

Dynamic New Secretary for Camogie Association

It would not be strictly correct to describe Seamus MacGiolla Fhinnean, who is the new General Secretary of the Camogie Association, as a man in a woman's world. Men have contributed over the years to the advancement of the national womens' game, and many are still actively involved in the sport.

But MacGiolia Fhinnean is the first man to fill this vitally important administration post in the Camogie Association's long history. He came to his new position after a spell with Conradh na Gaelige as a Timirie Ogras engaged in the task of setting up youth clubs that conduct their affairs through Irish all over the north.

Seamus knows the north well. He was born in Leitrim, in County Down, and attended the New University of Ulster at Coleraine. It was there that he became involved in camogie at national level by preparing the UUU teams for the Ashbourne Cup, the Universities' senior camogie championship.

The new General Secretary is a native Irish speaker, and is convinced that the Irish language can play a vital role in camogie. One of the best features of camogie he has found since he took up his post is the spirit of co-operation and helpfulness to be found among players and officials throughout the country.

The man who is now chief executive of an organisation that has 60,000 members, tells me he has two main aims for the short-term. One is the promotion of camogie in the schools, and the other the development of Gradam Tailte competition, which was launched only last year.

"Although camogle is making steady progress in the schools, some counties still have no primary schools leagues. I would like to see primary and secondary schools leagues in all counties, as these are invaluable in paving the way for the game's development at senior club and inter-county level", says the new official.

MacGiolla Fhinnean also stresses that he is prepared to visit counties and do what he can to help advance the cause of schools' leagues.

Gradam Tailte is a day of sporting competition involving the camogie player of the year from each county.

The main aims of the competition are to provide a 32-county individual awards scheme for players, to promote the game generally and to attract greater publicity for camogie.

The competition is decided on a points system over seven disciplines, or exercises, and the initial event last May was a big success.

The General Secretary is enthusiastic about the potential Gradam Tailte has for the promotion of camogie.

"The event helps to generate new interest in the game, and gives greater recognition to individual players and their skills. The indications already are that this year's promotion, fixed for

June 11, will be even more successful than the initial presentation".

There will be a stronger emphasis this year than last in Gradam Tailte on camogie skills. Two of the disciplines, as compared with one last year, will feature camogie skills, and both will be compulsory.

The County Down native was only days in his new post when he was involved with another new event in the camogie calendar — the first ever National Camogie Day. That was back in October, and MacGiolla Phinnean has analysed in the meantime the impact the inaugural event had on the sport. He expressed encouragement from his findings.

"I visited many counties in the weeks following National Camogie Day, and I found great enthusiasm for the promotion. In a number of counties the day was a festival event, much on the lines of hurling's national Feile na nGael festival for youth.

"I can see National Camogie Day becoming one of the best events in the camogie calendar".



On the inter-county fixtures scene, there are many who argue that the open drawn championship for the All Ireland title drags out over too long a period each year, and leaves too long a break between some games. The opening matches this year will be in early June, but the final will not be until mid-September.

I raised this point with the General Secretary. He had a ready answer:

"I agree that at times teams can be faced with long delays between games, but our system enables followers to see the maximum number of matches possible each season. I think this is a good thing".

Attendances at the All Ireland senior finals for some years past have been down very much on the crowds that flocked to the deciders of the sixties and early seventies. This has led in some quarters to calls for playing the finals at venues outside of headquarters.

MacGiolla Fhinnean has not much sympathy for such calls.

The County Down native was only other venue. Then, while attendances have been down of late on earlier finals, there still remains a great atmosphere at our deciders".

I asked the new official if he had any views as to steps needed to boost attendances.

"It is difficult to say, but I believe that the main thrust in this regard must come from the counties themselves, and the senior and junior finalists in particular.

"Three special buses travelled from Down for last year's senior and junior finals, even though the county was not represented in either game.

"I think then that the counties in general, and the finalists in particular could do much to encourage school players to travel on All Ireland day, especially as special concessions are available for school teams".

Seamus MacGiolla Fhinnean is enjoying the challenge of his new job as Camogie's Ganeral Secretary. He is a young man with flair, vision and the dedication necessary to put plans and blueprints into the type of action to ensure that the Camogie Association makes even more spectacular progress. So, this new era that has opened up for the organistation with the new appointment is one of promise and excitement.

"TWO all-Ireland tickets are the only perks attached to my job", smiles Camogie Board President, Mary Fennelly.

Installed in office in March for a three year term, Mary found the going very tough at first. Along with familiarising herself with the new role, she was also forced to fill the gap when Jo Golden, general secretary, decided to return to teaching when her contract expired.

And despite plenty of notice from the Association's girl Friday, the inevitable delay in filling the post heaped a huge second helping of

work onto Mary's plate. Basically the President's work involves chairing Central Council meetings, representing the Association at functions and attending games. And added to this in the busiest months of August and September was all the administrative work of the Camogie Board, normally the task of the general secretary. In spite of the tough start, she has plenty to look forward to. For the highlight of her term of office will be the G.A.A. centenary year in 1984, when she will join with G.A.A. President, Kilkennyman Paddy Buggy, in celebrating 100 glorious years of Gaelic sport.

Nursery school

A nursery school for her work was Mary's six-year service as secretary of Kilkenny Co. Board. But she admits she found it a "very big step" from county secretary to national President – her only previous experience of the big time was serving as a national subcommittee member.

As far as the Presidency is concerned, behind every good woman is another good woman. This was Jo Golden, who was responsible for making the Association develop camogie in line with other sports, mindful of the competition from other sports which were siphoning off players. Her crusading campaign to organise, glamorise and publicise camogie is now firmly in Mary Fennelly's hands and is a responsibility she takes very seriously.

"The sporting world is a very

competitive market", she commented. "And we have to sell our ideas and traditions if we are to survive. This year our main projects are a Superstars competition, in Dublin for county camogie players, and a National Camogie Day on October 10".

The present image of the game, Mary feels, will neither attract nor even hold young players. But she is confident the Association will get that vital breath of life from the Jo Golden inspired development play

which includes administration, coaching, finances, facilities, running of competitions and publicity.

She is delighted as far as the standard of play is concerned. interests so far between her home county and her national position? "Well, I resigned my position as county secretary when I was elected President as I thought it impossible theoretically to hold both posts", the pretty Stoneyford lady replied. "Where there is any issue involving any counties, including Kilkenny, I have to be broadminded and look at all sides of the story. But, of course, I can never forget my roots". This year has meant a lof of adjustment for Mary, three times all-Ireland medal winner and now in her mid-thirties. Along with her daunting new Presidential role, certainly no mere figurehead position, She also changed jobs. From secretary to a firm of architects in Dublin, she is now a secretary in Callan Wood Ltd., formerly Avonree buildings, and now producing a new type of fuel from waste sawdust.

She has little spare time. I met her in the Clubhouse hotel on a Thursday night, after a week of helping to recruit new staff for her new employers, and spending her nights catching up on camogie administration. Despite getting a bit of golf to relax, she was obviously feeling the pinch. But speaking of the game, its present state and its future, the jaded expression was gradually replaced by an intensely happy one.

"Often I get frustrated with the circus of meetings and functions", she admitted. "But when I see young girls enjoying themselves out on the field it makes it all worthwhile".

THE HOBBY OF **ALIFETIME FOR 10**

GETTING to know someone in every corner of Ireland was one of the happy spin-offs of Kilkenny-born Jo Golden's seven years as general secretary of the National Camogie Association.

One of the drawbacks was constant fixtures, meetings and functions to attend, making her timetable too cluttered to fit in with the regular bachelor girl's lifestyle.

For the first five years as secretary, she fitted in the enormous amount of work after her daytime job as teacher in the all-Irish Scoil Mhuire in Dublin.

A Department of Education grant enabled the Association to appoint a full-time officer in 1980. Jo got the nod after she was given two years' leave of absence from her teaching post.

The post was that of general secretary cum development officer. The secretaryship entailed arranging the over 100 inter-county fixtures throughout the year, arranging meetings, sending out notices, and a huge volume of other

Jo approached her new task of Development Officer very methodically. She drew up a very pragmatic development scheme which outlined short range and long-term

Getting the grant for a full-time officer was

considered a major breakthrough for Camogie, the Cinderella of most sports. An office was also provided in Croke Park as a permanent base for the Association.

There was also an additional £5,000 grant from Cospóir to promote the game. This enabled the Board to run various publicity-seeking events, notably this year's National Camogie Day.

EFFICIENT

Publicity was one of the major priorities for the efficient secretary. At first it was a case of begging for space in the daily newspapers. Jo is happy to report that rather than her hounding the press each week, she now gets regular phone calls from reporters. This is giving increasing recognition to the sport and some of its fine players.

Another of. her priorities was to promote the game at primary school level. It was felt if the sport became rooted at this level, people would carry on playing during secondary school and into their working life.

Another of her aims was to organise the fundraising better as camogie has not the attendance levels that are the major source of income for hurling. Her efforts raised a considerable sum, and she is remaining on as a member of the central finance committee.

The game itself has

developed immensely throughoutt the country. For many years camogie was confined to a few strong counties - Cork, Kilkenny, Wexford and Dublin - but up and coming counties have made their presence felt.

"There are now 11 counties with only a puck of the ball between them", asserted exsecretary Jo. "And not only that, but the game has become much tougher and it is only a matter of time before the pitch is extended to the full length of the hurling field".

DISAPPOINTING

A disappointment to her is the small number of members who support the All-Ireland camogie final in Croke Park. After football and hurling finals, camogie is the fourth final in a row and most people have little money to spare for yet another trip to Dublin.

But it's a vicious circle. R.T.E. will not give live coverage of the event until there are up to 20,000 people present at the final!

Jo has worked hand-inhand with Mary Fennelly, another Kilkenny woman and now President of the Camogie Association.

"I couldn't praise Mary high enough", she says. "She has all the right ideas, has ability and energy, is a great mixer and projects a great image for the Association".

Jo maintains a keen interest in her native county. She played with Kilkenny, but it was before their glory days.

Self-pronounced as being able to hurl before she could walk, she captained St. Paul's camogie team in Kilkenny city. She also won camogie honours with U.C.D. and won Gael Linn medals. A native of Dominic street, her teacher-mother and seven generations Kilkenny, Mary O'Sullivan still lives there. Jo is now a maths

A source of great pride to her is how the game has caught on in Kilkenny. The number of clubs has jumped from five in the late 'Sixtles to 20 this year, and there are 16 teams taking part in the recently-formed primary schools' competition.

Still very much involved in the game, Jo is serving on finance, history and administrative subcommittees. And an involvement that started from when she could walk is likely to extend to a lifelong commitment.

CHAMPIONS UPSTAGED BY CORK

THE HURLERS may have had the championship all their own way, but there was little joy for the ladies who had to swallow the bitter pill of defeat inflicted by Cork in the camogie championship semi-final replay.

After an amazing rally to earn a 1-14 to 3-8 draw, Kilkenny's exit in the replay was very disappointing, especially when a gruelling 20 minutes of extra time gave the girls a third chance to

But the tougher and fitter Leesiders stole the show by 7-8 to 3-13 and went on to become All-Ireland champions, beating Dublin in the

Kilkenny's exit from the championship, having earlier disposed of Clare in the quarter-final, did not constitute a severe blow to camogie in the county, as the hurling win permeated the ladies' ranks and created greater interest in the game. Also, the national Camogie Association made a greater drive than ever to uplift the image of the game and make it more attractive and to recruit more players.

The first national camogie day on October 10 proved an immense success. Seven-a-side tournaments

organised in St. Kieran's College and the day's activities were rounded off with an enjoyable social, Oiche Gaelach, in the Village Club.

TURNOVER OF PLAYERS

This year saw a good turnover of players on the county team. Two familiar faces missing were replayers Helena McCormick - now mumto-be - and Peggy Muldowney, both of whom made an immense contribution to camogie throughout their careers.

Exciting new additions to the panel were Rita Wemyss (Bennettsbridge) and Chrissy Walsh (The Rower - Inistioge). Rita held her place throughout the semi-final replay, and fittingly for her first full game for the county, played cautiously and made no mistakes.

Chrissy Walsh came on towards the end of the game and was very courageous outfield. If she maintains this standard of play, she should earn her place on the team next year.

Again to the forefront of camogie this year were the Downey sisters, Angela and Ann. Defender Ann made a marvellous contribution to the 1982 campaign and looked the most improved player on the

Meanwhile, Angela continued in high-scoring fashion while Bridie McGarry gave some fine displays of really stylish hurling. Ann Holden was the pick of the bunch in the semi-final replay.

Former double All-Ireland winner Mary Canavan also made a return to the county camogie panel this year, but her experience was not availed of during the championship.

DISAPPOINTED

Although Kilkenny were bitterly disappointed by their performance this year, the emergence of Cork as champions was good for the game on a national level. The Noresiders proved the bogie for Cork in the sides' five meetings before the drawn semifinal and morale in Cork was beginning to flag.

Another unlucky loss might have been a serious setback for the game in Cork, a county which boasts the greatest number of clubs and players and where the sport is most organised.

As for Kilkenny, with the existing hard core of young and extremely talented players and new "finds" every year, the black and ambers could claim their fifth All-Ireland title next year.

A GOOD YEAR FOR CAMOGIE

Tá Máire Ní Fhionnalaigh tar éis blian go leith a chaitheamh mar uachtarán ar Cumann Camogaíochta na nGael. Is, oiriúnach an t-am é anois iarraidh uirthi céard a thuairim faoin chumann anois, agus faoin fhorbairt atá ag leanadh ar aghaidh.

First of all, Mary outlined her aims on assuming office in 1981. Firstly, she wished to see Camogie in every parish in the country; secondly, she hoped for an elevation of the status of the game in the public eye, to be achieved by greater publicity - the public are not generally aware that our association is the largest women's sporting organisation in the country, with a membership of 60,000. Thirdly, an improvement in the quality of administration is necessary - an elimination of the informal approach all too common at especially club level, where success is left to hinge on the goodwill of all, rather than resulting also from a planned approach to activities. A greater attendance at the existing administration courses could play a large part in this improvement. Higher levels of coaching right down to club level are needed to ensure proper playing of the game at every level. In fact, many would see a more systematic approach to both admin-



istration and coaching as being the key factor in the attraction of young players to the game — and the potential has never been as great as in this age of increasing leisure time and increased parteipation by women in sport.

The establishment of a full time post, that of development officer, for the first time two years ago, the President considers to be a milestone in the progress of the Association. Joe Golden filled the post for the first two years. On her return to the teaching profession this Autumn, Seamus Mac Giolla Fhinnein, a county Down man, shouldered the challenge. This post, as well as making the task of organising and development a priority, has formalised a long co-existence with the G.A.A. - the office of the Development Officer is at G.A.A. headquarters in Corke Park. It has also, thus, given the Camogie Association a geographical base. The Development grant from the Department of Education has facilitated the financing of the post.

Prior to her acting as Uachtarán, Mary Fennelly was a supporter of the role of neutral venues for All-Ireland semi-finals at club and intercounty level. The practice for all had been a home venue for one team based on the luck of the draw. Now more actively involved in the arrangements for such venues, Mary feels that the proposition will not be really practical until camogic is well established in every part of the country — at present the Club Championship is played on this basis and poses great problems for organisers. On the question of choice of venues for the All-Ireland Camogic Finals, Senior and Junior, many suggest that a venue half-way between the participating counties would help increase the low attendances — for example Thurles for a Cork Kilkenny Final. Mary concedes that this might increase attendances, but feels that the first consideration must be the players, for whom there is nothing to equal Croke Park


A major concern of the President is what she sees as an increasing roughness in the game at senior intercounty level — she wonders whether an extended pitch might not be the solution, possibly playing the full hurling pitch instead of the present 120×75 yards. The consequent creation of space would allow more open play. A trial year, maybe 1984, the year of the G.A.A. Centenary, when the Senior Championship could be played on the full pitch, would help answer the question.

An event which each year provided almost 2,000 under-14 players with what will be for many the sporting experience of their lives is Feile na nGael. As always, the Division I Camogie Final was a thriller with Marino from Dublin making it two in a row when they pipped Cork representatives, St. Finbarr's, in the closing stages — a sweet victory on home territory. To me, the suprising feature of the Dublin Féile was the fact that not all Camogie playing counties could be accommodated; clubs with under 12 and under 13 teams who may not have an under-14 squad as such must be encouraged to participate — for the hosts as much as the visitors have such a lot to achieve and enjoy from participating.

I will conclude with a brief review of one of the novel developments of this past year. Thanks to the enthusiasm and hard work of the National Director at the time, Joe Golden, the Association introduced on May 30th "Gradam Tailte". This is a "Superstars" type competition where one top Camogie player from each county takes part in a series of athletic, camogie skills and novelty events. Gradam Tailte, which took place in St. Patrick's Training College in Drumcondra, produced some excellent competition, excitement and entertainment. At the end of the day, Antrim representative Josephine McClements came out on top. This competition, supported by Cospoir, is to become an annual event in the Camogie Calendar, and is surely among the most innovative and successful ventures undertaken by Cummann Camogaiochta na



It is not often that any player lines out at full back in an All-Ireland senior final, icores two goals to ensure the team of a draw, and then captains the side to success in the replay. That rare achievement was carved out by Liz

Neary, of Kilkenny, in camogie in

1981.

Liz has been one of the game's outstanding defenders in recent years, and she was at full back as Kilkenny lined up to challenge Cork at Croke Park for the 1981 title. The Noresiders trailed by six points with only eight minutes of the final remaining, and in changes made by officials at that stage, Miss Neary was switched to full forward.

Within a minute she had grabbed a goal, and as the game came to a close she was again on the target to score another goal and so do much to earn Kilkenny a well-merited draw. Liz Neary was back at full back for the replay, and her quality play in that role and her leadership as captain made her a bright star of a memorable win for Kilkenny.

Liz was a member of the Kilkenny side that ended an era in senior camogie by beating Dublin in a Leinster senior championship tie at Parnell Park, Dublin in 1968. That 2-3 to 1-3 win by Kilkenny earned them the proud distinction of being the first team to beat Dublin in the provincial championship in 32 years. Despite that great breakthrough, Kilkenny had to wait for a couple of seasons more for an All-Ireland final appearance, as they lost in the 1968 provincial decider to Wexford by a surprisingly big margin 1-3 to 8-3.

On the club scene she was a bright star in a great era for St. Paul's, Kilkenny, between 1968 and 1977, during which the Noresiders won six All-Ireland crowns.

When Kilkenny took the All-Ireland senior inter-county title for the first time in 1974 by beating Cork in a wonderful replay, Liz Neary was a commanding figure at half back. She was also in the county's remaining O'Duffy Cup (All-Ireland title) winning teams of 1976, 1977 and 1981.

In addition she has got among the National League medals with Kilkenny, and has helped Leinster as well to the interprovincial championship for the Gael-Linn Cup.

After her great contribution to the last title win by Kilkenny, Liz Neary received a further tribute to her tremendous skills and consistent play with her selection as the B + I Camogie Star of the Year for 1981.


She became the fourth Kilkenny player to collect that trophy. Helena O'Neill, a brilliant star of the county's drawn game with Cork in the 1974 final, was the first honoured. Bridie Martin brought the title back to Kilkenny in 1976, and Angela Downey was the winner in 1977.

Subsequently, she collected another honour with selection as the Camogie award winner in the Kilkenny Sports Stars of 1981.

All in all, then, a memorable campaign for Liz Neary, and one that provided further evidence that she must rank as one of the outstanding performers in the history of the game.

FROM CROKE PARK TO BANGLADESH





PAT LENIHAN who last September captained Cork to a memorable All-Ireland victory over Dublin is this morning on the last leg of a long journey to Bangladesh.

With her husband, Eamonn, Pat has opted to work as a Concern relief volunteer for two years in one of the most povertystricken countries in the world.

Into a country less than twice the size of Ireland, 90 million people are crammed, the overwhelming majority of whom struggle from day to day to keep alive.

Bangladesh regularly suffers from famines, its infant mortality is among the highest in the world, it is without any social welfare systems and even at their best the State's health and educational services cannot cope with the enormity of the country's problems.

Only volunteer workers stand between millions of Bangladeshi and hunger, disease and death

Pat, a qualified social worker, will be running work programmes for women in Dacca, the capital of Bangladesh.

Concern sees organisation of craft industries which generate small but critical incomes for the women of the country as a crucial element in relief and development strategy. Pat expects a few hundred women to be involved in the work programmes to be organised by her.

Eamonn, who is a BA, H Dip Ed graduate of UCC, will work as an administrative assistant to Limerick-born Fr. Jack Finucane who leads the Concern

effort in the country.

Volunteer work in the
Third World has been something about which Pat Lenihan has thought since

she was at school.
"I went through the
usual tentative enquiries
which many people go through but put it to one side. I think I always found excuses to stay at home. However, when I discovered that Eamonn was

also interested in this type of work, then I began to think in earnest about going and I'm glad that we have been given the opportunity.

The Linehans' motivation is a desire to help, to use their skills for the benefit of those who need help at its most basic.

"We are not under any illusions about the extent of the problems there or of the deprivation which will face us. We have spoken to a number of people who have already worked there and have been briefed by Concern, obviously. Still, I expect that any briefing will not prepare us totally for what the country and the deprivation is like," Pat says.

Despite the difficulties which are ahead Pat is anxious to get there and to start work. She expects the experiences of the months ahead to be tough, yet personally developing and fulfilling.

She leaves behind a sports career which places her among the greatest first senior All-Ireland medals and one senior All-Ireland club medal which she won with Killeagh, trained by husband Eamonn in recent years.

Her greatest personal riumph came in last triumph came September's All-Ireland final against Dublin when she captained the Cork team in an inspirational fashion. In that game Pat had to go off with a severe leg injury in the first half, but she re returned and prompted Cork to a fantastic last-minute victory.

Pat accepts that she has played her last game for Cork, but hopes to resume playing at club level when she returns from Bangladesh in two years time. She admits that she will miss the sporting scene and her friends in camogie.

"Camogie is a marvellous game but suffers from a lack of development. A proper marketing job needs to be done by someone to really get the game to the stage of development it should be at. We get a lot of support from the GAA, but I think that the Camogie Board and the GAA should be able to achieve more publicity for the game than is the case at present.

"I would really like to see major camogie games being played prior to senior championship hurling or football games. The crowds and the atmosphere w give a new dimension to the game and help us reach many thousands of people who would never otherwise see a camogie match.

Perhaps, when she re-turns, some of what she hopes for the game will have happened. In the meantime her thoughts and energies will be spent on more serious, vastly different, matters.

Bigger pitch and 15 players-that's Kilkenny motion!

THE CAMOGIE delegates from all over the country congregate at the Old Ground Hotel, Ennis, this weekend for the Annual Congress. The business will begin tomorrow at 10 a.m. and continue until 6 p.m., and on Sunday there will be an 11.00 a.m. start.

The Congress papers inciude reports from all units of the Association and they are an indication of the amount of work being done for Camogie at national, provincial, county, club and college level.

The various sub-committees who work for improved administration, qualifications in coaching competence in refereeing, compiling the historical background of the Association are all giving an excellent service as is apparent from their separate reports.

FIRST REPORT

The Association's new General Secretary and Deveyopment Officer Seamus Mac Gilla Fhinnein presents his first report to the Congress. He commends highly the work done by his predecessor, Seosaimhin Nic Unildriegh, who was the General Secretary for seven years and the Development officer for two years.

In his opinion, Inion Nic Ualdrick's contribution is not only apparent in administration but also in the work she put into organising so many new competitions during her time as Secretary,

Referring to Gradam Taiste and National Camogie Day, the new Secretary holds that both projects have great potential for thepromotion of the game.

From his short experience he pinpoints a number of areas in which improvement is required. He considers that communication at all levels is vitally important and that every secretary, either club, county or provincial should deal with correspondence promptly and should be particular about deadlines.

WANT STAR AWARDS

There are some very interesting motions included. Armagh propose that 'Ard Chomhairle institute All-Star Awards as in football and hurling on a sponsorship basis if possible, with an annual All-Star versus senior championship fixture." Kilkenny come up with the proposal to change the size of the pitch to that of a hurling pitch and to increase the number of players from 12 to 15.

This suggested change would make it very easy for counties to make the field arrangements for a game but I doubt that it would suit the smaller clubs and achools.

Monaghan puts forward new proposals for representation at Congress. At present, a county requires fifteen clubs to increase representation from one delegate to two.

This motion suggests that every County Board should have two delegates for the first twenty clubs. That would mean that a County with three clubs has the same representation as a county with twenty. Looking at the current affiliations it could increase the number of delegates at Congress by twenty.

SUGGEST NEW TESTS

Galway have proposed two new inter-county competitions — one for under 14 and one for under 18 players. Many counties are perturbed at the expense of the present number of competitons and administrators find it hard to fit them in, so discussions on these may present opposite views.

Clare's motion that, "All officer of provincial and Central Councils, together with various committee members, serve only three consecutive years, excluding the General Secretary."

This obtains at present for the president of Ard Choiste and the presidents of the four provincial councils, It will be interesting to hear Clare's views and reasons for change. It could be that they think some officers are there too long.

Indeed, of the thirty one motions tabled only two were passed.

All the officers and delegates were loud in their appreciation of the manner in which the congress was hosted by the Clare camogie board who spared no effort in presentation and entertainment.

Congress decided to delay the opening date of the National League in future bringing the opening from February to March.

CRITICAL OF COVERAGE

In a hard-hitting address, National President, Mary Fennelly was critical of RTE and the national media for its poor coverage afforded its activities.

She said she was at a loss to understand as to why our national television network was reluctant to screen camogie games while less popular sports got greater prominence and publicity. She pointed out that the Camogie Association was Irelands largest womens sports organisation.

Miss Fennelly called for greater efficiency and organisation at all levels within the association pinpointing areas such as fixtures, finance, coaching and refereeing as needing special attention. The president paid tribute to the schools and colleges for promoting camogic over the years and said that without doubt they were the life and blood of the association. She highlighted the wonderful work being done by Feile na nGael and Community Games.

IT'S BEEN A THRIVING TWENTY-FIVE YEARS!

THE Camogie Association, happy with its own achievements over the past twenty-five years, is glad to have been associated with GAELIC SPORT who, this month, celebrate their 25th Anniversary.

While congratulating the magazine on its success over the years, camogie followers may well be very grateful for the coverage given to the games and affairs of the Association for many of those twenty-five years in the pages of GAELIC SPORT.

In 1958 there was only one All-Ireland competition which comprised two semi-finals between the winners of the four Provincial Championships and the final. Only three counties had succeeded in winning All-Ireland titles by that year, Dublin 17, Cork 6 and Antrim 4 but many other counties had the satisfaction of being runners-up.

These included Galway, Louth, Down and Derry, all of whom have since attained All-Ireland honours in Junior ranks in that competition, which was inaugurated in 1968. The other counties who reached All-Ireland finals were Waterford (1945) and Tipperary (1949, '53, '58).

The setting up of the Provincial Councils in Colleges competitions was encourged by Ard-Choiste around this time also and it is the opinion of most that the upsurge of those playing the game has stemmed from the inauguration of Schools' competitions.

The Association celebrated its fifteth anniversary just four years earlier when to mark the occasion an atterprovincial competition was naugurated. Gael-Linn presented a cup the following year and the

competition has been the source of some fine games in the meantime, with the stars of the four provinces taking part.

Ten years later to mark the sixtieth anniversary year the All-Ireland Club Championship came into being, a very coveted title and it is thus to this day.

Celtic Dublin were the winners in the Jubilee Year while the cup donated the following year has gone to St. Pauls, Kilkenny (5 times), Naomh Padraig, Tipperary (2), Eoghan Ruadh, Dublin (1), Austin Stacks, Dublin (2), Oranmore, Galway (1), Croagh, Kilfinny and Ballyagram, Limerick (1 each), Buffers Alley, Wexford the current holders (3), Killiagh, Cork (1) and Athenry, Galway (1).

The attendances at the finals of this competition has always been good, consequently a moral to an increase

in our All-Ireland finals attendance must be hidden there somewhere.

In 1968, Ard-Choiste set upan All-Ireland Primary Schools Council and immediately All-Ireland Senior and Junior Competitions were inaugurated.

These competitions have gone from strength to strength although I find it hard to accept how a school which attained the highest honour, an All-Ireland title for the school, can allow the game to be lost. Let's hope that those who no longer promote the game will return to the fold.

In these times it takes a lot of hard work and dedication to keep pace with all that is available to the students but the national game of camogic should not be neglected.

In 1972 Ard-Choiste came to the fore once again and initiated the Higher Institutes Council and incorporated into this Council the Ashbourne Intervarsity Competition which was inaugurated fifty-seven years previously (in 1915). This Council now organises competitions, the Ashbourne Cup (Universities), the Purcell Cup (Colleges), the League (for both universities and colleges) to Freshers Competition (a one day 7-a-side) and a Combined Match (Universities v Colleges). Bridin Ui Mhaolagáin presented a magnificent cup for this annual match while she was President.

In 1974 the Minor All-Ireland Championship was inaugurated and Down became the first winners. Since then this competition has become part of the Willwood Tailteann Festival and each year gold and silver

medals bearing the image of Queen Failte are presented to the winners and runners-up.

1975 was the end of an era when Sighle Nic Anultaigh, who had been the Association's Secretary, a position she took on after serving four years as Uachtarán, for twentyone years, retired. Sighle has seen all this advancement already referred to during her term of office and the Association is much indebted to her for her foresight and dedication.

Coaching became a part of the Association's programme in the 'seventies. The National Coaches, Mary Moranand Anne Carroll, came up with a three year plan.

Coaches are now available to clubs and schools, they have Grade C qualifications, a number of Grade B coaches, who are deemed to have the qualifications to coach intercounty teams, are also available.

Two more top coaches in Grade A, Rosina McManus and Paddy Maher, have come up to help the National Coaches.

Anne Carroll and Mary Moran have published a Coaching Book which has proved most beneficial and Mary has recently published a followup, which deals with improving skills.

The inauguration of the Senior National League in 1977 gave the weaker counties an opportunity to gain experience from their games with top teams.

Tipperary (1), Wexford (1), Dublin (2) and Kilkenny (2), have been victorious in this competition for which A.I.B. presented a silver cup and each year donate beautiful Connemara Marble plaques for the winners.

In 1980 the Junior National League was introduced and this has had a tremendous effect on the promotion of the game in the weaker counties. The greatest of all advancements for the association was their acceptance by the Department of Education to provide a Development Officer for camogie. In 1980, Seosaimhin Nic Uaildrich, who had been Honorary General Secretary since the retirement of Sighie Nic Anultaigh, became the association's first full-time officer and was given an office in Páirc an Chrócaigh by Cumann Lútheleas

The effect of this step soon began to show and much progress was made in the following two years.

A development plan drawn up by Miss Golden has been implemented or partly implemented with good results in many counties. The setting up of a headquarters for camogic at Croke Park has proved most beneficial.

This plan is being followed up by Séamus Mac Giolla Fhinnéinsince he succeeded Miss Golden as Development Officer when she completed her two years leave of absence from the teaching profession last September.

It's been a triving twenty-five years both for camogie and the magazine and let's hope that GAELIC SPORT will continue to flourish and that camogie will be part of their continuing success story.

CAMOGIE COMMENT

T HE inauguration of the Junior National League three years ago has been one of the most important promotions in recent years. No less than twenty-seven counties participated in 1982.

Up to 1979 many counties only got one inter-county game, as half the counties in each province got knocked out in the first round of the championship.

The timing of the competition has also contributed to the success of the venture as the teams and administrators inside the counties have to put their affairs in order to meet the financial costs which are the one burden in the competition.

The standard in the Junior counties has risen considerably. The success of Louth in last season's All-Ireland Junior Final is positive proof of this. The wee county worked hard in their junior league games for the past three years and attribute their first All-Ireland victory, after fifty years of trying, to the experience and competition they gained in the Junior League.

Cavan, the previous year's League winners, also had the pleasure of bringing home their first National Camogic title.

Gradam Tailte, another innovation in 1982, is to be continued in 1983. The aims of this competition

are to implement a 32 county awards scheme for players, to promote Camogaiocht, to attract greater publicity at National and local levels and to raise finances for Ard Chomhairle.

The competition will be run on the same lines as last season when the thirty-two counties each elected a representative from their first panel of players to go forward to select the All-Ireland star.

Josie McClements from Antrim became the first winner and was presented with a Queen Tailte Statuette, sponsored by O'Neills International Sports.

Cospóir Camogie Day held last October was also highly successful. Most counties organised a programme which involved all members of the Clubs and their families and many past members also. It is hoped to continue this project in 1983 also.

The Camogie Calendar has now become so crowded, there are not enough Sundays to fit in all the competitions.

The new season on the playing fields starts on February 5 with the Junior and Senior National Leagues, the first two Ard Choiste Competitions. The Senior Open Draw Championship begins in June, the Junior and the Willwood Tailteann Minor Championship played out in the provinces at first, have the semi-finals played in July with the Minor Final scheduled for mid-August. The Junior final is played in conjunction with the Senior on September 25.

October is filled up with the Gael Linn Interprovincials, Junior and senior, and the All-Ireland Club semi-finals and Final.

The high standard at County Conventions is a remarkable feature of the past few months.

The Wexford Secretary, Dorothy Walsh, stresses the importance of well-run clubs and in a searching questionnaire must have given the delegates plenty to think about. She also emphasises the importance of promotion in Primary and Post Primary Schools.

Galway, who figured in this season's closing stages of the Junior and Minor All-Ireland Finals, were narrowly beaten in both. The County Secretary, Brid Ui Bhruadair, calls for more commitment and dedication to the training sessions.

Cavan, who have joint secretaries, Philomena Garvan and Brenda Lynch, are, according to the Secretaries report, in a very happy position with progress on all fronts. They won the Ulster Minor title but went down to Galway. Bawnboy Vocational won the All-Ireland Vocational Schools Final and St. Aidan's, Cootehill, won the Ulster First Year's Competition. Templeport won the silver medals in the All-Ireland Community Games competition.

In the Tipperary report, Shiela Delaney, is concerned about the standard at Senior level but with so much talent at Junior and under-age levels this will soon come right.

The game was barely on when Clare Kelleher snatched a marvellous opening goal, and this was quickly followed by two superb majors from Noelle O'Driscoll and a second from Clare Kelleher, to leave Cork in a very commanding lead after ten minutes as Tipperary could only manage two points in this period.

This rampage of scoring completely unnerved the Tipperary girls who had come to Cork with high hopes of winning the Munster crown. It also gave defending champions Cork the kind of boost they had been looking for and which they failed to find all through the National

League.

The history of lootball and hurling is liberally sprinkled by family connections, such as sons following impressively in the footsteps of famous fathers, brothers emulating the achievements of older brothers, and brothers starring together on club and inter-county teams. But a new and possibly unique angle to the family story is provided by the brother and sister combination of Scanie and Mary O'Leary of Cork,

Unique in the sense that it is doubtful if a brother and sister in any past era ever proved so adept and efficient at score-getting and in progressive all round play, and in the same seasons as well to anything like the degree that has marked the performances of the O'Learys in recent times,

This rare family connection was strikingly emphasised in the 1982 senior hurling and camogie championships, Seanie had a regal afternoon as Cork swept to a thirty-one point win over Waterford in the Munster senior hurling final, His expert finishing had much to do in shaping that big win, as he himself accounted for four splendid goals of Cork's tally of 5-31.

That was an outstanding feat by the Youghal club man, A performance in which he blended determination, positional sense that enabled him to be in the right place at the right time to avail of every opportunity, and dynamic finishing that ensured he put the perfect gloss on his efforts by collecting those four match-winning goals.

Later in the year Mary got into the high scoring action in the games that matter. She contributed all but 1-1 of Cork's total as the Leesiders edged to a 2-7 to 2-6 win over Dublin in the All Ireland senior final, Not only that, it was Mary O'Leary who also clinched the title for the Munster county with a magnificent point from a 40 metres free virtually on the final whistle, That title-winning point, of course, brought her record to 1-6.

Nor is this the end of the story, When Munster won the Gael Linn Cup for the interprovincial championship in Dublin, it was a repeat by Mary O'Leary of her All Ireland final title winning efforts, but on an even more handsome stale,

Once again the dynamic Cork forward chalked up the title-winning point, that one also from a free and just three minutes from the end of the game, That score brought her record for the final win over Leinster to a superb 2-8, just four points short of the easterners' tally for the game, Munster won by 3-10 to 2-12.

Small wonder that following those exciting performances, Mary O'Leary was named the B+I Camogie Player of the Year for 1982 a well deserved tribute to a gifted performer who left her imprint on a major double in gaelic games to an extent as well that marked her out as one of the outstanding stars

of the season in any branch of the national codes.

Sean O'Leary's four goal getting exercise against Waterford in the 1982 Munster senior final must rank as one of the best finishing displays of its kind at that stage of the southern test, It only served to strengthen, however, O'Leary's position as one of the best goalgetters in modern hurling, More than that he exhibited this match-winning flair early in his inter-county career by notching 1-1 in the 1969 All Ireland minor final win over Kilkenny.

A year later he was back again at Croke Park to leave his stamp on another under-18 national final win as he cracked home 2-2 in Cork's easy triumph over Galway. Throughout his senior inter-county career as well, O' Leary, a grandson of Tom O'Mahony, who won an All Ireland medal with Cork in 1902, has been finding his way uncannily through to the goal with a regularity that has not been matched by many of his contemporaries,

O'Leary has had a very successful time in hurling. After those minor medal wins he proved a glittering star for Cork at under-21 hurling in an era that saw the county reach great heights with three All Ireland crowns between 1970 and 1973, The Youghal forward played in all three title winning combinations,

O'Leary won his spurs with the county senior team in 1971, and won a couple of National League medals before striking it rich in a big way in the All Ireland senior championship in Cork's run of three titles in succession from 1976 to 1978. His career was interupted between 1977 and 1978 finals, through injury and illness, but atter a tengeny spen on the sideline

he returned to resume his activities with all his old sparkle and purpose,

O'Leary's skills and sporting qualities were rewarded by the All Stars selectors with trophies in 1976 and 1977, He boosted his National League medals take to four in 1981, and he has four Munster senior souvenirs,

But overall, for his years in intercounty hurling from minor, through under-21 to senior, Seanie O'Leary will be best remembered as one of the masters in the most important matchwinning facet of any field game - that of rattling home the goals with clockwork regularity. This is an asset that has made him one of the best matchwinners in the hurling game over the past fourteen seasons or so.

Mary O'Leary has also shown a real flair for consistency in the goal scoring stakes. During her memorable campaign of 1982, for example, she added up the splendid total of seven goals and 39 points - a record to be proud of,

A player adept in all facets of the game, and a tremendous competitor, Mary won an All Ireland junior medal in 1973. She went on to become one of Cork's leading scoring forwards in the senior grade, and in 1978 played her part in great style in completing a national senior medals double for the family. That was the year that Seanie won his third All Ireland senior souvenir in succession.

A member of the Watergrasshill club, Mary followed that first senior medal win by collecting a second in 1980, and then joined her brother in the treble returns with her major role in Cork's 1982 victory over Dublin,

Scanie and Mary O'Leary, then, have a truly remarkable family record - one that puts them in a rare and proud position in the annals of the gaelic games.

In an interview with RUTH O'MAHONY



R.O'M. - Mary, congratulations on your win in the Intercontinental Cup In Kuala Lumpur recently, was this the highlight of your sporting career so far?

M.G. - Winning the final was the fulfilment of a dream for the whole Irish panel - for me it was marvellous. Going out to Malayasia as underdogs. and qualifying for 1986 World Cup made it extra special, putting the thrill even beyond that of gaining my first international "cap" for Ireland.

Where and how did your interest in sport emerge?

I was in boarding school in the Ursuline Convent Blackrock, and in 2nd year the school team was short a goalkeeper, so I had a "go" and I never came out since. Mrs. Joan Dorgan was the coach and she taught me the basics of the game and apart from a few friendly games I have never played out

Your club is Old Ursulines in Cork and you live in Castleisland does that cause you problems?

No, it means a lot of driving, around 150 miles per match, but I'm used to that and I love the game which means more to me than just 70 minutes on a pitch. My whole life revolves around sport

What do the local people think of your achievments?

They are delighted, they take a great interest in the games, and some of the lads train with me and help me in that way. Training alone can be hard, but I'm never short of a helping hand to go running or walking -

Did your family encourage your interest in hockey, the ban would still have been in existance when you started playing?

It made no difference to them once I was involved in sport. At home I played camogle, badminton and a bit of football. I had no problem in that area.

You still play camogie and badminton - does this cause any difficulty?

Fixture clashes do cause problems. Only as recently as last October I had to make a choice between playing for treland in hockey in an international

Have you any All-Ireland medals in camogle?

Yes I have won two All-Irelands in 1979 and 1981 when I had the honour of being captain. With Eire Og I have been a member of the team which won the County championship three times,

I play here in Castleisland with the local club which is a thriving one, about four nights a week. It helps to keep me

Well, my mileage for sport in January, February and March this year worked out about 6500 miles. It is expensive, each weekend costing about £50, but I reckon that it is a great way of life which I love.

What about retirement?

A lot of nonsense is talked about retirement. I do not agree with retiring while at the top. I feel as long as one is enjoying, and after all that is what sport is all about, the game, then continue to play. Certainly, retire, if it becomes a

Could you envisage life without sport?

I could not live without games. My whole social life is built around sport. It has become a way of life to play

What advice would you give a young person facing life to-day?

Most should try to get involved in some game. You must be prepared to get stuck in, not to give up easily, to keep trying to overcome the obstacles that are bound to crop up. Friends made in sport are usully the ones who will rally around in difficult times. Team games help people to make a pile of real friends in many places.

Do you agree with sponsorship in sport for young people?

To an extent, but it is not good to see things come too easy. You must put in financially to appreciate what you get.

What improvements would you like to see in sport in Ireland?

More facilities are needed all over the country to cater for youth. But here at home in Castleisland we are lucky to have good sports facilities and there is no excuse for any youngster not to be



Dublin took the title at Lyrone's expense.

It is interesting to note that three northern counties figured in the final in the three years. Westmeath put an end to Derry's chances this year. Our opponents on the way to the final defeated Galway, Down, Kilkenny, Louth, Wexford and Offaly in the semi-final. They too finished with full points

The years certainly had their disappointments, but oh what marvellous achievements as well. Watching Deirdre in Glen's county win it was obvious that her team mates, one as young as 16, look to her for guidance and assurance and after her birlliant performance - as good as any in her playing career - it is not surprising that she has no intention of retiring.

Love Of Game Keeps Deirdre Going AT A TIME when more and more

women of all ages are taking an interest in sport, Deirdre Coleman (nee Sutton) sets a marvellous

example.

Two weeks ago Deirdre achieved a record which is hard to believe, when she played in goal for Glen Rovers as they won their first Cork Senior County Championship for fifteen years.

In that game Deirdre gave a superb performance and the amazing part of the story is that she not only fielded in the side which won the club's last county, all those years ago, but she also played in their historic seven-in-a-row of titles, which ended with that last one in 1968.

What motivated Deirdre to keep going through all those lean years, after she had already achieved so much? "Sheer love of the game," was Deirdre's answer to that one. She paid tribute to the Glen Club, all its mentors and her playing colleagues who gave such lovalty and encouragement even in the unsuccessful years. She felt that the strength of the club lay in the fact that so many past players are involved long after their playing days are over.

With her 37th birthday coming up in August and asked if she would now consider retirement. Deirdre's answer was "No way" that is as long as she was enjoying playing.

Typical of Deirdre's dedication to the game of camogie which she has graced so magnificently for so many years is the fact that she trained five nights a week for three months prior to the county

Husband John, who played inter-firm soccer for many years,

has been marvellous and Deirdre paid tribute to him when she said that if it had not been for his encouragement, his patience and his baby sitting services when she disappeared almost every evening for training she would not have been able to keep playing.

Deirdre's son, Adrian (15), who by the way was only two weeks old when Deirdre helped Glen win the county final of 1968 is also very proud of his Mum. Adrian's favourite sport is basketball, which he plays with the Neptune Club, but he also turns a hand to hurling and football with the North Monastery and, of course, Glen Rovers.

Deirdre's other sons, Niall (6) and John (21/2) are still too young to be involved in sport, but Niall was at the county final with his father and was really impressed.

What did Deirdre consider her greatest achievement? This, she said, was winning a hat-trick of All-Ireland titles with Cork from 1971 to 1973. Deirdre had opted out of playing for Cork when she married in 1967, and only returned to the inter-county scene in 1970. when she captained the junior side to All-Ireland honours. She regained her position on the Cork senior side the following year and went on to win that coveted threein-a-row. This, she felt was her biggest thrill, as she had experienced the taste of defeat so often with Cork in her earlier years, at a time when Dublin dominated the All-Ireland championship.

After that three-in-a-row Deirdre again decided to opt out of the Cork team, as she felt she could not give her full attention to her family, the county and the club. It was a difficult decision to make.
