

CAMOGIE SOARING STAR AWARDS ANNOUNCED

All Ireland Camogie champions Offaly have secured six awards in the inaugural year of the Soaring Star Camogie Awards, an awards scheme introduced to recognise players from the All Ireland junior camogie championship grades.

The awards will be presented at the All Star award ceremony in association with O'Neills in the CityWest Hotel on November 7th.

In the New Ireland Cup, Faithful County top scorer Elaine Darmody from Drumcullen leads the way with club mate Piona Stephens being selected at corner back. Joining them is goalkeeper Audrey Kennedy and Karen Brady both of whom were part of a very solid Offaly defensive unit, which also includes Michaela Morkan at centre back. The sixth Offaly award goes to ace attacker Arlene Watkins.

Beaten finalists Waterford have forward duo Karen Kelly and Aine Lyng among the winners. Kelly was also prominent at the weekend leading St Anne's to the Munster junior camogie club championship final.

Laois and Down also have two representatives, while

Meath have one.

Niamh Coyle helped Roscommon achieve a historic victory in the Nancy Murray Cup coming from five points down to defeat Armagh in the final by three. She is Roscommon's representative at number nine. Kildare's Susie O'Carroll has been rewarded in the half forward line following a prolific season with the Lilywhites.

Speaking at the announcement today, President Joan O'Flynn said, "The inaugural Soaring Stars Camogie Awards recognises the various strands of the All Ireland

championship. It rewards individual player excellence in the second tier national Camogie All Ireland championships.

"I am particularly delighted that the achievements of Offaly and Roscommon, both of whom won their first All Irelands in 2009 are recognised along with Waterford who reached their first All Ireland final this year. Congratulations to all 15 players who are wonderful exponents of our game and demonstrated leadership, skill and commitment this season".

RUTHLESS LAVEY LADIES BLOCK FOUR ROADS

All-Ireland Junior Camogie Club semi-final

Four Roads (Roscommon) 0-2 Lavey (Derry) 3-12 Seamus Duke

Four Roads' dreams of an appearance in the All-Ireland Club Junior Camogie Final were well and truly dashed by a very impressive Lavey side at Ballyforan on Sunday last. Four Roads battled away from the very first whistle but they were simply outclassed on the day.

The day was cold but dry and there was a big crowd to see this semi-final and a huge crowd present from Derry to follow their side. It all helped create a great atmosphere.

However from early in the game it became obvious that there was only going to be one mercilessly at opportunity.

Attracta McPeake, Paul McCloy and Mary O'Kane in particular terrorised the Four Roads defence and that trio led the Lavey charge on the day. The signs were bad for Four Roads as early as the 4th minute when Paula McCloy stole in behind the home defence to poach a goal. There was a touch of good fortune about the goal as Donna Kelly appeared to have been fouled on the 65-metre line in the runup to that score - but no free was given.

Lavey were strong in defence and deadly up front and they added to their score steadily as the half progressed. Mary O'Kane, Paula McCloy and Attracta McPeake (free) all scored points before the second Lavey goal arrived in the 16th minute. Attracta McPeake's pass was fielded by Mary O'Kane who made no mistake from close-range - and the same player added a point from 25 metres within 30 seconds.

Four Roads were plugging away and they grabbed their first score in the 20th minute when Cait Kenny converted a 45, but Lavey were relentless. McPeake adding two further pointed frees. Cait Kenny converted a 30-metre free for Four Roads to leave the halftime score at Four Roads 0-2 Lavey 2-6.

The second half didn't bring any cheer for the home side as Lavey continued to dominate. Paula McCloy added two early points from play before Attracta McPeake continued on her scoring spree with frees from 45, 30 and 50 metres respectively to put the game well and truly beyond Four Roads.

With seven minutes left on the clock, Mary O'Kane drilled home Lavey's third goal. Then in the 24th minute the scoring was completed by Denise McShane, who was on target from 35 metres out.

It was a day that will not live long in the memory for the Four Roads team but they tried so hard but just met a side that winner as Lavey swept forward were superior in most areas of the field.

Cashel crush Oulart's dream

OULART-THE BALLAGH failed to become the first Wexford side to reach the All-Ireland Club carnogie final since St. Ibar'sShelmalier in 2002 as they went down by four points to an extremely sharp Cashel side in Oulart on Sunday tast.

The Tipperary team, who won the Munster final by a whopping 20 points, were in no way flattered by the scoreline. It could, and should, have been more as Oulart-The Ballagh were over-run by the dynamic duo of Cura Hennessy and Claire Grogan.

The wing-forwards had far too much for their markers and at times it seemed Mary Leacy was trying to keep tabs on the whole of the half-

forward line, as well as Emily Hayden, whose switching with Mairéad Morrissey helped to create ample space for their teammates.

Leacy ended the game with the ball in her hand; fitting, as she was the only semblance of composure, the only defender who consistently got ball to hand and the glue that prevented a massacre. And to think, before the farce that was the omission of all Wexford players from the All Star side, Leacy was laughably left off the extensive 45-strong list of nominees.

It was her sister, Una, who almost gave the Wexford side the perfect start when she latched onto fellow county stalwart Ursula Jacob's pass, only to be denied by an alert Helen Breen. Jacob put over the resulting '45, but the lead lasted seconds as Alison Lonergan and Cliona Dwyer combined to present Grogan with her first over.

Jacob notched a second placed ball before Una Leacy again failed to get the better of Breen following a precise ball from Shelley Kehoe. With Leacy in at fullforward, Tipperary and Cashel defender Una O'Dwyer was having problems keeping her in tow.

However, the continued switching of Leacy and Jacob looked to do O'Dwyer more good than the Oulart-The Ballagh duo as she grew in confidence and began gaining the ascendency.

Morrissey broke clear down the right to tie the game in the eighth minute before Hennessy grabbed two points in 60 seconds, edging Cashel into the lead for the first time. Jacob replied with her third, first from play, but three points, two from Morrissey and the other by Grogan, gave Cashel a four-point lead after 20 minutes (0-7 to 0-3).

Shelley Kehoe moved back into the sweeper position and Oulart-The Ballagh gradually started to gain some possession after ten minutes on the rack. Mary Leacy's long-range free was doubled on by Una, just outside the square, and found its way into the visitors' net via the right post to give the home side a jolt of confidence.

Grogan momentarily doubled her side's lead, but when Una Leacy dropped Emma Moran's pass, Diane Ryan was on hand to pull and beat Breen for the second goal in two minutes. A fourth Grogan point tied the game in the 26th minute, but a brace of Jacob points gave OulartThe Ballagh a half time lead of 2-5 to 0-9.

Having narrowly dodged a bullet in injury time when Emily Hayden's effort clipped the outside of the post, OulartThe Ballagh started the second-half, with Kehoe surprisingly back in the forwards, on the back foot. Una Leacy grabbed the opening point of the half after a number of uncharacteristic Cashel misses, but their inaccuracy didn't last long as Grogan scored to pull

Disaster struck for Oulart-The Ballagh ten minutes into the half when Jill Horan's long ball was controlled poorly by an otherwise steady Helena Jacob, and Morrissey was on hand to force the ball over the line, giving the Tipp, champions their first lead of the half,

Cashel gained complete control with superior pace and power as Grogan notched twice to open a three-point lead (1-12 to 2-6) at the midpoint of the second-half.

Linda Grogan added her only point to edge her side four ahead before Oular(The Ballagh substitute Shauna Sinnott saw her effort cleared from under the crossbar by Breen, after tidy work by Stacey Kehoe.

Cora Hennessy completed a 1-5, 15minute, run without an Oulart-The Ballagh score before Una Leacy blazed a 30metre free over the crossbar to narrow the gap once again.

Both sides missed goal chances late on, with Jacob saving from Grogan while Leacy pulled an effort wide, but Cashel hung on to a deserved victory and will now be favourites when they take on Athenry in a repeat of the 2007 final.

Athenry and Cashel through to All Ireland senior club final ATHENRY set up an All Ireland senior club camogic final to savour with Cashel in two weeks time following their respective semi-final victories today (Sunday). It is over 30 years since the Galway club side claimed the Bill Carroll trophy, and this is a decider the westerners will very much look forward to, when they meet a Tipperary outfit who picked up their only All Ireland title in 2007.

The Galway girls had little difficulty overcoming Loughgiel in Duggan Park, Ballinasloe (1-15 to 0-3) as captain Therese Maher grabbed 1-3. There was never any question of victory going elsewhere with Brenda Kerins, Laura Linnane and Noreen Coen adding to the tally.

It was always going to be a tough ask for a young Loughgiel team, who made the Antrim championship their main aim. They failed to emulate their conquerors in that decider, O'Donovan Rossa, who are the reigning All Ireland club titleholders.

Meanwhile, following an incredible battle in Oulart-the-Ballagh, Cashel had to come from behind before pulling off a memorable 1-14 to 2-7 win over first time semi-finalists Oulart, The Slaneysiders got off to a great start with goals from Una Leacy and Diane Ryan to give them an interval lead of 2-5 to 0-9.

But, a Cashel goal inside 10 minutes of the restart from Mairead Morrissey let them back in. They hit a purple patch after that confining the Wexford side to just two second half points. The prolific Claire Grogan, Cora Hennessy and Morrissey fired some excellent points for the Munster girls to run out victors by four points.

Elsewhere, in another thrilling encounter St Anne's Dunhill, Waterford caused the shock of the day when they qualified for their first All Ireland junior final after ousting The Harps 3-10 to 0-16 at O'Moore Park Portlaoise. Croker tribute

REMEMBERING Nell - there is a special Mass this Saturday to honour the legendary trainer of the Dublin camogie team, Nell McCarthy. It takes place in Croke Park (6.0pm).

Nell trained the Dubs in the golden era when the county collected a harvest of All-Ireland titles. She was from Carricktohill in Cork. She worked in Dublin in the civil service.

She played for Celtic. A tidy centre halfback. She had a sweet lift and strike. Her second home was the Phoenix Park. She found her true vocation as a trainer/coach. Eileen Duffy-O'Mahony knew her better than most.

Eileen was the great Dublin goalkeeper who won eight All-Ireland medals - 1949, '50, '51 '52, '53, '54, '55 and in 1957 when she was captain. Eileen was voted camogie's Top Cat, claiming the number one spot on the Team of the Century.

"I knew Nell for over 65 years," explains Eileen. "She was the best coach that I ever came across. She was ahead of her time. Some of the skills that she drummed into us all those years ago, the Kilkenny hurling team are doing them now.

"Nell was a great believer in making use of the open space. Delivering the ball into it and making sure that players were always prepared to run into it.

"And she always focused on hitting the ball on the ground. Developing the ability to strike the sliotar left and right on the ground was uppermost in her teaching. When the time was right, you could lift the sliotar and go for

it, but the time had to be right. "She absolutely loved camogie. She just had that X factor."

Eileen and Nell served on the Dublin Board together. Every Monday evening, Nell would have tea in Eileen's house before they'd set off for the meeting. Camogie was the chat that dominated at the table. When Eileen got married and moved out of the family home, Nell still arrived for tea on those Monday evenings.

"I wasn't there then, but she'd still come and have her tea with my parents. Nell was a very friendly person. She was talented. She cherished life and she enjoyed travel. She had a wonderful sense of humour.

"She was so very kind. And she had an interest in all sports - football, hurling, rugby and soccer. She'd also go to the rugby and

soccer matches." It was Nell who ensured that Dublin never lacked fitness when they were winning all those All-Ireland titles. "We trained up in the

Phoenix Park and we trained hard - rain, hail

"Nell had a great eye to spot talent. I recall Una O'Connor when she was about 12. She had blonde hair, skinny little legs and a tiny hurl. But oh what a body swerve.

"Nell said she'd be a star someday and how right she was. Nell was known all over the country. She'd give coaching sessions in the boarding schools throughout Ireland on some weekends and I'd go with her. It was a fabulous education.

"Life was so different then. As a team, we were so fit. Nobody had a car. We walked, cycled and hiked everywhere. Life itself was a training session.

"Nell was such a lady. And the mass on Saturday will be a marvellous tribute to her memory, especially from us Dubliners to whom she gave so much.

"Everybody is welcome. We'd love to see as many as possible come along. And I think everybody would agree that it's so appropriate that the mass is taking place in the 'holy ground."

OLD foes will meet at a familiar stage when Galway title holders Athenry and 2007 All Ireland Club champions Cashel lock horns in what promises to be an explosive senior camogie showdown on Sunday at St. Conleth's Park, Newbridge (2pm).

The two strongest club teams in the land haven't clashed since that November day in 2007 when the underdogs from Cashel quiet simply played the favourites from Athenry of the pitch in an unforgiving display of pace, power and precision. The result was nothing beyond a shock and Sunday's encounter provides the Athenry women with a shot at revenge, but more importantly a chance to right the wrongs of the 2007 decider.

Midge Glynn and her backroom team of PJ Molloy, Eugene Cloonan, Dermot Monaghan and Frank O'Shea will again have to plan without the services of former All Star winner Jessica Gill - out with cruciate ligament problems while successful Galway Intermediate goalkeeper Deirdre Ward is ruled out with a cruciate injury also.

On the better news front, . corner forward Mary Keogh has returned to the fold following a bout of tonsillitis which kept her out of the semifinal win over Loughgiel. Athenry, who are chasing their first All Ireland Club title since 1977 having reached the final on six other occasions, are in the decider on merit.

Despite a group stage defeat to Mullagh, they advanced to the county semi-final where they staggered past Pearses by a narrow two point margin (0-14 to 2-5). This set up a county final meeting with Killimor and while many fancied the young pretenders from East Galway to put end to Athenry's reign, the county champions displayed a steely resolve to take their fourth consecutive title and 16th in total.

Certainly, the Galway club championship has fostered a ruthless mentality which was very much evident in their semi-final triumph. They were fully deserving of their 15 point winning margin, clocking up 1-12 in the first-half as all six for-



In that tourna-ment, Cashel's Sinead Millea sustained an ankle injury which has kept her out of action. She now has returned to do some light training, but whether Sunday's final has come too soon for her remains to be seen.

As already mentioned, Cashel will be making their 3rd appearance in the final. Other Tipperary clubs have also reached the finals. Drom - Inch were finalists in 2008 when they found the challenge from O Donovan Rossa (Antrim) too much Toomevara were runners up in 1995 when Rathnure of Wexford stole the show. We have to go back to 1971 when Thurles & Austin Stacks of Dublin were the finalists, and unfortunately it was the Dublin girls who claimed the title.



HIS IS Cashel's 3rd All-Ireland Final appearance. They lost to Pearses of Galway in 2001, they again made the final when they beat Athenry in 2007 to claim their first and only title. This has also been the only All-Ireland title won by any Tipperary club. Their path to the final has seen them play out a thriller in the County Final against Burgess/ Duharra. Their Munster campaign was somewhat less challenging with wins over Kileedy (Limerick) and St. Catherine's (Cork). However, a much needed challenge was provided by Oulart/The Ballagh (Wexford) in the semi-final, when despite having the best of exchanges in the first half, Cashel were down two points at half-time.

Speaking during the week, Cashel Manager John Grogan has said that "the title of favourite does not or will not affect their preparation." In relation to their displays up to this, John has been impressed on how his team "dug out victories from games they sometimes looked to be losing. The character and sheer grit that the whole panel puts into every performance has been commendable and they will need to call on all of their depth of experience and self-belief if they are to overcome the challenge of Athenry."

One downside to their semi-final win was the hand injury picked up by influential player Mairéad Morrissey. Despite battling through the pain of a broken finger for most of the game, Mairéad still managed to register 1-3 for Cashel. It looks as if she will not be able to feature in Sunday's game as a result of this injury.

Three successive County titles were to follow and the ultimate accolade, a Senior Club All-Ireland title, was achieved in 1977 - no mean feat for a club in its relative infancy. History had been made in the Club in more ways than one that year as the team had flown to Belfast for their All- Ireland semi-final encounter against Creggan in the previous

With no underage structure in place, the Club recognised the need for a breeding ground' for the future and thus in 1992 Athenry fielded their first under age teams with immediate success from U10 upwards. 1997 saw the Club win the Féile title with many of the girls in the Athenry colours today having played on that winning team. The fact that so many of these are still so active in the game is testament to their passion and commitment to this great and skilful game and to the support and dedication of Club, Community and Parish.





Final heartbreak for Athenry again

Galway champs just fall short against bogey team Cashel in All-Ireland Club final

ATHENRY'S fervent hopes of a second ever All Ireland Senior club camogie title lay in tatters on the Clarecastle turf after an enthralling final played in atrocious weather conditions on Sunday.

This far and no further shall you go was the stark message from the powerful Cashel side who celebrated a second All Ireland club title in three years - both victories coming at the expense of Athenry.

The four-in-a-row Galway champions must surely be scratching their heads as to what they must do to land the Bill Carroll Cup, a title that has continued to elude them since the club's one and only All Ireland triumph in 1977. In truth, the only emotion to describe the feeling of the Athenry players, supporters and management following the final whistle was sheer and utter heartbreak.

Unlike 2007, the Athenry women gave every ounce of energy to the cause but, despairingly, just fell short of the winning post, pipped only by a side that must rank up there with the great club teams of Pearses and Granagh-Balli-

Having survived an epic semi-final against Oulart the Ballagh, the Tipperary champions were in no mood to let the

ultimate prize slip from their grasp. A goal to the good inside the final ten minutes, the winners failed to add to their tally, but held on against a late surge spearheaded by Jessica

Indeed Gill deserves tremendous plaudits for her contribution. Sidelined since early September with cruciate ligament damage, the former All Star single-handedly wiped out the impact of Cashel full back and captain Una Dwyer, who had controlled proceedings inside the forty for well over three quarters of the tie.

It poses the question what if Gill had been fit? But injuries played key roles on both sides and it must be mentioned that Cashel were without Sinead Millea, as capable a forward as any that stared on Sunday.

The passion and intensity of the exchanges never flagged throughout and though no quarter was neither asked nor given, exemplary sportsmanship prevailed from the first whistle to the last. It was as hard and as competitive a game of camogie played all season. And while the opening half proved tight and tense, it was to be second fiddle to what came at the turnover.

At the end of the first quarter. Athenry found themselves one point to the good, Mairead Morrissey and Laura Linnane traded points before Brenda Kerins and Therese Maher found the target for Athenry. Cashel's response coming from the stick of Claire Grogan.

Crucially, Athenry gambled

In the ensuing passages of play, Therese Maher broke onto a clearance out of defence, galloped through the centre and struck for the top corner, but was denied by a superb save from 'keeper

Helen Breen.

This was just one of a limited number of goal chances presented to both sides, with Laura Linnane and Emily Hayden spurning opportunities. Brenda Kerins and Claire Grogan registered scores before Laura Linnane (45') and an inspirational effort from Noreen Coen sent Midge Glynn's charges three points clear.

Critically, though, Athenry

failed to build on their advantage, shooting six wides in that first half. Meanwhile, Cashel were making the most of every chance that fell their way, Claire Grogan and Alison Lonergan snipped a pair of points to reduce the deficit to a solitary point at the break.

Little things were going against Athenry - Maher's missed goal chance and Linanne's inability to spot Natalie Iordan on the edge of



'Hen parties' causing havoc with camogie fixtures in Galway

Finn elected new county senior team manager as Donoghue opts against extending his term

"GETTING the house in order" was just one of the recommendations made in relation to the fixtures debate which brought stirring arguments from many of the delegates who attended the County Camogie Board AGM at the Lough Rea Hotel & Spa on Monday evening.

Geraldine Chairperson McGrath argued "that many clubs had stooped to the lowest levels" to get matches called off during the summer. Clearly, infuriated, the Chairperson went on to say that "hen parties and 21st birthdays" were the excuses used week on week to have games postponed.

"Until we get our fixtures going, we are going nowhere", added the Chairperson. She said it was a credit to the fixtures committee that all competitions, with the exclusion of the minor championship were concluded by early November, but said next year the possibility of playing clubs matches while the All Ireland senior championship was in progress would have to be looked at.

The Camogie Board stressed it is their prime aim to finish the minor competitions by the end of the calendar year. The U18 'B' final between St. Thomas and Salthill will go ahead this weekend, despite a proposal from St. Thomas' delegate Marline Connolly that the final be re-fixed for next February.

The minor 'A' semi finals featuring Sarsfields against Mullagh, and Killimor against Athenry will also go ahead this weekend, with the final to be played the following week.

Assistant Secretary Pauline Mitchell thanked everyone for their courtesy and co-operation with regard to fixtures, but stated that "getting the mindset right" was crucial for future years.

In relation to finance, the County Board experienced a deficit of expenditure over income of €18,165 this year.

However, it was revealed that the cost of the senior team decreased dramatically in comparison with 2008 with the total sum for 2009 coming to €30,383. Camogie Board Secretary Ann Kearney said that County teams only received the "bare minimum"

Nine clubs, Oranmore/Maree Kiltormer, Mullagh, Portumna, Kiltullagh/Killimordaly, Cap-That gap is expected to be nar- patagle, Ardrahan, Turloughmore and Ballinasloe, supported Finn for the position.

Salthill delegate Joe Maguire proposed Finn for the senior job at the meeting and it was seconded by Kiltullagh/Killimordaly delegate Frank Duane. The decision is subject to ratification by the Executive Committee, but that will be a formality after outgoing manager Liam Donoghue informed the board prior to the meeting that he was not interested in seeking a second year.

Finn, who has guided Galway to two All Ireland Intermediate titles this decade plus the junior crown in 2003, pointed out that there will be a change in his background team for the upcoming season.

Geraldine Chairperson McGrath stressed the need for a "good relationship between the senior and intermediate players" but warned that only players that were needed be used by the senior management in 2010.

"This idea of bringing on girls for two or three minutes in a senior match just to give them a taste of it and, in the process, ruining their chance to play for the intermediate side must stop," she added.

With so many players in con-

tention for a place on the Galway senior panel next year following the success of the Intermediates, it was proposed that trial matches be held early in the New Year to select a panel.

But Galway U16 manager Johnny Kane quickly put the idea to bed stating it a "waste of time" holding trial matches as players simply won't show up. The Turloughmore man revealed that the first trial match held this year for the intermediate side brought only three players to Killimor, while only seven showed up at the second

No management team was put in place for the Intermediate side, although it was proposed that the manager of the U18 side take the Intermediate job as well, seeing as the majority of next year's U18 panel will also feature for the intermedi-

In any event, the successful U16 management team of Johnny Kane, Tom Page, Emer Kearney and Noel Kelly were given the reigns of both the U16 and U18 sides for 2010 with one delegate admitting: "why break something that's going so well".

The decision was not without its difficulty as many of the delegates argued that the Board were side stepping the Bye-law 4.15 which states that one person cannot manage two county teams.

Geraldine expressed her anger at people putting road blocks in the way of a management team that had brought All Ireland glory to Galway: "I can't believe people are making this so difficult." The Camogie Association has experienced unprecedented growth in recent years enjoying increased membership, an 11% increase in the number of clubs, growth overseas and a higher profile than ever

The first camogie match in public was a practice game in the Phoenix Park, Dublin on July 10th. 1904 played between Dublin selections. That game was followed a week later by a match between Keatings and Cuchulains, both from Dublin, at An Uaimh and was played in conjunction with an Aerideacht in the county Meath town. The celebrations of the founding of the Association in 2004 marked a turning point for the Association, re-energising those involved and bringing people back to the game who had not been involved in recent years. It also saw the launch of the Camogie Association's Strategic Plan 2004 - 2008 which has been the roadmap for the development of Camogie at all levels.

All-Ireland Senior Championship

On the playing fields Tipperary and Cork have dominated the opening years of the new century in terms of the All Ireland senior title. The Premier County won the O'Duffy Cup for the first time, surprisingly enough, in 1999. They met Cork in an All Ireland senior final for the first time in 2000 and the goal scoring expertise of full forward Deirdre Hughes, who finished with 2-2, was a key factor in enabling Tipperary

to regain the title. Tipperary went on to win five All Ireland titles between 1999 and 2004, beaten only by Cork in 2002. 2005 and 2006 saw the return of the Rebels for the All Ireland senior honours but they were stopped short of the three-in-a-row by an inspired Wexford side that captured the 2007 Gala All Ireland senior final, their first since 1975 and only the county's fourth All Ireland title. Wexford brought great excitement and colour

to the All Ireland final with a record breaking 34,000 people attending the finals in Croke Park. Sisters Mary (captain) and Una Leacy were instrumental in their side's win and went on to be the first sisters to win All Stars in the same year. Kate Kelly was a powerhouse throughout the championship for Wexford and ended the year as the Gala All Ireland Championships top

2008 saw Cork win their 23rd Senior Championship in 2008 beating Galway in the final. Mary O'Connor added her sixth All Ireland medal to her collection ensuring her

place in history with players such as Noelle O'Driscoll and Sandie Fitzgibbon. Cork draw ever closer to Dublin with a record 26 All Ireland


Junior titles for Dublin, Derry and Clare

In the junior ranks Dublin added a second Junior All Ireland title in 2006 beating Derry before returning to the senior ranks. Derry avenged their 2006 defeat by taking the title in 2007 beating Clare with a last minute goal after six minutes of injury time. Clare took the honours in the 2008 Gala All Ireland Junior Final beating Offaly in a thrilling game. This was Clare's first title since 1986 and captain Deirdre Murphy proudly lifted the New Ireland Cup making up for the disappointments of 2005 and 2007 when she also captained the side.

Kilkenny captured the 2008 Gala All Ireland Intermediate Championship with a win over Cork after needing two attempts to overcome Galway in the semi finals. Meath took its first All Ireland title in 2008 when it won the Gala All Ireland Junior Championship (Nancy Murray Cup) and the Division 4 League title, beating Roscommon in both.

Cork eye treble after taming Cats

It's not often that hurleywielding Cats lose one final, let alone two in the same afternoon at Croke Park, but their women could have certainly have no quibbles here.

Their young side came up considerably short against the defending All-Ireland senior camogie champions who proved their mettle yet again by racking up a phenomenal fifth title for eight consecutive finals. And as the final whistle sounded the question was inevitably posed: can the Rebelettes now go on to clinch the three-in-a-row which has always eluded them, most recently in 2007?

To her credit, manager Denise Cronin didn't dodge the question or pretend that it won't be next on their agenda. "If we'd lost one today you might have seen a lot of players retire but I

Not for the first time, the bedrock of Cork's latest victory was their defence, where All-Star goalkeeper Aoife Murray, Cathriona Foley, Rena Buckley, Mary O'Connor and Sara Hayes (who's just back from her honeymoon!) were outstanding during several periods of heavy aerial bombardment, mostly engineered by excellent Kilkenny captain Ann Dalton.

At times in the second half it was like 'women against girls' which, in many cases, was true as Ann Downey's young side were contesting their first final in eight years and giving away plenty of pound in experience and nous.

Kilkenny's only two points from play came before half-time and they only scored twice in the second half.

After being held level for the first quarter, Cork noticeably then surged four points clear and went in three points up (0-8 to 0-5) at half-time. Yet, as ever, they had All-Star keeper Murray to thank for never veering into the danger-zone.

The Cloughduv star was alert, after just 16 minutes, to a longrange shot from Aoife Neary and subsequently made three crucial second-half stops. Her second save, blocking the dangerous overhead ball on the line after 42 minutes, was her most important because a goal at that stage could have given Kilkenny new oxygen.

Neary also had goal on her mind when she stepped up to take a 20m free in the fourth quarter which Corkery parried, and from there Cork essentially suffocated them with their ruthless defensive efficiency and superior teamwork.

It may not have been a showstopper like the 2007 and the '08 finals, but Cork showed they can win any way. They ground out this victory with unfussy graft and selfless teamwork, exemplified by the leadership up front when all

"I'm delighted that the girls didn't let themselves down, but disappointed that we didn't win because we had high hopes. But on the day I think it was the experience that helped them. They closed us down every

chance that we got in the second half and were hunting in packs.

"But that's experience and we've to go back and build on today. We've a very young team and they've got that experience now and we'll be back next year," she vowed.

WE LIVE in strange times. Apparently one of our major banks has had serious difficulties in 2009 recruiting a Chief Executive for the apparently less than adequate salary of €500,000 per annum - 30 times what a single unemployed person has to survive on.

Imagine the impact €500,000 would have on Dublin Camogie. But then could you put a price on the voluntary efforts of so many in the Dublin Board, referees and in all the clubs that in 2009 saw a record of over 2200 games played not including the activities of the county teams and squads. In a book published in 2009 "Mná na hÉireann - Women who shaped Irish History", chapters featuring 50 women from many walks of life were covered was there a representative from camogie? No need to answer - you get the drift.

In 2009, Dublin camogie continued to provide a superb sporting outlet for thousands of girls. All over the county - players competed fiercely for honours. The winners are known in all but a few competitions (see Table) but already moves are underfoot to renew the challenge in 2010.

For Naomh Mearnog it will be a never to be forgotten year winning the first senior championship title in the Portmarnock club's history - a first in any code. The Iveagh Grounds year



After a lot of discussion, mostly in favour of the motion, it was decided that the motion be re-worded and changed and put to the floor for discussion at the first meeting of the New Year.

Two motions that were passed unanimously were submitted by the Coiste Chontae, the first that a disciplinary committee be set up to deal with all matters in relation to disciplinary matters, while the second called for clubs to pay an annual levy of €200 for the upkeep and maintenance of the county board pitch at Castle Road.














A fairytale year

Once again Cork camogie had new senior county champions for 2009. Remarkably Cork had a seventh county championship winner in nine years. Cloughduv took three titles in '01, '02 and '05. They are the only club side to retain honours as year after year a new club rises to claim the title and Cork camogie is thriving because of it.

This year was the turn of Ballynoe side St Catherine's. No betting person would have put their money on St Catherine's at the beginning of the season. Douglas, St Finbarr's and possibly Milford were the three most likely to be there or there about come final day.

It didn't turn out that way and that's the joy of sport. That's the joy of Cork camogie.

Once again the divisional sides held their own preliminary championship ahead of the championship proper, commencing on June 17. Seandun easily accounted for Avondhu 6-20 to 4-2. 2007 champions Muskerry had three points to spare over Carrigdhoun while Carbery afforded Imokilly a walkover.


In round two Muskerry moved more into their stride recording a facile 5-18 to 0-8 victory over Seandún. They advanced to round three and leap frogged into round two of the championship proper after they defeated Imokilty with 12 points to spare.

Still in June, Barryroe were left to ponder how they lost their opening game to Rockban after dominating for long periods. Ten wides in the opening half and two shots off the crossbar cost them dearly as Rockban took their chances and two goals; one in each half saw Rockban advance to the quarter-finals.

An impressive display from Milford saw them easily dispose of Ballygarvan, a double act from the Watson sisters bagging four goals between them finishing the game 4-9 to 0-10.

For the second year in a row a single point separated St Catherine's and Cloughduv. A last minute goal from Katherine Corkery wasn't enough to gain Cloughduv at least a replay as time ran out.

Three penalties, seven goals and 18 points provided the thriller in Brinney for the Courcey Rovers v Inniscarra clash.



Rovers advanced with a one point victory, 3-11 to 4-7, after the sides were level on six occasions.

2008 county finalists Douglas and St. Finbarr's met again in round one and once again the last quarter was where Douglas did their most damage, striking 3-3 in the last 20 minutes to which St Finbarr's had no answer.

The back-door saw Inniscarra account for Barryroe, St Finbarr's have two points to spare over Ballygarvan and Cloughduv advance to the quarter-final at the expense of Muskerry. Two second half goals in the space of three minutes put paid to any hope Cloughduv may have had of dethroning Douglas who controlled most of the second half despite Cloughduv's strong opening. St Finbarr's easily accounted for Rockban, 4-10 to 1-6 white Milford received a stern test from a very impressive Inniscarra outfit to emerge victorious by a solitary goal. St Catherine's ended Courcey Rovers' title hopes with a five-point victory in a game which failed to ignite. Marching on to thsemi-final and we had two mouth watering games in prospect.

Milford faced a mighty challenge in Champions Douglas but how they performed on the night in Mourneabbey on August 5. A powerful display by the North Cork side blew Douglas away and the question marks over the City club's defence were answered as Milford hit for three goals in a game that was effectively over at half time.

St Catherine's also faced a tough assignment taking on seasoned campaigners St Finbarr's. The sides couldn't be separated first time round when a Lisa Higgins injury time equalising point gave St Catherine's a second chance after they had led at half time by 1-4 to 0-2.

The replay however wasn't as close an affair as a top class display by St Catherine's epitomised by the outstanding play of Orla Cotter hit St Finbarr's for six, St Catherine's deserving of their eight-point winning margin.

Milford and St. Catherine's became the final everyone was talking about. The unexpected final, previewed to be a thriller. And a thriller it was. A magnificent second half provided all the ingredients. Milford pulled back a four-point deficit midway through the second half to draw level. With seven minutes of normal time left Orla Cotter won possession in the middle of the field. She supplied Deirdre Twomey who fed Evelyn Ronayne inside who made no mistake to goal from close range to the delight of a large and very enthusiastic St Catherine's following.

Milford piled the pressure on in search of the equaliser as the crowd sat on the edge of their seats. Denise Twomey coolly slotted over an immensely important insurance point and now Milford needed two scores, one a goal, just to level it.

Louise O'Flynn pointed three minutes into injury time to leave a goal between the sides. When referee Collette O'Mahony blew the full-time whistle on the puck-out it was a joyous occasion amidst joyous scenes for a club well deserving of this their greatest hour.



Aways going to win

Cork retained the O'Duffy cup and bid for three in a row in 2010 after a championship where, despite not reaching great heights, the Rebels still had too much in reserve for any opponent who crossed their path.

They progressed through their group without dropping a point to advance to a semi-final and final they were never in danger of losing.

It was Wexford who claimed National League honours in April after Cork suffered defeats to Galway and Wexford and failed to advance from their group. That typically doesn't seem to upset the Rebels too much with championship very much the focus of their attentions.

Just six weeks later Cork were in championship mode as they recorded a facile 3-21 to 0-7 victory over Dublin in Páirc Uí Rinn. New physical coach Frank Flannery laid down a marker as Cork's supreme fitness was clearly evident. All over the pitch Cork held the upper hand and used the opportunity to make use of their five substitute allocation during the course. Away to Kilkenny on July 18 proved a difficult task for Cork. In dreadful weather conditions it was only when second half substitute Emer O'Farrell grabbed two goals that breathing space separated the sides. Kilkenny packed their defence and in the poor conditions Cork couldn't spread them wide. Leading at half time 0-3 to 0-2 Cork dug deep to come out on top 2-5 to 0-7 and while it may not have been the prettiest of victories it was a victory hard won and filled with character.

Cork at this stage topped group 1 and a victory against Tipperary on August 1 would see them finish top where they would be paired against the runners-up in group 2 in the semi-final on August 16. Tipperary on the other hand were tied in second place with Kilkenny and with Kilkenny expected to account for Dublin the pressure was all on Tipp to take points from their Munster rivals.

A rather subdued Cork knew they were fortunate to walk away with two points to spare after Tipperary, who were

the better team over the hour, left the game and their 2009 campaign behind them in Päirc Ui Rinn. In fact poor refereeing decisions and poor tactical decisions by Tipperary in the last 10 minutes possibly denied the Premier County the chance to force a play-off. But Cork held their composure and deservedly advanced to a semi-final meeting with Wexford. A double header in Nowlan Park saw Galway and Kilkenny take first to the field where a Marie O'Connor goal three minutes into injury time saw the Cats reach their first final in eight years with a two-point victory. Cork and Wexford were up next.

Wexford having won the league had an impressive championship, amassing some high scoring victories, getting caught just once by in-form Galway.

The game was billed to be a close encounter.

A scintillating second half saw Cork advance after a poor first-half display saw the Rebels trail by three points and turning to face into a strong breeze.

Wexford led 1-3 to 0-4 after 19 minutes. Not a worrying gap on the board but all of Wexford's scores had come from play compared to two for Cork, both of them coming from the midfield pairing. Cork were struggling in many positions. It was Breige Corkery and Orla Cotter that were keeping their heads above water. Half time it stood at 1-5 to 0-6.

Two minutes of play, 37 minutes in, flattened Wexford and you could see no way back for them. Julia White had entered the fray before the break. She gathered and passed to Gemma O'Connor who flicked to Corkery in full flight. There was no stopping Corkery as she tore around the outside of defence and rocked the net. The crowd barely had time to catch its breadth before goal poacher supreme Emer O'Farrell pulled first on a breaking ball to goal, after good work by Moloney and White again, to leave the score 2-9 to 1-8 and Wexford shell shocked.

The life seemed to be sapped out of Wexford, the intensity of their challenge evaporated. From that moment on Cork were going to advance.

The very mention of Cork versus Kilkenny in an All-Ireland final brings certain anticipation. It failed to live up to expectations however. Kilkenny were disappointing on the day. Cork never looked like losing despite the fact that their full-back line and goalkeeper were the far busier of the two defences over the hour.

Cork's defence were superb throughout particularly Catriona Foley, Rena Buckley and Sarah Hayes. As a unit the entire defence hunted in packs and it is to their credit and the goalkeeping ability of Aoife Murray that Kilkenny scored only two points from play throughout the game.

Three points ahead at the break Rachel Moloney (free), Emer O Sullivan and Gemma O Connor had three points on the board by the 36th minute as Cork stretched their lead to six. You felt a Cork goal would help them to push on but it never came. It was Kilkenny who pushed and drove for goal but once again found the magnificent Cork defence and goalkeeper Aoife Murray in impeccable form.

Forty seven minutes in Cork led 0-12 to 0-6. Substitute Katrina Mackey stretched Cork's lead to seven. With this Cork had the luxury of bringing players off the bench to enjoy the moment.

The final say fell deservedly to the excellent O'Connor who hit a beauty from 70 yards to nail Cork their 24th All-Ireland title, their second in a row and fifth of the decade.

ffaly banished the ghosts of last y e a r's heartbreaking defeat to Clare when they powered to their first Gala All-Ireland junior camogie title win at Waterford's expense in Croke Park on September 13 last.


The Faithful County's 3-14 to 2-8 victory also atoned for their heavy defeat to Tipperary in their first All-Ireland final appearance eight years ago. Joachim Kelly's charges were the better side throughout with a brace of goals in the 49th minute from corner Siobhan forwards Flannery and Arlene Watkins confirming their historic success.

"It was a long time coming, but we got there in the end," Offaly captain Marion Crean explains.

"This makes up for all the disappointments we've had over the years. We were heartbroken after losing last year's final to Clare by a last-minute goal but, if anything, it made us more determined and stronger.

"Even though we went into the final as underdogs, I was convinced we were going to win. Last year, the occasion probably got to us, but that certainly wasn't the case this year. We never lost our focus from the first whistle until the last."

With Elaine Dermody scoring 1-5 in the first half, Offaly had build up a 1-11 to 0-4 half-time lead against a Waterford team that was appearing in their first junior final. And while Waterford resumed by outscoring their opponents by 1-2 to 0-1 in a 10-minute spell, the midlanders refused to panic and were home and hosed when Flannery and Watkins struck for quick-fire goals.

"We got off to the best possible start, and never eased up after that," the Shinrone star recalls.

"Waterford beat us by 13 points in the first game of the round-robin series in Kinnitty in June, but we had put in a huge amount of work on the training field in the meantime and we were determined not to let them get away from us. And the best way to do that was to take the game to them."

Under the management of Offaly hurling legend Joachim Kelly and his selectors Mark Corrigan, Ger Fogarty and Catherine Byrne, the Faithful County struggled to find their form in the early part of the season, with Marion claiming that the team was still "haunted" by last year's All-Ireland final loss.

"The ghosts of last September haunted us the whole way through and all we wanted to do was get back on the playing field in January, avenge that defeat and get back on the road to winning. But if I am honest, the whole way during the league we were haunted by what happened in Croke Park," the primary schoolteacher says.

"It was summed up in a letter that

was sent to me by a nun I don't even know from Cork. She sent a letter after the All-Ireland, complimenting us about the camogie we played but one line that kept ringing around in my head was that sport is cruel. You can train all you want and give it your all but on the day, one twist of luck can change everything and that is what happened us.

"We had a bad league campaign. Not that we thought it was easy and we could turn up and start winning games in the league. We went into the league thinking we will get through the league and get to the final. It was not that easy. The 20th of June was the date that was in our

heads. We knew we were playing Waterford that day. It was a turning

Offaly's 0-7 to 3-11 reversal at the hands of the Deise was the reality check they needed. They needed to win their next two games in the round-robin series to stay in the All-Ireland race, and this they achieved courtesy of impressive performances away from home against Dublin and Down.

"We beat Dublin by 11 points in Portmarnock without playing particularly well, and then beat Down by 5-20 to 0-6 in Newry. We played brilliant stuff that day and it was probably the first time all year that we clicked as a unit. It also highlighted the huge improvement in the team as Down had beaten us only a few months earlier in the league."

Offaly subsequently defeated Meath by four points in a physical encounter at Nowlan Park to secure their place in the All-Ireland final for the second year in succession. In the five weeks leading up the decider, they warmed up with challenge matches against Cork and Galway,

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who recently contested the All-Ireland intermediate final.

Despite their earlier defeat to Waterford, the omens were good for Offaly. They defeated Waterford at the semi-final last year and also got the better of the Deise girls in the 2008 All-Ireland minor 'B' final.

Although they played against a stiff breeze in the first half, Offaly began brightly by racing into a 0-4 to 0-1 lead inside the opening 12 minutes. Indeed, they were unlucky not have had a goal in the fifth minute when Elaine Dermody's penalty was saved.

The Leinster side eventually made the breakthrough in the 20th minute when Dermody hand-passed the ball to the back of the net to ensure a 1-5 to 0-2 lead. The long-serving Dermody bagged four more points before half-time, with scores also from Siobhan Flannery and Tina Hannon, to leave the Faithful County perched on a 1-11 to 0-4 interval lead.

Andy Moloney's Waterford charges began the second half in businesslike fashion with All-Ireland Poc Fada champion Patricia Jackman's 35th minute goal bringing them back into the game. However, Offaly staged a strong final quarter with goals in the space of a minute from Flannery and Watkins paving the way for a comfortable victory.

Aine Lyng scored a late goal for Waterford, but this was mere consolation as Offaly held out for their first All-Ireland success.

"Being underdogs suited us down to the ground. It was a real team performance," says Marion, who was presented with the New Ireland Cup by Camogie Association chairperson Joan O'Flynn.

As one of five survivors from the 2001 team - Elaine Dermody, Audrey Kennedy, Michelle Davis and Sheila Sullivan also played in that year's final against Tipp - Marion is fully appreciative of this success.

"It took us eight years to win the All-Ireland, and we're delighted. The preparation and training has changed so much since then. It's much more professional now. Back then, we went up to Croke Park and weren't prepared for what Tipp threw at us. They hammered us out the gate, but we've come a long way since then," she says.

Offaly will compete in the All-Ireland intermediate championship next year and Marion is already looking forward to pitting herself against the higher quality of opposition.

"We could have opted to go straight

up to senior, but you have to be realistic, especially when you saw how that backfired on Clare this year. There is a huge gap between junior and senior, and as much as we have improved, we are not ready for senior camogie just yet.

"You have to take things one step at a time. Joachim is staying with us and he has a two-year plan to get us out of intermediate. We feel we are well capable of competing with the Limericks, Clares and Dublins of this world. Next year will be all about building confidence and developing players.

"Our team is very young, with an average of just 22. You see someone like Michaela Morkham, who is already an All-Star at just 19. There is huge talent coming through and hopefully this will only be start of things to come," she concludes.



An impressive display from Milford saw them dispose of Ballygarvan, a double act from the Watson sisters bagging four goals between them finishing the game 4-9 to 0-10.





IN HIS introduction speech to the 2009 Sportswoman of the Year awards, John Treacy spoke of the "good match" between joint sponsors The Irish Times and The Irish Sports Council. Treacy, the CEO of the Sports Council, was among several distinguished sporting names at yesterday's lunch banquet in Dublin. The Irish Times was represented by newspaper editor Geraldine Kennedy, and also sports editor Malachy Logan - who spoke of the special place the awards now hold in the Irish sporting calendar.

This is a celebration of women's sport," said Logan, "the gifted individuals who are every bit as talented and committed as their male counterparts. They are also increasingly recognised at home and abroad as wonderful role models and ambassadors for their sports. They have thrilled and delighted us beyond reasonable expectation in the past 12 months, and deserve every accolade they receive.

"Every year these awards grow in stature. This can only happen because our best and brightest sportswomen keep on raising the bar, and they are helped in no small way by the Irish Sports Council, who are our partners in sponsoring these awards."

That was no exaggeration, as 2009 was a truly extraordinary year for Irish women's sport, reflected in the fact that the usual 12 monthly awards was expanded to 15, given there were three jointwinners, such was the windfall of

A year to remember for Cork camogie

WHILE we are still a few weeks away from the first ball being thrown in at inter-county or club camogie levels it's time to cast a quick look back over the headline grabbers in 2009.

INTER-COUNTY

Cork teams participating in competitions from Senior down to under 16 levels and the senior teams under the guidance of manager Denise Cronin made it back-to-back titles as they took their sixth title in eight years, a truly tremendous achievement by a wonderful group of players.

Goalkeeper Aoife Murray was one of the stars of the show as she was named as RTE player of the match after denying Kilkenny with some superb saves in a final where Cork held the upper hand. Captained by Amanda O'Regan from county champions Douglas, Cork were crowned Munster champions when they defeated Tipperary in thrilling final where Rachel Moloney earned the player of the match award.

The league didn't go well but the

Cork backroom team used it as a grooming exercise and they were ready when the championship dawned. Coming out of their group as winners they faced Wexford in the semi-final and a superb display saw them make it to the final.

Cork's second adult team-participated in section 2 of the national league and got their campaign off to a good start with victory over Gal-way, however, with just one team coming out of the group for the se-mi-final their loss to Wexford was enough to put them out.

They emerged from their group to qualify for the semi-final and in a great battle against Derry, Cork grabbed a late winner to make it to the All Ireland final for the third year in a row. In a titanic struggle against a strong Galway sides it ended all square and it was back to the drawing board two week later where a much focused Galway triumphed.

At minor level the Munster crown was annexed as Cork defeated Clare to take the title, however, the Banner reversed that result in the open draw championship at the All Ireland semi-finals.

Cork entered two teams at under 16 level in Munster. The under 16 All Ireland championship competi-tions began in unseasonable weather conditions in early March and there was little joy as Cork failed to make it through to the play-off stages. At provincial level the second team made it to the Munster final, but lost out to Waterford in a close game.

Cork were chosen as one of the counties to participate in the Coillte development squads at under 14 lev-el and a panel of 30 players enjoyed the experience which finished with a blitz day on October bank holiday weekend in Croke Park.

LOCAL COMPETITIONS

There was plenty of focus on the club action with championship from Senior to minor coming under the umbrella of the senior county board. at under age level the juvenile board ran competitions from under 12 to 16 and again in all codes championships and leagues were hotly con-

The senior board were again fortunate to have the sponsorship of all the adult championship competi-tions sponsored by the Evening Echo and at senior level we had new champions as St Catherines who took their first ever senior county championship title as they defeated Milford in a thrilling contest. From early season signs were good for the Conna girls as they came through the preliminary stages while it was the same story for Milford as they knocked out champions Douglas to make it to the final and having suffered the heartbreak of losing to Carrigdhoun in 200 hopes were high. In an action-packed final which drew huge crowds to Pairc Ui Rinn two committed sides battled it out for the title, a goal from full forward Evelyn Roynane with seven minutes remaining finally decided the outcome of a thrilling contest as both sides gave it every-thing to secure their first crown.

At Semor B level Ballincollig annexed their first title and won themselves promotion to senior level for the first time in the club's history when they held off the challenge of neighbours Eire Og in the final. Both side had come through the round robin series and emerged from the same section to contest the final Eire Og having recorded a vic-tory over Killeagh with Ballincollig defeating Glen Rovers.

Ballincollig set the pace of the final from the throw-in, and with Leah Weste, Sarah Buckley and Maire O'Donoghue to the fore they had too much strength for their mid Cork neighbours, Ballincollig's Samantha Coomey named as player of the match as her side were crowned champions.

For the first time in a number of years the Intermediate grade was re introduced and with six teams pro-moted from Junior A the championship was played on a round robin series with four teams emerging to contest the semi-final. After a lot of superb games Sarsfields, Fr O'Neills, Clonakilty and Tracton emerged to battle it out for a place in the final Clon piped Fr O'Neills at the post with a late point while Sars made it through after a tough hour. In the final Clonakilty had to battle all the way before denying Sars and it was Juanita Brennan who received the Nano Nagle trophy, kindly donated by the Presentations sisters in honours of the founder of the presentation order, Clon went on to represent Cork in the Munster junior club championship but lost out to Waterford's St. Ann's in the final.



Dual star Mary has battled back against odds



FOR ordinary guys and gals it would have been the end of the road, the end of a quite brilliant playing career.

The medics were describing the horrific injury in terms of 'forget about Cork. It's all over'.

Mary O'Connor, though, is different.

In fact, she's a phenomenon.

Just look at her achievements in

the accompanying factfile and you'll get the picture.

What more needs to be said about someone who's won 12 All-Ireland senior medals in camogie and ladies football, seven and five, respectively?

The 2007 camogic final defeat by Wexford was one of those rare afternoons of disappointment and frustration.

But O'Connor still had the prospect of the football final to come against Mayo, Cork's fiercest rivals, and strong hopes of another successful conclusion to the intercounty season.

The Killeagh native, however, didn't make it, as she explained.

"It was the Wednesday night after the camogie final, when I was training with the footballers.

"We were having a practice game and as I came down from challenging for a ball I hyper-extended my knee on falling.

"At the time the doctor thought my cruciate was gone and I had lateral collateral damage too, the ligament torn off the bone.

"He said he couldn't operate on the cruciate until the other injury healed and that I'd never play inter-county again." Mary O'Connor captured her 12th All-Ireland medal this year but her journey to greatness has not been without its ups and downs due to a serious injury scare

Given that O'Connor had already a bucketful of honours and had nothing to prove to anyone it would have come as little surprise if she called it a day.

"I've always said I want to retire on my own terms so that made me more determined than ever to get back

"I put my head down and just

worked and worked to return to playing.

"I went to the pool in the Quality Hotel in Youghal twice a day for six months, jogging up and down.

"I went back for another scan after about four months and while there was still 80% bruising, the surgeon admitted he had made a mistake."

That was the news she had waited to hear and her rehabilitation resumed with even greater urgency — if that was possible —with more remarkable results.

Then question of which of her All-Ireland medals she would keep should the choice have to be made?

"I'd have either of the 2008 medals (the camogie win over Galway in a very tight contest), but the sweetest of all was the football final win over Monaghan.

"I scored two points and contributed to a brilliant team performance

"After what had happened the previous year I didn't think I'd get the opportunity again.

"Captaining Cork to the five-in-a-row this season was very special, but this wouldn't have happened if I didn't get my act together in 2007."

The second youngest in a family of six brothers and two sisters, sport was always at the centre of home life.

And Killeagh's strong hurling and camogie tradition made it easy enough for her to fall into it as well

"I was always out in the garden either kicking a football or playing hurling. It was here I first heard the expression 'if you can't stand the heat get out of the kitchen'.

"There was no real access to soccer or basketball growing up in the 1980s. You either played GAA or nothing at all."

in the All-Ireland senior final.

"I studied leisure and recreation in college before taking up the position of GAA Development Officer at Limerick IT for four years.

"I remember we had literally nothing there, no pitch or anything, before the college began upgrading its facilities.

"We won Trench Cups and reached the Fitzgibbon Cup semi-final one year, but got hammered by Waterford IT.

"A short time later LPT dominated hurling.

"After that I was coaching in the primary schools in East Cork for four years.

"Then I was the Regional Development Officer for camogie, covering Munster and south Leinster before the current job came up after about 18 months.

"I'm Director of Camogie Development. There are seven regional development officers around the country and I'm supervising them.

"I make out work programmes for them as well as looking at club structures, player development, schools of excellence, academies, up-skilling coaches and administrators.

"A lot of our work is in developing camogie in places like Mayo, Kerry, Monaghan and Donegal, while also trying to consolidate what we have

in the traditional counties, Cork, Tipperary and Clare, for example.

"There's a fierce amount of driving involved. From now until February I could be away four nights of the week every week.

"It actually slots in nicely with my playing career, because once May comes all the clubs are active, playing games etc, and my travelling is reduced.

"Because I'm dealing with volunteers most of my work is at night and during the winter.

"Then during the summer, I'm getting ready to organise next winter's programmes.

"I really love my job. I'm in it now two-and-a-half years."

The question doing the rounds is O'Connor's intentions for next season, not that it requires answering one way or the other just now.

Especially as the dual sensation is hardly eligible for free travel, so there's plenty of time to weigh up the pros and cons.

"For me at the start of every season it is the challenge of getting there and the challenge of keeping your place that keeps me going.

"Once January comes around I'm thinking I'm going to have another go at this'.

"I'm going to get myself up, do all the disciplined things, make the hard choices. There's almost a sadistic enjoyment to be had out of it.

"I love a challenge and I enjoy the training and the friendship among both squads.

"I love seeing if I still have the ability to keep my place as I look over my shoulder at all the great players chasing me.

"I love seeing if I can still get up to the high standards of fitness and skill levels required to play for

"I know the minute I stop enjoying it I will give up.

"There will come a day, when I won't be good enough, quick enough or strong enough and I'll have to cope with that too.

"If it was only about the All-Ireland medals, I would have retired a long time ago.

"For me it's all about the enjoyment, the camaraderie, the friends. "Indeed I've friends for life now after playing with Cork in both sports.

"I've always been a person who thinks 'we've done that right, now what's next'.

O'Connor may have to choose between the two and she will be ready to make that decision, too.

"If you had asked eight or nine years ago, I'd have said camogie, hands down.

"At the time the footballers were getting hammered every year by Waterford and that was the season

"I was a dual player in name only. The skill and fitness levels have improved dramatically in football and both codes complement each other.

"If I had to answer the question now, I'd still say camogie, but it would be very, very marginal.

"Mind you, I still haven't even thought about it.

"Four doubles in five years is something special and great for women's sport.

"It will come to that eventually, but at the moment I'm not even thinking about it."

The influence of football coach Eamon Ryan cannot be stressed enough, not only in O'Connor's success story, but the astonishing rise in Cork's footballing stock generally.

"He's such a fantastic coach that even to go training is a learning experience.

"You take so much from a session that it would be very hard to walk away from that aspect.

"The quality of the training sessions with Eamonn is very high. He's a brilliant coach."

Which leads nicely on to life after playing, a possible Cork coach in either code down the line?

"When I was younger I would have fancied it all right, but now I wouldn't say so because of the job

I'm in.
"Managing is far more difficult

than being a player, because you have to take everybody's feelings

into consideration.
"I might get involved at underage at club level."

It's not easy to switch off completely from sport, but O'Connor is still able to unwind in the company of familiar faces.

"I've 16 nieces and nephews and I try to see them as often as I can.

"They're all at an age where you can have great fun with them, out in the garden and all that kind of stuff. "I like my own space too, going for

walks and listening to music.

"I have fantastic friends involved in camogie and fantastic friends who have no interest in the sports whatsoever and couldn't care whether I've a dozen All-Ireland medals or

"There's a lot of understanding there from my family as well.

"We're very much family-oriented and they all live within five or six miles of the homestead.

"Ann excommunicated herself to Fr O'Neill's all right, but we will forgive her for that."

This Wednesday O'Connor picks up another award, the Evening Echo Ladies Sports Star of the month, in association with the Rochestown Park Hotel and Newbridge Silverware, for September.

There could be no more appropriate a recipient!

Ring proud of Blackwater's 'fairytale' rise to top

THEIR rise to prominence has been nothing short of meteoric and, last Saturday, Blackwater Community School capped it off by climbing to the top of the Munster Colleges Senior Camogie tree.

The Waterford school only opened its door to students in 2003. But, from initial low depths, they have soared up through the college camogie ranks and on Saturday in Lismore staved off the challenge of Clare's St Caimin's to lift the Munster senior

"It's been fairytale stuff for us ever

since we started competing", says school principal and team coach Denis Ring. "We started off at intermediate B level, a nice name for the E competition. From there we won the intermediate A, then the year after the Senior C Munster and All-Ireland titles, and last year the Senior B Munster and All-Ireland titles. This year has been our first year competing at senior A level and we beat last year's champions Christ the King in the semi-final before Saturday's win in the final.

In hurling we've been making good progress as well, reaching the Harty Cup semi-final last year before losing out to Thurles CBS who went on to win the All-Ireland."

Ring believes the advances are a testament to the ground work being done at club level as well as the effort in the school.

"There's great being done in Lismore, Cappoquin and Tallow camogie clubs. They'd be the main three clubs we'd draw from although we do have some Cork representatives as well. There's a girl from Killeagh in our subs and Grainne Walsh, daughter of Cork senior manager Denis, from St Catherine's plays in our younger teams.

"We've put a lot of hard work into

it, especially from the likes of Fintan O'Connor, Tina Maher, Ann Fitzgerald, Ann Bennett and Catherine Quaid.

"We felt that with the camogie we had to make up the ground so we start our training around the time of the state exams. We then came back last July and August, as we felt we've to do more to be up to speed. To be fair the commitment from the players is outstanding, coming in for training in mid-term at Halloween and again at Christmas. Sunday morning's at 9am is our main session and we get great effort for that."

Next up is an All-Ireland semi-fi-

nal date with Portumna Community School on February 6 and Ring insists they will be making a bold bid to maintain their senior championship winning run, which stretches for three years at this stage.

"We'll keep putting in the same effort for the All-Ireland stages. It's an unparalleled achievement really in the steps we've taken in consecutive years to move up through the ranks. I didn't think it would be possible this year because we'd three long-term injures but the win just shows the character of our team. We're delighted for the school with all the progress that has been made."

Joan's playing career stretched across three counties — with her native club Fr. O'Neill's in east Cork, Celbridge, Kildare where she now lives and London Irish where Joan was a member of the first London representative team to play inter-county camogie twenty-one years ago. Joan served as Chair, Secretary and PRO of Kildare Camogie Board over a ten year period. She was a member of Leinster Council, Chair of the Association's National Strategic Plan Committee for six years and its Management Committee for three years. In 2004, Camogie Centenary Year, Joan authored Soaring Sliothar, A History of Kildare Camogie.

Mary Moran is a former president of Cumann Camógaíochta na nGael as well as an acclaimed manager, player and decorated administrator. A native of Limerick, Mary lined out for her adopted county of Cork, club side Old Aloysians as well as the renowned Dublin camogie side Celtic. She is the author of Cork's Camogie Story and Munster's Camogie Story and is currently writing a History of Camogie due for publication in 2011.

Eoghan Corry played camogie for the boys against the girls in the annual summer fun fixture at Presentation Convent Clane in the 1970s and once saved a penalty from later Kildare county star Marianne Johnson. He is a former sports editor of the Sunday Tribune, History graduate of University College Dublin and former lecturer at Dublin Institute of Technology. He is the author of over two dozen sports history books. A travel writer, broadcaster and weekly contributor to RTÉ's 'Today with Pat Kenny', Eoghan is also chairperson of the Communications and Website Committee of Cumann Camógaíochta na nGael.

Angela Downey was a joint recipient of the 2009 Irish Times/Irish Sports Council 'Lifetime Achievement' award for a glittering inter-county career with Kilkenny that saw her amass twelve All-Ireland titles, nine national league titles as well as six All-Ireland club titles. She captained Kilkenny to All-Ireland success in 1977, '88 and '89. In 1986 she became only the third camogie player to receive the prestigious Texaco Sports Star of the Year award and was named on the Camogie Team of the Century in 2004.

Ann Downey is the current manager of the Kilkenny senior camogie team and also led them to last year's Gala All-Ireland camogie final. She shares the Irish Times/Irish Sports Council 'Lifetime Achievement' award with her sister Angela. They are the first camogie recipients of such a prestigious accolade. She is the holder of twelve All-Ireland titles, nine national league and seven All-Ireland club titles and was part of the first All-Ireland success in 1974 as well as the invincible seven-in-a-row winning team from 1985 to 1991.

Eileen Duffy -O'Mahony represented Dublin from 1949 to 1957. She is the holder of eight All-Ireland titles and captained the side to glory in '57. She was selected as Sports Star of the Year in 1951 and again in '57. Eileen was a former member of Celtic Camogie club winning five county championships with the Dublin outfit. In 2004 she was named as goalkeeper on the Camogie Team of the Century.

Liz Howard served as president of the Camogie Association from 2006 to 2009. She represented her native county Tipperary as well as lining out for Clare and her adopted abode, Dublin. She also played club camogie with Dublin side Celtic. Liz holds the distinction of becoming the first female to serve on the Tipperary GAA Board acting as P.R.O. She was also one of the first GAA analyst on RTÉ's 'The Sunday Game'.

Mairead McAtamney-Magill won two All-Ireland titles with Antrim. The northern side captured their first in 1967 while Mairead captained the winning side in 1979. She is the holder of two Gael Linn medals; a Camogie All-Star and is a former Antrim Player of the Year. She is a manager, coach and administrator with club side Tir na nOg, Randalstown and is also involved in coaching and managing at inter-county level. Mairead was honoured on the Camogie Team of the Century in 2004.

Sheila Wallace served as Ard Stiúrthóir of Cumann Camógaíochta na nGael for twenty-two years. During her tenure the Association underwent many significant changes, including an expansion of teams from twelve to fifteen-a-side as well as the Camogie Centenary celebrations in 2004. Sheila played senior inter-county camogie for Dublin during the 70s and 80s and was part of the 1984 All-Ireland winning management team. She is a member of Cuala Camogie club, Dalkey with whom she won numerous county titles.



ST. COLM'S FLYING HIGH ...

Two-thousand-and-nine was an absolutely stunning year for the girls of St Colm's, Draperstown who won a landmark first-ever All-Ireland senior colleges camogie title in March and completed back-to-back Ulster victories in December. The twelfth month of the year also saw the school completing a notable double by capturing the Ulster (U16) junior crown, while St Colm's footballers are also making great strides under the watchful eye of a former Tyrone player. All in all, things are really looking up for the Derry school.

The girls of St Colm's reached their first-ever AllIreland senior colleges camogie final with a superb
3-7 to 2-2 defeat of Mercy Convent, Roscommon at
the semi-final stage. Despite trailing by a point at the
interval, they rallied wonderfully in the second half to
record a comprehensive success on Roscommon soil. This
set up one of the most exciting times in the Draperstown
high school's history as they prepared for their maiden
appearance in a national final – against the might of
Kilkenny outfit Grennan College on Saturday March 14
2009. Incredibly, the Ulster champions – who were rank
outsiders – produced an unbelievable performance to win
that final by 1-7 to 0-9. In so doing, they wrote a special
place for themselves in the history books of colleges GAA.

Since Post 16 was introduced by the school four years ago, it provided an opportunity for returning girls to participate in senior camogie. Having reached their first Ulster senior final in March 2008 (narrowly defeated by St MacNissis of Garren Tower), St Colm's lost only two players from that side and went into the 2009 campaign in fine fettle. Entering last year's competition, the target was an Ulster title. The team duly delivered by defeating St Louis, Kilkeel in the provincial final (3-5 to 3-2)

St Colm's High School then made history by winning their first All-Ireland senior camogic title in an epic thriller that required extra time against Grennan College at Ratoath, County Meath. With seconds remaining in normal time, the St.Colm's dream appeared to be slipping. But their resolute determination and self belief was enough to force the equalising point, which came from goalscorer Kelly Marie Hegarty. It would now come down to mental strength...

The first period of extra time saw both teams create many chances but tenacious defending resulted in both teams only scoring one point each with Grace Kelly getting the St.Colm's score. All square with ten minutes to play in the second half of extra time the apprehension and excitement were overwhelming...

Character, temperament and passion were evident throughout, but this final ten minutes of extra time was going to be a real test for both teams. With fatigue setting in and possession so vital, the crucial score came in the eighth minute for St.Colm's: Catriona McBride was fouled in the square and a penalty was awarded. Bronagh McGillian wisely took her point and this was the defining score which enabled St.Colm's to clinch their first All Ireland camogie crown.

Firstly, St Colm's clinched their first Ulster junior title with a magnificent 4-10 to 3-5 victory over St Columba's, Portaferry at Belfast's Corrigan Park. Meanwhile, the school's onslaught on the Ulster senior colleges crown saw them meet St Patrick's, Keady in an epic provincial decider. Having moved up a grade, the girls of St Colm's demonstrated all the characteristics of true champions as they prevailed by 2-7 to 0-8 at the second time of asking in Casement Park to secure the Fr Davies Cup and a coveted place in the All-Ireland series.

'Believe and Achieve' is the motto at St Colm's High School, Draperstown and the application of this ethos has been instrumental in the phenomenal success enjoyed by the camogie team (not to mention the footballers, who are also getting in on the act). There exists a great bond, a togetherness and camaraderie throughout the team, which comprises girls from aged 14 up to 17/18. A thorough sense of teamwork and unity permeates everything.

Team manager Fiona Devlin explains: "They are a fantastic group of girls and I honestly couldn't say enough about them. Their spirit is incredible. They were behind in many's a match and things often looked bleak, but they had that tremendous will to win and never gave up and somehow they managed to keep turning things around. This is an exceptional group and you have to do everything in your power to make sure they are afforded every possible opportunity. We had Davy Harte and Peter Canavan in speaking to them about what it takes to win at the highest level and giving them encouragement. We prepared them to be ready for when the chips were down and the girls responded magnificently.

"A great buzz went through the school as we prepared for the All-Ireland semi-final against Mercy College last year. We were going into the unknown and the excitement was unbelievable. It was a cracking match against a big physical side but our camogie came out in the end and we rollercoasted past them in the second half. That led us to an All-Ireland final and again the four-week build-up was unbelievable around the school.

"A lot of these girls had experienced All-Irelands before through participating in Feile with the local club. Ballinascreen, and they knew what it takes. It was a massive occasion for the school. We were underdogs and we were written off beforehand but the girls have a lot of character and they trained hard and put in a lot of effort, with no stone left unturned to secure the win. It was one of the most intense games I've ever witnessed. It went right down to the wire and was a true test of stamina and character. The girls emptied the tank to record a remarkable win.

"After 70 minutes, out destinies would be settled in ten minutes and we crossed the line and got the penalty in the dying minutes and Bronagh popped it over with 90 seconds left. Needless to say, there was absolute euphoria afterwards. The atmosphere and the support we had from the entire parish was unbelievable.

"We've since moved up a grade in the Ulster senior colleges and we lost four girls from that panel but we still have a good solid core. We aimed for a Top Four finish in this season's qualifying group and actually ended up topping the section. We beat Loretto, Coleraine in the semifinal and St Patrick's. Keady (a school of 1,000-plus) in the final - another fantastic game where both defences were outstanding. We beat them after a replay to make it back-toback Ulster titles in two grades.

"The level of skill, commitment and determination was incredible. There were no ifs, no buts and no regrets and they refused to come off the field beaten. Considering that we are a school of just over 400 pupils, with just one feeder club - Ballinascreen - and one other girl from Swatragh, they have done remarkably well. We couldn't ask for any more. It's been an unbelievable journey and so many people have contributed towards this, including the principal Roisin McKenna, Patsy McElwee from Swatragh who coaches the junior team, and our school caretaker Malachy who drives the coach to the matches and always gives the

players brilliant encouragement. There's just a great support network running throughout the school.

The Ballinascreen club has given them their grounding and the foundations have been laid at the local primary schools. That's where they got their skills from and they know what it takes. Now it's up to us to make sure they get every chance to maximise their potential at colleges level. So far, they've been doing pretty well!"


THE BIG RIVALS

There are three or four Oulart players down here and there were five last year, and there are a good few Wexford girls in UCD and the other colleges as well, so we have even played against club-mates as well. It's not too bad at the moment as we are all concentrating on the Ashbourne so we are only seeing each other now and then with the Wexford training."

SISTER ACT

The Wexford attacker never has to look too far from home if ever in need of some advice as her older sister Helena has been in charge of the Waterford team for a number of years. "She's been over the team for a few years now and is a former player with WIT, she works within the college as an accountant. She mixes the work load with the coaching and does a very professional job with the team. We wouldn't have won it last year if she didn't have us so well prepared. There has been a lot of work done already this year but we know there's a lot to do still. It's not too bad and I'm used to it at this stage although sometimes we'd have the odd row.

But she doesn't favour me in any way and I'm treated the same as any other player. We get on well, although I still don't like it when she has out doing laps!"

GETTING READY

The time is coming near for the trip to Cork and the reigning champs are intent on hanging onto their title and are putting in the hard work. "At this stage all the teams are working hard and just putting the heads down. It's been particularly hard with the bad weather, having to keep things going in training. Still we have to keep working on the skills and we are out running for the fitness work. Everyone is wondering what the other teams are doing as we don't get much of a chance for challenge matches so we'll have to wait and see. There isn't much we can do except focus on the next few weeks, train hard and prepare well. We are playing Cork IT in the qualifiers and we know that will be a tough match. They are the hosts so no doubt they will be wanting to go all the way. We have our work cut out."

ACLUBAPART

Ursula Jacob not only has had to line out against her fellow Model County friends in the Ashbourne Cup, but also her club-mates in recent years. Oulart the Ballagh have dominated the Wexford Championship during the 90s, winning six of the last seven titles. Their status in the county is unquestioned but they also have a big influense in the third level grade. In 2007, Mary Leacy lifted the Ashbourne Cup. In 2008 and 2009 as UCD and WIT went head to head, the club had a big representation once again. WIT's title defence will feature four Oulart the Ballagh players among their ranks showing that they can do it on the national stage and not just for their home club.



Terry: A genuine gentleman who Will be missed

WAS with sincere sadness that the people of Cork learned of the sudden death this week of Terry Dunne.

From Wellington Road, Terry, aged 70, and his beloved wife Kay were valuable members of many associations and charities around

Terry's contribution to life in Cork was invaluable, generous and

Originally from Piltown, County Kilkenny, he joined the Army in Cork on August 4, 1961. He served for 21 years, which included two tours of duty with United Nations deployments in Cyprus in 1964 and again in 1968.

An Army man to the core, Terry approached everything with precision and organisation, believing in leaving nothing to chance.

Having served with the 12th Battalion in Limerick and the 4th Battalion in Cork, Terry retired from the Army at the rank of Company Quartermaster Sergeant.

However, he never left the Army behind and was one of the founding members and driving forces behind the United Nations Veterans' Association.

Wearing his blue beret with pride, Terry was totally dedicated to the cause and proudly represented it in any way he could.

A former secretary of the association, just three weeks ago, Terry was voted president. The honorary position is bestowed on people who have dedicated themselves to its

Retired Quartermaster Pat Mc-Carthy, who took over as secretary from Terry, described him as a true gentleman.

"He worked tirelessly and diligently as secretary. He taught me everything I know - I'm only trotting after him," said Pat.

UN veterans came from all over the country to bid a final farewell to Terry and under the instructions of a parade commander, his coffin, which was draped with the tricolour and the United Nations flags, was shouldered by his comrades.

Following his retirement from the Army, Terry took up the position of steward at the Sundays Well Lawn Tennis and Boating Club. He and Kay lived in a house on the club's grounds and, for 10 years, were part and parcel of life there.

Secretary manager of the club and fellow ex-Army man, John Walsh, said Terry was respected by everyone.

"Even though Terry left here 18 years ago, he was still highly regarded and called in for a cup of tea and a chat regularly.

"During his time here, Terry made a huge contribution. He was lovely gentleman and there weren't too many like him. I knew him for 30 years and I couldn't speak highly enough of him," said

Another cause very close to both Terry and Kay's hearts was Marymount Hospice, and wherever there was a fund-raiser, the couple were sure to be there.


Vice-chairman of the fund-raising branch of the hospice, the Friends of St Patrick's, Terry dedicated years of his life to the charity.

Chairperson of the fund-raising committee and friend of Terry, Regina Donnelly, said they were all devastated by his passing.

"Terry was one of life's true gentleman and I never heard him say anything bad about anyone. He was also a brilliant confidante. You could tell Terry anything and it wouldn't be repeated.

"The fund-raising coffee morning was his baby and it was only last month that he reminded me about it. Terry and Kay have been with us for 14 years and did so much work behind the scenes.

"Terry was everybody's friend, and a friend to everyone. He was the most unassuming and genuine gentleman that was ever put on

this earth. People learned a lot from Terry. He always sat in the same chair at our meetings and we will all miss him, and the twinkle in his eye," said Regina.

County board PRO Mary Newman said Terry dedicated his life to others.

As president of the United Nations Veterans' Association and as Kay was president of the Cork Camogie Board, Terry recently joked that not too many houses had two presidents living in them.

His kind nature, generous heart and welcoming and friendly manner will be missed by many.

Galway camogie manager with Midas touch

NYONE who has been following Galway senior camogie in the last number of years will tell you if that there has been one fundamental element the Tribeswomen have been sadly lacking, it has been that little bit of

Well, that is something they hope to rectify this year with the appointment of Noel Finn, a man who has led Galway to three All-Ireland titles between junior and intermediate on the three previous occasions he was involved in the county camogie

It may be unfair to put Finn's significant All-Ireland title haul simply down to luck - there are few who work harder for the cause - but, certainly, he is the first to acknowledge that there are times when you have to unashamedly flirt with the fair

"I suppose I have (been a lucky manager), but you make your own luck too," insists Finn. "It is great winning the three All-Irelands the three years that I was there, but having said that you can't do it without the play-

"As I always said, there are loads and loads of great camogie players in Galway and it is no different this year. But, yes, I suppose you do need a bit of luck as well. If you don't have a bit of luck, well ..." Finn's voice trails off. It can be a fine line.

as pertinent. In guiding the Galway juniors to National League, Connacht and All-Ireland success in 2003, Finn left little to chance. It was the same in 2004, when he coaxed the same team to annex the All-Ireland intermediate outfit to their tidy collection of silver-

Although Finn, having also took charge of the seniors in 2004, was unable to deliver with that team in the top tier - they were defeated by Cork in the semi-final - he did return to the intermediate set-up in the Summer of 2009 to, once again, inspire them to yet another All-Ireland crown.

Yet, what prompted him to return to the fold after an absence of five years? "It was kind of funny. When the U-16s won (the All-Ireland) last year, I met Ann Kearney (Camogie Board Secretary) and she asked me would I be interested in going back.

"This was May - the intermediate manager (Gerry Flannery) had stood down - and we were out in June, so we had exactly 28 days before we played our first championship match against Clare. So, we had to get the players together," recalls the affable bookmaker.

After assembling a management team of trainer Basil Larkin and selectors Helena Huban of Kinvara, U-16 manager Johnny Kane and Killimordaly's Kevin Kelly, Finn and company began to construct a squad of

substance and in the group stages his charges accounted for Clare, a strong Wexford side, and a fancied Derry outfit, before taking Tipperary apart in the semifinal. This set up an All-Ireland final meeting with championship favourites Cork. While it took Galway time to

settle to the task in hand in the decider, they did hold a threepoint lead as the contest entered injury-time. However, Cork - as Cork do - then hit the Westerners for a goal to earn a 2-9 to 0-15 draw, and force a

To be denied the victory in such a fashion, one would have thought that the psychological edge would have been with Cork heading into the replay. Finn and company had other ideas, deciding to "freshen up" their preparations through the acquisition of former Waterford and LIT senior hurling coach, Bertie Sherlock, who has subsequently taken over as team trainer of the senior team this year. It proved a masterstroke.

"I have great admiration for his training, his ball drills and his awareness," says Finn. "He is very, very professional. He wants it done right and he is a perfectionist really. As he says, himself, if you train for an hour, then it should be quality for the hour. Anyone who has come and seen him training, and the girls themselves, they are all very impressed with him."

True to their character, the Galway women - who felt they had left it behind them first day out and desperately want to atone - returned to the battle with plenty of fighting spirit. A goal by Laura Mitchell in the first half lay the foundation, with further majors from Caroline Murray and Aoife Lynskey sealing the 3-10 to 1-5 victory. It capped a fine year for Galway camogie, given the county had already claimed the All-Ireland U-16 title earlier in the year.

Still, the senior title has continually eluded them, and after former Galway captain Liam Donoghue stood down from the

managerial post, Finn decided to throw his name into the hat and he was duly appointed to the position late last year.

Now, with his restructured management team of Sherlock, Larkin, Huban and former Galway hurler Noel Power (Tommie Larkins), he hopes Galway senior camogie can put behind it the heartbreaks and disappointments of recent years, particularly their All-Ireland final loss to Cork in 2008 and a heartbreaking semi-final defeat to

Kilkenny last year.

"It is a new year, a new management and a new beginning," says Finn. "I just think let the last two years be forgotten about, and let's move on. It is fresh ideas we need now. We need to look to the future, rather than looking back. The players are there in Galway to win an All-Ireland senior, but saying that we need to take it just one step at a

"We will start off with the league and try to build momen-

tum there. If we can, we will try to win the league, because winning builds confidence. I know they have suffered heartbreak the last couple of years, but they just need to forget about that and move on. This is a new year."

Firmly believing his charges can bounce back, he has nothing but praise for their early season dedication. "We are very happy with them. Their commitment and effort is super. Training is going very well and we couldn't be happier. They want to win an All-Ireland and, hopefully, we will do that this year. However, there is a long journey ahead of

In the group stages of the National League, Galway will face Clare, Wexford and Dublin, with the top two in the group qualifying for the semi-finals. That should be well within Galway's capacity and, after that, who knows?

The All-Ireland series, meanwhile, has reverted to the system where every senior team will play each other in the roundrobin stages. "We have a tough schedule in the championship," continues Finn. "We are out six Saturdays, one after the other, starting on June 12. We have no break. It is going to be tough on the girls in fairness. If you get injuries, you haven't a lot of time to prepare them for the following Saturday."

Indeed. Consequently, it may be then that Finn's courtship of Lady Luck may need to recommence.
