A NEW BEGINNING

ith Centenary year now in the background, teams and managers are firmly thinking of the forthcoming National League beginning on the 27th of this month. A new year always brings hope and in some cases many changes writes Maire Ui Scolai.

If last year's senior All-Ireland finalists Cork and Tipperary make it to Croke Park on September 18th this year, they will both do so with new managers. Double All-Ireland winning camogie manager Raymie Ryan of Tipperary stepped down having guided his team to the top, winning back to back Munster championships, completing a hat-trick in Centenary year of the Munster, National League and the Foras na Gaeilge All-Ireland titles. It might sound daunting to take

on such a task as defending all three titles, especially when one recalls the two narrow escapes the Premier County had last season at the hands of Wexford, in both the League Final and the All-Ireland semi-final. However, the man who stepped into Raymie's shoes, Paddy McCormack, is no stranger to Croke Park.

Paddy, who works as Games Development Officer in Thurles IT, has previously managed the Premier U21 hurlers as well as the minor hurlers. He also wore the Blue and Gold for a short time, but never made it to Croke Park, but come next September it is his hope to be standing on the sideline and not sitting as a spectator in either the Cusack or Hogan Stands.

"When asked by the County Board I was both delighted and honoured to be asked to take charge of the Tipperary team, they are a fine bunch of girls and I am looking forward to the challenge," commented Paddy, who has star forward and 2004 All Star Claire Grogan in his college. Like his predecessors. Paddy has not been involved with camogic teams before; however, he has seen the girls in action. The fact that he has not been involved previously with camogie teams may be a good omen for the Premier side. However, he knows one or two things about camogie and very much feels that Wexford will be putting it up to most counties this year.

It will be a big source of encouragement to the new manager that there is no talk of retirements so far in the Tipperary camp, although perhaps a few of their opponents might wish for a few! February 27th will be a test for the defending League champions when they travel to Kilkenny to take on the Cats in their opening match. Whenever these two sides meet it is always close and indeed their last encounter was in the third round of the Foras na Gaeilge championship last season when the

Cats almost defeated the Blue and Gold. Given that they are meeting so early in the League it may prove not to be as close as other occasions, but Tipperary will not be allowed to forget that championship encounter last summer. After all, Tipperary will be the team that most counties will want to defeat; the new manager will be aware of this and may well have a couple of new players in mind. Certainly the girls have been back training, so it is a matter of wait and see, but Paddy would love to record his first day out with a victory.

Tipperary's opponents last September, Cork, have also gone the route of a new manager. In the place of the former Cork hurler John Considine, comes five times All-Ireland winning minor manager John Cronin. In contrast to Raymie Ryan, John will have the task of turning defeat to victory and while we all know the very talented players that are by Leeside, he will be anxious to get back on the

winning rostrum very quick, which is probably why he has taken on the former six times All-Ireland senior winner Fióna O'Driscoll as physical trainer. The fact that Fióna is included in the back room team alongside Lillian Zinkant, who was with the successful Cork juniors last year will give the girls a great incentive to do well. Indeed the talented forward who won many awards over a long and distinguished career played with some of the present players such as Stephanie Dunlea who lead the Rebels to the field of dreams last September.

However, for Cork to make it all the way this coming season they will need to pick up a couple of other forwards, and to this end John will be very anxious to look at some of the successful minors, particularly those of the three in a row team of 2002, 2001 and 2000. John stepped down early last year following the minor defeat by Clare in the Munster Minor championship semi-final. Like Tipperary, they will taste the green sward on February 27th when they travel to the big smoke to take on the Dubs. Like the Tipperary versus Kilkenny outing, this encounter will not be an easy one as Dublin in contrast to the 2004 finalists have retained their manager Peter Lucey. The Dubs, who did not contest the senior championship last season, have again opted not to compete in the senior grade except for the National League. Like other counties they are well back in training now.

With much talk these days of professionalism in Gaelic Games it is interesting to see the professionalism coming into the training and management side of things in camogie. More counties are now looking at Supporters Clubs for instance and this may well be one way in which much needed funds might be raised and thus assist the county Board Officers in this way.

Other counties who are likely to shine are possibly Galway who impressed many last season when they took two All-Ireland titles across the Shannon. The first championship title of 2004, the minor All-Ireland headed to Galway and then they came back in October to win their first Intermediate title at the expense of Tipperary. While they suffered defeat at the hands of Cork in the All-Ireland semi-final it was a much more polished performance than the previous season. They may be the surprise package of

2005, but may not reach Croke Park just yet. Hot on most peoples lips will be the Model County who ended the year on a very good note with three All Stars, Áine Codd, Kate Kelly and Mary Leacy. Wexford know where they need the extra players on the field and given the continued success of Coláiste Bride in Enniscorthy they will chase everything this year.

It is difficult to see Limerick making huge strides this season as they seemed in many people's eyes to have slipped back last year. However, should they be able to pick up a number of young talented players in the county they may have a good League run which would give them much needed experience. Antrim unfortunately failed miserably last season and it would a real shock if they were to make an impact on the League this season.

While much talk often centres on the big guns, spare a thought for Westmeath. The maroon and white girls did not compete in the Division two League for over ten years, but that is now all in the past. Since last year, Offaly man Camillus King is in charge and while they lost in the opening round of the National League the defeat was not as heavy as previous years. It is most welcome to see counties coming back into the League as it is a great preparation for the championship and should open up the Provincial championship a lot more. Time will tell, here's to a good second centaury of camogie.

OFFALY PAY TRIBUTE TO MIRIAM UI CHEALLACHAIN

The Faithful County recently paid a fine tribute to Uachtarán Cumann Camógaíocht na nGael Miriam Ui Cheallacháin when the Offaly Association honoured her with Offaly person of the year.

This progressive Association are intending to bring out a history of the Association next year which no doubt will feature a lot of Offaly people and they will welcome any information they can get from people on this.

When the Tullamore Lady was elected to the highest position in Cumann Camógaiochta na nGael in 2003 in the Arklow Bay Hotel in County Wicklow she became the first lady from the County to hold the position. Miriam, who was accompanied by her husband Liam and daughters Áine and Orla, was overcome on the night.

"I was not sure what to expect, but it is a truly great honour and I am delighted to accept this great award," was how the former player and Offaly administrator put it.

As well as holding all positions in the Offaly County Board, she also held positions in Leinster Council. A former Uachtarán of the Second Level Colleges, she was in charge of All-Ireland finals at all levels. Although her county reached the All-Ireland Final in 2000, they just failed to bring back the New Ireland Assurance Cup to the midlands. The same year Miriam was county PRO. No doubt, it would be a moment of great delight for the former player if she was given the opportunity of presenting an All-Ireland Cup to her own county.

Miriam holds the unique position alongside the former GAA President, the late John Dowling, as the only officials from the midlands county to grace the highest office in their respective associations.

was held in the Regency Hotel in Dublin. In fact John Dowling became the first winner of the award in 1988. Miriam faced tough opposition from such well known Offaly people as the singer Johnny McEvoy, Michael Grogan, Ricey Scully, and many others. However, in the end there was no dispute as to who should receive the beautiful award made of Bog Oak.

On the night, Miriam was described as a founder member of the Tullamore club in 1973, and it is reckoned that she is one of the few players to hold medals with two different counties. This came about when there was no camogie club in Tullamore and she persuaded her parents to play in near by Laois where she won an underage championship medal! Since the Tullamore Lady donned the office of Uachtarán she has travelled the length and breath of Ireland and has received invitations abroad as well.

On the night many former winners were present including the great Matt Connor, Brian Cowan, Tom Parlon and Fr. Tom Scully. A large number of camogic personnel were also in attendance including three former presidents, Mary Moran, Lily Spence and Bridin Ui Mhaolagáin.

Also in attendance were members of the Offaly Board, runai Molly Guinan, and newly elected Cathaoirleach Gráinne McIntyre, formerly Mc Gabhann, who played for the famed Kilmacud Crokes in Dublin and Coláiste Íosagáin. Gráinne spoke in both languages and wished Miriam all the best for the remainder of her term.

Miriam's fellow Ardchomhairle members Sheila Wallace, Ardstiúrthóir, Sinéad O'Connor, Finance and Sponorship Manager and Máire Ui Scolai, National Camogie PRO were also present on the night. A four course meal was enjoyed by all with the speeches all kept sharp and to the point.

With the speeches over it was time for people to boogie the night away and that is what people did until the late hours. Earlier in the year the former Offaly player was invited to London by the Offaly Association there to receive a similar award and no doubt before her term is over many other awards will filter her way.

Miriam has also a keen interest in

politics which she said she received from her Mother while the Sports side came from her father. Both her daughters play camogie and her youngest daughter Orla was involved in the centenary celebrations on All-Ireland final day last year. An employee of the Midland Health Board, she leads a busy life between work and camogie. She even commented on the night that one of her daughters asked her once "when are you going to become a normal person, making beds and the like?" Miriam just laughed as did the attendance of over 200.

During her term in office some major changes have taken place. The first ever International competition, the first ever Shinty/Camogie Tournament were successfully held while Sinead O'Connor was appointed as the first ever Finance and Sponsorship Manager.

Should Offaly take a National title during her term it would be the real icing on the cake for the lady who hails from the Tullamore, where the first recipient of the Offaly Person of the Year, John Dowling, also came from.

Jenny has a bright future ahead of her

JENNIFER O'LEARY was last week named the 96 and 103fm, Rochestown Park Hotel, 'Player of the month' award for February in recognition of her outstanding performances in the Ashbourne Cup which her college, University of Limerick, retained for the second year in a row.

At just 21 years of age Jenny, from Barryroe in West Cork, has already made a name for herself as one of camogie's brightest stars with a great future ahead.

Currently studying PE and English in UL, Jenny captained the side last month to their historic Ashbourne win and played a major

UL defeated UCD in the final on a score line of 0-12 to 1-4 and Jenny scored 10 of those 12 points, nine coming from placed balls. Her calm, cool, left over right style of play rarely lets her down. Jenny, as she is affectionately known to her team-mates, began playing camogie when she was just eight years of age.

Her older sisters, Paula and Carol played it and wanting to be like them she picked up a hurley and 'tagged along'.

"It was Mrs Kearney in my National school in Barryroe who really brought me along. She started it in the school and from there I have not stopped," she said. The competitive streak in Jenny came to the fore very early on. "I used to be very competitive with Paula. We were always playing matches one on one. She always won though."

Winning wasn't long coming Jenny's way. Her first taste of success was in 1998 when Barryroe won the Feile na nGael Championship. She won an All-Ireland B title with her school, Sacred Heart, Clonakility and progressed to win the Senior B

County championship with Barryroe It wasn't long before Jenny's talent

was spotted by inter-county selectors. She received the call-up to the minor squad in 1998 and won back-to-back All-Ireland titles. An All-Ireland intermediate medal followed in 2000 and by then Jenny was destined for senior status. 2001 saw her win her first senior medal when Cork won the National League. It was 12 months later that Jenny experienced her first taste of what it was like to win an All-Ireland senior title. The memory is still very fresh today. "My greatest victory had to be the 2002 senior victory over Tipp. "Having lost the year before and not having tasted victory at this level before, it was an unreal moment.

"I didn't' realise how brilliant this achievement was until we reached Kent station the night after and the welcome we received was

"The support and congratulations I



received when I got home to Barryroe was unforgettable. As with most victories, the fall from the top is hard to take. When Cork lost their title 12 months later, Jenny felt both sides of the coin and it hurt.

"It was very hard to come to terms with our defeat in 2003. Not only do you feel disappointed for the team but you also feel disappointed for all the people that had traveled miles to see you play.

"The loss by only two points was particularly devastating." Jenny felt very welcome the moment she became part of the senior set up.

"I admire all the players who went before me. Those players made me very welcome when I first came on the senior panel and they showed me the ropes.

"One of the many I admire is Fiona O'Driscoll, her use of the ball was so clever."

Barryroe is very close to Jenny's heart, but not close enough for

She finds it tough at times to get the necessary lift to training, an hour away.

"I try to stay around Cork City as much as possible during the summer, doing summer camps, etc. That keeps me close to training. but it is tough to organise a spin at times.

But organise it she does and she never misses a session. Is there anything she'd like to see

change in the game?

"I would like to see shouldering brought into the game. Many people have said that in last years All-Ireland there were too many stoppages, it allows for no flow at all and it is extremely frustrating for both players and spectators.

"The game is getting more physical anyway. Bringing in a fair shoulder would not cause any problems.

One of three Cork players to be named on camogie's first All-Star selection in 2004, Jenny was also selected on the Ashbourne All star team for 2005.

The West Cork girl would love to win an All-Ireland again with Cork as well as a senior A county title with Barryroe.

"We have great talent at home. "We were unlucky last year to be defeated by just a point in the quarter final. You are always trying to improve your own personal performance each year so I hope to try and do just that.

"The Ashbourne three in a row with UL would not go astray. This young star wants it all but why wouldn't she? She can certainly achieve it. The future does indeed look very bright.

LIMERICK lost to Galway at the Gaelic Grounds, 2-10 to 0-8, in a Division One camogie encounter which featured sisters on opposing sides. Veronica Curtin was Galway's top scorer with 1-3 while her sister Orla wore the green and white, having recently transferred to Limerick.

Galway were only ahead by a soli-tary point at the break, 1-5 to 0-7. An opening point after four minutes from Limerick's Marie Keating gave the underdogs some hope and despite Lourda Kavanagh replying four minutes later with Galway's opening point, that too was answered immediately with an

Aoife Sheehan point.

However, Galway got to grips with
the game following an Emma Kilkelly goal after 23 minutes. They made the second half their own, with Orla's sister Veronica scoring the crucial Galway goal to make sure of Galway's sec-

ond league victory. 

FOR the first time in eight years Cork are not defending their Munster Minor Championship crown, writes MARY WHITE. Instead, they find themselves seeking to regain it after a shock defeat to Clare at the semi-final stage last year.

Cork have been the kingpins of Munster and Ireland over the past decade when it comes to the Minor Championship. Five All-Ireland titles in seven years nothing further need be said. Cloughduv man John Cronin was at the helm during those glorious years and despite the turnaround of players, time and again he combined the talent at his disposal into a formidable

Unfortunately, when at the top, there's only one way to go and Cork lost their Munster and All-Ireland titles in 2004. A cold, wet, windy night saw them possibly take their opponents for granted and they paid the price.

On April 8 and 9, we host the Annual Congress in the Blarney Park Hotel. Delegates from the 32 counties will attend with many submitting motions. Six weeks later Cork host the Féile na nGael All-Ireland Championship

Teams from the other 31 counties will pour into Cork for three days of competition. Champions Douglas will defend their crown and there can be no better place to retain or win the title than in your home county. But first, Congress, Some motions up for discussion are purely terminology. There is a motion to call the present Minor Championship the U16 Championship. Thereafter the term minor shall refer to a player/member who is U18 years of age on January 1 of a

competition year. It never fails to amaze me the number of rules affected by certain motions. By this one change the terminology of seven rules must be amended.

Offaly have submitted a proposal that the junior championship be run on the same format as the senior championship i.e. open draw league basis. I can understand why counties would want this, particularly Galway who have little or no Connaught opposition. It has certainly improved the senior championship with teams guaranteed three or four games in their group. Without doubt though, it does take the sting out of a provincial victory. Winning the Munster title is definitely not the buzz it used to be. The importance of the competition has faded with many teams not even fielding their full strength squad. The All-Ireland remains the number one priority.

London have requested that they be allowed participate in the Junior National League in 2006. No disrespect to London but there is little worse than a camogie board having to fork out the best part of €10,000 to bring a panel across the water to annihilate a side. I can see most counties shuddering at the thought of being drawn in the same group. One of the most topical

motions presented is the re-grading of players. I mentioned a couple of weeks



ago the crazy situation which currently exists whereby a player unless they possess an All-Ireland senior or intermediate medal can play at a grade lower than their defined status or grade. The motion is submitted by Offaly whereby participation in a higher grade in any season's championship shall designate a player's grade and define their status to that level for the future unless a regrading is

A player would not be eligible to compete in any inter-county or provincial competition thereafter at a grade lower than this unless a period of two years has elapsed from the date of her last championship match. Most of the other items up for discussion are the usual, e.g., the duties and powers of refs. advertising on jerseys etc. There is a fairly large section dedicated to the Carnogle Supporters Club Constitution. Tipperary introduced this club a few years ago and it has been a resounding success. Not ones to be left behind, Cork are now in the process of forming the same. It will be up and running within the next couple of weeks and I will keep you fully updated. The goal of the club is to operate a fundraising body for the purpose of providing equipment, services for the county camogie panels as are deemed appropriate and necessary with the team management and county board.

That's the legal wording of the club. In layman's terms the objective of the club will be to raise funds and to the best of its ability ensure these funds are readily available to all inter-county teams to assist them in their quest for All-Ireland honours. Thursday May 19 is the beginning of the Féile Na nGael weekend. A huge amount of preparation work is needed and the camogle board have elected a sub committee for that purpose. In 2001 Cork again were the hosts and with the foot and mouth epidemic that existed at the time they were unsure up to practically the last minute as to whether the competition would go ahead or not. It did and Cork had just six weeks to prepare. It was a great success and no doubt it will be this time round as well.

Funds from the Council must be spent wisely



A QUARTER of a Million euro! It sounds an awful lot of money. It is an awful lot of money. How far will it go?

Last Friday evening, April 8 at the opening of the Annual Camogie Congress at the Blamey Park Hotel, President Miriam O'Callaghan was overjoyed to announce that the association is to receive a grant of €250,000 from the Irish Sports Council.

Council chief executive John Treacy delivered the good news to the large attendance and said: "We are delighted to be in a position to allocate €250,000 of the special budget measure announced last December to Cumann Camogaiochta Na nGael.

"The Camogie Association submitted impressive and extensive plans in respect of this allocation and I am confident they will continue to develop participation initiatives for women and girls across the country.

"While working to advance the quality of playing. coaching and refereeing in the sport the grant will also help to employ specialist development staff who will bring Camogie to more schools in each county and work to increase the number of clubs on the ground which are key thrusts of Cumann Camogaiochta na Gaels strategic plan as endorsed and supported by the Irish Sports Council."

Mr Treacy hit on a number of key points.

Number one: Great credit and praise must go to Central Council and the excellent plan they presented to the Sports Council. The Council is inundated with requests and each submission is thoroughly scrutinised and analysed before funds are granted. Make no mistake but the association has moved greatly in times upon the realisation that they had to act quickly or be left behind. Numerous committees have been established, over the past couple of years in particular, to introduce and develop initiatives to drive our game forward. For the amount of work and effort give, this allocation and 'reward' is thoroughly deserved. Over the years the GAA have received their fair share of 'grants' from the Government and no one has ever looked upon them as handouts. They weren't. And neither is this!

Number two: The grant will enable implementation of the strategic plan to increase and develop the number of clubs and schools participating in the sport, this is a huge must. I have said many times before that the one fear I have about the future of carnogie is that the 'gap' between top counties (of which there are only about four) and the rest is too wide with no sign of it

I ask the question 'Is it enough?' because while it is indeed very welcome, the grant is only the tip of the iceberg when it comes to the finance needed to run an association and it won't last very long. We need to build on it and turn it into a mult monetary value but in what we achieve with it.)

The cost of hiring out Croke Park last September for All-Ireland camogie day to the Camogie association was in the region of €70,000. If only half the expected crowd attend the game, well then a lot of the money is wasted. But you have to allow for it.

The respect and goodwill is out there for carnogie. We have more media coverage than ever before.

Player's names are becoming familiar. 1998 saw RTE cover the All-Ireland Final live for the first time ever. Over a quarter of a million viewers tune in to watch year after year.

This year RTE are to televise the semis live. We've come a long way.

I remember playing All-Irelands and getting ten minutes coverage at the end of the Sunday Game (and that wasn't too long ago let me remind you!)





of Ireland twenty According to Fióna, both parents love it here. "I have been given great support from both Mum and Dad, Mum had a big interest in athletics, but gradually got involved with our local camogie team, Davitts and our school as well," said Fiona.

"I maintained a big interest in athletics until last year winning several All-Ireland titles, but then I decided to concentrate wholeheartedly on winning a senior 'B' All-Ireland with Mercy Woodford. "I was only about eight years of age

Not surprisingly, she has many club idols, with Galway player Lourda Kavanagh very high on her list while she also mentions Olivia Forde as having given her great coaching especially when she was on the Féile na nGael teams. While Davitts were fortunate to reach three Féile na nGael finals and one semi-final, alas they never tasted victory and that ranks as a big disappointment with young Fióna. She did however, captain the Galway U14 team to Connacht victory some years ago and winning that All-Ireland Minor medal last year in





centenary year made up for the loss of Féile na nGael somewhat. Fióna has one brother, nineteen year old Fintan, who is in college in UCC but has also played hurling with the Galway club

Tommy Larkins. Tall, bubbly Fióna gives it her all on the playing field as I saw recently myself, where she played a major part in securing the first senior 'B' title for the school. Victory came early for Fióna in her school when in 2001 she was part of the Mercy Woodford team that took the very first ever camogie title to the school winning the Colleges All-Ireland Junior 'B' title. The manner in which Fióna speaks of her teacher and coach is not surprising. "Donal always gives great encouragement, and pays great attention to detail, he will support you

all the way and so it was nice that we were able to pay him back this year with a senior 'B' All-Ireland title," said the Galway girl.

While camogie is very important to this young teenager she has other interests in life and one of those is modelling! The stunningly beautiful girl is well able to combine both. However, this all came about by chance, it so happened that a photographer accidentally met with Fióna's parents and mentioned to them that perhaps their daughter could do well at modelling. From there it just took off.

"I had never dreamt of anything in this line, but since taking it up in

Television as we as know is where we all long to be seen some time in our lives and this has not escaped Fióna either as she has featured on such popular programmes as RTEs 'Off the Rails' and TV3's 'Ireland AM'. These photographs clearly illustrate the camogie players' good looks, but while she may have modelling as part of her chosen career, she is not turning her back on camogie either.





St. Mary's hour of glory came in 1996 when a well-drilled and talented side won the All-Ireland Junior Championship. Having last competed in the Final in 2001, today St. Mary's make their seventh appearance in an All-Ireland Junior Final. The present squad hopes to emulate the feat of the 1996 side.

PRESENTATION COLLEGE, ATHENRY

Presentation College, Atherny is a mixed school of almost 570 pupils. There is a long history of camogle in the College, going back to the late 1960's. The school's glory days in this respect must surely belong to the teams of the mid-seventies when three Junior W titles were brought back to Athenry in 1974, '76 and '77. Two Senior W titles were also won during these years. The Connacht senior 'B' title was won in 1986, 1987, 1998 and 2003.

Presentation College Athenry defeated the all Ireland Junior W reigning Champions Colliste Bride, Enniscorthy in the semi-final to reach their second All Ireland final two years running.

BORRIS VOCATIONAL SCHOOL

Tipp never looked like catching Cork and when Una O'Donoghue goaled in the 19th minute after an excellent run and pass by Corkery the game was all over.



TV coverage is great news for camogie

THERE is further good news for the progression of camogie in the fact that this year's Division One National League semis will be televised live by TG4 for the first time ever.

The pairings for this year's semi-finals, which go ahead on May 8th are, Cork v Wexford and Galway v Kilkenny.

Cork booked themselves a place in this year's semi-final when they overcame arch rivals Tipperary last Saturday.

Ever since last year's All-Ireland final defeat by Tipp Cork were looking for revenge and they did it in style seven days ago.

Yes, Tipp were poor but Cork were good and you can't take from that. Cork can do little about how other teams perform. What they can do is look after their own house and concentrate on performing to the best of their ability.

While I've seen nothing of Wexford this year they really impressed me in last year's All-Ireland semi-final against Tipp and indeed, were it not for lady luck shining on Tipp, could well have found themselves pitted against Cork in the All-Ireland final.

It all ended very differently as we all know.

Wexford haven't had a great league campaign. They finished second in their group but Antrim and Limerick offered little. Galway top group B and so face Kilkenny, who will be happy with their performances in the campaign to date. Wexford have a very young side. Many of the Coláiste Bride, players are already playing at senior inter-county level and show no fear. They, as like all Wexford teams, are physically tough.

However in addition to brawn the squad also has plenty skill and this is where they differ from their predecessors of the past 20 years. The fact that they have had a poor enough campaign may be due to the fact that practically the entire squad are facing into exam time and their focus may not be all it should be. Now that they've reached the semi-final against Cork, they may well give it that extra push. Either way, the county will be a force to be reckoned with come champion-

Galway, like their hurlers, continue to offer so much on paper but it rarely comes to fruition. They have been their own worst enemy over the past eight years. They defeated Cork in the All-Ireland final of 1996 (as total underdogs). They lost out to Cork in 1997 and 1998 and from there on in have, at times, put in embarrassing displays.

They seem to have re-grouped and have put in a huge effort in the past 12 months or so. Shar-



on Glynn, 10 years ago, was one of the most talented players in the country. Without doubt she would have been in the top five.

Unfortunately the commitment wasn't there and her career plummeted. She is one of the mentors involved with the senior squad this year. By right she should still be playing and causing endless problems for opposing teams but the next best thing is that she is now coaching the senior side and if she can bring as a mentor what she, at first, brought as a player, then the future looks good for the Westerners.

Elsewhere counties are finding themselves in all spots of bother regarding registration of players.

Central Council deducted four league points from Clare recently over the non registration of a player who was playing her club camogie outside the Banner County. She proceeded to play for the county against the rules. Following a specially convened meeting of Central Council at the Camogie Associations recent Annual Congress, the Clare player, who plays her club camogie with Davitts in Galway wasn't suspended as she was unaware of the ruling. However Clare lost their points as the onus was on the county board to have the form, CC3, with Croke Park by the specified date.

Now Down find themselves in the same situation. It has transpired that goalkeeper Teresa McGowan, who plays for O'Donovan Rossa in Belfast had not been registered by the Down board by January 31st, as required under Rule 12.4. At it stands, McGowan cannot play for Down as she is currently unregistered to play county camogie outside of Antrim where her club is registered. Now Down, who have written to the Association, must wait for Central Council to decide the Mourne County's fate. But really the rules are in black and white and I can't see Central Council doing anything but penalising the county. Worse than that is the fact that Teresa cannot play for Down in 2005.

Many players now work and study in adopted counties. They tend to sign for other clubs as it is impossible to travel home and realistically continue to play for your home club.

The dangerous part is forgetting to ensure you are still registered in your home county and denying yourself the opportunity of representing your county for 12 months.



"Also, there is great camaraderie between the girls, which comes through in the way they play to each other's strengths, and how they encourage each other, if one of them misses a ball, the others will never come down on that player, but just say, 'Don't worry - the next ball is yours'

John O'Shea and Neil Moynihan worked so hard to maintain Coláiste Bride's amazing level of consistency, as they took over on what's understood to be a temporary basis from Elva Moriarty, who is on maternity leave. Without question they can be very proud of what they contributed.

Magnificent three-in-a-row for Coláiste Bríde's queens

'WHOLEHEARTED', 'wonderful' and 'worthy' are the words which aptly sum up Coláiste Bride's outstanding achievement in annexing a three-in-a-row of All-Ireland Schools senior 'A' camogse championship crowns on Saturday afternoon last, at the expense of their fervent rivals, St. Mary's of Charleville, at rain-soaked Carrig-on-Suir, County Tipperary.

This was a team-effort in all its resplendent glory, and, in truth, it needed to be just that, as a persistent light rainfall contributed to difficult playing conditions, leaving the Colaiste Bride queenpins to take a leaf from the book of the Wexford senior footballers, who had displayed tremendously disciplined determination six days earlier in similarly difficult conditions, to achieve major result themselves, when overcoming Tyrone in the National League semi-finals.

Considering how Saturday's conditions made scoring somewhat awkward, Coláiste Bride made a major leap towards another monumental win having pulled clear by 0-3 to 0-0 after eight minutes. There was still that margin between the sides at half-time (0-5 to 0-2), before the

Slaneysiders dominated the third quarter to execute a series of golden scores on the way to opening-up a 1-8 to 0-2 lead.

As much as some of us dared to dream otherwise, Charleville were far from dead and buried. They fought back with plenty of enthusiasm, and promise too, as they found the Coláiste Bride net after 45 and 56 minutes to keep all of a Wexford persuasion on their toes. This was especially the case as the challengers applied plenty of pressure through to the bitter end, which eventually arrived just seconds after the Munster

Una Leacy struck back with a similar score from play, with Brona Furlong dispatching a free to Maeve Frayne on the right, from where she found Leacy with a sweet pass.

While that score put Coláiste Bride ahead by 0-4 to 0-1, the challengers could have been on level terms but for some poor shooting on their part, as they had struck four wides - including two from close range frees - before Mary Coleman got in on the scoring act for them, with a 28th-minute point to make it 0-4 to 0-2.

Female relations forge stronger bond in the GAA's family

THE integration of the ladies football and camogie associa-tions with the GAA was cemented yesterday when a report from the integration task force was launched.

The aims of the integration task force were to bring all three organisations closer together but the ladies football and camogie associations will still retain complete autonomy.

The prospect of a ladies football or camogie final being played as a curtain-raiser to an All-Ireland hurling or football final remains as remote as ever, however.

Under the terms of the integration there will be greater co-operation and liaison between the bodies with

the formalising of an alliance which protects autonomy. Members of camogie and ladies football clubs will become members of the GAA by 2007.

In practical terms camogie and ladies football will work closely together with the GAA on fixtures and coaching projects by pooling resources and adding additional expertise in all areas.

GAA president Seán Kelly launched the integration document which followed a pilot scheme in eight coun-

Meanwhile, Tipperary's Con Hogan has been appointed the new chairman of the GAA's Disciplinary

Elsewhere, Mickey Whelan has been recruited as one of Ireland's international rules

Whelan will travel to Australia in October as part of the Irish set up in place of John O'Leary who has opted out due to personal reasons.

Whelan, who quit as Dublin manager after a torrent of se in 1997, worked on fitness testing with the Irish team last year and is familiar with the set up.

Amalgamation will benefit everyone, says Kelly

SEAN KELLY is adamant that the integration of the GAA with ladies football and camogie, at club level, will be beneficial to all three associations.

He was speaking at the publication of the Integration Task Force Report, set up in 2002 to develop closer links

between the associations.

A pilot scheme subsequently launched revealed that, while the three bodies should remain autonomous, they should unite at club level while developing closer relationships at county, provincial and national levels.

This will mean that an overall fixtures schedule embracing all codes will need to be drawn up at county board level, while attention will also have to be given to issues such as finance, facilities, club membership and player insurance.

Integration officers are to be appointed onto each county committee within the next three years while provision will also be made for a representative of camogie and ladies football on each county committee, provincial council and on the GAA's own Central Council.

While welcomed by most Gaelic games enthusiasts, concerns were raised at the GAA's Annual Congress about the increased workload this could involve for officials.

However all present in Croke Park vesterday put a positive spin on the

"I'm very pleased with the progress made in the last couple of years on the integration process as I feel it can only

strengthen all three of our organisa-tions," said the GAA President, "We looked at amalgamation at a

national level a few years ago but all three associations agreed at the time that this would be simply too big and

too unwieldy.
"We felt that all the good work the three organisations had done up to that would be undone if that were to

Ladies football and camogie are growing in stature.

"And it was felt that by amalgamating completely there wouldn't be the same opportunities in terms of TV, sponsorship and other areas.

Both the President of the Camogie Association, Miriam O'Callaghan and the Ladies Football President, Geraldine Giles were adamant that the arrangement was a logical way to pool their resources at ground level.

"It might have been hard to persuade our members in the past but now there is a general feeling that it is the right time to implement it," said O'Callaghan.

"This report has allayed the fears that were there 20 years ago that a move like this would see us being swallowed up.

"We are moving from a goodwill basis that already existed to a more formalised agreement."

Task Force to bring codes closer together



AN integration Task Force Committee was formed in 2002.

This task force consists of representatives of the Camogle Association, the GAA and the Ladies Football Association. The 'force' was set up to develop closer links between the three associations.

The committee has been meeting regularly to review experimental processes carried out and it is hoped that a formal alliance within the next 3-4 years, while preserving the identity and autonomy of each organisation will be achieved.

The Presidents of Cumann Lüthchleas Gael, Cumann Camógaíochta Na naGael and Cumann Peil Gael this week officially launched the 'Integration Task Force Report' which will provide the framework for increased co-operation between the three Associations.

A pilot scheme involving eight counties was taunched in 2003 and highlighted many issues that needed to be addressed in order to establish the best way forward. Arising out of this process it was agreed, among others, that:-

 While the Associations should remain autonomous they should be united and integrated at club level with closer working relationships at County, Provincial and National levels.

An overall fixtures schedule, including all of the codes, should be drawn up at county board level.

Speaking at the launch, President of the GAA Sean Kelly thanked his fellow task force members for their enthusiasm to developing a road map for integration and also paid tribute to the counties that participated in the pilot scheme.

He continued 'I am delighted to see so much progress in terms of this project and the lessons learned through the experience of the pilot scheme have been essential in establishing a way forward. The alliance between our associations will take place on a phased basis over the next number of years it will mean some changes to our rule book but I expect that by 2008 provision will be in place for the appointment of an Integration Officer on each of our County committees'.

He also said that provision would be made for a representative of Camogie and Ladies Football on each County committee, on Provincial Councils and on the GAA's Central Council and that County and Provincial fixtures committees and other relevant subcommittees would soon be in a position to incorporate representatives of the ladies associations as considered appropriate.

The Camogie and Ladies Football Association's have given similar commitments to make appropriate provision in their rules to facilitate the integration process. Miriam O'Callaghan, President of the Camogie Association, said 'There has long been a common purpose between the three Associations and I feel that the combined potential of all three and our effectiveness in promoting Gaelic Games can best be achieved through a concerted effort on all our parts.

We are delighted to be involved in this process and I have no doubt that it will bear much fruit in the future, not just for Camogle, but for Ladies football and for the GAA in general.

Geraldine Giles, President of the Ladies Gaelic Football Association, echoed these sentiments and pointed out that there was already significant crossover in the activities of the three Associations on the ground in terms of shared facilities, coaching and games promotion strategies.

President elect of the GAA Mr Nicky Brennan said he was looking forward to the challenge of overseeing the implementation of the report, "We will be looking for the full support of all our units to ensure that within three years we will have laid the foundations for our associations to proceed in unity and confidence.

Josie captained the county to their second All Ireland senior title back in 1935 while still at school, and indeed she attended the counties Centenary dinner at the Rochestown Park Hotel on October 22nd where she received a rapturous reception form the large gathering as she was presented with a memento of the occasion and later cut the Centenary cake with 2004 All- Ireland captain Val O Keeffe.

She had the distinction of playing on the first team to win the Cork County senior championship when St Aloysius School took the Science Cup in 1932 and was captain of the team in 1934.

THEY say sport can be cruel.

These words rang so true in Charleville on Saturday afternoon when on the stroke of normal time Tipperary hit the back of the net to steal the Munster Minor title from Cork and get crowned champions for the first time since 2000.





Ulster Camogie PRO Séamas McAleenan feels that the victory goes way beyond the confines of the south Derry school

"A week before when St. Patrick's Maghera went down to Charleville for the Senior All-Ireland semi-final – they failed to score against the Munster side and conceded 4-15."

"All that week there have been messages on the camogie website that it is time for Ulster schools to re-consider participation in the A grade competitions, that the future looks bleak."

"At present Ulster has only one county

— Antrim — participating in the Senior
National League and they got comprehensively beaten at the weekend by Galway."

"Then St. Mary's Junior (under 16) team take out the very same Charleville school with a gutsy display to qualify for the school's fifth All-Ireland Junior final in 11 seasons."

"What people forget as well is that Maghera also have played in two Senior deciders during that time."

"Yes the game in our schools is a bit off the All-Ireland standard – but not as much as people think – and the big hope is that Magherafelt can go all the way and claim a second national Junior title."

Their game with Charleville was tense and closely-contested throughout with Sinead McLaughlin's first half goal separating the teams right up until three minutes from time when the scoreline stood at 1-3 to 0-3.

That said a lot about the defensive displays from both teams. Then Charleville substitute Annette McAuliffe finally got the better of Ciara O'Kane in the home goals to tie up the game at 1-3 each.

That was the point when Magherafelt showed that they were different to a lot of other sides.

They went right up the pitch and Michaela Convery – a Colleges' All-star last year – banged home a goal for them. It got the crowd really behind them and with that atmosphere around them there was no response from Charleville.

They now have a great opportunity of going all the way as last year's runaway champions Colaiste Bhride Enniscorthy came up short against Presentation Athenry.

THE ROYALS HIT THE NEWS

ver the past few years many counties have been busily preparing for last year's centenary celebrations and also concentrating on the development of the game within their county. There is one county that stood out a lot last season for various reasons and that has got to be the County of Meath. A long time ago when I began playing with my South County Dublin club Cuala, or Naomh Mhuire as it was then known as, my first official game with my club happened to be one sunny summers evening in the Royal County - Dunboyne to be precise! I suppose when it is your first game it always stays in your mind, well we won and that was my memory of Dunboyne.

However, many years later I had cause to visit Meath in a totally different capacity, as National PRO in Centenary Year. Don't get me wrong, I did visit the county in between both as Dublin and National PRO, but suffice to say that a lot of events took place in Meath last year. For one thing the playing birth of camogie could almost be attributed to Meath as back in 1904 the then Meath Agricultural Society Grounds, which is now Pairc Tailteann, was the venue for the very first public camogie match between two Dublin clubs, Cúchulainn and Craobh a Chéitinigh. Since then the growth of camogie both in Ireland and abroad has grown dramatically with almost 90,000 participating in the

Having had breakfast with some of the Meath officials at Congress recently I was prompted to write this article and highlight the great work going on in that county at present and how they are looking to the future.

3,000 ROYALS! Down in the County Meath, there



are almost 3,000 players and members alone and in the past year they have increased by a further four brining the total number to thirteen clubs. With the publicity the county got last year one feels that the county board are very much steering the game in the right direction. Success may not have reached the intercounty teams yet, but last year was a historical year for their Minor 'B' team. They became the first Royal team to win a Leinster title! The young players then had the wonderful opportunity of playing the All-Ireland semi-final on July 17th as part of the celebrations to mark the first ever public camogie match. Lady luck did not fall on the young Royals that day, but judging by some of the talent on view one could say it will not be long before we see some of these young players on the junior intercounty scene.

That day, July 17th, really put Meath camogie on the map thanks to the hard work of many Meath people such as Brigid Carney, Anne Dempsey, Mary Burke, the 2004 Meath Ambassador and hardworking PRO. The sun shone while the Minister of Education Noel Dempsey unveiled a plaque on the wall of Páirc Tailteann recalling the first ever camogie match

played there in 1904. There was something on the day for both young and old. Two intercounty games went ahead as Meath players donned the long black skirts and white shirts and played an old fashioned game. Young children from Meath also played on the hallowed Pairc Tailteann turf. However, perhaps the most striking item that day was the formation of 100 Meath children who made a perfect human 100 to mark one hundred years of camogie. When one saw the work that went in to all that it does not really come as a major surprise that Meath camogie has come in leaps and bounds and more importantly has the potential to become much stronger.

One must not forget the hosting of Féile na nGael last year, the headquarters of which were based in Páirc Tailteann. The visiting of the primary schools was also a first for Cumann Camógaiochta na nGael and for many Meath boys and girls it was a great honour for them to meet such great camogie stars as Kildare's Miriam Malone, Tipperary's Ciara Gaynor and Kilkenny's former nine times winning All-Ireland medal holder Bride McGarry. All this camogie activity had to lead to

something good in the form of the county U10 Blitz.

UNDER 10 BLITZ

Youth, they say is the backbone of any great organisation and that is where the Meath County Board have gone back to. The success of the Meath minors of last year did a lot for the county. Last year the County Board ran a very successful U10 Blitz. Such was the success of this project that the Board this year have eight teams taking part and it has now become an U10 Championship. The medals and Cup for this competition has been sponsored by Ratoath man Jim McDermott, The under ten concept is quickly growing as a great exercise for young children. They develop the skills much faster, as they are continually hitting the ball. They are on the field for a shorter time but it is real quality time they are receiving. Considering that the county is presently fielding teams at junior, U18, U16 and U14 fourteen, one can see the huge benefit a well run U10 Competition could have on the county in a short number of years.

So where now can the Royals look to, well in 2003 Kilmessan almost pulled off a famous club victory when they reached the final of the Leinster Junior club championship only to be pipped by Offaly club Drumcullen. The growth of other clubs is also significant - Killyon won the county championship in 2004 and it remains to be seen if they can make it back to back titles this year.

While growth and development on the playing field is of the utmost importance, development other wise is of the utmost importance for the

future development of the game. The County Board in their wisdom have become involved in the Meath Local Sports Partnership to their benefit.

What a joke! 11.45am for a National League final? The very timing makes the event unimportant. And the players aren't the issue here. They are already

dedicated camogie fans. It's the general public we are trying to convert. Did we even try to get the game as a curtain-raiser to the hurling clash? Or even after it which would be better again! Our big games should be played at venues where curiosity and general GAA interest would entice a person to pop over the road and watch a camogle game live for the first time. If only 50 people did this six times a year and thoroughly enjoyed it, then we're winning. With that off my chest, I'll refer back to last Saturday's semi-final win over Wexford. Four weeks ago I was thrilled with Cork's display against Tipp in their final group game. They showed hunger, fitness and an abundance of skill. Last week I was extremely disappointed but, on reflection, maybe it was a good thing. Cork play Wexford in the first round of the All-Ireland Championship on July 2. I suppose it goes for all codes really. Winning back to back All-Ireland titles is an extremely hard thing to do.
