloaded to the unmarked Hanney who failed to make sufficient connection.

"I definitely should have converted that one, I would have regretted missing that one, but, thank God, I finished the second one and it counted. I am just glad it hit the back of the net.

"There were two Kilkenny girls hanging out of me, but I just stayed going, head down, I thought the Kilkenny goalkeeper was going to block it but thankfully it went in. We dominated the third quarter and, though we didn't move out of sight, I wouldn't say we were nervous. Maybe it was tired legs because we had fought so, so hard for 50 plus minutes. We held on in the end and I am so delighted we came out on top."

O'Reilly singled out Therese Maher in the match programme as the sportswoman she most admires and the youngster was quick to pay homage to those who had finally prized their hands onto the O'Duffy Cup.

"It's an absolute dream result. It is a dream result for those who have been fighting for so many years. The likes of Therese Maher, Brenda Hanney and Ann-Marie Hayes have been waiting so long to get their hands on an All-Ireland medal, having come up short on so many occasions and they truly deserve what they got today."

Further down the tunnel underneath the Hogan Stand and captain Lorraine Ryan is clutching the O'Duffy Cup, tightly, the second Galway lady to bring camogie's biggest prize across the Shannon.

"It's unbelievable, there are no words to describe it," smiled the wing-back.

"I think we are still in shock to be honest. It will definitely take a while for all this to settle in. I am just so, so



happy for the girls inside, they have worked so, so hard.

"We worked hard this year, but we have worked hard over the past four and five years, coming up short by two points two years in succession. We have had our hearts broken over and over again. These group of girls just came back and came back, and I am so delighted that we got our reward today.

"Conditions were difficult and it did take a while for both teams to settle down, we fought it out, we kept going, kept believing. Even when Kilkenny had their purple patch, we

Given that it was an All-Ireland final it's probably unfair to say that one side wanted the win more than

the other but that was certainly the impression as Kildare outworked their opponents in every position. The hard work started with corner forwards Louise Keatley and Róisín O'Connell and continued through every position.

If the girls had any nerves going into the game they hid them well and after Hurley's opener, Melissa Lyons scored a second point inside the opening 60 seconds of the game. Kildare kept up the pressure and points followed from O'Carroll, O'Connell and Hurley to move the team into a 0-5 to 0-0 lead after 15

The pressure that Kildare were putting their opponents under all over the field meant that Laois didn't register a point until Louise Mahony converted from a free after Olga Parkinson had been fouled. Niamh Dollard followed that with her team's first from play three minutes but a late Susie O'Carroll point meant Kildare held a 0-6 to 0-2 lead at the break.

The only downside to the opening half was that Kildare probably should have been further ahead and it looked like they might live to regret not turning their possession into points on the scoreboard when Dunlavin school pupil Grace O'Neill

beat Saileog O'Keefe with a well struck shot.

With the rain by now pouring down and a strong wind coming in over Hill 16, it would have been easy to drop the heads and let Laois right back into the game but Kildare's response will go down in camogie folklore for many years to come.

Less than a minute later, some brilliant stick work by Melissa Lyons created an opening for O'Carroll and she was cool as the proverbial cucumber as she rounded goalkeeper Laura Dunne and fired

Just 30 seconds later, Dunne was picking the sliotar out of her net again after O'Carroll latched onto a long pass and shot past the Laois netminder.

Hurley tagged on a point seconds later and shortly after the rain cleared to make way for blue skies and the sun once more and suddenly everything seemed right in Kildare's world once again.

Kildare held Laois to just two more points in the remainder of the game and even when Jim McMullan introduced four substitutes they remained on top of the game.

Hurley scored her fifth point of the game inside the final ten minutes before Cliodhna McSweeney rounded off the scoring as Kildare were confirmed as the 2013 All-Ireland junior champions.

# O'Carroll savours amazing feeling at Croker

KILDARE full-forward Susie O'Carroll has been a long time on the county senior team and there were times when a day out at Croke Park seemed a million miles

"It's just brilliant," she said after winning an All-Ireland title at the famous venue.
"For the last few years we've been striving to get here but five or six years ago we couldn't have even dreamt about this moment so to be here is absolutely brilliant. It's an amazing feeling."

Less than 90 seconds after Grace O'Neill's goal for Laois, Kildare's clutch full-forward Susie O'Carroll struck two vital goals in less than a minute.

"I don't remember much about them, I just remember that the ball broke to me and I was on my own and I was happy enough when there was nobody around me," said O'Carroll.

Kildare looked right at home on the hallowed Croke Park turf and O'Carroll felt that nerves went by the wayside because of their detailed preparations.

"We had said to enjoy the occasion but to not let it get to us once we were out on the pitch. We had our routine. Jim (McMullen) has focused on that during the year, keeping the routine the same. Once we got out there we knew what we were able to do and it was brilliant to get the scores on the board from the start."

Such was the dominance that Kildare enjoyed that they could almost afford to enjoy the closing moments.

"Siobhan (Hurley) had turned to me with about eight seconds to go and said we had it but I told her no we hadn't and to keep going," said O'Carroll, who said the team's belief has been the big difference this year.

"I think that was probably said in years before that there was this belief but this year you really knew - the quality of the players, the strength of the panel, even the players who came on today were really pushing for starting places."

When asked how it equated to that historic win in '96, he said it was difficult to draw comparisons. "It is different because '96 was just pure disbelief that it could have happened. A lot of the girls were so young in '96 as well and if somebody told us that time that it would be 2013 before we would win the next one, it would have been very hard to believe."

That said, for the long serving Therese Maher, who had already lost five All-Ireland finals in her 16-year senior career, her overriding sentiment would have mirrored her predecessors in '96 – pure disbelief.

"I think, initially, it is very hard [to come back year after year] once you lose. But you put the gear bag away and then everyone else is getting it out again and going out training. This year, the management were very good I have to say. I did my own bit of training in the winter season and in March/April I started to get that feeling of 'would the body be able for one more year?'

"When you enjoy it though and it is something you have played for almost all of your life and love, I am so glad I went back now. Today makes up for all of those [other defeats]."

Another of the older brigade who had experienced her fair share of heartache was Mullagh's Sinead Cahalan. She believed though that, despite a poor start to their campaign, losing the first round to their All-Ireland opponents, they timed their run to perfection this way.

"We just pitched it better. I know we started the year poorly and nobody gave us a chance - we had a poor league and we were not overly impressive in the early stages of the championship - but we just built it up bit by bit. I think, more than ever, we just had an unbelievable hunger and we were not going to accept defeat this year."

The rest, as they say, is history and all that remained was a victory homecoming tour that got underway with the symbolic crossing of the Shannon in Athlone before both teams received the adulation of the crowds in Ballinasloe, Loughrea, Cappataggle, Ballyfa, the home of manager Ward, and, finally, the Earl Inn, Kiltullagh/Killimordaly, the home of Galway's senior captain, Lorraine Ryan, on Monday evening.

Other clubs were subsequently visited over the ensuing days - South Galway clubs on Tuesday and City clubs on Wednesday - while the customary tour of the schools has also been taking place this week. One of the first to host the O'Duffy and McGrath Cups was St Killian's VS, New Inn, the former alma mater of manager Ward and six of his players, including senior cap-

tain Ryan.

LORRAINE Ryan is coming near the end of what has become a marathon of interviews and photo calls yet despite the media frenzy, she remains unfazed and, still smiling, she continues to give generously of her time.

"They have not seen the [O'Duffy] Cup come home before - while for others it has been a very long time - so hopefully it gives those young girls the belief to keep playing camogie with their friends and that they will come focused, because you just

"We knew coming here that the Kilkenny forwards was the focal point of their team and if we could try to quieten them at all - or keep them quiet a small bit - and get our forwards going with plenty of ball, we would be in with a good chance. However, if we were on the back-foot, we knew we would be in trouble.

"So, we had to keep strong, especially our six backs, and keep each other going. I thought we used the handpass to good effect, broke the tackles well, did the simple things right and moved the ball down the field as fast as we could. And especially in the last 15 minutes, that really worked. We just kept our heads after that and kept believing and kept going and thank God we came out the right end of the result."

In the end, the Cats replaced two of their inside sharpshooters - and three forwards in all - such was the dominance of Ryan and the Galway defence. However, Ryan said, even then, Galway were taking nothing for granted. She said, for the younger brigade, they had, by and large, come from a background of success and when diluting this with the experience of the older players, it proved to be a potent mix. "I suppose, we had none of the heartbreak that some of the older players had.

"Coming up along, we had won minor and U-16 and I think that blend of youth and the experience of the older girls was what brought this day to fruition and what finally won the All-Ireland," said McGrath, who, along with sisters Clodagh and Orlaith, was one of three siblings who took home All-Ireland senior medals on Sunday.

Indeed, she paid tribute to her sister Orlaith, who played a key role in Galway winning the All-Ireland intermediate



## McGrath switch proves turning point for Galway Intermediates

Sarsfields player revels in new role as Tribeswomen atone for last year's defeat

Galway 0-12 Limerick 0-10

GALWAY'S intermediate camogie team defied the odds - and stirred the emotions on a memorable day for the sport in the county - when accounting for a fancied Limerick outfit in an entertaining All-Ireland decider at Croke Park on Sunday.

Despite only narrowly losing the showpiece after a replay to Derry in 2012, the feeling in some quarters was that this Galway team might have spurned their opportunity for All-Ireland success, particularly given they were meeting National League (Division 2) champions Limerick this time round.

This notion - flawed as it transpired - had been endorsed on the premise that this was Galway's second string where the Limerick outfit on show comprised of premier players from the Treaty County. However, what those who held that belief had not factored in was that this was a Galway side finely balanced by youth and experience.

In the likes of the Tribeswomen's experienced players – captain Sinead Keane, goalkeeper Róisín Callanan, defenders Collette Gill, Paula Kenny and Sarah Noone, midfielder Caitriona Cormican, impressive righthalf forward Katie O'Dwyer and impact substitute Deirdre Burke – they had able gener-

In the likes of the younger players - many of whom had already tasted a great deal of All-Ireland success in the underage ranks - they had pace, power, guile and enthu-

siasm and, indeed, it was this similar potent mix that also yielded that clusive All-Ireland senior title, and a remarkable double, later in the afternoon.

Arguably, the key period in this contest was between the 39th and 51st minutes when Galway outscored their opponents by five points to one, which was hugely significant and pivotal to the victory given this was a game of tight maroins.

The sides had been level at the half-time break at 0-6 apiece and, truly, it was all to play for. Limerick subsequently took the lead through a Niamh Mulcahy free for the third and, ultimately, last time two minutes into the second half, but their failure to add to this tally when they had Galway under the cosh was to cost them dearly.

In contrast, this plucky Galway side showed no such inhibitions and, using every bit of nuance they had at their disposal, they rode out the Limerick storm before turning the game on its head.

There were a number of factors in this turnaround, including the introduction of St. Thomas' Deirdre Burke at half-time; the redeployment of Orlaith McGrath from the full to the half forward line; and, quite simply, that the Tribeswomen boasted greater firepower than their rivals.

In all, Ardrahan's Rebecca Hennelly and Sarsfields' McGrath shot four points apiece while, throughout the contest, midfielder Cormican and forwards Maria Cooney and Aoife Donoghue (2) also chipped in with scores. For their part, Limerick over-relied on centre-half forward Mulcahy, who tallied no less than eight of her side's 10 scores.

Still, it was the move of McGrath, who would later

also have the unique distinction of featuring in the senior final, to the wing-forward berth - from which she tallied three superb points - that was instrumental in the winning of

this decider.

Already, Limerick were struggling to cope with the inform Hennelly and the hardworking Katie O'Dwyer, who was creating scoring chance after scoring chance for her team-mates, and with the introduction of McGrath and her piercing runs from deep

into this sector, the Limerick defence suddenly was on the verge of a meltdown.

McGrath's impact took effect on 39 minutes when, collecting a Tara Kenny clearance, she diced and sliced the Limerick cover to tie up the fixture at 0-7 apiece. Over the ensuing 12 minutes, Donoghue, McGrath – two more – and Hennelly shot a plethora of points and Galway were looking good.

They could have further swelled that tally in this time

had they not dropped a number of efforts short into the Limerick goalkeeper's hands while Finola Keely and substitute Karen Kennedy both had opportunities to net during a frantic passage of play on 54 minutes. Limerick were on the

As it was, Tony Ward's charges held a three-point advantage, 0-11 to 0-8, heading into the dying minutes, but Limerick were by no means a spent force yet. They were awarded scoreable frees – the free count in the latter period was incredibly 12-3 in Limerick's favour – and Mulcahy had the required composure to convert the chances and reduce their arrears to a single point.

Galway needed to hold their nerve and this they duly did. Hennelly won a free – arguably a harsh call against substitute Janet Garvey – but given this was only the Tribeswomen's third free of the half, it went some way towards balancing the ledger.

In any event, Hennelly converted the placed ball in the first minute of injury-time to put Galway two ahead again but, more importantly, it meant Limerick had to net if they were to lay their hands on the McGrath Cup.

They did make a fist of it, floating in a free and a subsequent 45 in an effort to breach the Galway rearguard but goal-keeper Callanan and her defensive cohorts stood tall and repelled the danger to claim the title and bury, once and for all, the heartache of

It was richly deserved as Galway had been the better side for the greater part of the game. By the 20th minute, they had led 0-6 to 0-3 - compliments to points from Cooney, Hennelly (free and

play) McGrath, Donoghue and Cormican - and they would have continued to do so had they not switched off in the 10 minutes preceding the interval.

Consequently, it allowed Limerick to gain a foothold and with Mulcahy accurate from play and placed balls (2) they gained parity by the break. Limerick subsequently took the lead on 32 minutes but Galway then slipped into another gear and from there on in, it was the Tribeswomen's game to lose.

All in all, it was an outstanding display, not only from the aforementioned elder brigade, but from the likes of younger players such as Tara Kenny, Shauna Healy, Hennelly, McGrath and Donoghue. On this evidence, it won't be long before they will be wearing the senior jer-


The win also meant that, no matter the outcome of the senior game, Galway was not going home empty-handed. In that, the senior players would have been imbued with a greater sense of confidence and the moment they ran out of the tunnel, any fear of failure surely dissipated in the September wind.

## Years of heartbreak give way to tears of joy as Galway's camogie heroes end hoodoo at last

THEY travelled in their thousands to Croke Park on Sunday and they turned out in their droves to honour Galway's camogie heroes around the county on their homecoming tour the following day. It was a fitting tribute to a remarkable feat.

No doubt, September 15, 2013 will be a date that will live forever in the minds and hearts of Galway camogie. For it was not only the day that saw the county's senior side claim the O'Duffy Cup for only the second time ever but it was also a day when the Galway intermediate outfit completed a remarkable double at GAA headquarters by winning the McGrath Cup.



O'Reilly's major asked the most pertinent of questions about Kilkenny's character and, to some degree, the Cats were found wanting. While they were still licking their wounds, substitute Noreen Coen picked off two sweet points on 28 and 31 minutes and both of these

scores deserve mention.

The first highlighted all that was good about Galway given it was worked out from the back by Manton to Maher to Hayes before Coen supplied the flawless finish. The second came from some good work by O'Reilly and Hanney with Coen on hand to pull first time over the bar. Any lower, and it quite possibly would have beaten Kilkenny goalkeeper Emma Kavanagh for a second time.

As it was, Kilkenny, for all the hype about their much vaunted attack, had little to

offer going forward and a great deal of credit for this must go to the Galway defence. Just seven points conceded, suffice to say, they were immense.

The main premise of the Kilkenny offensive would have been to create one-onones between their lethal full-forwards of Shelly Farrell, Denise Gaule and Aoife Neary - who had amassed an impressive total of 10-18 between them in the championship to date - and the Galway full-back line, two frees on 48 and 52 minmaybe even isolate the

Sarah Dervan.

What they didn't bank on was Dervan playing like a demon possessed - she was awesome - while, to a woman, Manton, Heather in the final quarter and two Cooney, Cahalan, Maher and captain Ryan slowly but surely sucked the life out of the Cats' attack.

And it needed to be done. In the opening 25 minutes, Kilkenny looked menacing enough with Ann Dalton (free), Farrell (2) and Aisling Dunphy all tallying some fine points to take a 0-4 to 0-3 lead. Indeed, they could even have found the Galway net only Farrell's palmed effort on 17 minutes rose high over Susan Earner's crossbar.

Aside from those early exchanges, Galway never looked in any real trouble as Niamh McGrath - free and play - and Emer Haverty, following a neat lay-off by Maher, registered points of their own in the opening 20 minutes before the victors struck for that unanswered 1-2 late in the half to establish a healthy four-point advantage at the break.

Granted, Kilkenny did start the second period the brighter but a failure to translate possession into a meaningful amount of scores - just one point from Dalton on 33 minutes - dented the Cats' confidence, belief and morale.

For Galway's part, points from niece and aunt, Niamh McGrath (free) and Emma Kilkelly - the latter an inspirational score - enabled the Westerners' to keep the scoreboard ticking over and, ultimately, it forced Kilkenny into the last throw of the dice as they replaced three of their forwards, Grace Walsh, Neary and Gaule, in the closing 20 minutes.

#### Skipper Keane savours historic camogie double as focused Galway side banish 2012 final blues

WHATEVER happened in the All-Ireland senior camogie decider, Galway's intermediate victory in the preceding game was never going to be diminished. It was always going to be a triumph of its own standing. In the end, that the Tribeswomen won both finals ensured there would be no bitter-sweet taste. Just sweet.

For Kinvara's Sinéad Keane, she was one of those who enjoyed the delicious flavour of success on the double, Captain of the All-Ireland winning intermediate outfit, she was also a panellist with the senior set-up. Two All-Ireland medals in one afternoon. No wonder Keane was smiling.

"Yeah, what a day!" exclaimed the Galway defender. "Not just to win one All-Ireland but to be part of two All-Ireland winning panels. It is the stuff that dreams are made of and I never imagined the day would come where I would win two All-Irelands on the same day. It is the stuff of dreams."

Of course, by virtue of their 0-12 to 0-10 win over Limerick in the intermediate showpiece, which went some way to alleviating the hurt of their All-Ireland defeat to Derry at the same stage of the competition last year, it really did set the tone for the rest of the afternoon.

"We were conscious of that on the way up," said Keane, who is a niece of legendary Galway hurler Iggy Clarke. "We wanted a good start. We were fully focused on winning that game and, if we did win and the seniors saw us celebrating out on the pitch, it might give them the extra boost that they needed."

Keane, who also won an All-Ireland intermediate medal back in 2003, alluded to their defeat to Derry, after a replay, and believed it was the experience of that day that helped carry them through the 2013

"The overriding sentiment from last year was deep disappointment. We were devastated to lose the way we lost last year and that spurred us on. We were so focused today coming here. We knew the occasion, we knew where we would come under pressure and we knew we had to defend like our lives depended on it and try to take our chances as best we could. And, thankfully, we did that.

"That said, we were really well drilled and we each knew

what the other was going to do. I mean, five of the six intermediate backs were the same as last year so we were very familiar with each other. We were very solid defensively all year and we hadn't been conceding from play, if at all, in some matches. So, we believed in ourselves."

With both the intermediate and senior teams winning, and the underage set-up being so strong in recent years, Keane acknowledged the world is the oyster for Galway camogie in the immediate future. "It's onwards and upwards," beamed the Galway captain.

"We will have almost 50 girls competing for senior places next year and looking to drive on. We have had so many setbacks year after year and we have been knocking on the door so long, to finally get the breakthrough in the fashion we did is just sensational."

Meanwhile, Galway intermediate and senior manager Tony Ward, delighted to have completed a remarkable double on the day, was full of praise for his second string side. "They really set up the day," enthused the Sarsfields man.

"It was absolutely brilliant for us to have the intermediates in action today because it meant we were gone at 9 o'clock. In terms of the senior, the worst part of any All-Ireland day is waiting around for the time to come. We were gone though at 9 o'clock, we were fully keyed into what was happening with the intermediates, and it was full on when we arrived at Croke Park. And the rest is history now."

Team trainer Liam Hodgins was equally as generous in his admiration for the intermediates, noting they really wanted the victory after the disappointment of the previous year. "They trained as hard as any senior team and they did the exact same amount of sessions and the exact same training," outlined the former Galway hurler.

"I am so delighted for them, in particular for the girls who had lost last year. We had five or six new girls who moved up to senior and five or six girls who came in to replace them and they have won an All-Ireland in their first year.

"Then you have the likes of 'Gilly' (Collette Gill), 'Noonie' (Sarah Noone) and Sinead Keane and they are knocking around there on the intermediate panel for the last four or five years. They needed to get their reward and I am thrilled for them," concluded Hodgins.

name the new Liffey bridge after activist Rosie Hackett. The local authority selected a shortlist of five names from 85 official nominations for the bridge over the River Liffey at Marlborough Street. Camogie legend Kay Mills was runner-up in the vote, followed by Alone founder

Willie Bermingham, Dracula creator Bram Stoker, and the founder of the Legion of Mary, Frank Duff. Rosie Hackett was a

messenger in Jacob's biscuit factory and joined the Irish Transport and General Workers' Union when it was founded in 1909. She encouraged women workers to join in the 1913 Lockout struggle and was dismissed

from Jacob's. She was a member of the Irish Citizen Army and served with Constance Markievicz. In 1970, Hackett received a gold medal in recognition of her 60 years'service to the Irish trade union movement.

The Camogie Association and Dublin Camogie Board had been campaigning to have the new bridge over the river Liffey named in honour of former Dublin camogie star Kay Mills who won fifteen senior All-Ireland medals.

Kay Mills is the only Gaelic games team player to hold such an honour, eclipsing hurling legends such as Christy Ring, John Doyle and

UBLIN City Council has voted to Henry Shefflin. Kay began her playing career with Dublin at the age of 14, winning her first All-Ireland medal in 1942 and

her last in 1961. She captained the side in 1959.

She was a player noted for her athleticism, fantastic skill level and was a superb ambassador for camogie. In addition to her All-Ireland medals, she won Leinster twenty Championships, six Dublin senior County Championships and four Interprovincial medals. She was an automatic choice on the Camogie Team of the Century chosen in 2004 and was inducted into Cuchulainn Hall of Fame. She was also an accomplished soccer player, gymnast and table tennis player. Her medal collection is currently on

display in the GAA Museum Croke Park, while in 2011 a plaque was unveiled at her place of residence, 1 Abercorn Terrace, following a joint initiative of the Inchicore/Kilmainham Heritage Committee, Dublin City Council and the Camogie Association.

The three most recent bridges over the River Liffey were named after Samuel Beckett, Seán O'Casey and James Joyce. Of the 23 bridges over the River Liffey, the Anna Livia bridge in Chapelizod is the only other to have an official female name.



## All-Ireland Senior Club Captains 1964-'84 honoured

THE Camogie Association are today honouring the winning Senior Club Captains from 1964 to 1984 with a special lunch.

1964 marked the Diamond Jubilee of the founding of An Cumann Camógaíochta. It was decided to introduce an All-Ireland Senior Club Championship to mark the occasion. Like the GAA, it was run on the traditional provincial system. The first provincial winners were Glen Rovers (Munster), Celtic (Leinster), Newport (Connacht) and Deirdre (Ulster). While it was initially to be part of the jubilee year celebrations it was then decided to make the senior club championship a permanent part of the fixtures calendar.

Celtic travelled to Cork to play Glen Rovers. In those days the goalposts were much narrower and there was a bar across the two upright posts. Following discussion the match was played on a full-sized hurling pitch and the match ended in a draw. Celtic won the replay. Newport refused to travel to Belfast to play Deirdre, so the Ulster champions got an easy passage to the final.

The final was played in Croke Park where Celtic had an easy victory. An anonymous donor presented a silver cup known as The Jubilee Cup which the Celtic club was allowed to keep. Brid Hanbury captained Celtic. The team was managed by the legendary Nell McCarthy, a native of Cork. She trained successful Dublin teams over a long period and later held the office of President. Two players in action that day, Mary Moran who lined out for Celtic and Nancy Murray from the Deirdre club, later went on to become President of the Camogie Association. Claire Heffernan and Mary Casey were sisters to

Dublin football stars Kevin Heffernan and Bill Casey.


In 1965 the first official Club Championship final was played in Casement Park when Tipperary champions St. Patrick's played and defeated the Deirdre club in a keenly contested match. Aine Meagher wrote in the Gaelic Weekly "It was an exhibition that is bound to help the spread of camogie". Bill Carroll a well known camogie enthusiast and builder presented a cup for the competition. His daughter Ann was a member of the St. Patrick's team and played for Tipperary and later was part of the very successful Kilkenny team. The Bill Carroll Cup is still much valued.


Over the years many famous players won the coveted Senior Club All-Ireland championship. Included in the illustrious list are Phyllis Breslin and Mary Fennelly who later held the office of President. Team of the Century players Margaret O'Leary, Liz Neary, Angela Downey, Bridie Martin, Marie Costine, Pat Moloney, Una O'Connor all won club championship medals.



"The one thing that inspired me, and I learned this during my term as president, is the massive work that goes on at club, county, provincial and national level. I have a chance now to continue supporting that and keep driving camogic forward. "The game has been going from

"The game has been going from strength to strength, but there is more to do and challenges out there."

The attendance of 15,063 at the recent All-Ireland camogie finals is indicative of the game's relatively small support base. This will be one of the first issues tackled by O'Flynn.

"There could have been more at the final and the way to grow that is to nurture a fan base at club level up. I think it is unrealistic to expect 40,000 at the All-Ireland final when the work is not going in at club level. We need

to build support for the game to increase attendances. We can improve on that 15,000 figure and with the support of Liberty Insurance we can prioritise that in the coming years."

O'Flynn is in favour of merging forces with the LGFA, but noted that support at all levels is required.

"During my tenure as president we commenced a process called the 'One Club' model which was to facilitate a process whereby clubs at local level could be administered as single units. That was growing the idea of increasing integration from the grassroots up. The Camogie Association's first Player Welfare Committee was established in 2009 and its first Inter County Referees Assessment Programme was established in 2010. First steps to establish underage camogie internationally (particu-

larly in Britain and US) commenced 1986-2009 Institute of Public Adminin 2010. A new All Ireland Intermediate Club Championship was inaugurated that same year. Rules enacted included allowing two points for a sideline cut and increasing subs from five to eight in all league games, the changing of the Gael Linn Cup to a two year cycle. After a debate, the ban on camogie players wearing shorts was retained.

Joan's brother Denis was a referee and is PRO of his native club and her Presidency coincided with another East Cork native Christy Cooney's

tenure as GAA President. Known throughout the county as 'Mrs Ballincollig' in camogie circles, for her years of service and dedication to the club, she has overseen her club go from the whipping girls of the sport to potential senior county champions. On Sunday, Ballincollig take on reigning Cork, Munster and All-Ireland champions Milford, and she can't wait for the final which is the club's first final appearance. "This is a huge occasion for the club, with it being our first ever senior county final," said Mary

Ballincollig, who have not gone beyond the back door in the past two years, have surpassed all expectations to reach this year's county senior final. However, Weste believes it has come down to a lot of hard work and learning something from every game.





Milford became the first team to capture back-to-back Cork senior camogie titles since Cloughduy in 2002 with a 25-point hammering of Ballincollig yesterday

Ballincollig, playing in their first final, sought to become the seventh first-time winners of the senior crown in the past 11 years, but the Cork, Munster and All-Ireland champions had virtually sealed victory as early as first-half injury time, when they reeled off a pair of goals. from Orlaith O'Mahony and Maria Watson, to stretch the interval-gap to 10 points.

"The way the champi-onship has gone this year, a lot of the teams have played nine or 10 against us in the backs," said captain and player-of-the-match Elaine O'Riordan, "so I've ended up being the free-player sweeping at the back. It's the way the games are going against us, but we're learning to deal with it so it's grand.

The much feared North Cork side found their way around Ballincollig's sevenplayer defence as early as the fourth minute with a Deirdre

O'Reilly goal. Ballincollig stuck doggedly

to their task, blocking and harrying Milford and reducing the deficit to three, However Milford's late run of 2-1 punctured

Ballincollig's dreams.

Maura Flanagan added a fourth goal early in the final period as the game became somewhat ill-tempered.

However Milford saw out the storm and the floodgates opened for them in the final quarter, adding 1-10 without reply.

"It was a really special one to win and it means more than last year's win in a way," said two-time winning captain O'Riordan.

"A lot of teams find the second-year syndrome hard to overcome, especially after such a great year last year, but as you can see, the hunger is still there within the team."

A further sign of the chang-ing of the guard in Cork camogie came in the Senior B final where the county's oldest and most successful club, Glen Rovers, took their first title at that grade.

Led at centre-back by Lauren Callanan, they built up a seven-point half-time lead over Eire Og. Erin Corkery scored 1-1 to renew the Westerners hopes but Denise Luby and Sinead O'Halloran sealed the 1-13 to 2-7 victory.

The first 30 minutes was anything but as Ballincollig threw the kitchen sink at the champions. But an injury to Linda Dorgan and four nightmarish minutes just before the break which saw Milford strike 2-1 rattled Ballincollig deeply and they never recovered.

Once Milford got into their stride, once they managed to break down Ballincollig's seventh defender, their fluency and style was a class apart. Finding each other with relative ease as the game wore on the scores mounted up as it became a case of running down the clock.
