

While Cork turned on the class to beat Galway in the senior match, the junior final was arguably one of the most exciting matches seen this year; in any code.

Aramagh and Galway lived the 'it ain't over till it's over' motto as literally as they could and Galway performed a life saving act in the form of an injury-time goal to beat any that Kilkenny hurlers have pulled off in the last year.

Once again the Ulster supporters showed everyone else how it is done as it was the orange and white Armagh contingent who swelled the expected crowd of around 6,000 to that of around 10,000.

The fact that all supporters were concentrated in the Hogan Stand meant that atmospherics and noise were at a premium which made for a tremendous occasion.

It seems a pity that the junior replay can not be held as a curtain raiser to the Under 21 Hurling replay but these two great teams must be given a fortnight to recover from yesterday's action.

The venue for their rematch has not yet been decided, but I would say to anyone living near the venue on Sunday week: Go and see a treat of sport, you will not regret it.

With an average age of 21 there are still a good few more All-Ireland finals awaiting this Galway panel.
One of the stars of the

Connacht champion's performance was goalkeeper Tracey Laheen who at 18 years of age was only playing her second ever inter county match.



The fact that she let in three goals belies her strong performance and the huge length of her puck-outs was astonishing, as some even travelled over the other end line.

It was this factor that struck me as showing up the limitations of camogie when it is played on a shortened pitch. The drawn Junior match was full of excitement and fluid play but it seemed that the strength of the seniors was wasted on the reduced pitch as 60 metre pucks were common in yesterday's game.

This year's league season operated with an experimental 15-aside format played on the full pitch, and apparently it worked very well.

After yesterday's senior match players from both Cork and Galway had the utmost of praise for the experimental format but had reservations as to how it would be administered.

I would urge the camogie congress to look at extending the trial format to the championship when playing rules come up for voting again in 1996.

In the meantime, Croke Park played host to two excellent games of camogic yesterday and the Junior replay between Armagh and Galway should prove to be worth travelling to. The replay takes place on Sunday October 10 and the venue has yet to be decided, although Croke Park has been ruled out.

It is played with teams of twelve; the pitch is considerably shorter than that used for hurling or Gaelic football; when, as happens every year in Croke Park, the regular goal-structures are present, the girls' game is made to look inferior.

Perhaps this reduction in team number and in

playing area made sense in the early days doesn't now.

The modern ball flies farther than the old sliotar; the girls of today have much more time for

training. The big flaw in yesterday's games was the frequence of scrimmages; you longed for more of a

Otherwise you could hardly find fault; there was fierce commitment and an abundance of skill.

Cyril Farrell has been quoted as saying that the

skills in camogie compare well with those in hurling—he is right.

Indeed in one aspect yesterday's Senior final compared more than favourably with the recent Kilkenny-Galway final - the sideline cutting was better.

Yesterday was a good occasion for the girls' game.

It was augmented by the expedition from Armagh; the North is awake. The great deeds of Down and Donegal and Derry

have thrown Ulster into a ferment.

Armagh in the popular mind isn't associated with hurling but yesterday The Orchard County fielded a fine team in the Junior final.

They surprised Galway; their fusion of dash and skill almost brought what would have been a famous victory

A late goal frustrated them; a draw was a fair enough result.

About a quarter past five you could experience a e sight, a long line of saffron and white wended its way from Croke Park to O'Connell Street.

It was made up mostly of young girls and children; the Armagh expedition was on its way to

Amiens Street Station.
It reminded you of The Pied Piper — only that this wasn't Hamelin and that magical musician isn't around anymore.

Galway came with high hopes of a double; their Seniors were in their first final since 1962.

In the meantime the game languished in the county; there were occasions when the maroon-andwhite could hardly field a team.

The revival owes much to St. Raphael's Convent in Loughrea; there Cyril Farrell has for some years been a Pied Piper in his own right.

It was no secret that this year's teams, Senior and Junior, had prepared diligently.

Cork, freed from the shadow of Kilkenny, were

striving for two in a row.

And they made a flying start; two points in as many minutes boded well; Sandie Fitzgibbon and

The wildness came in the third quarter but was short-lived; a charge that felled Claire Lynch evoked a prolonged storm of boohing but it was unjustified.

A few seconds previously it seemed certain that Claire would score a second goal but Kathleen Costine brought off a great save.

selected charity. The team later went on to continue their celebrations at Glen Rovers club.



Women are so committed and have so much ability that they are so often taken for granted. Take Sunday's camogie final where Cork and Galway went flat out in pursuit of victory. Everyone played as if their lives depended on it. There was no let up, no cribbing with the referee, great passages of play and eventhough Galway were well beaten in the end they never gave up.


Cork played brilliantly, first touch was excellent, no fumbling or missing, great clashes overhead, moving the ball quickly, some excellent shots on the run without breaking stride, making room to hit and get in their shot. And to cap it all their accuracy was

outstanding.

Women usually have better footwork than men. That's obvious in dancing where they are more balanced with neater steps. But on Sunday what was so evident was the way they could change direction and go from one foot to another without getting tangled up.

I have to admit I've seen very few camogie games, mainly because they clash with hurling or training. But I would go along with the idea that camogic should be played before the big games, including the All-Ireland final.

There is no doubt they are the poor relations of the GAA and in fact women don't get much of a look



in anyway in GAA circles. All the pity when they have so much to contribute.

I've no doubt that hurlers could learn a thing or two from watching camogie. Their teamwork seems to be better, the more economical use of the ball, total commitment to their task and better discipline. These ladies are not just pretty faces; they can whip hard on the ball and don't hold back when they are clashing. This is because their footwork is better and

they can play close to avoid injury. Well done ladies you did yourselves and your county proud on Sunday. You may not be getting the support you deserve and maybe the crowds did not come to meet you off the train, but you are still All-Ireland champions for a second year running. On the fourth Sunday in September many hearts did soar in Croke Park - despite the sad sight of the Cusack Stand as the "Old man" cast one last longing lingering look behind. 
