







The Evening Echo honours Cork's sporting legends on November 8

THERE are other counties in which the dual star can burn bright, but nowhere on this island do they illuminate the sky so blindingly frequently as a above Leeside.

Down through the decades, legends such as Teddy McCarthy, JBM and Jack Lynch, combining football and hurling, or Dave Barry and Dinny Allen, who mastered the ball from both the hand and ground, Cork has been the home of dual heroes

Joining those established male names is that of Sandie Fitzgibbon who starred on both the camogie pitch and basketball court.

Whether wielding a caman or dribbling a ball Sandie was undoubtedly the star of the show.

During the heady two weeks this year when the Rebel women emulated '90 with a Cork double, five players captured medals in both camogie and football, reminding us of the similar abilities of Cork's other heroines.

Juliet Murphy, captain of the footballers has the energy and drive to attempt to carry the winning streak onto the basketball court during the winter

But the precedent for such multitalented Cork players has been established in the last 25 years.

From the early '80s, senior camogie player Liz Trowler went on to become a soccer international, and Mary Geaney also played international hockey for Ireland.

One coin, glimmered particularly strongly on both sides, even from the golden collection of that era.

The heads and tails of Sandie's basketball/GAA career both shone with remarkable success and colour; her role of honour says it all, a staggering list of national and local successes with Cork, Glen Rovers and Blarney.

Her precocious brilliance was evident from an early age, and in her teens she featured on a Cork minor camogie team that won four All-Irelands in succession and on the basketball court on a North Pres school team that won the All-Ireland cadet title in 1978.

She graduated to senior success during Cork's All-Ireland winning year in 1982, but she only blossomed into a starring role the following season, with another All-Ireland at the dawn of a brilliant camogie

Fitzgibbon's achievements with the sliothar were enough to earn her a place on the Team of the Century, yet she still managed to find time to not only play, but star at basketball.

On top of the all the honours with her Blarney team-mates, including captaining one of their National Cup triumphs, she played 64 times for the international team.

It was the meeting of international hoops and club camogaíocht in October '90 that best illustrated the demands of battling on two fronts; a non-stop tour of duty from Derry to

Boston to Kilkenny.

Sandie played the All-Ireland club camogie semi-final on the weekend, flew to the US and lined out three times for the Irish basketball team, then returned for the Glen's All-Ireland club win at Nowlan Park the following weekend.

A dizzying blur between the north and east of freiand and the east coast of America; three-pointers, planes, sliothars, camógs, basketballs, and passports all melting into the most remarkable week of dual activity from a most remarkable dual star.

There was no favourite between club, county and country, like any Rebel they all carried equal weight.

Though her intercounty camogie career got off to an auspicious start, it was filled with more than its share of big day heartbreak semi-final defeats in '85, '86, '90,

final defeats in '84, '87, '88, '89,'91.

With the safety net of a brilliant career in basketball despite being only 5' 6", it would have been understandable for her to ease off in her pursuit of O'Duffy Cup glory.

It seemed to make her even more

The reward was all conquering ack-to-back All-Irelands with both Cork and the Glen in '92-'93, a brief respite in '94 with a defeat, before another O'Duffy Cup in 1995.

Her tenacity, determination and crisp striking marked her out from the pack and she was equally comfortable in half-back or at midfield.

Her inclusion in the spine of the team show her importance as a heartbeat.

The passion and desire that motivated her to fly across the ocean and back in 1990 to honour her commitment to club and country, was county and country.

always on display in battles in the engine room.

Sandie's intercounty career ended on the deserved high in '97, when she landed the O'Duffy Cup for the sixth time.

But she had almost bowed out in the depths of defeat.

Galway had shocked Cork in '96, and exhausted from her commitment to the county spanning three decades, Sandie was opting out.

Luckily, her comrades appealed to the hunger that sustained during the non-stop cycle of basketball and camogie and she was one of Cork's MVPs all that year.

She committed another two seaons to the Glen, before announcing her retirement in 1999 - 26 years after she first lined out for the famous northside club at the age of nine.

Sometimes, a strained shelf of medals and individual awards (twice camogie player of the year, twice honoured as a Jury's Sports Star, the Delta Airlines Olympic Basketball Award) - with Sandie Fitzgibbon they only hint at the magnitude of an epic dual career.

MELLERICK. LINDA name and memorable marquee name in Cork camogie.

She twice captained Cork in their glorious spell from '92-'98, during which they annexed five of the seven available All-Irelands; she starred in an all-conquering Glen team that landed a seven-in-a-row haul from '90-'96 and bowed out at the top, preventing a Tipp four-in-a-row in 2002.

Along the way she added three club All-Irelands, player of the year in '93 and 98, culminating in selection on the Team of the Century last year, something which brought home to Linda her place in the pantheon of camogie greats.

'I didn't think much about it when I got nominated to be honest; I was genuinely just delighted to be there. I suppose it's only when you win an award like that or start looking back when you're retired that you realise how great a run it was."

Her trademark was scorching solo runs from the engine room. It was as fulcrum that she was happiest, and while she mastered the role to such a degree that she is now seen as the prototype all-action centre-fielder, she played at corner-forward until 1992.

Her camogie career began in St Patrick's Secondary School, Gardiner's Hill. It was the lure of half days and a cooked lunch on match days that first drew her in.

"I remember them coming into our class in first year to ask if we were interested in playing camogie. I didn't know what I was getting myself into to be honest, but it worked out great you could say. It was also nice to have the chance of a couple of hours out of class and the cookery class having a cooked lunch ready for you, so that was always nice," she chuckles.

Still those bonuses almost outweighed any perks during her time as a Cork senior star. With increased sponsorship, support from the Cork Camogie Supporters Club and the high profile achieved through TV and media coverage, the current players are involved in the most professional era in the history of the game.

"It's fantastic to see how much the game has developed. The media coverage is the big thing, before we used to be looking for one or two pieces a month, now the All-Ireland build-up is the same as we probably got over the whole time I played."

With the profile of the players hugely increased, and the numbers playing from local level across the country rising to unprecedented levels, would it be fair to say the game is at its peak?

"It's brilliant that people are getting credit but I don't think the standard has ved any great deal. There were fantastic players involved and I think you'd be hard pressed to find players as good as Sandie Fitz, Mary O'Leary or Angela Downey. The problem was that only those following the sport knew it."

Ah Angela Downey. It was a name you were almost afraid to mention. From 1985 when Linda began her senior Cork career until 1992 when they ended a painful losing streak, Angela Downey and Kilkenny dashed Rebel dreams almost every year

"I used to hate Kilkenny at the time, because year after year it was nearly always Kilkenny who beat us. We had seven long years without winning anything. You'd get a pat on the back as the 'second best team in the country', which made it worse."

The flipside of the rivalry was that victories over the foe brought a high that couldn't be matched. Unsurprisingly it was the first All-Ireland final victory over the Cats in 1995 that jumps to mind when she looks back at her favourite memory.

"1995 was just great; it was the one that meant the most to us alright. We were losing by two points with a couple of minutes to go and we won by four in the finish after we hit a goal and a few points.

"The funny thing was that when we were talking to the Kilkenny girls afterwards the likes of Angela Downey just said

'fair play to ye, we stole plenty of games from ye in the last few minutes.' They understood what it was like."

With her the Glen, the duels Lisdowney, Downey's provide both the highlights and lowlights.

"1990 was the best club win, be cause it was up in Kilkenny and against Angela's club St Paul. They got their revenge in '94 though. Angela scored four goals in 10 minutes and turned over our nine-point lead. That was a real sickener to lose."

Even now she speaks with hints of respect and fear talking about her nemesis Downey; the same fear and respect the rest of the camogie world looked at Linda with.

Liatroim looking Offaly good

Down club relying on experince to see them into another All-Ireland final

AFTER dominating Down camogie for almost 20 years, as well as winning their fair share of Ulster Senior Club Championships, Liatroim Fontenoys finally made the breakthrough last year when they beat Four Roads of Roscommon to lift the All-Ireland Junior Championship at Parnell Park.

Captain on that historic day was Anne Morgan and as Liatroim prepare to face Leinster champions Drumcullen in this year's All-Ireland semi-final on Sunday, Morgan admitted the memories of last year's final are something that will live with her forever.

"It was fabulous, amazing, and something that I'll never forget," said Morgan.

"It's probably every players dream to win an All-Ireland, especially with you club and to captain Liatroim was something special

"This year, the hunger is still definitely there though.

"Personally I've more hunger than last year because the pressure of being captain is not there so I can focus soley on my camogie.

"Not that I wasn't focusing last year, but it's just that as captain there are a few othe-r things to consider too."

It has been some eight weeks since Liatroim defeated Armagh champions Keady to lift their second Ulster Junior Championship title and while the other three provinces have only recently completed their own championships, Liatroim have been far from idle.

"It's a very long time since the Ulster final and we've spent the time training," Morgan said.

"We also had a training weekend in Galway a few weeks ago when we played Davitts [who face Cashel in the senior championship semi-final]. They beat us but we didn't take our scores and it was our own fault we lost rather than them beating us.

"But then again they are a senior club and it was a good tester for us. Although I didn't see that m'uch of a difference in standard between the two



When the winners look back at the video of their second triumph backed by commentary from dedicated clubman Paddy Butler - they should keep an eye out for an Imelda Kennedy free, which split the posts in the 18th minute.

Purple patch

The point was from a good scoring position, but it what followed afterwards that was even more important. That score was the start of a real purple patch for the Saints.

Both sides had laboured on a sticky North Tipp pitch, resulting in a small haul of just four points in the first quarter. Those

Lachtain's were ready for anything - Kennedy

TOTAL preparation was the key to success for St. Lachtain's.

That was the opinion of a tired but happy Imelda Kennedy, who was full of praise for her team-mates.

Captain of the 2004 winning team, Kennedy was a vital cog in the Lachtain's machine against Davitts on Sunday, scoring 0-6 in the final.

"We have the confidence. now to go out and do well," she said. "Last year we wanted to win a title so badly - there was a fear of losing, but we got over that.

"This year, we wanted to make it known that we wanted to be All-Ireland champions again, that our 2004 victory wasn't a one-

"As Mickey Harte said after Tyrone won their All-Ireland title, a great team can win one All-Ireland, but it takes an exceptional team to win two. I think we proved that today."

Great praise

A key part of that double success has been the backroom teams that have helped the St Lachtain's side. Both the 2004 manager Adrian Finan and his successor John Lyng came in for great praise from the half-forward.

*We had always been there or thereabouts in the camogie championship," Kennedy said. "Last year Adrian Finan brought us through the mental side of the game and prepared us

"As Adrian said, success breeds confidence. John Lyng continued with that this year, and did a tremendous amount of work to help us retain our title.

All that work prepared the team for the onslaught that Davitts brought to them throughout the game. The Galway side kept the pressure on throughout the game, but could not break down a strong Lachtain's

Strong team

"Davitts are a big strong team, especially down through the central positions," said Kennedy.

"Their forwards were strong too, but great credit to our experienced backs they were solid throughout.

After the final whistle I spoke to former camogie player Fiona Connery, now a hockey international, who told me that she couldn't get over the physical strength our team has shown.

"The compliments for that go back to our trainer Paul Quigley," Kennedy added. "As captain Margaret Hickey said in her speech it's worth coming out to see the girls train. He has brought us on leaps and bounds in the last couple of years, which stood to us in the final.

Calibre

Victory in the semi-final replay over Cashel proved that Davitts had the calibre to be in an All-Ireland final. That was a fact not lost on the Lachtain's team.


"After drawing with Cashel in their semi-final, Davitts stormed back to win the replay. That fact was always in our minds, and made things very, very tough, Kennedy

"They came back from the dead against Cashel, with Lourda Kavanagh getting amongst the goals for them. With that in the back of our minds we knew we could not give up.

"Go into the St Lachtain's dressingroom and you'll see a side who never give up," she added. Thankfully, that attitude stood to us in the final."












Dublin's Gillian McCluskey, balances the sliothar while being chased by Clare's Catriona McMahon and Deirdre Murphy



'Years of Plenty' launched in Nenagh

TIPPERARY'S impact on the national camogie scene since 1999, with five out of seven All Ireland titles won, was the subject of a book entitled 'Years of Plenty' which was launched in the Abbey Court Hotel, Nenagh on Friday night last by President of the Camogie Association, Miriam O' Callaghan.

Former 'Guardian' editor Gerry Slevin is the esteemed author of this concise tome on the fortunes of Tipperary camogie in a decade of success for the blue and gold and hundreds turned up to wish Gerry well at the Baronial Hall in the hotel.

MC on the night was well-known Tipperary great, Donie Nealon who paid tribute to Gerry for his work on the book and to Bridget Delaney for her beautiful photographs which liberally adorn the book.

The launch evening also included musical interludes by the well-known singing/instrumental local group Ama Deus.

The book was something Gerry originally planned to write following the team's three-in-a-row success in 1999. However, having spoken about it with a

friend he was advised to wait, his friend's view being that there was a lot more in this team.

Tipp went on to win two more All Irelands and in the centenary year of the Camogie Association (2004), not alone did they win the All Ireland, they also won the provincial title and the National League for only the second time ever, the first back in 1977.

In the 200 plus pages, those great years are vividly recalled, years, that saw Tipp rise to the top of the senior camogie ladder, following ninety-five titleless years.

For seven seasons saw Tipp become not alone the team to be envied by all aspiring champions, but also the team that had brought something very special to the game in terms of craft, skill and dedication.

All of this comes

through in 'Years of Plenty' and along with the games, the players, the management teams and everyone involved in Tipp's great run of success, other significant events during that period are recalled of like the honour bestowed on Deirdre Hughes as the only present

day inter-county player to make the Team of the Century. Recalled too is a never-to-be-forgotten Micheal O'Muirc-heartaigh-hosted evening in Nenagh to honour Deirdre's selection, which was organized by the Toomevara club.

Each year is dealt with separately and included too are quotes from players and selectors both before and after the All Ireland finals. Another chapter deals with the story of two sisters, twins, Deirdre McDonnell (junior) and Eimear (senior) who won All Ireland medals on the same day, in 2001.

The Centenary Banquet and the O'Neills All Stars also feature and the author has included his own personal highlights of the seven seasons in a chapter entitled 'Magic Moments'.

The front cover sees Deirdre Hughes scoring her 6th All Ireland final goal in the 2004 decider against Cork

Complementing the narrative is a series of excellent photographs from Bridget Delaney, the photographic content dealt with on a year-by-year basis along with the inclusion of many other shots, sprinkled throughout the various chapters. There are also pictorial contributions from Ray McManus of Sportsfile and from Rose Mannion.

The book is dedicated to the many players, living and dead, who wore the Tipp colours over the decades and who, unlike the present day players, didn't have the thrill of experiencing All Ireland senior success.

It is also dedicated to the memory of a famed Dublin player with strong Tipperary connections who died last December. Orla Ryan was wife of Jack Ryan. Moneygall, a member of the Tipp All Ireland winning side of 1971. Orla won several All Ireland medals with Dublin and was selected on the Leinster Team of the Century last year. She was daughter of Sean O'Siochain, former Director General of the GAA and her father in law is Seamus O'Riain, Moneygall, former GAA President. Orla took a very keen interest in Tipp's progress in recent years and up to her untimely passing.



Nora O'Connell, a native of Derricknue, Killenaule, who died in April, was one of the founder members and star players of the St.Mary's camogie Club of the 1930s. She played with Munster in the Tailteann Games in 1932 and, after she had married Finn Daly and settled in Clonmel, she acquired a reputation as a pitchand-putt player. In 1974 she became the first non-Cork person to win the Munster Ladies Stroke Play championship and in the same year she was the recipient of a Cidona award. She was born on the same day as her colleague on the


Tailteann Games team and her lifelong friend, Johanna Healy, and by peculiar coincidence the two died with a couple of months of each other - she at the end of April and Johanna .Healy at the end of June.

Mrs. Johanna Healy

(St. Mary's, Clonmel)

When St.Mary's Camogie club was formed in 1932 the joint secretary and one of the most active players was Johanna Meaney, a popular member of the nursing staff of

St.Luke's Hospital. Born and reared on Clonmel's old Kerry Road she was one of the group of young ladies who paid what was then the huge membership fee of half a' crown to form the club. In the Tailteann Games she was one of two St.Mary's players, the other being Nora Daly (nee O'Connell), who were picked to play for Tipp when the county represented Munster in the inter-provincial game against Connaught. She married Jim Healy of Knockaun, Upperchurch and in Clonmel they reared a family of five children, one of whom is Seamus Healy, South Tipp's Independent T.D. Her death in June severed what was probably the last link with the Tailteann Games team.



Anyhow, with two competitions out of the way, it was time to concentrate on the All Ireland. Tipp were grouped with Antrim, Kilkenny and Limerick. Cork, Galway and Wexford comprised the other group. However, only days before they were scheduled to travel to meet Tipp in the

opening encounter, the Glens ladies pulled out of the competition. Now, we had an All Ireland championship confined to a mere SIX counties, and that championship would provide a total of only NINE games, one less than the Tyrone footballers played in order to regain the Sam Maguire trophy! On the day that Tipp should have been

playing Antrim, we had the first upset of the season, Kilkenny's defeat by Limerick. Maybe now, we thought, this competition mightn't be the two horse race we all felt it would be. It was a result that placed much pressure on Kilkenny, Quite simply, they couldn't afford another loss and even though they had home venue for the visit of Tipp, the signs were there that Kilkenny needed more than that to inspire them.

Deirdre Hughes led her colleagues out in

Nowlan Park on Saturday July 16th, Una O'Dwyer's absence because of cruciate ligament trouble saw Niamh Harkin at full back, flanked by Suzanne Kelly and Maedhbh Corcoran. As usual, busloads of young and not so young supporters left the county on the morning of the final. Croke Park, as is now usual for camogie and ladies football deciders, reverberated to the sound of hooters, continuous shouting and cheering, accelerating the decibel levels appreciably. Tipp lined out as they began the semi final which was also the same team that had faced and defeated Cork in the 2004 final. Cork had eleven of the side that began that final, probably the most notable aspect of their line out being the move of 2004 captain Stephanie Dunlea from full back all the way up to full forward. It was a move than began during the league and was persevered with because of its success.

Every Tipp-Cork clash is special and this final was no different. It was tense throughout, the opening ten minutes very close before a series of fine points edged Tipp ahead to a 0-5 to 0-2 lead at the end of the first quarter, Jill Horan, Claire Grogan, Joanne Ryan, Eimear McDonnell and Philly Fogarty were Tipp's scorers.

Cork fought back and with three minutes of the first half remaining there was only a point

in it. 0-7 to 0-6. Claire Grogan then collected a pass from Noelle Kennedy and her high dipping shot deceived Cork's keeper, the ball finding its way over the goal line to the joy and delight of the Tipp team and supporters.

Half time came with Tipp ahead 1-10 to 0-8. It was no more than they deserved, as they had been the more enterprising side. It was a half that had seen them display many of the exquisite skills they had honed over the years and in all sectors they seemed to have the edge on Cork.

Thirty minutes still remained, a half-hour that would change the order of things dramatically. Cork resumed with a new mid field pairing, conscious, no doubt, of the need to put the shackles on a rampant Philly Fogarty and Angie McDermott who had been so influential in that sector throughout the first half. Some judicious switches in personnel were also made as the challengers set out to transform that title into that of champions.

Cork set the pace from the second half throw-in. Three points saw the margin reduced to two by the 7th minute. The supply to the Tipp attack was being cut drastically. The Tipp half back line was under immense pressure and not coping. Therese Brophy moved to the centre. Scoring opportunities at the other end were few and far between, although Jill Horan was very unlucky with two attempts at points. Thanks to a defiant inner defence line, Tipp still managed to

keep heads above water and precariously they seemed to be holding out. Noelle Kennedy was replaced by Emily Hayden and Michelle Shortt stepped in for Ciara Gaynor. It was all of twenty-one minutes of the half before Tipp added to their interval score of 1-10. Claire Grogan pointed a free after Deirdre Hughes had been fouled. Then, just a minute later, Cork defender Amanda O'Regan lofted a huge free into the Tipp goal area. The ball skidded off Una O'Dwyer's leg and over the line to the dismay of herself and Jovita Delaney standing just behind her. Eight minutes remained and Cork were ahead. But back came Tipp and a Deirdre Hughes point levelled up matters before Claire Grogan regained the lead with a point from a free after she had been fouled soloing through.

1-13 to 1-12 and two minutes remained. Could Tipp hold out? It was a question posed and answered positively in many a previous encounter, but not this time, alas. Two Emer Dillon points saw Cork back in front and there they stayed, finishing very strongly as three points were quickly added to have the O'Duffy Cup snatched away by a 1-17 to 1-13 score line.

Claire Grogan, top scorer in the final, had the satisfaction of being the game's top championship scorer for the season. Going into the final she was in 3rd place with 0-17, behind Wexford's Kitty Kelly (3-12) and Jennifer O'Leary, Cork on 0-19. By scoring 1-5 in the final, Claire leapfrogged over the pair to end the season on 1-22 (25 points) with the Cork girl moving into 2nd spot (0-23) after her four All Ireland final points.

Of course if was disappointing to lose; of course winning a 6th title in seven years would have been fantastic and as the players and mentors stood around on Croke Park's sod with family, friends and supporters afterwards, they knew they had given their all and they were as gracious and complimentary in defeat as they had been so often in

victory. Over that six-year period Tipp had met Cork each year except 1999. In all they clashed seven times, twice in 2001when it took a replay to separate them at the semi final stage. Tipp faced Kilkenny six times, Wexford five, Limerick three, Down, Clare, Galway and Dublin twice each and Antrim once. But, despite how some might feel about it, that September 18th defeat is by no means the end of an era. It is still a young team and a glance through the substitutes list reveals a wealth of fine talent that will continue to

A blip in a record of rare distinction might be the most apt way of describing the defeat. Deirdre Hughes and her team mates of 2005 deserve no less in defeat than they received in their many victories. Camogie's future in the Premier County is bright and there will be many more great occasions to celebrate.

ork recovered strongly to eclipse Tipp and lift the 2005 All-Ireland senior camogie championship with an incredible 1-17 to 1-13 success at Croke

The resilient Rebel lasses played catch-up for most of the match. They trailed by five points at the break and were still behind with only two minutes of normal time remaining, but they simply refused to give up, earning their 21st senior camogie crown with a scintillating late burst

In the final analysis, Cork's superior fitness and huge heart proved decisive as they overturned their Munster final defeat to today's opposition.

Tipperary almost fell across the winning line but a return of three points in the second half is never going to be enough to win an All-Ireland final - Cork scored precisely that amount in injury time alone!

The winners totally dominated the second half and were worthy winners, even if there was a huge element of fortune attached to the 52nd-minute goal that finally tipped the balance in their favour.

In fairness to Cork, though, the major they conceded in the first half was equally lucky, so those two scores cancelled each other out.

Cork held an early 0-2 to 0-1 lead but Claire Grogan's ninth-minute free drew the Premier County level.

Joanne Ryan demonstrated real predatory instinct to gather possession close to the Cork goal before firing the sliothar over the bar and an excellent Eimear McDonnell point made it 0-4 to 0-2 in Tipp's favour.

Midfielder Philly Fogarty stretched the Blue & Gold lead and Cork had a big let-off when Ryan came within inches of registering the game's first goal.

Centre back Ciara Gaynor's second pointed free edged Tipperary four points clear, 0-7 to 0-3.



Elaine Burke proudly raises the All-Ireland camogie trophy




The half time whistle sounded with Tipperary five points to the good, 1-10 to 0-8.

There is nothing more emotionally upsetting than to see a group of players distraught following the disappointment of defeat. Cashel camogie senior team know all about it. On Saturday, November 12, they endured the heartbreak of defeat at New Inn, in the All-Ireland semi-final by Davitts of Galway.

Time is a great healer and on reflection 2005 wasn't such a bad year at all. Playing in the league back in March, and with barely fifteen of the panel, we suffered defeats at the hands of Toomevara and Drom Inch. Plenty of time to regroup, perhaps, but prospects were not very good. Our first game in the championship was against a combination of Portroe and Burgess, a team called Duharra. This game didn't materialise due to a tragedy just half an hour before throw-in. Our next game was against Holycross, which we won by 2-18 to 2-6. We next beat Toomevara in Toom by 0-15 to 0-9, and a further victory over Drom Inch by 1-15 to 0-11 qualified us for the final against Duharra.

The final was played at the Ragg on October 2 and ended all square. The replay couldn't take place the following Sunday as the Munster Club semi-final was scheduled for that date. Cashel were nominated and defeated the Cork champions. Cloughduy, by 1-13 to 0-5. The replay of the county final took place at Holycross on October 16, with victory going to Cashel by 0-16 to 1-9.

There was no rest as the Munster Club final, against Limerick champions, Killeady, was set for the following Saturday at Cappawhite. Cashel came through easily enough, winning by 4-13 to 2-4, to take their third Munster title in five years.

There was a break of one week before the All-Ireland semifinal against Connacht champions, Davitts of Galway. This was played at Tynagh. Five games in six weeks was beginning to take its toll. Cashel were up by six points at halftime but a great comeback by the Galway side forced a draw, Cashel 1-13 Davitts 3-7.



The replay was a week later, November 11, at New Inn. Davitts were physically stronger, a fresher team, and possibly possessed greater hunger. Although the sides were close near the end, Davitts pulled away in the final minutes to win by six points, on a scoreline of 4-9 to 2-9, and qualify for the All-Ireland final.

In spite of the defeat the team gave wonderful hours of enjoyment to their supporters during the year. Much credit for the year's successes goes to Liam Cahill and Joe Williams. 2005 saw Toomeyara Camogie Club celebrating its 30th birthday. Camogie has been played since the 1930s, but the current club was founded in 1975. Founding members included James & Kathleen O Leary, Paddy Connors RIP and Mickie Martin RIP. Initially training began in Templederry but fields were hard to come by the club was lucky enough that Jack Gleeson obliged providing the training fields for many years. With the base now in Kilkeary, the first county success came in 1979 with an U/16 title fittingly captained by Anne Gleeson, Bertie Sherlock and John Joe Ryan were the main driving force around this time with Rita Gleeson, Joan Hughes and Fr. Kennedy.

1983 saw the first adult title and finally in 1988 the intermediate title was claimed

sealing the breakthrough into senior ranks. Roger Mounsey had now come on board and training moved to Ballinree. U14 and U/18 titles during the late 80s and early 90s ensured the platform for the senior team, with John Kennedy was now at the helm. Other influential people at the time were Margaret O Meara, Ellen and Catherine Guerin and Kathleen Hughes.

1992 finally saw the first senior title with a famous victory over Cashel. Toome recorded an impressive six in a row of senior titles and added a Munster club title, Kilmacud 7s and Pan Celtic during the 90s. 2004 saw the senior team take another senior title along with county success at junior, U/16, U/14 and U/12. Presently the hard work and commitment to the club continues with great enthusiasm.

In October 1995 a small group of people met in the G.A.A. Centre in Moneygall to organise a Camogie Club in the parish. They were reviving a club which had been in existence intermittently down the years. During the ten years of its existence the club had many good years but these pale into insignificance when compared to the success and activity of the last twelve months. The adult team having promised much in recent years delivered on that promise by winning the county intermediate championship and the county intermediate league. The county under-12 camogie B final was one of the most memorable of any game played anywhere in 2005. Moneygall qualified to meet Burgess and the game, played early in the summer, ended in a draw. The replay

was not played until the end of August and it also ended in a draw which meant that extra time now had to be played. The very tired girls played out the extra twenty minutes at which stage the score showed that the teams were still level. Such was the intensity of the game that the huge attendance in the stand in Toomevara stood for a spontaneous ovation for the two teams when the final whistle sounded.

COUNTY JUNIOR TEAM



On Sunday September 18th they contested their seventh final in a row and although defeated they put in a great effort and were only piped in the final moments. In the last seven years five All Ireland titles have been won and the teams success does not come about by chance and is a reflection of the enormous time, effort, sacrifice and commitment the players are prepared to make each year over an eight month period, starting with training in early February and concluding in mid September with the All Ireland final. It takes a special and very committed bunch of girls to continue training two and three times weekly over a thirty week period and when you allow for travelling from places as far as Cork, Kerry, Dublin, Waterford and Limerick one gets a picture of the enormous effort and commitment that these players freely put in, the sole reward required being to keep Tipperary at the top of the camogie world.



It was as a result of the team's achievements

looked after that the Tipperary Camogie Supporters Club was founded in 2002. In three short years we have made great progress and continue to grow from strength to strength and to meet our main objective of providing the necessary financial support to ensure the continued success of our senior camogie team. While our main aim is to cater for the senior team other teams have also benefited and in 2005 a presentation of kit bags was made to the United Strength and the Strength an and to ensure that the players were adequately the Ursuline Convent in Thurles who contested the All Ireland senior colleges final, kit bags and track suit bottoms were presented to the Tipperary minor team for the Munster and All Ireland finals, track suit tops were presented to the Tipperary U-18 team for the Munster final.

During 2005 the club funded its activities by a successful dog night in Thurles track on Saturday April 9th, a Camogie Supporters Club membership which was launched by Michael O'Muircheartaigh in May and a bucket collection taken up at the county senior hurling final on October 17th.

By this stage, it's a good assumption to make that everyone involved in Camogie in Tipperary knows where the County Camogie Pitch and Dressing Rooms are located. It's also a fairly reasonable assumption to make that most of the thirty clubs that are affiliated to the Board, have at some stage or other, over the years, played in this pitch whether it be a semi-final, final or tournament and if they haven't, then there's no doubt that some day they certainly will.

It is a fact however and not an assumption, that the pitch is one of the finest you will find in Ireland and another fact is that the Tipperary Camogie board are the only County Board to have their own playing pitch at their disposal. This is indeed a wonderful achievement for the Board and the development Committee of that time back in the late '80's, who had the foresight and vision to acquire these grounds. However, all of this did not come about easily and many will recall all the fundraising ventures that were undertaken to get to this stage.

So why then I hear you ask, as indeed I ask too, I can assure you, are some of our games played elsewhere, in particular our Senior Championship? Well the answer is obvious. The County grounds is unable to facilitate the spectators who want to view a match in comfort and undercover from the elements thrown up by our weather.

The various camogie development committee's that have strived over the years to bring the present facilities to the stage that all players to the pitch can now enjoy, are to be complimented for their foresight and endeavor and the people who gave so generously over the years to this project, can now see for themselves where their money was spent. Funding was also secured through the National Lottery, but our next stage of this project, the viewing stand, does not feature as a priority for funding, so we must come up with the cost ourselves. We the development committee, agreed to do the work necessary, in different stages so as not to be exerting too much pressure on clubs to come up with the funds. This stage of the development is going to cost in the region of 40,000, which by to-day's standards of building, is not a huge amount of money to be looking for, as I'm sure you will agree. When this target is reached, another stage of the development can then be looked further at, but remember, the work at the County pitch is nearing completion so the demand for fundraising will be lighter and the benefits for both players and spectators will be a huge benefit. And so the fundraising round begins for this stage, which is ho[ed we can get underway shortly and before the end of 2005.

YEAR OF MIXED FORTUNES FOR GALWAY

CAMOGIE

After much upheaval in the early stages of 2005, Galway Senior camogic squad settled down under a new managerial group, just two weeks before the commencement of AIB National League 2005, Ex Player Sharon Glynn, with selectors PJ Molloy, Martin Naughton and GAA coach Damien Coleman put a rigorous training regime in place, one which would pay strong dividends in the months ahead.

Almost immediately expectations grew, with the return of 1996 heroines Denise Gilligan and Veronica Curtin to the panel, and with players travelling from Limerick, Cork and Dublin for midweek training, commitment was unquestionable. Only time would tell if Galway could yet again compete with todays camogie greats.

A 12 point margin was as close a Galway team had been to Cork since the All-Ireland performances in the 1990s, and the prospect of an encounter in the League campaign would be some measure of this panels ability.

The trip to both Antrim and Limerick were facile victories with a varied team lining out on both occasions. Galway quickly settled into a notable rhythm of play, with a strong central line the key strategy from the outset with this team. Captain Therese Maher took up a new role at centre back which she proceeded to make her own for the entire year, while upfront the attack was clocking up impressive tallies with players keen to take every opportunity to impress. The girls continued to improve, running riot against Wexford in Duggan Park, and emerged victors over old rivals Kilkenny in the League semi final stages. However, injuries worries mounted as the League final approached with Lourda Kavanagh, Aine Hillary and Ann Marie Hayes all out of contention for a place. The strength in depth of this panel was to be fully tested with the loss of these three players. The team selected stood up to the task. Despite taking 23 minutes to register a score, when they found their feet, they proceeded to torment Cork. Galway forwards had the edge on their opponents with Brenda Kerins dominating in her corner, and Veronica Curtin converting on the back of Kerin's spadework. Ailbhe Kelly excelled at wing back while Sinead Cahalan and particularly Therese Maher were instrumental in the 2nd half in curtailing the Cork forwards, with two powerful performances. A one point victory was attained, which was an amazing

accomplishment after just three months work with this team. Was this a sign of better things to come, and proof of the ability of this squad? Every title counts, and Galways third National League title was enjoyed with the knowledge that championship is a very different affair.

Summer time clashes beckoned, with a testing group paired with Cork and Wexford both to be played in the month of July. Both teams had suffered at the hands of the tribeswomen in the league and were keen to gain just revenge for their earlier beatings. Lourda Kavanagh recovered from a fracture in time to take a place on the championship side, who travelled to Pairc Ui Rinn on July 2nd. It was a game Galway had control of from the initial stages despite some underperformances on the day. Yet they somehow managed to let Cork off the hook

in this opening round of the Championship. Galway had the Leesiders on the rack in the closing stages but they simply failed to put them away, allowing Cork to storm back into the game in the closing minutes. In the end, it left the Galway girls shattered after what was undoubtedly their finest performance against Cork since their All- Ireland victory in 1996. Galway did have Cork reeling, but they failed to take advantage. Three golden opportunities went amiss for Galway which would have killed off the Cork side. Instead, the game turned full circle, as Cork introduced Breige Corkery and Angela Walsh. In those last seconds Cork levelled. and on the back of that score, Angela Walsh pointed. Galway had been robbed, they were inconsolable.

Four weeks later the unthinkable happened as Galway crashed out of the title

race in a disappointing display against Wexford. Three Wexford goals in the final seven minutes of this game proved to be more than enough to see off an out of sorts Galway in Duggan Park on July 30th. To say the Galway contingent were shell shocked would be an understatement. Despite time, effort, commitment and sacrifice on the part of all involved, they had fallen short. The dream was over. Croke Park would not be reached in 2005.

Yet, there were many positives to be taken from the year. Galway are League Champions for 2005 and have returned Camogie to the forefront of ladies sport in Galway. A new sense of professionalism has emerged from this year and camogie followers can have no question that there is sufficient talent in the county to compete and defeat the top teams in Ireland. There have been many learning curves for all involved in the months gone by.

The maturity to gain from those experiences will be the key to further progress in next years campaign.

ALL - STARS

After an exciting return to the limelight, Galway were rewarded with four All Star contenters from their senior squad. Three Galway defenders received nominations Sinead Cahalan (Mullagh), Regina Glynn (Athenry) Therese Maher (Athenry), while Galway Bay FM player of the year Lourda Kavanagh of Davitts, was Galways fourth nominee.

Senior Manager Sharon Glynn also received just recognition of her achievements with this Galway Squad in the National League, receiving a nomination for Manager of the year.

GALWAY JUNIORS

Larry Burns Division 2 side had an impressive run in their League campaign reaching the final stages, Galway came out top of their group after defeating Armagh, Limerick, Wexford and Kildare, and went on to book a place in the League Final after disposing of Waterford in their home patch. Galway looked for a long time like they might pull off a double victory but despite a great display, it was Cork who stepped up to take the honours. Full Forward Molly Dunne was Galway's biggest threat, shooting a total of 1-5 of Galway's 2-7. In championship, this Junior side made light work of Roscommon in the Connaught Final however they failed to deal with the power and experience of the Banner Ladies in their semi final clash.

SUCCESSFUL YEAR FOR TURLOUGHMORE CAMOGIE CLUB

2005 was a milestone for Turloughmore Camogie Club as they captured their first ever Galway Under 14 A title and had the honour of representing Galway at the National Feile na nGael finals. Success has not been too far away from Turloughmore camogic over the years with a positive underage structure but making the breakthrough at top level has always been a difficult assignment. The idea to form a camogie club in Turloughmore was nurtured on the night that Turloughmore won their last Galway Senior Hurling championship in 1985 by two former camogie players from different areas who had come to live in Turloughmore, Ann Kearney from Oranmore and Carmel Costello from Pearses. A year later in 1986 Turloughmore camogie club was formed and concentrating at adult level, the club won the Galway and Connacht Junior Championship in 1989 and the Galway and Connacht Intermediate Championship in 1990. In 1993 the club captured the Co. Under 16 B title but it wasn't until the turn of the century that the club began to make serious inroads at underage level. A comprehensive juvenile policy brought many new parents on board and the club took a new lease of life. An Under 12 B title in 2001 was followed with an Under 14 B title a year later. In 2004 the club captured the Under 13 B title, and this title was retained by the club in 2005.

This year the Under 13 team had defeated Colman's, Clarenbridge. Mountbellew/Moylough, Pearses and Ahascragh in the group before accounting for Oranmore/Maree in the Co Semi final.

Killimordaly were Turloughmore's rivals in the Under 13 camogie final in a game where neither team played to their capabilities and justice was done when the game ended deadlocked. In a very exciting replay Turloughmore eventually edged off the challenge of Killimordaly in the replayed encounter to retain the Galway Under 13 B Championship title.

One of the most successful developments in the underage structure within the club is the running of the Madge Burke tournament which is run between children of the four schools of the parish and so excellently organised in both camogie and hurling by Cregmore National School Principal Joe Kennelly.

The competition involves a mixture of pupils from all schools at all ages and has proved to be a huge success in the development of camogie in the parish. This has led to two schools in the parish featuring strongly in camogie in recent years with Coolarne winning the Co Schools Camogie title last year and Cregmore coached by former Galway camogie star Anne Ford bringing Cregmore school to this years school finals only to lose to a stronger Mountbellew side.

The great work carried out at under age within the club where Gerry Linnane, Jim Keane, Ann Kearney, Pat Shaughnessy, Mary Fahy, Yvonne Hansberry, Emer Kearney and Johnny Kane have carried on that trojan work that led to the highlight of the club during the past year which was representing the county at the Feile na nGael National

Turloughmore had a difficult season in the Galway championship with defeat by Killimor in their opening group game. However a succession of victories over Davitts and Mullagh, led to a semi final appearance against Carnmore, which led to a place in the Co final against Killimor. There was sweet revenge for Turloughmore in the Co final when they defeated Killimor which gave them the honour of representing the county at the Feile finals.

The excursion to Cork for the Feile finals was special as Turloughmore hurlers were also representing Galway in the hurling competition.

Turloughmore camogic club were hosted by Glen Rovers, and the Galway side were drawn against Glen Rovers, Milford and Newmarket on Fergus of Clare.

However despite a number of quality performances, the Turloughmore side failed to make it to the final stages of the competition. However when it came to enjoying the party from wonderful hosts at the Glen, Turloughmore were in full flight.

The Turloughmore Junior Camogie team reached the county final for the first time in fifteen years. The many young players are not coming on stream and the Club is going from strenght to strenght. The team won the London 7 a -side tournment and also added the Agnes Keane trophy. They have qualified for the JuniorLeague final.

With the club also winning the Under 9 and Under 16 City Leagues there is no doubt but the future of Camogie in Turloughmore is in a healthy state for the future.



IT TOOK a Kathleen O'Brien goal four minutes from the full time whistle to finally decide the destination of the junior thirteen-a-side league title after an entertaining hour's camogie in Tracton yesterday.

Despite the death knell being just about ready to sound for the year, both teams turned in a superb afternoon's hurling and certainly there was enough excitement to keep the large attendance on their toes right to the finish of the game.

No more than two points separated the sides as they matched each other score for score through a close encounter.

Ellen Healy's third minute opener for Enniskeane was quickly replied to by Mallow's Michelle Brown.

It was level going into the closing five minutes of the half but to be in that position Mallow were thankful to an alert Emma Forde, who denied Healy a second goal with a point blank save before Brown pointed twice from frees to edge Mallow ahead 1-3 to 1-1 at the mid way-stage.

Enniskeane made the better start to the second half and inside four minutes were back on level thanks to points from Katie Buttimer and Orla Coughlan. With their defence continuing to be marshalled efficiently by captain Marita Collins who had a tremendous hour and with Healy causing the Mallow defence a lot of bother, they continued to press for a lead score but strong defending by Mallow and over-carrying of the ball by their inside line proved costly to Enniskeane.

On the other side, Mallow's distribution was excellent and their more direct and economical style of play ensured plenty of supply and it was as a result this that Brown and Kathleen O'Brien pointed in the eighth and 14th minutes respectively to edge Mallow ahead.

With Enniskeane still applying the pressure, Mallow broke away and again a long clearance found O'Brien who raced past the Enniskeane defence to rattle the roof of the net.

SLENDID COME-BACK BY CORK



It is often said that League form is not a reliable guide to the championship. That certainly proved the case for Cork in senior camogie in the past year.

Back in May Cork lost the National Senior League final to Galway at Semple Stadium. They scored just six points in that game.

Yet in September eleven of the players who appeared during the League summit were in action as the Rebels ended Tipperary's hopes of a treble of All-Ireland senior titles in the Croke Park clash for the coveted O'Duffy Cup.

However, it was a player who was not in action in the League who really stamped her personality on the 1-17 to 1-13 All-Ireland final win.

Gemma O'Connor, who was not available for the League final as she was on duty with the Defence Forces in Liberia, gave a Player-of-the-Match performance with quality play and she also chipped in with three points.

Later in the year her display was recognised in a big way with her selection as the Vodafone Camogie Player of the Year.

Then in mid November few could have been surprised when O'Connor was named at midfield in the All Stars team. That was her second such award as she was honoured in the inaugural All Stars team in 2004.

The year provided many other highlights. Vera Curtin did much at full forward with her clever play and finishing technique that yielded 1-5 to orchestrate Galway's League final win over Cork in May.

Dublin once dominated the All-Ireland senior championship and still lead the Roll of Honour, despite the fact that their last title was won as far back as 1984—the county's 26th title.

However, there was joy for the Dubs in the junior ranks in the past year with Niamh Taylor taking her place in that always appealing story of super substitutes.

Three minutes into added time in the All-Ireland final at Croke Park in September, Clare were a point ahead of Dublin. Then into the picture stepped Taylor, who went into the Dublin side after twenty eight minutes.

Dublin were awarded a 50 metres free

and Taylor displayed a cool nerve in the tense atmosphere as well as accuracy as she sent over the bar to tie the scores at 1-7 each and send the game to a replay.

Taylor was on from the start in the replay at Birr and hit two points as Dublin collected a first title since 1975 with a 2-9 to 1-4 win.

The competitive year ended on a high note with the All-Ireland Club senior and junior finals.

The sharpshooting of full forward Marie O'Connor who scored 2-3, and midfielder Imelda Kennedy, on the target with six points, proved very influential in enabling St. Lachtains, Kilkenny, to retain the senior title in their showpiece game with Davitts, Galway, at Cloughjordan.

Liatroim Fontenoys, Down, also made it a double by outscoring Newmarket on-Fergus at Cloughjordan to retain the junior crown.

The final was something of a personal triumph for full forward Maureen McAleenan, who highlighted her display by contributing 3-2 to the Down side's 3-7.
