

SCORING DEFENDER IN CAMOGIE

GERMAINE NOONAN — SUCCESS IN TWO SPORTS

In Dublin's fair city where the girls are so pretty, a Dublin senior camogie selector in 1981 first set his eyes on Germaine Noonan. Unlike Molly Malone, Germaine was not wheeling a wheel-barrow but yielding a hurley in Marino.

The young lady was so impressive at club level, displaying not alone skill but also courage and commitment that a decision was reached to give her an opportunity to play at inter-county level

Both Germaine Noonan and Joan Gormley made their debuts for the Metropolitan side on the same day and both ended up in the same place after the match — surrounded by doctors and nurses, dancing to their every need in the Mater Hospital.

Unfortunately for Germaine, she had torn a cartilage in her knee and as a result she did not play for the rest of the year. It took her over a year to fully regain her form and confidence and she was back fighting for her place on the side in 1983.

The G.A.A. were to celebrate their Centenary in 1984 and at the beginning of that year Germaine made a decision that she was going to become a permanent member of the Dublin team and play an integral part in her country's quest for All-Ireland success.

The history books will show that Germaine's ambition was fulfilled and her commitment rewarded, as in the month of September 1984 Dublin defeated Tipperary in the All-Ireland final at Croke Park.

Germaine contributed enormously to a famous victory by not alone playing well, but also scoring a goal despite playing at corner-back!

Germaine Noonan's first contact with the game of camogie was at the tender age of ten when the Marino Camogie club was founded in 1974. They won the Under-11 League and Championship but 1976 was by far the most successful year for the Marino ladies, as they came, they saw and they conquered every other camogie team in Under-11, 12, 13 and 14, in both League and championship competitions.

Their successful campaigns were due to a dedicated group of people, none

more so than Connie and Kay Lyons, two sisters who were both former Dublin players.

After attending St. Vincent De Paul's Primary School, Germaine entered the Post-Primary world at Maryfield College in Griffith Avenue. Under the guidance of Tony Woods, the school won several Leinster B. Colleges titles. While she was a student at Maryfield College, Germaine was selected on the Dublin Minor team in 1978 and indeed has the distinction of scoring seven goals and a point against Kildare in the Leinster Championship.

Unfortunately they lost the All-Ireland Minor Final to Cork by five points but several of that team went on to represent their county at Senior level including Yvonne Redmond and Jo Holden.

ASHBOURNE TITLES

After successfully completing her Leaving Certificate examination, she enrolled

in U.C.D. pursuing a degree in Commerce. During four hectic but wonderful years four Ashbourne titles were deservedly won by the Belfield Camogie team inspired on more than one occasion by the brilliance of Germaine Noonan.

Pat Power, Eamon O'Shea, Cormac Bonner and Mick Purcell, all notably from Tipperary, were the inspirational figures in U.C.D. at the time.

To confirm their superiority on the camogie field, U.C.D. also won the Dublin County Championship in 1982. (Interestingly thirteen years after the Marino Club was founded, many observers feel that Germaine could win her second County Championship medal, this time with her native club, as Marino have been producing sparkling displays so far this season).

Germaine's parents Dominic and Mary and her brothers Gregory and Dominic (Jnr), are justifiably proud of Germaine's achievements on the camogie fields of Ireland. She is presently working in the West coast of Clare as a Commerce teacher in St. Joseph's Secondary School. Spanish Point and even there, in an area dominated by Gaelic football, she has made a dramatic impact.

Last year, she trained and coached the schools ladies football team to their first All-Ireland Ladies Football title. She has a keen interest in all sports and indeed included among her ambitions is to attend (in person) the Olympics.

Despite her interest in various sports her heart lies in camogie and particularly in the camogie world around the River Liffey. Under the guidance of Rita Whyte, Phyllis Breslin and trainer Ann Carey, Germaine Noonan is quietly confident that Dublin will be a much more potent force in 1987 and she hopes that once again the All-Ireland Senior Camogie title will return to the streets broad and narrow of Dublin's fair city.

Sunday night's championship game between Fr. O'Neill's and St. Finbarr's promises to be an exciting affair. St. Finbarr's have been very impressive in the Championship campaign in the last two years, but have yet to make the big breakthrough and will be hoping that '87 might be the lucky year for them.

They will be without the services of Claire Cronin this season and she is sure to be a big loss to them but they can still call on such experienced performers as Margaret Farrell, Marie O'Sullivan and Stephanie Curtin and these together with their up-and-coming young players in Colette O'Mahony, Paula Carey, Niamh Coughlan and Deirdre Ryan combine to form a very strong outfit.

Fr. O'Neill's impressive winners of last year's Intermediate Championship, will field at senior level for the first time in the history of their club and this will be a big occasion for them. They are basically a young side and could find the going tough against a more experienced 'Barrs side, but they have nothing to lose and if players like Ann Marie Griffin, Margaret Finn, Mary Kennefick and Fiona O'Driscoll play to form, it could be an exciting tussle.

On Wednesday night, Killeagh play Sars and here the Killeagh girls will be expected to advance. Sars had a fine victory over a disappointing Na Piarsaigh side last weekend, but it is difficult to see them holding a Killeagh side that has

done exceptionally well in their recent senior league games. In fact Killeagh have won all their league games with the exception of their drawn game with Glen Rovers and now await the outcome of the Glen's final two games with Eire Og and St. Finbarr's, which will decide if they are the eventual winners or if they go into a play-off with the Glen. During these games, players like Patsy Keniry, Ann Leahy, Ann Marie Landers, Marion Sweeney and Breda Landers have all shown excellent form.

The Cork minors hold a very impressive record at Munster level in the past decade and they will be hoping to reach yet another Munster final when they play Kerry in this year's semi-final on Saturday.



teams permitted to accept sponsorship.

ONE of the most significant decisions taken at Congress concerns sponsorship. Hitherto, the Camogie Association has held a conservative view on this subject. The meeting balloted by six votes to permit teams to accept sponsorship and to wear the sponsors name on jerseys if this be a condition of the arrangement.

Supporters of the motion felt that camogic was losing out to other sports in this area. Sponsors are prepared to put money into sport but they want something in return. They see the easing of restrictions as a way of cashing in.

Reservations were expressed by those who wondered if pride in the club or county jersey would ever be the same. The introduction of outside influences has led to a loss of identity in other sports. They were concerned that this decision would be the first step in that direction.

There has been much talk of compulsory insurance over the past number of years. It eventually received the seal of approval and is now mandatory for all players. This development will ease the apprehension felt by many team officials.

Ard Comhairle tabled a motion requesting each club to raise £50 to aid central finances. At its first hearing it failed by a mere three votes. A re-run in the future may succeed.

Unexpected death of Mr. A. A . Healy

DEEP regret will be occasioned by the unexpected death which took place yesterday of Mr. A.A. (Gus) Healy, former Fianna Fail TD and once chairman of the Parliamentary Party.

A former Lord Mayor of Cork, Mr. Healy, who was 83, was an enthusiastic swimmer and was directly responsible for the growth of the sport in Cork. He had been swimming up to his eightieth year.

After serving in the Oireachtas for 20 years he retired from national politics in 1977, the year his party under his close friend Jack Lynch scored a landslide victory.

But he retained a keen interest in national events and in an Evening Echo interview earlier this year he insisted that everyone should feel it their duty to belong to a political party, and ventured to suggest that less than 10% of people over the age of 18 did so.

He believed that Coalition governments simply did not work and was less than enamoured by the defection of Des O'Malley from Fianna Fail. Explaining his reluctance at an earlier time to declare his hand in favour of Lynch or Haughey he said he was not a Lynch man or a Haughey man but a party man. "As long as the leader is democratically elected then I will follow that leader".

Mr. Healy had trenchant views which he did not hesistate to express: "I console myself that everything that was said about Charles Haughey was said about de Valera at some time or another. The media had to wait until he was dead before they saw any merit in him", he said.

In his early years too he was a well known Shakespearean actor and was a founder member of "The Loft" as well as being, in the 'Thirties, chairman of the Cork Repertory Company. Later on he became chairman of the Cork Shakespearean Company. In his youth too he was a member of Sunday's Well rugby football club and remained Chairman of the Club for many years.

Born at Castle Road, Blackrock, Cork, in 1904, he attended the North tery, but it was his connection with swimming that lead indirectly to his becoming a member of Cork Corporation

for the first time in 1943.

Though he had campaigned on behalf of Fianna Fail in the 1930's it was not until the early 1950's that he stood as a party candidate.

He became a member of the Dail in

February 1957 and during his public career spent over 20 years in the

During that time he filled such offices as Deputy Chairman of the Dail; Council member and honorary treasurer of the Inter-Parliamentary Union; Vice Chairman of the Irish/British Parliamentary Group as well as chairman of the Fianna Fail parliamentary party; chairman of the Electoral Law Reform All Party Committee of 1959-60 and member of the Committee on Public Accounts.

He was twice Lord Mayor of Cork in 1964/65 and in 1974/75 and combined

membership of the Corporation with the Southern Health Board; the City of Cork Vocational Education Committee; chairman of the Cork Festival Committee which also included the Cork Film Festival and the Choral Festival.

He was chairman of the National Association for Cerebral Palsy, the Cork Spastic Clinic, the Cork branch of the Irish Red Cross Society and was a director of Cork Opera House.

In addition he was a former President of the Irish Amateur Swimming Association and of the Munster Branch of the

IRFU, and was long identified with camogie in the city.

His chairmanship of the Fianna Fail parliamentary party coincided with the time of the greatest crisis to rock that party in recent years, the Arms Crisis in 1970, the dismissal of Ministers including Mr. Haughey and the subsequent events which culminated with the expulsion of Mr. Neil Blaney. The government and the party was shaken to its roots.

He himself always held that these events were overplayed by the media. He always remained popular with members of all parties.

The death of Gus Healy, former TD, Senator and Alderman, robs Cork of one of its quite outstanding citizens. It can truthfully be said that the regret at his passing will be as deep among politicial opponents as in the ranks of the Fianna Fail party, which he remained deeply loyal to for over half a century.

Gus Healy was, above all, a man of the ordinary people of Cork irrespective of their party politics. He always worked unselfishly for the welfare of his native city and many people will remember him for many different reasons.

He had a love of swimming and trained countless numbers of young swimmers in the swimming baths of Cork and in the coves of Myrtleville, his second home. His cultural activities found early encouragement in the classrooms of the North Monastery, his long membership of "The Loft" and his close friendship with the renowed Father Christy O'Flynn.

Once he embarked on a political career it could be said of him that he never descended to personalities and won the esteem of supporters and opponents alike. He became a close friend of Eamon de Valera, Sean T. O'Kelly, Sean Lemass, Frank Aiken, Sean McEntee, and was equally the respected opponent of men like Liam T. Cosgrave, William Norton, James Dillon and Brendan Corish.

As Lord Mayor he took part, with the Lady Mayoress, in a number of important overseas assignments and was everywhere greeted as a worthy representative of Ireland.

Thirty years ago Mr. Healy married Miss Rita McGrath and they made their home at The View, Montenotte, and lived there up to a month ago. They then went to live in a smaller house in Church Road. Blackrock, and had scarcely settled in when Mr. Healy was taken ill and rushed to hospital yesterday morning.

CAMOGIE ACROSS THE IRISH SEA.

Camogie, the beloved but isolated sister of hurling and football has now found a new home in the city where generations of Irish men and women have created a new and alternative home, London.

Alison Turnbull, a journalist recently searching for alternative womens discovered camogie. Her analysis of one of Irelands oldest female pasttimes makes interesting reading.

IRISH CREAM

Camogie is good news for those of you who were always being penalised at school for lifting your hockey stick above your head. In carnogie, you are allowed not only to lift your stick, but also to use hands and feet to stop and control the ball. The result is a faster moving, more aerial game and not many more bruises than you'll get in hockey or lacrosse.

Camogie is the female version of the Gaelic sport hurling, brought to Ireland by the Celts between 400 and 500 BC. It is played 12 a-side with each player using a hurley - a stick with a flatter end than a hockey stick, like a large wooden spatula. The Goal has uprights and a crossbar. Points are scored by

hitting the ball over the crosshar. goals underneath.

Like most Irish girls Carmel Hannigan, 30, was given a tiny hurley as soon as she could walk When she came to Britain in 1975 she tried hockey but says, There is no comparison. My instinct is to keep the ball in the air.'

Carmel now lives and works in

London. I like to exhaust myself mentally during the week, but at weekends I like both to use my brain and exhaust myself physically.' Two years ago she decided to find a local camogic team to play with and rung Sportsline, the computerised sports information service that operates in the London area. 'Ithought I'd stump them - but they had an answer!' The then Greater London Council was planning an events day and had contacted other members of the Irish community in London about staging a camogic game. Carmel went to a meeting and it took off from there. Now there are three London clubs including her own, London Irish -and about ten around the country. More and more women are coming into the game all the time. To begin with, they were homesick Irish women, but now the game is attracting others who, like Gill Harding, a 27-year old community worker from Barnet, don't have Gaelic roots. Gill played centre-forward for Hertfordshire hockey team and has only been playing camogie since January this year. 'My friend's jogging partner's flatmate suggested I go along to a London Irish training session. I scored five goals straight away, so they made sure to take my name and address before I went home!" Many sportswomen find that success with limited experience is often the spur to harder training and That improvement: motivation for me, says Gill

The withdrawal of Tipperary and Down from the senior championship was a major disappointment. Emigration was a factor in both decisions. Failure to find adequate replacements reflects a shallow well of talent. The extent of the ground to be made up in both counties may be measured by the lack of success at junior and minor levels.

There is talk of Down and Tipperary seeking regrading. It would be a pity to see Tipperary, who have contested six All-Ireland senior finals, taking a backward step. Hopefully, the heroic deeds of their hurlers in the Munster championship will inspire the Tipperary girls to emulate them.

MARY MORAN COMPARES

TODAY'S GAME WITH THE GAME OF YESTERYEAR

ANY stars from Dublin's M glorious past took down their boots to celebrate National Camogie Day at Na Fianna recently. With the odd grey hair showing here and there, Kay Lyons, Gerry Hughes, Una O'Connor, Carmel Walsh, Sophie Brack, Judy Doyle and the legendary Kathleen Mills were among the familiar faces.

What a host of wonderful camogie memories were brought to mind by the gathering. The seven named can boast of a combined tally of sixty three All-Ireland senior medals. Each one was a celebrity in her own right on the game's most successful team.

The many changes which have taken place in the games since their playing days were topics of conversation. The most obvious, of course, concerns the style of dress. Gone are the days of the swishing gym frocks, coloured sashes and long black stockings. The modern uniform is more suited to an energetic game.

The larger pitch, lighter and faster sliothars and male trainers are part of the modern inter-county scene, However, none of the boys could hope to match the status or records achieved by Nell McCarthy, the Dublin coach of their golden era.

There is certainly more emphasis on physical fitness nowadays. But whether the players are fitter as a result is debatable. Players in the fifties and sixties did not confine their camogie activity to matches and organised training. In fact, they rarely left their stick aside and, consequently, needed less physical training.

Angela Downey is the only player in today's game who could match Kathleen Mills and Una O'Connor in star quality. The modern game is very short on personality players.

I wonder if the tendency nowadays

to participate in several sports hinders the attainment of mastery in one. However, in fairness to the current players, it must be said that some of the supporting players on former winning teams would not make their county's present side.

The bond between players in those days was stronger. Perhaps this was because players looked to camogie for friends. Greater combination and teamwork was reflected in the game as a result.

Nowadays there are far more girls playing camogie. The majority of inter-county players have achieved a good standard. The days when a particular county dominated the scene are gone. At least four counties are capable of winning the All-Ireland Senior Championship today.

The tremendous work being done at underage level in Galway was borne out by the competent manner in which their minor team retained the All-Ireland crown. In accounting for Dublin and Cork, the side displayed skill, teamwork and maturity. It takes many hours by club trainers and school coaches to achieve this standard.

Triona Dolphin proved to be a tower of strength at centreback. Each time Mary Treacy, Aileen Brett, Bridget Fahy or Catriona Finnegan gained possession, a score looked on. Galway contested the first All-Ireland Senior Final in 1932 but they have yet to carry home the O'Duffy Cup. Let us hope that these fine prospects will realise that dream

Kilkenny favourites for senior title

WITH little more than a week to go to the All-Ireland Camogie finals, training schedules are winding down in Kilkenny and Cork. There is a great air of expectancy at the meeting of these countieh in the senior final.

They faced each other for the first time in 1970, when captained by Ann Comerford, Cork won 5-7 to 3-2 to bridge a gap of 27 years. There are two survivors from that match Marion McCarthy, a Cork substitute on that occasion, is now goalkeeper while Liz Neary wore the number six shirt for Kilkenny.

Two years later Kilkenny and Cork were back in the final with Cork, led by Hannah Dineen, finishing on top by 2-5 to 1-4. Bridie McGarry and Angela Downey had arrived on the scene by then.

the final. A few wteks later, Teresa O'Neill stepped up to take the O'Duffy Cup for the first time. Cork and Kilkenny were back in the final in 1981 and played another draw-

Kilkenny captained by Liz Neary, came out on top in the replay by 1-9 to 0-7, so the score between the counties stands at two each-

Cork lead in the overall position with 14 All-Ireland senior titles to Kilkenny's six. Apart from the finals, there have been great contests between them at the semi-final stage of the championship. While Kilkenny will deservedly start as favourites, it would be foolish indeed to discount Cork.

THE MOST successful group of sports people in Kilkenny in recent years will be out to grab the glory again this week-end. The talented senior camogie ladies take on mighty Cork in what should be a fascinating finish to the All-Ireland open draw championship.

These two great exponents of the game clash at Croke Park on Sunday, and the prize for the winners will be the handsome O'Duffy Cup. Kilkenny will be chasing their third title on-the-trot. The Leesiders will be after their 15th.

The ingredients are there for one of the best finals ever, with the Noresiders all out to register their first three together, and Cork determined to regain the title they last held in 1983.

In 1985 the ladies registered the never before achieved double of National League and Championship. They followed that in '86 with an All-Ireland win. This year they have already captured the League, so they are on the threshold of another magnificent double. In the same three years, there are few, if any people in this county who have achieved so much at such a high level. Well done ladies!

Taken for granted

Let us be honest, these feats have not gained the recognition they deserve.

Perhaps we all take the ladies for granted!

But it takes as big an effort from them to win an All-Ireland as it does the men.

Remember, there are some married women with children involved, and combining family and sporting life can, as anyone can imagine, be difficult. Now the ladies are heading to Croke Park as favourites.

And the All-Ireland experience will be very special for two players, Liz Neary (Kilkenny) and Marion McCarthy (Cork). They were involved in the first senior All-Ireland clash between the same counties, which was in 1970, when the Leesiders won by 5-7 to 3-2.

It's not just the medals

FEW PLAYERS at the highest level in any code can look back on a career which stretches back to the earliest years of the last decade.

Yet on Sunday, when Kilkenny take on Cork in the All-Ireland camogle final in Croke Park, no less than four of the Kilkenny girls will be able to make that boast.

And those four girls can claim an even more worthy honour. Should Kilkenny beat Cork, captain Bridie McGarry, Liz Neary and Ann and Angela Downey will all claim their seventh medal.

To the sporting world at large, Angela Downey is perhaps the most widelyknown of that worthy quartet. Goalscorers in any game command headlines and Angela Downey gets lots of goals.

In the All-Ireland semi-final against Dublin this year, a close first half gave way to a near landslide for Kilkenny in the second.

The main reason? Downey cracked home two goals in two minutes and Dublin were doomed.

In last year's All-Ireland semi-final against Cork, the black and amber trailed by five points with two minutes to go. As Downey herself says: "We were dead and buried".

But Cork did not win the match — Jo Dunne and Angela Downey grabbed a goal each, and Kilkenny had risen from the dead.

Angela Downey is only 30 years old, but for 15 of those years she has been playing intercounty camogie. She was called on to the Kilkenny team as a 15-year-old in 1972, and won her first All-Ireland medal two years later in 1974.

The awards in camogic have come steadily to the Downey household since then. The twin sisters, Ann and Angela, have won provincial and league medals with Kilkenny, and club honours with St. Paul's.

Angela came to the notice of a wider public last year when she was presented with a Texaco award, the first time camogie was chosen for such an award in almost 20 years.

The Kilkenny schoolteacher is now in no doubt but that the award was a "once-off" affair: "I would predict it won't be given to camogie this year," she says. "Some of the newspaper commentators were very critical last year. But if hurling and football are deserving of the award, why not camogie?"

She says women have to be very dedicated if they want to play camogie: "They will often have to cook a dinner before they go out to train or play a match. And if they have children they will have gear to wash, and housework to do. And, of course, a lot of women will have lobs as well," she points out.

All four of the girls who have the chance of winning a seventh All-Ireland medal this Sunday have played with the St. Paul's side which has won its way into the Leinster final

So Angela Downey certainly knows about the busy schedule some camogie players face. Sunday's match against Cork offers the attraction of the old rivalry between these two consults.

Hurling as it should be played

NO sickening cheating on the field; no preposterous posturing on the tannoy; no clockwork mannikins in the VIP box. Today is All-Ireland camogie finals day; and sport, and the true and only spirit of sport, will prevail in and illumine Croke Park.

Virtually everybody who watches camogie agrees that the pace and standard of the game have risen, and risen constantly, over the past quarter century or so. Indeed, it may be argued that most of the greatest women who ever wielded ash did or do so in the present decade. And a significant proportion of them will be on view today.

After beating Tipperary in the final of 1984, Dublin seemed to be the up and coming force which would dominate camogie for a few years. Kilkenny were coming too; and three seasons of these teams' struggle for outright sovereignty produced many splendid matches. But that epoch ended three weeks ago in definitive subjugation, by treble scores, of Dublin.

Kilkenny are now an awesome force, full of power, experience, cunning and class. And they have Angela Downey. Like Pele and Ring she will never enter into legend: the feats and facts of her career are more extraordinary and glorious than any legend. Yet, even

without her this Kilkenny combination would probably feel confident of victory, for her sister Ann, Claire Jones, Bridie McGarry, Liz Neary and the rest are all splendid hurlers to whom winning and the secrets of winning are second nature.

For a few years Cork practised a clever system of economy by selecting players who could go to the matches on the free travel scheme. The present mentors have come up with a wheeze of their own which involves packing the defence with forwards and the attack with midfielders. It makes for variety, for the unexpected, for contention, but hardly for success.

Transmute

They struggled dreadfully against a mediocre Wexford side and the reasons were not hard to find. Cork has, in Val Fitzpatrick, one of the most natural midfielders playing hurling today: very much from the mould of Ger Fennelly - though a far better free taker - relaxed, confident and skillful on the ball, and capable of endless, intelligent travelling. But selectors persist in trying to transmute her into a centre forward — a signal waste of time and talent. And today they start with a player who

often looks to have the makings of the ideal centreforward, Claire Cronin, at midfield.

Cork probably have some slight superiority of pace, especially out on the wings where Linda Mellerick, Sandy Fitzgibbon and Irene O'Leary can burn the grass underfoot. And Mary Ring is better equipped than almost anybody else to mark Angela Downey. But Cork have problems at centreback. Peerless Cathy Landers was never going to be easy to replace: but to try to do so with slowish one-sided full forward, Anne Leahy, smacks of a collective selectorial brainstorm.

And therein probably lies the key to today's game. The frenetic stage of an All-Ireland final is hardly the place for trying to turn an inside out team right side out again. Kilkenny have a smooth, settled and irresistible look about them. They should have a bit to spare at the end. And if the standard comes anywhere near that of the classic Glen Rovers and St Paul's club confrontation of a year ago - a repeat of which is coming up - nobody will go home unhappy.

The junior final may very well be a terrific contest, for Armagh beat Galway and Kildare beat Cork in the semifinals, and neither side is likely to be at all in awe of the other. Kildare's greater experience may shade it for

Irene O'Leary, Cork's top scorer along with Colette O'Mahony, are two young players who can notch up the scores while full forward Noelle O'Driscoll is well known for her accuracy from placed balls. All-in-all, this is a better balanced team than that which lined out against Wexford and while Kilkenny will enter this game as firm favourites Cork won't mind entering this final as the underdogs.

The Junior finalbetween Kildare and Armagh brings together two counties who have yet to win an All-Ireland title. Armagh were beaten in the finals of 1979 and 1985 while Kildare fell at the hands of Clare last year. Kildare have the evergreen Miriam Malone in their side and while one would not begrudge victory to Armagh, an All-Ireland medal would be a fitting reward to Miriam for her tremendous loyalty to Kildare and Leinster for many, many years.
