## WGPA making things better for county ladies' football and camogie players

### Jennifer caught up with the outgoing chair Aoife Lane

THE year was 2015. It was a Tuesday, January 20th, to be exact. And, at a reception in the Smock Alley Theatre in Dublin, a group of seven women were instrumental in launching the WGPA (Women's Gaelic Players Association).

The seven founding members included its chairperson Aoife Lane, Fiona McHale, Anna Geary, Valerie Mulcahy, Kate Kelly, Deirdre Murphy and Gemma Begley.

This was an association set up to improve the playing, personal and professional lives of women playing at the highest level at intercounty level and now provides a solid support to players all over Ireland who represent their county in camogic and ladies' football.

The year is now 2019, January has come, and with the cold comes further changes in the association. With four of its founding members stepping down, including former Cork camogie-winning captain Anna Geary, Clare camogie native Deirdre Murphy, Mayo footballer Fiona McHale and the great leader, Aoife Lane of Galway, there now is a rejuvenated executive with 11 members on the board, Maria Kinsella from Carlow will now chair the Association and will work to build further on the solid foundations set in place by these inspirational women.

Having made great strides in supporting women's Gaelic games, the Association is now going from strength to strength.

And, while it takes a strong collective of women to bring about change for women, there was one lady who showed incredible leadership in bringing about this positive change; a woman who was instrumental in pushing for more, a female who wanted better and demanded better for intercounty players.

Aoife Lane was the catalyst in forming the WGPA. I asked Aoife a number of questions about her four years at the helm of the Association – a role she found both challenging and rewarding. How do you feel about moving on from leading the WGPA, a significant movement in ladies' football and camogie?

I feel very content with my decision to move on, I think the time is right for me, but also I feel confident for the organisation and happy that it is in safe hands. would be protective of it in some ways and worried that all would be okay, but you can't be too precious – things move on without you, there are very few areas in life where you are irreplaceable.

The organisation is solid now, it knows itself, it is moving into a very sustainable environment and has excellent people at the forefront, none more so than all the players who are supportive of the organisation, and who want to contribute to continually improving things for ladies' football and camogie.

You have made many strides since founding the association in 2014, such as introducing scholarships and grants to support players in their education and sport. What do you feel has been the greatest achievement of the WGPA so far?

The greatest achievement is securing Government funding, with a special mention to Deirdre Murphy from Clare for leading that for the WGPA. There are so many good things about the funding; it is a joint project with ladies' football and camogie, it is acknowledgement from the highest office in the land, it is equal funding across all codes and grades and it is money ring fenced to support a high-performance playing environment for adult county players. It has opened a very important door for the county player and is a show of respect and support for women who reach the highest level possible in their chosen

#### What were the toughest obstacles you have faced?

The toughest obstacles are always related to issues where players or teams cannot represent their county in their sport. There are so many reasons for this; injury, personal circumstances, team issues, fixture clashes and so on, but regardless, it's always disappointing and the WGPA aren't always able to help, or know exactly how to help.

The organisation will always do its best, but equally has to be better in those cases. In many situations, players do such brilliant work in overcoming obstacles at a local level displaying brilliant leadership qualities.

#### What would be your vision for the WGPA in the years ahead?

Vision questions are always hard! I guess I would like that the organisation has a greater set of resources to be able to help more and continue to make things better. The WGPA is probably working at its maximum, so it needs greater resourcing to move forward and I am confident that will happen.

I would also like that the organisation is to the forefront of all players' minds as a helpful, supportive, consistent, challenging entity. The organisation definitely needs to build greater awareness levels amongst all members. The bottom line is that every player across every squad in both codes feels equally appreciated and supported.

On a personal level, you seem to have a busy schedule between your work commitments and the many committees you are part of, as well as leading the executive through an exciting time of change in women's sport in Ireland. How have you juggled it all? Has working for the WGPA been time consuming?

I guess it was a pleasure and, for the most, the experience of a lifetime. Working with the other members of the executive was so much fun and we found our way together to do something that is really positive. It needs new leadership now and new ideas, but we set out to make things better and we achieved that.

It probably has got more

time-consuming, and there have been elements I found really challenging, but the change is as much for the organisation as it is for me.

I also got so much from the WGPA in terms of my own personal and professional development, a leadership programme, trips to the US, meeting Billie Jean King and a whole collection of new friends.

I look back now and am happy and content about it all, it's a nice way to finish. I'm sure it's like players who retire on their own terms after winning an All-Ireland – the best way to go.

What has been the high-

light of being involved in the WGPA?

The highlight is the relationships I built; both with friends and professionals. I was in rooms and conversations that there is no way I would have been near if I hadn't been involved with the WGPA. It gave me a leg-up into a world that I was fascinated with and I will always be grateful for that.

In one sentence, how would you describe the WGPA?

The WGPA is supportive, reflective, player-led, grounded and player-focused.

A HUGE amount of work at underage saw a total of 66 clubs registered and enter the various competitions organised by the juvenile board through an extremely busy 2018.

Clubs were well catered for with the Juvenile Board running off competi-

tions for all age groups.

The U8 to U11s participated in Go Games blitzes while the U12s had three Cluster Blitzes followed by the hugely successful U12 leagues, organised so well on a new basis by GPC member Gerard Corcoran.

Without doubt, the U12 leagues were a huge success the decision to change the format and not grade the teams into A B or C sections as in previous years was an excellent idea.

The new structure was a resounding success the league was divided in to eight sections with six teams in each section each team played each other giving each club five games.

On completion of each of the sections of their games, the teams were then split into three groups of 16, based on their finishing position in their sec-

Group 1 consisted of the winners and second placed teams in each section, Group 2 was made up of the teams finishing in positions three and four, and Group 3 included the clubs in positions five and six in each section. These groups then played off in a knockout competition.

She says: "I would have close ties to it because I would have played with Mary O'Connor who is the brains behind all of it.



"Maybe I'm too old to benefit from that but at least my nieces and nephews which I think it's important for boys to grow up with this equal status in media, and hopefully it will mean we won't have to have the same conversations in 20 years' time."

"Seeing girls going around with their Cork camogie jersey rather than the Cork hurling or football jersey is one thing that has stood out. There's a lot going around in their club jersey which I think is even better again that they are so proud of where they come from."

#### Slaughtneil achievements deserve more recognition, says McKinley

Slaughtnell camogle manager Dominic 'Woody' McKinley has described what he feels is a 'disgraceful' lack of recognition in the wider media for his team as they prepare to create history by winning three consecutive All-Ireland titles when they face Wexford's St Martin's in a few weeks.

McKinley pointed to the huge numbers attending the last two Ulster finals when Slaughtneil came up against his home club.

"In Dungannon there last

year there was 4,000 people at the Ulster final," explained McKinloy

"In the year previous, it was played in Glen, Maghera. There were over 5,500 people, the biggest crowd ever recorded for a camogie match in Ulster.

"Teams like Loughgiel, Slaughtneil, it's about everybody here. It's not just because we are in the position we are in now. We are in a strong position to talk about it and maybe can connect to the story.

"The coverage they get for

all this work they are putting in is nil. I was sitting in someone's house the year we played the game in Maghera to see BBC and UTV. Spent half an hour wasted thinking they would say something about it. But not a word! I think it's disgraceful."

McKinley insisted that the issue had not been talked about within the group, but he felt he needed to raise it for the sake of equality, name-checking the lack of coverage Down's Clonduff camogie team have received in reaching the All-Ireland

Intermediate final.

"I am not speaking to the girls about this. The girls don't want any limelight, they are not like that. But as a person looking in and seeing what is going on..." said McKinley. "At the start when I came

"At the start when I came in, I had watched camogie and never really paid attention to it. I hadn't the respect that I have for them now. You start working with them and get the vibes and the feelings. They care so deeply about this.

"And to get to the level they have got, anybody that knows anything about sport, there is serious dedication to it. Serious time and effort to get to that level and then to maintain it and stay there? You are talking about a unique group of players."

McKinley insists the commitment from the Slaughtneil players show to their sport surpasses any senior men's group he has coached. It has been said within the club that the camogie team are setting the standards that the men's teams, who have won multiple hurling and football Ulster club titles, have to reach.

McKinley, who stepped

down from the role of joint Antrim senior hurling manager at the end of last summer, stated, "The amount of time and effort they put in, I have never worked with a group of girls like this in my life. I always say to those girls, I wish sometime in my life I could get a group of boys like this.

"We're going in to February and March every year, so these girls are training nearly every other day. We train Wednesday, Friday, and Sunday morning. And then they have their two gym sessions to do as well."

#### Karate and camogie funding hit by governance issues

Irish karate hasn't received a cent of Government funding this year, despite the fact that the sport is one of the new inclusions at the Tokyo Olympics in 2020.

This has been blamed on a major split in its national governing body, with two bodies — ONAKAI and Karate Ireland ONAKAI — now arguing that they represent the sport.

ONAKAI received a €6,000

grant last year, but Sport Ireland has not given it any allocation yet for 2019, saying that the grant is dependent "on the successful closure of ongoing governance items".

"We have tried to work with (Irish) karate but there's been a very significant split," said Sport Ireland's director of High Performance, Paul McDermott, pointing out that Sport Ireland offered to intervene with a mediator last summer, but to no avail.

The row has now gone to the International Karate Federation and in the meantime athletes, some of whom have already written to Sport Ireland, have been left in limbo, with no funding for their first-ever chance at Olympic qualification.

"Athletes are suffering," McDermott acknowledged, but he said that was not Sport Ireland's responsibility.

"Look, we have extensive experience of the connection

between [good] governance and performance. When we meet with a board of any kind and they say: 'We're having this absolute fight, but we're going to make sure our athletes aren't impacted', our response is: 'You cannot have open warfare at board level and think athletes won't be af-

"It's for that governing body to fix their own issues because you won't have a performance or a system and you can forget about Olympic participation until you resolve that issue. You are not adhering to your obligations to your athletes. Simple as that."

Camogie and table tennis are two other sports who may quibble about yesterday's grants

Both of them got the same 'core' funding as last year (€395,000 for camogie and €107,000 for table tennis), but virtually all other sports saw their grants increased.

McDermott said that camogie's did not increase because it lost its CEO last year and has still not finished the process of appointing her replacement, saying: "We made a decision that we're not going to support that until there's a bit of strength and leadership there with the appointment of

a new CEO."

He said table tennis still has some governance issues to resolve after a new group took over the sport in the past year.

#### Bal's camogie golden jubilee celebrated

Camogie club chairman Michael Pattwell welcomed everyone and get proceedings under way. A moment's silence was observed for the deceased players, coaches and mentors of 50 years ago.

## Cork progress to camogie league knockout stage

CORK made it three Littlewoods National Camogie League Division 1 wins on the trot as they saw off Waterford at Castle Road on Sunday.

Following the victory over Tipperary and a walkover against Wexford the previous week, it leaves Cork with full points ahead of their last match against Galway on February 24th. It guarantees a spot in the knockout stages and pitches that game against the Tribeswomen as a play-off for top spot in the group.

Courcey Rovers star Saoirse McCarthy marked her first start with a goal and a point from corner forward, while Ciara Mc-Carthy (Aghabullogue) showed up well at midfield on her bow.

Cork manager Paudie Murray was pleased overall with how his side did, while acknowledging that there is room for improvement.

'We got the job done,' he said.
'We played quite well for ten
minutes but, beyond that, I felt
we were quite mediocre, the
ball in was poor a lot of the time.

'One positive was that we blooded quite a few new players, Giara McCarthy started at midfield in her first game and showed a lot to say that she has a good future there. Saoirse McCarthy had her first start too and did well, so from that point of view it was a good outing.'

As well as the McCarthys, Briege Corkery and Niamh O'Callaghan were handed starts while Julia White made a welcome return from injury and goalkeeper Amy Lee, Katie McCarthy, Cliona Healy and Siobhán Hutchison were all handed game-time tob.

Three goals in quick succession put the game in Cork's control and a 3-3 to 0-5 halftime lead was never going to be relinquished.

While the Rebels played against the wind, Waterford couldn't take advantage as they had three early wides and Saoirse McCarthy had the game's opening score. Though Orla Hickey and Beth Carton had Waterford ahead, Orla Cronin and Julia White set up Amy O'Connor for the first goal and Saoirse McCarthy added another soon after before O'Connor got her second.

Further points from O'Connor and Linda Collins ensured Cork were comfortable by the break, with Carton adding to Waterford's tally, though the outcome looked decided even at that early stage.



While Niamh Rockett did cut the gap slightly on the resumption, Orla Cotter (two) and Ciara McCarthy extended Cork's breathing space and, as the substitutes' bench was emptied, the game petered out.

Galway's big win over Wexford leaves them with two wins from two, meaning a win for them this weekend against Waterford would leave them level with Cork ahead of the last game.

Theoretically, Cork's weekend off allows for some concentrated training, but unfortunately for Murray it's not as simple as that. Nevertheless, he is anticipating a stiff test when the team do get back back in action.

'The Ashbourne is on next week so we won't see some of

the girls until after that's over,' he says.

'It's hard to get a lot done and then you don't want to be overdoing things when those players do come back as I'm conscious of the kind of training we've been doing – we're not training for championship, let's put it that way.

'In February, it's always a fairly heavy slog and you can see in the games that we've played that the girls have started to tire around the 40-minute mark. It's not an easy workload.

'The Galway game will be tough, most likely winnertakes-all for the top spot in the group and what people would say is an easier semi-final. It'll tell us where we're at and be a good test.

'Galway have been going well so far, they've played a strong team in all of their games and it definitely won't be easy but that's not a bad thing.'



# The pinnacle of colleges camogie

TWO years ago, in a first for camogie, the National Sports Campus, in Abbotstown, became the only venue outside of a university to host the Ashbourne Cup competitions.

The CCAO third-level organising committee has continued the trend, and today and tomorrow the Ashbourne Cup will take place in Mallow GAA complex. The weekend will en-compass the Purcell Cup and the Fr

Meachair Cup Last year, Irish company Cúl Sliot-ars became the main sponsors of the weekend. The Ashbourne Cup is camo gie's oldest and most prestigious com-petition, and the highlight of college sporting life for camogie players. The players will have been training since college term and will be ready for the intense competition of the three cups.

The Ashbourne Cup is the highest level in colleges camogie, and features many of the current stars of the game, many of them of All Ireland and All Star level. It was the brainchild of Agnes O'Farrell, founder member and president of the UCD camogie club, who later served as president of the Camogie Association.

In 1915, she persuaded Lord Ash-

In 1915, she persuaded Lord Ash-bourne to donate a trophy for the ca-mogic intervarsity competition. The first game took place between UCC and UCD and the competition grew as more universities entered the competition. Since 2010, the Purcell Cup has been staged alongside the Ashbourne. Since 1977, the Purcell Cup has served as the third-level colleges Division 2 cham-pionship and was donated by Una Pur-cell, president of the Camogic Associ-ation, and her husband, Pádraig Puiration, and her husband, Pádraig Puirséil, who was GAA correspondent for The Irish Press.

Mary Immaculate College beat Poly-technic in the first final. The format is similar to the Ashbourne Cup: in the final stages of the competition, six teams are divided into two groups of three, in which each team play two

The top two in each group go through to the cup semi-finals, while the bottom team in each group plays in the final of the Purcell Shield. The Purcell Cup winners play the Ashbourne Shield runners-up the following year to determine promotion and rel-egation. Having initially been established for non-university colleges in 1977, the standard of the team rather than the type of university determined whether colleges should participate in the Ashbourne Cup or the Purcell Cup.

Colleges who do not compete in the Ashbourne and Purcell Cups play for chair Cup, which was mau gurated in 1986.

Close on 400 camogie players will descend on the Mallow complex this afternoon for the six semi-finals in the three competitions. Many of the players are already involved in intercounty camogie, but it will be a huge privilege to represent their college on such a prestigious stage.

Many players have made the breakthrough to inter-county camogie thanks to the Ashbourne, and intercounty managers will be in attendance to scout talent.

Last season, UL made it three in a

On Sunday, the focus will be on the Ashbourne, Purcell, and Meachair Cup finals and the Ashbourne Shield final. The finals get underway at 12pm,

#### Clubs and board set up vital courses

WHILE teams are only just gu ting back to the training pitches, there are plenty of courses being organised as coaches and mentors prepare for what they hope will be a long busy season on the playing fields

The County Board Children's Officer has been ensuring club mentors are compliant with legislation regarding vetting which must now all be done on-line. Previous paper vetting is now no longer valid so mentors are reminded to log onto the national camogie web site and

apply to be vetted. The county officer has also or-ganised three Child Safe 1 courses which must be done by all mentors and coaches who have anybody up to the age of 18 on their teams. Already two of these courses have taken place one before Christmas and one Wednesday last and both were fully booked out.

It's a similar story with next Wednesday's course which goes ahead in Castle Road. A Safeguard 2 course for children's officers and club-designated people had to be postponed due to bad weather recently. Any-body interested in doing this is asked to email Childrensof-

ficer.cork@camogie.ie.
There are also foundation courses 'Get a Grip' planned on March 3 in Cloghroe. On Sunday, March 10 the same course is being organised for Imokilly clubs. The day before there is a course at Midleton GAA, which is already full. Any clubs interested should contact Eoin Kennedy, chairman of Imokilly. Applicants must be 17 years and over as coaching Ireland will not issue certificates to U16s.

A Level One course open to those who have already completed a foundation level 'Get A Grip' and have one-year coaching experience is being organised. Participants must be available

to attend all three-course dates otherwise coaching Ireland will not issue certificates. These will take place on March 1, 2 and 9 at Bishopstown GAA club. Anybody interested in attending can contact development officer Esther O'Leary at developmenttofficer.cork@camogie.ie.
The Munster Council have or-

ganised a coaching and ref men-toring workshop on Saturday, March 9 in Mallow GAA club. The course is open to both club and school juvenile mentors.

Anyone coaching from UBs up to and including U16s are in-

The technical teaching points will be highlighted with sample drills to enhance the learning. Coaches will receive three 30minute tutorials focusing on different skills and age groups.

Goalkeepers, who must be aged between 12 and 18, and goalkeeping coaches will have a separate coaching and tutoring session using current inter-county coaches and senior Intercounty goalkeepers.

Teams will then play three games of 20 minutes a side and these will be referred by the recent First Whistle students with experienced referees mentoring.

"With the minors you would have trained twice, maybe three times a week.

"Now you were up to training four times a week. You had to be there an hour beforehand and everything was taken more seriously, from dieting right down to your sleep.

Nothing was taken to chance and it really was a massive step up.

Moira Barrett concurred with her inter-county teammate's assessment by saying: "I suppose I was thrown in at the deep end when I joined the intermediate panel after they had won the league and Munster titles.

"I was still on a high from our All-Ire-land success with the Cork minors and didn't really know what to expect. I was lucky in that I had Kate and Maeve with me and we were together on the road which made things a bit easier.

#### Treacy: WGPA pushing for change to camogie rules

Camogie

Cork camogie star Laura Treacy has revealed she's involved in efforts to change the game's rules in time for the 2020 season.

Full-back Treacy played in last year's All-Ireland final win, though referee Eamon

Cassidy was heavily criticised for his handling of that game. Many claimed he was overly fussy with Cork's winning from a controversial free.

In all, the game contained 36 frees and just nine points from open play. Cork manager Pau-die Murray stated in De-cember that camogie is at a crossroads and needs to move closer to hurling's rules, with more physicality and, specifically shouldering, permitted.

"He reffed to the rules of the game and when people are watching it, they're viewing it as hurling," said Treacy. "They're watching a camogie game as if it's hurling and that's how the whole, 'why is

he blowing for that?' and would he not let that go?

"I think it's kind of the rules that have to change with us. I'm part of the WGPA and we're actually meeting as players at the minute with Aoife Lane and Gemma Begley and we're hoping to meet with the Camogie Association to try to bring in some rule changes, or to make a bit of initiative towards that.

We're hoping to meet with the Camogie Association in the next few weeks to see if we

could even bring in some rule changes for next year's league, in 2020.

"Lean towards the hurling rules is what we're kind of discussing and what we'd like to discuss with the Camogie As-sociation. If we lean towards the hurling rules; so get rid of the hand-pass goal, the advantage rule, I think little tweaks of the camogie rules could really make it a much more free-flowing game and then players would get to express themselves a little

hit more

Treacy said she's open to bringing shouldering into the

"I wouldn't object to bring-ing in a shoulder but like, how many shoulders do you see in a hurling game? Do you even see one proper, fair shoulder given now? I suppose the issue is at club level. At county level girls are trained and they'd be able to take the shouldering.

Treacy, a nurse by profes-sion, also revealed she moved from full-time staff nursing to agency nursing to allow her to continue her Cork career.

"I remember playing a game, it was our first or sec-ond league game last year against Galway in Cork and I was on nights Thursday night, Friday night and Saturday night and the game was Sun-day," said Treacy. "So I came off nights Sunday morning at 8 o'clock, went to bed for two hours and then got up and played the game. I was mark-ing Ailish O'Reilly and I'd know her from the All-Stars trips or whatever, and I was like, 'I actually can't do this

So the wise women got together with a few more and started the club and with Fr Kieran Twomey, who would have been in Ballincollig at that time lending a hand, they got started. Mairead remembers Fr Kieran's

huge help to the club.
"He was a great coach with us all and I would have been on the first U14 team in Ballincollig, I went to school and played with South Presentation Convent as well so I suppose I really

had a love for the game."

She attended secondary school in Scoil Mhuire, so it was all club camo-gie in those years as there was no camogie in the school. Her long playing career continued until 1989 but as by then she had three children under four years of age it was hard to fit every-

thing. She was also coaching by then. Despite calling it a day on the playing fields she did make one or two ap-pearances when teams were short. Mairead went back as a coach in 1999 and with both her daughters Claire and Emma on the school team and panel the following year they were suc-cessful and won a Sciath na Scol title. Along with her service to club Mai-

read has given huge service to both division and county. She was a very efficient county board officer and served for three years as treasurer from 1982 to 1984 before taking on the role of sec-

retary In fact Mairead and her late mother Lillie served together as board officers from 1982 to 1984 when Lillie was board registrar. Mairead also held the role as development officer and development administrator in recent times.

I'm very aware of the importance of not just what you eat that matters, it is also when you eat. It's no good if you are having your first meal at 1pm or having your dinner at 10pm.

into the routine of doing my exercise first thing in the morning, to get me moving and to help clear my mind.

The saying I live by is 'hard work beats talent, when talent doesn't work hard'.

I may be new to this media and broadcasting world, I may not be the most talented or experienced, but I will work very hard at it until I have grown the skill-set I need.

Now, I'm going to do a masters in per-formance psychology and I'm getting married to my flance Kevin. We met through friends - he's a Dub who works for the GAA.

#### Camogie star Thompson pleads not guilty to nightclub assaults

The 28-year-old's solicitor, Eddie Burke, asked Judge Olann Kelleher, at Cork District Court: "Will you fix a date for hearing? She is

pleading not guilty. It was not possible to hear the case yesterday and Judge Kelleher adjourned the case until May 1 at Courtroom 3 at Cork

Sgt Gearóid Davis estimated that it will take between an hour and a half and two hours to hear the case. Mr Burke agreed that it would take some time and said: "It will take at least two hours.

Ms Thompson faces charges of assaulting Aoife O'Flaherty and Jennifer Coakley, both contrary to Section 2 of the Non-Fatal Offences Against the Person Act on February 25, 2018 at Secret Garden, Rearden's,

Washington St, Cork. Initially, she also faced the more serious charge contrary to Section 3 of the same act, namely assault causing harm to Jennifer Coakley. However, this charge was dismissed.

Ms Thompson was captain of the Cork camogie team which won the O'Duffy Cup in 2015. She has two All-Star awards and won three All-Ireland club medals with her club, Milford, in North Cork.

LAURA Treacy was exhausted.

A nurse in the Mercy University Hospital, she'd just come off her third night shift on the bounce, managed to squeeze in two hours of sleep and was now going full throttle in Cork's 2018 national league opener against Galway at Castle Road.

It was hard enough to stay awake let alone play an intercounty game.

It was torture.

The Cork defender was marking Galway's Ailish O'Reilly, and they'd know each other from All-Star trips. O'Reilly took on the extra role of agony aunt that January Sunday.

'I was discussing with Ailish during the game that this wasn't going to happen any more, that I couldn't keep going like this,' Treacy says.

'That game was on a Sunday. I had been on nights (12-hour shifts that started at 8pm) the Thursday night, Friday night and Saturday night, and our game was at two o'clock on the Sunday. I came off the Saturday night shift at eight o'clock on the Sunday morning, had some breakfast, went to bed around half eight for two hours and

then up for a team meeting at about 12ish, and then played the same

'I was exhausted. I got through the match and then went into nights again on Sunday night.'

The Killeagh woman knew that she was never going to get the best out of herself that way. She was already missing training sessions and the fear was that she would be left behind for the year if it kept going like this.

She'd won her first All-Star award the previous November, named left corner back on the camogie team of the year after playing her role in Cork's All-Ireland senior triumph. But instead of building on that, she felt she was stalling.

'I was working 12-hour shifts in the Mercy from September 2017 to April 2018. It meant I was missing training on Friday nights as usually you're not done until eight o'clock and training is usually around seven,' Treacy explains.

'I'd have to go and do my own session with our strength and conditioning coach Martin O'Brien, maybe the day before, or before I went into work or maybe the following day, just to keep up.

'I hated training on my own.'

She knew she needed to change, otherwise she'd be left behind.

'Over the next few weeks and months after the Galway game, I was weighing up my options to see what I could do. I spoke to a lot of people and I ended up going agency nursing from

April-it was the best option for my career and to allow me play camogie,' the Cork defender explains.

That decision has allowed her take control of both her work and camogie commitments.

'I'm able to pick my own days now that suit me around camogie. It's ideal and it's working for me at the moment,' she says.

'Switching to agency nursing has allowed me, for example, to finish at six so I can make seven o'clock training. I don't put myself down for shifts on match days so there is no clash.

'I could be working anywhere; in a surgery, in a clinic, anywhere. It just suits me at the moment while I play camogie.

'I can sit down and organise my shifts for the month. I get my timetable for Cork training for the month and I can revolve everything around that then.

'This has allowed me to work as a nurse and still play.'

Finding the right balance between work and camogie, Treacy went on to have a stellar championship in the Cork defence, and after the county defended their All-Ireland crown, she was shortlisted again for an All-Star.

Ahead of this Sunday's trip to Galway to take on the home side in their final Division 1 Group 2 game of the camogie league, Treacy is off both Saturday and Sunday, and will work a half day on Monday so she can fit in a recovery session that even-

ing. It's a long way from the last time these two counties met in the league - but she's expecting Cork's toughest game of the season so far.

Both counties are already through to the knockout stages and both have a 100 per cent record after the opening three rounds, so it's the ideal earlyseason indicator for Cork who want to top the group.

'This will be a massive battle,' Treacy says.

'We haven't travelled to Galway since 2015, they have a serious set up and have been beaten teams by big scores this year. It's a huge test.

'We will have to bring a lot of character to the game. We have already qualified but we want to top the group - and we will be disappointed if we don't come out of Galway with a win.'

It's that attitude that helps explain what drives this Cork team that is chasing three All-Irelands in a row. Manager Paudie Murray and his management team have set the highest of standards.

'We can't be how we were last year, we need to be a better version of ourselves,' Treacy

'It's driven from the management team - the professionalism they bring is second to none. If we win but don't play well, our heads will be down and we will be critical of ourselves, saying that we could have done this better or done

more of that. We expect a lot out of ourselves. We always want to be better. We are perfectionists. We want to hit the highest of our capabilities.

'We do a lot of things really very well in games and we see that too - but we always want to improve.

'We are always reminded that we need to step it up. The way we played in 2018 won't win us an All-Ireland in 2019 because teams are trying to catch up. There is nothing between us and Kilkenny so we need to step it up a notch.'

Helping to drive the 2019 challenge, Treacy says, is the ongoing battle for places. Paudie Murray is building a formidable panel. Courcey Rovers' Saoirse McCarthy, a minor last season, scored 1-1 in the recent league win against Waterford, Ciara McCarthy started her first game in midfield in the same match while Laura Hayes, another 2018 minor, has featured in the opening games too.

'No one's place is safe,' Treacy says.

'These girls are coming through and they're keen to make their mark. Sarah Hayes has played the last two league games and she's done super. It's keeping everyone on their toes.

"The youth, the speed and the determination that they are bringing from minor is great for the panel."

But first, it's Galway on Sunday.

# Support our team's 1,800 laps fundraiser

As Inniscarra Camogie U16 team prepare to travel to Germany for a youth league, MARTINA O'DONOGHUE talks to their manager Liam Ryan about the girls' love for the sport, the significance of the upcoming trip and how they are fundraising to pay

I'S not often that a sports team dedicated to the Gaelic tradition get to showcase their talents abroad

There is endless dedication to local club games, matches across one's own county, and for some, a chance to represent that county in a provincial or ultimately national level. But the perks of being part of something like a World Cup, a Six Nations championship or an Olympic athletic team are unlikely aspirations

However, one local camogie club is taking steps in that direction with a trip to Berlin later this month to play non-competitively with a select group of German teams, as well as providing mentorship to those teams.

While organising the trip is a group effort, it's fair to say that it wouldn't be happening without the input of the U16 Inniscarra Camogie Club manager, Liam Ryan, who says: "There is a long tradition of Irish cultural groups going abroad in music, dance, bands, etc. so why not bring our sporting culture abroad, and better again with emphasis on more participation from girls in sport.

"Let's lead the way in what girls can aspire to when they are part of a camogie club". When Liam, a father of four, was hatching his plan he looked very close to home for inspi-ration, as his wife Michele is the founder of Blarney Dance Academy (BDA), an Irish dance school that celebrates abroad every second year during the St. Patrick's Day festivities.

In 2015 it was Paris, followed by Rome in 2017, while this year they are off to Amsterdam for

more adventures Liam always travels with Michele and his three daughters, who are all involved in dancing, and those trips gave him food for thought in organising something similar for his camo-gie group, which he has been managing since

they were on the U9 team. Liam first went to Joan O'Flynn, the former director of Camogie in Ireland, based in Dublin, and spoke about taking a team to go into schools. She put him onto Kathleen Egan, the European Development Co-ordinator of Camogie in Europe. Germany was suggested and contact was made with Setanta Berlin, a club established in 2000, which has a schools program, as well as hosting a European Youth amogie event every year on the weekend after St Patrick's Day. This year they will host the very first German Youth League, with teams arriving from Hamburg, Frankfurt, Berlin and Munich, as well as the Inniscarra U16s who will be the star attractions and rightly con-

sidered experts in their field. "Inniscarra is the best camogie club in Cork right now and when the girls go out they'll be asked 'Can you show me side-line cuts? Can you show me how to take frees?" They're looking for specific coaching over there. Our girls will be providing mentorship to the teams, like

during the match at half time We have a girl of 16 who played for Cork, so for those kids that's the nearest they'll get to

their Ronaldo or Messi moment for the sport in

which they play", says Liam.
"Quite a few of our girls do German at school so they might demonstrate a few skills and do it in German. It'll be a fun thing for them", adds

One wonders what German word will be found for sliotar!

It seems a few more languages could come in handy too on the trip: "We'll be visiting the Nelson Mandela School on the Friday to introduce them to camogie. There are students there from places like Yemen and Brazil, around 25 different nationalities in total in the school. It's a unique opportunity to introduce the sport to so many different cultures.

Giving a helping hand with organisation on the German end is Berlin-based Sinead Kavanagh, PRO of German Camogie, which organised its first Cúl Camp weekend last year.

Illustrating how the camogie movement in Germany may have been initiated by ex-pats but has grown to the wider community, only one of the five coaches for the camp was Irish, the rest made up of Germans.

Sinead backs up this observation: "In our youth division, we currently have 70 youth members, aged between three to 16, only one of whom was actually born in Ireland. While many of our youth have some Irish connection, many have been attracted purely for the love of the game and are as enthusiastic as any Irish child playing in their local GAA team in Ireland. When you take the adult players into consideration, the GAA is really international, with our teams made up of ex-pat Irish, local German born and even those from as far flung as having south African and Tunisian roots

Back in Inniscarra, the planning is ongoing with Tipperary native Liam keen to stress that he's not a one man army. He carries out his duties alongside lead coach Fergal O'Leary and fellow coach Sheila Lyons who, like Liam, has been with the team since they were U9s.

'She does immeasurable work for underage teams", says Liam.

Still, Liam's own dedication is admirable, especially considering that his own daughters don't play the game.

"When I came to the parish first my older daughters didn't seem to have much interest. They were involved in karate and other things. My youngest daughter asked to join the U9s if

I'd help train. She stayed playing up until three years ago. She does a lot of Irish dancing and is out two or three nights a week with that. She still loves going to matches but she had to prioritise a little. By the time she'd given up for me, you get to a stage where you're loyal to that group of kids. We have a great affinity, they are good kids and they train well.

"It's hard to get people to train teams and organise teams so I said I'd stay involved with the group all the way up along. Last year eight of those girls were on the Cork U14 panel, which was a great achievement. They have a weal law for the grown."

real love for the game."

It's not only a challenge to keep trainers on board but also to keep the girls interested as they get older, with demands on their time from other recreational activities, not to mention the pressure of exams.

The U16 Inniscarra camogie captain, Katie Lordan from Blarney, is a prime example of someone with a busy schedule, as she manages to fit in piano, art and choir into her week, as well as playing camogic and basketball with her school, Colaiste Choilm in Ballincollig.

"I'm in fourth year this year but in third year It was tough to make it to every training session, but it's a break from the usual schedule, allowing you to relax and have fun",

A 2017 study commissioned by Lidl, sponsor of the Ladies Gaelic Football Association, found that while team sports have a direct and positive effect on self-confidence and mental wellbeing, half of young women drop out of their chosen sport by the age of 13.

So what is Inniscarra doing to keep their irls involved

Keeping girls in sport is very important and I've always been very conscious of the necessity to have a social side as part of what we're

"Girls are just as competitive as boys for sure but perhaps they enjoy the social side a bit , says Liam.

To that end, he has organised some fun (but physical!) days out for his team over the years, including trips to Ballyhass Aqua Park, West Cork Secret, Blackwater Outdoor Activities and Fota Island Adventure, as well as Mahem in Cahir, Co. Tipperary, a site used for filming TV show Ireland's Fittest Family.

Of course, on the upcoming trip to Berlin

there will be plenty scope for the social aspect. "This is going to hopefully create bonds for life. And it's very healthy in a community club for the parents to have connectivity with each other too", says Liam.

The squad has been fundraising for the trip to Berlin and on March 9 they will participate in 1,800 laps of the community pitch in Ballyanly, representing one lap for every kilometre of distance from Cork to Berlin.

Team captain Katie is optimistic about the future of camogie.

"I feel like camogie is seen - not less than hurling - but not as well attended. I want it to grow and get bigger and to show that it's even growing in other countries", she says. Meanwhile in Berlin, Wexford native, Sinead

The visit of Innniscarra to Berlin is so important to Setanta because it demonstrates to our players the wider reaching links to the GAA community at home and aboard, and for our growing camogie population, it serves to show how wonderful the sport really is when played at the highest level and gives them a goal of excellence to aim for," she said.

New members are welcome and online regis-tration is available via the Clubforce platform.

"Inniscarra is the best camogie club in Cork right now and when the girls go out (to Berlin) they'll be asked 'Can you show me sideline cuts? Can you show me how to take frees?' They're looking for specific coaching over there. Our girls will be providing mentorship

to the teams, like during the match at half time. We have a girl of 16 who played for Cork, so for

those kids that's the nearest they'll get to their Ronaldo or Messi moment for the sport in which they play."

#### Sacred Heart in All-Ireland semi-final

MUNSTER colleges' junior B camogie champions, Sacred Heart Secondary School Clonakilty are one game away from an All-Ireland final appearance.

The Clonakilty school take on Coláiste Bhride in an All-Ireland junior colleges' semi-final this Saturday, March 2nd, in Enniscorthy (2pm) with a place in the final

Sacred Heart - managed by Ciarán Mulcahy - were very impressive in their 1-10 to 2-0 Munster final win against St Mary's Midleton in January. That was the first time the school had won the provincial competition.

That day, full back Emma O'Driscoll, captain and centre back Daire O'Brien, defenders Kate O'Donovan and Kellie

O'Gorman, midfielder Jessica McCarthy, corner forward Eimear O'Brien, as well as Maeve Kingston and Millie Condon, all impressed for the Clon side that includes players from Ballinascarthy, Clonakilty, Enniskeane, Kilbree and Barryroe.

It was Enniskeane's Eimear O'Brien who carried the threat in attack against St Mary's as she finished with 1-7.

## We have been willing this all our lives, says Foxe on Croker return

AIB All-Ireland Club Championship final

Chloe Foxe is taking time out from completing a college assignment to chat. The conversation flows, the 21year-old at ease with discussing sport and life.

Though she will only turn 22 in May, the third-year UCD computer science student is a long-established dual Wexford player, having also played at underage level for the county in soccer. She will be going on placement in a data analytics role with Liberty Insurance shortly. There is potential for consultancy there, "which could be cool".

Keeping all those plates spinning while achieving at a high level academically is not for everyone, but Foxe revels in the demands — not that she would view them as such.

"It's absolutely incredible, to be honest. It's a year and a day the other night since we started training for what was effectively 2018, but turned into 2019 now" Foxe details.

"We said to ourselves last year (2017) was fun (to finally win the first senior county camogie title in the club's history). But if you are coming out in November to train and you are on the beach in December, you are not looking in the past, you are not looking in the present, you are always looking to be in Croke Park. You can't be thinking: 'Oh, I am here today and whatever happens tomorrow.' You have to be thinking about the All-ireland final and going up the steps.



"I have played with six teams over the last year. I am playing UCD O'Connor Cup (third-level ladies football). That is coming to a head now (with the semi-final on Friday). UCD Camogie, Wexford football I am still involved with, obviously Wexford Camogie when it gets back on track.

"It's the enjoyment factor for me. Most people who know me know I don't like to be bored with college work and everything. I feel like I get more of it done when I have more things to do. You are setting yourself a time limit to finish things, instead of saying: 'I have a week to do that now and I will finish it on

panel. If you were looking in, you might say: 'I can split them into two groups of players'. I don't think it really comprehensively describes the team that we are. That is where we have come from last year. We have seen that it doesn't matter what age you are. Everybody has a responsibility on the pitch even if that is going to the next ball, or if something needs to be said, it doesn't matter who you are. We are all part of the one team. That is something that has really brought us together this year in terms of collective responsibility."

responsibility."

Kate Kelly was a childhood hero of Foxe and was still around when she first came into the Wexford panel. Kelly had retired when the teenager broke through, but remained a member of the backroom staff. To have trained with such a legend is a memory that Foxe cherishes.

With St Martins, the likes of Noeleen Lambert and Mags D'Arcy were also role models.

"Very similar to Kate" she agrees. "Players my age who are in with Martin's now; myself, Amy Cardiff, Sarah O'Connor and the likes, we have seen those girls in 2007 and 2010, 2011, 2012 going on to win All-Ireland Champion-ships with Wexford.

"There is a photo of myself and Mags when she called around to my school. When I look back on that now, it's quite surreal in a way. Now we are playing together on the same team. She is always pushing everybody and always demanding the best. Noeleen Lambert is similar. They are the driving force for the younger players."

When D'Arcy dropped in with the O'Duffy Cup, Foxe was in Clongeen, but her parish didn't have a camogie team. So her father Ger, a selector for the Wexford football team that reached the All-Ireland SFC semi-final 2008 under Jason Ryan, brought her down to St Martin's when she was a child.

And they're glad he did. Her heroics in the All-Ireland semi-final, when she hit nine points (six of those into the wind in that second half) were pivotal, while she also scored a second-half goal in the provincial decider to help overturn an interval deficit against Thomastown.

And now, having lined out at Croke Park for the Mini-Sevens in 2009, when she overcame the nerves to slot a free, she is ready to return with silverware on offer. "I am just eager. People are making it out to be this big occasion. But I would say every player on the team has been willing this our whole lives. When you are seven or eight years old, and you are banging in goals, you are saying to yourself: 'This is to me in Croke Park'. In a way, you have been psychologically preparing a lot of the time".

### Rebels will renew rivalry with Cats

CORK will resume their rivalry with Kilkenny in a Division 1 semi-final of the Littlewoods Ireland Camogie League.

The two counties have clashed in All-Ireland and league finals in the past few seasons, and while Cork have won the last two All-Ireland finals, Kilkenny have held the upper hand in league deciders.

In fact, Kilkenny are pursuing a fourth consecutive title – but they still needed a 63rd minute point from Michelle Quilty to claim a 1-12 to 0-14 victory over Limerick in the Gaelic Grounds that ensured they finished the round-robin phase on top of Group 1.

#### Waterford champs Gailltír the talk of the town

AIB All-Ireland Intermediate Club Final

Claire Dunne can't walk down the street without hearing talk of Gailltir's bid for All-Ireland

Intermediate glory,
On Sunday, the Waterford champions face Down's Clonduff at Croke Park, hoping to lift the AIB All-Ireland intermediate camogie title.

It's been a long and winding road to get here. After beating De La Salle in the county final, Gailltír overcame Cork's Éire Og in the Munster decider, before defeating St Rynagh's of Offaly by 3-8 to 0-12 in the

All-Ireland semi-final.

Dunne, who works as a teacher alongside former Waterford boss Derek McGrath at De La Salle col-

lege, can't wait for the big showdown at GAA HQ. "I'm definitely excited," said Dunne. "It's a bit surreal to be here. We're excited, and I'm a little bit nervous, but when the game comes, we'll be good to go. It's been a long year for us. It's been constant, and now we're coming into March after starting pre-season last January, so we're just waiting for a long time. There's been a big gap, and we just can't wait now.

Dunne (28) is on the scene for quite some time and marvels at the idea of finally making it to Croke Park at this stage of her camogie career.

Former Déise men's senior boss McGrath recently took a training session with Gailltír, despite their beating his own De La Salle in the county decider, and imparted his wis-

"It was fantastic to have him take a session, and he's such an inspirational speak-er," says Dunne, whose side has a nice mix of youth and players who experienced a Munster title win two seasons ago. "We have a good few girls who have been playing for a number of years, but we have a few who have just come on the senior team in the last three years.

"The experience is important, but in fairness to the girls, and especially to the girls who have stepped up to the mark this year, you'd think they had been playing with us all along. There is something special in the younger girls, and then the older girls bring that experi-ence on the day itself.

"The build-up has been great and we've had so much support from everybody. Everyone you meet on the street, they just want to talk about it. Everyone is buzzing and they're behind us 100%.

"The club was 60 years old last year, so it's something special," she adds. "We'd love to get over the line - not just for us as a team. We want to do it for the whole community, all the supporters, and every-one who has contributed to us from the first day.

All-Ireland club successes have been few and far between for Waterford sides. Lismore secured the intermediate club camogie title in 2014 after a 3-8 to 0-7 win over Ballyhale Shamrocks. Last year Ardmore became the first men's side to take national honours after a 3-11 to 0-18 victory over St Mogue's Fethard of Wexford in the junior decider.

The pacy teenager hit two more points and was fouled for the penalty, having initially



been brilliantly hooked by Clare Gilligan with the goal at her mercy, but Lyng's shot was stopped by Karen Haughey and Sarah-Louise

Again Clonduff stretched clear by four in the second half, but Gailltir powered back to within one and Jackman, Clodagh Carroll and Fitzgerald all fired efforts just wide. Clonduff defended resolutely and the day was theirs.

he 20x20 initiative is a movement gathering momentum as it aims to shift cultural perceptions about women in sport in the time leading up to 2020.

Cork's All-Ireland winning Camogie captain, Aoife Murray, told us about her support for the campaign.

She says: "I would have close ties to it because I would have played with Mary O'Connor who is the brains behind all of it.

"I think its great and how you get the message out is extremely important and that it's communicated to people and that it is more about getting an equal status rather than one trying to be better than the other and I think that is a really important thing.

"I certainly don't want to be seen to be better than my counterpart in hurling, I just want to have the same level of opportunity and respect.

"We have a huge road to go but you have got to start somewhere. In women's sport we are behind the curve a huge amount, so for this to just get that ball rolling at least it is a start. There is a very long road ahead of us but now I can't go on twitter without seeing some 20x20 hashtag in something.

"Maybe I'm too old to benefit from that but at least my nieces and nephews which I think it's important for boys to grow up with this equal status in media, and hopefully it will mean we won't have to have the same conversations in 20 years' time."

"Seeing girls going around with their Cork camogie jersey rather than the Cork hurling or football jersey is one thing that has stood out. There's a lot going around in their club jersey which I think is even better again that they are so proud of where they come from."



## Three-in-a-row camogs setting Slaughtneil's lofty standards

Three All-Ireland titles in a row. In any other code in Gaelic games, it would be hailed as the astonishing achievement it is, but so much of the Slaughtneil camogie story is hidden from view.

For the last number of years, their ambitions and tilts at All-Ireland glory have been celebrated. Much of their history has been told, but of the three strands of the club, camogie has been more stagehand than centre-stage.

Ask those within the club, however, and they will confide that the camogie contingent dictates standards within the club.

The camogs train every Wednesday, Friday, and Sunday on the pitch. They have an app on their mobile phones, which they use to log their two compulsory gym sessions. If anyone misses a pitch session, they have to do it at another time, under the supervision of two others.

"The training would usually last anything from an hour and 20 minutes to an hour and 40," says team manager Damien McEldowney.

"The girls have their own gym programmes. Ollie Cummings (strength-and-conditioning expert in Maghera), does up a gym programme and updates it every six weeks.

"So, they go to his gym once every six weeks and he runs through the programme, and then they go themselves on other nights, or during the day, whatever suits them, twice a week. One of the nights would be upper body, one of them would be lower."

It's not just the accountability, although that makes managing the team a pleasure rather than a chore, but it is the culture of 'doing extras'

that has delivered such suc-

"At times, you have to hunt them from the pitch," says McEldowney.

"A couple of girls, Louise (Dougan) and Tina (Hannon), they stay on and work on frees after training and we are shouting at them to get the lights turned off. They have so much dedication themselves, it makes our job so much more

That kind of talent on the pitch has been matched by the calibre of management on the sideline. For a while now, aspiring county managers have been managing ladies' football teams, but camogic teams copped that long ago.

copped that long ago.

When Slaughtneil won their first Derry camogie championship, in 2012, it was under the management of PJ O'Mullan Jr, who, earlier the same year, had managed Loughgiel

Shamrocks to the All-Ireland hurling club title.

When they stepped away, in 2014, the replacements were the late Thomas Cassidy—father of three playing sisters, Brona, Aoife, and Eilis—and Dominic 'Woody' McKinley, who has managed Antrim as joint manager with Terence 'Sambo' McNaughton for two stints.

This season has been like every other. They have asked big questions of themselves, and have found that the club matches that commitment. While the club senior huriers and footballers have embarked upon training weekends away to prepare for All-Ireland semi-finals in February, the exact same courtesy is afforded to the club camogs.

On a training weekend to Kilkenny a while back, they all attended Mass in the city on Sunday morning and received a tip of the hat from the man on the altar.

If Slaughtneil are doing all they can, that is also being replicated by Down's Clonduff, who won the intermediate title.

Over the last few weeks, they had Tipperary hurling manager Liam Sheedy in to deliver a talk, as well as current Antrim hurler Neil McManus.

With ten of the Down panel that reached last autumn's All-Ireland intermediate final, they have a good share of players who are used to a certain level, but, as selector Ursula Quinn explains, "nothing comes easy and I would say our girls do as much as any intercounty camogie team, or intercounty football team, in terms of commitment and dedication to training."

"Preparation, too, was a big thing for us this year, down to the finer details, strength-andconditioning, food, nutrition, all that.

"We targeted it more than any other year, but those finer details maybe made the difference."

She added: "We would be three or four times a week on the pitch and our girls are doing a lot of gym work, a lot of strength-and-conditioning under a brother of mine, Francis.

"Even within the club, outside of county players, that's
the level the girls want to be
training at. We have said it so
many times: when you go
down to the pitch you want to
go and you want to do a good,
hard session. When you are
giving up the commitment,
you want to train hard and
you want to train hard because you have big aspirations
for yourself and for your club,
and you know that is going to
take hard work."

The post-match scenes were unforgettable – Cushendall hurler Arran Graffin sliding knee-first with no thought to his health or safety to congratulate his wife Sara Louise, who scored three points on the day – and the excitement hadn't diminished when they returned to south Down, according to their joint-manager Damien Farnon.

"The reception was unbelievable. Even when they just came into Hilltown, all the supporters were out on the square. The amount of fans who were there was unbelievable.

While this was Clonduff's first appearance in an All-Ireland Camogie final, the players showed no signs of nervousness as they bossed the first quarter, racing into a 0-5 to no score lead.

#### Avoiding relegation the immediate priority for Kennedy

Wexford camogie are hopeful a difficult few months is behind them following the appointment of Barry Kennedy as senior manager.

Kennedy, given the job this day last week, succeeds Kilkenny's Martin Carey who vacated the role two months ago and is immediately tasked with preserving Wexford's Division 1 league status as they face Offaly in this Sunday's relegation decider.

Wexford native Kennedy is in the process of finalising his backroom team and it remains to be seen what players he will have at his disposal for this weekend's crunch relegation fixture. Getting 15 on the pitch remained a problem for the following week's trip to Galway, with a team of just 13 players suffering a 9-23 to 1-2 defeat. This run of results led defender Ciara Storey to label as "embarrassing" the lows to which Wexford had sunk.

A panel of 16 players turned out for their final group outing against Tipperary, which ended in a 5-11 to 0-8 victory for the Premier County.

Relegation for the Wexford

senior team would see the county's intermediates, currently operating in Division 2, drop to the third tier in 2020.

The Division 1 camogie semi-finals also take place this weekend. Cork and Kilkenny renew acquaintances this Sunday at Carriganore (2pm throw-in), while no venue has yet been confirmed for the clash of Galway and Limerick.



# O'Driscoll's and Murray's management styles are different but they both work

A RECENT video clip shared on Twitter by Joe Brolly caught my eye. It was one that went viral. Highlighting negative tactics that many coaches are teaching 'their players in Gaelic football.

In the U15 Brock Championship match between Abbey Grammar School Newry and St Patrick's Maghera, the former kept their 15 players inside their own half while St Pat's passed the ball around and maintained possession within their own half for fifty minutes of the game. It was as hard to watch as it sounds. Neither team could have enjoyed this game of football.

St Pats won 0-2 to 0-1, a soccer-style scoreline, and that video clip from the game caused quite a stir online with questions pointed in the coaches' direction. Negative tactics such as this are some of the reasons why changes have been made in the rules governing the game at inter-county level. However, how can you change a management/coaching system that teaches this style of play to players as young as 15 years of age?

So after seeing the clip online, it made me think about the types of management that surface most prominently in my mind. One being the manmanagement style that Ole Gunnar Solskjaer is successfully implementing in Manchester United's exciting resurgence in the football world. His players look happier, they are expressing themselves in their play and the results show how his friendly approach towards his team is certainly paying dividends. The negativity left by Jose Mourinho has been lifted and what remains is a team who feel greater self-worth. After all, happy teams win games. It's the same group of players that Solskjaer and Mourinho are working with - but the end result couldn't be more different.

Closer to my own experience, there are two managers
I had the pleasure of working
under during my playing days
with Cork, Fiona O'Driscoll and
Paudie Murray. While these two
couldn't be more different from
one another, what they had in
common was their understanding of the importance of a happy
but positively prepared team.

Fiona O'Driscoll brought fantastic changes in the professional set-up of the team and management in 2005. It was

her coaching and organisation that really set the ball rolling for what female players deserve and should receive when playing at a high level. She made sure that every single detail was looked after from player welfare to focused training sessions to intricate preparation in the lead up to games and on the game day itself.

Having spoken to her years after her management and coaching role with the Cork senior team, she would admit herself that she found the whole process exhausting. She gave everything to that role in the years from 2005 to 2007, and in some regards was very hard on herself, to the point of trying to manage and perfect everything.

Her people management is second to none. She had the rare ability of reading you and your mood by just looking and observing your body language. A little friendly chat with players was a mechanism that in-

stantly elevated your mood, leaving you with a sense of selfworth, a feeling that someone understands you and cares.

But it wasn't all a friendly experience. Fiona demanded sacrifice from every one of us. Missing training was unacceptable. In fact, you would dread telling her if you had to. Your reason would need to be well thought out and appropriately expressed to her. Letting her down was seen as letting the team down too. It was all connected when she was at the helm. It instilled in us that we should be making excuses to make training, not to miss it.

I loved every moment under Fiona's management with Cork. She was fully invested in every player and saw the importance of a happy squad. Trips to her hometown Ballymacoda for training weekends conjure up great memories with swims in the local Redbarn beach post workouts that were always perishing but welcomed to soothe the tired limbs. In those torturous ten minutes of wading through water up to our waists, she succeeded in building a happy team. We were a team that knew each other much better than simply playing camogie on the same field together.

While I mentioned that Fiona started the rise in professionalism for the Cork senior camogie team, it was Paudie who elevated this even further and has improved every year since. However, compared to Fiona's understanding but firm approach, Paudie demands even more sacrifice from his players. If you want to be one of the starting 15 players, you have to imbed camogie into every day of your week. Two to three days in the gym, two to three camogie sessions in the week and a game to top it off. You live and breathe camogie. We needed this approach. Other teams like Wexford, Kilkenny and Galway were upping their trainings and hitting the gyms just as hard as we were.

### Master-plan

It was crucial we remained proactive about our preparation and Paudie insured that a master-plan for the year was set in place with a solid backroom personal consisting of friends and family. With four out of seven O'Duffy Cup titles so far, his approach is working. He was always available, only a phone call away, always on the camogie beat. He is fully invested in Cork Camogie.

It's hard to determine what approach is best to take as a coach of a team. I feel it all depends on the players put in front of you. It's crucial that you understand the player in her/ his entirety. You need to see the bigger picture. Not just what you notice about the player as they train or how they work during a game. It's important that you get to know them. To see how they tick. Because one size does not fit all when it comes to managing a team. Personalities and interests are undoubtedly going to be different and the challenges this can bring is testing for even the most experienced coach.

I try and adopt a caring approach when it comes to managing school football teams. Taking the time to talk to your players, listening to their worries and thanking them for their efforts is so important. I've noticed that there are lots of insecurities that teenagers face and many don't realise their worth, and this could be simply because they didn't make the starting 15 on a given day.

A young person's life can be full of pressures and stresses also and we as coaches need to be mindful of this. Just recently, a talented footballer on our team came over to the sideline at half-time and buried her head in her hands while sitting on the ground. I later realised that she was worried sick as her grandmother had broken her hip the day before and was poorly in hospital.

She played out of her skin that day but she was also going through a painful personal strain. I felt terrible that I didn't know this information before the game but I was also glad she had an outlet to express that emotion, a distraction from the upset.

Playing a sport can be an incredible means of self expression and a stress reliever. However, coaches shouldn't be taking the opportunity of playing freely and without constraints away from players who just want to play their game in a sporting manner.

# All systems go in underage leagues

IT'S all systems go as the county under age league fixtures are circularised to clubs and will get underway shortly.

Following on the huge success of the new format in 2018 for under 12s a big decision has been made regarding Under 14 and under 16 league competitions.

The proposal that came from the three-person committee set up to review the juvenile competitions and juvenile affairs for 2019 was that club would not be graded into A B or C sections as in previous years as the feeling is that it is impossible to know the standard of each club as all but six clubs entering the league had requested to play B.

At under 14 levels there will be forty

At under 14 levels there will be forty teams and the format is there will be eight groups of five teams, each of these clubs will play each other and at the end of the five first round game games there will be eight top teams and these will go into the A league where there will be two groups of four teams and the top in each section will play in the final.

The next eight teams which will be the second team in the original groups of five will be called Under 14 A1 and here again there will be two groups of four and top two go to final.

The teams that finish third in the groups will be the A2 league and again the same format will apply, this will continue down the group with each of the teams graded in the same way.

Outside of the forty clubs there are thirty nine clubs who will be graded in a B2 and C2 league and here the format is to be decided.

At Under 16 level there will be thirty two teams divided into eight groups of four and each will play three games to decide their grading, as with the under 14 teams will be graded according to their finishing position ie top team in each group with play A, second eight will be A1, next eight will be b and last eight will be B1.

but the failure will make you


stronger, in the end."



THE Galway players and management couldn't have been blamed for fearing the worst when Kilkenny struck for two timely second-half goals in Sunday's National League Camogie final at Croke Park.

# Sighle Nic an Ultaigh Distinguished Service Award

From Warrenpoint, Co. Down, Sighle Nic an Ultaigh is credited with guiding the path of Camogie for 50 years. Elected National President in 1949, Sighle served in many roles including Secretary of the Down County Board, Chairperson of Ulster Council, Ard Rúnaí (1953-1975), President of All-Ireland Primary Schools and Trustee (1985-2004).

In 1999 she was honoured with the title of Life President of the Camogie Association. Sighle passed away in the Centenary Year of the Association, 2004, at the age of 88.

The Sighle Nic an Ultaigh Award was inaugurated to acknowledge distinguished administrators of the Association.

THE Killeagh Camogie club recently held their inaugural 'Sheila Spillane Perpetual Cup Senior Camogie tournament where they hosted a superb day on their two main fields in Pairc Ui Chinneide.

The tournament was named after the founder of the Killeagh club Sheila Spillane, who is also the club president

Sheila is well known not alone in camogie circles but is also a well-known figure around the greyhound tracks and having trained many a fine hound to honours the length and breadth of the country and beyond she is no stranger to sport and the outdoors.

In the many years since 1973, when Killeagh Camogie was founded, right up to the present day Sheila Spillane has been at the core of Killeagh, she has been a constant supporter of all things club and camogie for many years and the club said the gesture was a small token from the club to honour a great club stalwart.

She was the founder of the club in 1973 and worked tirelessly for the promotion and development of camogie in the parish of Killeagh, herself and her late husband John donated a pitch in Burgess to the Killeagh camogie club in 1973 where they provided a venue for camogie to be played.

They set up two portable cabins which provided excellent changing facilities for players and many a fine game took place on the venue on the left hand side so the road after going through the village.

The prospered and grew and produced many fine players who went on to represent Cork and win All-Ireland

medals and Sheila as coach and trainer in those days played a huge part in a lot of these player's development.

Killeagh won five senior county championships, one Club All Ireland and five Munster Club Championships along with numerous underage County titles and Sheila was involved in all the teams.

Whilst the club also produced All-Ireland senior winning captains in Cathy Landers (mother of former Cork hurling captain Seamus Harnedy) and Pat Maloney, Betty Joyce captained Cork to a Junior All-Ireland Title whilst Betty Joyce in 1986 had the honour of refereeing an All-Ireland Camogie final in Croke Park with Sheila Spillane acting as umpire.

Sheila held every officer ship in the club and was chairperson for twenty five years and as well as that she served at County Board level as vice chairperson and she was also a selector on Cork teams at various levels. Still very active in the club despite being in her late eighties no job or role was or is too big for her.

When the club would hold their annual point to point fund raiser in January Sheila was renowned for the job of making the hot whiskeys all day long to help keep the chill away.

It was also well known that every team in the club was guaranteed to have spare jerseys and towels to dry the hurley's at games on wet days in winter as Sheila made sure of this, also if club membership needs to be collected or the sliotars need to be bought and taken care of the bag packing or church gate collection organized money needed to be counted or lodged, Shelia was always available to Killeagh Camogie club to do these jobs.

In 2010, Sheila recovered from a serious illness only to suffer the loss of losing of her second daughter in October 2011 when Shelley passed away at a young age, yet Sheila still carried on as determined as ever with her beloved club ably assisted by her daughter Mary, who is also very much involved in all things camogie in the club.

The day was enjoyable from start to finish with six senor teams participating Killeagh, Sarsfields, Cloughduv, St Catherine's and Courcey Rovers.

Each club played four games which were 12 minute a side and there was an excellent standard of Camogie on show from m the teams participating.

There were many of the Inter county start participating with Chloe Sigerson, Laura Treacy, Hannah Looney, Finola Neville, Aoife Murray, Orla Cotter, Linda Collins, amongst those lining out.

The games were intense competitive games and a credit to all the clubs involved, games came down to the wire with just one point separating some of the teams.

Both Killeagh and Sarsfields succeeded in winning their first three games leaving them to battle it out in the final with both attempting to be the first side to claim the Sheila Spillane Perpetual Cup.

The final was played as a 15 minutes a side game and it was extremely high level of skill, competitiveness and passion from both teams so early in the season

Killeagh proved the stronger of the two teams in the final as they showed

huge determination.

Killeagh captain Rachel Sheehan was presented with the cup by the lady herself Sheila Spillane and after strong performance's across all four games Killeagh's Caoimhe Harney was named 'Player of the Tournament'.

t's another couple of months before Sinéad McNulty commences her role as chief executive of the Camogie Association but what should be at the top of her inbox is obvious; the outdated rules that govern the game.

At Congress earlier this month, the pathway to making change became a little clearer when a motion to ease the introduction of experimental rules was passed. However optimism about those necessary alterations taking place seems in short supply despite a deluge of complaints from those at the coaliace of the game about how it is officiated.

Last week, Galway's Sarah Dervan summed up the frustration when she remarked: "Nobody wants to see a freetaking competition as a game. I find it (the rules) restricts players from showcasing their ability."

The rule prohibiting players from shouldering each other is an archaic as the playing gear regulation that they must wear either a skirt or skorts. The non-contact element may have served camogie well for years but it is so dated now that it almost feels sexist.

. The evolution of the game is in the hands of the players and managers.

And there is little doubt about the feelings on the ground.

### Paudie Murray (Cork manager)

"We can all talk about the refereeing of camogie and does it need to be tidied up? Yes, it does. I've said that a number of times. I think the way the rules are at the moment makes it impossible for a referee to referee the game. (2018 All-Ireland final referee) Eamon Cassidy is probably one of the top two referees in the country but there is so much in relation to the contact area and what is a free, or isn't a free, that it's next to impossible (to judge). If a player charges with a shoulder, it's just impossible."

# Aoife Murray (Cork)

"They're going to have to change (the rules). It's not going to be an easy job but it has gotten more physical and faster and maybe the rules need to be tweaked and amended to reflect the standard."

# Meighan Farrell (Kilkenny)

"If the rules change maybe the refs can change. It's hard when you are able to look and see what referee you have and you know that they are going to blow for everything. It's become way worse than it was."

### Niamh Rockett (Waterford)

"The ladies football got 50,000 [attendance] last year in the All-Ireland final, camogie got less than half that... if things stay the way they are, we may not have any camogie in 20 years time, and that is a scary prospect."

# Amy O'Connor (Cork)

"Whoever has the best freetaker wins. It's terrible — the majority of scores are from frees. I don't blame the referees at all, they're only doing their job. The rules are the problem. It's so frustrating, especially as a forward, because you get the ball and you're fouled every time."

## Eve O'Brien (Dublin)

"The talk of the final this year (2018), the one day that people actually watch camogie, everybody's just talking about the ref... "They can't touch each other'."

### Laura Treacy (Cork)

"The physicality is there anyway, there's just a few tweaks to the rules that have to be made so the game can be opened up and, as players, we can express ourselves fully."

### Fiona Hickey (Limerick)

"Girls want to be as strong and as powerful as they can be and the rules at the moment probably aren't allowing for that, I definitely feel they should reassess the rules."

# Libby Coppinger (Cork)

"Obviously, we were delighted with the All-Ireland win and a free won us the All-Ireland so we can't complain too much but it's not really an enjoyable game to watch."

hen the referee has become the most important person on the field, it is time to sit up and take notice. However, if Camogie Association president Kathleen Woods' stance on the matter is anything to go by, McNulty has a job on her hands.

In the wake of that awful All-Ireland final last year, Woods told the Irish Examiner that the organisation had no plan to address the glaring issue of the rules and if players felt so strongly about it, they should take matters into their own hands and propose a motion.

"The game is in the hands of Congress," she remarked. "Ifplayers wish to see rules changed, they must approach their higher body and try to impact their views. We are developing a new four-year development plan for our game, but it will not be looking at rules changes."

# Book celebrates club's 50th year of camogie

A bet which led to a camogie trainer having his legs waxed onstage after his players won the county final is just one of several stories recalled in a new book spanning 50 years of sport since the establishment of a camogie club in West

Called Give A Girl A Hurley, the book reflects on 50 years of

fun, friendship and camogie. It will be launched on Bank Holiday Monday, May 6, at Ballinascarthy Community Hall. The book's name is key, says Kate Crowley, who coordinated the stories for the volume, as the concept was that giving girls a hurley opened important doors to friendship. leadership, championship and the cultivation of a strong team spirit over the subse-

Everyone is invited to the launch of the 80-page paper-back book, packed with local anecdotes and photographs.

The book looks back to when the very first team was formed in 1969 when the girls of Ballinascarthy were given hurleys for the first time.

The first club, then called Castleview Camogie Club. began with about two dozen members with maroon and amber colours.

It is now Ballinascarthy Camogie club, playing in black and red, with more than 120 members. "We basically now have the two dozen, plus another 100 or so members," said Ms Crowley.

There are more than 50 stories detailing players' experiences throughout the 50 years of the club's existence. We received contributions from former players, current players, captains of winning teams, parents, mentors,

trainers and sponsors." One story, she recalled, was from 1972 when a player entered what she thought was the anonymity of the confessional: "However, when she had finished her confession and was leaving the confes-sion box, the priest addressed her by name and asked if she

was due to play in Sunday's match. When she said she was, he warned her: 'Keep out those goals and don't let Barryroe beat us again."

Another story relates to players making a bet with their trainer — if they won the county final, he would shave or way his low in public The or wax his legs in public. The team went on to win the County final. "The bet was played out in front of a big audience."

With a myriad of hilarious anecdotes from dowGive a girl n the years, she added: "It's a real snapshot of the life and times of our club from 1969 to the present day, through a range of real-life experiences as narrated by people with close ties to the club."

# Camogie forum tackles growing rules discontent

Camogie chiefs have organised a 'Feedback forum' in Dublin on Saturday to hear the concerns county players and managers have around the rules of the game

Each county board has been invited to select two senior players, their team manager, plus one more member of the management team to attend the meeting in the capital.

The forum is in response to growing disquiet over the rulebook, which many feel is outdated as the game has become faster and more physi-

Last year's All-Ireland final

between Cork and Kilkenny was a free-ridden affair which sparked hugely negative com-mentary. Ann Downey's Kilkenny team lost by a point and she is looking forward to a chance to air her concerns this weekend.

Downey said: "For us, that final was fairly frustrating, and I definitely don't want this to sound like sour grapes, but when you come out of an All-Ireland final, the focus should not be on the referee. And that was the case. I met a few former hurlers after the game and they said they wouldn't go again. So, it is just good to have a conversation this weekend. There is a need to move

camogie forward and this will be a discussion with no barriers. Everybody wants to make the game more enjoyable to play in. You want to make it enjoyable for the spectators as well.

"The big problem I would see is the different interpretation of the rules.

"You go out one day and a referee is going to be pulling and blowing for everything and then the next day it is free-

"So, it is good to have this forum to see what can be done to improve the game.'

A Camogie Association spokesperson outlined the rationale behind the weekend

gathering. "It is vitally im-portant that we hear the views of both players and team managements and this is their opportunity to influence the future of camogie.

The forum will focus on the future of adult inter-county competitions over the next five years and will invite the attendees to contribute on discussions regarding the future of our game and what changes should be considered to improve our game and how we can positively affect and influence change to improve

The event will take place at the Croke Park Hotel on Saturday.

A WGPA survey has shown that 82% of inter-county camogie players are in favour of trialling new rules to bring the game more in line with how hurling is officiated.

Ahead of Saturday's Camogie Association 'feedback forum', this Women's Gaelic Players Association survey is the latest reminder to the game's top officials of the strong desire among players for a sweeping overhaul of the camogie rulebook.

At Congress earlier this year, a motion was passed to allow for the trialling of new rules. Of those surveyed, 70% want changed the rules relating to physical contact. Almost half are in favour of swapping skorts for shorts, while 30% would like to see an end to the hand-passed goal. At present, the camogie rulebook outlaws shouldering and 'moving into an opponent's body', effectively rendering the game a non-contact sport.

Last September's All-Ireland final between Cork and Kilkenny made for pretty turgid viewing, the game blighted by 36 frees and containing only nine scores from play. Similarly unappealing was the Galway-Kilkenny semi-final, a fixture which also had a freecount in the 30s and produced a meagre seven scores from

to be either good, very good, or excellent, with 60% citing as poor the officiating of their

Not content to continue bemoaning the current state of the game, a WGPA working group is proposing the estab-lishment of a player engagement group that might be integrated into the new Camogie development plan; commence a referee engagement process; and conduct a rules review.

Camogie Association president Kathleen Woods, in an interview with the Irish Examiner last September, said their new four-year development plan would not be looking at rule changes.

"A proper objective analysis of the trends in the game and refereeing needs to be carried out because players currently don't feel engaged through the current mechanism for changing rules," said WGPA chairperson Maria Kinsella.

Added Cork's nine-time All-Ireland medal-winner Gemma O'Connor: "Players have been frustrated expressing frustration around rules and referees publicly for a long time and this now represents a collective call for change and an opportunity to improve the

Elsewhere, the majority of players (95%) were in favour of double-headers with men's games, with 96% of players keen for integration with the GAA in terms of a strategic plan and matched investment for camogie.

'The conditions were quite difficult with the wind and some showers left over from the storm,' Wallace says.

'We discussed before the start the difficulties of playing with the wind and we asked our players to be composed and use the ball smartly. In fairness, they were brilliant in the first half. We scored 3-11. At half time we said that if we matched or bettered Clare's first-half tally in the first half that we would hold on.'

Early in the second half Clare showed their intent and took full advantage of playing with the strong wind as they notched up 1-4 without reply inside ten minutes. That cut the Cork lead to ten points after 40 minutes.

Cork responded with a brace courtesy of Isobella Sheehan and Finn to put 12 between the sides before Lorna McNamara, who finished with 0-10 for Clare, struck three scores to see the lead cut to nine and inside the last ten minutes. Finn responded when she fired over a close-range free to push Cork ten clear.

Clare did score 1-3 in the closing four minutes to move to within six points but Cork weathered the late storm to defend their title.

'We were never not comfortable in the second half,' Wallace says.

'The work that our midfield and our half-forward line did when we didn't have the ball, they never let Clare settle and get ball into their inside line. The pressure we put on them in the second half was vital and that was the pressure they didn't put on us in the first half.'

# 'They are not going to take the heads off each other'

All-Ireland winning manager Paudie Murray hopes that camogie bosses will act on the feedback they received at the weekend's specially convened 'Feedback Forum' in Dublin.

Association chiefs organised the event to hear the views of players and officials in an effort to continue to promote and grow the game of camogie.

The chief topic of debate last weekend centred around the rules and how they are enforced, particularly at intercounty level.

Many present at the forum, including Murray, believe that the rulebook must move with the times in an effort to increase the attractiveness of the sport for players and spectators alike.

Murray insists that three rule changes must be prioritised.

He explained: "One is the advantage rule. That is a fivesecond rule at the moment. Our feeling would be the advantage rule suits the person that commits the foul rather than the player on the

"Certainly, we would like to see the five seconds go and that the advantage would continue until play breaks down or there is an actual advan-

"Two, there is a need to look at the contact area, particularly the frontal challenge. I think that is impossible to referee.

"I can't see what is wrong with a shoulder, they are not going to take the heads off each other.

"There is probably a fear within certain people in the camogie that is going to

"The third thing, which I think is very, very important, is to get some sort of consistency within the referees who are refereeing inter-county games, which isn't there at the moment.



Cork manager Paudie Murray believes rule changes in three key areas must be prioritised for camogie.

"You go from week to week and you don't know what way the game is going to be refer-

"They are the key areas, and I think they are areas that can be acted on very quickly and implement them for the championship if they can at all, which I then think will

speed up our game.
"The rest of the issues are really irrelevant at the moment compared to those three

key areas.

"You would hope after our meeting that the Camogie Association would take our views on board and would act on them. It is only then you

can say it was successful."

What a lot of people do not realise is the number of rule differences that exist between hurling and camogie.

With the game constantly evolving, these rules are coming more and more under scrutiny.

For instance, in camogie, players are not allowed to put a hand on an opposing player's back. They are also penalised for deliberately shouldering an opponent, while in hurling these are not

The hand-passed goal in camogie is another much debated point. Noticeable too is the lack of scores from open play, and the low-scoring nature of the last two All-Ireland senior finals.

Aoife Murray captained Cork to a 0-14 to 0-13 victory in 2018, while Rena Buckley brought the O'Duffy Cup to Leeside in 2017 following a 0-10 to 0-9 result.

One more item that generated discussion at the weekend was the wearing of skorts, which many were in favour of retaining.

# Camogie star pleads guilty to nightclub assault

GAA All-Star camogie player Ashling Thompson has admitted that she assaulted a woman at a nightclub by elbowing her in the

The victim came home to Cork from Abu Dhabi, where she rides horses for the royal family.

Jennifer Coakley said she had a suspected hairline fracture to her jaw, but did not follow up with medical attention, as she had travelled to Abu Dhabi.

The case against Thompson had been listed for hearing at Cork District Court yesterday, but Eddie Burke, defence solicitor, said the accused was pleading guilty to the charge of assaulting

Jennifer Coakley, contrary to Section 2 of the Non-Fatal Offences Against the Person Act, on February 25, 2018, at Secret Garden, Rearden's, Washington Street, Cork.

Inspector James Hallahan summarised what had happened that morning, at 2:44am, in the nightclub.

"The defendant was speaking with a male. Jennifer Coakley was standing nearby and she began speaking to the male. She (Thompson) struck out with her right elbow and contacted her face, doing damage to same. It was superficial," Insp. Hallahan said.

Judge Con O'Leary asked the injured party if she disagreed with anything in the inspector's summary. She said she did not. Asked how it affected her, she said:
"Mostly in the fact that I had
to come all the way back
from Abu Dhabi. I was about
to go to Singapore, with my
other half. I did not follow
up in the medical reports as
much as I would.

"It was a huge impact, having to take the time out. I don't know the person. I did not know her beforehand. It was not pleasant, when someone comes up and attacks you when you are minding your own business, on your last night-out in Cork."

Judge O'Leary said to the injured party: "The evidence is that you were not minding your own business and that you started talking to the

Ms Coakley replied that

she knew the man and that they were all in one group, but that she did not know

Ms Thompson before this.

She said she sustained a hairline fracture to her jaw, which still caused her problems. She added not following up on medical treatments.

ment was her own fault.
Judge O'Leary asked her
what she did in Abu Dhabi.
She replied: "I currently
ride horses for the royal
family over there."

Eddie Burke said there were a number of complications in the background, precluding the possibility of Ms Thompson being given an adult caution at a garda station, rather than being prosecuted for assault. He said one complication was the initial charge for assault

causing harm, which was withdrawn by the State.

Insp. Hallahan said she also had a previous drink-driving conviction. Mr Burke said that would be considered to be a spent conviction, as it was more than seven years old.

Mr Burke said: "The media got hold of things. I think the glaring eye of the media had an influence on it (the initial prosecution for a more serious assault charge). Unfortunately, that is the case."

Judge O'Leary put sentencing back to June 18, when another case is listed for hearing, where Ashling Thompson is accused of assaulting another young woman, Aoife O'Flaherty, at the same time and place.

# Rena bucks the trend

One of the country's most decorated sports stars talks to Donal O'Keeffe about life off the pitch - and what it feels like to be a modern-day work of art

ENA Buckley, one of the most decorated players in GAA history, has lately reached new heights of fame. Joining local icons like Roy Keane, Rory Gallagher, and Karl Marx (per The Sultans of Ping FC), she has been honoured by Mad About Cork's guerrilla art campaign - her face now adorns an electrical box on St Peter's and Paul's Place.

On a rainy Monday afternoon in her busy Macroom physiotherapy practice, Rena laughs with delight when asked how she feels about this newest decoration.

"I think it's class," she says. 'It's strange to have something like that about yourself, you know, but it's great for women in sport. I hope too many people aren't laughing at me.

It seems unlikely many would laugh at someone with 18 All-Ireland medals. With six camogie and football doubles, Rena remains the only GAA player to captain her county to All-Ireland success in both codes.

The soul of modesty and fairness, she is quick to correct her interviewer when told she is

"Briege Corkery does as well," she says. "And Briege is still playing with Cork, so she could very easily pass me out. In fact, she has a great chance, because Cork are going well this year in camogie.

ena retired from intercounty competition al-32-year-old still plays camogie with Inniscarra and football with Donoughmore. She trains twice a week with both clubs, although she says she has seen a slight drop

in her own levels of fitness "I wouldn't be quite where I was at inter-county, but I won't be breaking the weighing scales anytime soon either. The standard of training in Cork is very high, and

it's hard to maintain that if you're

not playing at those high levels. But I would take club level very seriously. Inniscarra is a senior camogie club. We got to the All-Ireland semi-final last year. We were beaten by St Martin's from Wexford. Donoughmore is a junior football club --- we're a competitive junior club."

Physiotherapy was something lways hoped to work in: When I was in school, I always loved sports, and I always loved science, so I just hoped to put them together.

Approximately a third of her work is sports-related, the majority from footballing and hurling. Of the rest, she says, back injuries would be the most common, some down to lifestyle, and not getting enough exercise.

Rena advises clients to try to get, when possible, 30 to 40 minutes of exercise, five times a week: "Ideally, you should mix it be-tween cardiovascular training, like walking, cycling and swimming, and then a bit of resistance training, exercises using your own body weight. Press-ups, squatting, lunging, bridging, step-

"To do both types of exercises is important for your health, especially as you get older in life."

In an age of social media, every negative voice can seem ampli-fied. Rena isn't into social media and says it's important to tune out the negativity. "What's very important is that you have a couple of people around you that will support you no matter what, and if they need to give some constructive feedback, take it from them, but Joe Soap on the street? Don't take as much

When asked about her partner, Freemount GAA player Páidí Collins, and their long-term plans together, Rena laughs and says she saw another GAA star "get caught with a question like that one time". She recalls an article where the player's relationship status became the focus of the headline and says she has no intention of that happening here.

She says she and Páidí are in a good place, and long may that continue. We're just enjoying life and enjoying our time together. Sure you never know what's around the corner."

When it's put to Rena that she is one of the greatest athletes the country has ever produced, she demurs modestly that she is very lucky to have been part of some great teams.

teams with brilliant people I'm talking about the whole set-up - management teams, players. And, like me, those players would have had great family support.

"To become a successful player, you need support as a person. The players who tend to play for years at a high level

tend to get great support from the

people around them. "My family has been hugely supportive, and I think family support is something you'll see with most sportspeople, especially those who play after

school level." Her parents still come to her club games, and that family support has made all the difference to

ince retiring from intercounty competition, weekends have become more flexible. She is grateful that she now can devote a little more time to her clubs, and notes that her social life is a little freer too.

"Obviously, if you put a lot of time into sports, you have to put ss time into everything else.

That can affect your work situation, your social life, your relationships, and it can be tricky, forboth males and females, to get that balance right.

"A male sportsperson can sometimes be celebrated that bit more, so it can be a bit easier for a man to commit more time to his sporting life. Girls who are involved in sport are very dedicated, but there definitely would still be a higher recognition for a male than there would be for a female, but I do think that's chang-

Rena notes that for female teams, the All-Ireland final can often be their first visit to Croke Park, something she says can be a pressured situation.

"If you're a male team, you're there for the quarter-final, you're

there for the semi-final, it's the same routine, whereas for a female team it's such a big deal to get to Croke Park. And then it's a pressurised situation of an All-Ireland final as well."

So what can be done to support

female players? "I think we're going in the right direction, but the momentum has to keep up. I think double-headers are excellent, where you have a female fixture and a male fixture paired. Those encourage supporters to cheer on both female

and male players. Rena champions the 20x20 campaign, which plans that by next year, women's sports will have 20% more sponsorship, 20% more media coverage, 20% more attendances, and 20% more participation in playing and administration. "There's a lot of talk in media at the moment about female empowerment, and that's very popular in sport too, and numbers have increased significantly in terms of female participation. I think the rest of society will follow that.

"Media will follow that. And I hope attendance at events will fol

low it as well." She might be retired from inter-county competition, but work or play, Rena Buckley has no intention of slowing down.

And, despite her unjustifiable modesty, it seems unlikely that a city-centre electrical box will be the last or best monument Cork offers to the only GAA player to captain her county to All-Ireland success in camogic and football.

CIARA O'Sullivan never doubted that Cork would defend their All-Ireland camogie minor A championship title.

Apart from an early wake-up call when they lost their Group 2 opener against Tipperary, the young Rebels have impressed en route to a second successive All-Ireland crown.

Newcestown teenager Ciara (17) has been a key player in these back-to-back successes.

'At the start of the year we found it hard to get going and then we came up against a Tipperary team that had hit the ground running. But we know that if we played them now we'd be a different proposition,' Ciara says.

'That loss to Tipp brought us together as a team and we fought harder as a unit after that. From there on, we got better and better.'

Group wins against Wexford and Dublin and a draw with Galway (a repeat of last year's final) saw Cork advance to an All-Ireland semi-final against Kilkenny. They beat the Cats by 1-21 to 1-14. In the final they lowered the Banner with a 3-15 to 2-12 victory against Clare.

'By the time we got to the final we had momentum. We took that from the group stage into the Kilkenny semi-final and we felt unstoppable going into the Clare game,' Ciara says.

'The wind was really strong in the final. We played with it in the first half and we wanted to

put as many scores on the board as we could when we had that advantage. We did. We led 3-11 to 0-3 at half time and I knew we had control in the second half.

'Inever doubted us once from the Tipp match onwards.'

In 2018 Ciara won the All-Ireland minor title alongside Newcestown club-mate Ashling O'Donovan and Ballinascarthy's Moira Barrett who was captain. This season there were five Carbery players on the panel and all five played in the final. As well as Ciara at wing forward, Hannah Sexton (Kilbrittain/Timoleague) and Claire Sexton (Ballinascarthy) lined out in defence, and Enniskeane's Sinead Hurley started in midfield, while another Enniskeane player, Tara Sheehan, replaced Ciara in the second half. Courcey Rovers' Fiona Keating, another who was involved last year, was named player of the match after a fivepoint haul.

'There are more and more West Cork girls being selected for Cork which is brilliant,' Coláiste na Toirbrirte fifth-year student Ciara says.

# Murray feels that camogie will eventually adopt hurling rules

Cork boss says some refs don't know the difference between hurling and camogie

PAUDIE Murray believes that camogie should adopt hurling rules.

The Cork manager also feels that some referees who officiate camogie games don't know the difference between hurling and camogie.

A number of high-profile camogie players have hit the headlines in recent months calling for the game's outdated rules to be updated. Murray agrees that the rulebook needs urgent attention and he wants to see two rule changes made before the start of this summer's All-Ireland championship.

'Eventually I think we should be going to hurling rules, simply because the audience that the Camogie Association are trying to attract are hurling people,' Murray says.

'When they tune in they apply hurling rules automatically to the game and that's why sometimes they are scratching their heads over some decisions – and because they don't know the rules they could be giving out about a referee even if he is doing his job perfectly.'

But Murray also feels that there is a problem with the consistency of refereeing in camogie. That's an opinion echoed in a recent Women's Gaelic Players Association (WGPA) survey. Sixty per cent of inter-county camogie players surveyed felt that the consistency of refereeing is poor.

'A big problem is the consistency of refereeing. Some referees don't actually know the difference between hurling and camogie,' Murray says.

He highlights his frustration with a recent example from Cork's Munster championship win against Clare. 'The referee wanted all players outside the 20-metre line for a puck-out, even though the camogie rules state that it's only the opposition that have to go outside the 20-metre line. That's how poor things are,' Murray says.

'We have our own plans for puck-outs and that worked against our plans. We plan within the rules that are there but then you go out and play but the referee won't allow you do what you had planned – and which is

within the rules - because he doesn't know the rules.'

The All-Ireland winning Cork boss has also called on the powers-that-be to implement rule changes before the championship throws in next month. The WGPA survey found that 82 per cent of inter-county camogie players are in favour of trialling new rules in league competitions. Murray wants to fast forward the process.

'I hope that they look at the contact and the advantage rules before the start of this year's championship. I can't see why not,' he says.

'I think it's essential that we do it.

This year's championship will be exciting. Galway are the front-runners, then there is Kilkenny in second and I'd have Cork in third at the moment; that's going on what we saw in the league.

Then you have Limerick, Tipperary, Dublin, Waterford, and they'll all be in the shake-up.

'It could be a very exiting championship if things are left flow. But what you don't want is to pick up the newspaper on the Monday morning after a championship game and see that 70 to 80 per cent of scores came from frees. No one wants that.

'Camogie could be a wonderful product if we make it free flowing.'

To improve the game Murray feels that two rules could be changed straightaway and have a positive effect on the game. Not surprisingly he—like a vast majority of camogie players — wants to see a change to the rules relating to physical contact, which are slowing the game down and turning matches into shoot-outs between

free-takers.
The rules around contact

are an issue, especially the frontal challenge and the shoulder. They need to be looked at fairly quickly, Murray insists.

'All the up-to-date data we have will tell you that frees have increased in the game – and that's not a good thing. If you analysed the frees, they're not down to pulling and dragging. In the main it's because players have got fitter and physically stronger. Girls are covering ground now quicker than they were six years ago.'

Murray is also adamant that the advantage rule should be changed immediately

changed immediately.

'We need to let advantage develop until the play breaks

down rather than having a five-second rule that we use at the moment, he points out.

'What we want to see is that instead of the five-second rule that the advantage keeps going until the play breaks down or there is an actual advantage.'

The Cork boss attended the recent Feedback Forum – organised by camogies bosses and held in Dublin at the end of April – and he hopes that the voices of managers and players will be listened to.

'There are areas to improve on straightaway that can make the game flow that bit quicker: That's what we all want: a better and more enjoyable game.'

### Listen to players and update camogie's rules

LIBBY Coppinger told The Southern Star earlier this year that too often camogie is 'not an enjoyable game to watch." The All-Ireland winning Kealkill woman (pictured above) said everyone would 'prefer less frees and more open play."

That's a familiar cry for change that several top inter-county players have made in recent months.

Cork great Gemma O'Connor pleaded that 'players are crying out for change' and 'the game needs to be revised urgently'.

Amy O'Connor admitted that camogie 'is a game of free-takers', that it can be 'a bit boring to play', 'boring to watch' and has become 'just free after free after free.'

Galway captain Sarah Dervan told the 42.ie that 'nobody wants to see a free-taking competition as a game', and just last week Kilkenny legend Anne Dalton added her voice to the calls for an overhaul of the rulebook: The game has changed. The rules have to change

The players must be listened to. One of the main gripes is the lack of physical contact in camogie. It's non-existent. Camogie is a noncontact sport. That's frustrating for players who are fitter, stronger and faster than ever before - but the rules haven't evolved to mirror the improvement in players' physicality

and conditioning. 'I don't think it would be any trouble to have a bit more physical contact in the game,' Libby Coppinger said. That's an opinion shared by a large percent of inter-county players. In a recent WGPA survey 70 per cent of players were very much in favour of change to the rules relating to physical contact.

The survey found that 'there was a sense that the rules of camogie were not keeping pace with changes in the fitness of players, and equally, that the technical skills of the game are not as visible as they could and should be.

Players have become frustrated with the high number of frees awarded in games. In last year's televised All-Ireland senior final, 18 of the 27 scores were from frees, including Cork's winning point.

The game has become stop-start. It doesn't flow. It can be hard to watch. As Amy O'Connor said, whoever has the best free-taker wins.

The rule book is the problem.

In camogie both shouldering and 'moving into an opponent's body' are against the rules. But players want more physicality in the game and not have the referee blow for a free every time there is contact.

Cork boss Paudie Murray says rules around 'the frontal challenge and the shoulder' need to be looked at fairly

More physicality should be allowed in the game. Let camogie be played at speed and with hits.

At Camogie Congress in April, Rule 20.4. re: introduction of ability to trial playing rules passes with a majority of 67 per cent, and that's a tentative step in the right direction - but managers and players need to see a plan put in place and a timeline for change.

Camogie players are training harder than ever and preparing better than ever, and they deserve the chance to show off their talents and skills without being restricted by an archaic rulebook (that hasn't changed with the times) and the referee's whistle.

It's in everyone's interests - the Camogie Association, the players, the managers and the supporters - that the concerns of players are listened to and acted on, and the rulebook is

People want to be able to see a stylish, skilful game. I think those players in the present day are capable of doing that, just that they're not allowed to go out and demonstrate that because of the stop-start nature of the match,' Amy O'Connor said earlier this year.

There is an overwhelming desire for change, it has to happen. The players deserve that at the very least.



# Market opening in Women's sport



THE Cork senior Camogie team are going for three in a row of All-Ireland titles this year. The Dublin ladies' footballers are going for likewise.

Blackbee Investments have come on board as Cork's new sponsor in a three-year deal. Despite playing in front of 50,141 people last September, the Dublin ladies still struggle to find corporate investment and are forced to organise 'golf classics' and other small-scale fundraising events. Ciara McGuigan is an All-Ireland

winner at both minor and U21 level with Dublin and has completed her master's in marketing, with her disser-tation focusing on 'The Benefits, Return on Investment and Brand Engagement within Ladies Gaelic Foot-ball & Camogie', for sponsors, McGuigan found that women's sport

receives just 0.4% of corporate investment globally.

Women's sport has, up until now, been very much an afterthought when it comes to sponsorships. Men's sport has always dominated the industry and it can often feel as though the Olympics and Wimbledon are the only tournaments in which female athletes are taken as seriously as their male

In recent years, there has been a major shift in public perception of women's sport, despite a severe lack of unding among many women's teams. Some sponsorship deals have been on the rise, however, which indicates that real change is happening and will con-

inue to do so. Globally, are women's sports worth the sponsorship investment if they aren't as popular as men's sports? A LogoGrab' blog put forward a strong argument recently that "yes, they defi-

nitely are". Let's explore why. Women's sport is actually thriving and there are many reasons for this nost notably, the successes of women's teams and athletes in tournaments, particularly in the US and Euope. Participation in women's sport is at an all-time high, despite the argu-nent that sponsorship decisions are entirely market-driven.

Over 3.3 million girls play sports in he US and women make up 58% of participants at running events. The nost important statistic of all, from a orand and ROI perspective, is that women control 70-80% of consumer

Perpetuating the excuse that sports ponsorships are purely marketfriven in order to justify the lack of ponsorship support for women's eams won't cut it anymore. Women's port is a huge market for sponsorhips and the growth in the industry

nly serves to validate this. It's not just active women in sport. Their popularity amongst fans is inreasing at a substantial rate. For example, the 5,000 tickets designated to he Wales vs. England game for the Women's Football World Cup on 31 August 2019 sold out in just 24 hours. In addition, The Football Association announced that it is likely to double the number of players and fans by 2020.

There is a major misconception that both men and women have an interest in men's sport, while only women have an interest in women's sport. But that's simply not the case. According to Nielsen, 84% of sports fans have an interest in women's sports, 51% of whom are male. Furthermore, 56% of fans watching the Women's Rugby World Cup final from home were male, as well as 58% of fans watching the Women's Euros semi-final.

Turnout at major women's sporting events has grown an average of 38% each year since 2013. Moreover, while over four million people tuned in to watch soccer's Euro 2017 semi-final, 1,94 million people watched the Women's Rugby World Cup 2017 final. And according to Sky, the Women's Cricket World Cup was also seen by over 1.1 million.

So, if women's sports are indeed extremely popular, then why haven't sponsors acknowledged this?

The bottom line is that the media

needs to take action to support women's sport in order to encourage sponsors to invest in them. Although there is an abundance of sportswomen out there, there is a serious lack of representation of these women and their sports in the media. (It is improving marginally here).

It's also disappointing from the point of view of young girls. If they can't actually see female athletes achieving incredible victories, then they will be left with very few sports heroines to look up to who could be role models for them. That's where our own "20x20 - If she can't see it, she can't be it" sport's initiative was introduced by the Federation of Irish Sport to raise the profile and participation of females in sport.

This historic lack of exposure has meant that sportswomen and their teams need to circumvent traditional media and innovate in order to keep up (thank God for social media). And if they have to do this, then so do spon-

To sum up, women's sport is pros-pering like never before, accumulating support from a wider range of audiences and some sponsors. Brands need to realise that targeting for women's sport shouldn't be limited to female demographics, especially since, as already discussed, a substantial percentage of women's sport's viewership is

male.

It's also important for brands to really engage with women's sport and focus on the bigger picture rather than one-off returns for a single event.

If the trajectory of women's sport continues the way it is, brands could be missing out on valuable long-term investments by turning down sponsorship opportunities for women's teams and athletes. By approaching these op-portunities in a unique way, these sponsorships could provide both the brands and the sportswomen just as, and possibly more, value in the longterm than men's sponsorships.



'And it's silverware too. There are only a few trophies on offer every season so it's one that we want to win."

The experienced O'Connor at centre back, as always, was rock solid in the Cork defence on Saturday. Laura Treacy at full back and Libby Coppinger were another two to shine in

The first half was an open and free-flowing game with little separating the sides. Megan Ryan got Tipp up and running with an early point before Orla Cotter, unerring on placed balls, fired over her first of five to level proceedings.

Two Nicole Walsh frees in quick succession had Tipperary two clear after five minutes. But an unanswered Cork brace from Amy O'Connor and a fine Chloe Sigerson long-range effort soon levelled the game.

Collins pass, she made no mistake to hit the back of the net and push Cork seven clear. That goal extinguished any Tipperary hopes.



# Will Cork meet Kilkenny in final?



THE Liberty Insurance All-Ireland Senior Camogie Championship is only two weeks away.

Reigning champions Cork are in a group (2) that features last year's semi-finalists Tipperary, quarter-finalists Waterford and Dublin, Meath and

Having met in the semi-final stage in 2018, Kilkenny and Galway will face off once more, drawn alongside each other for the opening game in group 1. They will face competition from Of-

faly, Limerick and Wexford.

The two teams to top their respective groups will automatically qualify for the semi-finals, while second and third placed teams will qualify for the quarter-final stages. This year will see one team face relegation from the senior championship as the two teams to finish bottom of their groups will face off in a relegation play-off. With Galway having defeated Kil-

kenny in the National league final earlier this year, is it as foregone a con-clusion as people think that it's going to be another Cork and Kilkenny final?

After so many years of unrest in Galway, has new manager Cathal Murray finally settled a rocky ship, calmed the waters and set to ride the tide in 2019?

His side captured their first national title since 2015 and ended the Cats' league dominance, pulling the curtain down on their four in-a-row bid while shaking things up nicely ahead of

championship.

Cork and Kilkenny have really dominated the inter-county landscape over the past few years.

Since Galway last lifted the league crown in 2015, Ann Downey's Kilkenny have won three — beating the Tribe in 2016 and then the Rebels in 2017 and 2018. The Noresiders' ended Cork's 2018. The Noresiders' ended Cork's three in-a-row All-Ireland championship bid in 2016, but the Leesiders' have beaten them in the past two finals to lift back-to-back O'Duffy Cups.

Galway have had an array of talent through the years, but their failure to stay at the very top since their second All-Ireland senior championship title win in 2013 has puzzled many.

The lack of continuity at management level has surely not helped, but now they seem a much more solid unit.

And league silverware provided a

nice boost.

Sarsfields defender Tara Kenny wouldn't allow herself or her teammates get too carried away, but she was well aware of the value of their league triumph. "At the end of the day, we know it's the league and we have Kilkenny in the first round of the Championship and that's different gravy, but we haven't beaten Kilkenny in the last few years so mentally that's going to be good for us.'

Kilkenny will be a different side come June 15 for that opening clash.

They hadn't a huge amount of hurling done for the league, focusing on the gym due to the difficulty in trying to get a pitch for some consistent hurling.

But they used a lot of young girls throughout the league and that will stand to them.

Cork defeated Tipperary last week to take their 61st Munster title, 3-17 to 2-10 and they weren't at full strength. Dublin are also facing into their first championship under a new manager,

Frank Browne. Frank brings with him a proven track record with senior inter-county

squads in both hurling & ladies' foot-He managed the Mayo senior ladies football team and took them to the All-

Ireland Final in 2017. He has also managed the Mayo senior hurling team and worked with the Roscommon senior hurling team as Director of Fitness & Coaching

Frank can only work with what he

has, and Dublin are going to need consistent underage success over the next decade to bring them closer to the

Kilkenny have won six minor titles since the U18 championship's inauguration in 2016.

Galway have won three, Tipperary two, Cork two and Limerick one.

Galway have won the last three U16 All Ireland titles in a row (6 in ten

Tipperary won three out of the previous four. So where should the strong competition be coming from?

Definitely, Galway and Tipp but while Galway are always close to the dining table, Tipperary are seated further back, and they seriously need to do a root and branch on why that is.

Limerick, Clare, Tipperary, Offaly, Wexford and Waterford, strong hurling counties, need to be at the forefront when it comes to camogie too.

### 'We are not afraid of change and we're not afraid of the challenge'

The Camogie Association is "not afraid of change" as players demand rule changes to improve the game as a spec-

That was the strong mess-age from association president, Kathleen Woods at yesterday's launch of the Liberty Insurance All-Ireland Championships, where it was also revealed that six of the group matches in the senior cham-pionship will be streamed live, and that New York will be the venue for the second All-Stars tour in November.

Both of these developments are backed by Liberty Insurance, who are entering their seventh season as championship sponsors, and have placed a major emphasis on raising the profile and exposure of camogie, as well as looking to drive increased participation and attendances.

An attractive spectacle is central to that ideal, and it was notable that Woods acknowledged the new horizons created by the players' growing dedication to being elite athletes and the challenges facing the sport in view of that.

There has been widespread debate surrounding the rules of the game, particularly in the wake of last year's stopstart All-Ireland final between Cork and Kilkenny. The revolutionary motion passed at Congress in April, allowing the introduction of trial rules without having to wait for the previously-required threeyear cycle to come around, showed that the association

Yesterday, Woods spoke of the players "going through an evolutionary period", doing the exercise of a professional

athlete in an amateur world".
"Ard Comhairle are not afraid of change and we're not afraid of the challenges. Our most important step is the creation of the playing rules review working group.

Cork captain, Gemma O'Connor, was part of a group of players brought together by the WGPA to look at the issues and welcomed the acknowledgement change was needed.

"Things are slow, but I think they're finally starting to move," said O'Connor, a nine-time All-Ireland winner and 11-time All-Star who captains the Rebels as they bid for three-in-a-row honours this season. "They're setting up the rules review group which hopefully will start sooner rather than later. Liberty Insurance, with the All-Star trip

and the streaming of games is moving it in the right direction. We just hope that it's moving a bit quicker and it continues to move in that direction. More than likely I won't be there to play with (any new) rules but it's for the future players, to make the game that bit better. And we have the product to make it an unbelievable sport. What we want is a bit more flow to the

game."
O'Connor asserted that "the game has to reflect what the players are doing off the pitch" and that an opportunity existed now to make real progress. "We're not being negative about it: We're all in it together to make sure it's a great game ... We want the talking point (after the All-Ireland final to be) that camogie is a great sport, that the hurling is fantastic, it's fast, it's physical. That's what attracts viewership. We don't want to go backward, we want to move forwards.

Kilkenny defender Grace Walsh concurred. She said: "I would just like the rules to be tweaked a little bit... Let girls show the skill-base they have, show the quality, show the pace (Camogle) can be played at, the way it's played at training" stated Walsh.

"I think that will bring the game forward and get more people to come to the games because they want to watch it

because they want to watch it, because they think it's going to be an exciting game.

Dublin's Aisling Maher was part of the WGPA group along with O'Connor, Chloe Morey from Clare, Kilkenny's Anne Dalton and others, and emphasised the need for "con-structive steps" in a shared journey involving all the stakeholders.

"I think there's a common perception that everyone wants shouldering in, and I don't think necessarily that's the case" Maher observed. "I would like to see a slight change in the definition in the tackle. I feel like at the mo-

ment it's a little ambiguous.

'It's very difficult for referees to implement, and it's very difficult as a player to know how a referee is going to im-plement it game-to-game. It's very difficult to spend all this time on strength and conditioning, and then tackle a player and not give away a free, because any kind of physical contact seems to be falling on the wrong side more often than not.

"But for me to come back, things had to be right.

"I said to Paudie (Murray, the Cork camogie senior team manager) that I've a lot of commitments this year and, as you get older, the commit-

ments get greater.
"I've a lot of close family weddings.
My cousin Alan got married a few weeks ago and it was one of the first real opportunities to celebrate some-thing as a family, as opposed to grieving (referring to the loss of her mother, her nan, and her cousin over the past three-and-a-half years). That was im-portant to me. I had to leave that early for training and I'm bridesmaid for a friend's wedding the day of our game

friend's wedding the day of our game against Dublin, so I'll more than likely miss that wedding.

"Aoife and I have a number of weddings and we train Saturdays and Sundays mornings, so life becomes a rush.

"So, I said I will come back on condition that the set-up would be the same, that there would be no change in management, that we weren't starting from agement, that we weren't starting from

"I'm not saying that what worked the last few years will work this year anything can happen in any given championship — but things went well for us over the last few years and I've a good relationship with the manage-ment and the girls.

"Obviously, Paudie changes things some bit every year to keep it fresh, but to have the backbone of the management and the team remain, yeah, I decided to give it one more year. Then, of course, the three-in-a-row is at the back of your mind. That's something I never achieved. That thought came at a later stage, but I'd by lying if I said it wasn't an incentive.

When St Finbarr's won their first senior county title, in 2006, only one person was going to be handed the captaincy of Cork for 2007. Unfortunately, Cork lost their bid for three-in-a-row that year and now Gemma finds herself in a familiar position.

At this time of year, it might seem strange to hear tell of two sports stars from Cork and Tipperary working side by side.

For Ashling Thompson, camogie takes a back seat this weekend. The Rebel star has made the trip to Mondello Park instead, to take the wheel of a Ford Fiesta for her first motor race. Thompson is going it alone, but Ireland's fastest female driver will be there to guide her.

Nicole Drought, 24, from Tipperary has already made her mark on the track. Two weeks ago in Wales, the Roscrea native won a major endurance race - the Citroen C1 Challenge 4-Hour Race. In 2016, Drought became the first woman to win a round of the Irish Touring Car Cham-pionship. Before she started racing, Drought excelled at camogie, captaining Roscrea to an U16 County Championship title.

No wonder Drought has discovered Thompson is a

kindred spirit.

"She's fast," said Drought.

"She's so competitive. I'm
hopeful she can get a top ten."

Thompson has to learn

quickly. When they line up on the grid for the Keelan Construction Fiesta Zetec Championship tomorrow, Thompson will be racing other cars for the first time.

'Motorsport was something that I always had an interest in," Thompson reveal-"I've always loved driving. I was taught at the age of 12 how to drive. We'd go to the Rally of the Lakes every year while rally driving around north Cork is very popular.

The two-time All-Star first met Drought two months ago. Drought is an ambassador

for Formula Female, established by Ireland hockey international Nicci Daly. Thompson starred at Mondello last April when she was pitted against Ireland's leading sportswomen in an

unique one lap challenge. This weekend she returns to Mondello in association with Motorsport Ireland and Formula Female.

"Your positioning on the track is very much like your

positioning on the field," Thompson explained. "You have to be able to read the situation. To get past people and to get yourself up to speed, you have to be on the ball. You have to be in the

right position at the right

With guidance from Drought, who races in the Irish Strykers Championship today, Thompson is on the right road.

"I think she'll be good," said Drought. "She's unsure of herself driving in traffic but she just has to keep an eye on her mirrors. If she doesn't, she won't be the only driver not looking in their mirror."

During practice yesterday, Thompson spent time figuring out turning points and braking points. In her black overalls, the 29-year-old was

"I'm kind of just taking time out at the moment," Thompson relayed. "This is the perfect opportunity to keep the brain focused somewhat. I don't know what I'll do yet in terms of camogie.'

Although uncertain about the future, she is keeping her options open: "I played camogie during the league. I didn't play Munster Championship. The door is definitely not closed. I'll decide what I'm going to do in a few weeks' time when I've a clearer mind on things. It won't be a retire-ment job or anything like. We have Championship with the club in July so there'll be no finish to camogie at all yet. They haven't seen the last of me playing camogie."

Meanwhile, Drought con-tinues to climb the ladder. Only four years into her motor racing career, she has clocked up wins at home and abroad, her latest success coming at Anglesey Circuit in South Wales on 26 May. Against all expectations, Drought took the chequered flag, 21 seconds ahead of her nearest challenger after four hours of racing.

"To win in the UK was massive," said Drought, "It's the biggest win I've had. I couldn't believe it when I crossed the line. I kept thinking, 'This is mental.' It wouldn't sink in even though I knew it was real."
