With 13 out of the starting 15 having senior inter-county experience, UCC were under severe pressure to deliver the goods.

Clearly struggling to control her emotions after she accepted the silverware, captain Sinead O'Callaghan admitted: "It is an unbelievable feeling. We had to make up for last year's defeat to WIT. But, it was not just about avenging that loss, it was also about winning this season's Ashbourne Cup.

This was a crunch game for both teams, but the prolific scoring of Emer McDonnell was the big difference between the sides.

Crowned 'Player of the Tournament,' the supply was terrific for the Tipp player who danced around the back-lines on both days causing all kinds of consternation.

LORETO WHILE retained their Leinster senior championship title for the first-time ever, last Thursday afternoon's final in Carlow was one Colaiste Bride could have

The Enniscorthy girls, challenging for their first outright success since completing back-to-back titles in 1999, enjoyed periods of dominance at the start of either half, but ultimately they paid the price for failing to capitalise fully upon such an advantage. While after 13 minutes

In Saturday's semi-final, at the Shamrocks grounds in Enniscorthy, Coláiste Bride were much greater value for their victory than the scoreline might suggest.


They were easily the better side, an assertion which rings all the more true when noting ineffectiveness of Portumna attack comparison to that of Colaiste Bride.




EIMEAR DILLON (Harlequins)

### Congress breaks new ground with full-time appointment

ANNUAL Congress went ahead at Clarinbridge over the weekend, and what a significant occasion it proved to be.

For the first time in the history of the Camogie Association, the position of treasurer at national level will become a full-time post.

It was agreed unanimously, and while Jo Golden was re-elected it was decided that the incumbent treasurer would be prepared to continue in office until replaced by a full-time appointee.

The position of treasurer has always been a topical subject because with the overall development of the association, the workload has increased to such an extent that it has become virtually impossible for a person working on a voluntary basis to deal with it.

And it is envisaged that the job will become even more demanding in future. So, this is a timely appointment in-

Considering too that the association will be celebrating its centenary in 2004, it is desirable that added momentum be given to the drive for sponsorship and funding over the next couple of months and that the impetus be maintained thereafter.

Guest speaker at the conference, Joe McDonagh who is chief executive of Foras na Gaeilge (sponsors of the All Ireland senior championship) stressed that this was an important milestone and should be marked accordingly.

Speaking of the proposed strategic alliance with the GAA, the former President said, "it is my dream that camogie and the GAA would have a future together."

Congress also marked the launch of the association's first official coaching video with some of the country's top players displaying the skills of the game.

Noel Treacy, Junior Minister of State for Science and Technology who launched this video at congress said that this brings camogie up to the same level as hurling, football and ladies football This video is available country wide through County Boards and also from Croke Park at a cost of €30.

A motion from the Offaly County Board received the thumbs-up with the introduction of an All Ireland Junior club championship, likely to be played in

Meanwhile, National Secretary, Sile Wallace whose official title incidentally has now changed to Ard-Stiurathoir (Director/General) delighted the audience with the news that the proposed alliance with the GAA is set to progress.

Officials in Croke Park will send out an interim questionnaire to all the clubs in the country to assess their current involvement with their local GAA clubs.

It can then be determined what is happening at grassroots level. However, before a concrete decision will be made, it is proposed to hold a Special Congress to deal with the matter.


nn Downey is in an unusual position as the new season's National League gains in momentum. Unusual, in that she is now in a managerial role having retired from her long intercounty innings with Kilkenny two years ago. On the back of a distinguished intercounty career stretching back to the early 1970s, Ann Downey is one of the most talked-about bosses as the new season gets underway. She is taking over from Brendan Williams and Ted Browne (sister Angela's husband).

Helping her will be fitness trainer Anthony Geoghegan. The holder of a record twelve All-Ireland senior medals herself, Ann has plenty of talent at her disposal and will surely approach this year's National League campaign with an eye to the championship. The Cats' league outings in 2001 were a fiasco with little or no preparation going into their section games. Yet with the aid of the back-door system they won their way into the All-Ireland final, only to be defeated by an all-conquering Tipperary team in a one-sided final.

Kilkenny's open the league by entertaining of one of their greatest rivals, Cork. But, with many of the Cats' panel involved in Ashbourne and Purcell Cup competitions, there should not be much between the sides right now. Meanwhile, the Rebel County will once again train under manager, Pa Finn. Like their Noreside friends, Cork too have quite an involvement with the various third-level competitions with no fewer than ten of their players on parade with UCC. At least when this clash should have more "oomph" than their dreadful meeting last March, when Kilkenny were whitewashed, 3-19 to 0-0.

Tipperary will be the big guns once again in 2002, under the guidance of Michael Cleary. With many of his charges sprinkled amongst UCC, UCD, UL, WIT and Carlow IT, he will not be too worried about preparations for their opening league game at home to Gahway. Michael Kennedy and his daughter Colette Walsh have taken over the Western helm from Damien Coleman and Billy Carr.



I WAS most intrigued when looking through the programme of events coming up in Croke Park over the next month to see a PRO Seminar listed for the end of April.

And of course curiosity got the better of me as I went to find out what this was all about. When I called on the National Camogie PRO, Maire Ui Scolai she was only too willing to explain the reason why, and what this seminar would entail. Well, the subject was first aired at last year's Congress when various delegates expressed concern about their understanding of the role of PRO within the organisation, and Ms Scolai also touched on it at that same meeting.

It would appear that some officers had issues with regard to dealing with the media, and were unsure at times as to what the job involved. As a result of these questions being raised, the powers that be in Croke Park decided that they would put together a one-day programme including workshops - the end result being a greater awareness of the role of PRO and consequently then being able to sell Camogie in the best possible way.

This seminar is thrown open to all County PROs and people interested in the area of Public Relations. And judging from the high-profile speakers who will talk on the day, it is sure to generate a lot of interest for the various attendants.

Senior Producer and Director of RTE sport, Caroline Murphy and Denis Walsh, a journalist with the Sunday Times are among the elite band of media experts who will be involved.

From Croke Park, Publication and Media officer, Fergal McGill will attend, and Jerry O'Sullivan who is Sport's Presenter with INN will also give some useful hints on how best to present a report or relate a story to a radio audience.

This seminar, which will be held on Saturday April 20th in Croke Park, should prove to be a huge success, as most aspects of media reporting will be covered through the efforts of radio, print media and television personnel.

Meanwhile, what a day Wexford camogie had on Monday, coming to Leeside and defeating the home sides in both junior and senior grades in the National League. Or, should I say what a dismal afternoon it was for the Red and White - not because they lost to Wexford but the manner in which they succumbed. There appeared to be complacency in the way of thinking of some players. Surely, it is hungrier Cork should be getting, now that they are in their fourth year without a senior All-Ireland title. Unfortunately, unless this lateral thinking improves they will be pushed further down the pecking order.

#### TODAY'S FINALISTS

#### LORETO, FERMOY

Loreto Secondary School, Fermoy was founded by the Loreto Sisters in 1853. In the 1970's the school amalgamated with the Presentation Secondary School in the town. New buildings were added in the late 1960's and again in the 1980's. At present a major building project is on the verge of commencement, this will include a long dreamt of sports hall.

Until the 1980's Loreto was both a boarding and day school. When the boarding school closed the old dormitories were converted into classrooms and the refectory has become the canteen.

The student population is approximately 660 girls. Pupils come from the town of Fermoy itself and from a wide surrounding area of Co. Cork and parts of Co. Waterford and Co. Tipperary.

Sport is seen as very important in the School. As well as camogie, pupils also play football, hockey and basketball. Students also compete with enthusiasm and success in athletics, swimming and equestrian events.

Loreto is twinned with Lycée St. Seuveur in Redon. Pupils from this French school are looking forward to attending todays Final as they are here at present on an exchange visit.

#### ST. MARY'S, CHARLEVILLE

Camogie was introduced to St. Mary's in 1984. In addition to numerous Cork Colleges titles, St. Mary's have won 42 Munster Colleges A Titles and have 21 All-Ireland Colleges titles to their credit. The first of these was in 1986 when they collected their first All-Ireland Junior title and retained their crown in 1987. They won the Junior title again in 1994, 1995, 1999 and 2001. St. Mary's have enjoyed considerable success in the All-Ireland 7's competition, claiming the title on 10 occasions.

Charleville are indebted for much of their success to their local clubs, namely Ballygran, Ballyhea, Charleville, Granagh-Ballingarry, Kilmallock, Milford and Newtownshandrum and their trainers Anna Marie O'Keeffe, Vincent Harrington, Fr. Tim Hazelwood and Gerard O'Donovan.

#### SCOIL MHUIRE BALLINASLOE

Scoll Mhuire make their first ever appearance in an All-Ireland post primary schools final. They won the Junior Connacht final in 1998. The girls have been working hard all year and have showed great commitment throughout. Their hard work and dedication has finally paid off, earning them a place in not one but two All-Ireland Finals. The Junior team were the first to qualify by beating a very strong Wexford side in the semi-final. This game was a replay, as their first encounter ended a draw. Enroute today's final the Junior team have also defeated St. Cuans. Castleblakeney. HRC Mountbellew. They defeated Athenry Vocational School. New Inn Vocational School in the Connacht finals.

#### COLÁISTE BRÍDE, ENNISCORTHY

The school has an impressive record since Camogie was introduced in the sixties by Sr Mary Critchley. We have contested two All-Ireland Finals before this and achieved Junior success against Seamount, Kinvara, in 2000.

In 2001, Coláiste Bride reached the All-Ireland semi-finals, but had to withdraw from the competition due to the Foot and Mouth disease. However, the determination has continued and, en route to today's final, Coláiste Bride defeated Loreto Kilkenny and Portumna Community School. With only two games played to reach the Final, we will definitely be considered underdogs today. Eleven of today's panel are talented footballers, who were recently defeated by Monaghan in the Schools' Junior A All-Ireland semi-final.
