







Rebels bid to make it lucky 13

CORK and Galway in the National Camogie league final. Who would have forecast this pairing at the begin-ning of the year? Cork maybe. But, great credit to Galway after internal strife threatened to end their season before it began. Are they about to join the major players once again? Their only All-Ireland senior success came in 1996, and they have won only three Division One league titles.

Tomorrow's pairing in Semple Stadium will only be the second ever, and Galway have never beaten Cork in a decider. But, whatever the outcome, the Tribeswomen are certainly moving in the right direction. In the semi-final albeit against a poor Kilkenny team they showed much promise.

Defensively, they are very strong, with a free-flowing attack that loves to run at goal.

But they are without some key players — Lourda Kavanagh is their top scorer but is unavailable with a hand injury. Aine Hillary is another notable absentee at midfield, joining Kavanagh

"Thankfully, so far, major games have not clashed. It can be quite demanding fitness-wise, but you have just got to mind yourself and not over-train. It would be amazing to win another medal tomorrow," said the East Cork girl, who plays her foot-ball with Inch Rovers. Cork and Galway also contest the Division Two final, which will be staged at Templemore at 3pm.

SCHOOL holiday thoughts are to be put on the back burner for the weekend as under 14 teams from Cork, Tipperary, Wexford, Kilkenny, Waterford, Limerick Colleges, Clare, Dublin, Galway and Cork colleges meet in the James Hurley memorial inter-county blitz in Inniscarra on Saturday next.

The competition is organised and hosted by the Cork Colleges camogie committee, and is in memory of one of the greatest workers, the late lames Hurley, who passed away three year ago at a very young age. James was a teacher in St. Aloysius and was very prominent in the Cork Colboard, having been a selector with the Cork Colleges under 14 side and an officer. After his untime-

ly death the committee decided to dedicate the Cork competition to his memory and his family presented a beautiful trophy which is played

for each year.

The competition will be played on a round robin format with the top two teams contesting the final on what promises to be a great days camogie. The Cork side is coached by Ger Donovan from St. Mary's, Charleville. The side is chosen from players whose school participated in Cork colleges competitions, and they have prepared well for the challenge ahead. Recently they participated in and won the Limerick Colleges U14 blitz and have in preparations also played games against Lim-erick, Dublin, Waterford and Waterford and

Kilkenny. The Cork side is captained by Michelle Healy from Coachford College while Catriona Collins Bandon, Jennifer Lynch Crosshaven, Cliona Galvin Charleville, Grainne O' Keeffe Carrigaline, Claire Keohane Carrigtwohill, and Denise Lu-by Carrignavar.

Kilkenny and Dublin have beaten Wexford in the Leinster under 14 championship and will contest the provincial final in June, Galway won the Clare blitz by virtue of a four point win over Limerick Colleges in the final and the stage is certainly set for a thrilling Cork event.

The Cork Colleges backroom team have left no stones unturned in their search for talent and have picked the panel of 29 players from

17 schools who represent 19 clubs. They have been busy preparing since last September with the assistance of fellow selectors Cathal Egan (Glen Rovers), Mairead Ni Mhaoileoin (Col Daibheid), Prionsias Creedon (Carrignavar) and Rob Lotty (Coachford).

CORK seniors will have to pick themselves up from their defeat at the hands of Galway in last Sunday's National League final as they face Limerick on Wednesday night in the semi-final of the Munster championship in Ballyhea at 7.30pm.

While the game has no bearing on the All Ireland series, which is played on an open draw basis, Cork will be anxious to get good games under

their belt and get back on the winning trail as they prepare for their championship outings against Gal-way and Wexford on July 2 and 17.

In last Sunday's league decider, Cork failed to ignite against a Galway side that were hungry for success and they face into tomorrow's clash badly in need of a boost.

The counties are on opposite side of the championship and were also

in opposite league groups. In their section Limerick had games against Cork's championship opponents Wexford and Galway.

Limerick failed to make it to the play-off stages of the league, suffering a comprehensive defeat at the hands of Wexford, but they picked themselves up sufficiently to come within five points of the newly crowned league champions They are

paired in a tough championship sec-tion with holders Tipperary, Kilkenny and Antrim.

Cork continue to be without several players who are exam-tied or out of the country and certainly they felt the loss of these players on Sun-

However, they will be hoping for an improved performance to book a place in the provincial decider.

Rebels up for Galway final test

"WE'LL be giving it our best shot," was how Cork manager John Cronin described tomorrow's senior National League final game against Galway.

Having taken over from John Considine this year, it would be a great start for the Cloughduv man should Cork take the title.

Fairly depleted in training these past months with many of the squad doing exams, Cork have managed to keep the momentum going with former Cork player Fiona O'Driscoll coaching the side.

"Fiona is dong an excellent job for us. Her coaching is excellent. She is very meticulous and most importantly the players respond very well to her," he

Fiona feels if Cork play as well as we do during training on Sunday then she'd be confident of a vic-

Galway manager Sharon Glynn and Flona are no strangers to each other having faced each other numerous times on the playing field.

Galway beat Cork in the All-Ireland final of 1996 in what was a shock defeat for the Rebels but the sweetest of victories for Galway, who claimed their one and only title to date.

Cork gained revenge in 1997 and 98. Now both players face each other as mentors passing their expertise and advice on to their charges.

Galway named their team early in the week and it shows a number of personnel and positional switches due to the non availability of right-half forward Lourda Kavanagh and centre-field player Aine

Nicola Gavin comes in at left full-back. Lorraine Kelly moves to right half-back which sees Fiona Healy demoted to the subs bench. Shauna Murphy starts at centre-field for Hilary and Aoife Lynskey moves to right half-forward.

Galway have a running team. One of their weaknesses in the semi-final was their over elaboration of the ball. They hand pass continuously, particularly around the middle of the field and up front and don't play enough direct hurling. They are very young and MAY 2005

Cork named their team only last night due to the fact that Friday was the only night the entire squad could get together this week because of exams.

As expected Aoile Murray takes the number one shirt. Murray is undoubtedly the top goalkeeper in the country at the moment. The full-backline stands at Jennifer Browne, Stephanie Dunlea and Joanne O'Callaghan. Shaky enough in the semi-final this line of defence is usually dependable. Amanda O'Regan wins the right half-back slot from Paula O'Connor with Mary O'Connor and Nora Ahem completing the trio. Rachel Moloney begins at centre-field alongside the tireless Breige Corkery. Angela Walsh who had an excellent debut against Wexford retains her position at right half-forward. Emer Dillon reverts back to her more natural position of centre-forward and flanking her on the left is free taker Jennifer

Captain Elaine Burke is carrying an injury. She may well be sprung from the bench but Cork have named Colette Desmond to start. Ciara Healy, who hasn't put a foot wrong with the juniors this year takes over from Sarah O'Donovan at full-forward.

All-Ireland winning captain Una O'Donoghue is inside at left half-forward.

Cork have a strong squad. When one looks at the fact that Vivienne Harris, Rena Buckley, Gemma O'Connor and Anna Geary have still to come on to the panel, it gives an indication of the strength in depth available to Cork.

The All-Ireland is Cork's priority, but for the moment they aren't thinking beyond Sunday. A league title will start the year off very nicely indeed.

Cork v Galway camogie preview

IT'S Cork on the double yet not at the same venue this Sunday as Cork take on Galway in the senior and junior National League finals.

The junior final goes ahead in Templemore at 3pm while the senior game takes place in Thurles at 5.30pm after the Munster Football quarter final between Kerry and Tipperary.

The seniors, league champions in 2003, will be favourites to beat the 2002 Galway champions. On route they accounted for Dublin, Kilkenny and Tipperary to emerge top of their group and face Wexford in the semi-final. A two-point victory here saw them through to this weekend's final show-

Rena Buckley and Anna Geary are still unavailable until after their leaving cert, Vivienne Harris has yet to settle back into the team having missed training again due to exams.

Sarah O'Donovan is out of the country and will miss the final and Gemma. O'Connor, last year's All-Star is currently serving in Liberia. She is due home on June 2 after a six month stint and there is no doubt that she will command a place in the starting 15 for the championship.

Angela Walsh made her debut in style for Cork three weeks ago in the semi-final scoring 1-2 and will be pushing for her place again. Clara Healy has been in dynamic form for the junior team all season and will surely replace Sarah O'Donovan at full forward.

The Cork defence was shaky in the semi and will need to tighten up against a running Galway forward line.

Galway have a number of injuries and will be missing two of their key players. Acide Lynskey comes in at right half forward in place of Lourda Kavanagh. Kavanagh is Galway's top forward and her loss is a big blow.

Aine Hilary is also out and she is replaced at centre-field by Shauna Murphy. It is hard to see Galway beating Cork without these two players.

Galway shock Cork to win third league title

THERE was a big shock in Thurles yesterday as Galway upset the form-book to claim their third vision One national camogle league title at Semple Stadium.

And how they greeted that final whistle as the celebrations launched the maroon and white back on the success trail.

It wasn't just winning that made their fans ecstatic it was the fresh resolve shown by this new-look Galway team. Boss Sharon Glynn was

overjoyed.
"This must rank as the best-ever. We are a long time down and badly needed to get something out of today.

"We were short two of our top players (Aine Hillary and Lourda Kavariagh) and as a result, and rightly so, a lot of people had written us off. To be shonest, I had my own doubts daying the week.

*Blat-we asked the 15 girls that took the field to work hard and to be proud of themselves. They were brilliant and to not belief." But, if truth is told, this will rank as one of Cork's poorer perfor-mances. Already drained in midfield and attack by the loss of injured duo Hillary and Kavanagh, the Connacht defence soaked any pressure Cork threw at them.

Captain Therese Maher was tremen-dous at centre-back, while Ailbhe Kely was powerful at wing-back. Their full line also battened down the hatches and keeper Stephanie Gannon, who earlier this year received the Irish Exammer Junior Sports Star Award, was superb.

Her acrobatics in the opening five minutes denied Cork a perfect start.

Cork manager John Cronin had no complaints, admitting: "we were not good enough. What more can one say? We were short of scoring power and you need scores to win matches."

Even if the scoring was low, this was very competitive encounter, with Cork opening smartly courtesy of two fine points from Una O'Donoghue and Jennifer O'Leary. But Galway began to settle and suffocated the Cork attack. Two minutes into injury-time, Galway's Veronica Curtin broke through for a brilliant goal, which helped them to a four-point interval lead, 1-4 to 0-3.

A bartling second-half display ensued, with Galway's inside-forward line (Brenda Kerins, Curtin and Emma Kilkelly) impressing, while at the other end, a pair of misses from placed balls by the usually reliable Jennifer

O'Leary proved costly.

The Rebels pegged the deficit back to two by the three-quarter stage, but the large Galway following were already sensing victory. Cork failed to score again.

CORK were favourites to take their 13th National Senior League title when they faced Galway in Thurles last evening but it didn't quite turn out like that.

The script was re-written by the girls from the West and they had something to say about Cork's fairytale ending.

Despite Cork's dominance at times throughout the game Galway are deserving winners if for no other reason but that they seemed to want it more. Their first touch was a joy to watch and when they took Cork on they had the legs to split them apart.

The first half was flat for the most part until the last 10 minutes which yielded the majority of the 31 minute scoring.

The teams seemed nervous and tense and one kept waiting for the game to explode.

Cork certainly had the upper hand in the opening exchanges but this wasn't being converted into scores. Despite having 65 percent of possession in the opening 20 minutes they found themselves only two points to the good and with four wides on the board.

As the game wore on Galway began to open uptheir play and take Cork on. Mary O'Connor was dominating centre-back and on her left Amanda O'Regan was steady. Rachel Moloney fell back and won a lot of ball but other than that Cork struggled.

It was noticeable that once the ball passed Cork's

half-back line Galway were in control.

Galway's jewel in the crown, Veronica Curtin wasn't to put a foot wrong at full forward, finishing with a personal tally of 1-5, and together with team-mate Brenda Kerins at right corner forward ran Cork ragged.

Curtin opened her side's scoring on 23 minutes with a free. Kerins added another two minutes later and Dillon replied for Cork on the 27th. The remaining minutes of the half was all Galway as the pendulum began to swing. Curtin pointed again on the 28th.

Heady times for GAA in Grenagh village

2004 was probably the most heartbreaking year ever for the sports-mad village of Grenagh.

MISSED chances last year have made Grenagh camogie

Three county finals in gaelic games were lost in the space of a few weeks and all by the narrowest of margins, a single point.

The Junior A hurlers lost to Ballygarvan while the Junior A footballers lost to fellow Mid Cork rivals Aghabullogue in what, effectively, was a county final. However, the defeat of the junior camogie team after a replay was probably the hardest of all to take.

Grenagh had overcome a nine-point deficit at half-time in their semi-final against Bandon to win by two points and hopes were high that the club would win their first ever county title at junior level when facing Castlemagner.

The final in Mallow saw Grenagh lead by seven points midway through the second half, but Castlemagner fought back to level late in the game.

The replay in Ballyanly saw Grenagh up by five points with just minutes to go, but two late Castlemagner goals, including the winner in the last minute, meant heartbreak for Grenagh. This was the closest a Grenagh camogie team had come to winning a junior title. MISSED chances last year have made Grenagh camogie club all the more focussed as they continue to build for a bright future

"It was disappointing but we will learn from the experience and we are growing as a club all the time," said Grenagh chairman Ken O'Callaghan.

A camogie club was formed in Grenagh in 1934 within a year of the GAA club being founded. The club was not, however, affiliated and only took part in practice games.

Mary B. Buckley was the club's first captain. The club only lasted a couple of years but was reformed again in 1944 with Ted Mullane as president and Kathleen Kenny as secretary, a position she also held with the newly-formed Muskerry Camogie Board. The club disbanded again in 1947 as several members left the

However, the following year, the camogle craze was transferred to the neighbouring parish of Courtbrack.

This club was in existence from 1948 to the early 1950s when the ladies of both parishes came together to form one club, Grenagh.

The club reached the 1955 County Junior Final which was played at Church Road, Blackrock, only to lose to Mayfield, 3-1 to 2-1.

In the late 1950s, the team was discontinued again and for some years, the sport of camogie was continued under the Courtbrack banner, who

made every effort to revive interest in the game, but to no avail.

The present camogie club was formed in the summer of 1984 by Breda Kenny and Breda McDonnell. They held their first AGM on February 7, 1985 with Breda Kenny becoming chairperson and Noreen Mannix both secretary and

The committee consisted of Breda McDonnell, Maura Walsh and Tom Kenny.

As a result, the club was affiliated to the County Board.

The club organised an annual tournament every August, inviting fellow Muskerry clubs to these, with Grenagh winning across several age groups. Also in the early years, many tournaments were won at under-age level in places such as Ballincollig. Mourneabbey and Dromahane.

The club went into decline again in

the late 1990s and only for the trojan efforts of Linda Corkery and the involvement of Donal Hurley at under-age level, amongst others, the club might not have survived.

The renaissance began in 2002 when the U13 team won the Muskerry League, defeating Ballinora in the final.

This was the first trophy won by the club. The same year saw the U14 team reach the county semi-final and the Junior B team lose a league final to Killeagh.

The following year, 2003, saw the

club win its first county title, beating Tracton in the 12-a-side Championship.

The U14s also reached the county final only to lose by a goal to Dungourney. Last year, the Muskerry U15 B Blitz was won. That came just a week after losing the Junior B final replay, so it provided some consolation for the club.

"We are putting a huge emphasis into the under age setn up. We cater for girls from eight years of age up and our numbers are swelling all the "They are the future of the club and we are definitely moving in the right direction," added O'Callaghan.

The club has provided many players to Muskerry teams in recent years.

Last year alone saw Elaine Vaughan and Norma Hurley play a major role in Muskerry's U16 triumph in the inter-divisional blitz.

This sealed a three-in-a-row for Muskerry and both girls were part of all three panels. Jenny Vaughan and Linda Dorgan starred for the victorious U21s. Jenny actually captained the Muskerry team. Linda is also a senior player with Muskerry and honoured the club by becoming the first player to win an All-Ireland medal with Cork's intermediates.

Another player to wear the red and white of Cork was Elaine Vaughan, who played for the Cork Colleges U14 team in 2003.

Last December, a new committee was elected as the whole club was restructured.

Ken O'Callaghan was elected chairman with Ann Donovan as his vice chairperson.

Donal Hurley became secretary with Mary O'Keeffe-Jones as his assistant.

Linda Corkery was elected treasurer and Margaret Vaughan is PRO. Tom O'Donovan, a life president of the club is still working away in the

back ground as the club continues to grow and develop.

There is now a total of 20 officers and committee members to oversee the running of the club and each one

is working very hard to make the

club a successful one.

Fundraising was the first objective and already this year over €7,500 has been raised through a race night, sponsorship and donations.

The club has also, for the first time, two major sponsors — S.O.S. Heating + Plumbing at junior level and the Scally Foundation in Blarney has contributed to the purchase of gear for the under-age.

The GAA club has also donated money and The Village Inn, through Don McEvoy, has always been good to the club. All the money raised so far has been ploughed back into the club with the purchase of new gear, gear bags, jackets, hurleys, sliothars

"There is tremendous goodwill in the area to the girls and the club.

"Recently we attracted 36 sponsors to our cause and that can only augur well for the future," added O'Callaghan.

There are now over 90 members of the club and this figure is rising every year. Two of the junior hurling team, Martin Barry and Dean Dalton, have taken over the coaching duties of the junior team as they try to atone for last year's final defeat. Ken O'Callaghan, Tom O'Donovan and Donal Hurley are-in charge at under-age level while Linda Dorgan trains the U16s.

Also Breda Kenny and Noreen Mannix have both been made Life-Presidents of the club for their Trojan work.

The club is celebrating 21 years in existence this year and hopes that over the next few years, it can become one of the most progressive clubs in Cork. The work is being done off the pitch, now it is up to the players on it.

Within months of the founding of the Camogie Association by the Keating Branch of the Gaelic League in Dublin in 1904, the game had spread to Cork. The first Cork club was formed in the Blarney Street area of the City and was called Fäinne an Lae. Cork's second club, Clan na nGael came into being in the Blackpool area. Clan Eimear, in the Lough area and Clan Eanna also affiliated.

Punch & Company presented the Science Cup for the Cork Senior Championship in 1932. Cork entered the inter-county arena in 1934 and won six Alf-Ireland Senior Championships in the following eight years and produced some of the finest players that the game had seen. Kitty Buckley, Peggy Hogg, Joan Cotter, Lil Kirby, Kathleen Coughlan, Josie McGrath, Eileen Casey and Rence Fitzgerald became household names.

In a dispute over male officials, Cork did not affiliate to Munster Council in 1944. For the following eight years, Cork were absent from the inter-county playing fields. They returned in 1952 but had to wait until 1970 to bring the O' Duffy Cup to Leeside, Ann Comerford, Marie Costine, Pat Moloney, Liz Gurvan, Hannah Dincen, Betty Sugrue and Rosie Hennessy were the stars of the side that brought a four-in-a-row to Cork.

Forty-two All-Ireland titles (20 senior, 2 intermediate, 7 junior and 13 minor) have been won by Cork. No other county can match this record. In addition, Glen Rovers and Killeagh have lifted the All-Ireland Club Championship title. St. Aloysius School, North Presentation, St. Patrick's, St. Mary's, Charleville, Sacred Heart, Clonakilty and Coachford College have captured All-Ireland Colleges titles.

The Cork Camogic Board organises competition for 57 clubs and fields five teams in inter-county competition. An energetic Juvenile Board eaters for underage camogie. The county has produced many outstanding administrators over the years, five of whom were honoured with the position of President of the Camogic Association. Cork camogic looks forward to the second century with confidence.





results from these clashes.



GALWAY CLAIM LEAGUE CROWN

The girls from the west have not gone away if their recent national league success is anything to go by. Maire Ui Scolai reports from the league final.

"We came determined to compete and win," was how Galway selector Damian Coleman put if after Galway's first National League, Division 1 victory against Cork, 1-6 to 0-6 in Semple Stadium on Sunday 29th May. He further went on to say just how delighted he was. "Those girls did everything that was asked of them, I am so proud of them."

Galway's victory was almost a rags to riches tale as last year they failed to win one League match, but under the new management team of former player Sharon Glynn, Damian Coleman the former U21 hurler together with PJ Molloy, the former All-Ireland winner they have turned defeat into victory for Galway.

Galway may have started off rather slow and nervous. And it showed as they had to wait twenty three minutes before their opening score, a point from full-forward Veronica Curtin, who is engaged to be married to selector Damian Coleman. However, once Curtin found the posts she continued as just before the break the all important goal came for Galway in a great move that saw Brenda Kerins find the waiting Curtin who smashed the ball to the Cork net two minutes into injury time. It was the turning point of the game as it left the 2002 League champions ahead 1-4 to Cork's 0-3 at the break, the Cork points having come from Una O'Donoghue, Jennifer O'Leary and Emer Dillon.

Galway, who had to line out without top players Lourda Kavanagh and Aine Hilary due to injury, showed real fight and determination in the second half, but just like the opening half it was the Rebels who were first on the scoreboard with an Emer Dillon point in the opening minute. However, if Galway showed fire so too did the Rebels and they left nothing to chance as they brought on Vivienne Harris at the break and later on introduced Paula O'Connor, but on the day the Galway half backline of captain Therese Maher along side Ailbhe Kelly and Lorraine Lally were in top form.

Immediately after Emer Dillion's point Veronica Curtin sent over a vital Galway free to leave it, Galway 1-5 to Cork's 0-4 with just four minutes gone. Amazingly, Galway failed to score again until the twentieth minute when Curtin knocked over her fifth point of the day. In between Cork sent over two Jennifer O'Leary frees, the second coming twelve minutes into the half and that remained the Rebel's last score of the day.

However, it was the Galway goalkeeper, Stephanie Gannon the 2004 Young player of the year who ran the whole pitch to take the penalty, but it was saved on the line by the Cork defence.

The final few minutes were tense and close as Galway tried hard to hold on to their lead, while the Rebels desperately looked for the equalising goal, but on the day it was the real Galway spirit that shone in the end.

Galway, looked for a long time in the Division 2 Final as if they might make it a double on the day. Despite getting off to a great start with two goals inside the opening twelve minutes from Molly Dunne and Rachelle O'Brien, it was Cork who stepped up the pace once full-forward Ellen O'Herlihy got their first half goal midway through the half to level the game at the break, Cork 1-4 Galway 2-1.

Two further points from Molly Dunne in the fourth and fifth minute put them ahead 2-2 to Cork's 1-4. Camogie Féile will give players first taste of glory

Feile na nGael

WITH the Feile na nGael kicking off in a matter of days it is interesting to look back to when camogie first entered this prestigious competition and the many great players whose first taste of camogie and success came with Feile na nGael.

The hurling Féile began in 1971. Camogie followed in 1974 and the first title was won by Ahane of Limerick. The competition was held in Cork in its second year, 1975, despite the fact that the host county were not involved. Four visiting counties participated, Croke Kilfinney from Limerick, Mervue of Galway, Kilkeel of Down and Knockanna from Wicklow.

After hosting Féile, Cork decided to introduce an U14 competition and convention passed a motion to begin an U14 League.

By the following year the interest was widespread and within a short period of time Cork had nine clubs taking part, -Eire Og, Nemo Rangers, Blackrock, Douglas, Na Piarsaigh, Ballyphehane, Old Als, Ballinlough and Glen Rovers. The competition was won by Na Piarsaigh.

In 1977 another Cork club, Killeagh, claimed the title, winning the final by just

In 1986 Bishopstown represented Cork and met Mullagh of Galway in the final in Cusack Park, Ennis where they had the honour of playing in front of the then President of Ireland Paddy Hilary.

It took extra-time before the title was decided when a late point from Emer Hardiman gave Mullagh their second title. The following year Bishopstown got their hands on the trophy when in a thrilling final in front of a crowd of 12,000, they defeated St Monica's of Dublin.


Indeed, when one looks at the history of Féile it is interesting to note that many of the All-Ireland Féile winning clubs, who had only recently taken up the game of camogie, went on to become major forces and continue to be so today, ie Grenagh Ballingarry of Limerick and Pearses of Galway. Thus enhancing the age old belief that the grassroots is where we need to build from

FÉILE NA nGAEL is a competition with a magic all of its own and it's something special in every young camogie or hurlers sporting career to participate in such a prestigious event.

With Cork hosting Feile in 2005 and again in 2006 it gives that extra opportunity to many local clubs to participate.

In several Cork clubs there will surely be nostalgia as parents watch siblings hoping to achieve what they themselves achieved way back in the 1970 and '80s, to bring home one of the game's most prestigious prizes: an All-Ireland Féile na nGael medal.

In 1977 Feile moved to Waterford and again a Cork team took the honours as Killeagh captured the title. Clare ladies denied Munster glory

CLARE were denied Munster championship glory in the cruellest fashion in Newmarketon-Fergus on Thursday evening when Cork claimed their eighth intermediate camogic title in ten years.

This was rough justice and grand larceny all at the same time. Clare were the better team over the hour and should have won. Worse still Clare were denied a draw by a referee who didn't declare Cork winners until fully three minutes after the final whistle.

As Joe O'Donovan studied his score card and consulted with his umpires confusion reigned.

The score board read 1-11 to 0-14 - a draw. Both Clare and Cork, in huddles, even took measures to prepare for extra

Extra time however never occured since Joe O'Donovan blew his final whistle again, outstretched his arms and declared Cork Munster champions. It was a bizarre end to an entertaining night's camogie, but one which left a very sour taste indeed for Clare.

The controversy had to do with a point from Cork cornerforward Eimear O'Friel in the 58th minute. It looked wide, but the umpires raised the white flag. The score, however, was never registered on the scoreboard.

It left Clare assuming they were a point adrift as they pressed forward. When a scoring chance fell to Catherine O'Loughlin in the last minute she stroked it over the bar.

Had the corner forward known that Clare were two points down she would surely have gone for goal. The chance was there - she was on the fourteen yard line - but the point meant the chance was lost.

It was a terrible way to lose, but in truth it shouldn't have come to this. Clare should have had this Munster final in the bag long before the controversy was stoked at the end of the hour.

Clare dominated for long periods, but profligacy in front of goal cost them dear. Wayward shooting marred a superb first half effort in which Clare tore into their much vaunted opponents.

They had ten wides in this period while also conceding a very soft goal in the eighth minute when Catherine Corkery's gentle lob from 40 yards sailed all the way to the net.

This gift and poor shooting meant that Clare had to be content with a level scores at half-time. They had seven points when it should have been closer to 17 - in contrast Cork's tally of 1-4 came from seven opportunities.

These statistics reflected Clare dominance, even if it wasn't reflected on the scoreboard. Clare again forced the pace in the second half with a superhuman effort all over the field.

No one shone brighter than Wolfe Tones starlet Laura Linnane. She was magnificent and player of the match. Her point from 40 yards after a 40 yard run from her own half-back line was worthy of an All-Ireland senior final.

Linnanc didn't deserve to be on the losing side, but that was her lot after an action packed and controversial second half. It was end-to-end stuff - the sides level six times before Cork edged ahead for the final


"However, she had been told that there was only a point in the game and she put the ball over the bar when she could have gone for a goal."

Onwards and upwards is Mick's mantra.



Battle on to tip Tipp from top

AS Croke Park underwent a facelift for the weekend festivities, the All-Ireland Camogie Championship was launched in brilliant sunshine yesterday, displaying all the attributes of a sport on the up.

Just as headquarters is being transformed into a concert venue, camogie is a sport that has re-invented itself over the past few years.

Last year's centenary championship elevated the sport to unprecedented heights, with over 100,000 members and more clubs registered than ever.

The rising standards, that has gone hand-in-hand with the game becoming 15-a-side, has resulted in some exciting matches in recent years. However, certain things never change, like a championship being launched with Tipperary as defending champions.

However, Deirdre Hughes, the Tipp captain, is expecting some serious challenges in the summer ahead.

"Things haven't been going that well for us in the league," the talented Tipp forward said. "We had a few injuries and are only really getting down to the nitty-gritty of it now.

"Given that we are All-Ireland champions, I suppose we will be favourites but there is very little between the top three or four teams."

That has been evident in recent seasons. Only the width of a crossbar saved Tipperary against Wexford last year and Galway defied the odds recently to capture the league title.

"The standard has got a lot higher in the last three or four years, the speed of the game is a lot better and 15-a-side has definitely helped," Hughes adds. "The advantage rule, when it is played right, helps the game and there is a lot of coaching being done."

he passion-fuelled manager of the Galway senior camogie team, Sharon Glynn, was taking a leaf from the pages of Shakespeare when she accepted the job, specifically, from the immortal words of Polonius in Hamlet: "To thine own self be true". Camogie was such a great a part of her life that the former star with club and county could not shirk the sense of responsibility she'd felt in recent years while watching Galway teams lose big matches they could and should have won. It was a long and disappointing way from the glory days of 1996 when Galway ended a long, lonely wait by powering to their first ever O'Duffy Cup All-Ireland triumph.

"As players that year, we loved every minute of it," Sharon fondly recalls. It hurt to see these players, some in their early 20s, so disillusioned, "That was the single biggest factor in my decision to take this job," Sharon revealed. "I got so much out of the game when I was playing - and I stayed playing for as long as I could - that I couldn't stomach the idea of good young players packing in county camogie and being content to stay tipping away with their clubs,"

"It was still a tough call for me, of course, as I had lost my first Galway manager's election by one vote. Then the new set-up for the 2005 season collapsed, for reasons that are too complex to go into. and I was approached and asked if I'd take the job. Many people took it for granted I'd turn it down in the



She acknowledges that Tipperary has set the standard in recent years and that they

Within three minutes of the second half they were level and it's very hard to stop a runaway train.

If we could only have stopped for a moment to regroup we might have stopped them. We were defeated by two points, 4-8 to 1-15 and were devastated. Of course, badly wounded, Cork returned and gained revenge against the same opponents in 1997 and

When I watched the league final four weeks ago my mind flashed back nine years and I thought: Déjà vu. The difference this time is that it was a league final not an All-Ireland and Cork have a chance to make amends. But will they? We'll find out this afternoon.

Cork won their first All-Ireland title after nine years in 1992 and for a county like Cork it was a dreadful famine. Of course Kilkenny reigned supreme at the time winning seven titles in a row and year after year Cork were the alsorans. In fact we were known throughout the land as the second best team in the

That all changed in '92 and for the next seven years Cork dominated winning five titles. At that point there seemed to be nobody who could touch us. But how quickly the tide

Cork strolled through the National League campaign in '99 and registered 9-19 against Tipperary in the League final. Who would have backed Tipperary to win the All-Ireland just four months later and become the force they are today? But once again Cork slipped up and left the door wide open. That same year we went into the All-Ireland semi-final against Kilkenny as raging hot known as the also-rans.

What has happened to Cork? We find ourselves once again, despite a reprieve in 2002, caught in a famine. Whether I'm right or wrong I believe that the entire panel don't desire it as much as they used to. As individuals the players will tell you that they want it more than anything but as a unit it doesn't look that way. I have watched performances over the past number of years and I can honestly say that Cork have not done themselves justice. I can't say that they played to the best of their ability but were beaten by a better team because on each occasion there was something missing. I believe the players are there. We have 52 clubs attiliated to the county board and there is not a chance any other county in the country can boast the same. When you look at the local scene the county championship last year was the best in years. There was some tremendous games and the county final between Carrigdhoun and Milford was without doubt the most competitive, tough and skilful final in any code in Cork in a long time.

We just don't seem to be gelling as a unit when it comes to playing senior intercounty. This surprises me as the majority of the squad are in and around the same age. Of course an All-Ireland victory will always bond you but you've got to win it first. We need an All-Ireland senior title this year. The journey begins today. If nothing else but camogie dominates the player's thoughts from now until September we stand a chance. If not, then we will once again begin to become
