# Ararahan aim high

Ardrahan camogie club in Galway was founded three years ago but they are showing encouraging signs that they will be a force to be reckoned with in the near future. Aidan Canning spoke to chairman Martin Glynn and main sponsor Frank Higgins to discuss their brief history.

Although they are a young club. Ardrahan are already making waves in the Galway camogic scene. Founded by Michael Brennan, Mary Kennedy, Martin Murphy and Rose Brennan, the club fields teams from U10 right up to the intermediate grade, with a fine array of gifted young players comprising some very successful sides.

Martin Glynn and Martin Murphy have been the chairmen since the club's inception three years ago. Martin Glynn hails from a family steeped in GAA tradition and is a former Galway underage footballer so his involvement with a local GAA club was a natural progression.

"The club is only three years in existence yet we are already being labelled the up and coming club in the county," Martin Glynn remarks, "We knew there was great interest in the game amongst the young girls in the community so we decided to form a club. In the short space of time since the club formed we have made giant strides and this progress must be credited to all the members of the committee who are working extremely hard to ensure everything runs smoothly. The players too, have been really dedicated and helped raise the profile of the club with some sterling displays in all the age brackets"

Ardrahan compete in the intermediate grade although they have come close on a number of occasions of making the breakthrough to the senior ranks.

"We reached the intermediate county final in 1998 in only our second year in existence," he continues. "Unfortunately Cappagaggle beat us in the decider that year by a single point so we failed to get promoted but we bounced back in great style last year and won the intermediate league. Castlegar then enacted revenge on us by knocking us out of the championship but it was still a great achievement to get our hands on a piece of silverware at adult level.

"Our aim this season is to win the intermediate championship and I firmly believe that we'll achieve this goal. The girls proved last year that they're capable of beating all the teams in this grade and if they continue improving like they've been doing in the last few years, then

they've an excellent chance. It would be a remarkable achievement to get promoted to the senior ranks with such a young club."

One of the reasons the club is performing so well at adult level is because of the conveyor belt of young players coming up through the ranks. They have teams competing at every juvenile grade and Martin hopes these girls will play an integral part of future adult teams.

"We are very fortunate in Ardrahan to have plenty of people who are prepared to sacrifice their spare time to coach the young girls. All our underage teams are very competitive and we did really well in all competitions last year. Our U10 side - coached by Martin Murphy, Mary Murphy and Greta Donaghue - reached the quarter-final of their competition. I helped train the U12 and U14 sides along with John Kennedy and Teresa Murphy and they also reached the last eight of their championships while the U16 team is looked after by Michael Brennan, Mary Kennedy, Martin Glynn and Teresa Murphy and they got beaten in the "B" final by Cappagaggle.

final by a point to win the club's first minor title. They are a great bunch of players and their mentors Michael Brennan and Mary Kennedy must be applauded for the way they handled them. Most of these girls play on the intermediate team as well and it was particularly pleasing to see them winning a county final because they are the future of the club," the Garda admits.

The club received a further boost last year when they were asked to host the All-Ireland minor final. A huge crowd attended the game between Galway and Cork and it was a truly memorable occasion. Martin is quick to acknowledge the part played by Tadhg O'Sullivan, Sean O'Neill and Michael Brennan in the preparation of the facilities and their work ensured everything on the day was a great success.

Ardrahan is generously sponsored by Frank Higgins of Frank Higgins Ltd. Frank, whose daughter is a member of the under 16 and under 18 squads, is a native of Ardrahan and he provided the club with jerseys since its formation three years

ago. "It was great to see a camogie club being formed in the town,' Frank admits. "It gives the girls opportunity to play sport when they approached me sponsor a set of jerseys I delighted to oblige. They are doing

trojan work in the club and it's amazing to see how far they've come in the space of three years. All the teams that compete at underage give an excellent account of themselves while the intermediate team are making great strides and appear to be ready to make the breakthrough to the senior ranks."

Frank founded the company in 1977 and he has two quarries in Ardrahan and Gort. He started in the sand and gravel business but changed to the quarrying industry in 1983. He recently opened a quarry in Gort and has a total of 25 employees. The name Higgins Quarries is printed on the front of the club's jerseys.

Ardrahan have set themselves a target of winning a senior championship in the next few years but for the moment, they are concentrating solely on gaining promotion from the intermediate grade. With so many fine players coming up through the ranks, it appears as if it's only a matter of time before Ardrahan's name is etched on the cup. A new force has arrived and they're determined to succeed.

ITH the national leagues at sen-ior and junior level starting on March 5, selectors are preparing for busy campaigns.

TWO IN A ROW FOR GRANAGH/ BALLINGARRY

It is celebration time again down Limerick way, as the ladies of Granagh/Ballingarry retained their All Ireland Club camogie championship title over first time finalists, Davitt's of Galway.

Played in the cruel November weather, it is little wonder that the initial reaction of captain, Kay Burke was, "fantastic, if I could warm up". The elated wingback went on to say, "The conditions were terrible, but I am thrilled to have won. Despite trailing 1-3 to 0-1 at half time, I felt we were doing well enough against the gale force wind".

The day in question was unfortunately one of the wettest and windiest days so far this year, and it was such a pity that two of the top clubs in the country were not allowed display In another corner of the changing area was the "Player of the Match", Eileen O'Brien. Sisters Breda and Beirne also collected their second All Ireland Club medals. Eileen, a seventeen-year-old Leaving Cert. student at St. Mary's of Charleville, scored 1-3 out of her sides' total of 2-4. While her goal might have been a trifle fortuitous, she was not giving anything away either. When asked if she went for goal, her reply with a grin simply said "yeah".

For centre-back Bernie Chawke, the 1999 club final was significant and memorable for several reasons. She was collecting her third All Ireland club medal - her first was exactly 21 years ago with another Limerick side, Ballyagran. "They are getting more precious as we go on", declared Bernie soon after the game. It was also a case of double celebration in the Chawke household, as husband Mike was trainer to the victorious side.

Mike has a long association with the Granagh/Ballingarry club, and although very happy with the win, he was disappointed with the unkindness of the weather: "I would like to see the final being played a month earlier. It is not fair on the players having to play in such conditions. Today, we could have had a fantastic match".

But one thing is for sure, despite the lashing wind and rain, there was nothing could take from the determined effort made by these top two teams to lift the ultimate honour in club

#### PJ Fulham reviews the events of 30 years ago in the world of camogie

This week we glean back to 1970 which was a memorable year, during which the first National Coaching Course was held in Gormanstown.

Coaching and Referees Seminars were held throughout the country and the All-Ireland Colleges Council was set up under the Presidency of Lily Spense, Antrim. At National level, camogic was given a considerable boost with the appointment of the Ardrunai Sighle Nic An Ultaigh to 'Cosac', the new Sports Council set up by the Government.

Apart from the All-Ireland Senior Championship for the 'O'Duffy' Cup and Senior Gael Linn, many competitions were in their infancy. There was no Intermediate, minor, junior Gael Linn or National Leagues.

Cork won the All-Ireland Senior Championship after a lapse of 29 years. They defeated Kilkenny 5-7 to 3-2 in the final and Anne Comerford was the captain. This great team went on to win four titles in a row. Cork team: Eleanor Cummins, Marie Costine, Hannah Dineen, Mary Joe Ryan, Shiela Dunne, Betty Sugrue, Anne McAuliffe, Anne Comerford, Pat Moloney, Liz Garvin, Peggy Dorgan, Rosie Hennessy. Crotty, Nuala Guilly. Liz Garvin won 'Miss Camogie Award' for 'Player of the Year.' Mary Moran became Uachtaran in 1979 and the referee of that day, Nancy Murray of Antrim, became Uachtaran in 1975.

The All-Ireland junior championship was in its 3rd year and Dublin won the 'New Ireland' Cup for the first time. overcoming Armagh on

a scoreline of 4-2 to 3-3. The captain was Vera Feely. This Dublin side went on to notch two more titles in the '70s but they have not won an All-Ireland junior crown since.

Phil McBride was widely know as the 'mother of the GAA in Armagh'. A member of the Trodden family, her love for Gaelic Games was handed down by her father. The family hotel in Armagh was the Associations headquarters in the city for several decades until the Ceannaras was opened in 1984. Phil provided accommodation, food and advice for generations of Armagh officials and players and her popularities knew no bounds. She was President of both the Armagh and Ulster Camogie Boards and played in the first game to take place in the county, in 1925.

Reproducing the sort of passion that had been a hallmark of their performances en route to last Saturday afternoon's final at Coolree, an eager FCJ Bunclody outfit regained the Leinster Post-Primary Schools senior 'A' camogie championship crown they last held in 1989 with a character-driven victory over holders Colaiste Bride of Enniscorthy.

In a fairly keenly contested fixture the Bunclody girls showed true grit and determination from the word go, taking the game to their more fancied opponents in what was an historic first-ever all-Wexford affair.

And the Niamh O'Connor-captained winners answered the call, forcing the pace of the game in the first-half

with a performance brimming with enthusiasm and lacking nothing in terms of ambition.

A strong feature of Bunclody's performance over the course of the first 25 minutes was the number of hooks and block downs they got in as they went about disrupting Colaiste Bride's game plan to in essence prevent the holders from finding their rhythm.

In fact, but for their poor rate of finishing the Bunclody challengers could have established a commanding lead come the break, by which juncture they had tallied 10 wides, but only managed to muster a flimsy 0-2 to 0-1 lead whilst assisted by the wind.

The contest evened

The contest evened out during the secondhalf, and towards the finish, with FCJ having stretched their advantage to 0-4 to 0-2, the Bunclody goal had a number of narrow escapes as the resolute Colaiste Bride girls came agonisingly close on a number of occasions to netting a potentially decisive goal.

In each instance the Bunclody defence applied sufficient pressure, and indeed it was the endeavour shown by the maroonclad backs which determined where the 'A' crown would go in 2000. Those defenders rarely conceded an inch as they strove to stop the Colaiste Bride forwards from expressing their undoubted skill.

The various Colaiste Bride lines, in fairness, tried their utmost. However, in too many instances they took too long to get into the game, by which stage the FCJ had established a foothold which they never allowed slip.

One wonders where the FCJ found the energy, but thankfully from their point-of-view it was all worth it as in the end they joined Mercy, Callan of Kilkenny at the head of the roll-of-honour, with six outright victories in the 40 year history of the competition.

Most encouraging is the fact that so many of the Bunclody contingent

are eligible for three more seasons, and with that statistic being repeated in the case of Colaiste Bride hopes are high that Wexford schools can keep the county to the fore in Leinster, at least. That's not forgetting St. Mary's, New Ross, who possess great potential too, and who no doubt are not too far away from adding their name to the

provincial title list.

Colaiste Bride have represented Wexford superbly over the past few seasons, and were unfortunate to come up against a slick St. Mary's of Charleville unit at the ultimate hurdle in the past two years.

In both deciders the Enniscorthy school competed with great pride and, certainly in the case of the 1998 All-Ireland nobody would have begrudged them a taste of All-Ireland glory.

For Bunclody, the focus now switches to the search for the glittering prize. They are scheduled to meet another traditional force from Munster, namely St. Mary's of Nenagh in county Tipperary in the semi-finals on March 4th.

While it is an away fixture for the Wexford school there should be no reason why they should not expect to do well in it. They have clawed out victories



## Camogie surges back to

CAMOGIE was played in Carrigaline in the 1940s and 50s but lapsed for many years

Revived in 1991 the club has enjoyed tremendous success and the future is looking bright.

When Kay and Billy Fitzgerald, Joe Lynch, Frances Power and Phil Jones gathered a group of enthusiastic girls in 1991 little did they envisage the successes that lay ahead.

It only took one year for the first trophy to sit on the sideboard when the South East U-10 Indoor title came to the club. The following year 1993 saw the girls field in U-15 South East league and record the first victory for the club. The South East Indoor title at U-10 and 11 again found their way to the now vibrant club in 1994 as they continued to grow in stature.

The U-16 team reached the club's first county final since 1954 when they met Ballygarvan in the U-16B county final. On the day they had to give way to their opponents but were determined to stick together and the big breakthrough came with a league final win over Eire Og as Melanie Fitzgerald led her side to first county success for 41

The U-11s again hit the success trail in 1996 with a South East title and went on to contest the county U-12 final the following year when they lost to Milford.

1999 has been the year when it's all come right for the hard working under-age committee who put in a huge effort both on the field in coaching and off it where they organise a successful weekly fund-raising disco.

It was no surprise to see the club enter a team in the junior league and championship competitions. Reaching the league finals in 1997 and 98 the teams experienced the heartbreak of losing to Ballygarvan and Milford respectively but, undaunted. they stuck together under the guidance of Des O'Connell and former St Finbarr's senior player Marie Scully to reach the Junior B championship final.

However, they went down to a star studded Inniscarra side.

A league final still beckoned and this time the Carrigaline girls were not going to falter against Youghal for a victory hard found since 1991.

DESPITE hectic extremely schedule endured by the Caoimhe Fitzpatrickcaptained outfit over the past month, Colaiste Bride coach Elva Moriarty is confident her juniors are fresh enough to press on with their search for All-Ireland honours.

Five of the under-16 team were involved with the seniors in their push for a third successive Leinster title last month while also assisting the juniors in their programme of fixtures, which included a demanding three-match semi-final marathon with FCJ Bunclody.

That saga reached its end on Wednesday afternoon of last week, and three days later Colaiste Bride underlined the fact that their hunger for victory hasn't abated with a convincing provincial final performance to Loreto overcome Kilkenny Thomastown.

"The girls are all extremely young and for that reason they tend to recover much faster than, for instance, the seniors would," explains Moriarty, disappointment at the loss of the senior crown was greatly eased as the juniors brought an eightyear famine to an end with a 3-7 to 1-3 victory over Loreto.

"We were just delighted to have qualified for the Leinster final," she said, "so to have won it was brilliant. I told the girls that we would have to make a strong start to stand any chance of beating I oreto, and they responded by scoring 2-3 within the first ten minutes.

"Still the rest of the game was pretty tough, out we were delighted to have the junior hampionship especially at losing the senior, but also because there wasn't p junior title in the school since 1992.

"In addition, it is a very young team, with most of them being only first and second years, and in that sense achieving success at this age suggests that Colaiste Bride will be to the fore in senior competition for some years to come."

However, it is the immediate future, and this weekend's grudge All-Ireland semi-final eacounter Charleville in nniscorthy that is ccupying the minds of and the Moriarty Caoimhe Fitzpatrick-

captained contingent.

In the past two All-Ireland senior finals the Cork girls inflicted defeat upon Cathedral town side, a fact which is serving to fuel Colaiste Bride's desire to gain retribution, albeit in a lower grade.

Three of the Leinster champions, namely the aforementioned Caoimhe Fitzpatrick (Marshalstown) together with Ursula Jacob (Oulart-The Ballagh) Catherine and O'Loughlin (Monageer-Boolavogue) were part of the senior set-up in last April's 3-10 to 0-5 final loss to Charleville.

And the manager is hopeful the experience gained by that trio will prove to be of immense benefit as the team looks to negotiate a tough penultimate hurdle against reigning champions St. Mary's.

"Having been part of a senior All-Ireland last year it should stand to them, and certainly I would be hoping that Ursula, Caoimhe and Catherine, who are all fabulous players, would provide leadership for the other players.

"Even while we have home venue we know Charleville are going to be red-hot favourites, and we are just hoping to put up a good challenge. We will definitely have to put in a 100% effort if we are to beat such quality opposition.

"Playing at home should help as we saw in the senior All-Ireland semi-final against Portumna of Galway last year, when the girls produced unforgettable display to win at Bellefield.

"I would be hoping that the juniors gain inspiration from that particular display and maybe even produce a repeat performance against Charleville.

"But, I have no doubt that if our girls play to their potential that we will be there or thereabouts

Full-forward Ciara O'Connor pointed soon afterwards to leave the scoreline reading 1-3 to 0-0 with nine minutes





WHILE ADMITTING the FCJ came up against the probable All-Ireland Post-Primary Schools sénior 'A' camogie champions, manager Kinsella Rory expressed his satisfaction with the courageous performance his charges put in for the duration of last Saturday's semi-final against St. Mary's of Nenagh.

"At the start of the year if we were to think that we would be Leinster champions we would have been extremely happy. I am definitely extremely happy with the effort our girls put in today.

"Probably we could have got a few more scores, but," he admits, "we were never going to win against such superb opposition. Still, a lot of this Bunclody team is very strong, with six third years, so there's definitely a bright future in store for this

St. Mary's coach Ger Dullea praised Bunclody, saying: "The FCJ effort was superb. They gave it everything right from the throw-in and matched us in most areas of the field.

"However, Eimear McDonnell was the difference and she really showed her class out there, scoring 3-5. The plan was to get the ball into her as quickly as possible, and the plan worked a treat."

# Big hearted FCJ bow out gracefully

The final margin of 12 points does scant justice to the endeavour shown by the Wexford crew, who competed with grim determination even after being rattled by a brace of goals within the opening eleven minutes which left them facing an uphill task.

Bunclody made a brisk start to force the early pace, but as the minutes ticked by a number of the team appeared to be suffering from big match nerves, which was something St. Mary's preyed upon as, through the precision shooting of full-forward Eimear McDonnell, they established a commanding platform from which they crafted a truly deserving victory.

Those members of the team who may have been caught off guard during the opening quarter, however, proved their undoubted class thereafter as they redoubted their efforts to help ensure the FCJ competed on equal terms with the Munster queenpins for the closing three-quarters.

Tellingly, even while meeting with stiff opposition, St. Mary's continued to dominate the scoresheet as they out-shot Leinster's finest by 1-7 to 0-3 over those last 37 minutes, with the aforemention of dMcDonnell finishing the game with a handsome

personal tally of 3-5.

Prior to Bunclody's first appearance at this stage of the competition in eleven years some concern was expressed about their chances of advancing a step further if there was not a significant increase in productivity by the attack.

In the four games immediately preceding last weekend's, the Niamh O'Connor-captained contingent finished with totals of 1-2 in three of them, while they managed just four points in their provincial final triumph over holders Colaiste Bride of Enniscorthy.

Certainly, and particularly after half-time, Bunclody threatened to supplement their first-half account, which came to 0-2, but the tight-marking St. Mary's made sure that clear-cut scoring opportunities continued to be at a premium.

It must also be remembered that, owing to a congested fixtures schedule, most of the senior team were involved in championship ties for the past five weeks, with five of Saturday's first-12 being called upon twice each of those weeks to also help the cause of the juniors. Inevitably such demand on the players took its toll.

In fact, but for the sheer brilliance of Fiona Kavanagh between the sticks for the FCJ, the opposition could have finished with an even more convincing margin of victory, but nonetheless they march on to a final date with Kinvara of Galway, who had an easy win over Magherafelt of county Derry, also on Saturday last.

The annexing of the Leinster championship title is surely something Bunclody are deriving some consolation from following their heartbreaking exit. They should be extremely proud of their achievements this term, and most especially because they competed so strongly in not alone the senior but also the junior grade.

Considering that just three of the team are Leaving Cert students, and that the large percentage of the remainder are only in third year, the temptation to be hopeful for Bunclody's chances of being major contenders on the senior front for years to come is something that cannot be resisted.

Manager Rory Kinsella too deserves huge praise, with his infectious enthusiasm rubbing off on his charges while through his undoubted knowledge of the game he helped charter Bunclody's way back to the top in the province.

He was in the happy

position of welcoming key attacker Aoife Druhan back for the penultimate round encounter after the Bunclody club star had been forced out of competitive action through a hand injury she sustained in the replayed Leinster quarter-final against St. Mary's of New Ross.

She, together with the likes of Josie Dwyer and Niamh O'Connor, were prominent as the FCJ applied some early pressure, but it was at the opposite end that the ice was broken when Eimear McDonnell pointed a free in the fifth minute.

That score came a short while after Bunclody netminder Kavanagh had brilliantly outsmarted the full-forward in a one-on-one, but McDonnell eventually found the net in the sixth minute as she rounded off a strong surge involving Anna Woods and Denise Ryan with an unstoppable shot.

Josie Dwyer got the visitors off the mark when making amends for an earlier miss with a pointed eight minute free, but as O'Connell engineered a second goal out of nothing in the eleventh minute the odds were beginning to stack up against the maroon-clad contingent (2-1 to 0-1).

Bunclody's work ethic showed a marked increase subsequent to that torrid opening, but despite their best efforts scores were still few and far between, and after Josie Dwyer exchanged pointed frees with Sheena Howard, the Nenagh side's interval advantage was extended to 2-3 to 0-2 through a further minor from the stick of O'Connell, who

was a member of the Tipperary team which, last September, won the All-Ireland senior camogie championship for the firsttime.

certainly the various
switches proved
worthwhile as the FCJ
took charge for large
chunks of the closing-half.

Scores for them, however, were not forthcoming, and Nenagh actually had increased the margin to 2-7 to 0-4 after 43 minutes, with Niamh O'Connor having weighed in with what proved to be Bunclody's closing couple of noints.

O'Connell sealed the issue three minutes shy of full-time when rattling the net to complete her hattrick, but St. Mary's were denied two further greenflags as Fiona Kavanagh made unforgettable saves in quick succession from the lively Anna Woods.

Denise Ryan roundedoff proceedings with a point three minutes into added-time, and as the final whistle sounded the disappointment of all those associated with Bunclody was clear to see, with members of the Nenagh team offering some consoling words to the vanquished.



So we had new, first-time champions for a new century."

Having lost seven finals, few begrudged Tipp their success. I is surely great for the game and also hugely encouraging to see famous hurlers like -Michael Cleary and Colm Bonnar getting involved in their backroom.

Like Jackman, their 5-a-side expertise was vital and their pro file certainly helped bring much needed media attention.

But, have no fear. This Kilkenny team, which includes so much class and young talent, were ultimately beaten by a whisker and will definitely be back!

## DOWNEY ALL THE YEARS

n the course of 25 years playing camogie at ful. the highest level, Ann Downey inevitably encountered hundreds of new faces. Colleagues, opponents, managers, trainers, supporters, officials. But it wasn't until well into her final season that she met Bobby Jackman from Windgap.

What Ann thought of Bobby, who took over midway through

1999 as coach to the Kilkenny senior camogie team, is not our concern here. (For the record, she was impressed.) What Bobby, who up to then "had never met her, only read about her", thought of Ann, is, however. Within a couple of training sessions the secret of both her success and her longevity was clear to him.

"What came across most was her fierce determination. Fierce determination. That's what I'll always remember about her. It amazed me, to be honest, because Ann was injured at the time and you could tell it was killing her not to be out there. The fortnight before the All Ireland final she made a huge effort in training and was disappointed not to be on the team. Her legs weren't guite what they were, understandably. It was only then it struck me that she'd been around for a quarter of a century.

"With her level of fitness, you could see why. In training she was well able to keep up with everybody. Her will to win amazed me. Though we didn't win the All Ireland, it wasn't for lack of effort on Ann's part. She wanted to win as much as anybody else did. Maybe even more

Sad to bow out with a defeat. But, as Ann Downey concedes, if somebody had told her at the beginning of her career that she would end it with twelve All Ireland senior medals to her credit, what else could she have been but grateful? "I had a wonderful innings.

Losing to Tipperary - Ann came on as a sub at the start of the second half - didn't change the fact either that at her peak she was a colossus of the age, a one-woman power station in the middle of the field for clubs (St Paul's and Lisdowney) and county. Hunger, energy, forcefulness, the fierce determination that wowed Bobby Jackman: Ann Downey had it by the bucket-

As had her sister Angela. The twin Downeys from Ballyragget were both blessed with attitude, instinct and hurling intelligence. But one of them was blessed with more besides, with genius in her wrists and dynamite in her camán. It wasn't Ann.

The messiah was her sister. At a pretty early stage she copped on to that small fact. Copped on that it was Angela and not she who was the chosen one. Angela and not she who belonged to the Kilkenny stylistic brotherhood of Meagher and

> Langton and Keher. The old, apocryphal-sounding story that follows has been related often before. No apologies for telling it once more.

The girls were just beginning to make a name for themselves on the camogie fields of the county, with Angela making rather the bigger name of the two, when a customer in their dad's butcher's shop pointed at Ann one day and enquired, "Is she the good one or the bad one?"

Shem Downey loyally replied that both of them were good and Ann, though possibly not the customer, departed mollified. "After that, I suppose, reality eventually dawned. Angela was the good one, I wasn't quite so good. But I can't say I had a problem with it. If we were losing in a match, people wouldn't be looking to me - I wouldn't be looking to me - to win it. They'd be looking to Angela."

Times and fashions change. Against Cork at Parnell Park last August it was Ann Downey to whom Kilkenny looked to save the All Ireland semi-final. The mistake Cork made, she insists, was to believe that she might. "Too busy thinking I was Angela and was going to do something. No chance. No way would I turn a match."

She was thrown in with ten minutes left and her county losing touch. "Keep an eye on her," she heard Tom Nott, the Cork coach, shout to his charges. For five minutes they needn't have bothered. Kilkenny were wobbling horribly, the champions four points ahead and raining in flurries of potential knockout blows. For five minutes all Losing to Tipperary didn't change Ann Downey in full flight in 1999 All Ireland Final Ann could do was watch as a line of black and amber jerseys beat out ball after ball and a line of white and red


jerseys beat them back in again.

#### TURNED THE GAME

Then at last she got a sniff. A clearance came towards her, whizzed through her legs, beat Eithne Duggan behind her, was picked up by Martina Maher and despatched to the Cork net by

Margaret Comerford. Into injury time and a point separating the sides, Ann finally managed to touch the sliotar. She transferred it to Gillian Dillon and roared at her to run. Gillian ran and won a free that Sinead Millea sent to the Cork net with practically the last puck of the game.

into their first All Ireland final in five years. And Ballyragget's second-finest didn't turn matches..?

The odd part of it, Angela Downey-Browne points out, "is that people didn't realise that Ann was a far more talented all-round sportsperson than myself. She's played international squash with Ireland, interprovincial hockey for the South East. And on the camogie field she was always much more involved than I was. I'd have my own patches of action but she'd be going for the full hour, all around the centre of the field."

Her father Shem, an All Ireland medallist with Kilkenny in 1947 and the hero of the 1950 National League final, was the other constant in Ann's career. When they were younger, Shem Downey wouldn't allow his daughters to swim during the summer; in his eyes you were committed to one sport and one sport

only. "The skill we had, we got from him," Ann acknowledges "And there's still no fear of him. In the county final this year I was blocked down twice. 'Drop shot,' I could hear him in the stand."

The past 25 years have been enormously rewarding for her albeit seriously draining on the pocket. "But you don't count the cost when you're doing something you enjoy." She captained Kilkenny to two All Ireland triumphs ("the county's bigges strength for years was that we had good young players coming in to replace the older ones"), was a member of the GAA touring party to the Toronto Skydome in 1991 and nominates Cork's Sandy Fitzgibbon as her toughest opponent ("she was so fast, i was impossible to keep up with her"). All in all, not bad going to the woman with the apparent misfortune to be born the sister o the Greatest Camogie Player Ever.

The game's profile, or lack thereof, remains her favourite hobby horse. "The All Ireland ladies' football semi-finals were live on TV this year. Why weren't the camogle semi-finals? We need more publicity, we need better publicity, we need a persor at the top with experience in the marketing area, And I know I've said this a million times before, but why not have a camogic match as curtainraiser to a big hurling game? That would make people realise how good the standard is. As it is, camogie is los ing the PR war."

The week before Kilkenny's Croke Park date with Tipperary Ann Downey told a friend that were she given a choice the fol lowing weekend of winning a million pounds on the Lottery of winning an All Ireland medal, she wouldn't hesitate for a moment, "An All Ireland medal, of course."

Well, what else would you have expected this woman to say'

It's just necessary to keep the players ticking over as a lot of them are involved with club and second/third level colleges.


"Our aim is to qualify for the league semi-final, which we now look like doing after wins over Down and Galway," he added.

As can be seen from the brief biographies on this page, all six are deserving recipients.


The awards are further proof of the Lord Mayor's determination to honour Cork people who have achieved outstanding feats.

#### Calling all Glen Rovers Camogie players past and present



#### ST. MARY'S, NENAGH

St. Mary's Nenagh is one of the leading camogie schools in the country. Camogie was first played competitively at St. Mary's in the early eighties. The first All-Ireland success came in 1991 when St Mary's captured Munster and All-Ireland Junior titles. They made back to back titles in 1992. The school's greatest achievement came in 1994 when they won the All-Ireland Colleges Senior Championship title.

St. Mary's have lived in the shadow of St. Mary's, Charleville in the past few years. Victory over Charleville in this season's Murster semi-final was a huge step forward as the Cork school had been reigning All-Ireland champions for the past four years. Tipperary senior camogie team won their first All-Ireland senior title last September. Five past pupils, Claire Madden, Suzanne Kelly, Noelle Kennedy, Ciara Gaynor and Graine Shanahan played their part. Two leaving Cert students, who will line out with St. Mary's today, Eimear McDonnell and Sheena Howard were also part of Tipperary's success.

#### SEAMOUNT COLLEGE, KINVARA

Seamount, Kinwara made an instant impact in 1998. In their first season in competitive camogie, they carried off Connacht and All-Ireland Colleges Junior Championships. These players have progressed to challenge for the All-Ireland Colleges Senior B title. This success must be viewed in the light that hockey is the main sport in the College.

Many Callanan, Teresa Kavanagh and Eileen Keane have made a huge investment in terms of

Their ability to impart the skills of the game is reflected in the number of past and present pupils who have worn the maroon and white of Galway. The Curtin, Kerins and Huban sisters are among those who have done their school and county proud.

#### ST. CUAN'S, CASTLEBLAKENEY

This is St. Cuan's College first appearance in an All-Ireland Senior Final. In 1984, the school were defeated in the semi-final stage by St. Patrick's, Cork and appeared in the 1994 All-Ireland Junior Final. With Approximately 220 mixed students it is a great achievement for our school to contest this All-Ireland. In 1996, the Senior Hurling team reached the All-Ireland Senior B Final and both teams have been trained by a teacher in the school, Collette Walsh. She has got great assistance with today's team from three students in the school, Owen Lynskey, David Kelly and Shane Connelly. The school principal is Mr. Eamonn O'Donoghue.

Past pupils of the school that hold All-Ireland Senior and Junior medals with Galway include Sharon Glynn, Michelle Glynn, Bridget Kilgannon, Carmel Hannon, Veronica Sweeney and Aine Hillary.

#### ST. PATRICK'S, SHANNON

St. Patrick's, Shannon has a strong Camogie tradition over the last twenty-five years. Many Clare Colleges titles have been won in that period. At Munster Colleges level three Senior titles, one Intermediate, one Junior A and three first Year Blitz titles have been won. The greatest feat of all was the All-Ireland Senior title win in 1982. Fr. Michael McNamara has been a constant presence with the Senior Teams over that twenty-five year period. The school is very grateful to the local clubs. Wolfe Tones na Sionna, Newmarket-on-Fergus, Kilkishen and Sixmilebridge for the constant supply of young players. This year's Senior side sees one player from Kilmaley and Feakle clubs which do not usually figure in St. Patrick's team line-outs.

On route to today's final, St. Patrick's defeated Sacred Heart, Carrignavar, St. Aidan's, Cork, St. Declan's, Kilmacthomas and Coachford Community School in Munster and St. Brendan's, Birr in the All-Ireland semi-final. In 1987, St. Patrick's won the All-Ireland Colleges B Hurling title, thereby making it one of the very few schools to win All-Ireland Titles in Camogie and Hurling.

**IHE Limerick County Camogie Board has** secured a financial windfall after gaining a major sponsor for its intercounty teams. The deal, which has not yet been launched, restricts county secretary Clare O'Herlihy from divulging any details except to say, "It's a very positive step and I am very impressed with the proceedings."

Last year is history for the Shannonsiders but having lost to Cork in the senior championship in the opening round, they are now beginning to find a way back.

More important too is the participation of the players themselves in working to improve their own structures. After a recent race night organised by the clubs, the coffers are healthier to the value of £10,000.

That amount of money should be able to help most county clubs. However, Limerick do not have a big selection - there are 24 clubs in the county, five of which contest the senior championship.

The emergence of Granagh/Ballingarry in

the past two years, claiming back to back All Ireland club titles, somehow does not seem to be filtering through to the county team. With almost half of the green and white made up from the club champions, the lowly populated club scene lends to a limited pick.

Limerick have never won the most prized ossession in inter-county camogic, the O'Duffy Cup, but there is growing optimism

for future years.
CBS Brother, Philip Ryan is the new team manager and with their win over Antrim last Sunday, it is still possible they could qualify

for the league play-offs. Their progress at the moment though is measured more by performances than by winning

Selector Anne Marie O'Keeffe and trainer Jerry O'Donoghue complete a formidable backroom team.

Teacher Anne Marie is well known for her involvement with the successful St Mary teams in Charleville, and will bring with her wealth of knowledge from their glory days.

Jerry O'Donoghue by profession, is a personal trainer who came on board at the end of last season's championship.

Proof that camogie is on the way up was seen by all last autumn, when the county's U-18 team played well before losing by four points to Cork in the Munster Championship.

"We have an U-14 development programme which is now in its third year," said county secretary O'Herlihy, who sees this as another reason why standards are improving.

Limerick include Eileen O'Brien, who was a recipient of The Examiner youth sports award and is of rare quality. Her two sisters Breda and Bernie join her on the team.

The sun has gone down on Dublin camogie - what else can one surmise from its descent from the top? Once the queens of the catwalk with a record 26 All Ireland titles, it is now 15 years since the O'Duffy Cup rested Lifleyside, but things are gradually changing in the capital.

Last July, Armagh man and current Chairman of the Ulster Council, Tom Monaghan came on board. After Dublin's exit from the '99 championship, the focus was firmly set on the future. Slowly under the guidance of their new trainer, the girls' outlook became more positive. According to team captain, Germaine Noonan, "Tom gets into your mind and makes you much more focused on the game".

Training at the moment is confined to the weekends - Fridays rights and Saturday. This is an arrangement that saits all as it does not interfere with club activity. The mood is very much upbeat within the county. Players and count board alike are joining forces in a major fundraising activity, the first of which is a race night in the Ballyboden/St. Enda's club on Friday April 28th.

She progressed to refereeing - in charge of the first All Ireland Junior Final in '68, and later two Senior Finals in '73 and '81.

Phyllis began her term of office as Uachtaran in '97, a crown she took over from Down's Belle O'Loughlin. Since her inception, she can be proud of her many achievements - live coverage by RTE of the All Ireland Finals, Schwarzkopf Ireland Ltd.'s sponsorship of the Inter Provincial Garl Linn competitions, plans for a Shinty/Camogie tournament, the "Camogie Abu" annual magazine, inaugural Rest of Ireland team selection...just to mention a few.
