

Down, who has given three-quarters of a century of service to camogie and on this, the 50th anniversary of her having held the position of National President, Congress conferred the honour of Life President on Sheila. This was a unique honour conferred for the first time ever on a member of the Association to pay tribute to her long service.

Amongst the motions passed at Convention were the setting up of a Minor B Championship to be organised at provincial level. A motion from Connacht that a test series of 15-a-side be continued for the year 2000 was also carried.

There was one election at Congress, when outgoing PRO, P J Fulham from Offaly, held off the challenge of Maura Scully, Dublin, to retain his position.





It also means that venues should be easier found for games". The Kilruane McDonaghs club player feels that acquiring venues has been a major problem for the Association, and the knock-on effect has been the lack of support when matches have had to be played at out-of-the-way locations.

"It's always hard heading back to the muck and hard slog of winter training, especially when you are always put up alongside my good friend Meadbh Stokes. I don't know if Biddy does it to make me go faster or for me to slow her down!!" the witty sentiments of a girl, who on a more serious note says she will be disappointed if Tipperary do not take an All Ireland Senior Title within the next

And be assured players all over the country will find themselves in similar situations as the season progresses. Many girls train with the 'opposition', but in doing so are missing out in the great camaraderic that is nurtured from the early stages of a panel of players working together for the same goal. The team that play together stay together!

Ciara Gaynor has come a long way from playing with her father in the front yard of her house, but one thing hasn't changed she has yet to get the better of the renowned Len Gaynor!!

n Chomhdhail Bhliantuil was held in Anner Hotel, Thurles on March 27th and 28th. Cumann Camogaiochta na acknowledged the unique contribution of Sighle McAnulty to the Association in a very meaningful way by declaring her Honourary Life Uachtaran of Cumann Camogaiochta na nGael. This was a very appropriate occasion on which to honour Sighle as it was the fiftieth anniversary of her election as Uachtaran.

Sighle Nic an Ultaigh first took office in 1925 as Rúnaí of her club, the Betsy Gray Club, Warrenpoint, An Dún. She went on to become Cathaoirleach of Coiste an Dúin, represented her county at Comhairle Uladh, became Cathaoirleach of Comhairle Uladh in 1947, has been a member of Ardchomhairle and has attended An Chomhdháil Bhliantúil on an almost continuous basis since that time.

During 1948, Sighle was instrumental in reuniting the Association in the aftermath of some difficulties, was elected Uachtarán in 1949 and, when her three year term was completed in 1952 An Chomhdháil Bhliantúil re-elected her for an additional year, thus extending the stipulated three year term. She was elected as Ardrúnaí in 1953, a position to which she was re-elected until 1975 when she decided to step down from office.

An Chomhdháil Bhliantúil of that year approved the establishment of sub-committees at Ardchomhairle level and subsequently, Sighle was appointed to the Finance (now Management) Committee and as Cathaoirleacht of the Administration Committee. She had, prior to this, been appointed as Cathaoirleacht of Comhairle na mBunscoileanna on its establishment in 1974. Sighle, in her capacity as Trustee of the Association for several years, continues to be a member of Ardchomhairle and of the Management Committee. Whatever position she had held or holds. Sighle's contribution to the Association has been and is on inestimable value.

Sighle has been a member of Cumann Lúthchleas Gael as well as of Cumann Camógaíochta na nGael almost all of her life and has already attended in excess of two hundred hurling, football and camogie senior finals as well as the Congress of both Associations on a continuous basis for more than sixty years. She is a member of the St. Peter st horting football and camogie club in Warrenpoint and is the author of the Down GAA History "O'Shiol go Bláth."

Kilcormac's big breakthrough came in 1996 when they won Leinster titles at both Senior and Junior level in the Vocational Schools Competitions with extremely young teams. They are the first team from Offaly to win a Colleges Grade A Leinster title when their 7 aside team proved successful in 1998. With only 170 girls on roll and no transition year, Kilcormac opted for the B grade this season. They earned their Leinster title by defeating St. Brigid's, Callan in a replayed final and progressed to overcome Mercy, Roscommon in the All-Ireland semi-final. Kilcormac are indebted for much of their success to their local clubs, Drumcullen, Kinnitty and Kilcormac/Killoughey, their Principal, Mr John Keane and their trainers, Honor Kinsella and Joe Tully.

SACRED HEART SECONDARY SCHOOL, CLONAKILTY

Sacred Heart, Clonakilty lies in football country. It is significant that there is no member of the panel from the town. The School's emergence as a power in Colleges Camogie is strongly linked to the success of the Barryroe Club who won the Cork Senior B Championship in 1998.

Sacred Heart tested success for the first time at Munster level in 1998. They won the Munster Intermediate Championship and League. They were promoted to the Senior B grade this season and have been doing very well. They overcame St. Mary's, Macroom in the Munster decider and St. Louis, Ballymena in the All-Ireland semi-final. They are coached by well-known G.A.A. broadcaster Liam Nash. Their most noted past pupil from a camogie point of view is Cora Keohane, the present Cork Senior goalkeeper.

COLÁISTE BRIDE, ENNISCORTHY

The school has an impressive record since the game was introduced in the Sixties by Sr. Mary Critchley. The school won the Purcell Cup in Croke Park in 1971. Senior success was achieved in 1972 when Coláiste Bride defeated old rivals Mountmellick in the Leinster Final. However, they were defeated by St. Louis, Kilkeel in the All-Ireland semi-final. They retained their Leinster crown but failed in the penultimate match in the following season.

Colàiste Bride contested last year's All-Ireland Post Primary School Senior Final against the same opposition as today. They led in the early stages and put up an excellent performance. The feeling is that today's side is a stronger one and confidence is high that they can realise their dream of lifting Corn Sceilge.

ST. MARY'S, CHARLEVILLE

St. Mary's make their 7th successive appearance at All-Ireland Colleges Finals Day. They have a very impressive record since Carnogie was introduced to the school in 1984. In addition to numerous Cork Colleges titles, St. Mary's have won 32 Munster Colleges titles.

St. Mary's have 16 All-Ireland Colleges titles to their credit. In 1986 they collected their first All-Ireland Colleges Junior Championship title and retained their crown in 1987. They won the title again in 1994 and 1995 and picked up their fifth Junior title a month ago. They have enjoyed considerable success in the All-Ireland Sevens claiming the title on eight occasions. This year, St. Mary's are going for their fourth All-Ireland Senior title in a row. Much of the credit for their success going to the dedication and coaching ability of Vincent Harrington and Ann-Marie O'Keeffe.

"We are now the leading convent in Ireland at camogic which is great.







THE QUEST FOR AN INTERNATIONAL OUTLET

With Hurling-Shinty internationals at under-21 and senior level between Ireland and Scotland under Compromise Rules now annual fixtures on the Gaelic Games calendar, it is perhaps not so surprising that the Camogie Association is moving to broaden the horizons of the sister game on this international front.

Camogle President Phylis Breslin and General Secretary Shiela Wallace visited Inverness in Scotland last month to explore the possibilities of establishing links with Ladies Shinty officials. They were encouraged by the enthusiastic response they received from the Scottish Ladies members.

"It is early days yet but the Scottish girls like ourselves were very keen to advance the cause of games between our two Associations", says Phylis Breslin.

The Camogie officials hope to build on the contacts over the coming months.

However, although Shinty is a long-established and very popular male sport, especially in the Highlands of Scotland, the ladies game is really only beginning to get off the ground.

Ladies Shinty competitions in fact are only a couple of years old. There are ten teams and these compete in a League. Clubs have long distances to travel but solid progress is being made.

The contacts between the Camogie Association and the Ladies Shinty officials were initiated by Sean O'Leary, Games Manager of the G.A.A. Discussions she had with Shelia Wallace led directly to this visit of the top two officials to Scotland with the party for the Hurling-Shinty internationals at under-21 and senior.

"When we first considered these contacts with Scotland we thought it might be a good move to send our Gael-Linn Cup (interprovincial championship) winners to Scotland for a game with the locals. However, from what we learned from our visit the Scotlish game is not yet up to that standard, so we will have to wait a little before deciding on a particular fixture," says Phylis Breslin.

The Camogie officials offered to return to Scotland in the next few months to review matters further and this offer was accepted.

"We also suggested that the Scots visit Ireland in September for the All-Ireland junior and senior carnogie finals at Croke Park and possibly field a team in the Glenalbyn All-Ireland Sevens in Dublin on the eve of the deciders.

"We would have to get permission from Glenalbyn for a Scottish Shinty team to compete in the All-Ireland Sevens, but I don't think that would raise any real problems. The visitors could then attend our junior and senior All-Ireland finals at Croke Park the following afternoon" commented the Camogie President.

That is certainly a sound suggestion as not many in Scotland have actually attended a camogie game.

The All-Ireland Sevens tournament has gone from success to success down the years and is now one of the highlights of the annual programme.

A visit to Dublin for the event would enable the Scottish enthusiasts to meet with players and officials from all over the country and and learn at first hand of the efforts being put in to the successful promotion of our national women's game.

The All-Ireland junior and senior finals the following afternoon would give the visitors a further valuable insight into the skills of sport.

Members of the Ladies Shinty
Association attended the Hurling-Shinty
under-21 and senior internationals at
Inverness last month and were very
impressed by the games under the
Compromise Rules.

On the evidence of the strides made in Hurling and Shinty in forging out the international series of games there is no reason why Camogie and Ladies Shinty officers can not come up with an attractive game involving both codes.

It will naturally enough take time, but at least a beginning has been made.

Philis Breslin says that there appears to be great interest in Ladies Shinty at schools and adult level.

However, a real problem for Ladies Shinty and for other sports is that when children move on to Senior School no sports are catered for and many understrandably drop out of their particular game.



Cork girls crush Clare to retain Munster minor title

Progress can also be measured by the introduction this season of the fifteen-a-side test series. This formation has obvious advantages in terms of the use of Cumann Luthchleas Gael pitches and increasing player participation.

The largest female sporting organisation in the country may take pride in the progress made during almost a hundred years in existence. It has long been apparent that the pitch dimensions needed to be increased at many levels of competition. So far, the fifteen-a-side does not appear to be causing problems at inter-county level, but clubs in some areas seem to be experiencing difficulties with pitches and in finding additional playersBut ard-runal Sheila Wallace reports

that retaining this new format is the best option for the game as a whole during the coming years, "we must overcome these obstacles and plan in advance for change.

A real effort must be made during the coming year, particularly at club level, to give this new departure a chance and to be in a position to adapt easily to change should it decided to retain the fifteen-a-side game.

Also, beginning in the year 2000, an All Ireland Minor B Championship will commence. This is welcome news for counties who have not recently featured in the A grade, and will be played in line with the existing Minor championship.

Camogic Congress in Thurles last month heard that Ardchomhairle is currently seeking major sponsorship of all of its competitions. If sufficient funding were then available, Cumann Camogaiochta na nGael would join with Cumann Luthchleas Gael in the Ireland/Scotland International annual Tournament and have Camogic/Shinty matches in conjunction with Hurling/Shinty matches. Cumann Luthchleas Gael has supported this proposal.

Ardehomhairle has further agreed that the team would be selected from the players who participate in the Gael Linn Interprovincial Senior competition.

Cumann Camogaiochta na nGael also decided that the unique contribution of

Sighle Nie an Ultaigh to the Association should be acknowledged in some way. Sighle first took office in 1925 as secretary of her club, the Betsy Gray Club, Warrenpoint, County Down. She then went on to become Chairperson of the Down County Board, and in 1947 progressed to the chair of Ulster Council. She has been a member of Ardchomhairle, and has attended Congress on an almost continuous basis since that time. 1949 saw her become Uachtarán,, and when her three year term was complete in 1952, she was re-elected for an additional year, thus extending the stipulated three year term.

She was elected as Ardrunai in 1953, a position to which she served up to 1975, when she decided to step down from office. Sighle has also been a member of Cumann Luthchleas Gael all of her days, and has already attended in excess of two hundred Hurling, Football and Camogie Senior Finals. She is now a member of the St. Peter's Hurling and Camogie Club in Warrenpoint, and is the author of the Down G.A.A History. "O Shiol go Bláth".

It has knocked down county borders to bring together 9 clubs, all of whom were becoming disillusioned with either the standard of competition within their own counties or with the amount of travel involved.

There are 3 clubs from Monaghan, and 2 each from Tyrone, Fermanagh and south Donegal.

In the Monaghan and Fermanagh cases, these clubs form the bulk of camogie activity within their respective counties.

Not so long ago, Teemore looked capable of challenging the big clubs in east Ulster, even managing to win underage provincial honours in the colours of Fermanagh, but the movement of those players into Further Education and the work-force took the girls further from home and lack of competitive action in the county led to a drop of interest.

In Monaghan, as the Ladies' Football grew to a position where they are regular challengers for All-Ireland titles, camogie Senior development suffered and the number of clubs functioning at senior level declined.

Geography was the main consideration in both Tyrone and Donegal, with the main camogie action centred in other "remoter" areas of the county in recent decades.

The new leagues will run each Saturday (again bucking tradition) in April, May and June and should help to provide real competitive camogie action for clubs in the "poorer" parts of Ulster.

The mid-Ulster league however is only an experiment, as Tom experiment, as Monaghan, cathairleach Uladh, Comhairle acknowledged at its launch recently.

"The strength of Gaelic Games traditionally has been the club unit within the county league set up and that will be our aspiration for every county. That is where our Developmennt Committees will seek to operate."

"However we recognise that the traditional structures in certain areas are weak and need special measures in the short term. That is why we have taken - in Gaelic Games terms - such a dramatic step to consolidate what we currently have."

"If we managed to get under - age development structures in place at each of the counties involved, and bring those through to adult level, hopefully we can look forward to the time when we do not need a cross-county club league."

When the mid-Ulster was first mooted, there was an indication that more clubs were interested, but 9 have thrown their caps into the ring and all 9 should benefit from the new set-up.
