Twenty years after the founding of the Gaelic Athletic Association, Irish girls were still without a national game. At this time, the Gaelic League was thriving. The Craobh an Chéitinnigh Branch of the Gaelic League in Dublin included hurling and football in its programme of activities.

Lady members of the Branch complained that there was no Irish game available to them. The Branch Committee took up this challenge and set about inventing a new game based on the ancient game of hurling.

FIRST GAMES

Tadhg O Donnchada suggested the name "Camóguidheacht". Rules were drafted which vary little from the present Official Guide. The first team was composed of members of the Keating Branch. The second team to be formed played under the name of Cuchullains.

Following practices at Drumcondra Park and later in the Phoenix Park, the first camogie match was staged at Navan on 15th July, 1904. The newspapers of the time described the event as a "novelty".

There is no reference to the quality of play in the early games but, it is reasonable to assume, that the standard was not very high. The fact that the players of the day were grown up before taking to the game would account for this. It was not the accepted thing for girls to play games. A field, team-game would have been new to these girls.

LACK OF TECHNIQUE

The style of dress of those early players did not lend itself to athletic activity. Long hobble-skirts frequently tripped up their wearers. Footwear was rather restrictive. Laced or buttoned boots, which often came well up the leg, tended to hamper movement.

The majority of the players confined their efforts to ground camogie. A few used all their energy just to show how far they could puck it. The longer the shot, the more satisfaction the wielder of the caman got from her exertion. Whether the ball landed to the advantage of her team-mates or outside the playing area did not seem to matter.

DEVELOPMENT NATIONALLY

From Dublin the game spread to Dundalk, Cork, Newry, Belfast and other areas. Mayo born Sean O'Duffy, who hurled with Crokes GAA CLub, directed his energies towards promoting the new game. In a lifetime of committed endeavour, his saw the game played in each of the thirty-two counties.

Camogie is a superb game. It embraces a complete range of skills. To master the game, it is essential for a girl to be introduced to it at a tender age. Many, many hours of practice are required to

gain control over the stick and ball. The correct technique must be shown to the new player and guidance from a good coach is necessary as she progresses.

The schools and colleges throughout the country have played a dominant role in fostering the game. Nuns and teachers have made a vast contribution to the raising of standards. Camogie has flourished where the game is well organised in the schools of the area or where there is a strong hurling tradition.

COMPETITION AND STARS

The All-Ireland championship commenced in 1932. In the ensuing years, tremendous matches have been witnessed and outstanding performers have graced the game. Strangely enough, only five counties, Dublin, Cork, Antrim, Kilkenny and Wexford have engraved their names on the O'Duffy Cup, symbol of All-Ireland supremacy.

Honours in the initial decade of intercounty competition were divided between Dublin and Cork Dublin notched the first of their twenty five titles in the opening year of the competition. Many of the Dublin players are remembered with pride. Brid Kenny was the outstanding goalkeeper in that era. Her centre-back Maura Gill doubled as captain of the team and President of the Camogie Association. The late Maire O'Kelly was an artistic player with a devastating shot. Emmy Delaney, Queenie Dunne and Jean Hannon possessed individual brilliance.

DUBLIN AND CORK

Cork bounced on the scene in 1934 and proceeded to win a hat-trick of titles. Lil Kirby, who went on to collect six All-Ireland medals, dominated the centre of the field with her speed and neat striking. Kitty Buckley's delightful stickwork was a treat to watch. Always using her head to assess the best option was Josie McGrath, who later filled the role of Lady Mayoress of Cork.

The 1937 and 1938 Dublin winning sides contained that most colourful of performers, Angela Egan. Her contemporaries place her in the superstar class. Peggy Griffin at centreback was a most accomplished player. Placed at right forward was Agnes Hourigan who devoted her life to the promotion of the game.

SOME OF THE GREATS

Cork returned to take another hat-trick. Peggy Hogg was a mere twelve-year-old when she first stood between the posts for Cork. A goalkeeper of sheer class, Peggy was rarely beaten by the ball. Kathleen Coughlan and Mary Fitzgerald were stouthearted defenders but it was the clever interplay of forwards Kitty Buckley, Renee Fitzgerald and Eileen Casey which made that Cork outfit a winning one.

Kathleen Mills was the best known players of herera. She won the first of her fifteen medals in 1942. She possessed an elegant style of play. She struck

Although Cork were far from their best in the National League final against Dublin, they still did enough to take that coveted title for the first time — and here perhaps lies the secret of Cork's success — the ability even when playing badly to come up with the necessary scores.

However, Cork followers will remember that Clare gave the county team a will remember that Clare gave the county team a tough battle at the same stage of last year's championship and felt they could have won. Clare were not too impressive in the League campaign but they too have been training very hard for Sunday's crack at the champions. A home venue will be a help too and if their top players, including Maureen Davoren, at centre back, Ann Marie Russell in goal, as well as Patricia and Carmel Moroney, Clare Jones, Veronica Casey, Liz Condron and Martina Beegan all play up to standard, they will be pretty confident of causing a major upset.

For Sunday Cork have lost their star corner for-ward Martha Kearney, who has emigrated to America and she is going to be greatly missed. A stylist and powerful defender she will be hard to replace.

Martha's position will be
taken by Liz Lynch, who is
no newcomer to the side as no newcomer to the side as she has played many games for the county. She is a sound, close defender, who will give little away and with experienced defenders around her, she should fit in well.

The rest of the team is the same as that which started in the league final against Dublin. This means that grand goalie Marian McCarthy will again be in goal with the solid Eileen Dineen at full back and the sound Miriam Higgins on the opposite wing to Liz Lynch. And at centreback Lynch, And at centreback Cork have one of the best defenders in the country in Catherine Landers. Newcomer Liz Dunphy continues to hold her place at full centre and she will be flanked by that exciting and hard working pair Clare Cronin and captain Sandy Fitzgibbon.

It is a little surprising that Cork retained the same attack as this sector was the most suspect against Dublin, and missed many scoring chances. This four goal blitz by Galway really left Cork with it all to do but a goal from Cork's Jean Paul Kent brought her side back to within four points of the lead. The goal came about from a long range shot from Kent which went straight to the net and while it was a stroke of luck on Cork's part, coming as it did with three minutes remaining in the first half, the goal proved to have a bearing on the eventual outcome.

Cork's recovery got the boost it just needed when with just three minutes played in the second-half, Karen Mellerick was first to the dropping ball and knocked it past a hesitant Galway Goalkeeper to bring Cork back to within a point.

After this there was no stopping Cork, despite a tremendous goal from Galway's Anne Ryan when she blasted a shot past Brid Walsh, from about 15 yds. out, three minutes later.

This, however, proved to be Galway's last score as Cork consistancy began to tell. Points from Ina Leahy, and Pat O'Shea reduced the deficit for Cork and two furether points from frees from Colette O'Mahony midway through the second-half levelled the issue.



On experience alone Dublin should romp away with the title at Croke Park tomorrow. but when it comes to All-Ireland day anything can hap-

If one were to go back to the beginning of the year, few if any, would have envisaged this pairing. While a lot of emphasis had been placed on the Tipperary senior hurlers and the hopes and wishes that they might have contested the final in Thurles in this the G.A.A. cenenary year, it's te girls who have stolen the limelight

and have quietly but deservedly earned the right to their place in this intriguing clash.

Make no mistake about it, Tipperary are in Croke Park tomorrow because they have proved beyond all doubt that they are never beaten until the final whistle.

Their fighting spirit and determination in their two matches with Wexford, when they came back from the jaws of defeat on both occasions, have shown this. Nobody could come up with an answer as to why they failed so miserably that day. Perhaps they had been luiled into t false sense of security by their demolition of Louth, Down and Kilkenny in the earlier rounds and brought back to earth with a bang that sunny afternoon in Cork.

But since then they have matured and to their credit have come fighting back with grtat determination and enthusiasm. In the semi-final they proved themselves to be a good side when they beat champions Cork, especially with that dramatic last-minute goal.

Even though tht pressure to win will be more on Dublin than Tipperary, pre-match nerves will not be as bad for the Metropolitans as they have been at this stage more recently than their Munster rivals. The fact that they are appearing in their third successive final will stand to them.

The Dublin selectors have made two changes in personntl from the side that won through the semi-final. Anne through the semi-final. Anne Thorpe and Carmel O'Byrne make way for Edel Murphy and Germaine Noonan. In fact 11 of this team played in last ytar's final while 8 remain from the '82 game.

With the experimentation of the League and the earlier rounds of the championship behind them the selectors now feel that their captain Anne Colgan is of better benefit to Dublin at centre folward rather than in the back line. Ptrhaps the surprise of the team is the placing of Edel Murphy at left corner forward. Following her impressive performance when she was intoduced at half time in the semifinal the stlectos feel that she will add t little bit more experience and scoring power to

the forward line.

Tipperary have their own stars in Breda Kenntly, Mary Sheedy. Maura Hackett, Rosie Ryan, Mary Griffen and Jenny, English. Leading the Tipperary team will be the ever-enthusi-tatic Dtirdre Lane. GREAT OCCASION FOR CAMOGIE IN CAVAN

County in search of All-Ireland title

SUNDAY next marks a great, historic occasion for camogie in Co. Cavan when for the first time ever a Cavan team will contest an All-Ireland final at Croke Park, when the juniors meet Cork. Indeed, it's the first time since 1959 (when the minor footballers went under to Dublin) that a Cavan team has appeared at GAA headquarters in a final in any grade. The fact that this is the centenary of the GAA makes the appearance of the Cavan team in an All-Ireland final all the more

Camogie has struggled to stay alive in Cavan for the past seventy years without a great deal of success at inter-county level. In fact, Cavan only won their first Ulster title in 1940 which was 36 years after the Association was founded in 1904.

The Ulster title was retained in 1941 but as in the previous year Cavan lost out at the All-Ireland semi-final stage

1978 saw Cavan win an Ulster title for the first time in 22 years when they won the Ulster Junior B' Championship. They retained this title in 1979.

By MAOL MUIRE TYNAN IF psychological taboos carried any weight, Tipperary's camogic team would be frozen with terror at the prospect of meeting Dublin in this afternoon's senior final. In all but one of their half dezen forays into All-Ireland finals at this level they have been deprived of fortune by the

But, delapidated statistics will get scant respect from these young teams during Croke Park's first Ali-Ireland ci 1984.

Dublin have fed often in the land of plenty with no less than 25 All-Ireland titles to boast about. But they endured narrow defeat in the last two Championship finals and the climax of the National League and those memories are vividly omnipresent.

Tipperary's past is not bedecked with medals but they retain half the team that reached the All-Ireland final of 1979 which ended in a tantalisingly close downfall to Antrim. They offer genuine meaning to the tired sporting cliche-"a mixture of youth and experience."

The marked dissimilarities between the styles and techniques of these two teams should make this an extremely colourful final. Though Dublin have drifted slightly from ground play in recent years, they retain the county's traditional style with speed and detailed co-ordination playing a major role.

Tipperary, on the other hand, tend to carry, the ball much more; one suspects that the game has been influenced by the county's hurlers in this respect. Their manner of play is as fluent as Dublin's is smooth.

Tipperary's appetite for success was truly whetted when they drew against Louth in the first round of the Championship. Poor Louth put up a deser-

pionship. Poor Louth put up a desper-ate attempt to salvage their honour but were hopelessly overcome. Their luck held out when they received a bye in the second round and were finally tested by Wexford in the semifinal.

Cork Seeking A Notable Double

CORK may be out of the Senior All-Ireland Final on Sunday but the red and white flag will still be very much in evidence as our second string will be playing in the junior final against Cavan and will be hoping to add that title to the one already won by the minors, to make it two out of three All-Ireland trophies for the season.

Two of the counties involved in this season's All-Ireland finals at Croke Park on Sunday, have never won an All-Ireland title at any level. Cavan the junior finalists, who meet Cork, hav never had a team at Croke Park, while Tipperary, although they did contest six finals, the most recent in 1979, have never had national success. And Dublin, the fourth team involved have not won the senior crown since 1966, an extraordinary spell, considering their phenomenal success in a 20 year period up to that year, when they won the senior title on no less than inneteen occasions.

Dublin, after accounting for Cork in a very exciting semi-final, will certainly start as favourites to make it in this their third successive final - they lost to Cork in 1982 and 1983 - and will be determined that its "third-time-luck" for them.

The Dublin record in recent years in the League is also impresive as they won the title in 83 and only lost to Cork in this season's decider. They also had the toughest campaign to the final, as they had to overcome very good Kilkenny and Limerick sides.

This Dublin team is strong in all sectors and now that they have over come their "bogey" side, Cork, they are on a crest of a wave and will be very hard to beat. They have a first class goalie in Yvonne Redmond and excellent defenders in Marion Conroy, Bernie Toner, Germaine Noonan and Catherine Ledwidge.

The midfield trio of Una Crowley, Marty Mernagh and Barbara Redmond, a sister of Yvonne, are first class midfielders, while in the attack they have Edel Murphy back in action following a muscle injury and an appendicitis operation, as well as team captain Ann Colgan, Joan Gormley and Marie Connell, who made such an impression against Cork in the semi-final, and this quartet are bound to give the Tipperary defence a tough afternoon.

What of Tipperary? Well they have come through to this stage by virtue of wins over Louth and Wexford

and they had to meet the latter county twice, but that second game against Wexford could have done a great deal for their morale, as that county was very confident of getting to this year's final.

Tipperary won the National League in 1977 and they reached the All-Ireland final in 1979, when they lost to Antrim by a single goal. Since then they have not been too impressive but how that they have got to the decider, they will not give up the chance of that first All-Ireland crown easily.

Tipp have a number of experienced players in their side but for the most part they are less experienced than their opponents. Breda Kennedy in goal will be playing her first game in Croke Park and she will be fronted by Mary Sheehy, who played in goal in the 1979 final. Triona Bonnar is an excellent centreback, while Maura Hackett, and Margaret Madden complete an uncompromising defence.

In the middle of the field for Tipperary they have Ger Ryan, Rosie Ryan and Anne Gleeson, who will contest every ball, while in the attack they have one of their trumph cares in captain Deirdre Lane, the talented Jenny English, Mary Griffin, Siobhan McDonnell (nee Tynan), all of whom could be match winners on the day.

So although Dublin must start as "hot" favourites to win on Sunday. Tipperary will be fighting all the way and now that they are so close once again to victory they might well cause a major upset.

One player from last year's panel, Irene O'Leary, is in the side, and she will captain Cork on Sunday, and a great deal of Cork's hopes will be resting on this stylish player. Kathleen Costine is a stylish and efficient goalie and Cork have excellent defenders in Mary Spillane and Paula Goggins and other fine

players in the non-stop Mary Currid, Josephine Rumley, who got that winning last minute goal against Dublin, the stylish Linda Mellerick, who is always capable of picking off vital points, and Denise Cotter.

For their part Cavan got to Croke Park by virtue of very good wins over Derry, Donegal, Armagh and Galway and will be very keen to make this, their first appearance in an All-Ireland final a victorious one. From reports they have a very good side, with strength right through and will be a very difficult team to overcome. They have a grand goalie in Anne McKiernan who captains the side as well as fine players Margaret Hastings, Frances Smith, Noleen Kiernan, Mary McMullen and Bernie Callaghan.

So Cork can expect the toughest game of their campaign so it would be for them to take the title inthis their first year playing together as a team.
