Colaiste Mhuire, Ennis, contested their first Munster Colleges Senior final in 1968 and their most recent in 1987. The title has so far eluded the Clare school. On Saturday, they will have another chance when they line out against St. when they line out against St. Mary's, Charleville, in the 1988 Munster final.

Colaiste started the season in uncertain terms. Their coach, Mick Meagher, had taken a year's leave of absence taken a year's leave of absence and no other teacher showed interest in taking over the team. The girls organised themselves in the beginning and later Fiona Whyte from the Eare Og club, where most of the girls play their club camogie, stepped in to help.

Comprehensive side, they were installed as likely champions. Colaiste and Charleville contested the 1987 final. Tight marking resulted in low scoring and only a single point decided the outcome in Charleville's favour.

St. Mary's retain colleges title

St. Mary's, Charleville 2-2, Colaiste Mhuire 0-4

ST. MARY'S, CHARLEVILLE retained their Munster Colleges senior camogie championship title at Ballyagran, Co. Limerick on Saturday when they repeated their 1987 final success over luckless Colaiste Mhuire of Ennis on a 2-2 to 0-4 scoreline.

Bearing in mind the heavy nature of the pitch and the vicious hail storm that lashed the players for a ten minute spell in the second half, this was a game of remarkably high quality which the Charleville girls more or less clinched in the first half during which they played against the elements and still managed to turn over leading 1-1 to 0-3.

The decisive moment of the opening half came after 15 minutes when Fiona Reidy snatched a goal for Charleville. Ennis had the better of matters territorially but seemed to rely too much on Catherine O'Loughlin who scored all their three points.

Claire O'Callaghan scored Charleville's point in the first half and then five minutes after the interval scored the goal that ensured that the title would return to St. Mary's for the second successive year. She was unable to make contact from a free but as the ball fell to the ground she pulled on it and crashed a fierce shot past the

Ennis defence and helpless goal-keeper, Shelly Hegarty.

Leading 2-1 to 0-3, Charleville had several opportunities to stretch their lead. Some of their misses bordered on the unbelievable but, in fairness, control was extremely difficult as the hail thundered down and icy hands found it impossible to grip the sticks.

To their credit, Ennis never gave up the fight and when the brilliant Catherine O'Loughlin struck for her fourth point with ten minutes remainthey were within a goal of Charleville who continued to experience difficulty in finding the target and didn't wrap up the match until the closing stages when Frances Broderick sent over a well-taken point.

Universities gather for Ashbourne Cup

THE highlight of the universities camogie calendar is the Ashbourne Cup weekend and this year Cork play host to the competition, when over 200 players and officials will arrive in Cork on Friday, to join in the 74th Ashbourne Cup.

The UCC camogie club is proud to be the oldest club in Cork and has consistently contested the Ashbourne since it's inception in 1915, when it was donated by Lord Ashbourne.

UCC have won twentyfive Ashbourne titles, second only to their nearest rivals, UCD, who have won thirty-four. They are the only college to have won six titles ina-row, from 1922 to 1928 and more recently from 1972 to 1978. With the honour of hosting the competition this year, UCC are determined to recapture the title last won in 1985.

The club has always had its stars, but in more recent years, players such as Noelle O'Driscoll, Claire Cronin, Anne-Marie Landers, Patsy Keniry and Anne Delaney, all

players, have made the contributions to the competition.

The C.C.I.A. lay down very strict guidelines regarding a players eligibility. The player must be a full-time registered student of her college to be allowed to play in any C.C.I.A. competitions. A list of eighteen names must be sent to each of the other colleges at least fourteen days before the Ashbourne preliminaries.

In other words, each college knows the other teams panel of players at least two weeks before the competition begins. No new players can be added to this panel once

it has been posted to the other colleges.


Sunday is of course the big day for those teams competing in the finals, but all teams and supporters turn out to encourage and shout for their own particular favourites. The venue will be at the Mardyke, UCC. The Duracht final is played first, followed by the Ashbourne final itself.

Sunday night is for many, the highlight of the weekend. On this night the Ashbourne dinner is traditionally held, this year in the Metropole Hotel. The original Cup is still presented every year. It is valued in the region of £3,000 and for this

reason, the Cup is presented at the dinner and not after the final. The stand has the names of every player who has ever won an Ashbourne medal engraved on it.

By MARY MORAN PRESIDENT MARY LYNCH TO STEP DOWN AFTER A HECTIC TERM OF OFFICE

MARY Lynch, the twentieth Uachtarán of Cumann Camogaíochta na nGael, has completed a hectic term of office and will step down at the forthcoming Congress in her native Monaghan. The first lady from her county and the fifth from Ulster to hold the prestigious post, Mary may reflect with satisfaction and pride on the last three years.

Mary brought a wealth of experience to the job. A former All-Ireland player, an inter-county referee, county team coach, county and provincial cathaoirleach, she was familiar with and well practised in all aspects of the Association.

She accumulated considerable mileage as she journeyed to the four corners of the country to promote camogie. In addition to the normal heavy schedule, she supervised the initial Coischéim, Medical/Coaching Seminar and Youth Convention.

Congress 1986 instructed Mary to appoint a Commission to examine all aspects of the Camogie Association. She will receive the completed report shortly and present it to Congress 1988.

The Commission is of the opinion that the Camogie Association can stand favourably with other sports. While recognising the great work which has been done and is being done at all levels, it believes that a still greater effort is required to reach full

Reorganisation of the Ard Comhairle sub-committees is called Time consuming routine matters, presently dealt with by Ard Comhairle, are allocated to subcommittees. A more comprehensive role is envisaged for the Management Committee. Future planning and development will occupy much of the members' time.

Fund-raising warrants a separate committee and the Games Committee will handle grading, transfers, fixtures and appeals. The Administration Committee will work hand in hand with the proposed County Development Committees.

Under the heading Competitions, the Commission suggests an All-Ireland Intermediate Championship with a view to bridging the wide gulf between junior and senior. Lack of interest in the senior interprovincials gives rise to its replacement with an annual fixture between the All-Ireland champions and the Rest of Ireland XII.

With regard to the playing of the game, the duration of inter-county matches is increased to sixty minutes. The apparent advantage of an attacker in possession over her opponent has called for a ban on scores from the hand. The compulsory use of helmets for players of fourteen and under, greater powers for neutral umpires and a maximum size pitch for all inter-county games are advocated.

Under the heading of promotion, there is a call for greater attention to detail in all aspects of organisation. It is suggested that a Public Relations Consultant would be appointed to do a once-off examination with a view to improving the game's image.

If the Commission's plan for the recruitment of referees is accepted, clubs who do not provide referees will find themselves ineligible for fixtures. A section is included covering the prevention of injury and how to deal with injury when it occurs which was submitted by camogie orientated members of the medical profession.

The production of a top quality video on the skills of the game, an outlay on promotional and exhibition material, a vigorous campaign to obtain sponsorship, a realistic and practical input by youth in the affairs of the Association and a concentration on development of the game in Primary Schools are listed for attention.

The conclusion of two years of examination and discussion by members of the Commission are now in the hands of the Association. The delegates who congregate Monaghan will decide to accept or reject their findings.

KILKENNY AND DUBLIN TO RENEW RIVALRY ON THE DOUBLE

Kilkenny and Dublin destined to renew what is becoming something of an annual rivalry in the All-Ireland senior open-draw championship ... a new fixture to mark the capital's Millennium Year. These are some of the features of a very full season of events that promises another successful and exciting season in camogie.

The campaign will get under way at the end of the month when the National Junior League, which started back in October and was suspended for the winter break, will resume. Nineteen counties are competing in the Junior League.

The National Senior League - Kilkenny hold the title - will not commence until March 13.

But back to that Kilkenny and Dublin rivalry. The Dubs were All-Ireland champions when they lined out against Kilkenny in the 1985 national championship final. They lost that game, and were once beaten again by Kilkenny in the 1986 All-Ireland final.


Last year Kilkenny again proved Dublin's bogey side. They beat the Metropolitans in the National League final in June, and then in August, Dublin had a home venue for their All-Ireland semi-final with the Noresiders, but were well beaten. Kilkenny went on to chalk up their first treble of All-Ireland senior championships, and so confirm their status as the outstanding team of the 'Eighties in the senior game.

The championship draw for 1987 has brought Kilkenny and Dublin into opposition in a first round tie. That will be on July 24, and the Dubs must travel to Kilkenny.

It is tough luck on Dublin that they must come up against their old rivals at such an early stage of the championship, but at least they will have plenty of time to build up strength for that clash.

Even before then, however, we are guaranteed an early show-down between these great rivals in a competitive game. They are in the same group in the National League, and will meet in a second round tie at a Kilkenny venue.

The Senior League should once again provide a useful guide to the champi-



onship campaign. Eight Counties will compete in two groups. Kilkenny and Dublin will be joined in their section by Cork, runenrs - up for the All-Ireland title last year, and Wexford, and this is very clearly the stronger of the two groups.

It seems probably that the winners of the League title proper will emerge from this section, although Antrim, Clare, Galway or Limerick, who will compete in the other group, may have something to say about that later in the year.

The League final has been fixed for June 12. The Junior final will be played a week later.

The same counties entered for the Senior League will vie for the O'Duffy Cup later in the season. Wexford have been drawn against Clare. Galway will meet Antrim, and Limerick will oppose Cork. The remaining tie is that clash between Kilkenny and Dublin.

FINAL REPEAT

Kilkenny or Dublin will meet Galway or Antrim in one semi-final. This means that there is a possibility of a repeat of last year's decider between the Noresiders and the Leesiders, but a lot of water must flow under the bridge before we arrive even close to that possible situation. The championship starts on July 10.

Preda Holmes, stylish full forward in the Kilkenny senior camogie team, and Michael Walsh, a master of the handball court from Roscommon, have more in common than the fact that both were champion competitors in a big way on the sporting scene in 1987.

They enjoyed such success, in fact, that they have just been rewarded for their achievements over-all with the coveted Player of the Year awards for their respective sports under the popular B&I Line G.A.A. awards promotion. And, no sooner had Breda and Michael received their trophies than they assured me they had no intention of reasting on their hard won laurels.

Kilkenny will be striving for a fourth

All-Ireland senior camogic championship in succession later this year, and their gifted full forward told me that training was about to commence for the squad. She also reported that the champions expected to have all their regulars available again this season.

That will mean that Angela Downey, Liz Neary and Bridie Martin, all former B&l Line Player of the Year award winners, incidentially, will be in line to join an exclusive company of players in Gaelic Games in general who have won eight All-Ireland senior medals. Breda Holmes, in contrast, is a

comparative newcomer to the county senior team. But in her short career so far at inter-county level she has won more than many players gain in a lifetime. "I first played for Kilkenny in any grade of camogie in the National Senior League in 1985. We won the title that year, and went on to capture the All-Ireland championship. The Redmond sisters, Anne and Yvonne, of Dublin, are among other players whom Breda Holmes rates very highly.

As for the immediate future, the quietspoken Kilkenny teacher, who is also one of the county's most able camogie officials, is looking forward with quiet confidence to the up-coming season.

The selection of Breda Holmes now brings to seven Kilkenny's total of B&1 awards since 1975 to seven.

'MISSIONARY' / DRIVE IN LONDON

MARY Noonan, secretary of the London County Camogie Board, has taken to task the aspect of establishing the structure of an organised coaching framework in the cross-Channel capital, and on February 27-28 two of the top coaches in the Camogie Association will fly in to supervise its introduction to London.

Last year, London sent across two Board delegates to begin the process of relations building with the Camogle Association at the 1987 Congress in Clare.

Informal talks were held, and from those discussions, planning started on the objective of putting together a special two-day Coaching Seminar.

On Saturday, two of the country's leading authorities on coaching the skills of the game, Antrim's Rosina McManus, past President of the Association and Cork's Mary Moran, an All-Ireland medal holder, and coach to various Cork minor, Junior, and senior All-Ireland Championship winning sides, will fly in to take charge of the course.

Evidence of an upsurge in interest in camogie in the London area over the past three years has fuelled renewed conviction within their County Board to strengthen the grasp of the sport.

Coaching courses, since the Ulster Convention opted to initiate a Coaching Programme for the Province in 1966, a policy which has enjoyed widespread benefits throughout the country since that time, have played a very important role in the continuing development of camogie.

Needless to say, every club and county wishing to become successful have availed of the opportunity supplied by coaching courses, which led to the initiation of the National Coaching Course at Gormanstown annually, to learn the correct techniques and the up to date training methods required to further their ambitions.

Now, London's clubs, which presently number five, and their players, made up mainly of the growing numbers of students now working and studying in the area, and Irish exiles, have decided to avail of the opportunities at their disposal.

Rosina McManus, one of the major forces behind the setting up of the National Coaching Course, feels this is just the beginning of greater things. It is the aspiration of the Antrim and Ulster official that this London excursion must be viewed as but a step in the right direction.

"I think it will probably be the thoughts of most people, and that of most counties, that this is a continuing process. Most will express the view that the course will be too short, and will look for a follow on", says Rosina, "If people can find the money required, courses for the advanced beginners, improvers, and advanced skills can be undertaken. What I would be looking for from this is that representatives of all London's five clubs will attend, and that the London Board will sponsor members of their clubs to go to the National Coaching Course in Gormanstown this year.

ormanstown this year.
"In that way, members of

their clubs can become fully qualified coaches under the requirements of the National Coaching Course. What I would be looking to achieve is a break down, and in that way you become closer to the people involved.

"If their Board can sponsor some of their mombers to attend Gormanstown, and if they achieve the level required, then they can go back to their various clubs and coach the game themselves. That, eventually, is what I would look for.

"The ideal thing, we would feel, is that that applies to all County Boards. There are about 100 qualified coaches, but a good many are inactive. We would be hoping for the County Boards to sponsor a number of

people to go to Gormanstown to become qualified coaches, and use the course to the full, and the coaches to the full".

On Sunday at the Northhumberland Park Sports Centre in Tottenham, London's active camogie enthusiasts will experience the benefits of properly organising coaching under the guiding influence of two of Ireland's leading specialists.

The special seminar will deal with all espects of the game. Newcomers to the game will see at first hand the various skills demonstrated and explained in detail. For the more advanced, the weekend should prove equally benefical.

CAMOGIE CAMOGIE Mary Moran reports column COLUMN on the major motions discussed at Annual Congress in Monaghan

HE return of London to the All-Ireland championship, election of a new President and proposed changes to the size of the playing pitch were the main talking points at the Annual Congress held in Monaghan.

Kildare born Mary Noonan travelled from London to put her case for the inclusion of a London team in the All-Ireland Junior Championship. She was delighted with the warm response to her request. Connacht offered London a place in their championship but the meeting felt it more appropriate to arrange a special quarter final to facilitate the newcomers.

London were drawn to meet the Munster winners and will wear a uniform based on the colours of the four provinces. Wearing green skirts, white jerseys with blue and gold hoops, they will be very distinctive.

London, of course, fielded a team in the All-Ireland Senior Championship in the fifties. It is sad to note that the growth of the game in the London area coincides with peaks of emigration from this country. Within the past two years, seven clubs have been formed.

The clubs are naturally based in areas where there is a large Irish population. London-Irish the first club to affiliate, is based in the Finsbury Park area. It was followed quickly by Croydon and Tara clubs. Newham Gaels, St. Michaels and Green Isles brought the number to six. The latest addition is Islington Irish in North London.

Majella O'Neill, who won an All-Ireland senior medal with Kilkenny in 1977, is the leader of the London County Board. Ettie Kelly (Meath), Mary Noonan (Kildare), Rita O'Hanlon-Wright (Galway) and

Teresa Finneran (Roscommon) are the other officers.

Members of the National Coaching Committee held a coaching course in London in late February. From the standard of play on view, there is no doubt but that London will be in a position to field a strong side.

When camogie was revived in the Aghabullogue area in the late sixties, she became involved once again. She joined the Inniscarra Club when the game was organised in her parish.

Firstly, as a selector, Mary became involved in the affairs of the Cork County Board. She served as cathaoirleach of the County Board and Munster Council. Mary is already well-known around the country and will not spare herself covering events.

Kilkenny presented a very detailou report on their Pilot Scheme for the full sized G.A.A. pitch measurements. They arrived at the conclusion that the playing strength would require to be increased to fifteen to cover the larger playing area.

However, due to an oversight, a motion to increase the playing strength to fifteen was overlooked. As the other relevant motions which appeared on the Congress papers referred to a twelve aside game, Kilkenny were left with little option but to withdraw them.

Players and spectators alike have often remarked that camogie matches are too short. In future, inter-county senior and junior championship games will be over sixty minutes. The alteration will be effective for the 1988 championships.

The banding of sticks lead to a lively debate. Increased cost of hurleys and poor quality of same prompted support for the lifting of the ban on the use of metallic banding. However, the prospect of injury caused others to withhold support. The motion failed to gain the necessary two-thirds majority.

The well organised Congress in Monaghan catered for the largest attendance in recent years. As originally feared, the meeting failed to finish the extremely heavy agenda. In excess of twenty motions, bye-laws and the Commission Report will be tackled when Congress reconvenes at Croke Park on 14th May.

As a member of St. Cronan's athletic club she keeps herself busy in the winter time in cross country events and she MAY 1988




