

# Cork take on Armagh in the League final

ST. FINBARRS GROUNDS in Togher is the venue on Sunday next for the National Senior League Final which will see Cork and Armagh in opposition at 1.30 and here we should have a great contest in store.

Cork have not won the League since 1992 and no doubt a return of this trophy to the Leeside would boost Cork's confidence as they prepare for the forthcoming Championship.

For Armagh and the Province of Ulster it will be an hiostoric day as Sunday will see a Northern team compete in the National Senior League Final for the first time ecer and thet will be making the long journey to Cork full of confidence and determination.

Armagh recorded a double last season winning both the All-Ireland Junior Championship and League titles and since their promotion to senior ranks have been making quite an impact. Their semi-final victory over a fancied Wexford side last Sunday certainly proved that they are ready for the big time. They will be spearheaded on Sunday by the experienced and captain of the side Mary Black, Bernie McBride, Ursula McGivern, Mar-garet Moriarty and goalkeeper Maggie McCann and these girls on form can cause problems for the toughest of opposition.

Cork on the other hand will be the more experienced and aoded with a home venue will start as favourites for Sunday's clash. Last Sunday's victory over arch rivals Kilkenny, will certainly have boosted their confidence, by the selectors are quick to point out, that while many would have regarded this game as the

final, they certainly are not of the same opinion and are expecting a very tough game from their Northern opponents.

Therese O'Callaghan will be at centre forward with Collette O'Mahony, Lynn Dunlea and Irene O'Keeffe completing the full forward line.

ARMAGH will create their own bit of history when they travel to Cork on Sunday to play the home side in the National Senior League camogie final.

The Northerners, seeking their first title, are the first side from Ulster to contest the final of this competition, which was not in existence when the great Antrim side were at their peak.

Cork, on the other hand, will be looking for their fifth win in the competition and with home advantage, and having defeated All-Ireland Kilkenny last Sunday, they will start hot favourites to add another title to their collection.

The home side will be the same as that which started against Kilkenny last Sunday, with Colette

O'Mahony, who received a hand injury and had to be replaced in that game, back in action. Hilda Kenneally, who received a head injury after coming in as a sub against Kulkenny, is listed amongst the

Armagh, who have enjoyed tremendous success in recent years in the Junior grade, winning the league in 1980, 1988 and '94 and the All-Ireland title in 1994, have the

nucleus of a good side. They have players from several clubs on their panel, including Aine Lennon from Clann na Gael, Mary Donnelly, St. Brendan's, Mary Black, St. Mochua's, Orlagh Murphy St. Bridget's and Patricia McEvoy from Crossmaglen Rangers.

# Cork turn on the style

Cork 5-16, Armagh 3-4

CORK had little difficulty in capturing their fifth National Senior League camogie title at St. Finbarr's Grounds, Togher, yesterday, when they had a comprehensive victory over a gallant Armagh side who lacked the craft and experience of the home

Cork played with a strong wind in the opening half and were well worth their 3-7 to 0-2 interval lead. In contrast to the previous Sunday, when they defeated Kilkenny in the semi-final, they rarely missed any reasonable scoring chance and had three excellent goals.

The first goal, in the 4th minute, was set up by Colette O'Mahony who found Lyn Dunlea free five meters out and the full-forward blasted home. O'Mahony scored the second herself in the 14th minute when she was on hand to bat home the rebound after Irene O'Keeffe's effort was brilliantly saved by goalkeeper Margaret McKee. Three minute's later the Barr's star again rose the green flag when she shot hard and low to leave the Cork side 3-3 to 0-1 in front after sixteen minutes.

Armagh then tightened up in defence for the remainder of the half and forced a rampant Cork side to shoot from long range.

Cork continued to show good form in the second-half when playing against the wind. Paula Goggins was having a tremendous game at right halfback and Sandie Fitzgibbon and Mags Finn gave their respective opponents little scope.

Vivienne Harris, who was the star of the game, did trojon work in the middle of the field ably supported by Stephanie Dunlea and this allowed Therese O'Callaghan and Irene O'Keeffe to stretch the Armagh defence and they set up some lovely attacking moments - most notably the one which yielded their fourth goal. Stephanie Dunlea broke from midfield before parting to her sister Lyn who raced at the Armagh defence before setting up Therese O'Callaghan to score from close range.

Armagh had their best spell between the 42nd and 47th minute when they scored two goals and a point to cut the deficit to 3-12 to 2-4 but that was the nearest they came to the winners and a goal by Bernie McBride a minute from time only managed to put a better complexion on the scoreboard.

For the visitors, Geraldine Haughty was very solid in defence. Ann French and Mary Black tried hard at midfield, while Bernie McBride Olive McGeown and Patricia McEvoy were the pick of the



# CAMOGIE

The sun smiled at O'Connor Park, Tullamore for the finals of the All-Ireland Post Primary Camogie Championships. Months of misery and headaches caused by continuous rain relented and the warm sunshine was greeted enthusiastically by the players and their followers.

St. Mary's, Charleville made a brave bid to join Presentation Athenry and St. Raphael's, Loughrea, the only colleges to record a senior and junior championship double on the same day. Their junior team retained their All-Ireland crown in style while their senior squad finished only one score adrift of Presentation, Kilkenny.

As in their other games, Charleville made a slow start in the junior game. But it was soon obvious that they were a more skilful outfit than their Derry opponents, St. Mary's, Magherafelt. Forwards Sinead O'Callaghan, Eileen O'Brien, Caoimhe Harrington and Angela Sheehy combined beautifully to score excellent points.

With the wind to their backs
Magherafelt set about reducing
Charleville's eight point advantage from
the first half. But their efforts only
prompted the Munster side to raise their
game and put the issue beyond doubt.
Charleville were worthy winners of the
fourth All-Ireland Colleges Junior title
on the scoreline of 2-12 to 1-1.

Vincent Harrington has achieved a lot in the past decade with the camogie players of Charleville. The school has won four junior and four seven aside titles at All-Ireland level and contested two senior finals. With the majority of his players available again next season, he will undoubtedly have another shot at the clusive senior title.

Likewise Rita Moran, a former All-Ireland player with Antrim, has brought St. Mary's Magherafelt to the forefront. Ulster junior champions for the past four years, St. Mary's have contested three junior and two seven aside finals at All-Ireland level in that period. Their day must surely come.

Presentation, Kilkenny will always be remembered as the first All-Ireland Colleges Champions, Players of the calibre of Helena O'Neill, Liz Neary, Bridie Martin and Teresa O'Neill progressed to be Kilkenny stars for many years.

The current Presentation, Kilkenny team has its ready made stars. Michelle Fennelly, Sinead Costello and Marie Maher wore the black and amber for the Kilkenny senior team which defeated Wexford in the All-Ireland final last September.

Great things were expected from this Kilkenny side. From early in the season word from Leinster of their exploits marked them as potential champions. Yet the younger and lighter Charleville side were ahead by 0-3 to 0-1 at the change over. However, one could sense that this narrow margin would not suffice.

Presentation forged ahead. Three goals in the third quarter seemed to have the Kilkenny girls firmly on the road to victory. Charleville stormed back for a dramatic finish. Goals from Caoimhe Harrington and Vera Sheehan brought St. Mary's back into the game but time ran out.

Congress 1995 was a tame affair. The lack of any controversial matter kept the speakers to little more than a dozen. The rest were content to enjoy the comforts of the Tower Hotel and let the gathering sail by.

There was little support for Ard Chomhairle's attempt to stage All-Ireland

semi-finals at neutral venues as against the present set-up of home venues. Likewise Kildare's motion to confine the Intermediate Championships to teams of that grade failed to win an adequate share of the vote. At present teams which are defeated in the first round of the senior championship may gain admittance to the Intermediate Championship.

The meeting decided to discontinue the post match reception on All-Ireland Day for a trial period of two years. It was argued that players preferred to spend the Sunday evening with their own team, friends and families than be whisked away to meet up with the other three county teams. A lunchtime function on the Monday will be organised in its place.

Connacht sought to increase the number of All-Ireland medals allocated to a team from sixteen to twenty. However, the meeting considered that this would have the effect of lowering the status of a medal. In the case of junior teams the winning side would have twenty players up-graded instead of sixteen. It lacked sufficient support to be passed.

The ongoing discussions with the G.A.A. are to continue. Talks with the aim of bringing the two Associations closer together have been in progress since the initial approach of the G.A.A. While the end result cannot be anticipated, a set-up whereby the Camogie Association would retain its autonomy would appear to be favoured at this stage.

On Sunday next the National Senior League Final will be decided. This year it is a final with a difference. It is the first time since the National Senior League was inaugurated in 1977 that an Ulster County has contested a final. Armagh will face a torrid test when they travel to take on Cork. This is the first year for the Orchard County to take part in Senior ranks and they have deservedly reached the final after disposing of the holders Galway. They failed to Kilkenny, but once again showed their true metal on Sunday last with their win over Wexford. They are a confident squad with excellent performers in Margaret Moriarity, Margaret McKee, Bernie McBride, Ursula McGivern, Aine French, Mary Black and Olive McGeown.

Cork will be appearing in their tenth final having won four: 1984, '86, '91 and '92 (when they defeated Wexford 2-17 to 0-10). The following year they were back in the final against Kilkenny for the first 15-a-side campaign and were defeated in the semi final last year by

Galway.

This year the League reverted to 12-a-side. The Leesiders have been showing great promise. They only dropped two points to Wexford 4-10 to 2-13. They have a host of stars and are sure to be well served by the Dunlea sisters Lynn and Stephanie, Linda Mellerick, Therese O'Callaghan, Irene O'Keeffe, Colette O'Mahoney, Paula Goggins, Sandy Fitzgibbon and an excellent goalie in Kathleen Costine.

They will not be taking their opponents lightly in what promises to be an entertaining tussle. However, Armagh will get it hard to lift their first title down by the banks of the Lee.

The following are some extracts from Sile De Bhaillis, Ard Rúnai's report to Congress:

'In presenting my tenth report as your Ard Rúnaí, it appears that the same issues have been raised on an annual basis during the last ten years and, indeed prior to that. However, this is not necessarily an indication that little or no progress has been made by the Association, as certain issues, by their very nature need to be addressed on a continuous basis with the view to improvement and

The core business of our Association, that of promoting Camogie, is our primary responsibility but, like any organisation or business, we must recognise outside influences which can both impede and aid such promotion. We need to meet and overcome many challenges which present themselves and work from our strengths in the furtherance of our aims.

Our game is intrinsically attractive, very many of our players are highly skilled opponents of the game and bring great honour to the

Association in general, while those involved in the many areas of organisation have a considerable amount of expertise, experience and vision. Cumann Camógaíochta na nGael has the ability to expand and develop and with almost a century of tradition behind

it, should be optimistic about the future.

While talent and skill, coaching and commitment are major contributors to success, the introduction of the Intermediate Championship has played a certain role in achieving a balance in standards. It has the dual purpose of providing a stepping stone between Junior and Senior ranks, and of providing Championship competition for the less successful Senior teams. It has been suggested on a few occasions since it's introduction that counties simply be graded Senior, Intermediate and Junior, with no Senior team participating at Intermediate level. This could result in certain Junior teams being regraded to their own detriment and that of the Senior Championship as a meaningful competition. The Intermediate competition needs more time in order to develop before it is changed in any way.

#### NATIONAL PRO P.J. FULHAM FOCUSSES ON CAMOGIE IN ROSCOMMON.

#### ROSCOMMON'S BID FOR GLORY

Records have shown that Canogie was played in Co. Roscommon as far back as 1913; however it wasn't until 1956 that en-official Co. Beard was formed. In 1968, there were 7 clubs affiliated strangely, in 1994 the number of affiliated clubs remains at seven. The game is played within a 15 mile radius of Roscommon town which indeed is also the hurling stronghold in the County Efforts to spread the game to other areas have so far proved unsuccessful.

Presently competitions are organised for all grades, including U-12, U-14 and U-16. Championship. The underage competitions are run over the summer months. The County is divided into Junior and Senior grades with both League & Championship competitions organised for both grades. There is also a very successful Co. Primary Schools Competition which is run in conjunction with Cumann na mBunscoil. 1994 saw a total of 14 schools take part and much credit is due to the teachers in the County for their hard work and indeed the efforts of Cumann na mBunscoil, especially Camogic Co-ordinator Michael Kelly, as this competition has contributed greatly to the promotion of the game at underage level.

Roscommon County teams have enjoyed moderate success over the years. Many talented underage teams have taken part in provincial competitions, however neighbours Galway have far too often proved too strong.

however, on a number of occasions.
Roscommon have managed to overcome the Galway teams and take provincial honours. 1970 saw the first ever Junior title come to Roscommon, when the team trained by Gabriel Keating defeated Galway on a score of 6 goals to one goal. This success was repeated again in 1971 and 1975 respectively. Many fine players from those years have since given great service to camogic in the County, namely Ann Naughton, Kathleen Gannon, Marie Benedeti & Maura Quigley to name but a few. Indeed, two officers of the present County Board were members of the 75 victorious team - Marie O'Brien (nee McDonnell) & Marion Conway (nee Collins).

National camogic honours first came to the County when in 1979, Convent of Mercy Rescommon won the All-Ireland Junior Colleges title defeating Kilfmane of Limerick. From that winning team Catherine Hoare (nee Carty) is presently playing with the Roscommon Junior team of 94. A second All-Ireland title was won by the same school again in 1983, when the Junior team defeated St. Pauls Kilrea, and Mary Cannon a member of that team still appears on the Roscommon Junior team of 1994.

National honours were also won by one of Roscommon's strongest Clubs, Oran when their U-14 teams won All-Ireland Feile na nGael titles on three occasions - 1980, 1982 and 1989 respectively. Well known County player Karina Jones (nee McDonnell) also achieved national success while a member of the victorious UCG team that won the Ashbourne in 1989.

Indeed Roscommon has produced many fine players over the years. In 1981 six Roscommon players won Gael Linn medals with the only Connacht Junior team to win Gael Linn. The players were P. O'Connor, J. Rogers, M. Byrne (St. Dominics) K. Hoey, M. Collins, M. Coyle (Four Roads), Mairead Coyle is presently a member of the Roscommon Junior team.

1986 saw Roscommon capture another Connacht title and repeated this performance in 1990. The team also reached the National League semi-final in 1988 and the National League final in 1990 under the management of Liam Bracken.

This year the Junior team, under new management of Michael Kelly, Marie O'Brien & Mairead Goyle, re-enter and the National League after a lapse of a number of years. This is in the hope of building a panel for next years championship. The team have got off to a good start with a fine win over Leinster champions, Kilkenny. They went down to All-Ireland finalists Limerick by only three points, so this must augur well for next year.

The Foundation Level course is primarily geared to cater for people coaching at Juvenile level. minimum age for coaches at this level

Having successfully completed a Foundation Level course and submitted I sample training session and log book, and are 18 years or over, Coaches can then advance to Level 1 Course.

Having successfully completed the Level I course and filled in the logbook, Coaches can then advance to Level 2 course.

The same principle applies to coaches who advance to Level 3 and Level 4 courses.

#### Existing Coaches:

Consideration is currently being given as to how Coaches who have previously qualified or who have acquired sufficient practical experience will be integrated into this new system.

Coaching The Development Committee would welcome the attendance of experienced Coaches at both Foundation and Level 1 Coaching Courses. This would allow them the opportunity to familiarise themselves with the new Coaching structure.

Organisation of Courses: Central Coaching Committee in conjunction with the Regional Coaching Committee will have responsibility for the organisation of Foundation and Level 1 courses.

#### Course Tutors:

The Foundation and Level 1 courses will be given by our Tutors, Brendan Williams and Colette Kennedy. They will be joined by Grace O'Neill and Cathy Hannigan during 1995.





# Hurley making legend dies

"THE burley surgeon who helped Cork" — trumpeted the Cork Examiner headline the day after Cork burlers defeated Kilkenny to complete the famous All-Ireland three-in-a-row

The man behind those headlines was hurley making legend Michael McCarthy of Riverstown, Co. Cork who died on Tuesday at the age of 86.

Cork coach Fr. Bertie Troy wasn't happy with the striking of some of his stars in 78 and who better to summon in his hour of need but master craftsman McCarthy, who had supplied custom made sticks for the greatest of them all — Michael's idol Christy Ring. He was so proud of that connection that up to the day of his death Christy's hurley took pride of place over his bed. His family say it will remain there.

#### QUALITY NEVER SURPASSED

It's history now that Cork completed that great treble, but Mick's contribution must also go on the record for the quality of his hurleys that year was never surpassed, accord-

ing to coach Fr. Troy.

Mind you, Brian Corcoran might argue with that assessment for he maintains Michael's sturdy sticks were the driving force as he became an All Star in '92. High praise indeed as one must remember that those hurleys were crafted with, dare we say it, almost primitive tools.

I remember him telling me once that because someone had borrowed his plane he put the finishing touches to a Ring hurley using broken glass.

Ring was loud in his praise of McCarthy and regularly directed the Gleastars to Mick's workshop. Tomas Mukahy, in his heyday, always used a McCarthy special.

Other greats who wielded his

hurleys with distinction were Paddy Barry, Micka Brennan, Jimmy Brohan, Ray Cummins, Jimmy Barry Murphy, Seanie Leary, Teddy McCarthy, John Fenton, John Fitzgibbon, Denis Coughlan, Johnny Crowley, Mick Kennefick, Willie John Daly and Denis Murphy. And thats only a short list.

He will also be sadly missed by his many friends in the Riverstown foot beagles, where he was a committee member for almost 55 years. Life long friends Billy O'Flynn and Sars stalwart Bertie Murphy said he was a tireless worker and a great allround sportsman.

He was a racing fanatic and travelled to meetings all over Ireland by rail and road with O'Flynn — often accompanied by his son Danny and Examiner racing correspondent Pat Keane.

In his playing days he suffered the disappointment of losing four senior hurling championship finals with his beloved Carrigtwohill — the Barr's being their conquerors in '32 and '33 and the Glen in '35 and '37, the Glen getting a walkover in '35 because Carrigtwohill were in dispute with the Co. Board.

His popularity was reflected in the fact that hundreds of sportsmen travelled from far and wide to attend his removal last night. He will be buried today in Rathcooney Cemetery after 2.30 Requiem Mass in St. Josephs Church, Riverstown.

He will be sadly missed from his perch outside his home in Riverstown and we will all miss the banter and big match postmortems.

We extend our sympathy to his daughter Breda, sons Danny and Johnny, sisters Nell and Peg, nephews and niece. He was predeceased by his wife, Kitty.




# Glen look for a 21st party
