Kay's goalden hour as Limerick crowned

Limerick3-7 Roscommon4-3

GAELIC Athletic Association, it is doubtful if team manager, Eamonn Cregan, will ever forget the dying minutes of this cracking All-Ireland junior camogie final at Croke Park on Sunday.

Leading by nine points at the interval and looking destined to receive their first All-Ireland success in 18 years at a canter, the Shannonsiders came apart in the second half and trailed by two points to a resurgent Roscommon with less than two minutes left on the clock.

Shades of similar final defeats for Limerick hovered menacingly before them as rampant Roscommon thwarted their every effort to get back on terms. If ever the Shannonsiders needed a saviour it was now and it from a piece of brilliant opportunism by redhaired corner forward, Kay Burke, which eventually won the day with a goal that will be long remembered in the annals of local Gael-

It was the Feobanagh-Castlemahon girl's third goal of the game and it is unlikely that she will ever notch a more important score as far as Limerick camogie is concerned. A point in arrears with seconds remaining in this topsy turvy decider, Roscommon came forward in a last ditch effort to pull the game out of the fire and they very nearly forced a replay with virtually the last puck of the game when Hilary Hussey's left-handed shot from 40 metres bounced off the upright and went wide much to the delight of a prancing Eamonn Cregan who had by now made his way to the right of the Limerick posts.

Seconds later referee Maire Ui Pholáird from Waterford sounded the final

whistle and the scenes of joy from the Limerick camp, and the couple of hundred supporters who had made their way to the capital to support the county, had to be seen to be believed. Disappointments of the past eighteen years were washed away by the euphoria of an All-Ireland success; Limerick's ladies had conquered the hoodoo of Croke Park with a late late show of courage and a dogged refusal to accept

Let there be no mistaking. Were it not for the sheer bravery of a number of players in those dying minutes, Limerick would today be looking back on another All-Ireland defeat. Roscommon had come back from the dead and players of lesser character would not have responded to the challenge. But the Limerick backroom team have instilled a great pride in wearing the green and white shirt and never was it more evident than on this occa-

Heavy rain poured down as the final got underway and it was Limerick who looked the sharper, rising the ball with ease and striking with authority. Elizabeth O'Riordan was first to threaten, picking up a long ball from Agnes Sheehy but Pauline McCarthy was narrowly wide with a left-handed effort. Limerick

were not to be denied the lead, however, with Pauline McCarthy of Bruff pointing a "30" after four minutes.

Roscommon rallied and only smart defending by Helen Clifford-McCarthy goalkeeper Breda O'Brien kept the green and whites in front. Limerick increased their lead after six minutes when Pauline McCarthy pointed Limerick free and Eamonn Cregan's side looked impressive. Mary Burke and Anna Marie Stack were ruling the middle of the field and their speed on the ball and excellent stick work were features of the first half. At the back the experienced Ann Lenihan was winning her battle with the dangerous Mary Gannon and when Lenihan Jost possession Maeve Healy snapped up the chance to put Roscommon's opening score on the board from an acute angle.

Limerick's reply was swift and after good work by Mairead Cagney, Pauline McCarthy shot over from 35 metres out to give her side a 3-1 advantage after 16 minutes. A minute later Limerick were three points ahead and again it was Pauline McCarthy who got the score, slotting over a '30" to give the Shannonsiders a little breathing

At the other end it was the turn of Limerick goalie, Breda O'Brien to again show her class, saving smartly from Maeve Healy and this was to herald Limerick's best spell of the

entire game.

Sweeping down field, Pauline McCarthy picked up a loose ball before finding Anna Marie Stack with a perfect pass. The Ballyagran girl struck a low ball into the path of Kay Burke and rising the sliothar sweetly, the little Feo-hanagh-Castlemahon star rounded Caroline Connaughton to plant the ball in the Roscommon net for a classic goal at any level. A minute later Limerick flags were again flying high as Anna Marie Stack and Pauline McCarthy again tore open their opponent's defence and when Roscommon goalkeeper. Ursula Hussey, made a great save, Kay Burke slammed the ball to the net for her second goal in a minute. Limerick were now on top in all areas of the field, using ground hurling to clear their lines and using their speedy midfielders to create constant problems for the Roscommon defence, Pauline McCarthy added yet another point after an exciting solo run and Limerick led 2-5 to 0-1 after 25 minutes play.

Limerick fans could be forgiven for thinking that all the hard work had now been done even at this early stage of the game. Roscommon, apart for a few individual performers such as the outstanding Mary Grehan, captain Karina Jones Gannon, appeared to be outclassed and although Hillary Hussey struck over a point from a free just before half time it appeared to be only of token significance.

What a serious error of judgement we made, however, for no sooner had the second half got underway than it was clear that this Roscommon side were not going out without a fight. The introduction Mairead Coyle of the Four Roads club was to make all difference and after just five minutes she hammered the ball to the Limerick net to

Seconds later Limerick were under pressure again and only a heroic intervention from captain, Helen Clif-ford-McCarthy, saved a cer-tain goal as Mary Gannon prepared to shoot into an empty net. This incident left three players on the ground injured and when play resumed it was Limerick who went close with a good effort from Pauline

McCarthy. With five minutes left and only a goal between the sides, this junior title was still very much up for grabs and Limerick hearts sunk as Mairead Coyle lofted a 40 metre free all the way to the net. With the sides level, Limerick now needed leadership and it was the experienced Pauline McCarthy who was prepared to take on the responsibility, picking up the ball on the 40 and forcing a foul from which she calmly put

Limerick back in front. It was now pretty exciting stuff with every ball being fiercely contested and the Limerick defence suffering from a severe dose of jitters every time Roscommon launched an attack. Carol Murphy came on for the injured Elizabeth Leonard with three minutes remaining but before Limerick could re-organise their side Roscommon took a sensational lead. Mary Grehan was again the instigator, driving the ball deep into Limerick territory and when the sliothar was handpassed across the goal-mouth, Charmaine Cooney was there to send an unstoppable shot past Breda O'Brien for what, to Limerick supporters, looked like a sad ending to their hopes of All-Ireland glory.

These Limerick girls, however, are made of stern stuff. They had trained hard for the past twelve months. and their road to Croke Park was not an easy one. They were not going to give in as long as they had a last

ounce of energy in them and Breda O'Brien summoned all her strength to loft one last, mighty puckout into the rain-filled Croke Park skies. Mary Burke carried it on and in a flurry of excitement, her sister, Kay, who had an outstanding game all though the hour, struck left-handed to flash the ball past Ursula Hussey and into the Roscommon net to give Limerick the title that they just about deserved.

Limerick had to withstand a last gasp Roscommon effort but the sound of the final whistle must have sounded like music to the ears of a Limerick team that had shown character, plenty of hurling ability and a will to win that other county teams could well be inspired by.

The Croke Park pitch was a sea of green and white as the Limerick girls celebrated their success. The win was, in the words of team captain, Helen Clifford-McCarthy, "well worth waiting for. It was a long time coming but after eighteen years I think that we deserve our success today," she told the cheering fans.

And there was a word of consolation for the gallant Roscommon side: "We know what it is like to lose an All-Ireland," said told the Connaught champions, "and your day will come."

Wiping the sweat from his brow, team manager, Eamonn Cregan had run further than some of the players during the hour but still found his way to the press box minutes after the presentation:

"We were extremely lucky," he told us, "but we are thrilled to win. We were brilliant in the first half but the girls never hurled at all after the break. We needed an early point to settle us down but when Roscommon got that early goal we were always in trouble.

Vera and club PRO, Brid Naughton, together with Pauline McCarthy, who had such an outstanding game for Limerick on this occasion, played with Limerick in their last All-Ireland success in 1977.

The entire panel and their mentors have shown dedication and total commitment to the county team during the year and their success is fully deserved.

Brave Roscommon Denied By Upright

Limerick 3-7, Roscommon

The width of a post. That's all that separated Roscommon from another crack at this All-Ireland Camogie final. After a grandstand finish which saw the Roscommon girls seem to snatch victory from the jaws of defeat, only to fall behind again, Hilary Hussey's long range shot in the sixth minute of injurytime seemed to be going over the bar for an equaliser, but instead struck the right hand upright and went wide.

The referee's final whistle moments later signalled an agonising defeat for the brave Roscommon side, who had come back from being ten points down at one stage. With the introduction of Mairead Coyle at the interval a major factor in the turnaround, they had dominated the second half and gradually clawed their way back into contention.

With two minutes of normal time left on the clock, Roscommon were three points down when they were awarded a free about 30 yards out and Mairead Coyle's strike went all the way to the net, levelling the scores for the first time in the match.

Limerick forged ahead again with a free - converted by Pauline McCarthy . awarded following a challenge on Anna Marie Stack. This tackle was dubiously deemed to have been a foul by the referee Mary Pollard, who did Roscommon no favours throughout the game.

However, the Connacht standard-bearers still had more fight left in them and in the second minute of injury time, went ahead when Charmaine Cooney latched onto a rebound from a Geraldine Carr shot and sent it to the net, putting her side ahead for the first time.

That score sent the Roscommon contingent into ecstasy but their joy was short-lived as Kay Burke completed her hat-trick of goals for Limerick just one minute later when she pulled on a loose ball from close range and sent it to the net, putting them back in front by the narrowest of margins.

Then followed a couple of minutes of intense activity by Roscommon as they strived desperately to create the point which would put them into a replay. But the last chance was Hilary Hussey's great effort which barely failed to hit the

the very first minute but she was blocked down by goalkeeper Breda O'Brien before a decent shot on goal could be attempted.

Limerick then forged ahead with a pointed free by Pauline McCarthy, and then a fine effort from play by Anna Marie Stack who seized possession and shot over after a wide-bound long range free by Mairead Cagney had been batted down by Kay Burke.

Both sides had numerous wides during that opening period and it was not until the 14th minute of play that Roscommon opened their account, with Maeve Healy getting an excellent point from the right wing, after catching a breaking ball and shooting immediately while under pressure. But apart from that, the forwards were

McCarthy added two more points, before setting up Kay Burke for a goal in the 19th minute when she found her running in behind the defence and Burke handpassed the sliotar to the

half as they hurled with much more passion and purpose, and were soon rewarded when substitute Mairead Coyle sent a lovely shot to the roof of the net with just three minutes played, reducing the deficit to six points.

Four minutes later, Geraldine Carr was unlucky not to raise the green flag herself when a good low shot was brilliantly saved by Breda O'Brien, but Coyle added another point from a free when Carr was subsequently fouled. Pauline McCarthy pointed a free from Limerick in the 18th minute but then came a score which gave great hope to Roscommon - Mary Gannon skillfully doubling

on a long Hilary Hussey free to direct the sliotar to the net, reducing the gap between the sides to just three points.

The scene was then set for a grandstand finish and it was duly provided as Mairead Coyle added her second goal, Charmaine Cooney got her first and Limerick came back to steal the All-Ireland

Roscommon will have been very disappointed to lose this thrilling encounter but all of the 13 players which featured on Sunday played their hearts out and contributed to courageous performance. Particular credit must go to substitute Mairead Coyle who again proved her worth

when sprung from the sideline; goalkeeper Ursula Hussey who made some superb saves; Mary Grehan; Charmaine Cooney; and Maeve Healy. No doubt they will be back.

The Offaly hurling manager and Limerick camogie coach was saved from suffering that unenviable fate on Sunday last but only just.

It took an injury time goal from Limerick forward Kay Burke to give the Munster side the narrowest of victories against a brave Roscommon side in the All-Ireland Junior final.

Roscommon were given little chance of victory before the game and absolutely no chance at half-time when they trailed by 2-5 to 0-2. The second half appeared to be little more than a formality. Roscommon, however, had other ideas and almost succeeded in pulling off one of the most dramatic comebacks this year.

Limerick, who lost by a point to Galway in last year's final, made a blistering start, clearly intent to atone for that crushing

Midway through the first half Kay Burke grabbed two spectacular goals to give her team early control. Roscommon, inexperienced on the big stage, took a lot longer to get going and did not register their first point until 15 minutes into the game. Limerick added points to their two goals and by the half-time whistle held a commanding 2-5 to 0-2 lead. Even the most optimistic Roscommon supporter must have had grave doubts about a comeback.

With the arrival of substitute Mairead Coyle on the field, Roscommon were revitalised. She made an immediate impression by scoring a goal. Encouraged, the Connacht girls made repeated attacks and a second goal from Hilary Hussey placed them within touching distance.

Breda O'Brien in the Limerick goal brought off a number of fine saves but she couldn't prevent Maeve Hanley adding a third to equal the scores. 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

Cork Smash The Hoodoo

t was a long 23 years since Cork had defeated arch rivals Kilkenny in Croke Park on an All-Ireland Camogic Final Sunday. Not as long a wait for 21-year-old full back Eithne Duggan, Bishopstown and former captain of U.C.D., who spent the last ten minutes of the thrilling encounter marking the legendary Angela Downey in what was the maestro's last All-Ireland! What an experience for a first ever game on the hallowed sod. Eithne's most exciting moment, believe it or not, was running out through the tunnel into the Croke Park arena!

Was she in awe of playing with such stalwart and experienced players as Sandie Fitzgibbon, Linda Mellerick, Therese O'Callaghan or Fiona O'Driscoll? Would such august opposition as the Downey twins, Breda Holmes or Gillian Dillon unsettle her determination to win her first All-Ireland senior medal? "Once the whistle blew for the throw in nothing crossed my mind but victory."

Eithne, now a physiotherapist in the Cork physio clinic had one ambition always where camogie was concerned - to win an All-Ireland with Cork! Despite the fact that her parents now live in Limerick, once she qualified from U.C.D. she returned to Cork where she was fortunate in securing employment immediately, and once again began playing for her old club, Bishopstown.

The Cork team had a rare blend of new and experienced players. Like Eithne Duggan, Vivienne Harris was a newcomer to the team. At only 16 she was the youngest member of the squad and is attending St. Vincent's school in Cork where she sits the Leaving Cert. in 1996. Big into kick-boxing and Judo, this vivacious teenager, cool as a breeze, stormed onto the pitch for the second half, fearless of the mighty black and amber! History Of Camogie

Because of the Bank Holiday there are no fixtures on this weekend which gives us the opportunity to take a brief look at the history of Camogie.

Camogie was born in 1904, just twenty years after the G.A.A. The first public Camogie match was played between two Dublin clubs Cuchulainns and Keatings as one of the main attractions at a Gaelic League Aeridheacht in Navan on Sunday July 17th 1904. An Cumann Camogaiochta was officially inaugurated at 8 North Frederick Street, Dublin on February 25th 1905 with Maire Ní Chinnéide as its first Uachtarán.

Chinnéide as its first Uachtarán.
The original playing rules stipulated that the Camóg should not weigh more than 32 ounces with the ball 4 to 5 ounces and measuring 7 to 9 inches in circumference. Listed among the fouls was the deliberate stopping of the ball with ankle length skirts which were then in vogue. An item of interest in the Gaelic Athletic Annual 1907 / 8 was an advertisement for Ladies Camógs 24/- per dozen or 2/6 each by post.

The first real attempt to establish Camogie in a Nationwide contest was made in 1911, when a meeting organised by Sean O'Duffy refounded the Camogie Association at 25 Rutland Square, Dublin (now Parnell Square). Eleanor Dowager, Countess of Fingal, one of the most progressive ladies of her time, was elected Uachtarán.

1912 saw the first official Intercounty game when, on July 12th Dublin defeated Louth by 2-1 to 0-0 at Jones's Road (now Croke Park).

A year later on July 20th a large crowd witnessed Munster's first intercounty contest. A first class game, Cork defeated their Kilkenny visitors 2-2 to 1-0. Gate receipts were £60 and the day was rounded off with a Ceilidh for both teams in the Gaelic League rooms.

In 1914 the first University Club was founded in U.C.C. 1915 / 16 marked the inauguration of the oldest National Competition of which the game can boost: Comortas Mhic Giolla Bhride, the Ashbourne Cup for Inter-Varsity competitions. Although the majority of activities were halted during the "Fight for Freedom", the Ashbourne Cup matches went on annually.

The first Ardchomhairle took office in January 1923 under the guidance of Maire Gill, Dublin, Uachtarán.

The present Phoenix Park Camogie Pitch was acquired the following year.

A special Convention held in the Gresham Hotel, Dublin on April 25th 1932 with 60 delegates marked the arrival of Cumann Camógaíochta na nGael as we know it today.

The All-Ireland Championship came into being in 1932 although the final was not staged until August '33 at Galway when Dublin, captained by the Association's President Maire Gill became the first holder of the O'Duffy Cup, defeating their hosts Galway 3-2 to 0-2.

In 1934 Congress banned

In 1934 Congress banned Camogie players from playing foreign games. This ban extended to foreign dances the following year.

Congress '35 recorded the affiliation of 28 counties, 423 teams and 1,000 players and by 1938 all 32 counties were affiliated.

In 1942 Dublin and Cork played the first ever draw in a final, with the former winning the replay before a record crowd at Croke Park. That final was the first to be broadcast, a task undertaken by the Publicity Officer Riobaird O Bramhaim.

Shiela McAnulty, Down became Uachtarán in 1949.

In the Golden Jubilee year, 1954 the first match was commemorated by a Jubilee game staged at the same pitch in Navan with a Leinster selection defeating their Ulster counterparts. So successful was the Jubilee game that an Annual Interprovincial competition was established. In the inaugural

final in 1956 at Knockbridge, Louth, Leinster won the Gael Linn Cup for the first time when they defeated Ulster 7-1 to 3-0.

One of the most outstanding players of the game, Kathleen Mills of Dublin, won the last of her record 15 All-Irelands medal when her county beat Tipperary 7-2 to 4-1 in the 1961 All-Ireland final.

1964 marked the Diamond Jubilee of the Association and the inauguration of the All-Ireland Club Championship. Celtic, Dublin and Deirdre, Antrim contested the final. Cork born Mary Moran accepted the cup on behalf of Celtic while Deirdre were led by Nancy Murray. Both captains were subsequently to become Presidents of the Association.

1966 saw one of the most foremost players of the time Una O'Connor, Dublin receive the Texaco Award. Sue Cashman, Antrim was honoured by CALTEX the following year. They are the only two Camogie players ever chosen for these awards.

Down carved a niche for themselves by winning the first All-Ireland Junior Championship in '68 while Presentation, Kilkenny did likewise when taking the All-Ireland Colleges Championship Trophy in the final of 1969 / 70 season.

1970 was a memorable year during which the first National Coaching Course was held in Gormanston. Coaching and Referees Seminars were held throughout the country and an All-Ireland Colleges Council was set up under the Presidency of Lily Spence, Antrim.

At National level, Camogie was given a considerable boost with the appointment of the Ard Rúnaí, Shiela McAnulty to COSAC, the new Sports Council set up by the Government. Shiela's term on that Council established a relationship which would contribute in no small measure to the future development and streamlining of CUMANN CAMOGAIOCHTA na nGAEL.


